TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

Polls will be open from 10:00 am to 7:00 pm.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officials for the year ensuing.
- 2. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict revenues from the sale of recyclable materials to expenditures for the purpose of buildings and/or equipment for municipal recycling purposes? Such revenues and expenditures shall be accounted for in a special revenue fund to be known as the Recycling Building/Equipment Fund, separate from the general fund. Any surplus in said fund shall not be deemed part of the general fund accumulated surplus and shall be expended only after a vote by the legislative body to appropriate a specific amount from said fund for a specific purpose related to the purpose of the fund or source of the revenue.

You are hereby notified to meet at the American Legion Hall in said Kensington on Thursday, the twelfth day of March, next at 7:30 pm to act upon article 3 and subsequent articles:

- 3. To raise such sums as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same. Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$524,053
- 4. To see if the Town will grant the selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes not to exceed \$1,000,000
- 5. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money; provided; (1) that such grants and other moneys do not require the expenditure of town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as by RSA 31:95-b.
- 6. By petition of Johanna Rice and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$370 (Three hundred seventy dollars) to assist Seacoast Hospice, a non-profit organization.
- 7. By petition of Clair Cushman and other registered voters of the Town of Kensington: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 (One thousand dollars) to assist Rockingham Counselling Center, formerly Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private non-profit organization which offers quality counseling services to our residents.

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- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000 (Forty-five thousand dollars) for work on town owned property on Trundle Bed Lane to allow for sand and salt storage for the Highway Dept. and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose.
- 9. By petition of Linda Buxton and others: To see if the Town will vote to go to the "pay-per-bag" user fee system of paying for solid waste disposal and to raise and appropriate \$1,500 (One thousand five hundred dollars) to purchase the necessary stickers." If this article passes, the effective date of "pay-per-bag" will be May 1, 1992.
- 10. By petition of Harriette Willoughby and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,767 (Two thousand seven hundred sixty-seven dollars) to be added to the Recycling Building/Equipment Fund and authorize the use of the December 31, 1991 fund balance for this purpose.

This money represents the sale of recycling materials collected through the Recycling Program in 1991. The RB/E fund established through RSA 31:95-c and enacted through passage of Warrant Article #2.

- 11. By petition of Alicia Sargent and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,002 (One thousand two dollars) to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, multi-service anti-poverty agency. This amount represents 4.5% of \$22,257 (twenty-two thousand, two hundred fifty-seven dollars), the value of services rendered to Kensington residents from July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991.
- 12. By petition of Susan Varn and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$533 (Five hundred thirty-three dollars) for the Women's Resource Center, a private-non-profit organization, to assist in funding the Rape Crisis Intervention Program. This agency has a 24-hour crisis hotline, advocates for sexual abuse survivors and provides educational prevention programs in the schools.
- 13. By petition of Carol Sargent and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,461.80 (Two thousand four hundred sixty-one dollars and eighty cents) to the Rockingham Visiting Nurse Association for providing continued health care services to the residents of the town.
- 14. By petition of Margaret Ruggeri and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 (Five hundred dollars) for the support of the Seacoast Mental Health Center, Inc.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Town Meeting.

You are hereby notified to meet at the American Legion Hall in said Kensington on Thursday, the fourteenth of March, next at 7:30 pm to act upon article 2 and subsequent articles:

<u>ARTICLE 2.</u> To raise such sums as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same. Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the ensuing year is \$466,869.00.

Joe Ripel moved to adopt the article, seconded by Mike Schwotzer. Joe Ripel spoke to the article. Barbara Boudreau spoke to the importance of keeping town expenses down. She read 7 amendments she wanted voted on. The moderator indicated that there is a problem in parliamentary procedure. Mrs. Boudreau stated that she would like to have these voted on tonight, each individually if possible.

Amendment 1: That no ones property tax be higher than 1/6 of their previous years reported income. Seconded by John Sargent, Jr. Moderator stated he thinks the town does not have the right not to vote on this amendment. Paul Steeves spoke by saying that he does not think this is relevant to the article being discussed. After moderator consulted with the Selectmen, he agreed that this amendment runs counter to warrant article 2 and he ruled it out of order. This amendment and all of Mrs. Boudreau's other amendments will be taken up at a different time.

After a little discussion of the police budget, John Larsen moved to call the question, seconded by Mike Schwotzer. The voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

 $\underline{\text{ARTICLE}}$ 3. To see if the Town will grant the selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Joe Ripel moved to adopt the article, seconded by Mike Schwotzer. Joe Ripel explained how we always have to borrow money to pay our obligations before tax monies start coming in. Bi-annual taxes did not eliminate this practice. The

school bill is large and tax revenue is down. John York stated that he thinks that we need to vote tonight on the amount of money the selectmen have the right to borrow.

Joe Ripel made an amendment, seconded by John Sargent, Sr. to borrow up to \$750,000. After little discussion the amendment was voted on. The voice vote did not carry.

James Rosencrantz, Sr. made a motion to amend the article to add to it that the selectmen have the authority to borrow up to \$1,000,000 in anticipation of taxes, seconded by Robert Dow. The voice vote was in the affirmative.

The voice vote on the amended article was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money; provided; (1) that such grants and other moneys do not require the expenditure of town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as by RSA 31:95-b.

Joe Ripel made a motion to adopt the article, seconded by Mike Schwotzer. Sandra Mitchell asked if this meant matching grants. Joe Ripel thinks it does not mean we can't use matching funds. Seth Perry asked if matching funds have to be appropriated. Joe Ripel answered yes, like in recycling last year.

Motion was made by Jim Thompson, seconded by Sandra Mitchell to change the word "other" under (1) in "expenditures of other town funds" to "unbudgeted" town funds. The voice vote on the amendment was in the affirmative.

The voice vote on the amended article was in the affirmative.

<u>ARTICLE 5.</u> To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000 to resurface a portion of Wild Pasture Road.

Joe Ripel moved to adopt the article, seconded by Mike Schwotzer. Mr. Ripel spoke to the article. The selectmen hate to ask for the money but thought it was necessary to keep up with maintenance of town roads. There was some discussion and Mr. Bob Sargent stated that this would only enable both ends of the road to be paved. To pave the entire road would cost about \$50,000. The condition of the

subsurface etc., will be checked before paving was done. Continuing to patch the roads does not last and costs the town a lot of money, too.

After a little more discussion the hand vote was taken and carried:

<u>Yes 65</u> <u>No 57</u>

<u>ARTICLE</u> 6. By petition of Carol Sargent and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,461.80 to the Rockingham Visiting Nurse Association for providing continued health care services to residents of the Town.

Motion was made by Carol Sargent to adopt the article, seconded by Pat Williams. Carol spoke to the article. Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

<u>ARTICLE 7.</u> By petition of Margaret Ruggeri and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Seacoast Mental Health Center, Inc.

Margaret Ruggeri moved to adopt the article, seconded by Mike Schwotzer. Margaret spoke to the article. Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

ARTICLE 8. By petition of Doug Armstrong and others: To see if the Town will vote to have all solid waste in Kensington picked up at curbside to be in specifically marked plastic bags sold only by the town. All monies received from these bags to be used to offset expenses of solid waste disposal tipping fees, the cost to be \$1.00 per bag. If article passes, the effective date of "Pay-Per-Bag" to be June 1, 1991.

Doug Armstrong moved to adopt the article, seconded by Betty Willoughby. Doug Armstrong spoke at great length and detail to the article. Betty Willoughby made a motion to amend the article taking out the word "tipping" and add the word "maximum" before "cost to be \$1.00", seconded by Karl Singer. Voice vote on the amendment was in the affirmative.

Others spoke in favor and against the article. Alfred Felch made a motion to add to the article "The selectmen will set a weekly fee for all dumpsters picked up by the town", seconded by John York. Doug Armstrong spoke to the amendment explaining this pertained to the businesses in town and that these tipping fees now are being paid for by the town. Voice vote did not carry.

After further discussion the voice vote on the seconded article failed to carry.

ARTICLE 9. By petition of Clair Cushman and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650 to assist Rockingham Counseling Center, formerly Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit organization, which offers quality counseling services to our residents.

Motion was made by Clair Cushman to adopt the article, seconded by Nancy Roffman. Clair Cushman spoke to the article. The voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

<u>ARTICLE 10.</u> By petition of Ruth Rosencrantz and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the Richie McFarland Children's Center. (\$250 for each child served: 0 being served but services are available for residents.)

Motion was made by James Rosencrantz, Sr. to adopt the article, seconded by Dwight Crow. Mr. Rosencrantz spoke to the article. Nancy Borden explained this program helps children with developmental problems.

Voice vote was in the affirmative.

<u>ARTICLE 11.</u> By petition of Patricia Linneman and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$370 to assist Seacoast Hospice, a non-profit organization.

Pat Linneman made a motion to adopt the article, seconded by Nancy Roffman. Mrs. Linneman spoke to the article. Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

ARTICLE 12. By petition of Alicia Sargent and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,117 for the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. This amount represents 4.5% of \$24,826, the value of services rendered to Kensington residents from July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990.

Motion was made by Betty Willoughby to adopt the article. seconded by Alicia Sargent. Betty spoke to the article. Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

ARTICLE 13. By petition of James Ouellet and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175 to support the Rockingham Nutrition Program's meals services for older, homebound older and handicapped Kensington residents.

Motion was made by James Rosencrantz, Sr. to adopt the article, seconded by Karl Singer. Mr. Rosencrantz spoke to the article. Voice vote was in the <u>affirmative</u>.

ARTICLE 14. By petition of Donna Hall and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$480 to the Women's Resource Center, a private, non-profit organization, to assist in funding the Rape Crisis Intervention Program. This agency has a 24-hour crisis hotline, advocates for sexual abuse survivors and provides educational prevention programs to school children.

Motion was made by Susan Varn to adopt the article, seconded by Donna Hall. Donna spoke to the article. Voice vote was in the $\underline{affirmative}$.

<u>ARTICLE 15.</u> To see if the Town will vote to require that the Town officials and agencies do not participate in any emergency planning activities for the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant.

A motion was made by Joe Ripel to adopt the article, seconded by Mr. Mattin. The moderator stated there has been an appropriate number of requests that this be a paper ballot vote. It will be a paper ballot vote, part of the reason being that last year this was a very close vote. Joe Ripel and Susan Maire spoke to the article.

Karl Singer made a motion to drop the word "not" to make it more clear as to what we are voting for, seconded by Pat Williams. This change was approved by the selectmen. Voice vote on the amendment was affirmative.

The moderator clarified that a yes vote means that there will be participation, a no vote means that there will not be participation. After some discussion a paper ballot was cast:

Yes 100 No 20

The Town will participate in planning activities.

 ${\underline{\mathtt{ARTICLE}}}$ 16. To transact any business that may legally come before the Town Meeting.

James Rosencrantz handed over to Robert Sargent, chairman of the Grange Hall Committee, a check for \$204.13, money left over from donations after having a plaque made in memory of Charles Eastman. Bob reported on the slow progress of the Grange Hall renovations.

Barbara Boudreau made a motion to adopt the following amendments:

That the Town agree not to accept any new property gifts so as not to reduce the present percentage of property generating property tax income. It was <u>not seconded</u>.

That the Town should revalue its properties every 5 years instead of our present 10 years to accommodate our dramatically fluctuating market values. It was not seconded.

To restrict town-owned cars from being used to transport town workers to and from work and home for lunch seconded by Sandra Mitchell. Barbara spoke to the amendment. The voice vote did not carry.

Jill Coffin made a comment she was appalled by the disrespect some people have for others when voicing their opinions which they are entitled to at this town meeting.

Judy Santarelli spoke about her concern for her children at school in the case of an emergency at Seabrook. Susan Maire stated there is an Emergency Management Team and they need input by townspeople to know what concerns need to be met.

The Selectmen asked Steve Smith to announce the meeting being held on March 27th at the town hall at 7 pm regarding the Pease Development Authority. The meeting is opened to the public.

1991 has been a year of concern and gratification for our town. the concern of providing services that are adequate and consistent with the past in light of a recessive economy and the gratification of a town pulling together when confronted with adversity.

All taxpayers were rewarded with the efforts of the school board and other volunteer and professional employees of the town in holding the line in spending. There were many instances when a "no" vote had to be cast for a worthy cause. The Board knows this effort and dedication will continue in years to come. The concern of providing service is forefront.

Dedication is a key word as Hurricane Bob so adequately demonstrated. The EOC (Emergency Operations Center) was activated on September 9 in cooperation with the State Emergency Management Center. This group of Emergency Management people responded immediately, without regard for their own potential problems, in the spirit of true community service. People literally placed themselves in life threatening situations for the good of their fellow man. Enough cannot be said of their contributions.

Administratively, several changes occurred in the course of the year: Frank Kinslow accepted the position of Emergency Management Director (just in time for Hurricane Bob). His vacated position of Building Inspector was filled by Frank Felch. Lucien Lizotte was appointed Road Agent just prior to the first ice of the year.

Looking back and ahead, the Selectmen have determined a dire need for an area to store our sand and salt for the winter season. We're certain most people have noticed the pile behind the Town Hall. This is an interim measure for this year only and a permanent measure must be taken for the future. This means a facility to store the material under environmentally safe conditions. Fortunately, the town received property off Trundle Bed Lane in 1989 and hopefully this site can be developed to provide the required facility.

We would like to collectively extend our thanks and appreciation for those employees and especially volunteers who have made our town what it is with their tireless and unrelenting devotion and dedication. We would list them, but it would fill pages. This town needs them and you.

The Bisbees have taken very good care of the cemetery and we appreciate their dedication. We hope our tractor and trimmer will continue to give us good service through the coming year. They do get a lot of use as they are used for the town park and library grounds as

well.

Please remove all winter bouquets, etc. from the cemetery by April 1. Please do not throw things over boundaries onto our

neighbor's property.

Again we urge all who have cemetery plots to establish perpetual care. Lots in the cemetery are not sold and may only be procured upon the death of a resident. The interest from these trusts helps pay maintenance.

BURIAL PROCEDURES: In the event of a death, the family should contact the Town Office or one of the Cemetery Trustees.

LOT SELECTION: In the event that the family does not already have a plot, the Cemetery Trustees will assist the deceased's family in selecting one. There are two graves to a plot.

WINTER BURIALS: Due to weather, road conditions and frozen or muddy ground, the Village Cemetery will no longer be open for winter burials. In the event of death the Vault is available for storage until spring burial.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1991

The Kensington Fire Dept. and Rescue Squad has had a very successful year in 1991. Finishing my second year as Fire Chief, I feel very fortunate to be a part of an organization with as many caring and dedicated members as the Kensington Fire Dept. and Rescue Squad.

So much is required of firefighters and rescue personnel today, especially school and training, that it is quite a commitment of time and effort for each member. This past year we have had an increase of five members added to our roster, we have also added 3 E.M.T.'s and 5 Advance First Aid personnel to the Rescue Squad. More than 12,000 hours have been expended by these members keeping the equipment in repair, maintaining the station, administration, planning, education, training, and responding to alarms.

I would like to highlight some of the accomplishments of the Fire

Department for 1991.

- The complete renovation of the upstairs storage room into an office for the Rescue Squad Leader and the Fire Chief.

- The parking lot out back was made larger to accommodate more vehicles for Fire Dept. and School functions.

- A Standard Operating Procedure manual has been put together by a committee to better coordinate our activities at an incident, and has been passed out to each member.

- All water holes and dry hydrants in town have now been repaired and cleaned out. All dry hydrants have had new strainers installed.

- The Ambulance replacement fund is now in excess of \$14,000.

- The presentation of our fire prevention program has now been expanded

to include the day schools in town.

As mentioned in the 1990 town report, we have formed a new truck committee, this committee has been working very hard throughout the year on specifications for this new pumper. This pumper will replace our old pumper, which is 25 years old this year and no longer reliable. 1992 is the last payment on our newest truck purchased in 1986. The first lease payment on this new pumper would be due 1 year after delivery, sometime in 1993. This new pumper would be a very important step in keeping our department effective in the protection of life and property in the town of Kensington.

The Kensington Fire Station has been designated the Emergency Operations Center for the Town of Kensington. An emergency generator has been installed by Seabrook Yankee to keep the department and part of the school operational during any loss of power. The Emergency Operations Center (E.O.C.) will be activated during any large scale area emergency, such as a hurricane, tornado, crippling snow storm, emergency at Seabrook Yankee, etc. For help during a large scale emergency you can call this number to reach the E.O.C. 772-9787, if you can not reach the E.O.C., call 772-5191 for Rockingham Dispatch and relay your emergency.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members for all

their hard work and for making this a very successful year.

Most of all I would like to express my gratitude to the residents of Kensington for their generous financial and moral support.

It is a pleasure to serve this community as Fire Chief and I will continue to do so to the best of my ability.

The Fire Dept. & Rescue Squad have had a total of 70 fire calls and 75 ambulance calls for 1991, with a breakdown as follows:

REPORT OF THE KENSINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

As your Chief of Police, I am pleased to report to you the activities of the Kensington Police Department for the calendar year 1992.

Economic downfalls are felt by everyone. Municipal budgets are no different. I think we all understand the need for adequate police

services. The question is to what extent?

Budget restraints for three consecutive years requires changes in any department. We now must prioritize calls for service and respond accordingly. An example would be us now spending more of our limited patrol coverage in the neighborhoods preventing residential burglaries. This means less time enforcing motor vehicle laws.

We have managed to reduce the number of house breaks by 5 over

We have managed to reduce the number of house breaks by 5 over last year. We are certainly pleased by this, however, we paid the toll in the reduction of motor vehicle summons and D.W.I. arrests by approximately 50% under last years figures in both categories. This is a real concern to the Police Department. We are also spending more time investigating major crimes than in previous years. Simply taking the police report is not adequate or even acceptable to the victim by today's standards. A call for service may take weeks to complete with any degree of success.

In addition, more court time is now being required by all officers. Again, I contribute this to the faltering economy. More people seem to be contesting a ticket or criminal charges than in the past. An average court session for one of our officers requires his presence between 2 and 8 hours in the court room. As much as we understand the financial strain placed not only on the accused, but also the absence of patrol coverage during this period. In any event, we cannot jeopardize the safety of the community by putting blinders on.

This year, I encourage your thoughts and questions pertaining to your Police Department, not only as taxpayers, but concerned citizens. If you don't ask, you may be relying on false impressions. I honestly believe in order to maintain a working and professional relationship between town and any department, citizens should be aware of services available and the limitations associated with it. This would certainly make the lives of your police officers a little easier.

In closing, I want to give special thanks to the Board of Selectmen, the Fire Department, and Lucien Lizotte as the Road Agent for their support and cooperation. I know these groups and others have worked hard throughout the year to make Kensington a better place to live. I look forward in sharing mutual support with these groups in

1992.

For your information I have included a Consolidated Crime Report for the Kensington Police Department for the year 1991.

The aerobics program is still very popular with adult residents and is offered 5 times weekly. Stay in shape and stay in touch--call Donna Carter for details.

The girl's softball program grows each season under the guidance of Dave and Rita Podalsky and their numerous volunteers. Two teams traveled to compete with teams from surrounding towns. The girls are learning the basic skills and the Recreation Committee is looking into having a pitching clinic this spring. Thanks to the local merchants and interested townspeople who donated the girls' shirts.

The summer program in the park for children K-6 was enjoyed by more than sixty children. Sheila Lane, with local teenage assistance, offered the children a wide range of activities. The program runs from 9 am - 1 pm daily for one week in July and one week in August. This

year the children enjoyed a field trip to Wallis Sands and a performance by the Little Red Wagon.

In April a 60' x 80' asphalt pad was installed at the park. The Recreation Committee purchased basketball standards which will be

REPORT OF THE RECYCLING COMMITTEE

Our recycling program continues with the use of our MRCC (Coke truck) and we have expanded our program as the recycling market becomes available. Aerosol cans, paint cans, automobile type batteries and waste oil have all been added to our ever increasing list of acceptable recyclables. All our materials are sold locally, the MRCC travels to Nashua with the plastic, glass and aluminum while all the other recyclables are taken to Amesbury or used right here in Kensington. We continue to receive monthly checks from Container Recovery in Nashua and also from Shorts in Amesbury for our paper goods and cardboard. Five cent refundables are taken to Massachusetts and Maine by volunteers. The only marketed item we receive no revenue from, still, is from the metal can category, although they are recycled and taken from the waste stream.

As you can see in the Financial Report that follows, our income greatly exceeds our expenses. The cost avoidance factor at the landfill should not be overlooked either.

At this point of the recycling program we would like to find an available building or erect a building to operate our baler. Also, we support the pay-per-bag article and feel we would see an increase in participation in recycling if this was to pass. Maybe in the not too distant future, if the pay-per-bag program materializes, curbside pickup of recyclables may be a consideration.

One of the biggest drawbacks with recycling is contamination. Contamination is: mixing materials, recycling unclean materials, adding dirt in with your items. If in doubt, please ask. Crushing materials is for our benefit so we may carry more in the same space but they need to be crushed before coming to the recycling drop-off center. If crushed at the MRCC, dirt and gravel are added to the bins and could

cause us to loose our market.

TAICOME

We continue to look for volunteers and committee members. Drivers with commercial drivers licenses are also needed to help us on a rotating basis with trucking. The program continues to grow and functions well with all interested and devoted volunteers and participants.

GRANGE HALL COMMITTEE

Last year the committee reported that several decisions had been made about renovations to the Grange Hall. We are very pleased to report to the townspeople that many of the

major renovations have already taken place.

The back ell now has a foundation, the electrical work has been completed, a central heating system and insulation has been installed and the plaster on the ceiling and walls has been restored. In addition, the siding on the south side of the hall has been replaced and the roof repaired. The entire building has received a coat of stain. Hal Bodwell, Carol and Bob Sargent have worked diligently overseeing these renovations and have spent countless hours working on the renovations.

The entire committee has worked very hard on fundraising. Over \$22,000 has been raised over the past year and a half. We wish to thank all those who generously contributed to this project. We are especially grateful to the Kensington Elementary School PTO for its contributions and fundraising efforts. We thank the Historical Society and Police Association for its support. The Volunteer Fire Department has volunteered many hours to this project. In addition, several interest townspeople have given their time scraping and staining.

The committee is committed to finishing the renovations as soon as possible so the town can use this beautiful building. Despite the efforts to accomplish this task in a cost effective manner we find that we need more funds. The floor needs to be refinished, water and plumbing have yet to be installed and the woodwork must be sanded and painted. The sanding and painting is a labor intensive project. We

certainly could use some volunteers!

ROCKINGHAM PLANNING COMMISSION

During 1991 the Town of Kensington received a variety of services from the Rockingham Planning Commission.

In addition to general advisory services, the following direct technical assistance was provided:

- Researched off-street parking standards for commercial development and provided examples.
- Completed GIS-based groundwater resources map and related text for the Kensington Master Plan
- Provided complimentary copies of Planning and Land Use RSA books to the Planning Board.
- 4. Spoke with Planning Board Chairman regarding the McDonald Excavation on the Kensington/South Hampton town line; advised Board on further changes in RSA 155-E -- the State excavation regulations statute.
- Provided copy of Kensington base map to citizens working with the library.

In addition to Town-specific assistance, Kensington benefited from planning services provided on a region-wide basis, including land use planning, educational programs, transportation planning, solid waste management and other miscellaneous planning assistance.

SOUTHEAST REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT 53-B 1991 Annual Report

The Recycling Committee continued to study and make recommendations for a Recycling Facility to be located at the Fremont Landfill site. On February 21, 1991 the District voted to table for twenty-eight days the motion to proceed with building and operating a recycling facility in Fremont. At a special called meeting on March 7, 1991, the committee passed a motion to defer the implementation of the Fremont facility until August 15, 1991. On August 15, 1991, the vote was again tabled until October 17, 1991. At the October meeting, the motion to proceed with building a Fremont recycling facility was defeated.

The Recycling Committee continued the Grant Program for education and public relations. Brentwood, Fremont, Hampton, North Hampton, Sandown, and South Hampton applied for and received grants which totaled \$7,542.50. Again, the Recycling Committees have done an excellent job in producing educational materials for their communities. \$10,000.00 has been budgeted to continue this program in 1992-1993.

Household Hazardous Waste was, and is, an on-going issue for the Recycling Committee. The committee began planning a series of household hazardous waste collection days and also used oil and used tire collection programs for member towns.

A State Household Hazardous Waste Advisory Committee was established and Henry Mixter, Bob Batchelder, and Barton Carr were appointed as the District representatives to that committee. Mr. Batchelder has attended most of the meetings in Concord and reports that the committee is active and working and has ongoing efforts on House Bill 776 with

recommendations and comments.

The Landfill portion of the District operations continued with long-term contract with Waste Management of NH. Brentwood, Fremont, New Castle, North Hampton and Rye shipped to the Turnkey Landfill Facility in Rochester this past year. The tipping fee at Turnkey from July 1, 1991 through June 30, 1992 is \$50.18. We project the tipping fee for 1992-1993 will be between \$51.45 and \$52.00 depending on the CPI at January 1, 1992.

The Septage Committee and Waste-to Energy portions of the District were inactive and will continue to be so.

Walter Hill of South Hampton, chairman of the Liason Committee met with several key people in towns not currently members of the District.

IN THE UPCOMING YEAR:

The Administrative portion of the District will be reduced to a half-time operation. The present office location will be maintained, and the Administrative Assistant's hours will be reduced to twenty hours per week. The Recycling Committee will continue to explore options for processing recyclables for market. The committee will also continue the planning for two household hazardous waste days and a used oil and used tire program for member towns.

The Liason Committee will continue to work to establish stronger relationships with the Boards of Selectmen in the member municipalities and improving communications with other 149-M towns.

The District will continue to operate its brush/wood chipper. The chipper will be delivered and picked up at no charge to the member municipalities. The use of the chipper may be scheduled by calling the District Office or the Hampton Department of Public Works.

The District continues to have an agreement with Waste Not, Inc. for stump grinding and wastewood/wood demolition disposal. This service is located at the Town of Hampton landfill and is available to all member municipalities. It operates Monday, Wednesday and Saturday from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. A fee is charged for the use of the service. Further information may be obtained by calling the District Office.

KENSINGTON SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

MARCH 9, 1991

The moderator, Tom Kerr, called the meeting to order at 7:00PM.

Ann Noll led the meeting in a salute to the flag.

Tom Kerr introduced the school district officers, as well as: William Clancy, Superintendent of Schools, Darrell Lockwood and Kathleen Lynch, Assistant Superintendents of Schools, Gary Vander Els, Principal of the Kensington Elementary School and Ann Thompson, Attorney for the sending towns. Mr. Kerr stated that if there were no objections then he would allow the aforementioned persons to address Warrant Articles. There were no objections.

George Martin moved to dispense with the reading of the 1990 School District Meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by several persons. The vote was taken and was in the affirmative.

Mr. Kerr read the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1. Shall the school district accept the provisions of RSA 195-A (as amended) providing for the amendment of the area school written plan for schools located in Exeter serving the following grades 7-12, from the school districts of Brentwood, East Kingston, Exeter, Kensington, Newfields and Stratham in accordance with the provisions of the plan on file with the district clerk?

Hal Bodwell moved to accept Article 1. Linda Blood seconded the motion.

Tom Kerr then recognized Ann Thompson, Attorney representing the sending towns, who gave a detailed overview of the amended AREA agreement.

Tom Smith asked if any consideration had been given to changing the name of the Exeter AREA agreement so as to include the sending towns. Ms. Thompson answered that the consideration had never been addressed either at the inception of the original agreement or during any negotiations to amend the agreement.

Barbara Boudreau asked if construction of a new plant were in progress could Kensington pull out of the agreement. Ms. Thompson answered yes a sending district could terminate its association in the area plan by a school district vote and within forty-five days of the receiving districts approval of the bond issue and upon payment of any lawful indebtedness.

Donna Carter asked about the tuition rate. Darrell Lockwood stated that he is expecting the tuition rate to remain level for the next couple of years.

Don Chase questioned the initial litigation by the town of Exeter. Ann Thompson presented the meeting with a recap of the negotiations.

Gary Easson asked if Kensington would have a voice in determining the salaries of the administrators. Ms. Thompson answered that the sending towns had representatives on the Advisory Committee to determine those salaries.

Mr. Kutsch asked what Exeter would gain from the AREA agreement. Mr. Clancy answered that for many years there were questions and disagreements regarding the agreement and that with the amended agreement both Exeter and the sending towns had resolved those conflicts. In addition, Mr. Clancy stated he felt that Exeter residents had voted down a new addition to the elementary school two years ago because they first wanted the AREA agreement resolved. He felt that the major gain by all parties was peace and a better working relationship.

Dick Drew stated that the board felt the amended agreement was the best thing for the town of Kensington.

The question was called for and the vote was in a paper ballot form. The result of the vote was one hundred sixteen (116) affirmative and four (4) negative. The motion passed.

ARTICLE 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the School District at the same amount as paid in the previous year.

Hal Bodwell moved to accept Article 2. Linda Blood seconded the motion. There was no discussion. The vote was taken and was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

There were no reports.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year. Said money must be used for legal purposes for which the School District may appropriate money; requires a public hearing on the action to be taken; must not require the expenditure of other School District funds.

Dick Drew moved to accept Article 4. The motion was seconded by several persons. There was no discussion. The vote was taken and was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. To choose Agents and/or Committees in relation to any subject embraced by this Warrant.

No motions were made regarding this Article.

ARTICLE 6. To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials and agents and for the statutory obligations of the District.

Dick Drew moved to raise the sum of One Million, Seven Hundred Six Thousand, Seven Hundred Sixty-Four Dollars (\$1,706. 764). Mr. Drew indicated that this amount was Ten Thousand, Fifty-Two Dollars (\$10,052) less than the amount posted. The decrease was due to the reduction in the amount appropriated for NH Retirement. Linda Blood seconded the motion.

Gary Easson voiced his concern regarding a particular student from Kensington, now in High School, who he feels is lacking in the basics of grammar. He stated he felt teachers passed along students without investigating whether a student was accomplished in all aspects of the curriculum.

Barbara Boudreau addressed the meeting giving various New Hampshire statistics regarding school district budget increases over the past five years and the general economic status of N.H. Mrs. Boudreau stated that because school district budgets are funded solely by town taxes that budgets should remain at the 1990 level or even be lowered. Mrs. Boudreau intimated that teacher salaries are hidden in other line items and children may go without necessary items, but teachers were getting raises. In addition, Mrs. Boudreau stated that if the school district continued to pass inflated budgets that the town was sending a message to the state that they need not reconstruct the total tax structure. Mrs. Boudreau stated that the Kensington School Board had an open check book.

Linda Blood answered that Mrs. Boudreau's report may have been good in a general way, but stated that the board did not have an open check book and had worked very hard to bring in a fair budget while considering both the needs of the community as well as the Kensington students. Mrs. Blood noted that the 1991-92 budget is lower than the 1990-91 budget. Mrs. Blood also stated that the teachers were in the third year of their contract and the board had gone as far as fact finding during the negotiation process to bring about that contract.

Ann No11 addressed the meeting and stated that she felt the school board had done a very good job in planning the budget and had considered the monetary effect of the budget upon taxpayers while still providing the best education for our students.

Jessie York asked what the salary increases were for the teachers.

Hal Bodwell stated that the increase was 9.73~% and he noted that percentage was not an individual increase but an overall line item increase.

Gary Easson questioned the Eighty-Four Thousand Dollar (\$84,000) New Hampshire Public Tuition line item. Mr. Lockwood answered stating that the amount was in the special education account and was appropriated for four high school students next year. In addition, the amount included the possible placement of a preschool special needs student in the Seacoast Learning Collaborative Program next year. When questioned further whether the amount was being split among five students Mr. Lockwood noted that most of the amount involved was for a seriously involved special needs student being placed in a residential high school program next year.

Gary Easson asked what health insurance plan the board was using. Mr. Drew stated they were using Assets, however, they would be transferring to Blue Cross/Blue Shield as a cost effective measure

As there was no further discussion, the vote was taken by paper ballot. The result of the vote was Eighty-nine (89) affirmative and Twenty-Eight (28) negative. The motion passed.

Linda Blood then addressed the meeting noting how fortunate it is that the Kensington Elementary School was participating in the D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) Program. Mrs. Blood noted that the program's aim is to make children feel good about themselves while educating them on how dangerous drugs are. Mrs. Blood thanked Sergeant Magyar from the Kensington Police Department who has volunteered his own time to bring this program to the children in Kensington. He received a standing ovation!

ARTICLE 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Tom Kerr recognized Dick Drew who thanked that PTO for their expenditure of between Six and Eight Thousand Dollars (\$6,000 - 8,000) for the renovation of the playground.

Mrs. Brandano then addressed the meeting questioning the three-four year old program and the anticipated five-year old program at Kensington Elementary School. Mrs. Brandano stated she had spoken to both Mr. Yander Els and Mr. Lockwood voicing her concerns regarding the lottery process and the exclusion of those children not chosen to participate in the program. Mrs. Brandano stated she was willing to chair a Kindergarten Committee. Mrs. Brandano noted that New Hampshire was the only state without a mandatory Kindergarten and fifty percent of the towns in N.H. had public Kindergarten. Mrs. Brandano would really like to investigate the feasibility of having a Kindergarten in Kensington.

Mr. Bodwell stated that because of space limitations and the monetary commitment involved with the operation and staffing of a Kindergarten the board would not at this time recommend a Kindergarten but was not opposed to a Kindergarten study committee.

John Sargent Jr. then asked if Mr. Yander Els would explain the three-four year old program and the five-year old program.

Mr. Vander Els explained that both programs were in lieu of sending our preschool special need students out of district. Mr. Vander Els explained that in an effort to benefit children, save money and gain control over special education, the school had studied various alternatives and reached the conclusion that Kensington Elementary would house its' own Integrated special needs preschool program. Mr. Vander Els stated that after much study it was determined that a lottery system was the most fair way of choosing the non-coded students to obtain a heterogeneous mix of students, as in an "average" classroom for the program. Mr. Vander Els went on to say that next year the school would continue with the three-four year program and would add a five-year old program. Mr. Vander Els stated he felt both were very appropriate programs.

Mr. Lockwood addressed the meeting and stated that a comprehensive description of the program had been sent to the state department and reviewed by the Special Education Department at the programs inception and the state found it a model program and did allow for a lottery system. Mr. Lockwood stated that last week the Stratham School presented a package suggesting that Stratham follow Kensington's lead in investigating the same program rather than out of district placement for preschool special needs students.

Mr. York stated he thought it unfair that students be chosen by lottery rather than being evaluated for neediness. It was clarified that the lottery was only for the non-coded students.

Mrs. Felch asked how many students were actually special needs students.

Mr. Vander Els stated that presently there were four coded students and two at risk.

Mrs. Felch then asked if it were possible to charge tuition for the non-coded students.

Mr. Yander Els stated the board had investigated the possibility but had decided against it.

Mrs. Brandano again voiced her concerns regarding the non-coded students chosen for the program and stated that those children chosen at the age of three would continue in the program entering into grade one with three previous years at Kensington. Mrs. Brandano stated her concern was for those students not able to afford Kindergarten and by having the preschool programs at Kensington it would inhibit the town from having a public Kindergarten because of space requirements. Mrs.. Brandano also questioned the costs of the programs and intimated that the costs were hypothetical and Mr. Vander Els had not even seen the figures for the out of district placement of special needs students but had accepted the figures from staff members. In addition Mrs. Brandano stated she felt the programs were experimental programs and would rather go with a proven program such as Kindergarten.

Mrs. Murphy then addressed the meeting stating she had received a preschool application for her son however, he had not been chosen. She voiced her concern that all children receive the same preschool curriculum before entering grade one at Kensington. Mrs. Murphy also stated that until this evening she was not familiar with the evaluation screening process of preschool age children.

Mr. Powers then asked if the Grange could be considered as space for a Kindergarten.

Mr. Armstrong then addressed the meeting stating that his son had been chosen in the lottery but had he not been chosen he would have worked to send his son to preschool. He voiced his concern that the present discussion was casting a negative perception of the program. Mr. Armstrong further noted his son was quite happy being in the program. Mr. Armstrong stated he felt the program really worked well.

Mrs. Brandano again reiterated her feelings to investigate the feasibility of a Kindergarten.

Mr. Armstrong stated again that had not his son be chosen for the program he and his wife would have seen to it that his son receive a preschool education. He agreed that a study committee should be formed.

A resident questioned if a lottery system was in effect at any other school.

Mr. Lockwood answered yes that Seabrook was using the lottery system and again noted that the state had no problem with the system. Mr. Lockwood said he felt that the meeting was confusing the preschool program issue with the public Kindergarten issue.

Mrs. Brandano stated she would chair a Kindergarten study committee and once again voiced her concern regarding the preschool versus Kindergarten situation.

Mr. Drew stated that Mrs. Brandano had come to a recent school board meeting and she was told to come to school district meeting and ask for a Kindergarten study committee. Mr. Drew stated that with the space limitations it was not feasible to recommend Kindergarten at this time. In addition, Mr. Drew answered Mrs. Brandano's earlier statement that the town was funding an experimental preschool program and stated he felt it was not an experimental program because it really was working.

Mr. Kerr then stated that as there had been considerable discussion without any motion on the floor and the meeting had passed by Article 5 dealing with appointing committees he asked if there was a motion regarding the appointment of a Kindergarten study committee.

- Mr. Powers moved to appoint a Kindergarten study committee.
- Mr. Perry asked who would appoint the committee.
- Mr. Kerr stated the original motion had not been seconded.
- Hal Bodwell moved that the moderator appoint the committee.

Mr. Powers stated he felt that because the School Board had voiced their opposition to a Kindergarten that no one from the board serve on the committee.

Nancy Smith then addressed the meeting stating she took offense to that suggestion as Linda Blood unselfishly served on a Kindergarten study committee for many years and worked very hard on that committee.

John York then seconded the motion that the moderator choose a committee.

Hal Bodwell addressed the meeting reiterating that because of space limitations and the cost of a Kindergarten he was in opposition to a study committee. He stated he felt the committee would not get far because of the overall cost factor. Hal stated he thought the appointment of a Kindergarten Study Committee would not produce adoption of a Kindergarten Program next year.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Kerr asked for a second on the original motion. The motion was seconded, the vote was in the affirmative.

A vote was then taken on the motion that the moderator appoint a Kindergarten study committee. The vote was in the affirmative.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Kerr asked that anyone interested in serving on the study committee to see him after the meeting.

No further discussion followed on Article 7.

A motion was made and seconded for adjournment. The vote was in the affirmative. The meeting was adjourned at $9:00\ \text{PM}$

REPORT OF SAU 16 ADMINISTRATORS March, 1992

William J. Clancy, Superintendent Darrell J. Lockwood, Assistant Superintendent Kathleen M. Lynch, Assistant Superintendent

The school year 1991-1992 has seen the first year of our secondary schools functioning under the amended AREA Agreement.

Also, during the 1991–1992 year we have implemented the revised K-6 Reading Curriculum and the revised K-2 Math Curriculum. Much appreciation is owed to those teachers and administrators from all SAU 16 schools who participated in these critical projects.

The tuition rate for 1992-1993 at EAHS and EAJHS was set by the cooperative process detailed in the AREA agreement and the AREA Capital Committee has made a recommendation to the Exeter School Board regarding the science area of the EAHS.

The major focus of the development of each of our six school budgets for 1992-1993 has been the balance between the economic limitations we are all experiencing and the requirements we all share to adequately fund the education of our young who have only this opportunity to receive their public education.

There are plans for science classroom additions at EAHS and classroom additions and renovations at Exeter's Main Street School which will be placed before the Exeter taxpayers at the Annual District Meeting. A series of informational hearings sponsored by the respective building committees and the Exeter School Board have been held to inform the electorate of the specifics of each proposal. We are very grateful to those citizens who are serving on these facility committees.

Finally, a word of appreciation must be extended to the members of the budget committees in each of our communities. The input and advice each offers during the budget process is insightful and helpful as we attempt to construct responsible budgets which can meet our responsibilities to children.

Principal's Report

It is my privilege to report to you. Kensington Elementary School is committed to the belief that all children have great potential and are capable of growth and improvement. Our staff continues to strive for excellence and the opportunity for each student to develop academically, socially, physically, and emotionally to his or her potential in an integrated setting. TESA (Teacher Expectations Student Achievement) and Cooperative Learning are two methodologies we are presently utilizing to implement our beliefs.

We continue to fully utilize this facility. Our current enrollment is 176 students. In June 1990, there were 139 students. In June 1991, there were 158 students. The school census indicates a decrease of 10 students next year.

Our intermediate (Grades 4-6) children are or will be working on telecommunications units with 45 other schools. Through computer link ups we have exchanged data with children in Japan, England, and many of the states in our Union. We are very excited about the potential for these programs. Two of the units deal with acid rain and weather. The collection and analyses of data from all over the world encourages our children to be active learners in social studies, science, math and language arts.

Through the generosity of a local family, who wishes to remain anonymous, we have initiated the Kensington Elementary School Educational Trust. This trust will enable us to serve our children in new and challenging programatic, curricular, and technological ways. We are very grateful to this family for this beginning gesture. The impact, both fiscally and educationally in the future, will be significant. This interest only trust is open ended if anyone wishes to help us impact the future.

There continue to be staff changes at K.E.S. Marilyn Orr has taken a leave of absence. Diane Atherton is our new first grade teacher. Timothy Russell joins us as a music instructor. Nancy Leavitt left to work on a graduate degree. Physical Education teacher Patricia Yeaton has left. Her position has been taken by Michelle Grenier. Paul LeFevre departed to take a position in Rochester, NH. Mary Ellen Bergeron has replaced him. Dorothy Hubbard joins us as an instructional aide. Jacqueline Yaccaro is our new Chapter One tutor in Language Arts. We welcome all our new professionals and wish those leaving us our best wishes and thanks.

Our school board continues to strive to provide the best possible education for our children. Hal Bodwell is leaving the School Board after nine years of dedicated service. Hal also served as chairperson of our Building Committee when the new addition was constructed in 1987. Good luck and thanks Hall

Darrell Lockwood is leaving February 1 to take a similar position in East Haven, Connecticut. As I'm sure many of you will attest, he will be missed. His wisdom, intelligence, empathy, and honesty have helped guide Kensington in its quest for educational excellence. Godspeed Darrell!

Our P.T.O. continues to support us in our work. Their tireless efforts enable us to offer our children a wide variety of programs and extras. From cultural programs to hot lunches, from hay rides to technological advances, from a marvelous playground to field trips; we sincerely appreciate their work.

We are very appreciative of the efforts of countless townspeople for their encouragement, support, and help. You are welcome in our school at any time. We will continue to work hard to strive for excellence in all we do.

KENSINGTON SCHOOL DISTRICT EDUCATIONAL TRUST

The Kensington School District Educational Trust is established by the citizens of Kensington for the purpose of enhancing educational processes and learning opportunities for Kensington children of public school age. Funds may be added to the Trust by individuals and/or groups at any time by submitting said funds in the name of the Trust to the Kensington Trustee of the Trust Funds. The principal of the Trust will remain intact. This Trust will be reviewed and revised as deemed appropriate by the Kensington School Board every 5 years..

The founders of this Trust envision the following criteria as guidelines for disbursement of the accrued interest of the trust:

- "Cutting edge" curriculum ideas which keep Kensington School District at the forefront of educational advancement.
- 2) Programs which impact Special Reeds students.
- 3) Programs which impact 'Gifted' students.
- 4) Purchase of computers, computer accessories and other technological instructional tools.
- 5) Teacher development associated with new and challenging curricular advances.
- 6) Computer skills enhancement for students and/or staff.

A Committee appointed yearly by the Kensington School Board and made up of one member of the School Board, a Kensington Elementary School Teacher, the Principal of Kensington Elementary School and two (2) Kensington Citizens will meet periodically to review proposals for consideration of use of the fund.

Teachers and others may make proposals for consideration of the Trust Fund. They can seek support for a program or a creative "idea" by filing a proposal giving specific information regarding their request. All proposals for a given year will be due on February 1. Allocation awards will be announced in May of the same year. The recipients are then awarded the grants. Programs are implemented for the following school year unless otherwise decided. In June, the whole process begins again with plans for the next appeal which will begin the following September.

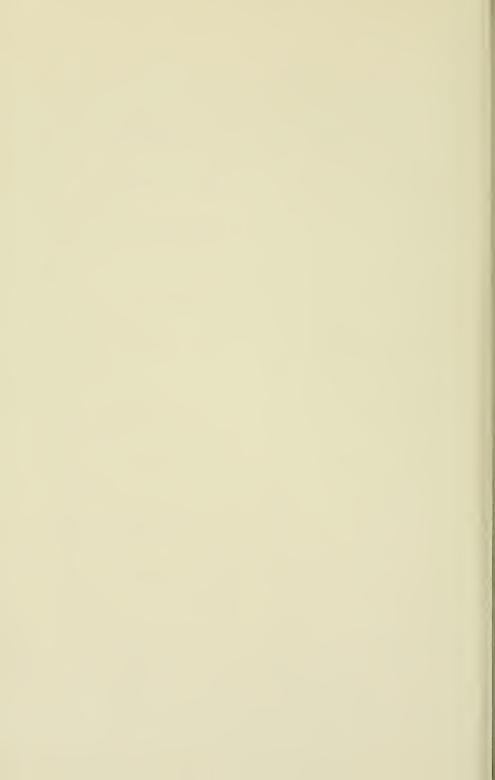

INFORMATION FOR KENSINGTON RESIDENTS

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR WASTE AND REFUSE DISPOSAL

- There will be a house to house pickup every Weds. of each week.
- Waste must be contained in plastic bags or trash containers, not to exceed a capacity of 30 gallons.
- Solid waste must be placed at the end of the driveway at 6:30 a.m.
- 4. Weight of any container must not exceed 100 pounds.
- No brush or stumps will be picked up and no 55 gallon drums are to be used.
- Refrigerators, stoves, washing machines, dryers and tires will be picked up at a predetermined date.
- There will be a container placed at the Elementary School for the use of the school, fire house, library, town hall and church.
- No petroleum products, car batteries or ashes will be picked up.

LICENSING OF DOGS

Each owner of a dog three months old or over must license the dog with the Town Clerk before May 1st of each year. Each dog over six months old must have received a rabies vaccination. The certificate of vaccination is to be presented to the Town Clerk at the time of licensing. Each dog must wear a collar around its neck; attached to the collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its license number.

License fees are as follows:

Penalties - \$1.00 per month after June 1st

JUNK CAR REGULATIONS

New Hampshire Statute requires anyone with two or more registered vehicles or old cars no longer intended or in condition for legal use on highways or used auto parts equal in bulk to two vehicles must obtain a license or be subject to a \$10.00 a day fine and a mandatory injunction to end the violation by selectmen. New and used car dealers registered as such are not considered auto junk dealers but must remove junk cars from their premises within 160 days.
