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## TOWN WARRANT The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Londonderry in the County of Rockingham in said State, Qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said Londonderry on Tuesday, the Fourth Day of March, next at seven of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

## ARTICLE 1.

To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

## ARTICLE 2.

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

## ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

## ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell at public auction property acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

## ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to accept state aid for the construction of Class V roads and to raise and set aside for said purposes the sum of $\$ 1,807.95$ and the state to contribute the sum of $\$ 12,053.02$.

## ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of $\$ 15,000$ to be paid to the Londonderry School District for the purpose of purchasing a future school site.

## ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the state and local assistance act of 1972 the sum of $\$ 12,600$ for the purchase of three new police cruisers with trade in of 2 used police cruisers.

## ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of $\$ 60,000$ for the purpose of new construction on town roads.

## ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of $\$ 5,000$ for the purchase of a new dump truck for the highway department with trade in of the old dump truck.

## ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds estalbished under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 the sum of $\$ 5,800$ for the purchase of a parcel of land located at the junction of Sargent Road and Mammoth Road being 2.9 acres and shown on Tax Map 9, Parcel 41 A.

## ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct the Board of Selectmen to negotiate and enter into a contract with the Town of Auburn, N.H. to use the Londonderry Sanitary Landfill Site. Passage of this article will reduce the line item in the amount of $\$ 1,575$.

## ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 8,500$ to be used by the Bicentennial Committee for expenses which may be incurred during the celebration presently scheduled to be held August 1976.

## ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 131.00$ for White Pine Blister Rust Control as authorized under RSA 223.

## ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 442,000$. for the purpose of constructing a multi-purpose town office building and to authorize the selectmen to negotiate a twenty year note in the sum of $\$ 442,000$.

## ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will conduct a study to investigate the feasibility of establishing a salary schedule for all salaried town personnel including step increases, fringe benefits and merit increases and of providing a job description and job evaluation for all such salaried positions and to appropriate the sum of $\$ 4,500.00$ for same. By request of Budget Committee.

## ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such federal, state, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.

## ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of $\$ 14,000.00$, for the purpose of preparing a facilities plan on sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended ( 33 U.S.C.S. 1251 et seq., 6 Stat. S. 16 et seq.) and will qualify the town for federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes not to exceed $\$ 14,000.00$ under and in compliance with the provisions of the municipal finance act (N.H.R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such notes as shall be in the best interests of
the town of Londonderry, and to allow the selectmen to expend such additional monies as become available from the federal government under the financial assistance program of the construction grants section of the federal water pollution control act, as amended (33.U.S.C. S. 1251 et seq., 6 stat. S. 16 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto. The town's share to be $\$ 2750.00$ and the state to contribute the sum of $\$ 11,250.00$. The Federal share will be $\$ 41,250.00$. By request of the Sewer Commissioners.

## ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed $\$ 50,000$. For the construction of sewer and water lines on property owned by Londonderry Housing Authority and to authorize the selectmen to negotiate a 10 year note. By request of Londonderry Housing Authority.

## ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 95,000.00$ for the purpose of constructing a Multi-purpose recreation facility. Funds to be obtained by authorizing the selectmen to negotiate a note in the sum of $\$ 50,000.00$ and authorize the withdrawal of $\$ 45,000.00$ from Federal revenue sharing funds appropriated to the town of Londonderry as established under the provision of the state and local assistance act 1972, or take any other action hereon. By request of Londonderry Parks and Recreation Commission.

## ARTICLE 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 20,000.00$ for site preparation of the multi-purpose recreation facility and to authorize the selectmen to negotiate the terms and conditions of the note to be issued. By request of the Londonderry Parks and Recreation Commission.

## ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 7,000.00$ for the purpose of equipping the multi-purpose recreation building. By request of Londonderry parks and recreation commission.

## ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate $\$ 66,600$. The sum necessary to construct two (2) softball fields and one (1) regular football field, on Tax Map 9 Lot 56, and to authorize the selectmen to negotiate the terms and conditions of the note to be issued. The construction of the above to be subject to available matching federal funds, which would reduce the total project cost to $\$ 33,300$. By request of Londonderry parks and recreation commission.

## ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of not to exceed $\$ 7,000.00$ to construct a Children's Play apparatus area on Tax Map 9, Lot 5 . The above to be subject to available matching federal funds which would reduce the total project cost to $\$ 3,500.00$ By request of Londonderry parks and recreation commission.

## ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to employ a full time recreation director, to work under the control of the Londonderry Parks and Recreation Commission, and to appropriate $\$ 8,400$ as a starting salary for said director. By request of Londonderry parks and recreation commission.

## ARTICLE 25.

To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to accept a conveyance from Olivette C. Richards of a portion of parcel 9-56-1; said parcel abutting on Nelson Road and containing 1.9 acres, more or less, as shown on a plan entitled. "Lot Line Relocation, Lot 9-56-1, Londonderry, N.H., Olivette Richards and Town of Londonderry" and in consideration thereof to authorize the selectmen to make a conveyance to Olivette Richards of a portion of $9-56$, said parcel abutting the land of Richards and containing 1.9 acres, more or less, as shown on the above referred to plan and, further, to authorize the selectmen to take whatever action and to execute whatever documents may be required to effectuate the purpose contained herein. By request of Londonderry parks and recreation commission.

## ARTICLE 26.

To see if the Town will vote to rescind the motion made at Town Meeting March 10, 1970, under Article No. 45, requiring all future Town Reports will include detailed statements of payments, shown to whom and for what monies were spent - by each and every department.

## ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize and instruct the Board of Selectmen to exchange an 11.8 acres parcel, being part of property owned by the Town as shown on Map 9 Parcel 11, with an 11.8 acres parcel being part of Proferty shown on Map 9 parcel 1.

## ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen and the trustees of trust funds to accept a conveyance of the real estate and a transfer of any and all of the funds of the Glenwood Cemetery Association and, thereafter, to be responsible for the care and maintenance of the Glenwood cemetery. By request of Glenwood Cemetery Association.

## ARTICLE 29.

To see if the Town will vote to accept the following cemetery perpetual care trust funds, with interest accrued in excess of that necessary for the particular lot, to be used for general cemetery up-keep: Richard C. \& Dorothy P. Bartlett, \$300.00; Roger \& Gladys Boyle, $\$ 100.00$; Joseph Harvell, $\$ 100.00$.

## ARTICLE 30.

To see if the Town, pursuant to New Hampshire Agricultural Law, Chapter 437-A will vote to establish a mosquito control commission, the members of which shall be appointed by the Selectmen and shall consist of five residents of Londonderry, who are also registered voters. This commission will compile information regarding mosquito control and based on their research, will prepare a program for such control to be voted on by the voters of Londonderry at an official town meeting one year hence. By petition of Jack Shuler et als.

## ARTICLE 31.

To see if the Town will vote by ballot to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law as provided by RSA Chapter 32:1. If adopted the Budget Committee shall consist of twelve (12) members at large to be elected by Town Meeting. One-third of the members at large shall hold office for a one year term, one-third of the members at large shall serve a two year term and one-third of the members at large shall serve a three year term and/or until their successors are elected and.uqualified. In addition to the above twelve members, there shall be one member of the school board, chosen by the school board and one member of the board of selectmen, chosen by the board, of selectmen. No member of the school board, board of selectmen or town manager shall serve as a member at large as provided by RSA chapter 32:2. By Petition of the Budget Committee.

## ARTICLE 32

To see if the Town will vote to discontinue plowing and maintenance of all parking lots of all church and non-profit organizations.

## ARTICLE 33.

To see if the Town will vote to reopen a portion of the former road leading from the Kendall Pond Rcad to its junction with the old Hudson-Derry Road near the residence of the late Charles W. Anderson. This road was discontinued in 1926. The section to be reopened under R.S.A. 234:19 (conditional layout) is starting from the Northerly side of Route 102, thence northerly along land owned by Gladys and Marion MacGregor to land owned by Marion Ingram, a distance of approximately 75 feet as shown on Londonderry Tax Map 6 Parcel 34.

## ARTICLE 34.

To see if the Town will vote to prohibit anyone from distributing literature or campaigning on any property where a town, state, or federal election is being held.

## ARTICLE 35.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt a resulution in support of the National Flood Insurance program as follows:

Whereas, the town has adopted and is enforcing zoning ordinances, and whereas, Chapter 11, Section 4 of the aforesaid prohibits any person firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the building inspector, and whereas, the building inspector must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made to him for a building permit.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the town meeting of Londonderry as follows:
(1). That the building inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonable safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage; and
(2). That the planning board shall review subdivision proposals and other proposed new developments to assure that (i) all such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (ii) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (iii) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and
(3). That the building inspector and sewer commission shall require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contaimination from them during flooding.


#### Abstract

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of 8 ; comprised of 2 members of the Londonderry Police Department, 2 members of the Londonderry Fire Department, 1 Selectman, and 3 Registered voters. The purpose of the committee will be to study the feasibility of combining the police and fire departments into one Londonderry Department of Safety. The object of this consolidation being to enhance the safety of the citizens of Londonderry and economize administration. By petition of John T. Griffin and others.


## ARTICLE 37.

To see if the Town will adopt the following recommendation: Due to and because of the population growth and increased complexity of town administration, we recommend that a vote be taken to affirm the increase in the number of town selectmen from the present total of three to the total of five. This increase to be accomplished through the 1976 Londonderry Town Election, by the election of three selectmen in that year. Petition by John T. Griffin and others.

## ARTICLE 38.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter 1, Section XIX, Article 2B to read: Maximum surface area applicable to signs facing Town roads shall be sixteen (16) square feet and for State roads thirty-two (32) square feet, except in the Residential District signs shall be limited to two (2) square feet.

## ARTICLE 39.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section XIX, Article 6A to read: To any charitable, religious, scientific, literary, educational, fraternal, civic, political or other similar non-profit organization or association, a temporary sign advertising any function or activity of the applicant which will be open to the public, provided that the permit for such sign shall be for a stated period of time not exceeding 30 days.

## ARTICLE 40.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section III, Residential District by adding: A1. A Residential District is defined as all land subdivided into two (2) acres or less.

## ARTICLE 41.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section III, Article B to read: 10. Residences and land area may be used by the owners or tenants for home occupations, business or professional offices, provided that such use does not create a public nuisance nor materially reduce the property valuations within the adjacent areas. Agricultural livestock, poultry, and dog kennels are prohibited.

## ARTICLE 42.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section XIII, Board of Adjustment, by adding: C. All applications to the Board of Adjustment will be accompanied by a fee of $\$ 10.00$.

## ARTICLE 43.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordiance Chapter I, Section III, Article B. 3 a .1 to read: (1). Minimum Land Area - No residential lot with or without Town Water and/or Town Sewage shall be less than one acre. A residence may be constructedson a lot of record at the time this Ordinance becomes effective regardless of the area or width of the lot.

Chapter I, Section III, B4 to read: With or without Town water supply and/or Town Sewage, conversion of existing residences or construction of new multi-family residences shall comply with the following:

Chapter I, Section III, B. by deleting: 5. With a town water supply and a town sewerage system, conversion of existing residences or construction of new multi-family residences shall comply with the following: (a) Minimum lot size per building 15,000 square feet for the first dwelling unit plus 2,000 square feet for each additional dwelling unit. (b) A multifamily development shall include a minimum of 5 acres. (c) Minimum lot
frontage shall be 100 feet. (d) A building shall contain no more than 8 dwelling units. (e) Two family dwellings are exempt from Para. 5 (a thru c) provided the lot includes 25,000 square feet minimum revised by Para. 5 (a thru e) all requirements of Para. 4 are applicable.

## ARTICLE 44.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section XVII, Definitions, to read: (3) FRONTAGE. The length of the lot bordering on any highway or right of way approved and maintained by the Town or State.

## ARTICLE 45.

To see whether the Town of Londonerry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section VIII, Conservation District by adding: A3. All land otherwise in an Agricultural-Residential and Industrial District which is at or below elevation 262 U.S.G.S. datum along Little Cohas Brook upstream of the Fish and Game Waterlevel Control Dam, except any land South of Litchfield Road and East of Rt. 128 (Mammoth Road), henceforth to be known as Little Cohas Marsh Conservation District. Provisions B5, B6 and B7 are not applicable.

## ARTICLE 46.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter II, Section III, Article B. by adding: (4). No building permit shall be issued for the construction of a building for residential, commercial or industrial use on a road that does not meet minimum road standards (see subdivision, Section 4 Article 4:2-1-16c), unless this provision has been waived by the Planning Board for a subdivision of less than six lots. This does not apply to a single lot of record.

## ARTICLE 47.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section VII, Commercial District
by adding: All the land on the North side of Route 102 between Gilcreast Road and the State Right of Way - I93, for a depth of 500 feet.

## ARTICLE 48.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section VII, Commercial District, by adding: All the land for a depth of 500 feet East of Londonderry Road, from the present Commercial District, North to Ash Street.

## ARTICLE 49.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section VII, Commercial District, by adding: Map 7 Parcels: 72 and 72-1. (Webco Development, Route 102).

## ARTICLE 50.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter I, Section VII, Commercial District, by adding: Map 10 Parcels: 51, 51-1, 136, 129, 128, 122 and 123. (Lumbertown, Inc. East to the Derry Town Line.)

## ARTICLE 51.

To see whether the Town of Londonderry will vote to amend the zoning ordinance Chapter II, Section III, B2 to read: (2.) In addition to the filing fee and prior to issuance of a building permit, the applicant shall pay a fee in accordance with the following schedule:

ARTICLE 52.
To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. To see if the Town will Amend Chapter I,

Section III to read: Conversion of existing residences or the construction of new multi-family residences shall be permitted provided that (1) one acre of land area be required for each additional family unit and that additional lot frontage of (25) twenty-five feet be required for each additional family unit.

## ARTICLE 53.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. To see if the Town will amend Chapter I, Section III, to exclude all multi-family residences (condominiums and/or apartments), except owner occupied duplexes, from the town of Londonderry.

## ARTICLE 54.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. That we, Roger Faucher and Alice Faucher of Londonderry in the County of Rockingham and State of New Hampshire for ourselves, our heirs, assigns and successors in title do agree and COVENANT that, so long as the certain parcel of land owned by us and known as LOT.NUMBER 57 on Page 11 of the Town of Londonderry, New Hampshire and an area thereon with 565 feet frontage 2100 feet in depth is duly zoned by the Town to permit mobile homes at the denisty of $21 / 2$ homes per acre, voluntarily restrict the occupancy of the proposed mobile home park or parks on said property to persons of the age of forty years or more, exclusive. And further agree to set up all of our leases and other agreements for the use of the said premises according to the spirit of this restrictive covenant, and agree to do all things necessary for the enforcement of the same. This covenant shall run with the land and shall insure to the benefit of the Town of Londonderry, New Hampshire and its residents and shall be enforceable by a Petition in Equity in the Superior Court.

## ARTICLE 55.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. To zone from agricultural to Commercial and Industrial 150 acres which is located on Auburn Road and Old

Derry Road; that borders George Simard's land on the North side and the East side, including the Landfill site and old Londonderry Dump. Being Parcel 23 on the tax map 16.

## ARTICLE 56

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. To zone 58 acres from agricultural to Commercial and Industrial, which is located on Auburn Road and on the West side of Cohas Brook; 800 ft . up Cohas Brook, South; West approximately 2,000 ft, North to Auburn, N.H. line East approximately 2000 ft , along the swamp to starting point. 500 ft . frontage on Auburn Road.

## ARTICLE 57.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. To see if the town will adopt a change from residential to commerical. Location of property (junction of 128 and 28 one parcel east of route 28 opposite junction North of Stokes Road bordering Route 28.)

## ARTICLE 58.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following amendment to the zoning ordinance, as submitted to the Planning Board by petition. To Amend the zoning ordinance such that Lot 39, Tax Map 7 be rezoned from residential/agricultural to commercial.

## ARTICLE 59.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Given under our hands and seal, this seventeenth day of February, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and seventy-five.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Twelve Thousand, Six Hundred Dollars $(\$ 712,600)$ for the purpose of constructing a multi-purpose Town Office Building and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a twenty year note in the sum of $\$ 712,600$ minus all
available Federal Revenue Sharing Funds appropriated to the Town of Londonderry as established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 or take any other action hereon. (Testimony on this Article recorded verbatim.)

Mr. Richard Hodgman explained Article 21.
Mr. Mead, architect from W-M Design Group, Nahant, Massachusetts and Center Harbor, New Hampshire, explained Article 21.

Mr. Griffin moved to table Article 21 . Seconded by Ann Griffin. Discussion followed. Motion defeated.

Mr. Gordon Arnold moved that Article 21 be amended to delete the words, "minus all available Federal Revenue Sharing Funds appropriated to the Town of Londonderry as established under the provisons of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972." The Article would then read, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Twelve Thousand, Six Hundred Dollars $(\$ 712,600)$ for the purpose of constructing a multi-purpose Town Office Building and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a twenty year note in the sum of $\$ 712,600$, or take any other action hereon." Seconded by Mr. Griffin. Discussion followed.

Mr. Babin moved the question. Seconded by Dr. Shuler. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack: The question is on the amendment to Article 21, which would read as follows: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Twelve Thousand, Six Hundred Dollars $(\$ 712,600)$ for the purpose of constructing a multi-purpose Town Office Building and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a twenty year note in the
sum of \$712.600, or take any other action hereon." Voted affirmative.

Discussion on Article 21, as amended, followed. Mr. Webster moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Vangrevenhof. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack then took up Article 21, as amended, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Twelve Thousand, Six Hundred Dollars $(\$ 712,600)$ for the purpose of constructing a multi-purpose Town Office Building and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a twenty year note in the sum of $\$ 712,600$, or take any other action hereon." (Ballot vote.)

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 4,750$ for the purpose of having a Comprehensive Park and Recreation Plan done of the Town. This plan to serve as a guide to the Orderly Acquisition and Development of Park and Recreation Areas and Facilities over a period of years, as required.

Mr. Charles Fowler moved that Article 24 be accepted. Seconded by Robert Lincoln.

Mr. Mack advised that Article 24, as amended, would read: "To see if the Town will vote and appropriate from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds the sum of $\$ 4,750$ for the purpose of having a Comprehensive Park and Recreation Plan done of the Town. This plan to serve as a guide to the Orderly Acquisition and Development of Park and Recreation Areas and Facilities over a period of years, as required." Discussion followed.

Mr. Bonney moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Fowler. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack then took up the amendment to Article 24. which would strike out the words, "to raise" and insert the words "from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds", the purpose being to use Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to fund Article 24. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack then stated that Article 24 now reads: "To see if the Town will vote and appropriate from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds the sum of $\$ 4,750$ for purpose of having a Comprehensive Park and Recreation Plan done of the Town. This plan to serve as a guide to the Orderly Acquisition and Development of Park and Recreation Areas and Facilities over a period of years, as required." Voted affirmative.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to construct four (4) tennis courts and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the terms and conditions of the notes or bonds to be issued. The construction of the above to be subject to available matching Federal Funds, which would reduce the total project price of $\$ 86,500$ by one half. Mr. Fowler moved to accept Article 25. Seconded by Mr. Bonney. Discussion followed.

Mr. Arnold moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Jaskal. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack then took up Article 25, "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to construct four (4) tennis courts and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the terms and conditions of the notes or bonds to be issued. The construction of the above to be subject to available. matching Federal Funds, which would reduce the total project price of $\$ 86,500.00$ by one half." Motion defeated.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to construct two (2) softball fields, one (1) regular football field and one (1) practice football field and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the terms and conditions of the notes or bonds to be issued, the construction of the above to be subject to available matching Federal Funds, which would reduce the total project price of $\$ 105,000.00$ by one half.

Mr. Fowler moved to amend Article 26, changing the total amount from $\$ 105,000.00$ to $\$ 99,500.00$. Seconded by Mr. Bonney

Mr. Mack stated: You are moving to accept and amend the Article at the same time so that it would read that the $\$ 105,000.00$ would be reduced to $\$ 99,500.00$. Your motion was seconded by Mr. Bonney Discussion followed.

Dr. Shuler moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Bonney. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack then took up Article 26, as amended, which would read as follows: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to construct two (2) softball fields, one (1) regular football field and one (1) practice football field and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the terms and conditions of the notes or bonds to be issued, the construction of the above to be subject to available matching Federal Funds, which would reduce the total project price of $\$ 99,500.00$ by one half."

Mr. Mack stated the result of the balloting on Article 26 is as follows: Total votes cast, 355. Total votes required for adoption of the Article, using the two-thirds rule which is necessary for bonding articles, would have required 237 votes. There were cast in favor 201 votes; opposed, 154. Motion defeated.

Mr. Mack stated that he now has the results of the ballot on Article 21.

Article 21, there were 432 votes cast. 288 votes were required to accept the Article. 271 votes were cast in favor. 161 votes were cast opposed. Motion defeated.

Mrs. Moore moved for reconsideration of the vote on Article 21. Seconded from the floor. Discussion followed. Mrs. Moore withdrew her motion to reconsider the vote on Article 21. Second withdrawn from the floor.

Mrs. Moore moved that reconsideration of Article 21 , as amended, take place in seven days, roughly. Seconded by Mr. Giddons. Discussion followed.

Mr. Mack stated that in the vote that reconsideration of Article 21, as amended, be reconsidered in seven days, we have a total vote of 347 . Required for the two-thirds vote is 231 votes. We had voting Yes, 211 votes, and voting No 136 . The motion to reconsider has been defeated.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Thirty-one Thousand, Four Hundred Forty-Five $(\$ 31,445)$ for the purpose of purchasing a new grader with the trade-in of the present grader and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a loan to be established for a period of five (5) years for said purpose.

Mr. Russell moved to amend Article 20 as follows: To see if the Town will vote and appropriate from Revenue Sharing Funds the sum not to exceed Thirty-One Thousand, Four Hundred Forty-Five Dollars $(\$ 31,445)$ for the purpose of purchasing a new grader with the trade-in of the present grader, Ten Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars $(10,800)$ for three police cruisers, and Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars ( $\$ 55,000$ ) for new road
construction. Seconded by Mr. Day. Discussion followed.

Mr. Russell withdrew his motion. Mr. Day withdrew his second.

Mr. Russell moved Article 20, To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Thirty-One Thousand, Four Hundred Forty-Five Dollars $(\$ 31,445)$ for the purpose of purchasing a new grader with the trade-in of the present grader and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a loan to be established for a period of five (5) years for said purpose. Seconded by Mr. Day. Mr. Mack: We have a motion made and seconded to accept Article 20.

Mr. Russell then moved to amend Article 20 so that it would read: "To see if the Town will vote and appropriate from Revenue Sharing Funds a sum not to exceed Thirty-One Thousand, Four Hundred Forty-Five Dollars $(\$ 31,445)$ for the purpose of purchasing a new grader, with the trade-in of the present grader. Seconded by Mr. Day. Discussion followed.

Mr. Thibeault moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Early. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack: The amendment would read, "To see if the Town will vote and appropriate from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds a sum not to exceed Thirty-One Thousand, Four Hundred Forty-Five Dollars (\$31,445) for the purpose of purchasing a new grader with the trade-in of the present grader." Voted affirmative. Amendment carries.

We will now vote on Article 20, as amended, To see if the Town will vote and appropriate from the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds a sum not to exceed Thirty-One Thousand, Four Hundred Forty-Five Dollars (\$31,445)
for the purpose of purchasing a new grader with the trade-in of the present grader. Voted affirmative.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand $(\$ 15,000)$ for the purpose of printing a Londonderry Town History. This Article is recommended by the Londonderry Historical Society.

Mr. Jack Webster moved that Article 22 be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Griffin. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Forty-Eight Thousand Dollars ( $\$ 48,000$ ) - - $\$ 24,000$ for the ensuing year and $\$ 24,000$ in the year 1975) to employ the services of a Professional Appraisal Firm to revalue all of the Taxable Property in the Town of Londonderry. Mr. Kimball moved that Article 23 be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Day. Discussion followed.

Mr. Thibeault moved to table the question. Seconded by Mr. Moreau.

Mr. Mack: Mr. Thibeault has moved that the question be tabled, and it has been seconded by Mr. Moreau. It will require a two-thirds vote. Voted affirmative. Article 23 tabled.

Mr. Greenwood moved that the Moderator not entertain any motion to reconsider any articles that have either been acted on or will be acted on tonight. Seconded by Mr. Fortin.

Mr. Bonney moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Vangrevenhof.

Mr. Mack: The motion is to move Mr. Greenwood's question. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Mack: We will now go to Mr. Greenwood's motion. This would require two-thirds vote. The motion is to not reconsider any of the Articles that have been acted upon up to this time, or that will be acted upon beyond this time. Voted negative.

The motion has been defeated.
Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Mr. Kimball moved we accept the budget as printed in the book. He moved the figure of Three Million, Two Hundred Fifty-Two Thousand, Seven Hundred Three Dollars and Thirty-Eight Cents ( $\$ 3,252,703.38$ ) - - and add to that figure Seventy-One Thousand, Three Hundred Sixty-Seven Dollars (\$71,367), which is the School Budget, which was appropriated last Saturday, and he moved the figure of Three Million, Three Hundred Twenty-Four Thousand, Seventy Dollars and Thirty-Eight Cents ( $\$ 3,324,070.38$ ).

Mr. Mack: The figure you are moving is Three Million, Three Hundred Twenty-Four Thousand Seventy Dollars and Thirty-Eight Cents ( $\$ 3,324,070.38$ )

Mr. Kimball: Yes. Seconded by Mr. Russell.
Mr. Russell moved to amend the Police Department Budget, reduce the line item as shown by Ten Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars $(\$ 10,800)$ and specifically provide Ten Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars ( $\$ 10,800$ ) from Revenue Sharing Funds to purchase three police cruisers.

Mr. Russell moved to amend the Highway Budget, that item labeled "New Construction", by Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars ( $\$ 55,000$ ) and specifically allocate
from Revenue Sharing Funds Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars $(\$ 55,000)$ to be used for the construction.

Mr. Russell stated that the budget, in effect, will stay exactly the same in total, but those monies just mentioned, the Ten Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars $(\$ 10,800)$ and the Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars $(\$ 55,000)$ will not be derived from Taxes. They will be derived from Revenue Sharing. Seconded by Mrs. Moore.

Mr. Mack: The motion has been made by Mr. Russell and Seconded by Mrs. Moore to substitute from the Police Department Budget Ten Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars $(\$ 10,800)$, to substitute Revenue Sharing Funds, and in the New Construction, under "New Construction" under Highways and Bridges, to remove Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars $(\$ 55,000)$ and substitute Revenue Sharing Funds in that category. Discussion followed.

Mr. Webster moved to amend Mr. Russell's amendment to increase the Town Hall expenses from Forty-Five Hundred Dollars $\$ 4,500$ ) to Forty-Three Thousand Dollars ( $\$ 43,000$ ). Seconded from the floor. Discussion followed.

Mr. Mack: I am going to call for a vote on Mr. Webster's motion. The vote is on whether you favor amending Town Hall expenses from Forty-Five Hundred Dollars $(\$ 4,500)$ to Forty-Three Thousand Dollars $(\$ 43,000)$. Voted negative. The amendment is defeated.

We will now move to Mr. Russell's amendment which would substitute Revenue Sharing Funds in the amount of Ten Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars $(\$ 10,800)$ in the Police Budget, and Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars $(\$ 55,000)$ in the New Construction Budget. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Russell's amendments carry.
Mr. Mack: Are there further parts of the Budget you wish to discuss?

Mr. Mitzel moved that the Selectmen's secretary's salary recommendation of Seven Thousand, Nine Hundred Thirty Dollars $(\$ 7,930)$ be changed to Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Fifty Dollars $(\$ 7,550)$, which would be a nine (9) percent increase, which would be in keeping with the raises given to the Town Clerk and to the Town Tax Collector. Seconded from the floor. Discussion followed. Mr. Bureau moved the question. Seconded by Mr. Duval. Voted affirmative.

Question moved.
The motion on the floor is to reduce within the Town Officers' Salaries the salary of the Selectmen's secretary from a figure of Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Dollars ( $\$ 7,930$.), to the new figure of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Dollars $(\$ 7,550)$. Voted affirmative. Motion passed.

Further discussion ensued.
Mr. Webster moved that the rest of the budget be accepted as printed. Seconded by Mr. Babin. Voted affirmative.

Mr. James L. Wray, Assistant Moderator: We have to vote on a final figure. That final figure would be Three Million, Three Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand, Six Hundred Ninety Dollars and Thirty-Eight Cents ( $\$ 3,323,690.38$ ). I would like a vote on that figure. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Wray (Assistant Moderator): This is your Budget and I so declare it adopted.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Mr. Vangrevenhof moved to accept the article. Seconded by Mr. Moore. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at Public Auction, property acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds. Mr. Russell moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Mitzel. Voted affirmative.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class $V$ roads, to raise and set aside for said purposes the sum of $\$ 1,815.49$ and the State to the sum of $\$ 12,103.25$.

Mr. Russell moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Moore. Voted affirmative.

Mr. Wray (Assistant Moderator): Article 6 and Article 7 have both been taken care of by ballot.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Perpetual Care Trust Funds, with interest accrued in excess of that necessary for the particular lot, to be used for General Cemetery Up-Keep.

Mr. Kimball moved the Article be adopted. Seconded by Mr. Hicks. Voted affirmative.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to change the name of the road known as Kendall Pond Road to South Road from the west end of Kendall Pond Bridge as shown on Londonderry Tax Map No. 4 between lots 10 and 95 and thence running northwesterly to the south side of Route 102 as shown on Londonderry Tax Map No. 6, between lots 49 and 52.

Mr. Kimball moved the Article be adopted. Seconded by Dr. Shuler. Discussion followed.

Mr. Kimball withdrew his motion that the Article be accepted and moved that it be tabled. Dr. Shuler withdrew his Second.

Mr. Wray (Assistant Moderator): The vote is on whether or not to table Article 10. Voted affirmative.

Article 10 tabled.
Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to name the street, leading from Londonderry Road to Interstate 93 as shown on Londonderry Tax Map 19, between lots 7 and 15 and running in a westerly direction to a dead end at Interstate 93, "Reo Lane."

Mr. Kimball moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Hicks. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of Old Page Road from the east side of Clarence Jaches driveway to the East side of Mammoth Road as shown on Londonderry Tax Map 27.

Mr. Vangrevenhof moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Babin. Voted affirmative.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Clerk to accept names to be added to the Checklist as provided under RSA Chapter 55:9a and 55:9b.

Mr. Russell moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Babin. Voted affirmative.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or more Highway Agents as provided for under Chapter RSA 245:6.

Mrs. Moore moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Russell. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to approve the employment of an Engineering consultant or consultants to act on behalf of and under the direction of the Selectmen for the purpose of advising the Town regarding Intermunicipal Cooperation on Water Supply and Pollution Control Problems and Coordinating the plans of the Town relating thereto with the New Hamsphire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission.

Mr. Kimball moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Russell. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town, pursuant to RSA Chapter 252, Section 19 through 22, will vote to establish a Board of Sewer Commissioners to exercise all the power in the Town which would otherwise be conferred upon the Selectmen with regard to the Construction and Maintenance of Sewers.

Mr. Kimball moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Russell. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA Chapter 252, empowering the Town
to Construct and Maintain Sidewalks and Sewers in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter.

Mr. Kimball moved the Article be accepted. Seconded by Mr. Russell. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. The objectives of the Commission are to provide for and encourage Regional Planning Analyses: Promote a Consensus on Problems of Regional Concern: and assist with the Implementation of Projects located within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of member communities.

The Commission has only such authority as conferred on it by RSA Chapter 36: Sections 45-53, of 1955, as amended and will serve in an advisory capacity representing the interest of the local governing body. The Board of Selectmen shall appoint two representatives to the Commission from among those nominated by the Planning Board in accordance with State Law.

Mr. William Boucher moved that Article 18 and Article 19 be defeated together. Seconded by Mrs. Boucher.

Mr. Mack: I will allow discussion on the motion. Discussion followed.

Mr. Mack: The vote is on whether or not you are in favor of defeating Article 18 and Article 19 together. Voted affirmative.

Articles 18 and 19 defeated.
Mr. Mäck: Article 20 has already been taken care of.

Article 48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five (5) members to study the feasibility of a mosquito control program for the Town of Londonderry.

Dr. Shuler: I move the Article be accepted. Seconded by William Garbon. Discussion followed. Voted affirmative.

Article 49. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Thibeau moved that in years to come all the money articles be put first on the Warrant and put the street names and that stuff on the back, where it belongs, and come up with the money items first thing when the people are all present, and not when they are ready to go home at one o'clock.

Mr. Mack stated that it is not possible to direct what the next year's meeting is going to do.

A motion was made from the floor to reconsider Article No. 26.

Mr. Mack: It is the Moderator's feeling that too many of us have gone home. My feeling is that we cannot reconsider Article 26 at this time. Discussion followed.

Mr. Mack: In order to reconsider Article 26 you will have to move to overturn the ruling of the Moderator. A motion was made from the floor to overturn the ruling of the Moderator that Article 26 cannot be reconsidered at this time. Seconded by Mr. Ralph Smith. Voted negative.

The Motion is defeated.
Motion from the floor to adjourn the meeting.

Seconded from the floor.
Meeting adjourned at one ten.

## ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

During the year of 1974 we remeasured the roads in town to determine the increase in mileage due to new developments. In 1974 we recorded 80 miles of tar roads as compared to the 1973 figure of 77 and 21 miles of dirt roads compared to the 1973 figure of 26 .

Bartley Hill Road from Mammoth Road to Noyes Road was completed and hard surfaced with the State TRA Funds. South Gilcreast Road from the Catholic Cemetary to the Derry town line was hard surfaced with Revenue Sharing Money. This included graveling, clearing of trees and installation of drainage as well. New construction money also completed a large portion of high range road involving gravel, clearing of trees, drainage and hard surfacing from Litchfield road to Alexander Road; Catch Basins and drains on Devonshire Lane: widening of Hardy Road; Ledge removal and drainage on Stonehenge Road and drainage on Spring Road. The hill on Old Derry rọad has also been hard surfaced including drainage. We have tried to install street signs on all streets, even though some are only wood construction. Vandalism is a very large and expensive problem with all our signs.

The new grader arrived which was paid for with revenue sharing funds as appropriated at Town Meeting in 1974.

As this is the last year that I will be working for the town as an elected official, may I sincerely say thank you to everyone for all the cooperation I have always received and I will look forward to working for the town in every way possible.

## LONDONDERRY POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT - 1974

Demand for Police related services in 1974 continued to increase at a rate considerably above the population growth of the Town. The list of the Police activities accompanying this report illustrates the work load of departmental activities. Some of the major increases were in burglaries, up $42 \%$; Thefts up $72 \%$; Criminal mischief (vandalism) up 57\%. Complaints and requests for assistance requiring the dispatch of a cruiser totaled 3395 , an increase of $38 \%$ over 1973. If the current rate of requests continues without substantial increase, cruiser responses will approximate 6000 in 1975, an additional increase of about $75 \%$.

The number of investigations handled, by the department, excluding auto accidents, was 775 or about 2 per day. Each investigation may take from several hours to several days. We have not had sufficient manpower to properly investigate all complaints. Lieutenant Webster and Agent Eaton, working individually and as a team, have done extremely well particularly in the area of offenses committed by local youth. If you will note the number of juveniles apprehended in the various categories you will have some idea of the extent of our local problem. Additional manpower must be allocated in the coming year to meet the demands in the area of criminal investigation.

Refunds and reimbursements to the Police Department totaled 12,712.62. When deducted from our total expenditure of $155,719.10$, we show a net
expenditure of Town funds in the amount of 143,006.48. In addition to the refunds and reimbursements we were able to employ additional dispatching help representing more than $\$ 4500$ in wages at no cost to the town. The need for 24 hour dispatching from the Police office has become critical to the efficient operation of the Police Department. The wages for the additional help will be paid by the Concentrated Employment Program until March at which time the town meeting will be acting on the police budget which includes provisions for these personnel.

## LONDONDERRY CIVIL DEFENSE 1974 REPORT

Since my appointment on September 24, 1974, considerable progress has been made to rehabilitate the building on High Range Road for Civil Defense use.

The building needed considerable repairs to make it habitable. A new roof was installed, one wall completely rebuilt, new lighting and a heating system capable of heating the complete building was installed. Enough building materials are on hand to finish repairing portions of the interior walls, ceilings, and put a good solid floor down to cover up recessed portions in the concrete.

Insulation will be put in most of the walls that can be exposed, and in the ceilings. This will save much fuel during the cold months, and keep temperatures reasonably cool during the summer.

Proposed plans include installing toilet facilites, a reasonable water system, communications room, and repair the emergency generators on hand. The remainder of one wing not used for storage and office space will be utilized for a shelter.

A functional classroom should be finished by the first of March 1975, so classes of instruction can be held comfortably. Classes will include first aid, and other important subjects related to Civil Defense. Dates and times will be published ahead of time so anyone will have the opportunity to attend.

A complete reorganization of the Civil Defense posture is progressing, so the department will be a practical, and functional unit for the benefit of all residents needing help from disasters that may strike in the future. When major fires, hurricanes or similar
disasters happen, this department should be ready to provide immediate help. Our aim to be ready can be a reality with the support of all the residents of Londonderry. Residents capable of donating one hour per month towards this goal, should contact me or the town office for more information. This includes male or female adults, and young adults. Representation from all sectors of the town is an important segment of a Civil Defense plan. Your cooperation will make it a success.

The year of 1974 began with the continuing training of all fire department personnel. Included was a simulated fire at the Junior High School to test preplanning, in the event a response is required. Firemen participated in 18 training sessions throughout the year, keeping their skills at a high degree of proficiency.

The fire department expends hundreds of man-hours in an effort to raise additional funds to augment town appropriations in maintaining equipment and stations. The May Ball, public dances from October through April, filling swimming pools, collecting newspapers, selling Christmas trees, and renting the Firemen's Hall, netted a total of $\$ 4840.55$.

The department has spent $\$ 1508.97$ on new equipment, including a Homelite rescue saw, two Scott-Air Paks, Helmets, Coats, and boots. Rescue markers for children and invalids, which are placed on the windows of the rooms they occupy, were also purchased. These can be obtained, free of charge, at the firehouses.

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the fire department contributed $\$ 500.00$ of their raised funds to the remodeling of the upstairs of Station No. 1. This figure was matched by the department.

Firemen removed chain link fence from Grenier Field, and erected it around the water supply in the rear of the library, to prevent the possibility of accidents. The water supply and a dry hydrant provide protection for the schools.

The fire department conducted 243 inspections of oil burning equipment, chimneys and fireplaces, tank installations, and businesses.

In closing, I want to caution everyone who is using wood to help in heating their homes. Be certain your chimney is clean and in good condition; also that any heating devices attached to the chimney are installed properly. Take note of the fact that the year of 1974 ended with three chimney fires.

If anyone desires information on proper installation they may call Station No. I (432-3442) or Station No. 2 (432-3369) at any time. Please use these numbers for all information calls in order to keep the Emergency Line clear.

As a note of interest, fire losses for 1974 totaled $\$ 49,575.00$. The number of responses for 1974 showed a $22.8 \%$ increase over the previous year.

## LONDONDERRY RECREATION \& PARKS COMMISSION 1974 ANNUAL TOWN REPORT

1974 was another banner year for the Commission, with considerable growth experience in all our regular programs. Our Youth Basketball program now includes 240 of our local boys and girls. Teenage Basketball and Men's Basketball have an average of 50 participants. Flag Football (excluding Pop Warner) had about 260 participants including cheerleaders. Our Summer Playground Program, expanded to include a swimming program and field trips, experienced an increase to 180 children, up about 60 children from last year. Youth Hockey has grown to three teams, with Men and Women Volleyball maintaining an average of 80 adults. Track and Field Events average about 100 participants.

With the formation of the Londonderry Football Association and the initiation of the Pop Warner Football League, the need for a playable football field in town was one of our top priorities. With the total cooperation of the School Board, the Londonderry Football Association and some very generous citizens of Londonderry, we were able to build a temporary field at the schooi property on South Road.

The Comprehensive Park and Recreation Plan for our town, which was approved at the 1973 Town Meeting was completed and presented to organizational heads in October. A copy is at the Leach Library for inspection to those who are interested in the recreational growth potential of our community.

Few new programs were initiated this year due to the
limited facilities available at the present time. The Commission is finding it increasingly difficult to meet the present needs of our Community, much less begin new ones.

At this time, special thanks should be extended to the School Board, Robert Shea, Central School Principal. the Londonderry Football Association and all the parents who volunteered their time in order to make the programs a success.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DERRY VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION FOR THE TOWN OF LONDONDERRY

The Derry Visiting Nurse Association, during our past fiscal year of July 1, 1973 to June 30, 1974, made 454 visits to Londonderry residents, more than to any other town served by our agency except Derry. The appropriation of $\$ 3,000.00$ voted by Londonderry residents in March, 1973 helped our agency to make these visits. (The appropriation of $\$ 5,000.00$ voted last March is being applied to our current fiscal year. Total visits for this year, ending June 30, 1975, will be included in next year's report. The total for the first quarter is already 182 , which is a considerable increase.)

Of last year's visits, 257 were made to give skilled nursing care in the home under a physician's orders and 18 visits were made by our physical therapist. These were "fee visits", but in most cases the fee is paid by third parties such as medicare and private insurance. Our fee is adjustable on a sliding scale according to the patient's ability to pay, and care is given regardless of ability to pay.

The remaining 179 visits were "public health type visits" made to newborns and their mothers or to provide home follow-up to patients seen by our various state clinics. By agency policy these are made without any charge. The appropriation from the town pays for all of these visits and helps us to offer the skilled nursing type visits on a sliding fee scale basis.

During our present fiscal year we have added a

Homemaker/Home Health Aide service. So far this has provided $581 / 2$ hours of service to Londonderry residents. Since it is new, full statistics for this program for 197.4-1975 will be included in next year's report.

The agency is operated by a Board of Directors of not more than 25 members having representation from each of the six towns served. The Londonderry directors at present include:

## LONDONDERRY PLANNING BOARD

It stands to reason that the sudden change in the economy would slow the number of subdivisions and lessen the work load of the Planning Board, however this did not seem to be the case in 1974. The Board continued to meet weekly and seemed to have time only to discuss subdivisions. The size of the subdivisions presented did show a change, however, and were mostly a single lot or two by a Town resident rather than a development of 100 lots by a developer.

The Board gave its approval to 127 lots and 306 condominium units.

The zoning regulations, subdivison regulations, airport zoning, and zoning map were updated and printed in a loose leaf binder that can be updated every year by printing and replacing only the pages involved in currant changes.

Zoning changes approved by the voters in 1974 added to the Commercial and Industrial areas in Town; improved and strengthened the gravel ordinance, added a requirement that all new driveways be approved by the building inspector; required that multifamily developments have a buffer zone to shield single family developments, be prepared by a professional land use planner and that an additional four feet of frontage be required for each unit over 100.

The regular monthly meeting of the Planning Board is held on the second Wednesday of the month.

There were twenty-one requests involving commercial activity including a concrete batch plant, a kennel, a barber shop, an addition to an existing green house, a tire shop, two kindergartens and several types of offices.

Five requests were for buildings nearer to lot lines
than the fifteen feet required by Zoning. Five additional requests involved frontage of less than the required one hundred fifty feet.

Seven cases were heard for non-accessory signs and one for a portable saw mill. The remainder were miscellaneous requests.

## THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION <br> of Londonderry, New Hampshire 03053

The Conservation Commission has worked with the Planning Board on an additional Conservation District; The Little Cohas Marsh Conservation District. All land at and below elevation 262 U.S.G.S. Datum in the Cohas Marsh Area will be in this District.

This land is now under the management of the N.H. Fish and Game Department. The Marsh is one of the largest in Londonderry and is under the National Flood Hazard Area.

The Conservation District is intended for the preservation and maintenance of the ground water table, to protect the public against the hazards of flood water inundation and for the protection of the community against the cost which may be incurred when unsuitable development occurs in swamps, marshes, and along water courses.

The Commission has worked all year on numerous projects. The reviewing of Dredge and Fill Permits is one of our more time consuming duties.

## 1974 REPORT OF BOARD OF SEWER COMMISSIONERS

The Sewer Commission has been largely concerned through its first year with the sewer construction program for North Londonderry. The administrative needs of this project prompted the Selectmen to appoint the Commission, and it is expected to be the Commission's major project for the next two years.

In 1974 the newly formed Commission reviewed the North Londonderry sewer project and undertook a number of steps needed to get construction underway. These included discussions with the Manchester City Engineer's office regarding the agreement between the City and Town for treatment of our sewage at the City's new Brown Avenue sewage treatment plant. This agreement is in final negotiation. We cooperated with the City in accumulating and processing data from industries which will be needed as part of the agreement.

The Commission has negotiated with a number of property owners along the proposed sewer lines for easements, and it appears that needed easements can be acquired so as to benefit both the Town and the property owners. Concern over the effects of construction was felt by some property owners, but adjustments or precautions added to the plans and specifications appear to afford,satisfactory assurances.

The Commission requested a priority for a construction grant for the sewer project, but has tentatively been allocated a priority for a grant next
year (fiscal 1976) due to rescheduling of the Manchester sewer from the Town line to the treatment plant.

The Commission has prepared an article for additional engineering studies stressing environmental effects, required by Public Law 92,500, the Clean Waters Act of 1972. These studies are referred to in the Act as the "Facilities Plan", and are a condition precedent to the construction grants. A breakdownsof grants and local costs for the article follows:

Completion of the Facilities Plan will provide data needed to complete the application for the construction grant, and will facilitate future programs as well as re-examining approaches to future sewerage of South Londonderry.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Londonderry Central School in said district on the 1st day of March, 1974, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the District will appropriate $\$ 1,450,000$, or any other sum, for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing a new elementary school, to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise to authorize the School Board to contract for and accept federal or other funds in connection with the project or to take any other action relative thereto.
2. To hear reports of agents and auditors and committees or officers chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
3. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept and to spend on behalf of the District, any or all grants or other runds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or the State of New Hampshire.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

This year has been an exciting one for education in Londonderry. On July 1, 1974, Londonderry formed its own Supervisory Union (No. 12). We now have our own Superintendent and Business Administrator working full time for us. It has been a real pleasure to work with Dr. Roberts and Normand Tanguay. Londonderry is fortunate to have such dedicated employees.

The School Board has had a busy year co-ordinating the work of our various committees. The High School (Phase II) Building Committee has been monitoring the construction of our newest facility. The completion schedule will allow us to open the building for student use in September 1975.

The South Elementary Building Committee is working hard on developing plans for an elementary school. Their proposal will be considered at this annual School District Meeting.

The Building Needs Committee has continued to up-date their figures on student population and space requirements for present and future needs. Their efforts have allowed us to do the proper planning in order to provide educational facilities for our children.

The Site Evaluation Committee has actively searched for potential school sites to fit the needs as determined by the Building Needs Committee. This Site Committee reviewed many parcels of land and evaluated their useability. It is because of their efforts that the School District will be asked to purchase a parcel of land for future school use.

A Year Round School Study Committee was also formed this year to research the feasibility of "year 'round" schools for Londonderry. The Committee's report appears elsewhere in this book. The Committee has worked hard on evaluating this educational alternative and has related it to Londonderry's rapid growth.

The Londonderry School Board wishes to thank all the committee members for their outstanding and untiring devotion to the educational needs of Londonderry's youth. It is this kind of citizen participation that has and will continue to provide good education for all. Londonderry has much it can take pride in - its outstanding educational system and its people.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Until July 1, 1974, the Londonderry School District was a component of Supervisory Union No. 10, with administrative offices located in Derry. On the above date, the component districts of Union No. 10 were separated, and Londonderry became the sole district comprising Supervisory Union No. 12. It is now administered by a superintendent of schools, a business administrator, and a five-member School Board composed of the same persons comprising the Board of the Londonderry School District. The result is a single operating organization, whose total resources and energies are directed exclusively toward the maintenance and improvement of the local schools.

As I approached the assumption of my duties as superintendent of the new Union, three areas of concentration appeared to hold the highest priorities; namely, transfer of functions and reorganization from Union No. 10 to Union No. 12, immediate classroom needs, and development of a high school curriculum. While some progress was made in the initial weeks of the school year in organization of the new Union, the myriad problems associated with the building program in progress and proposed - required the major portion of our time and energies. The development of a high school curriculum is imperative prior to the submission of a budget for 1976-77.

Bids for steel for Phase II of the High School were taken in March in order to ensure timely delivery and the most favorable price possible. General construction bids were recieved on May 1, 1974, and the contract subsequently awarded to Charles Construction

Company with actual construction beginning in June. In spite of being beset with, problems associated with extremely poor soil conditions, septic system design and location, roofing delay and some slow materials delivery, the project is "on time" for a projected opening of September, 1975.

A proposal to bond for an elementary school in the southern section of Londonderry was defeated at the March, 1974, district meeting. Subsequently, architects were employed to prepare preliminary plans, and a bond proposal was submitted to the district again in October. This, too, was defeated. Since that time revisions have been made in the specifications in response to public communications, and a new proposal is in preparation for resubmission in March, 1975.

Enrollment projections made last year by the School Building Needs Committee were updated to reflect the slowdown in building, and a close watch has been kept of the current changes. At the present time there is relatively little growth occurring because of families moving into Londonderry; however, pre-school children already here will cause the school enrollment to rise again in September as they enter first grade.

Slow, but steady, progress is being made in providing a comprehensive curriculum for our youth. A full music program was begun in grades 1 to 5 in September, 1974; the social studies curriculum was reviewed and improved as a result of a summer workshop, and a comprehensive study of the physical education program has been underway during the school year with the help of a consultant from Boston University. Plans for 1975-76 envision the initiation of a formal art program at the elementary level, a second foreign language for junior high students, and the employment of a certified school
librarian for the district.
Along with providing rooms for elementary pupils to restore space in the Junior High School building for high school students, a curriculum for the high school must be prepared within the next ten months. Even though it is planned to phase in the high school one year at a time, a total curricular program must be developed as a framework for the orderly institution of course offerings year by year.

In closing, I want to gratefully acknowledge the help and support of both the Union and Londonderry school staffs, the School Board, and the citizens of the district in meeting the problems associated with the re-organized administrative structure, building needs, and curriculum development. In spite of many anticipated and unexpected extra demands, the quality of education provided for the children and youth of Londonderry has been maintained at a gratifyingly high level.

## LONONDERRY JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the citizens of Londonderry, I hereby submit my annual report as Principal of the Londonderry Junior High School.

This past school year was a very rewarding one for all of us at the Junior High School.

For the first time, we had a full-time reading instructor who was able to work with a large number of our students. Because of this, the reading level of each youngster worked with was raised considerably.

Specialists contributed a great deal to the school as a whole. Guidance services were increased this year; a learning disabilities person was added, and a speech therapist will be added to replace the person previously provided by the Union.

For the first time, the Junior High School will have a Resource Class for the 1974-75 school year. This will enable the very slow and special students to progress at their own pace. Most of these students will spend a portion of the day in a regular classroom, and students who need very special attention in a particular major subject area will be programmed into the Resource Class.

Another goal we had at the Junior High School was to develop better communications between parents and the school. To this end we had parent conferences for sixth grade classes for the first time. We also had a night for the parents to take their youngsters schedule and go through a typical day. Thus, a large number of parents were able to better understand the school, the program, and their children's school career.

Parent involvement reached another level this year with the use of parents as volunteer tutors in the Junior High. I would like to thank all those involved for
making this a success.
Progress in anything is directly attributable to those who are associated with the product. I am especially grateful to everyone on the professional staff for their outstanding cooperation. I am also grateful to the school librarian, teacher aides, custodial staff, and especially Mrs. Parker, the school secretary. All of these people have played important roles in the operation of the Junior High School.

My thanks are also extended to Mr. Bernard Ellis, Superintendent, and Mr. Arthur Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent, for their cooperation.

A redesigned math program was incorporated in all grades with a concentration on the use of manipulative aides. Many workshops were held throughout the year with the professional staff focusing on our math program. An evaluation at the end of the year indicated very positive gains with this math program.

A series of in-service workshops were conducted for the professional staff in the areas of learning disabilities and in meeting the special needs of students.

One of our goals is to develop better communication between all parents and our school. In meeting this goal we have extended our parent conferences to include grades one through five. A parent volunteer program was also initiated whereby residents of Londonderry would assist in allowing us to share their talents and services in our school. We plan to further develop this program
next year. We are most appreciative to all volunteers who worked in our school. We extend an invitation to anyone interested in joining our volunteer program.
Many qualitative educational programs were conducted in all classrooms, also in physical education and in special services. I am most grateful and appreciative to the entire staff for their sincere dedication to the teaching of our students.

Although our elementary programs have grown, we are looking forward to the development of music and additional special services at the elementary level in September, 1974.

We are nevertheless faced with some very serious situations, such as a lack of adequate space for our students and programs. There is also a need for an art program at our school.

I am especially grateful to everyone connected with the North Londonderry School - the professional staff, the clerical, custodial and school lunch staffs for their cooperation. I am also grateful to Mr. Bernard Ellis, Superintendent of Schools, and Mr. Arthur Mitchell, Assistant Superintendent, for their support and encouragement in the operation of the North School.

The staff and I wish to express our appreciation to the Londonderry School Board and to the citizens of this community for their thoughtfulness and cooperation in providing quality educational programs to all the students of Londonderry.

## SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

## SEPTEMBER 1973 - JUNE 1974

A good health program is the result of the combined efforts of the entire staff and community. With this thought in mind, we submit the following report to keep you, the citizens of Londonderry, abreast of the various health education programs that exist in your schools.

A series of three immunization clinics were held under the direction of Ronald Gagne M.D., Londonderry School Physician. The clinics were open to pre-school age children. A total of 132 children received 291 immunizations. We are really beginning to see the results of these clinics, as only one case of measles was reported in Londonderry this year.

The Dental Clinic, sponsored by the American Legion had a very successful year. Mrs. Barbara Coish R.D.H. was our dental hygienist and 512 students received dental care.

School requirements for children entering first grade state that children must be six on or before September 30, 1975. Children are also required to have completed all necessary immunizations and have had an examination by their doctor prior to the first day of school.

Genuine concern for the well being of children must include their nutritional health. With this in mind, the N.H. Legislature has instructed schools to teach nutrition in the classroom. A workshop entitled "Big Ideas in Nutrition Education" was held here in Londonderry. All teachers of grades four, five, and six were invited to attend. The workshop was sponsored by the New England Dairy and Food Council; Miss Judith A. Kettunen R.D. was the instructor.

This year for the first time all seventh and eighth
grade students took part in a basic first aid course; 287 students successfully completed the course and received a basic first aid certificate from the American Red Cross.

Londonderry should be very proud of the many local organizations which assist in the schools in promoting good health. A most sincere thank-you to the American Legion, Fire Department, Lions Club and Newcomers Club for their continued support.

It is the goal of the school health service to promote a higher level of well being for all students and to recognize the interrelationship of physical, mental, social and emotional health. The various health programs in Londonderry Schools would not be possible without the understanding and support of all involved. We would like to express our gratitude to all the Staff, Principals, Superintendent and School Board members for their help and cooperation.

## REPORT OF THE YEAR-ROUND SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE

In April, 1974, the Londonderry School Board charged this advisory committee to investigate the year-round school concept and generally relate the findings to Londonderry's school system.

The concept of extending school operation is not a recent innovation; since the late 19th century, urban schools have offered summer terms to disadvantaged minorities, Rural students, on the other hand, attended school only during the brief span of time their labour was not needed. Standards for attendance (minimum 180 days) and curricula were ultimately formalized to equalize educational opportunities; even so, many schools continued to administer extended year schedules.

At present, school districts are investigating year-round options in order to increase efficiency of space utilization: a building which stands idle one-third of the year is obviously not being used to capacity. European schools have consistently offered educational programs of approximately 200 days to their students.

Rapid population growth has pushed many school districts beyond their capacity to bond for expensive construction, and in some cases, beyond the voters' willingness to accept higher taxes for education.

Creative educators seek a means to offer students in our highly sophisticated society a greater diversity of courses, thus broadening and individualizing the public school experience.

All of these goals efficiency, economy, enrichment can be realized in one form or other of the year-round format. In many cases, adoption of a plan for economic
considerations has led to a corollary diversity in course offerings. Year-round school is a way of life: it requires flexibility and committment from the communities which implement.

The school districts which have no economic pressure have structured their programs to provide a wider range of educational options. Course specialization and diversification, coupled with the offering of accelerated graduation for qualified students, create a stimulating and enriching educational environment.

Other school systems, pressured by ever-increasing enrollments and shortage of funds, implement year-round scheduling in order to postpone new construction, or avoid it entirely (dependant upon the rate of continuing population growth). The year-round format allows these systems to house up to $30 \%$ more pupils in existing facilities.

It should be clear at the outset that year-round use of schools does not necessarily imply that students or faculty attend full-schedule. In most cases, groups of students enter in a staggered series of entries, with short vacations occurring periodically throughout the year, rather than only during the long summer period.

The best method of explaining the basic scheduling concept of year-round plans is to use an example, - let us look at the $45 / 15$ plan developed by the Valley View, Illinois elementary system. The total school population is divided into four geographic groups, and labeled Track A, B, C, D. Each track is scheduled to attend for forty-five school days, and then recess for fifteen days.

1st Day - Track " $A$ " begins forty-five school days
16th Day - Track "B" begins
31st Day - Track "C" begins
46th Day - Track "D" begins

Track "A" goes on vacation ( 15 days)
The sometimes confusing variety of year-round schedules, for all their diversity of purpose, are implemented by these basic means: division of school population, staggered entries, and multiple vacations. The systems which operate year-round and offer enrichment, allow the student the option of attending full-schedule.

Impacting in our school system, and economic factors are of primary importance to Londonderry at present. The year-round format is considered to be an economically sound solution when implemented with these objectives; certainly when the cost of operation year-round is compared to the sizeable outlay necessitated by a new building (debt service, principle payments), the savings become obvious. Operational costs tend to rise during the initial stages of implementation, and subsequently decrease. Air-conditioning - where necessary - increased secretarial staff, and increase in maintenance of buildings and buses are some of the initial cost increases one might expect during the first year; the economic impact of these, however, can be considerably lessened with careful, foresighted planning.

The School District of Londonderry could save monies related to a new building by implementing the year-round format; the need for construction could be postponed an additional year, but not avoided, because of the demands of our population growth rate. Per pupil expenditures will remain relatively stable. The Committee finds the continuous learning year programs educationally sound, and economically feasible; however, considerable more study would have to be undertaken, with a budget to facilitate, before a cogent
recommendation of a plan suitable to Londonderry's unique needs could be forwarded to the School Board. ## SOUTH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Building Committee was appointed and met for the first time in July. The Committee consisted of 6 members-myself, Leo Masse, Linda Presley, James Reed, Martha Gonzalez and Donald Jobin. We met with the architectural firm of Russell, Gibson and Von Dohlen, who had been hired by the School Board. The proposal presented to the architects was to design a school for 500 pupils, with the possibility of adding on classrooms for 300 more pupils at a later date. The school design consisted of 23 classrooms, which included a special education room, a multipurpose gymnasium and cafeteria with a satellite kitchen, a core area designed for the full 800 pupil school, consisting of administration and guidance offices, conference rooms, health suite, work storage areas and teachers aide rooms and Library/Media center. The total area was 45,600 square feet at an estimated construction cost, including site development, of $\$ 32.00$ per square foot. Allowing $\$ 20.00$ per square foot for fixed and moveable equipment, legal fees etc., the total cost of the project came to 2.4 million dollars or 52 dollars per square foot.

At the special school district meeting on October 18, the school proposal was presented to the voters, and the plan was rejected, much to the disappointment of the Committee. We began again in October to work on a new plan. We felt that the community voted against the school for two predominate reasons: the cost of the project and the open classroom design.

The Building Committee lost two valued members,

Linda Presley and Donald Jobin. We then added 3 new members; Richard Hodgman, William Corbett and Vincent Sardo. Our new seven-member committee has interviewed many firms through November and December who are involved in all types and methods of construction in order to arrive at a second proposal to present to the voters in March.

In closing, I would like to thank my Committee for their dedication and hard work. Many hours of planning have gone into this project and their efforts are greatly appreciated.

## REPORT OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

In mid-June, 1974, I assumed my duties as Business Administrator of the newly-formed Supervisory Union No. 12 and became immediately involved with the transition from Union No. 10.

The first order of business was to set up an efficient accounting system, which includes the use of computers, that controls receipts and expenditures, and insures effective use of time and money.

During this same period, construction of Phase II started, which required many meetings with the architect, Building Committee, School Board and Superintendent. A schedule of payments was arranged which allowed temporarily available bond money to be invested in certificates of deposit with yields as high as $12 \frac{1}{2} \%$. In order to insure that the District pays only for work completed, all requisitions have been carefully audited.

Upon inspection of the Junior High School by the Londonderry Fire Chief and Building Inspector, it was deemed necessary to install stairs and a walkway leading from the building on the north and west sides for emergency use. This was done. Bids for paving the North School parking lot were sent out, as well as bids for the new fireproof stage curtains for Central School. Another significant problem, which has existed for some time, was ascertaining the liability of and the extent of damage to the North School roof. As a result of thorough investigation, it is imperative that the roof be replaced in order to avoid further damage to the
building. A warrant article is being introduced to finance this project.

As Bus Coordinator for both elementary and high school students, I have worked closely with the transportation companies in setting up routes to accommodate the students as efficiently as possible within the time and budgetary restraints. A study was made to consider the possiblity of the School District purchasing its own buses, with the conclusion that with today's economic conditions, a capital outlay of this nature would not be feasible.

An increased student enrollment which averages $10 \%$ per year necessitates the building of a new elementary school. The proposed school would be built on 20 acres of District-owned land in South Londonderry. A major factor in developing the second proposal for this school was the townspeople's desire in regard to the specific concept. Factors involved in arriving at the cost of a school building are general economic conditions, the debt limit of the school district, the long-range cost of operating and maintaining the school, as well as the building cost.

Of prime interest to all taxpayers is the school budget. To begin with, a school budget is a pattern for the educational program of a town and what that program will cost. Portions of the budget are dictated by law. For example: payment of interest, reduction of principals of earlier bond issues, social security, State retirement system, transportation, insurance, and maintaining accreditation. Other portions are necessary expenses, such as fuel, power, telephone service, repairs,
and some insurances. The remainder of the budget reflects the town's desire of the quality of its educational system by the wise application of monies. This year, budget development was particularly challenging due to stressful economic conditions; however, it is a workable budget and one that will have a reasonable effect on the tax rate.
