LITTLETON WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the 9th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:30 P.M.), to act upon the following:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, one member of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for one year, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting: "Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, relative to playing the game of Beano be adopted in this Town?"

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to elect by ballot a permanent police chief for the Town of Littleton, N.H., as provided by R.S.A. Chapter 41:47. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Town Building, Police Department, Forest Fires, Sewers, Streets and Highways, Street Lights, Vital Statistics, Sidewalks, Town Garage, Superintendent of Public Works, Health Officer, Hospital, District Nurse, Public Dump, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Social Security, Blister Rust, Fire Department, Damage by Dogs, Garbage Disposal, Special Highway Account, County Tax, Public Library, Cemeteries, National Holidays, Advertising, Region Association, Planning Board, Recreation, Debt Retirement, Interest on Indebtedness, Sewage Treatment Plant and other necessary expenses. Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monics, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1965 and to be paid therefrom.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer and sell and convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds for such price and upon such terms as the Selectmen may in their discretion determine.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to sell and convey to Littleton Rifle & Pistol Club, Inc., present lessee, a parcel of land situate in the Alder Brook area, so-called, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a point in the southeasterly line of Alder Brook; thence running southeasterly to line of land of the grantee herein, at the edge of a presently existing gravel pit or old field; thence running northeasterly along an old logging road five hundred (500) feet to an iron pin; thence running northwesterly along a line of blazed trees to said Alder Brook; thence running along said Alder Brook to the point of beginning; containing five (5) acres, more or less." Excepting and reserving any existing rights-of-way, and reserving to the Town the right for a period of five (5) years to remove gravel from time to time, with the right to enter for such purpose.

and, in the event that the vote is in the affirmative, to fix and determine the consideration for the deed and authorize the Selectmen to convey said parcel of land upon payment of said consideration.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the road known as Devil Elbow from its junction with the Lyman Road to its junction with the Foster Hill Road, at the Wilbur M. Parker, Jr., place, for a distance of about 3,500 feet.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) to purchase and plant trees on Town Property.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) from the Parking Meter Fund and apply said sum to pave the Eames Parking Area. Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the land and buildings on Mill Street and known as the Mrs. Bernice Harris property for the sum of \$7,500.00, which property if purchased shall provide additional off-street parking facilities for the general public and said sum to be taken from the Parking Meter Fund or to raise and appropriate said sum of money as the voters may decide. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen of the Town of Littleton, N.H., to appoint a committee of five legal voters to study the need for more adequate quarters for the housing of fire fighting equipment, station equipment and personnel. Further, that the Selectmen instruct said committee to study the advisability of separate quarters for the above purpose as opposed to a Municipal Building for the quartering of all local Governmental agencies except the Public Works Department. The committee also shall be instructed to recommend sites which are felt to meet the needs of the community. This committee shall be instructed to report to the Selectmen with their recommendations prior to the next regularly scheduled Town Meeting. (This article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to pay for all septic tanks, cess pools and other sewerage facilities and installation of same where such installations are necessary and required excepting the cost of labor and materials for connecting to the aforesaid tanks, cess pools or other sewerage facilities from building or buildings; and further that previous article or articles passed by the voters of the Town of Littleton, N.H., in 1963 dealing with the same subject of septic tanks, cess pools and other sewerage facilities and installation of same shall be interpreted in accordance with the intent of the voters to mean and have the effect of the town paying for all septic tanks, cess pools and other sewerage facilities and installation of same when said installation is necessary and required excepting the cost of labor and materials for connection to said installations from a building or buildings. And the Town of Littleton shall be chargeable for the aforesaid labor and materials as of January, 1963. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 14. To see if the Town will establish a town Conservation Commission as set forth in R.S.A. 36-A. Article 15. To see if the voters will vote to direct the Selectmen of the Town of Littleton to remove Davis Sanville from the office of fire chief of the Littleton Fire Department within sixty (60) days after date of town meeting if the town so votes. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

Article 16. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 17. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the warrant.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

January 26, 1965

Board of Selectmen Littleton, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1964, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal and District Courts, Sewer Bond Fund, Library, Planning Board, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1963 - December 31, 1964: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1963 and December 31, 1964, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$51,112.34 in 1964.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 and A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1964, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$26,461.72, plus a revenue surplus of \$7,755.67, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$34,217.39.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1964, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, in included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1964, in indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Reserve Fund: (Exhibit B-4)

A summarized statement of the activity in the Parking Meter Account during 1964 is presented in Exhibit B-4.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of outstanding Long Term Indebtedness as of December 31, 1964, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

Municipal Courts: (Exhibits I-1 and I-2)

Statements of the accounts of the Littleton Municipal Court for the period January 1, 1964 to June 30, 1964, and the District Court for the period July 1, 1964 to December 31, 1964, are included in Exhibits I-1 and I-2.

Sewer Bond Fund: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the Sewer Bond Fund account for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1964, is presented in Exhibit J.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report, are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$14,687.66, from \$74,426.16 to \$59,738.50, in 1964, as shown herewith.

Surety Bonds:

The surety bonds of the Town Clerk and Town Treasurer should be increased in amount as follows:

Town Clerk-increase from \$8,000 to \$10,000.

Town Treasurer-increase from \$25,000 to \$30,000.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1964

My 1963 report to the people of Littleton ended in this manner: "And now I feel that great change lies ahead for N.H. libraries." Have you read in the papers of the many meetings for people to learn about a statewide system for the libraries of New Hampshire? Are you aware that each of the four bookmobile areas in the state has increased its staff from two to four persons to give quicker, more intensive library service to the people near them? Do you know that as I write this report for you early in 1965 the machinery has arrived at the State Library in Concord to make a set of catalog cards for each book we will receive through central purchasing which our library already enjoys with 36%-40% discount on most books? The sets of cards for each book will mean much less work for your librarian, which can free her for other services. Also, local expense for time and material should be considered as a saving with central cataloging. Do you know that if Littleton should be selected as a Service Center her book buying powers, now \$3,000, could be doubled?

Littleton is fortunate. Many problems are behind us in our library history, such as: cataloging the collection, selecting books using professional standards, thus building up the collection so that it would be possible to use this library as a Service Center. For 33 years we have had a professional librarian. Since 1920 we have had much help from the State Library both with professional advice and, several times, with money for reference books and children's books. Our last gift was the Shieling books. As your professional librarian, I hope you will think it proper for me to state that I believe the Statewide Library Development System can be a fantastic educaional force to all people and all libraries in this beautiful northern New Hampshire area as well as the whole state.

Last summer John H. Colby asked me to write a feature story about the Littleton Library for the October 15, 1964 Courier. This assignment did much for me, for I learned all the steps in the long 74 year development of this library. Also, I can see the development pattern of the many other libraries in the area in relation to the new plan designed to strengthen all. I am pleased, Mr. Colby, that you called on me. Historically, The Courier, bound and housed in this library is invaluable. Currently, we are all most proud of our local paper.

Sixteen hi-fi records were given to the library in 1964 in memory of Laurence C. Chase, Arthur E. Corey and Dorothy M. Longchamps. Thirty-one books were given in memory of Leon Ordway, George Gale, Richard Poore, William E. Carbonneau, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ide, Wanda J. Richardson, Fred Kelley, Edward A. Harmes, Mrs. Lawrence Gilman, Thomas A. Golden, Dorothy M. Longchamps, Kenneth Crane, Mrs. Lena Fournier, John Haslam, Mary Strain, Benton Moyer, Sr., Earl B. Rogers.

The library is loaning a group of over 600 books at a time to the elementary school.

The White Mountain Garden Club has a project each year to add several new books to the Littleton Public Library on subjects related to the club interests. These books are on the library shelves with book plates showing their source. We are also thrilled with the interest of this club in keeping the library cheerful with fresh flowers each summer. I know how much library users enjoy this service and I feel that I have been remiss in expressing the appreciation which we all feel. This fall and winter suitable arrangements have brightened our loan desk. We do thank you for having the library so much in your hearts.

Virginia Walsh left the Littleton Public Library in April to begin work as librarian at St. Mary's-in-the-Mountains. We are most fortunate to have Althea F. Haskell working for us since April 7, 1964.

Again your librarian has attended professional and neighborhood meetings including two days at the New England Library Association Meeting at Wentworth-by-the-Sea in early October. Also, in October, there was a fine all day meeting on the principles of book selection, provided by the State Library and held in Concord. October 7 and November 19 your librarian and seven other school and public librarians were called together by the Department of Education and the State Library to help plan a handbook designed particularly to help New Hampshire with better cooperation between school and public library.

We are having growing pains at the library. We have more books on the main floor than it will gracefully take. We, on occasion, have more people than can be seated. A move to other floors means more staff, more shelving, more heat, more furniture, etc. All last year the library board has been paving the way to move the children's room upstairs. At this moment we are waiting for a shipment of furniture.

Last year our new front walk was completed. Since we cannot move our building to the sidewalk or even lower the approach to sidewalk level, the majority, I believe, feel that the walk is much improved with no slope and no uneven bricks.

I thank the library trustees, Mrs. Nita Howard, Mrs. Virginia Walsh, Mrs. Althea F. Haskell, Miss Patricia Richards, Miss Barbara Clemens, Mr. Joel Bedor, Mr. Norman Kinne and all of you for another busy year as we change and grow with the library needs of this town.

ANNUAL REPORT OF LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

T.R.A. Work

During 1964 the T.R.A. work was on Mann's Hill. Work was started at the very top of the hill and was extended approximately 0.6 mile in a southerly direction towards Littleton village. The road was widened, straightened and new drainage put in. The base gravel was laid and compacted. This year the crushed gravel course will be laid and an asphalt surface put on.

It is hoped that this project can be extended still further toward Littleton Village this season.

Sewers

The sewer main on Mountain View Rd. was completed in 1963. A small section of storm sewer was installed on the upper section of Washington St. This did away with a water problem around the Porter Block which had existed for some time.

The balance of our sewer work was in conjunction with the contract work which was being done in town this past season.

Streets and Highways

The Town Highway Dept. continued its program of blade mixing and sealing on rural roads and town streets as has been done in the past. This program is to continue this coming season.

There were minor improvements made on Oak Hill Ave. and Church St. this last summer.

The Dept. built the parking lot to the rear of the theatre known as the Eames Lot. It is planned to put an asphaltic concrete type I-1 surface on this lot this season, and to do other work to complete the project.

REPORT OF LITTLETON WATER AND LIGHT DEPARTMENT FOR YEAR 1964

In 1962 the Water and Light Department engaged the services of Gordon E. Ainsworth and Associates to make a study of the town's water supply system.

Two of the recommendations have been carried out thus far, phase one being the laying of a 12" water main on Redington street finished in 1963.

The second phase was carried out in 1964. This was the installation of a larger water main on Cottage street to supplement the 6" line, involving the laying of 10" Universal, cast iron, cement-lined water pipe. Hydrants on the 6" line on this street were removed and new 6" Mueller hydrants were installed on the 10" line. This increased the size openings of the hydrants from 4" to 6", for greater flow of water for fire emergencies.

Clinton Clough was the successful bidder on digging and laying approximately 2,800 feet of 8" Universal water pipe on the Brickyard road and for the construction of a pump house at a new artesian well. A deep well pump was installed during the year. The completion of this well project is expected to avert future summertime water shortages which had become commonplace over the past few years.

On the St. Johnsbury road 1,300 feet of 6" Universal water pipe were added to the system, as were 700 feet of the same size and type pipe on the Mountain View road, better known as Herbert Development.

Extensive repairs were made on the Oak Hill reservoir by Mr. Clough, low bidder.

New racks and screens and some cement work was done at the North Branch Intake at Gale river.

In cooperation with the Selectmen, the Department is carrying out a program of renewing and adding a few street light fixtures each year. On Pleasant street, above Oak Hill avenue, eleven 2' and two 4' fluorescent fixtures replaced the old type lights. Seven 2' and two 4' fluorescent lights were installed on Pine street, as were five 2' fixtures on Maple street. Three General Electric mercury vapor lights were added on the Franconia road, as were three of the same type fixtures on the Mountain View road. Twenty-three outdoor lighting fixtures were installed on customers' property.

A new three-phase line was built on the Brickyard road to service the new well and 1,000 feet of single-phase line were added on Manns Hill to service cable television equipment. Also 1,700 feet of line were run on the Lisbon road for the Sewerage Treatment Plant.

Excavation was done for a second sub-station to be built at the corner of South and Bridge streets to provide for future growth of the community.

Various new services were added in both Departments, plus the usual repairs and replacements.

The total amount spent for capital improvements was \$103,736.62, considerably more than in past years. This investment in plant and services reflects the desire to keep abreast of the needs of the public for water and electrical requirements.



Twelve patients were given transportation to Hanover hospital and to the Haverhill hospital.

There have been six patients from Littleton who have received appointments at the Cardiac Clinics held in Lancaster, and there have been two Chest X-ray Clinics held at the Littleton hospital at which the members of the L.C.N.A. have served as clerical workers, a very necessary part of the clinics.

At the six clinics held in Littleton, 29 patients were school children and 12 were pre-schoolers.

There have been 40 people in Littleton who have had the use of the beds, walkers, wheelchairs, commodes and other items for use in the home to help make it easier for a person to be cared for, and indeed to make it easier on the person caring for the patient. Some have two or more pieces of equipment and some of the items have been out for a considerable length of time.

The only requirements for obtaining the use of any of the equipment available is the consent of the physician in charge of the patient. There is a nominal charge of \$1 per month for the use of any item if the patient can afford it, otherwise there is no charge. Many people have given more than the stated fee and this helps to replace and renew some of the equipment.

We have received the gift of a new walker in memory of the late Miss Eleanor Sullivan, from Mr. and Mrs. Paul R. Holly.

In September there was an Immunization Survey conducted under the direction of the State of N.H. Dept. of Health. More than 200 homes in the town were visited and questionaires were filled out by the parent or guardian of children in the home, in regard to the level of protection by immunization against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, smallpox and measles. Upon completion of the survey in the entire state, results will be presented to N.H. State Dept. of Health and the N.H. Medical Society with recommendaions for better immunization programs.

The services of immunization are available to all through one's own physician or there are clinics held at stated times and places. The last immunization clinics held in Littleton under the sponsorship of the L.C.N.A. were in the spring of 1962 and we hope to hold another series in the near future.

Court Bellefleur of the Catholic Daughters of America again sponsored the Vitamin Project for school and pre-school children.

At Christmastime, through the generosity of local organizations, and individuals, the Christmas Fund money permitted us to provide 24 families with food baskets and clothing and winter footwear for many. There were seven baskets sent out by two organizations and individuals for a total of 31 food baskets. Many smaller remembrances were sent to folks who did not require regular food baskets. These were small gifts of fruit and candy and a visit which seemed to please the older folks especially.

I wish to express my appreciation to the L.C.N.A. president, Mrs. Frances Dunham, and the members of the board for their interest and help throughout the year: to Mr. and Mrs. Tefft, at the Community House for helping with the arrangements from our loan closet, and to all the people, professional and non-professional, who have helped with our programs this past year. A special thank-you to Mrs. Lavonne W. LaBonte, R.N., the school nurse, with whom I collaborate frequently and most satisfactorily.

The Littleton Community Nurse association was organized some 40 years ago and its purposes have remained steadfast; to provide skilled nursing care, UNDER THE DIRECTION OF THE PHYSI-CIAN, to the sick in their homes on a visit basis, charging in proportion to their ability to pay; health instruction; educational follow-up and arranging for medical care where necessary. It is supported by the Town of Littleton and the nursing care fees received.

The community nurse is a graduate registered nurse who works for the local voluntary, one-nurse, public health agency, the L.C.N.A.

The community nurse is ready to help YOU when you are sick no matter where you live in Littleton, or whatever your financial situation. She gives nursing care and instruction to people of all ages elderly or chronic invalids; mothers with new babies—convalescents returning from the hospital—in fact to all who require skilled care in the home. She changes dressings, helps with special exercises and home treatments, gives hypodermic injections and stays long enough to give the nursing care ordered by the physician and to teach someone in the family how to give necessary care between her visits.

The help of the community nurse is obtained by asking your physician to notify the nurse, or by telephoning her yourself. The nurse answers each call but visits are continued only under the guidance of a physician. She is on duty from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Only essential visits and emergency calls are made on weekends and holidays.

Telephone numbers for the nurse are either 444-5711 or 444-5566. Fees are set at the rate of \$2 per call for bedside care. Hypodermic therapy cost is \$1.50. Fees may be modified or omitted, according to circumstances.

All fees are turned over monthly to the treasurer of the L.C.N.A. and applied to the organization budget.

LITTLETON PARK COMMISIONER'S REPORT FOR BUDGET YEAR OF 1964

1964 was another year of improvements. Our major attention was focussed on Remich Park. In 1963 the year-round paved recreation area was initially completed. This year we painted and lined out three regulation size tennis courts, completed installing the necessary basketball nets and added a large "separation" type net to partition off the area, making individual courts. The big expense came when we installed a plywood section fence of 4x8 plywood pieces preparatory to the first flooding of the area for Skating, which occurred in November this year (this added several weeks of skating). In addition to this, two new signs were painted and erected at Remich Park. A new one fastened to the tennis court fence, facing Pleasant St, and the sign on Oak Hill was replaced. We believe that a fine area like this should display its name proudly.

BIG IMPROVEMENT AT MT. EUSTIS

In mid-summer a bulldozer worked a full week clearing the old jump site area and later this was mulched and seeded, adding almost double the skiable area to the Mountain. A new method of routing the rope at the base of the tow was installed, making loading onto the tow much easier.

ADDITIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS-APTHORP COMMON

The existing shelter was re-roofed, and we added onto the North side an 18-ft. open structure supported by iron posts with cement slab floor. This was ideal protection from the hot summer sun and the rain for our Director and her many young "customers." A large new set of high swings was also purchased and erected in concrete settings. Existing sand boxes, etc., were repaired or replaced.

SWIM PROGRAM-SUMMER '64

For the second year our swimming program was carried on at the Bethlehem pool. Enrollment was about the same as last year and attendance was excellent. We added several Junior swim aides to this program, making it much more efficient.

TOTAL APPROPRIATIONS: \$13,990.68.

TOTAL EXPENDITURES: \$13,990.68.

The greater amounts spent were in the form of personnel to carry on these many and varied projects.

Some of the costs for additions and improvements were:

Care at Park \$1,264.37

Ski tows at both Remich Park & Mt. Eustis-\$1,500.00 (Care & Personnel).

Recreation Directors and assistants at Remich Park and Apthorp Common—\$1,550.00

INSURANCE—Over \$1,000.00 and numerous other maintenance costs.

Cost of some of the actual additions to the existing facilities:

New Tractor & Mower for Remich Park-\$1,000.00.

New Boiler (Furnace) Remich park grandstand Building-\$700.

Paint for Tennis Court (rink) areas-over \$300.

Plywood panels for Rink Fence-\$400. or more.

New netting for tennis court area-over \$250.

The above listed are some of the more expensive items, but only a part of the many and varied costs involved in the multiple improvements outlined earlier in this report.

A detailed and accurate explanation of all disbursements in this department can be seen in the regular budget section.

The Park Commission would like to take the opportunity afforded by this report to thank all who gave of their time and talent to make another full and even better year of recreation for Littleton.

The school board of Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report will be found the audit of finances for the school year 1963-1964 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission, budgets and estimated receipts and expenditures for this year and next year, and written reports by the superintendent, the principal and the school nurse.

The budget for the coming year shows an increase over the present year. This is due to increases in two areas, namely, teachers' salaries and supervisory union expense. All other items in the budget remain substantially the same.

We recommend to you a budget of \$642,200.00 for the ensuing year for the support of schools.

WARRANT FOR SCHOOL MEETING

To the inhabitants of the Union School District, in the town of Littleton, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the high school, in said Littleton, on Saturday, March 13, 1965 at 5:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following articles. (Discussion of warrant at 8:00 P.M.)

Article 1. To choose a moderator, a clerk, two members of the board of education for three years, and a treasurer.

Article 2: To see if the district will vote to increase the school board from five to nine members, the following question to be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting: "Shall the school board be increased from five to nine members and the school district be given the authority, by vote, at any future annual meeting to decrease the number of school board members?"

(This article to be voted upon only in the event that Senate Bill No. 28 authorizing and directing said vote shall have been adopted by the Legislature and shall have become effective prior to the date of said meeting.)

Article 3. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division.

Article 4. To hear the reports of officers, auditors or committees of the district and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the district will vote to create an area school planning committee consisting of three qualified voters, appointed by the moderator, of whom one at least shall be a member of the school board.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Article 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Littleton Union School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1964, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1963 and June 30, 1964, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$48,138.55 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1964.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1964, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$33,107.35, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$10,109.48, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$22,997.87.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summery statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1964, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1964, is indicated in Exhibit F. Building Fund Account: (Exhibit G)

A summarized statement showing the activity in the Building Fund account during the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit G.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1964, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhbit H.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the School Tax account with the Town of Littleton is included in Exhibit I. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1964, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1963-64 School Tax amounting to \$459,734.14.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$11,901.74 to \$3,040.29, during the fiscal year as shown by the following statement:

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your schools.

A number of changes in teaching staff have taken place since my last report as a result of a few accepting positions in other areas and several resigning after having reached retirement.

Mr. Gordon Peaco, a graduate of Bates College, with ten years' teaching experience in Maine, part of which was in administration, was elected teacher of English in the high school, replacing Mr. James Winer who resigned to accept a position in Connecticut.

Miss Phyllis Brown of Portland, a graduate of the University of Maine, was elected teacher of French, replacing Mrs. Harriet Mc-Laren who retired from teaching.

Mr. Barry Clough of Farmington, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth State College, was elected teacher of History, replacing Aldrige Vaillant who resigned to return to college for further study.

Mr. Charles Ricardi of Carroll, a graduate of Keene State College with Master's degree from Worcester State College, and with nine years' teaching experience in New Hampshire and Massachusetts, was elected special teacher in junior high, replacing Mrs. Marion Lewis who retired in June.

Mr. Philip Bender, a graduate of Springfield College with Master's degree from Worcester State College, and with previous experience in Ashland, Maine, was elected as an additional teacher in the English Department.

Mr. Albert McLellan, a graduate of Lyndon State College with further study at the University of Vermont and Hamilton College, was elected to teach General Mathematics and General Science to replace Mr. Timothy Mahurin who resigned to accept a position in Bristol, N. H.

Mr. John Baldwin of Gorham, a graduate of Boston University with both Bachelor and Master's degree, and with fourteen years' previous experience, was elected principal of the Lakeway Elementary School. Mr. Baldwin served as principal of the Gorham Elementary School prior to coming to Littleton. He was elected to replace Mr. Bruce Smith who resigned to become assistant superintendent in the Farmington Union.

Mr. James J. May of North Conway, a graduate of Fitchburg State College, with four years' experience in North Conway was elected teacher of Science, Reading and Music in Grades 4-5-6, replacing Mr. Theodore Pfeuffer who resigned to accept a position in Connecticut.

Mrs. Barbara Bender of Caribou, Maine, a graduate of Newark State College and with four years' previous experience in New Jersey and Maine, was elected to teach Grade 3, replacing Mrs. Marion Pfeuffer who resigned to accept a position in Connecticut.

Mrs. Joann Reid of Littleton, a graduate of Bridgewater College, Va., with one year's experience in Virginia, was elected to teach Grade 4, replacing Mrs. Lillian Frazer who resigned to accept a position in Woodsville.

Mrs. Judith Smith of Bethlehem, a graduate of Salem State College, with previous experience in Deerfield and Whitefield, was elected to teach Grade 5, replacing Mrs. Lila Nutbrown who retired in June.

Mrs. Bernice Kyte of Littleton, a graduate of the University of Maine, was elected to teach kindergarten, replacing Mrs. Judith Millen who resigned for personal reasons.

Major repairs and replacements in the schools since my last report include the following:

Elementary School-

Painted four classrooms Painted all outside doors Painted toilet areas on ground floor Repaired gymnasium roof next to flashing on all sides

High School—

Painted floors in Mechanic Arts Shops Painted Rooms 2, 3, 23, 26 and chemistry laboratory Painted boys' toilet room on second floor Painted rear stairwell next to cafeteria Painted public entrance Painted girls' locker room Corked and painted base of columns at front entrance Sanded and painted metal work at front steps.

A portion of the sweepstakes money appropriated was used to purchase and install a modern language laboratory in the high school.

The guidance office was enlarged by partitioning off a portion of the storeroom in the high school and installing a door from the present administrative suite.

Equipment added to the high school this year includes 168 wire baskets and racks for physical education department, replacement of four typewriters in Business Education Department, liquid duplicator for junior high school, stands for two calculators, chairs for Home Economics Department, a stereomicroscope for Biology, miscellaneous small pieces of equipment for Mechanic Arts, and a photocopier.

Equipment added at the elementary school includes 30 pupil desks and chairs, four classroom tables, an overhead projector, three double tier chair trucks, several record players, a combination floor machine, and refrigerator for kitchen.

By vote of the State Board of Education in December, Littleton will become a member district of the enlarged White Mountains Supervisory Union which will include besides Littleton, the school districts of Bethlehem, Franconia, Sugar Hill, Easton, Lisbon Town, Lisbon Special, Landaff, Lyman and the White Mountains Regional District. This move is a part of the reorganization plan of the Department of Education to reduce the number of supervisory unions from 48 to 36 as recommended by the Interim Commission on Education and approved by the 1963 legislature.

Serious consideration should be given at this time to a study of future curriculum and space needs in the high school area. The high school curriculum is constantly changing to meet the variety needs of children and communities. Littleton is no exception. Littleton has become the educational center of the immediate area as evidenced by the fact that it now receives tuition pupils from Bethlehem, Franconia, Lisbon Town, Sugar Hill, Easton and Lunenburg.

Our own local school population is growing faster than was ever anticipated. Our war babies that gave us considerable concern 15-20 years ago have completed high school and we are now beginning to feel the impact of their children in our schools. During the school year 1953-1954 the average daily membership of resident pupils in the high school, Grades 7-12, was 285.6. This past year the average daily membership of resident pupils in those same grades was 486.0. This is an increase of approximately 70% in the number of resident pupils attending the high school, Grades 7-12, in the short period of ten years. This present year promises to show another marked increase in resident enrollment.

The principal's report shows an increase in the total enrollment for this present year. It also shows a marked decrease in the number of drop-outs. With these two factors working in opposite directions, the problem of space becomes still more acute.

I would recommend therefore that serious consideration be given to this problem and that a study begin early. Committees from neighboring districts that send tuition pupils to Littleton should be brought in on the study because the future of Littleton High School is a concern to them as well. I would urge that these districts consider seriously a study of the Area Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) School Law. It could have provisions that might be helpful to us all. In order to do this, an article in the school district warrant of this year seems necessary, which in no ways binds a school district to enter into any agreement. It should be a good start.

On other pages of this report will be found a list of teachers, statistical report, health report by school nurse, high school principal's report and tentative school calendar for the school year 1965-1966.

In closing I wish to express my sincere thanks to the school board and all other personnel, as well as the citizens of Littleton for their continued cooperation and support.

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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

January 14, 1965

To: Mr. Leslie S. Cummings Superintendent of Schools

I hereby submit my first annual report as principal of Littleton High School, for the year beginning September 1964, to date.

REGISTRATION

The total registration to date for the high school is 513 plus 191 in the junior high school for a total of 704 registrations in grades 7-12. This compares with a total registration of 669 for the entire 1963-64 school year and represents an increase of 29 in the high school and 6 in the junior high school to date. Eleven have withdrawn from the high school to date and 4 from the junior high school. Eleven of these people have transferred to other schools and only 4 have dropped from attendance at any school. During the academic year 1963-64 this latter figure was twenty. These figures represent a drop-out rate far below the national average.

CURRICULUM

Littleton High School is accredited by the State Department of Education as a comprehensive high school. There is now a sufficient number of students in attendance to indicate that a fully comprehensive program is practical. Such a program should provide opportunities for the student to explore areas of special interest, to receive a well-rounded cultural background, to prepare for different types of post-secondary education and to gain some degree of salable skill which would serve as qualification for employment above the unskilled level. Not every student will desire all these opportunities; but to provide equal opportunities to all students the curriculum must be sufficiently diversified to meet the individual needs of students of differing abilities, interests and goals. The school is doing an excellent job of preparing students for postsecondary education, as borne out by national examinations and the successess of the graduates, but expansion of the curriculum is necessary if the responsibilities of a fully comprehensive school are to be met.

Innovations-1964-1965

Because of a rapidly increasing enrollment and an overcrowded condition there was a return to the seven period day in order to gain more teacher stations during the day. This has caused increased pressure on the already overworked study hall facilities. Additional study facilities will be needed if the enrollment continues to grow; if there is a return to the six period day additional classrooms will be needed to continue the present curricular offerings.

Department heads have been designated and have been given the responsibility of developing, in cooperation with other teachers in their departments, a course of study for all subjects offered. This is being done to establish priorities for the different aspects of the subject, to insure that the proper time is spent on those areas of importance and to provide a planned program from year to year.

The additional period in the schedule has permitted additional sections to be offered in subjects already in the curriculum. These additional sections are required because of increased enrollments. A few additional courses have been added to the curriculum to meet special needs. These courses are: History and Appreciation of Music for those with desire for greater background information in this area.

BSCS Biology—For a number of years the Biological Sciences Curriculum Study group has been working on new courses for high school biology which would permit more laboratory experience for students. This year this course was provided for one section on an experimental basis. It is hoped that this program might be extended to three sections another year.

Personal Typing—A one-semester course to provide basic proficiency for those desiring typing instruction but not interested in the course for job skills. A separate group is enrolled each semester.

Economics—A course in the basic economic principles, open to all students, necessary to an understanding of our economic system. Bookeeping II provides for a continuation of instruction begun in Bookkeeping I. This course provides instruction in more specific accounting systems and will provide students with proficiency far beyond that possible in the one-year course.

Areas of Special Concern

As mentioned earlier an expansion of the curriculum is necessary if the responsibilities of a fully comprehensive school are to be met. This broadening of the curriculum will require additional space and faculty.

The junior high program is being evaluated with respect to course offerings and time allotments. Greater provision for individual differences, more elective course offerings and student activity programs specifically for this age group is needed.

Additional faculty is needed to reduce teacher loads to levels which will make possible more attention to individual needs. This teacher load is especially heavy at the junior high level and in the mathematics and English departments.

The library continues to be one of the aspects of the school of which we are most proud. The selection of books is good and with continued purchasing the library will become even more effective. Additional space and materials will also be needed if it is to continue its high level of effectiveness.

CONCLUSION

I would like, personally, to take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the students, faculty, the school board, Mrs. Howland, Mrs. Beere, the people of the entire high school community, and you for the fine cooperation which I have received during my short time in Littleton.

Program of the White Mountains Region Association 1964

The White Mountains Region Association this year has published and distributed 136,000 promotional folders and cooperated with the five other Region Associations in publishing 400,000 copies of the New Hampshire Accommodations Booklet.

We received a total of 7,500 individual inquiries about the Region which were answered with a package of folders and with personal letters. Because we are closely associated with the State of New Hampshire promotional effort, we receive in our office inquiries which are generated by the State. The Region Association's address is listed on one and one-half million individual pieces of literature published by the State.

In addition to maintaining an active and effective mailing office, the Association has encouraged and promoted many important developmental projects for the region. Such projects include Northern Ventures, a venture capital corporation to assist people who have ideas for industry; Temple Monorail System at Twin Mountain; the Kilkenny project in Lancaster; Mt. Agassiz Development in Bethlehem and Big Bear Ski area at Bartlett.

Through our Industrial Council we have changed the emphasis of industrial development of the State of New Hampshire so that it includes the northern three countries and also encourages a "do it yourself" attitude with industrial development groups.

Last year we assisted in promoting an appropriation of \$65,000 for the construction of the Whitefield Regional Airport and went on record opposing the Livermore Falls Dam in the Pemigewasset Valley.

Presently we are planning to establish an active Historical Sites Committee which will encourage the development of major historical sites in the region, an asset which we have which has not been developed to its full potential.

The work of the Association is continually hampered by a lack of adequate funds. In order to do the work necessary to raise our economy, the full support of all towns in the region is needed.

We near the end of your Planning Board's ninth year. As of April 1st, 1964 the term of our Secretary-Treasurer James J. Gannon expired. Your Board of Selectmen reappointed him.

The pressure of business and other obligations convinced our member, Roger L. Lord, that he would be unable to devote the time and effort he felt should be expected and needed. He resigned effective July 1, 1964. We were sorry to have Roger leave as his eager interest and special abilities had made him a valuable member of your Board. We extend special thanks for his services and ideas in the interests of Littleton.

Your Selectmen later appointed Roland A. Dorr to complete Roger Lord's unexpired term.

The preliminary studies, details, effort and time necessary to bring the sewage treatment plant and system to acceptance and implementation during the previous two years added to the normal activities of your Board made the reduced work load, after the acceptance of the project, a somewhat welcome relief.

However, a Citizen's Committee with the help of your Planning Board, after much study and work, suggested that Littleton secure engineering aid toward developing a comprehensive plan for Littleton with consideration given to urban renewal possibilities.

The 1964 town meeting authorized this and voted to appropriate up to \$8,000 to defray $\frac{1}{2}$ of the cost with the Federal Government to pay the $\frac{2}{3}$ balance.

Thus your Planning Board's work let down was not for long! Under the state law this survey is made under the direction of the Planning Board and the N.H. Planning Department. The State makes the actual contract with the consulting engineering firm chosen to do the work and helps guide the progress. Previously Littleton has had many special surveys or studies such as schools, water resources, town dump, traffic relief, parking, swimming facilities, a long range sewer and waste disposal plan, zoning, and tax mapping. Most of these have been done under the guidance of or by special engineering people. It is expected the comprehensive planning study and recommendations will include bringing these various specific studies up to date and add studies such as an economic survey, a community facilities plan, land development policies, capital improvements, etc. These then are to be tied together in one overall master plan. The study will include the necessary details and recommendations needed if and when Littleton should decide it wished to enter some degree of urban renewal.

The completed survey will serve as a guide and advice in deciding wisely when, where and what improvements or changes are feasible and good to make.

To avoid duplication of effort, to utilize any possible advice and because reports of actual experiences in urban renewal in some instances are quite questionable, your Board has moved slowly. After many informal and some formal meetings and individual activities your Board in conjunction with your Board of Selectmen has been interviewing the four consulting firms of Klunder Associates, Hanover, N.H.; James Sewall Company, Oldtown, Me.; Metcalf and Eddy, Boston, Mass.; and Edwards and Kelcey, Boston, Mass., all of which enjoy excellent reputations and have special facilities for, and understanding of northern New England community problems. The choice of consultant is now tentative. The survey should start soon.

Your Board has continued its attention and study in several problems. Since your Board for a long time has advocated parking improvements for the central business area in the best interests of the community, we were glad you chose last town meeting to purchase the Eames lot. This has been one of the key areas recommended for action by your Board to acquire space and achieve circulation where badly needed.

We are interested in and call to your attention the article in the coming town meeting warrant as to the purchase of the Harris property on Mill St. This has been one of the key spots recommended by your Board to improve as soon as practical in the parking and traffic relief program. Our optimism as to Littleton continues. We envision solid growth and improvement in many facets. This can be aided and insured by energy, action and vision not only in Littleton, but in the surrounding areas as well, because what helps our neighbors tends to help us and what helps us tends to help them.

Thanks for your help. We are continually looking for your help and are eager for information and suggestions.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy-both industrial and recreational—is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area-4,350,000 acres-is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.
