



## MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Delivered in Court Room, City Hall Building, Wednesday, Jan. 1, 1902.

Gentlemen of the City Councils:

A year ago today I had the honor of addressing you, and at that time mapped out, in a general way, the policy of the incoming administration.

This address is in the nature of a report of progress in carrying out that policy and statement in regard to the financial condition of the city.

While we have not realized all we anticipated, still we hope in a measure that the administration of the affairs of the city has been satisfactory to the citizens, and, with the year's experience, trust that we will be able to do better during the remainder of our term.

The financial condition of the city at the close of the year

This amount was not included in the annual appropriation.

There have been unforeseen calls for money as are liable to happen in any city: our cases of smallpox and building of the new hospital for contagious diseases being the principal ones.

We feel it to be a matter of credit to ourselves and hope one of satisfaction to the citizens that the total expenditures of the city for the year 1901, have not exceeded the appropriation.

Under the authority of an act of the legislature and the joint resolution of the city councils, the \$75,000 6% bonds, due July 1st, were refunded at 3%: the entire issue being largely over-

subscribed and entirely by our own citizens, which is a matter of great satisfaction.

It was particularly satisfactory to note that so general an interest was taken in this bond issue; instead of the whole amount being bought by out-of-town brokers or by one or two banks, it was taken up in small amounts by citizens of more limited income and, to twist an old saying, "Where a man's money is, there his heart is also," we know the location of the hearts of a good many of our town's people.

This refunding of the bonds at 3% will make a saving of \$2250 in the yearly interest account.

I wish to call your attention to the improvements that have been made on certain streets during the past year.

Six hundred and forty-four square yards of granite block paving have been laid on a portion of Franklin street west from Main street, 1,093 square yards on Bridge street: East Hollis street from Dearborn to Main has been laid so the paving of this street has been completed from Main street to Hudson street, and it is in a condition that will not require any expense for years to come.

The macadamizing of Main street from the bridge crossing Salmon brook south to Taylor street about 8,370 square yards at 44 cents per square yard, is an excellent piece of work and a credit to the commissioners in charge, we know it will be greatly appreciated by the people as it is one of our principal thoroughfares.

In District No. 1 much excellent work has been done in the way of permanent improvements: it has been the policy of the commissioners and committee on highways that whatever work was done it should be in such a way it would not have to be repaired again in another year.

I wish to say in this connection that I think the commissioners have shown good judgment in the management of their work, and economy in the expenditure of the money, as the appropriation in 1901 for the streets was less than in 1900, and

to their credit be it said that they have done excellent work and kept inside of their appropriation.

While there has been but little sewer work done in the past year it has been laid in all cases where applications have been made. Needed repairs have been made principally on Berkeley street where 306 feet of unproperly laid sewer had to be rebuilt.

Under an act of the legislature passed in 1901, the departments formerly under the management of the committee on highways and bridges and sewers and drains are placed under the control of a committee to be known as the Board of Public Works.

This, with its extended jurisdiction over the streets and sewers, can be made an important department of the city and by the proper management of its affairs should endeavor to secure permanent improvements. The purpose of this act as generally understood, was to remove the control of the office of street commissioner from politics, and create a tenure of office for that position which would not subject it at each election to the uncertainties that must occur when the tenure of office depends on the success of one party or another in the city election.

In my judgment this must result in a benefit to the city as the commissioners can give their time and best efforts to the work and management of the department, rather than be looking out for their re-election, and as the members of this board are elected for one, two and three years, we will always have two men who will have the benefit of former years experience in carrying on street work.

Under this system improvements can be begun that may require more than one or two years to complete, and the work continued as first planned. This board being a new department of course will be much criticised like all new ventures, but must in the end, I think, result in great good if properly managed

#### CIVIC IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION.

The well directed efforts of such institutions have accomplished great good upon many occasions, I am sure everybody would welcome the advent of such an association.

I cannot enter into the details of the operation of these organizations, but recommend the idea to the attention of those possessed of sufficient civic pride and interest to desire to do something to add to the attractiveness of our city.

There is one thing especially, gentlemen, that I would like to call your attention to:—during the past a practice has grown up of suspending the rules regulating the passage of a motion. I should strongly advise that such action be discontinued.

There may be cases where immediate action is so necessary that the suspension of the rules is advisable. There will probably be but few matters arising which will suffer from the delay of allowing them to lay over for two weeks; such a course will give the members an opportunity to ascertain the feelings of the people upon the public matters before them, as well as give the members themselves sufficient time for mature consideration.

The desire has been during the past year to manage the business affairs of the city along conservative lines. It was thought best to improve and derive the greatest benefit from what we had on hand, rather than to branch out into new work and undertake more than we were able to perform, or than the resources of the city would permit.

If I were to sum up in a few words the paramount needs of this city at present, I believe that I would say that first of all, is absolute need for the economical administration of public affairs; second, the encouragement of manufacturing establishments either already located or to come; third, to put into practice the theory of patronizing home industries; lastly, an outpouring of a spirit of civic loyalty and pride in this our city of Nashua.

In conclusion permit me to thank the city councils and other city officials for their hearty co-operation during the past year and to express the hope that these relations may be as cordial and harmonious during the year to come.

#### INSTRUCTIONS TO KEY HOLDERS AND CITIZENS.

1. Upon the discovery of a fire go to the nearest box, turn key in lock, and hold bolt back with key, as it is a spring lock, pull down the hook as far as it will go; shut the door. Do not try to remove the key, as it is locked in, and cannot be re-

moved unless by one of the engineers, who will, as soon as convenient, release and return it.

- 2. All persons giving fire alarms should remain awhile beside the box so as to direct the firemen to the fire.
- 3. No person will give an alarm for the same fire after the first alarm has been given without an order from an engineer or the officer in command, and the person so ordered will be sure to go to the same box from which the first alarm was given and report to the chief engineer.
- 4. Never signal for a fire seen at a distance; never touch a box except to give an alarm of fire; do not give an alarm for a chimney fire.
- 5. Never let a key out of your possession unless called for by the chief engineer. If you change your residence or place of business where the keys are kept, return the key to the same officer.

#### APPARATUS AND HOSE.

The apparatus consists of four Amoskeag steam fire engines, one one-horse hose reel, two one-horse and two two-horse hose wagons, four supply wagons, one hook and ladder truck, one combination chemical and hook and ladder truck, one Babcock chemical engine. All in first class condition.

We have, at present, about 9000 feet of fabric hose in good condition.

## THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR 1901.

To the Honorable City Council:

Gentlemen:—At the annual meeting of the trustees of the Public Library, Feb. 8, it was voted that the secretary be a committee to make the customary annual report, called for in the agreement establishing a free public library, to your honorable body.

In accordance with the foregoing instruction the following report is respectfully submitted.

The year has been one of unusual activity not only in carrying on the constantly increasing work of the library proper, but also in planning for the future. The trustees have held fifteen meetings during the year, it being understood early in the season that the fund in the hands of the city treasurer who was made custodian of the Hunt fund had so nearly reached the original sum of fifty thousand dollars as to warrant the trustees of the library to take up the work of erecting the building without further delay, which work devolves upon them by the stipulated terms of the donors of the fund.

The first meeting to examine the plans that had been submitted was held July 5, 1901. There were three differing very much in style and general appearance but all from architects of high standing and ability in Boston. After much careful study and comparison the plan submitted by Cram, Goodhue

& Ferguson received the preference and the choice was unanimously so decided and adopted and the work of procuring details and specifications was taken up. Then followed advertising for bids as it was considered very desirable to get the stonework for the basement and cellar in before winter came. Bids came in with satisfactory promptness from contractors of good reputation and large experience which were carefully considered and compared resulting in the award of the contract to the Nashua Building Company.

The walls of the basement were immediately put in and suitably protected for the winter and made ready for the super-structure on the opening of spring.

So far as the bids would warrant the work was given to our own citizens, greatly to the gratification of our business men and citizens generally.

Turning from this line of work to the condition of the library we are pleased to report that it has been a year of continued growth and uninterrupted prosperity. We have added over a thousand volumes answering fairly well the demands of the year, while the reading room has been well supplied with a careful selection of the best newspapers and periodicals of the day.

The demand from the schools for special lines of study has been met to the full extent of our means, also the requirements of clubs and social organizations.

Few citizens are aware of the reading and study necessary to find and select the latest and most valuable works on science, religion, literature and miscellaneous topics that are discussed by the active and progressive minds of the day.

Printing, illustrating and binding so unite in their most attractive work that the eye and the taste are being educated, and, it is hoped, the heart made better.

The public library as an educator of the masses has come to the front as never before and the vast sums of money that are not only being offered but actually pressed into service by open hands and generous hearts are the marvel of the times. The great interest and liberality of Mr. Andrew Carnegie has done much to bring this about, a line in which he has no peer. The present and coming generations may arise in gratitude and call him blessed. Others have been moved and still others will be moved to come forward with substantial aid, librarians cannot fail to catch the inspiration and the tide of education through such means will rise high above the past and give glowing promise of the future.

This interest will take on new strength in our case because it will have behind it the prospect of a beautiful library building for a home with such improvements and conveniences as time and experience have found desirable.

With such pleasant anticipations we close this report expecting our next will emanate from our new home.

The treasurer's report will furnish you with the financial condition and assure you that we do not fail to bring our expenses within the limit of your appropriation.

The librarian's report, also made a part of this gives you such details of the work as may afford you abundant satisfaction.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

#### To the Trustees of the Nashua Public Library:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to present to you the report of the librarian for the year 1901.

During the year there have been added to the library 1271 volumes; by purchase, 926; by gift, 315; by binding periodicals, 30.

Deducting books withdrawn as unfit for circulation, and the five volumes lost during the last three years, the number now on the accession list is 21,289.

There have been 550 books rebound this year.

Files of the current daily issues of the Nashua papers have been given to the library by their publishers. These are bound and preserved for reference. All efforts have been unsuccessful in completing the file of the Nashua Telegraph. The years between those edited by Mr. Beard and the opening of the reading room are still imperfect.

From the circulating department, which was open every day, with the exception of Sundays, holidays, and the day of President McKinley's funeral, 69,873 volumes were given out, an increase of 7,756 over that of last year. The largest number any one day was 588, on February 25. The smallest 96, on August 8.

The circulation of French books this year was 1765 volumes. Even with the prospect of a new library building, in the near future, it has been necessary to add two book cases and rearrange the books, owing to the very crowded condition of the shelves.

The registration for the year has amounted to 520.

The bulletins which were published in the autumn of 1901, have been issued monthly during the year. Beside the accessions of each month, the books which have been added since the previous catalogues and bulletins have been given. Now all books of the library can be found in the printed as well as

the card catalogue. Since this was accomplished, the historical fiction, arranged by countries, has been given. Through the courtesy of the press we have been able to give the public a list of the books added each month.

The visitors in the reading room have numbered 19,245, there were 918 on the Sundays, This room has only been closed on the day of President McKinley's funeral and holidays.

The reference books are on open shelves, no record being kept of the number used. For the readers in this room 1497 volumes have been drawn from the circulating library.

Gentlemen:—I respectfully submit a report comprising the period from Jan. 1, 1900, to Dec. 31, 1901.

At the former date the following cases were pending against the city:

- 1. Parker vs. Nashua, Petition for an abatement of taxes on real estate situate on the corner of Temple and Court streets. Referred to a commissioner. Petition filed Dec. 21, 1896.
- 2. C. R. Pease Housefurnishing Co. vs. Nashua. Petitions for abatements of taxes on stock in trade and real estate situate on Pearl street. One petition referred to a commissioner.
- 3. Russell vs. Nashua. An injury to a horse from a defect in the highway on Main street.
- 4. Boucher vs. Nashua. An injury occasioned to the plaintiff and his team by falling into a sewer excavation on Main street.
- 5. Greeley vs. Nashua. An appeal from an assessment of damages for land taken in widening Buck street. Referred to a commissioner. Entered March term, 1887.

The case of Russell vs. Nashua has been settled for \$125, by agreement, without trial.

The case of Boucher vs. Nashua has been settled for \$50 less costs, by agreement, without trial.

During the year the following suits have been brought and are pending against the city.

I. C. R. Pease Housefurnishing Co. vs. Nashua. A petition for an abatement of taxes on stock in trade and real estate situate on Pearl street.

2. Renaud vs. Nashua. Claim for services alleged to have been performed at the request of the Overseer of the Poor.

3. Houle vs. Nashua. Personal injury occasioned by a collision on Tyler street and falling over an embankment.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR 1901.

To His Honor, the Mayor and the City Councils:

The Board of Health hereby submit their annual report for the year 1901.

The number of contagious diseases reported is as follows: Typhoid fever, 14; diphtheria, 126; measles, 1; smallpox, 3.

The usual number of complaints were received in regard to nusainces and attended to with promptness and in an impartial manner.

In certain localities a house to house inspection has been made which has greatly improved the sanitary condition of the same.

It is a matter of congratulation that the sanitary condition of the city as a whole is good. We have not been visited by pestilence or epidemics except in the cases of smallpox as above noted, the circumstances attending the same being so well known that we need not here enlarge upon it.

The total number of deaths from all diseases was 490 which gives the annual death rate for the year 21.75 per one thousand.

To the Honorable City Councils of the City of Nashua, N. H.:

Gentlemen:—The trustees of Woodlawn Cemetery respectfully submit the following as their annual report.

The same general plan of making the cemetery grounds present an attractive appearance has been continued during the past year and from remarks made to the superintendent by visitors, we feel that in a measure we have succeeded.

The principal improvement during the year has been the construction of a greenhouse which is heated by steam.

The growing demands of the lot owners for plants and cut flowers has made the greenhouse almost a necessity.

Some shrubbery and a few small trees have been added during the year.

The fund received for the perpetual care of lots has been closely and carefully invested.

Fifty lots have been repaired and regraded and six new lots laid down.

Twenty headstones have been reset.

Twelve new and expensive monuments have been erected during the year.

Nineteen bonds for Perpetual Care have been given for the aggregate amount of \$2,150 and eight deeds issued for lots sold

Sixty-three interments of resident adults, 29 adults from outof-town, 25 children in town, and five stillborn have been made, making the total number of interments during he year 122.

Removed to cemeteries out of town, 3.

Four soldiers have been buried, making the total number of soldiers' graves in this cemetery 257.

Records of all meetings of the board have been kept.

### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## Trustees of Edgewood Cemetery.

To the City Councils:

Herewith submitted ninth annual report of trustees of Edgewood cemetery, for the year 1901.

The usual care of the grounds has been maintained, some new lots graded and a new garden constructed and planted, avenues and paths have been repaired and kept in proper condition: owing to lack of funds but little has been done toward developement of the unimproved sections.

The trustees are pleased to report that the debt of \$1,500, assumed by themselves, for improvement in 1899, has been cancelled from the receipts, and that there are now no debts, outstanding bills, or claims of any kind, against the city or board of trustees, on account of the cemetery.

On July 1, the trustees made an exchange of a portion of the Perpetual Care Fund investments, by taking up the loan of \$2,745 to the city as per report of last year, which, with the additional sum of \$1,255 received during the year made a fund of \$4,000, and this fund was invested in City of Nashua bonds of 1901–1921, at 3 per cent. interest.

Meetings of the board have been regularly held.

Interments from Jan. 1, 1901 to Dec. 31, 1901: Adults, 35; children, 13; removals from other grounds: Adults, 3; children, 1: total burials, 53.

Four veterans of the Civil War were laid to rest in these grounds during the past year, thus making the record of

soldiers interred: One Revolutionary War, five War of 1812, two Mexican War, 66 Civil War. These graves are all properly marked, flagged, recorded and cared for.

Continued interest is shown by lot holders, in care of the grounds, the number of lots placed under care, both annual and perpetual is increasing, tending to further embellishment of the grounds.

### REPORT

OF THE

## Trustees of Suburban Cemeteries.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the Honorable City Councils:

GENTLEMEN:—The secretary of the board of trustees of Suburban Cemeteries hereby submits his fifth annual report.

### Condition of Cemeteries.

There has been a steady advance in the improvements in all the cemeteries.

In the Old South sixteen new lots have been prepared for burial purposes, which no doubt will meet all the requirements for some time. As stated in a former report, there is a pressing need of a new wall along the road and also on the north and west sides of this cemetery.

At the Evergreen cemetery, the fence along the road has been repaired, and an artistic new gate properly inscribed add much to the general appearance. Another marked improvement has been made in the grading. The Matthew Thornton Chapter of the Daughters of Revolution have this year caused a boulder to mark, as nearly as possible, the site of the Old South Church.

A lack of funds necessitates a delay in the completion of the city engineer's plans for the laying out and building up of the new part and several other desirable improvements. The trustees hope the day is near at hand when this difficulty may be overcome.

The Gilson and the Hillside cemeteries have received their usual care. And in the latter, those trees which were killed by the dry weather have been replaced by new ones.

### Interments.

During the year the interments have been made as follows: One in the Hillside cemetery, one in the Old South cemetery, three in the Evergreen cemetery.

## Resolutions and Ordinances.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

ADOPTING JOINT RULES AND FIXING TIME FOR HOLDING REGULAR MEETINGS.

That the joint rules of the City Councils for 1900 be and the same are adopted for 1901, unless otherwise ordered, and the time for holding the regular meetings shall be on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at seven o'clock and thirty minutes p. m.

Passed Jan. 1, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

That the mayor and city treasurer for the time being are hereby authorized to hire money to pay the current expenses of the several departments, and any outstanding notes, city script, certificates of stock, bonds or other evidences of debt of the city becoming due, and to give promissory notes of the city therefor.

Passed Jan. 1, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

### RELATING TO CITY CHARTER.

That the City Government view with dissatisfaction any attempt upon the part of the legislature to make any change in the city charter whereby any board or commission may be established to interfere with the duties of the City Government as they now exist; such change being opposed to a large majority of the people and we believe prejudicial to the interests of our city.

Passed Feb. 14, 1901.

### A REGULATION.

IN AMENDMENT OF AN ORDINANCE PASSED FEB. 25, 1896, "RELATING TO JUNK DEALERS."

That the ordinance passed Feb. 25, 1896, entitled "Relating to Junk Dealers" that Section 2 of the same be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

"The city shall receive a fee of fifty dollars for each license granted" so that said ordinance as amended shall read:

Section 2. The city shall receive a fee of fifty dollars for each license granted as aforesaid.

Passed Feb. 28, 1901.

### A REGULATION.

BY THE MAYOR AND ALDERMEN IN PURSUANCE OF PUBLIC STATUTES, CHAPTER 124, SECTION 2, PRESCRIBING CONDITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS AS TO LICENSES GRANTED THEREUNDER.

All persons licensed as aforesaid shall keep a record of any article or articles purchased or received, specifying the time of

receiving them, the number weight, quantity, and such other description as will identify the articles, and the name and residence of the person offering the same for sale or barter and no article or articles so purchased or received shall be sold until a period of at least one week from the date of the purchase or receipt of the the same shall have elapsed.

All persons licensed as aforesaid and dealing in old junk, old metals and second hand articles, by collecting the same in any wagon, cart, hand-cart, sled or other vehicle, shall have placed upon the outside of such wagon or vehicle, and upon each side of the same, the number of the license in plain, legible figures, of not less than three inches in size and so that the same may be distinctly seen and read: and any person owning, having the care, or driving of any of the vehicles before mentioned, for the purpose of collecting the articles aforesaid, and every person collecting the articles aforesaid without the use of said wagon or other vehicle, shall wear a badge on his hat or cap with the number of the license thereon, in brass or plated figures, of not less than one inch in size and so placed that the number may be distinctly seen and read.

The provisions of this regulation shall be incorporated into each license granted under Chap. 124 of the Public Statutes.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this regulation shall be fined not exceeding ten dollars or imprisoned not exceeding thirty days.

Passed Feb. 28, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

IN RELATION TO APPOINTING COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE ELECTRIC LIGHTING.

That a committee of five, composed of two members of the Board of Aldermen, two members of the Common Council, with the mayor, the same to be appointed by the mayor, be

constituted a committee to investigate and report costs of a municipal electric light plant for this city.

It shall also be the duty of said committee to investigate and report costs of electric lighting in other cities.

The committee to be authorized to select a clerk outside of the committee, said clerk to be paid a reasonable sum for services rendered.

Passed March 14, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

### IN REGARD TO STATE HIGHWAY.

That the public good requires that a sufficient sum of money be appropriated by the state of New Hampshire for the construction of a state highway from the Massachusetts state line to Manchester, as surveyed by the commissioners appointed for such service.

Passed March 14, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

### IN RELATION TO HUNT LIBRARY FUND.

Whereas, Mary A. Hunt, same deceased, and Mary E. Hunt of Nashua, donated to the City of Nashua the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) Sept. 6, 1892, for the erection of a public library building in memorial of the late John M. Hunt, to be located in said Nashua; and whereas, said donation was made subject to certain provisos, conditions and limitations set forth therein, to which reference is made for the particulars thereof, and whereas, by one of said conditions it is provided that the City of Nashua shall furnish a suitable lot for said building, and whereas the City of Nashua has complied with said condition: now therefore,

Be it resolved by the Board of Aldrmen and Common Council,

That the City of Nashua in compliance with the requirements of said donation, hereby authorizes and instructs the city treasurer to pay the trustees of the public library, in pursuance of the full and complete supervision, direction and control over the erection of said building vested in said trustees by the terms of the donation, such sum or sums of money, from time to time, the whole not exceeding \$50,000, as the trustees shall deem necessary to meet indebtedness incurred in the erection of the Memorial Library building; and when said sum or sums, to the full and just amount of \$50,000 shall be paid to the trustees, as certified by the auditor, then the trust and agreement with the doners shall terminate and cease and all claim upon, or liability of the City of Nashua for any further sums shall be declared fully cancelled, satisfied and discharged.

Second, That the City of Nashua will proceed to put in proper condition said Memorial library building lot, and will remove therefrom the buildings now situate, establish the grade, and perform any other necessary preparatory work, at the earliest practical date and turn said lot over to the trustees of the public library for the purpose aforesaid.

Passed March 28, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

### MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR 1901.

That in accordance with the vote of the City Councils in joint convention assembled this day, the following sums are hereby appropriated for the various departments:

### AN ORDINANCE.

### GOVERNING PAWNBROKERS.

Section. 1. No person shall carry on the business of pawnbroker in this city unless a license therefor is duly issued by the Board of Aldermen; and the Board of Aldermen shall license each applicant complying with the fifth section of this ordidance.

- Sec. 2. Every person licensed as aforesaid shall keep a book at his place of business, at which he shall enter at the time of receiving the same, a minute description of any article left for pawn, particularly mentioning any prominent or descriptive marks on the same, with the name, age and residence, giving the street and number when possible of the person from whom he received it, noting also the day and hour and the amount paid thereon: and the book and the articles left for pawn shall at all times be open to the inspection of the police officers of the city.
- Sec. 3. No pawnbroker shall, directly or indirectly, receive any article in pawn of any minor or apprentice, knowing or having reasonable cause to believe him to be such, without the consent in writing of the parent or guardian of such minor or apprentice, and no article received in pawn shall be sold until at least two weeks after the expiration of the time for which the same was pawned or pledged.
- Sec. 4. All licenses granted under this ordinance shall designate the place where the person licensed shall carry on the business, and he shall not carry on the business at any other place within the city.

Sec. 5. The fee for a license under this ordinance shall be twenty dollars and every person licensed as pawnbroker shall execute a bond to the city in the sum of one hundred dollars conditioned that the said licensed person will in every particular conform to the requirements of this ordinance.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

IN RELATION TO BUILDINGS ON HUNT LIBRARY SITE.

Section 1. That the committee on lands and buildings be and hereby is authorized and empowered to sell and dispose of the buildings now situate on the Hunt Memorial site, belonging to the City of Nashua, at public or private sale, together or in parcels as may be deemed most advantageous to the city, and the proceeds of such sale or sales be placed with the city treasurer.

Sec. 2. That the committee on lands and buildings be and hereby is authorized to prepare said lot and put the same into suitable condition at such grade as may be given by the city engineer and when so prepared turn the same over to the trustees of the public library.

Passed April 11, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION

AUTHORISING THE ISSUE OF BONDS TO THE AMOUNT OF SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$75,000) TO RE-FUND AN EQUAL PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF BONDS MATURING JULY 1, 1901 AND ISSUED AND BEARING DATE OF JULY 1, 1876.

The mayor and city treasurer are hereby authorized to issue and the treasurer to sell, in such manner as the committee on

accounts and fluance may direct, bonds of the City of Nashua in the aggregate principal sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), said bonds to be issued by virtue of and in pursuance of the provisions of the Municipal Bond Act of 1895; also by virtue of an act of 1901, authorizing the city to issue Refunding Bonds to bear date of July 1, 1901; to be in denomination of 100-500 and one thousand dollars each, with interest coupons attached, both principal and interest payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness, at the office of the city treasurer in Nashua, or at the National Bank of the Commonwealth, Boston, Mass.; to be payable to the bearer; to mature July 1, 1921; to bear interest at the rate of three per cent. (3%) per annum, interest payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July of each year; and said bonds shall be signed by the mayor and countersigned by the city treasurer under the city seal. The proceeds of said bonds shall be applied to refunding an equal principal amount of bonds maturing July 1, 1901, and issued July 1, 1876.

IN REGARD TO APPROPRIATION FOR BAND CONCERTS.

That the expenditure of appropriation for band concerts for 1901 be given to the committee on accounts and finance.

That the second regular meeting of the city government be omitted during the months of June, July, August and September, 1901.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

IN RELATION TO THE TIME FOR THE PAYMENT OF POLL  ${\tt TAXES}.$ 

That the time for the payment of poll taxes in the City of Nashua shall be on or before Sept. 1, 1901, and if such tax shall then be unpaid the collector is directed to proceed in the collection of the same according to Sec. 19, Chap. 60 of the Public Statutes of the State of New Hampshire.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

EXEMPTING THE IMPROVED PAPER MACHINE COMPANY FROM TAXATION FOR A TERM OF TEN YEARS.

That the Improved Paper Machine Company be exempt from taxation for a period of ten years, commencing the first day of April, 1902, on the building, engine, boiler, machinery, stock on hand, stock in process of manufacture and manufactured goods belonging to the Improved Paper Machine Company.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

EXEMPTING FROM TAXATION PROCTOR BROS. & CO'S NEW MANUFACTURING ESTABLISHMENT WHEN CONSTRUCTED.

That the Proctor Bros & Co. are hereby exempt from taxation for the term of ten years from March 31, 1902 on all buildings, machinery and stock used by them in conducting their cooperage and manufacturing business to be erected and maintained on their land situate in said Nashua and bounded on the north by Hollis street, on the east by land of the White Mountain Freezer Company, on the south by land of the Acton railroad, so called, on the west by Marshall street.

The exemption shall not apply to any stock said Proctor Bros & Co. may carry in conducting a retail lumber business. Passed Aug. 29, 1961.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

AUTHORIZING THE COMMITTEE ON LANDS AND BUILDINGS TO SELL AND CONVEY THE PEST HOUSE.

The committee on lands and buildings are authorized and empowered to sell in behalf of the City of Nashua, property belonging to the same, situated at No. 41 Broad street and known as the pest house, at public or private sale as may be deemed most advantageous to the city; and said committee are authorized and empowered to make and execute a conveyance thereof, and generally to do such and every necessary act in pursuance of said sale and conveyance.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION.

IN RELATION TO THE DEATH OF PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

That the City Councils of Nashua have heard with profound sorrow the announcement of the death of Hon. William Mc-Kinley, late president of the United States of America.

That by his death the country has sustained an irreparable loss.

He won distinction, honorable mention and promotion as a soldier in the Civil War. He was a legislator of rare ability, a gifted orator, a tribune of the people, whose rights he ever defended with unselfish devotion, and the unbounded confidence in them which he at all times displayed cost him, finally, his life, and the nation its chief executive.

A man of great, good judgment and vast experience in national affairs, never has a chief executive of this republic been confronted with more serious questions than our late president, yet in every instance he approached the solution of such national problems with the laudable ambition to promote the best interest of all classes of our people. To the discharge of his public duties he gave the resources of a mind richly endowed by nature with rare intellectual gifts. Cautious, he seldom made a mistake; honest, he always looked to the advancement of the general welfare: patriotic, he gave the best of his mind and body to the protection and advancement of the interests of the country he loved so well. His whole career, as a private citizen, soldier, statesman, stamps him as one of the highest types of American citizenship.

The people of our city, state and nation will ever reverence his name and treasure the memory of his virtues. We extend to his devoted wife and the members of his family our sincere sympathy in the great loss which they have sustained.

Be it further resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the grief stricken widow; that the same be published in the Nashua Daily Telegraph and Nashua Press; and that they be spread upon the records of the City Councils of our city.

Whereas, City Clerk A. A. Hall was duly notified, Oct. 25, 1901, to appear before the City Councils at their meeting on Nov. 14, 1901, and show cause why he should not be removed from the office of city clerk for the neglect of duty, and

Whereas, the said city clerk has not appeared before said meeting to show cause why he should not be removed as aforesaid, and

Whereas, it is further reported by said committee that said City Clerk A. A. Hall unlawfully appropriated money belonging to the City of Nashua,

Now therefore it is resolved, that A. A. Hall be and hereby is removed from the office of city clerk of Nashua, for neglect of duty and the unlawful appropriation of money belonging to the City of Nashua.

The city clerk within ten days after assuming office shall give bonds with sureties to be approved by the city councils, in the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), for the faithful discharge of the duties of the office.

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Board of Education:

I herewith submit my ninth annual report, the thirty-fifth of its series.

During the past year the schools have run with very little friction, the attendance has been well sustained, little time has been lost on account of stormy weather or for other reasons, and steady progress has been maintained by the pupils in the several schools.

One point of great satisfaction to me has been the comparatively few differences which have arisen between the parents and the teachers. There seems to be an unusually good understanding between the home and the school. This is due in part, I believe, to the care with which the teachers keep the parents informed of the deportment of their children in school, but more particularly it is due to the fact that our teachers as a body are efficient and painstaking. The constantly increasing number of visits, 1,254 in 1901, which the parents make to the schools, indicate a more thoughtful interest in the welfare of the pupils and a desire to more thoroughly understand the conditions which surround their children while in the schoolroom.

This era of good feeling, if I may so express it, between pupils, teachers and parents is to my mind one of the most commendable features in our school system.

### HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

The one subject of paramount importance to be considered by the Board of Education is the erection of a new High school building. It was with the greatest difficulty that the class entering last fall was accommodated. Every indication seems to point to a larger entering class next year than we have had ever in the history of the school. If such should prove the case it will be impossible to provide for them with our present accommodations.

I believe that the consideration of this matter should not be longer delayed by the Board of Education. The facts are all before you. The present facilities in the High school may be perfectly understood by anyone upon examination. That there are 120 pupils in our nineth grades to enter the High school next year is a fact and must be reckoned as such.

I would respectfully urge upon each member of the Board the desirability of satisfying himself that we are in urgent need of a new High school building, and when each member has learned that this condition is a fact, I believe that the Board as a whole should meet the city government and decide upon some form of relief. I am convinced that the conditions need only to be stated to the honorable gentlemen of the city government, in order to have them take some definite action looking toward the erection of a new High school building.

### SUBURBAN SCHOOLS.

If the suburban schools are to be retained in their present form, it seems to me only right and just that the teachers who have charge of them should be placed on the same level, so far as salaries are concerned, with the teachers in the city. To be sure the classes are small, but nevertheless, in these small classes pupils may be found from the first year to the High school. This necessitates on the part of the teacher a wider knowledge of subjects and the preparation of a much greater number of lessons than develops upon the teachers in our graded schools. It is my opinion that upon the whole the work of a teacher in a suburban school is fully as arduous and demands as high a grade of professional ability as does any of the schools in the city.

### BUSINESS COURSE IN THE HIGH SCHOOL.

In relation to the matter of introducing a thorough business course in our High school, I would respectfully call your attention to the following paragraph, selected from the report of the Commissioner of Education, of the plan in New York City for the Commercial High Schools.

"The first two years shall be in direct continuation of the work of the grammar schools or upper grades and then proceed along special lines which are likely to be directly useful in mercantile and commercial life. At the same time it is intended that these specialized schools shall not be merely technical and commercial like the old fashioned 'business college' but more broadly civic and educative. Instead of confining the student's attention to literary, scientific, or classical fields, the chosen subjects of specialized knowledge are taken from civic life and the world and politics and economics. Stress is laid upon the science of government, the laws of trade, economic and commercial history, commercial geography, commerce itself, statistics, modern language, forms of foreign correspondence and the progress of other countries as described by our consular reports. Here is a vast body of most interesting and concretely useful knowledge about the world in which America is actually living and moving. The point is that 'things as they are' are worth studying in themselves and possess a positive cultural value."

The above quotation expresses the ideal method of developing a business department in our High schools. The broader training of the young men and women in the actual duties of citizenship should go hand in hand with the tools of this training, namely: Stenography, type-writing, commercial arithmetic and book-keeping.

### SCHOOL LIBRARIES.

In my previous reports I have often spoken of the desirability of school libraries for the purpose of cultivating in a child an interest in good literature. Many towns and cities have adopted this idea and have found it exceedingly helpful.

A report presented by Miss Clarissa Newcomb, who has charge of the libraries in the schools of Denver, Colo., gives in detail one of the most comprehensive and feasible plans for adapting collections of good books for the use of school children. Miss Newcomb says in part, "To one who knows how to use books a well selected library is one of the most valuable means of education. The training of children in the choice and use of books is therefore an important subject for all teachers. An early beginning is necessary or else the great majority—those who leave school before the higher grades are reached—wholly escape this training.

But how shall this training be given, is the question. How shall we bring the child in touch with good books? We have found that a collection of 50 books in a room, chosen with reference to the age and ability of the pupils in that room, is the most satisfactory means of forming a taste for good literature. We have tried other methods, the central library, the library in the principal's office, and the plan of moving books from one room to another.

Of all these the room library, that is, a certain number of books which are the permanent property of the room, has proved the best.

Beginning with the second grade, each room in the district has its own collection of books which remain there from year to year. As the children go from grade to grade, they are each year brought in contact with another set of books new to them. When not in use these books are on a table or shelves accessible to the children at all times. The pupil thus becomes acquainted with the books and feels a personal pride of ownership. He becomes interested in reading, and familiar with his own small library.

Fewer disappointments occur than where the collection is larger; hence fewer obstacles are presented in the formation of a love for reading. The range of choice is narrowed and the

teacher feels the responsibility of directing the children's reading, for the library is but another tool with which to mould the character of her pupils. All become readers if the teacher is skillful and tactful and enters sufficiently into child life to appeal to the pupils. The recitations are made brighter and good books go into the homes and the children are kept from the streets.

Each book is selected not alone because of its intrinsic literary value, but also because it has proved interesting to several children of like age and grade. No mistakes have been made when the selection of books has been left to the children. They know what they enjoy. The one aim is to give children a love for good literature, for when they have acquired that we need have no fear their education will stop when they leave school."

I have taken this quotation somewhat at length for I believe it touches upon a vital question. There is no one point which so clearly differentiates the educated man from the uneducated as the character of his reading matter. The very fibre of our intellects is changed and moulded by that which we read. How essential it is then that the children should be led from the very first to form a taste for wholesome literature. It is my opinion that this can be done in no better way than by school libraries.

In this same connection I would also urge the carrying of the school library idea into our school districts. For here it will prove particularly valuable, since it is almost impossible for the children in these outlying districts to have access even to the city library. In these district schools strong cases could be provided and when filled with well chosen books suited to the ages of the children they might be taken from school to school, thus bringing good literature into homes which could otherwise obtain it only with great effort.

In closing this report I would urge upon the consideration of the Board of Education a point which is often overlooked, namely—the number of children for whom this Board is called upon to provide an education. Members of school boards are inclined to consider, and naturally so, the expenditures of schools, the salary lists, the bills for supplies, the bills for repairs, etc., until they unconsciously begin to ask, "What are we getting for the money expended?" The only way to obtain an adequate idea of the other side of the question is to make a thorough and conscientious round of visits to all the schools. When this has been done and the true proportions of the size of a city school system, whose total enrollment numbers 3,875 pupils, have been realized, a better understanding is obtained of the results accomplished by the expenditure of the money.

I wish to express my appreciation of the uniform support and courtesy of the Board of Education.

To Mr. James H. Fassett, Superintendent of Schools:

DEAR SIR:—This, my fifth annual report of the department of music in the public schools of Nashua, comes at the close of a most gratifying year as to results, during my tenure of office.

There has been a healthy enthusiasm along the lines of song—singing, sight singing and improvements in tone quality.

The written work introduced two years ago has also shown marked improvements this year as well as written tests.

The material in use is practically the same as that used the past four years with the exception of the seventh grades, where the Fifth Reader of the Educational Music Course has been introduced to replace the Fourth Reader of the National Course.

The Kindergartens are doing excellent work in the line of singing, and the quality of songs taught cannot be excelled.

The object of our High school music is to make the pupils who elect this study acquainted with the best works in choral music. To this end standard compositions within the range of difficulty of a young chorus are taken for study and mastered.

The works under study in this school at the present time are Charles Gounod's "Gallia" and Max Bruch's "Fair Ellen," together with part-songs.

The annual High school concert last May brought credit to every one who took part in it. The chorus numbers were those studied by the choral class during the year. These were Alfred R. Gaul's "Ruth" a cantata for chorus and soloists, and a part song "Forget-me not," by Giese. The soloists assisting were Mrs. Frederic L. Martin, soprano; Miss Ada Campbell Hussey, contralto; Mr. Frederic L. Martin, bass, all of Boston, and Miss Mabelle Griswold, contralto, class of 1902, N. H. S., in the concerted numbers. To Miss Anna L. Melendy, the efficient pianist, is due a large share of the credit for this eminently successful concert.

The teachers in our schools are doing good work, and a great amount of it. Their enthusiasm and good will has been a source of pleasure and encouragement to the supervisor, and for this he is sincerely grateful.

I feel very grateful to you, Mr. Superintendent, and to the committee on music, as well as to the Board of Education, for support accorded me.

# REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF DRAWING.

James H. Fassett, Superintendent of Schools:

DEAR SIR:—The course of drawing in the grammar schools has been improved by several additions this year. Mechanical drawing is being taught in both the eighth and ninth grades. Excellent drawing boards including T squares and triangles have been provided, and the pupils are learning to make simple working drawings of common objects. Such geometric problems as they need to do the work are taught, and the principles of projection and development are explained.

The study of famous pictures is being carried on in every grade. Perry pictures have been provided and before a pupil leaves the ninth grade he will have an opportunity to see and study copies of the great Italian, Dutch, Flemish, French, Spanish, and English masterpieces.

In the high school a third class, in which the principles of design are taught, has been added for those who have studied drawing two years.

I should like to mention here the food fair which was held by the teachers in November to raise money for school room decorations, and to thank all who worked heartily and enthusiastically to make the undertaking a success.

The amount earned was \$230.75. This was divided among the teachers and is being spent for pictures and plaster casts.

If we are to continue to raise money for schoolroom decorations and hope to accomplish anything of asthetic worth it will be necessary sooner or later to plan the decoration of each building with some unity of idea. The temptation to buy pictures at random will have to be resisted, and it will have to be appreciated that a beautiful room must have walls and win-

dow shades of harmonious tints, and a few well chosen pictures framed in uniform frames.

The tinting of the walls of the Amherst street, Main street and Mt. Pleasant schoolhouses by the city during the Christmas vacation has helped us to realize this ideal and I would like to say, in closing, for myself and the teachers that we fully appreciate the kindness of the Board of Education and thank them for cooperating with us in this work.
