TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Richmond, N.H. in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Richmond, on Tuesday, the 6th day of March, next at 7:30 P.M. to act upon the following subjects:

(1.) To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

(2.) To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. *(Note: See explanatory Note at end of Warrant)

(3.) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,300.00 from monies received under the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Av Act of 1972 (Revenue Sharing) for the following purposes:

Police Work--\$3,000.00
Fire Department--\$1,000.00
Library Building Fund--\$1,000.00
Recreation Committee--\$300.00

(4) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for highways and bridges, or take any action thereon.

(5.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for winter maintenance on highways, or take any action thereon.

(6.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Cemeteries, or take any action thereon.

(7.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Library, or take any action thereon.

(8.) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the Fire Department, or take any action thereon.

(9.) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the Police Department, or take any action thereon.

(10.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Old Age Assistance, or take any action thereon.

(11.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of Town Poor, or take any action thereon.

(12.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital, or take any action thereon.

(13.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$576.44, the State to contribute \$3,842.91 for the TRA Program.

(14.) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the Recreation Committee, or take any action thereon.

(15.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum \$600.00 payable to the Winchester District Nursing Association, Inc. to make their services available to Richmond, or take any action thereon.

(16.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Civil Defense, or take any action thereon.

(17.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Zoning and Planning, or take any action thereon.

(18.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$138.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action thereon.

(19.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Meadowood County Fire Department, or take any action thereon.

(20.) To see if the Town will vote the sum of \$223.72 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Regional Planning Commission.

(21.) To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Richmond Conservation Commission a gift of a 5.2 acre tract of land lying north of Rte. 119 and west of the Ralph Whitney Memorial Grounds, the same being all of the remainder of the Sheperdson Lot, so-called, lying north of Rte 119 in Richmond. As much of this land as is necessary to be used for additions to the Library and the remainder to be managed by the Richmond Conservation Commission for the benefit

of the public.

(22.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to help support the Cheshire County Humane Society.

(23.) To see if the Town will Vote to adopt as a temporary ordinance the Following:

“Pending completion of a Medium Intensity Soil Survey by the United States Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service and its acceptance by the Town, and the adoption by the Planning Board shall be empowered for a period of two (2) years to disapprove without other cause any application for subdivision that the Planning Board feels in its discretion ill not fit into the projected Master Plan except that an application for minor subdivision into not more than four (4) lots shall not be disapproved
(Petition by the Planning Board)

(24.) To vote by ballot to amend the Richmond Zoning Ordinance in accordance with the Statutes of the State of New Hampshire.

(25.) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$115.00 for the use of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

(26.) To see if the Town will vote to pass the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Town of Richmond goes on record as requesting the State of New Hampshire to allow Sandy Pond to return to its natural state and to cease recalculation.

(27.) To see if the Town will vote to amend the Snowmobile Ordinance passed on March 7, 1972 by adding the following sentence:

“These restrictions shall also apply to all off-highway Recreational Vehicles.”

(28.) To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two-percent on Property Taxes paid in full within 30 days of invoice.

(29.) To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for use of the Town, in anticipation of Taxes.

(30.) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Deeded Property.

(31.) To hear the reports of Agents, Committees, etc.

heretofore chosen and to take any action thereon.

(32.) To take any action that may legally come before the meeting.

*Note: Town Charges consist of Town Officer's Salaries, Town Officer's Expenses, Election and Registration, Expense of Town Hall and Other Buildings, Damage and Legal Expense, Vital Statistics, County Tax, Street Lighting, Dump Rental, Interest on Long Term and Temporary Loans and Insurance.

TOWN MEETING

TUESDAY, MARCH 7, 1972

- (1) The Town Officers for the year ensuing were elected by secret ballot.
- (2) The amendments to the Richmond Zoning Ordinance in accordance with the statutes of the State of New Hampshire were voted on by secret ballot.
- (3) The Town voted 40 to 0 to raise the sum of \$16,470 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- (4) The town voted 62 to 0 to raise \$6,000 and appropriate \$11,000 for summer maintenance for the bridges and highways.
- (5) The Town voted by a vote of 63 to 0 to raise \$6,000 and to appropriate \$8,000 for winter maintenance of the Town's highways.
- (6) By a vote of 47 to 15 the Town voted to raise and appropriate \$400 for the maintenance of cemeteries.
- (7) The Town voted 72 to 0 to raise and appropriate \$750 (\$350 for salaries, \$400 for books) for the maintenance of the Library.
- (8) The Town voted 78 to 0 to raise and appropriate \$900 for the Fire Department.
- (9) The Town voted 62 to 2 to raise and appropriate \$2,500 for Police Work.
- (10) By a vote of 62 to 0 the Town voted to raise and appropriate \$1,200 for Old Age Assistance.
At this point, the Town voted to dispense with the counting of hands on a vote, voting rather by voice.
- (11) The Town voted to raise no money for care of the Town Poor.
- (12) The Town approved the sum of \$151 to be raised and appropriated for the Elliot Community Hospital.
- (13) The Town voted by secret ballot whether or not to discontinue the election of an Auditor on the Town Ballot.
- (14) The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$582.45, the State to contribute \$3,883.00 for the TRA Program.
- (15) The Town approved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the Recreation Committee.
- (16) The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$125 for the Blister Rust Program.

- (17) The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 payable to the Winchester District Nursing Association, Inc. to make their services available to Richmond.
- (18) The Town approved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for Civil Defense.
- (19) The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$200 for Zoning and Planning.
- (20) The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$131 for the Monadnock Region Association.
- (21) The town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Meadowood County Fire Department.
- (22) The Town voted the sum of \$223.72 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Regional Planning Commission.
- (23) The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$250 to add to the Trust Fund for the purpose of building an addition to the Library.
- (24) The Town voted to adopt the following ordinance:
The displaying of exterior signs within the Town of Richmond, New Hampshire shall be limited to the following:
 - (a) Town, State and Federal highway directional and regulatory signs.
 - (b) Signs designating areas of historic significance.
 - (c) Signs relating to the sale or lease of premises.
 - (d) Signs relating to the profession or home occupation of occupant.
 - (e) Signs indicating the sale of goods or products sold on the premises.
 - (f) Property restriction signs.
 - (g) Identification and directional signs for residences, businesses and public buildings.
 - (h) Street, road and highway identification signs.
 - (i) Political signs during campaigns on private property only and only with the written consent of the owner, which shall be filed with the Board of Selectmen prior to the displaying of such signs by the party securing the written permission and said signs shall be removed not later than two weeks after the pertinent election or voting day by the party securing the written permission.
 - (j) Signs not falling within any of the provisions of (a) through (i) shall be prohibited and in violation of this ordinance.

(k) In no case shall any sign or group of signs exceed twenty-five square feet in area.

Anyone found in violation of this ordinance shall be fined \$10.00 and costs for each offense for each day in violation thereof and shall be held responsible for the removal of such sign(s) in violation and such removal shall be at the expense of the violator.

- (25) The Town voted by secret ballot whether or not to authorize the Selectmen to appoint the Highway Agent.
- (26) The Town voted to affirm that the Martin Road is open and subject to maintenance as far as the Wm. Suderman residence.
- (27) The Town voted against the proposal to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to establish a trust fund for the purpose of providing the interest each year as an award to the High School Senior who has made the greatest civic contribution to the Town, as determined by the Selectmen.
- (28) The Town passed over the Article to authorize the Selectmen to designate the names of streets in accordance with Chapter 251, Sections 1, 2 and 3 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated.
- (29) The Town voted to rescind the motion adopted at last Town Meeting regarding the use of herbicides in Town.
- (30) The Town voted to adopt the following ordinance: No herbicide or pesticide shall be used in the Town of Richmond along public rights of ways, easements and water courses, except as may be approved by the Richmond Conservation Commission.
- (31) The Town refused to adopt the following ordinance: It shall be illegal for any person to hunt upon the land of another without the written consent of the property owner. Any person violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of \$10.00 and costs.
- (32) The Town voted against accepting all existing roads in the tract known as the Morgan Reserve effective as soon as the Selectmen certify that these roads are completed to the standards set down by the Selectmen and the Planning Board.
- (33) The Town voted to designate all roads in Richmond other than Routes 32 and 119 as Scenic Roads.
- (34) The Town voted to place the following roads on Gates and Bars, if they have not already been discontinued. A map showing these roads shall be included with the

minutes of the Town Meeting. The Chief of Police shall be responsible for the Gates and bars.

- (a) The Monument Road from the John W. Hewel residence to the Greenwoods Road.
 - (b) The Attleboro Mt. Road from the Chapman Place to the Taylor Place.
 - (c) The Martin Road from the Wm. Suderman residence to the Royalston Town line.
 - (d) The Boyce Brook Road from the Martin Road to the Fitzwilliam Town line.
 - (e) The Old Richmond-Winchester Turnpike from the Mark A. Fusco residence to the Winchester Town line.
 - (f) The road from Des Jardines to Grace Hurd Place thence easterly to Morgan Reserve and northerly to Ljimtainen residence.
 - (g) The road from Cory corner to the Benson burying ground.
 - (h) The Pudding Hill Road from Whipple Hill road to the Winchester Town line.
 - (i) The Perry Road to the Swanzey line.
 - (j) The Lorrie Howard Road from intersection with Taylor Hill Road to its intersection with Attleboro Mt. Road.
 - (k) The Bowker Road, beginning with intersection of road to Barrus Cemetery going southerly to its intersection with Whipple Hill Road.
 - (l) The road from the Benson burying ground northerly to the intersection of the Activity Road. This road should be marked on the attached map.
- (35) The Town voted to raise and appropriate \$600 to purchase a new portable radio for the Fire Department.
- (36) The Town defeated the proposal to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a new heating system for the Town Hall.
As an expression of opinion, it was polled 35 to 26 in favor of holding Town Meeting at the Veteran's Hall next year.
- (37) The Town voted to give the Fire Department the \$140 proceeds from the sale of the 1937 Chevrolet Truck.
- (38) It was voted by secret ballot "to take the sense of the qualified voters whether the Amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved."
- (39) The Town voted to accept land in front of the Town

Hall to the black top road as a gift from Herbert and Rufaye Blackwell.

- (40) The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,650.00 to be used by the Richmond Conservation Commission to obtain a Medium Intensity Soil Survey of the Town of Richmond and three interpretative maps for Homesite Location Limitation, Sewerage Disposal Limitation and a Wetlands Soil Survey, with the understanding that the United States Soil Conservation Service, through the Cheshire County Soil Conservation Office will provide \$3,740.00 in matching funds and that the Ford Foundation will provide \$2,400.00 in matching funds.
- (41) The Town voted to accept \$200.00 in trust for the Carl E. Johnson Cemetery Lot, located in Middletown Cemetery, the income to be used for perpetual care and maintenance of the same, and known as the Carl E. Johnson Trust Fund.
- (42) The Town voted to increase the size of the Richmond Conservation Commission from three members to five members and to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one new member to serve for a period of three years and one for a period of two years.
- (43) The Town voted to return the unexpended balance of the Special Appropriations of the North Richmond Bridge to the General Fund.
- (44) The Town voted "to compel the Selectmen of the Town to conduct an assessment of all properties contained within the Town for 1972. The assessment may be performed in any manner deemed most expedient by the Selectmen, but must include a uniform, objective format, and on the site inspection."
- (45) The Town voted to empower the Selectmen to appoint a three (3) member Police Advisory Board to have such duties with regard to the operation of the Police Department as they may be given by the Selectmen.
- (46) The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$6,500 to be used for the purchase of the Braley Property adjacent to the Town Beach, in order to expand the beach, and to appropriate the same.
- (47) By a vote of 36 to 26 the Town voted to accept the following ordinances: It shall be illegal for any person to operate a snowmobile on the property of another without the written consent of the property owner. Nor shall any snowmobile be operated within the Town Limits between the hours of ten o'clock in the

evening and seven o'clock in the morning. Any person violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of ten dollars (\$10.00) and costs per offense.

- (48) The Town opposed prohibiting the use of salt and similar chemicals on the highways within the Town except for dangerous intersections and extreme road conditions as designated by the Selectmen or Road Agent.
- (49) The Town voted 29 to 20 to adopt the following ordinance: "Any dog or dogs within the limits of the Town of Richmond shall be muzzled or restrained from running at large during the months of January, February, March and April in each year and the Selectmen may issue their warrant to one or more of the Police Officers or Constables of the Town to kill all dogs found unmuzzled or running at large contrary to this ordinance."
- (50) The Town voted to pass over increasing the salaries paid to the Board of Selectmen from the present \$450 annually for each member to the following.
\$600 to any member for the 1st year of his 1st term.
\$800. to any member serving his second initial year.
\$1,000.00 annually to each member serving his third year and for each successive year, and \$100.00 additional for the year to that member serving as Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.
- (51) The Town voted to allow a discount of 2% on property taxes paid in full within 30 days of invoice.
- (52) The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money for use of the Town, in anticipation of taxes.
- (53) The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Deeded property.
- (54) The Town heard the report from the Board of Adjustment as read by Mr. Harry Lord. The Town approved the Board of Adjustment's report as read and the reports by various agents, Committees, etc., as shown in the Town Report.
- (55) The Town voted on the following Resolution to be sent to the State of New Hampshire: The Town of Richmond, New Hampshire requests suitable measures be taken to restore as far as possible, Sandy Pond in Richmond, New Hampshire, to the natural balance of native fish species such as existed before the Pond was "reclaimed" the first time.

At 1:05 a. m. Wednesday, March 8, 1972, the Town of Richmond voted to adjourn the 1972 Town Meeting.

The Auditors appointed by your Board have attended to that part of their duty and desire to make herewith their report of an Audit and Examination of the Accounts and records of the Town of Richmond, New Hampshire, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972.

The Financial statements as listed hereafter are to be included as part of our report, however, only this letter of transmittal need be published in your annual report of Town Officers.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

The accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, and Trustee of Trust Funds, are included in our examination and audit.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. The Comparative Balance sheets show an increase in the net debt of The Town in the amount of \$557.76.
2. The Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures shows a net unexpended balance of appropriations in the amount of \$2,645.73.
3. The Statement of Estimated and Actual revenues shows a net revenue surplus in the amount of \$2,812.59.
4. The Town has a net Budget surplus for the fiscal year of 1972 in the amount of \$5,458.32.
5. The summaries of the accounts of the Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, and Trustee of Trust Funds are also included.
6. Summary of Long Term Indebtedness.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The Audit procedure included comparing of vouchers and cancelled checks with supporting invoices and payrolls, as well as entries of record. Receipts were verified insofar as possible and totals of all receipts and expenditures were verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled Bank balances made from Statements obtained from the depository Banks. Uncollected taxes were verified by mailing notices to a majority of the delinquent tax payers, as indicated on the Tax Collector's records.

CERTIFICATION OF AUDIT

This is to certify that we have examined and audited the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, and Trustee of Trust Funds of the Town of Richmond, New Hampshire, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1972, and have found them in excellent order, and to the best of our knowledge and belief the financial statements and summaries reflect the true financial condition of the town of Richmond for the period under review.

The town beach was checked at least once a day in summer months. All complaints were investigated and all property at the pond was checked periodically, sometimes on snowshoes.

I have patrolled all town areas at least an average of 5 times a week. We have had one new Special officer added to the force, Walter Bradshaw of the Whipple Hill area.

We had to cut down patrolling last year due to the Police Budget. We put in for \$2800 and got \$2500. We were about \$500 over budget. We want \$300 for 1973 as we have equipment to buy and are asking for \$2.00 per hour for all men on duty.

REPORT OF FIRE CHIEF

I hereby submit my report to the Selectmen and citizens of Richmond for the year ending December 31, 1972.

The year of 1972, we were very fortunate that we had only a car fire and one partition fire which did not amount to anything.

We were called out on one Mutual Aid call to Fitzwilliam for cover while they were in Winchendon, Massachusetts, to a building fire.

The company has purchased a few more coats and hats from the donations of the firemen.

We have also purchased two new portable radios. The town paid for one of these and the fire department the other.

Our old portable pump has not been in running order since last fall. We have decided it was time to invest in a new one. It should arrive about the middle of February, 1973.

The company turned over the third payment of \$500.00 to the town that they agreed to pay on the new fire truck.

At this time I would like to thank everyone who worked on trucks when needed and especially want to thank Meadowood and surrounding towns of Swanzey, Winchester, Fitzwilliam for help through Mutual Aid.

Report of the Cemetery Committee

To the Board of Selectmen:

Your Cemetery Committee has made considerable progress on the Earl R. Howard Cemetery Extension this year, and we, the members of the Committee, report the following projects as being completed:

1. At no cost to the Town, we obtained 125 arbor vitae shrubs, which we set out on the south side of the area for a boundary barrier. These were obtained from the New Hampshire State Nursery at Boscawen through the Cooperative Extension Service and the State Forestry Department.

2. The lots have been laid out and roads have been put in by removing the top soil, which was stock piled for composting on the west side of the area, and all roads were graveled up to the grade of the lots. The lots were laid out essentially the same as the original plan except, that the two-body lots were changed from the south side to the north side, and the three-body lots were put on the south side because of the stone wall which separates the original cemetery from the extension.

The work was done by Leonard Lawrence at a cost of \$262.75. The crushed gravel was purchased from the Town for \$172.80, making a total of \$435.55.

We have a balance of \$978.95 left of our appropriation with which we hope to be able to straighten up the wall and entrance on Route 32, reseed any areas that need it, and get our lot markers installed.

We would greatly appreciate it if anyone with a knowledge of stone masonry would be willing to supervise this project because we have been unable to get a price on the stone work that we can possibly afford.

Report of the Richmond Conservation Commission

To the Board of Selectmen:

As required by statute and for the information of the citizens of Richmond, the Richmond Conservation Commission hereby presents the following report of its activities for 1972.

In compliance with the favorable action by the 1972 Annual Town Meeting, the Selectmen appointed two new members, Jeffrey Taylor, who is a practical conservationist and well versed in forestry practices and natural resources, and William Suderman, who is also a conservationist and can work wonders with his cameras. Norman Tandy was reappointed for three years.

We have had a very busy and, we hope, productive year. Some of our projected plans were accomplished and some remain to be fulfilled in 1973.

1. We have held open meetings, either regular or joint meetings with Commissions in neighboring town, every month, with various special meetings and work sessions.

2. We attended promotional meetings in Troy and Fitzwilliam to help increase interest in establishing Commissions in those towns, and both towns voted favorably to the proposal. An organizational meeting was held in Fitzwilliam to assist in establishing a program of action.

3. We have held two joint meetings with Winchester on the subject of waste disposal, one with Fitzwilliam, and a promotional meeting with Rindge to inspire activity in their Commission.

4. Two members attended the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire State Association of Conservation Commissions in Conway, and Harry Bennett, Chairman of the Richmond Commission, was elected President of the State Association.

5. We were finally successful in getting our Ford Foundation Grant of \$2400 approved for our Soil Survey, and we have certification from the Cheshire County Soil Conservation Service that the field work will be done in the spring and summer of 1973. The \$2400 from the Ford Foundation and your \$1650 appropriation of 1972 are in a special account at interest in the Cheshire National Bank.

6. We performed six more acres of Timber Stand Improvement work in the Town Forest under the REAP, a Federally sponsored program.

7. The Commission sponsored a boy to attend the Conservation Camp at Spruce Pond in the Bear Brook State Reservation. Of the twelve young people who were eligible to go from Richmond, only two applied. Peter Tandy was chosen to go as he was the only one who had not attended a camp previously.

8. The Commission sponsored an essay contest through the Mondanock Regional High School District on the topic of "What Conservation Can Mean to Richmond." The contest was open to all high school students from Richmond. The chairman of the school board served as judge with two other board members of his choosing giving assistance. Kristin Tandy won \$25, Candice Mattson \$10, and Toivo Liimentainen \$5. A generous contribution from a lady who wished to remain anonymous made this possible.

9. We manned a promotional booth again this year at the Firemen's July Barbecue, and we dispensed information and conservation bulletins.

10. We obtained rosebushes, white birch and sugar maple seedlings from the State Nursery at Boscawen, and these were planted by members of the community on the Common and near the Library. About seventy spruce and scotch pine seedlings were planted by the Commission in the Town Forest.

11. By concerted effort, the Commission obtained enough funds to purchase from Emily B. Whitney the balance of the Shepardson Lot of 5.2 acres lying north of Route 119, and west of the Ralph Whitney Memorial Park for \$500. This assures the Town of having sufficient land for any desired expansion of the Library and it has marvelous possibilities for a Wild Life Area and a park. We trust that the Town will see fit to accept this gift from the Commission.

We have tremendous plans for the future, but we will tell you about them next year as we hopefully fulfill them.

The financial statement of our Commission Fund and the Soil Survey Account, both of which have been approved by the Town Auditor, are as follows.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Your Selectmen have continued working on the new card system of assessing, but due to lack of personnel and time, we were unable to complete the system this year. Hopefully, we can impliment the new system for next year's taxes.

At this time, the case relating to the proper use of our right-of-way to get to the Town Hall and the Middletown Cemetery is still pending on the Court's docket. Also still pending is the case of the alleged failure to clean up a collapsed building.

On Aug. 28th, the Selectmen accepted the resignation of Frederick Gilbert as Selectman and shortly after we appointed George Blais to fill this vacancy until Town Meeting.

During the year, we also accepted the resignations of Leland Robbins, Frank Valez, and Roger Carrier from the Police Force. Lawrence Sweeney was appointed to the Regular Police Force and Walter Bradshaw was appointed to the Special Police Force.

On Nov. 6th, it became necessary for the Selectmen to remove from office the Road Agent for failure to discharge his duties as Road Agent, and failure to follow the instructions of the Selectmen. Terrance Qualters was appointed Road Agent until March.

The Selectmen worked with the Recreation Committee and Library Trustees on the matter of moving the building located on the Braley beach property. This is the property that is adjacent to the Town Beach and was purchased by the Town last year. It was decided that the building will be used as an addition to the Library.

During 1972 the Selectmen issued 16 building permits and 9 pistol permits.

Last summer the Selectmen hired a stone crusher and had 2000 yds. of gravel crushed for use on Town roads.

Henry Patnode was engaged, and completed extensive repairs to the roof structure of the Veteran's Hall.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Regular meetings were held at the Town Hall on the second Wednesday of every month to act upon applications for subdivisions, and to plan for future development of the town. Two informal meetings and two public hearings were held re amendments to zoning. Board members attended several meetings at Dublin and Winchester where solid waste collection and disposal was discussed. As no regional decision is as yet forthcoming we must soon find our own answer to this problem as Winchester's open dump will be banned after 1975.

The Board was gratified at the voters acceptance of its recommendations for zoning amendments in 1972. It will be necessary to amend the Zoning Ordinance each year so as to legally protect us and our environment without unduly restricting or regulating our growth and activities.

The Board appointed Edith Atkins, Harold Dickinson, Gordon Nelson, Herbert Steinberg and Alan Harvey as a committee for a Richmond Historical Society. Their recommendations for the formation of this society, its need, purposes, and activities have been presented to the Board of Selectmen, and appears in the Town Report following this report

Gordon Nelson and Thomas Baird served as our representatives to the Regional Planning Board, attending regular monthly meetings with other member towns in the Cheshire and Hillsboro County district.

David Graves was appointed to the Board and George Blais replaced Frederick Gilbert as Selectman representative.

Seven fire ponds with dry hydrants in four different parts of town will have been completed by next fall due directly to our subdivision regulations.

The Board is at present preparing a questionnaire, which will be sent to all property owners in Richmond so that we can better incorporate your wishes for the future of Richmond in our planning.

SUBDIVISION APPLICATIONS APPROVED

1. TREE GROWERS INC. — \$25.00 fee. Eleven lots of from 5 to 10 acres each situated on both sides of Rte 119 west of the Four Corners (Colony lot) approved subject to completion of two fire ponds with dry hydrants. Sites of the John Cass Inn and the Kelton Cemetery, being within these lots, have been declared Historical Sites and will remain untouched and will have public access by foot path.

2. LAND SYSTEMS INC. — \$25.00 fee. Seven lots of 15 acres each, plus 56 acres to be held in common on land formerly known as the Allen lot south of Suderman's on the Martin Road, now subject to gates and bars. Land Systems will gravel the road abutting their property and install two fire ponds with dry hydrants, and is under bond for \$8000. until this work is done.

3. NEW HAMPSHIRE ACRES INC. -\$25.00 fee. Nine lots of 4 to 45 acres each on the Lang lot on both sides of Lang Road at Mud Pond. N.H. Acres Inc. is in bond for \$1000.00 until completion of the fire pond. Also it is understood that Richmond residents may have foot access to Mud Pond.

4. There were also several lots with a single division approved by the Board. A \$5.00 resident's fee accepted for each application.

The Committee for a Richmond Historical Society, having been duly appointed July 12, 1972 by the Planning Committee of the Town of Richmond, and having met in committee July 12, August 21 and September 25, here with make the following recommendations:

1) That the Town of Richmond, being one of the oldest settlements in New Hampshire and rich in history, make a definite effort to preserve its past ad historical treasures for the benefit of its residents and the enjoyment and edification of the citizens of Cheshire County and posterity through the establishment of a permanent Historical Society in the Town of Richmond.

2) That a permanent site be provided to house the society and its historical collections.

3) That a permanent directorship be appointed by the Town in open meeting or by authority through Its Planning Committee to establish and guide the Society, with membership open to all interested town residents.

4) That all the historical records and other historical material of a valuable nature, which may not necessarily be exhibited publicly but which should be preserved for posterity, be stored in the basement of the new library addition.

5) That the Committee for the Historical Society and the Society, when and if established, be empowered and responsible for the collecting, sorting, recording and storing of all historical material, and act as a repository for all items of a historical value given or loaned to it.

6) That a museum be established by the Society for the exhibition of historical relics, documents and other material of interest to the Town and County in the building provided.

7) That a suitable place be provided by the Town as a headquarters for the Historical Society that will house its collections, files, and museum, and that this building might also be used for other Museum collections, special exhibits, antique and Arts and Crafts show etc. which could prove of benefit to the town in attracting outside interest.

8) That the Historical Society determine and mark all sites, areas, buildings and objects of historical significance or interest within the Town boundaries of Richmond.

9) That the residents of Richmond be encouraged to restore and identify homes and property of historic interest.

10) That an effort be made to encourage and promote outside interest in the historical preservation of the Town of Richmond.

11) That an effort be made to invite the cooperation and involvement of County and State authorities and Societies where advisable and insofar as the interests of the Town of Richmond are concerned.

12) That investigation might be made in regard to sites and areas of historical interest in danger of being lost due to private sale or development.

13) And lastly, that an effort be made to promote, encourage and foster the introduction of native arts and crafts.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow, must obtain a fire permit, free of cost from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild, it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.
