INAUGURAL ADDRESS

by Mayor Louis H. McDuffee

Gentlemen of the City Council:

We have been very fortunate during the present depression in Rochester, according to the conditions in other parts of New England and the whole country.

Our factories have been running part of the time, and our citizens have made a big effort to live on the small amount of money which they have received as wages.

Two opposite opinions have arisen to cure this depression—to spend money and make improvements, or to economize and make no improvements and spend no money. For the past two years, we have made many improvements and spent much money. The citizens have not hesitated to ask for everything they could think of to be done, but—the taxes, which is our only source of revenue for improvements, many people think are too high and they want the taxes reduced.

So, this year, we think it would be advisable, for expenditures to be kept at the lowest point. For several years past, we have employed many men who otherwise would have been helped by the city. We cannot employ these men and reduce taxes, so we think it advisable to go on to the economy plan, even though we have to pay more money through the Poor account, to take care of our citizens unable to get employment.

WATER WORKS AND SEWERS

The improvements made on the water supply during the past two years have proven perfectly satisfactory, which we consider a big asset to the City of Rochester.

We wish to further mention the fact to the Committee that year by year new services and fixtures are constantly increasing and in order to assist our present volume, we would recommend for their careful consideration, the erection of two standpipes—one

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at the proper location for the City proper, and one for Gonic, under the same conditions, also the installation of a by-pass at the reservoir to take care of the distributing system provided repairs should become necessary at the present in-take.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department has been very fortunate, regarding its expenses. They have also been very fortunate regarding fires of any size. The Head-quarters Station has had the only extraordinary expense in repairs and should go many years without an expense in the way of improvements.

PARKS

During the year 1930, we set out over 100 Rock Maples in our parks and along the highways. Several of these trees have been broken off short and destroyed by some malicious citizen. Most of the trees, however, are living and some day will be greatly admired by our citizens and visitors.

During 1931, we set out on our various properties 12,000 seedling pines. In 1932 we expect to set out more pines, and we have also looked over a grove of Blue Spruces which we think can be set out on our Parks and Commons at a very small cost.

HEALTH

We have been very fortunate this past year in our Health Department. Contagious diseases of a serious nature have been very scarce. We think this is due to the efficient work of the Board of Health; the School Nurse and the District Nurse. Preventative measures are much better than curative measures. The Clinics which have been held here have assisted, we think, in keeping down contagious diseases. This year, we shall continue the same methods that we have used in the past year and hope for as good results.

LIBRARY

It happens that when business is quiet, many people turn to reading to take up their time. It costs only the time and improves the reader's morale.

As a result of this, our library is taxed to its capacity, both in reading space and book stacking space. New shelves must be built in the library and soon an addition must be put on if the library patrons increase as they have during the past two years.

POOR

It is very easy to complain and find fault about roads and streets, but when it comes to finding fault about the Poor, it is very unpleasant. We have checked up the Poor Account with cities similar to ours both on inhabitants and from per capita point of view and find that our Poor Account is as low as any. The reason for this, we think, is on account of the Officials handling the Poor Account and Mrs. Frank Smith. This year the Poor Account will be no smaller than the two years past.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

In making up the budget for 1931, it was estimated that \$2,000 would be received from fines and costs. This amount was within a few cents of the amount received which shows that the Police Department was efficient and knew its business. We have had during some months more cases in court than we had in six months twenty years ago. Many of them were Motor Vehicle cases which we have to handle and for which we receive not one cent. For 1932 the Police Department should work along the lines pursued the past few years, as we think the Police Department has given general satisfaction.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

At the present time the Highway Department plays a very important part in the prosperity of a city. Good roads are an invitation to the tourist to come again, and well kept streets make an impression not quickly forgotten.

During 1931 many miles of permanent roads have been constructed and sidewalks and streets improved. It is the aim of this Department to do as much permanent work each year as time and money will permit. We have many miles of roads to clear of snow in winter and keep in good condition in summer by dragging and treating with oil and Calcium Chloride whenever the expense will allow.

We must not lose sight of the ever increasing demands on this Department, consideration of the hardships of the men and expense incurred to keep our roads passable and streets cleared of snow. This is quite an item in the expense of the Department, but in this day of the automobile, it is necessary.

SCHOOLS

Three years ago we stated that the Maple Street School was a disgrace to any city. We restated this fact two years ago and again last year. This year the city council and school board unanimously agreed with us and both bodies voted that a building should be The council voted \$80,000 for a new building. A building committee, consisting of the Mayor, Harry H. Meader, Louis Bergeron and Joshua Studley from the Council; and Fred F. Seavey, Lawrence Haley and Albert J. Desjardins with William H. Buker as secretary from the school board, carried out the wishes of both city bodies. A nine room building with an assembly hall was erected and ready for occupancy September 1, at a cost of \$71,119. There is retained \$325, and there is a small amount of work to be done on the grounds in the spring. It is usually the custom for a building committee to call for a second appropriation. This committee spent nearly \$8,500 less than voted by the council.

It is very gratifying to report that the school board members of 1931 expect that the schools of 1932 can be run on the same budget as for the past five years, although they have increased the teaching force the past year due to the Maple Street Building, and an increase in the maintenance of the building will logically follow.

In analyzing the school budget, we find that 80% of the budget is directly under the control of the public statutes and public opinion. Teachers with certain qualifications are necessary; textbooks and supplies must be furnished; fuel must be purchased; janitors are required; pupils living a certain distance from the school must be transported; the two dollar per pupil

tax must be paid to the state; a certain number of hours must be given to the mechanics arts course in order to get state aid; we must keep our buildings in repair and maintain them. The teachers and superintendent are producing efficient results, for reports from the colleges of our graduates continue to be very satisfactory.

CONCLUSION

Finally, we have passed through what is considered one of the worst depressions in the history of this country. We have not spent any more money than seemed to be necessary in the minds of the people handling the affairs of the City.

We think we have accomplished a lot of work and have received a good value for the dollar spent. It is considered fitting to keep the expenses down, so we shall do only what is necessary, and as well as we can, for the amount of money we have to spend.

IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS

Passed by the City Council, 1931

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDING SCHOOL HOUSE ON MAPLE STREET

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: A joint committee of the City Council and School Board recommend to the City Council that an eight room elementary school building be constructed at Maple Street and the Committee be authorized to take immediate steps to secure plans and specifications, and accept bids for a building the cost not to exceed \$80,000.00 and the Finance Committee of the City Council be authorized to issue bonds for the same.

RESOLUTION TO HIRE MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Finance Committee be authorized to hire a sum not exceeding \$100,000.00 on note or notes of the City during the year 1931 in anticipation of taxes. Said notes to be written at such times and taken up at such times as the balance in the treasury will permit.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO SALARY OF TAX COLLECTOR

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That Paragraph 6, of Section 1, of Chapter 24 of the City Ordinances with reference to the Salaries of City Officers be amended by striking out the whole of said paragraph and inserting in place thereof the following:

The Collector of Taxes sixteen hundred dollars and postage, payable one hundred and thirty dollars each and every month until the last monthly payment, when the balance of said salary of sixteen hundred dollars shall be paid.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE DUTIES OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Chapter VIII of the City Ordinances, Fire Department, Section 4, as amended by act of January 7, 1927, be amended by adding at the end thereof: "The Chief Engineer shall respond only to calls for fire within the residential districts of Rochester City proper, and the residential sections of the villages of East Rochester, Gonic and North Rochester. He shall not respond to any calls or attend any brush fires or fires occurring outside the limits of the City of Rochester. Assistant Engineers shall respond to and take charge of all fires occurring outside the residential districts of Rochester City proper, and the residential sections of the villages of East Rochester, Gonic and North Rochester, and all brush fires and fires occurring outside of the Rochester City limits" so that section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 4. In all cases of fire the chief engineer shall have the sole control and command over all the engineers and other members of the fire department, and he shall at all times exercise supervision of the entire apparatus which may be in use; and shall have the care of all hydrants, see that they are kept free from snow and ice, and that they are at all times in good condition and ready for use. The board of engineers shall make a report of all fires to the city clerk within two days as required by the public statutes. The chief engineer and assistant chief engineer shall devote their whole time to the service of the city.

The chief engineer shall respond only to calls for fire within the residential districts of Rochester City proper, and the residential sections of the villages of East Rochester, Gonic and North Rochester. He shall not respond to any calls or attend any brush fires or fires occurring outside the limits of the City of Rochester. Assistant engineers shall respond to and take charge of all fires occurring outside of the residential districts of Rochester City proper, and the residential sections of the villages of East Rochester, Gonic and North Rochester, and all brush fires and fires occurring outside of the Rochester City limits.

Amend Section 5 of said Chapter VIII, by inserting in the first line thereof after the word "engineer," the following: "the first assistant engineer if present, otherwise" so that said Section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 5. In the absence of the chief engineer, the first assistant engineer if present, otherwise the next assistant engineer in rank who may be present shall have the powers and perform the duties of the chief engineer; and the seniority in rank of the assistant engineers shall be determined by the board of engineers at their first meeting.

Passed March 3, 1931.

RESOLUTION OF ANNUAL APPROPRIATION

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That there shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised, with such overlay as may be found necessary, on the polls and ratable estates within said city \$295,867.71 to defray necessary expenses

of the City for the ensuing year, which together with the sums which may be received from various sources shall constitute the City budget.

Passed April 7, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE MONEY WITHIN THE SPRINKLING PRECINCT

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That there be raised by taxation within the sprinkling precinct the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars in accordance with the act of the Legislature, creating said precinct.

Passed April 7, 1931.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF RUBBISH

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Chapter XI be amended by adding a new section, being Section 10 to read as follows:

Sec. 10. That garbage, refuse and other waste material shall be collected, removed and destroyed weekly, and that the Mayor and Committee on Highways be and hereby are authorized and empowered to provide for the weekly collection, removal and destruction of garbage, refuse and other waste material and to make necessary regulations relative thereto. The Street Commissioner under the direction of the Mayor and Committee on Highways shall employ the necessary trucks and labor to carry on said work. The expense incident thereto shall be paid out of the regular highway appropriation.

Passed April 7, 1931.

AMENDMENT TO TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 3 of Chapter XIV of the City Ordinances be amended by adding thereto the following: All vehicles on River Street shall be brought to a stop on River Street before entering North Main Street from River Street.

All vehicles on Pine Street shall be brought to a stop on Pine Street before entering North Main Street from Pine Street.

All vehicles on Maple Street shall be brought to a stop on Maple Street before entering North Main Street from Maple Street.

All vehicles on Glenwood Avenue shall be brought to a stop on Glenwood before entering Wakefield Street from Glenwood Avenue.

All vehicles on Academy Street shall be brought to a stop on Academy Street before entering Charles Street from Academy Street.

All vehicles on Grove Street in East Rochester Village being operated in a southerly direction shall be brought to a stop on Grove Street before entering Highland Avenue.

All vehicles on Grove Street in East Rochester Village being operated in a northerly direction shall be brought to a stop on Grove Street before entering Highland Avenue.

All vehicles on Grove Street in East Rochester Village shall be brought to a stop on Grove Street before entering Portland Street.

All vehicles on Pine Street in East Rochester Village shall be brought to a stop on Pine Street before entering Highland Avenue.

All vehicles on Highland Avenue in East Rochester Village shall be brought to a stop on Highland Avenue before entering Main Street.

Passed June 2, 1931.

AMENDMENT TO TRAFFIC ORDINANCE

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Chapter XIV be amended by adding another section to be known as Section 6, to read as follows:

Sec. 6. All vehicles travelling south on Central Square when entering Central Square from Wakefield

Street shall go to the right of the plot of ground on which is located Parson Main Monument on Central Square.

All vehicles in passing over Central Square in a northerly direction toward the intersection of Wakefield Street and Central Square shall pass to the right of Parson Main Monument.

All vehicles passing over North Main Street in a southerly direction on to Central Square shall pass to the right of the plot of ground on which is located Parson Main Monument on Central Square to go north on Central Square on to Wakefield Street or east on Central Square to enter Hanson Street.

The City Marshal shall place and maintain suitable signs and markers on Central Square for the direction of traffic in the manner above set forth.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUE OF MAPLE STREET SCHOOL HOUSE BONDS

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the vote of the City Council at regular meeting February 3, 1931, in substance authorizing the Finance Committee of the City Council to issue bonds to raise funds to defray the cost not to exceed \$80.000 of the construction of an eight-room elementary school building at Maple Street be amended and perfected so that said bonds be issued in the aggregate principal amount of seventy thousand (70,000) dollars, be dated July 1, 1931, be payable \$14,000 on the first day of July each year 1933 to 1937 inclusive, bear interest at the rate of four per cent. (4%) per annum payable semi-annually, be in coupon form in the denomination of \$1,000 each, be payable as to both principal and interest at the Harris Forbes Trust Company, Boston, Massachusetts, bear the authenticating certificate of said Trust Company, and be in form substantially that specified in New Hampshire Public Laws, Chapter 59. Other particulars as to the form, issuance and sale of said bonds shall be determined by the Finance Committee and the City Treasurer.

Resolved further: That said vote of February 3, 1931, in all respects not inconsistent herewith and all acts done or performed under authority thereof be and the same are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Passed June 17, 1931.

RESOLUTION RATIFYING ALL BUSINESS OF SPECIAL MEETING JUNE 17

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the resolution providing for the issue of \$70,000, 4% Maple Street School House Bonds, passed at meeting June 17, and all acts in relation thereto are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved.

Passed July 7, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO EXTEND DISCOUNT PERIOD

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That for the collection of taxes for the year 1931, the provisions Section 2 of Chapter XIX of the revised ordinances of the City of Rochester be suspended and the tax collector be authorized to allow a discount of oneand one-half per cent. on all taxes paid in full on or before August 1, 1931, and one per cent. on all taxes paid in full on or before September 1, 1931.

Passed July 7, 1931.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE, ADDING A NEW PARAGRAPH TO SECTION 15 OF CHAPTER XII

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 15 of Chapter XII of the City Ordinances be amended by adding at the end thereof the following:

"Any person violating any provision of this section shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than twenty dollars," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 15. No person shall distribute, dump, put or place, or cause the same to be done, in or on any street, lane, alley, sidewalk, or other public place in the City, any hand bill, circular, programme or piece of paper. any stones, dirt, house dirt, ashes, garbage, seeds, salt. shavings, filth, suds, offal, oyster shells, or rubbish, except in such places and such manner as the Mayor and Council may decide.

Any person violating any provision of this section shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than twenty dollars.

Passed July 7, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR VACATION OF PERMANENT MEN IN FIRE DEPARTMENT

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the permanent men in the Fire Department be granted a vacation of one week with pay, the same to be under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

Passed July 7, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR VACATION OF PERMANENT MEN IN POLICE DEPARTMENT

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the permanent members of the Police Department be granted a vacation of one week with pay, the time of such vacation to be under the supervision of the City Marshal.

Passed July 7, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO SELL LAND TAKEN FOR TAXES

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That whereas the City of Rochester has taken for taxes a certain tract of land situate on the Gonic, Somersworth Road, and holds a Tax Collector's Deed for the same, and the total amount of tax money actually lost on account of said delinquent taxes amounts to only \$8.19 or \$16.45 with the cost of selling and whereas Harold Frost has made an offer for said land to the amount of \$15.00, be it resolved:

That the Mayor be authorized to sign a quit claim deed to said land and deliver the same to said Frost. This land is covered with small sprout and is deeded to contain five acres more or less but has no apparent commercial value and this is the only offer since the property was taken.

Passed September 1, 1931.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE, INSTALLATION OF GASOLINE PUMPS

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Chapter X of the City Ordinances "Hazardous Buildings" be amended by adding thereto Sections 5, 6, and 7 as follows:

Sec. 5. No person, firm or corporation shall hereafter erect or cause to be erected, or alter any building already erected, or permit the use of any building or structure already erected in the City of Rochester for the purpose of providing or maintaining a place for the sale of and storage of petroleum or any of its products, kerosene and fuel oil for domestic purposes excepted, without having filed a petition therefor with the City Council for a license so to do, setting forth (1) the location and situation of the building proposed to be erected, altered and used for said purpose; (2) the materials of which said building is to be constructed; (3) the manner in which and the materials to be used in the alterations contemplated in a building already erected; (4) the location of the tanks and pumps to be placed on said premises, and used in connection with the handling of said petroleum products.

Upon the first reading of the petition by the City Council it shall be laid on the table until the next regular meeting following the date of its presentation at which said regular meeting a hearing shall be had on said petition permitting all parties of interest the opportunity to appear and be heard on the question of granting such license.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this section shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than five dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars for each and every day such violation shall continue to be recovered on a complaint of the Mayor or of the City Marshal before Municipal Court for the City of Rochester.

Sec. 6. The City Clerk shall record all such licenses granted as provided in the preceding section in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Amended by prefixing Section 5 of said ordinance to read as follows: "With the exception of those who have complied with the provisions of Section 29 of Chapter CLXII of the Public Laws.

Also amended by adding another section to be known as Section 7 to read as follows: Sec. 7. Section 7 of Chapter XVI of the revised ordinances as passed October 5, 1929, is hereby repealed.

Passed as amended October 6, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO HIRE IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Committee of Finance be authorized to hire a sum not exceeding \$50,000.00 in anticipation of taxes. Said sum to be hired on note or notes of the City and to be issued at such times and taken up at such times as the balance in the treasury will permit.

Passed Oct. 6, 1931.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATING TO SUNDAY OBSERVANCE

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That we amend Chapter XIII of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Rochester, relating to Police Offenses by adding thereto four new sections following Section 9 of said Chapter and renumbering Section 10 as it now reads to read Section 14 so that said sections as amended to said Chapter shall read as follows:

Sec. 10. AMATEUR SPORTS. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day, to engage in play, games, sports, and exhibitions of physical skill, to which no admission is charged, except public dancing, horse racing, prize

fighting, wrestling, pool, billiards, and bowling, provided that peace and quiet are not unreasonably disturbed thereby. The Mayor and City Council may regulate the time, manner, and areas of such play, games, and sports, to the end that no unreasonable disturbance of peace and quiet shall be caused thereby.

Sec. 11. PROFESSIONAL SPORTS. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day to engage in play, sports, and games involving physical skill, for which an admission is charged, except public dancing, horse racing, prize fighting, wrestling, pool, billiards, and bowling, but not earlier than one o'clock in the afternoon. No such play, game or sport shall be held without a license therefor from the Licensing Board.

Sec. 12. MOVING PICTURES AND THEATRICALS. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day to conduct motion pictures, lectures, concerts, theatricals, and vaudeville performances, but not earlier than six o'clock in the afternoon, provided that no unreasonable disturbance of peace and quiet is caused thereby. The Mayor and City Council may make regulations controlling such entertainments as do not now require to be licensed, to the end that no unreasonable disturbance of peace and quiet shall be caused thereby, and nothing in this section shall be construed to permit without license, any such entertainment now requiring license.

Sec. 13. RETAIL TRADE. It shall be lawful on the Lord's Day to sell at retail, newspapers, periodicals, flowers, and nursery stock, ice cream, soft drinks, confectionery, fruit, bakery products including pastry, cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, smoking accessories, toilet articles, gasoline, oil, automobile parts and accessories, and food for consumption on the premises. Except as provided herein and by Section 5 of Chapter 385 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, it shall be unlawful to sell or expose for sale any merchandise whatever on the Lord's Day.

Sec. 14. If any person shall be guilty of any offense against any provision of this Chapter for which no penalty is attached, he shall pay for such offense so committed, a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances incon-

sistent herewith are hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall take effect when approved by a majority vote of the legal voters present and voting at the next regular City Election.

Passed Nov. 4, 1931, subject to the approval of the people at the next regular election. Accepted at City Election Dec. 1, 1931, and passed to be enrolled.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO WATER WORKS COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Chapter XXI, Section 2, be amended by adding thereto the following amendment:

"Said committee in conjunction with the superintendent and clerk shall meet in the office of the Superintendent on the first Thursday at 7.30 P. M. following each regular City Council Meeting for the purpose of transacting such business as may duly come before its meeting, special meetings may be called at the option of the clerk," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 2. Said Committee shall have the charge of and exercise general supervision over the Water Works and all property, material and appurtenances belonging to the same; shall have the supervision and expenditure of the appropriations made for their extension, improvement and maintenance; shall make all necessary contracts for the supply of labor and shall make requisition upon the Purchasing Committee for any material or property necessary for their use; shall execute and direct the performance of all works, matters and things pertaining thereto; provided that the above powers shall be exercised subject to the orders of the City Council and to such ordinances and regulations as it may from time to time make and prescribe in relation thereto.

Said Committee in conjunction with the Superintendent and Clerk shall meet in the office of the Superintendent on the first Thursday at 7.30 P. M., following each regular City Council Meeting for the purpose of transacting such business as may duly come before its meeting; special meetings may be called at the option of the Clerk. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Passed Dec. 3, 1931.

RESOLUTION TO TRANSFER BALANCES

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That if found necessary in closing the accounts of the year, to transfer from a department where there is a balance to a department where there is a deficit, the Committee on Finance be authorized to make such transfer.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In rendering my report of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1931, I would state that we have been very fortunate in not having many serious fires, but we may not always be as fortunate, therefore it stands us in hand to be prepared for whatever emergency may arise by having up-to-date equipment.

There have been 11 bell alarms, 128 still alarms, mostly chimney fires, 24 brush and forest fires in the City proper; 11 bell alarms, 5 still alarms, 1 brush and forest fire at East Rochester; 3 bell alarms, 7 still alarms, 7 brush and forest fires at Gonic, making a total of 197 alarms for the year.

Out of town calls: We assisted, February 22, Bow Lake; April 13, Strafford; April 16, South Berwick; April 19, Farmington; May 17, Farmington; October 1, New Durham; October 19, Center Lebanon; November 1, Center Lebanon.

REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Trustees of the Rochester Public Library respectfully submit its thirty-eighth annual report, together with the report of the librarian and treasurer.

The purposes for which moneys received from the city's appropriation and from the interest on the endowment funds have been spent can be seen in the detailed report of the librarian.

We are pleased to report that many individuals have kindly contributed books, magazines, periodicals, and valuable articles for the museum, and at the same time we are sorry to note that our annual plea for further endowment has been of no avail.

The library sorely needs a thousand dollars more revenue yearly.

The library staff has in its usual manner rendered devoted service, and in behalf of the library patrons we thank them.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Rochester Public Library:

Gentlemen:—Again it has become necessary to submit a report of a year's work therefore I present to you records and notations in the briefest manner possible.

The thing of primary importance to those interested in the library is its growth. This can be estimated by the quality and quantity of additions for the year. The limited book income has been divided between the useful, the necessary and the entertaining. It has been difficult to select from among the wealth of good books, those, which would satisfy the majority of readers and students and not offend the taste of others. Six hundred and sixty-one volumes have been purchased from library funds including money received for fines and from other sources. Forty-two have been purchased from the interest of the \$1,000 fund left by the late Jennie I. Farrington and 18 reference books from a part of the income from the John Mc-Duffee fund left by the late Abbie McDuffee Chase. The total amount spent for these books was \$991.44. The amount spent from each source is noted in the report of the treasurer which concludes this report.

Had the library been obliged to pay the listed price of each book the amount expended would have exceeded \$1,464.30. Through the kindness of F. P. Meader, Library Book House, Personal Book Shop, different cut price book firms and various publishers, liberal discounts have been allowed and in addition, used books have been purchased whenever possible.

To the number of books purchased may be added 341 gifts and 74 volumes of bound magazines making the total additions 1,136.

Through constant use books wear out and 144 have been discarded because past use, 14 have either been lost or destroyed by patrons, one of the number at the East Rochester Branch and four were burned

because of exposure to contagious disease. This makes the net gain only 974 and the number in the library at the close of 1931, 29,618.

Periodicals serve two distinct purposes, that of supplying current reading for the tables and providing important reference material. These magazines have cost after deducting \$52.09 allowed by virtue of library and clubbing rates \$201.30. The more important magazines are bound and become a part of the library, others are filed in the basement where they may be accessible.

Reading and reference rooms have been well patronized. There is seldom a day when the reference room is not in use. Adults, resident and non-resident, use it freely and pupils from the upper grades as well as High School come for needed information, usually requiring help from one or more assistants. Rarely are there fewer than 40 readers or students in a day and on many days more than 100 have been counted, many staying an entire afternoon or evening. The attempt has been made to separate readers and students in the count but it has not been possible to do this with any accuracy. The number using the rooms this year has been 17,362, an increase of 4,823 over last year.

In the children's room the work has gone on quietly. Much attention has been paid to the selection of books for the younger children. During the summer a contest for good reading was carried on which was participated in by 45 children. The circulation from this room has been 17,503 and 5,151 readers have been counted.

At the East Rochester Branch, Mrs. Elliott tells us there is neither room nor time to give out all the books which are wanted. Two thousand one hundred eighty-one of the Rochester books were given out, 292 more than last year.

Miss Meader gave out 1,783 books at the Gonic Branch, more than 1,300 of the number during the first six months of the year. A comparison is impossible as this branch did not re-open until November of last year.

Books which have been discarded have been given to Miss Bertha Allen who, for several years, conducted a little home branch at her home at Walnut Grove. These, in spite of their loose leaves, their torn and soiled pages and broken bindings, have been circulated or given to her neighbors, many of whom cannot come to the public library. Miss Allen kept a record during the month of November and reported that fifty books were given out.

It has been a great pleasure to know that in this time of unemployment the library could contribute something to relieve periods of worry and discouragement. This condition, no doubt, is responsible in great measure for the large increase in circulation and readers.

The number of books given out was 88,252, an increase of 13,143 over last year. How this circulation has been distributed, the number given out in each class, the proportion from the main library and each of the branches may be seen in the tables of statistics which are a part of this report.

It has been something of a task to circulate in the limited space and time, and with the crowded condition of the shelves, the 84,268 books which have gone out from the main library. Many days books have circulated at the rate of more than one per minute. Issuing books is only the smaller part of circulation. Each book which goes out must be brought back and it takes longer to cancel a book, find its proper slip, look it over for tears, stains or mutilation, and prepare it to to circulate again, than it does to give it out. The circulation at the main library shows an increase of 11,308.

It is interesting to note that non-fiction has had a large place in the reading of the year. Non-fiction is very readable today, whether history, philosophy, essays, drama or poetry. Biographies attract by their very titles. Many of our readers prefer such books to the novels of the day.

The gifts have been numerous and valuable. Among the 209 volumes given by Mrs. Emma Copp Neal were many which will help in the required reading of the schools and many which will be of interest to the Boy Scouts. All gifts have been mentioned in

the Library Notes which are printed each week through the kindness of the editors of The Rochester Courier and Foster's Democrat. To the givers of these gifts, books, pictures, periodicals and binders, pamphlets, catalogs, reports, curios for the museum, flowers to brighten the rooms, words of appreciation and commendation of the library, and fruit and sweets for the staff, I would give grateful acknowledgment.

The work of this, the busiest year in the history of the library, has been carried on with the same regularity and attention to detail as heretofore owing to the splendid team-work of the staff, each attending to her allotted tasks and combining during the rush hours to meet every demand and turn off the work as quickly as possible. The annual inventory revealed the fact that four books had been taken from the seven-day rack without permission and never returned and that two books missing in the inventory of 1930 had appeared. In the spring Miss Foss and Miss Baril cleaned every book on the main floor. More than 20,000 books were handled in this piece of work. They also assisted the librarian in cleaning the curios in the museum.

Marriage has again depleted our ranks. Miss Lois Fownes and Mrs. Blanche Arnold, who were chosen to fill the vacancies, have fitted into their places quickly and are becoming good library assistants.

For the good work of these new assistants and of those who have so readily responded to calls for extra help, as well as for the splendid co-operation of the two assistant librarians, Miss Foss and Miss Baril, I wish to express my most sincere appreciation.

I would at this time acknowledge every courtesy and kindness of the trustees and the treasurer, Mr. Copp, who have so graciously responded to any demand made upon them.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board:

I present the fortieth annual report, concerning the schools of this city. This is the ninth report under my supervision.

At the monthly school board meetings and through the press I have endeavored to inform you concerning the changes that have been made in the schools during the year. However, it seems necessary to summarize these activities in order that you may have at hand information to guide you in formulating the policies of 1932.

MAPLE STREET SCHOOL BUILDING

In January, 1931, a building committee was appointed to act in conjunction with a similar committee from the council to consider replacing the Maple Street Building with a modern school building.

The members of the committee from the school board were Fred Seavey, Albert Desjardins and Lawrence Haley; from the council, Harry H. Meader, Louis Bergeron and Joshua Studley. Upon the recommendation of this committee the city council appropriated on February 2, \$80,000 for a school building.

The joint committee selected Warren S. Holmes Company, 18 Newbury Street, Boston, as architects.

Bids were secured and on April 28, contracts were made with A. F. Smiley Company, General, Pawtucket, R. I.; A. P. Covey, Plumbing, Rochester, N. H.; Sanborn, McDuffee Company, Heating, Rochester, N. H.; P. F. Casey Company, Electrical, Dover, N. H.

The building committee gave many hours during the spring and summer in general supervision of the building. On September 5 the contractors turned the building over to the committee.

This building is of brick, consisting of eight classrooms, a domestic arts room, an assembly hall, a principal's office, janitor's closets, a boiler room, and a coal pit.

The grounds were graded, sidewalks constructed,

and shrubbery added during the fall.

The total cost of the building, equipment, grading grounds to date is \$71,119.94. There is being withheld \$325 for one year, and in the spring about \$150 will be needed on the grounds; or a final cost of \$71,600.

The committee deserves much commendation for erecting such a building.

KEEPING CHILDREN IN SCHOOL

The depression has brought about an increase in our high school enrollment. It is an excellent time to reduce child labor (ages 14-16) and keep children in school in order that their physical and educational welfare may be preserved and protected. This increased enrollment also leaves more places of employment for adult workers who are unemployed.

Some public activities may be postponed for a year or two but our schools must continue. Recently it has been said that the community may largely determine its tax rate. This is far from true concerning the school tax.

The Mayor has carefully analyzed the 1931 school budget and found that 80% of the budget is determined by public statutes.

CHANGES IN TEACHERS

Elementary Schools

Miss Elsie Darling resigned as teacher of grades six and seven at East Rochester, to accept a position at Littleton. Due to this resignation several transfers were made in the city.

Miss Arlene Bessey (Mrs. Daley), the music supervisor, was married during the year. Miss Alice Norton was elected to fill this vacancy.

Two additional teachers were added, due to the new Maple Street Building. Miss Zelma Labbe is teaching grades seven and eight at Maple Street and Miss Anna Clark, grade five at School Street. Miss Phyllis Bliss, a third grade teacher, has been on a leave of absence since September, due to a serious automobile accident in September. Miss Bliss expects to return to her duties February 29. Her place has been taken by Miss Alice Wales.

REPAIRS MADE

HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

1. Plumbing and repairs on boilers have been made.

2. Tinted assembly hall.

3. Repairs were made on the gas pipes.

4. The shower baths were repaired.

- 5. Barberry bushes were placed on the lawn.
- 6. The first floor of Vocational Building was painted.

ALLEN BUILDING

1. There were only minor repairs made in this building as last year about \$1,200 was expended.

SCHOOL STREET BUILDING

1. The interior of the building was painted.

2. The grounds in the rear of the building were graded.

3. The wiring of the building was completed during the summer vacation.

MAPLE STREET BUILDING

1. A nine room building and assembly hall was erected.

2. Basketball stands have been erected on the grounds.

GONIC BUILDING

1. In the rear of the building the grounds were leveled.

2. On the south side of the lot a volley ball court was constructed.

3. The city constructed a skating rink near the building which is a great asset to the school grounds.

4. Basketball stands have been erected. The pupils raised one-half of the money for the same.

EAST ROCHESTER BUILDING

1. The building has been completely wired.

2. A well and a pump had to be installed to care for the water from the boiler and fountains.

A floor was laid in the assembly hall.
 New curtains for the stage were made.

5. The swings were painted.

REPAIRS NEEDED

HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

1. The ceilings in Rooms 1, 3, 6, 7, 17 need calcimining.

2. Rooms 6 and 17 need to be painted.

- 3. The woodwork in the high school needs varnishing.
 - 4. The cafeteria should have one coat of paint.

5. Several desks need buffing.

6. The basement in the Mechanic Arts Building should be painted.

ALLEN BUILDING

1. New stair treads are needed.

2. Several desks need buffing.

MAPLE STREET BUILDING

1. It seemed unwise to paint the classrooms at the time the building was constructed. Therefore we should have this work completed the coming summer.

2. A fence needs to be constructed in the rear

of the building.

3. The lawn in the front of the building will need to be finished.

GONIC SCHOOL BUILDING

1. Four rooms should be painted.

2. A driveway and lawn should be made in front of building.

EAST ROCHESTER BUILDING

1. Urinals in boys' basement need to be replaced.

2. Fence should be constructed on the south side

adjoining Mr. Wilmer Hayes' land.



I herewith submit my annual report as Headmaster of the Rochester High School.

Forty-six junior and senior high schools in the state had an average attendance for 1930 to 1931 of 97%. Rochester was one of these schools. The average for the state was 96.3. The average number of tardinesses per pupil for the state was .9. The num-

ber of tardinesses per pupil in Rochester was .3. We were in session 363 half days last year. The average for the state was 356.8.

From September 1930 to June 1931 12% of our pupils were discharged from school because of weakness, loss of interest, outclassed, and economic conditions in the home. Nine per cent. of our pupils failed in one course and six per cent. in more than one course. We hope to reduce discharges and failures to a minimum for the year 1931 to 1932 by the following methods:

- 1. To establish a guidance program that will help pupils to select the type of work best adapted to their particular needs.
- 2. To transfer pupils who are unable to do the work in one course to a course in which they may become interested and do passing work.
- 3. To group pupils in recitation sections according to their ability.
- 4. To assign class work that is adapted to the needs and ability of a particular group.
- 5. To allow this group to work at a speed adapted to their needs and ability, rather than to do a large amount of work less thoroughly.
- 6. To have more personal conferences between parents and teachers, and pupils and teachers.

TEACHERS

All of the regular teachers who were with us last year, returned this year. We have two new teachers: Miss Norton, Supervisor of Music; and Mr. O'Leary, Physical Director and teacher of junior and senior Mathematics. In addition to the above mentioned teachers we have a practice teacher in the Mechanic Arts Department, James Connelly, from the Keene Normal School. Mr. Connelly does not receive any salary for this work. It is a part of the training that four year normal graduates receive. His work is as follows:

- 1. Work with pupils who need help during the regular class period.
- 2. Work with pupils who need help in addition to the help obtained during the class period.

- 3. Correct papers and explain mistakes to pupils.
- 4. Observe teaching by the class teacher.
- 5. Help with extra-class activities.
- 6. Teach special group under supervision of the class teacher.

We have six recitation periods each day. Eleven teachers teach six periods, and four teachers teach five periods. In addition all of the teachers have supervised work from three to four each day for those pupils who need help. One teacher teaches seven periods each day.

In addition to the teaching load each teacher has charge of at least one extra-class activity.

I feel that we are fortunate in having this group of experienced, conscientious, hard working men and women.

BUILDING

This fall the entire building is devoted to high school use. Classes are using rooms that are poorly adapted to efficient work, due to overcrowded conditions, lack of equipment, and blackboard space. One class in Solid Geometry is compelled to use the Mechanical Drawing room in the Vocational Building, and in consequence the class is handicapped by the constant noise from the machinery. We are unable to seat all of our pupils at an assembly. More pupils are registered for Physics, and Typewriting, than we can efficiently accommodate.

We have seats enough in ten home rooms to seat all of the pupils, but we do not have rooms enough to take care of our class sections in a way that will enable teachers and pupils to work with a maximum efficiency. Most of the pupils have one or two study periods each day. Pupils are compelled to study in rooms where recitations are going on. Very few pupils are able to study under such conditions.

CLASS ROOM WORK AND STUDY

I feel that the quality of our teaching is improving each year, due particularly to the experience of our teachers. We are covering as much work as the majority of high schools. State tests indicate that

our pupils are above the state median in mental ability, above standard in Place Geography, and above state standard and median in English. Pupils are required to do more work of a higher grade than in the past. In the Rochester High School last year 9% of our pupils failed one course and 6% failed more courses. The state average indicates 8.3% failed one course and 6.5% failed more courses. Our ranking compares favorably with that of the rest of the state.

The thing most essential in bringing about a better and higher grade of school work is the cooperation between the home and the school. The school will do all that it can to aid pupils while they are in school. The home must see to it that the pupils devote at least three hours each day to home study under good study conditions, if they expect to receive a high mark.

All pupils do not have the same mental ability. The school tries to get each pupil to do the best that he is capable of doing. A boy who works to a capacity grade of 70 deserves as much credit as one who works to a capacity grade of 90. We are more interested in a pupil working to capacity than in the rank he receives. Ranks indicate a teacher's evaluation of the actual work a pupil does. More important than ranks is a teacher's evaluation of a pupil's capacity to do the assigned work plus an evaluation of his efforts. Parents may obtain this evaluation by personal conferences with teachers. Most of our failures are due to lack of work rather than lack of ability.

HONORS

The Dartmouth Medal was awarded to Wilma Lunt for the second year. The Springfield Scholarship was awarded to Mae Otto, now a freshman at the University of New Hampshire. The Woman's Club Scholarship was awarded to Beatrice Nutter. Large R's were awarded to Violet Robinson, Marion Meader, Edith Meader, Annette Masse, Marion McGurty, Evelyn Lane, and Gladys Goodwin.

EXTRA-CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES

Last spring a committee of teachers, composed of Mr. Monroe, Mr. Maxam, Mrs. Coleman, and Mrs. Allen, worked out an extra-classroom activity system

whereby a larger number of pupils could take part in such activities. This system gives so many points to the various activities, to illustrate: a pupil may receive so many points if he is on an athletic team, in the musical clubs, dramatic clubs, or if he is a member of a committee or an officer. The pupil is limited to the number of points that he can receive per year. After receiving a certain number of points he may become a member of an Honor Society in the school.

MUSIC

We have thirty-three pupils taking orchestra work this year, and an eighty minute period each week is devoted to this week. We have forty girls in the girls' glee club. An eighty minute period is devoted each week to this work. We hope after Christmas to have a boys' glee club, as in the past years. On Friday morning at eleven o'clock we have a music appreciation hour. The period is devoted to chorus singing, rehearsals by the orchestra and glee club, and on some days we allow the pupils to listen to the music appreciation series, broadcasted through the facilities of the National Broadcasting Company, under the direction of Walter Damrosch. Only pupils who are interested in music are allowed to register for the music appreciation hour.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the Superintendent and the School Board for the help and suggestions for the past year.
