IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS AND ORDERS

Passed by the City Council, 1934

RESOLUTION CHANGING METHOD OF BORROW-ING MONEY FOR WATER WORKS CONSTRUCTION

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the action taken by the City of Rochester at its Council Meeting on December 7, 1933, relative to the Water Works Extension and Construction on Rochester Hill, and the Gonic Road, be and is rescinded in so far as the same is in conflict with the following:

That whereas in its vote had at the City Council Meeting on December 7, 1933, it was voted to issue Rochester City Bonds to raise money to pay cost of the Rochester Hill project, not exceeding thirty-five thousand dollars in amount, and at the time of said Meeting it was uncertain what amount of money would be required to complete the Rochester Hill project, and whereas it has now been determined that the whole sum of thirty-five thousand dollars will be required, and

Whereas it has now been determined that the said sum of thirty-five thousand dollars can be raised by notes of said City, thereby saving the cost of a bond issue, being Bond attorneys certification and printing of said Bonds.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars be expended by the City of Rochester to construct a Pumping Station at the foot of Rochester Hill and a Storage Tank on said Rochester Hill with proper and necessary pipe lines therefrom, and to construct a pipe line on the Gonic Road, and

That the City of Rochester issue its notes bearing interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, in such sums as will retire said indebtedness in twenty years from the date of said notes, in accordance with Section 3 of Chapter 59, of the Public Laws of New Hampshire. That the Water Commissioner of said City of Rochester shall employ all labor required in said work and pay therefor such wages as he may determine.

That the said Commissioner shall employ only such citizens of Rochester as have resided in said City for six months or more before their application for employment.

That the Mayor and City Treasurer be and hereby are authorized to sign and execute such notes of the City on its behalf, and the City Clerk is authorized to countersign said notes, and said notes shall be paid at the Rochester Trust Company.

That the City of Rochester make sale of said notes to the public in so far as it may seem advantageous to said City to do so, and the Finance Committee of said City is directed to purchase, from any funds in said City, such notes as said City may be unable to sell to the public.

Passed January 2, 1934.

RESOLUTION DECLINING APPOINTMENT UNDER THE WILL OF CHARLES H. BERRY

Resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That whereas the said City was appointed trustee under the will of Charles H. Berry on the 17th day of October, 1933, under an instrument which purported to be his last will and testament, and whereas a later will has been found,

Now, therefore, be it resolved:

That the City of Rochester resign that trust which was given to it by the Honorable Judge of Probate under said appointment, and that the Mayor be and is directed to sign a proper instrument of resignation and the City Solicitor file the same with the Probate Court of Strafford County.

RESOLUTION TO HIRE MONEY IN ANTICIPA-TION OF TAXES

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Committee on Finance be authorized to hire in anticipation of taxes for the year 1934, a sum

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not exceeding \$150,000.00 to be hired at such times in multiples of \$10,000.00, and to be taken up at such times as the balance in the treasury will permit.

Said sum to be hired on notes of the City.

Passed January 3, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO INSTALL A NEW BOOKKEEP-ING SYSTEM

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Finance Committee be and is hereby authorized to install for the City a new bookkeeping system and to expend therefor a sum of money not exceeding twenty-five hundred dollars.

Passed February 6, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO BUY EQUIPMENT FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Mayor, City Marshal and Police Committee, be and hereby are empowered to purchase such additional equipment as they may deem necessary to safeguard the public welfare, such equipment not to exceed the amount of \$500.00.

RESOLUTION FOR PURCHASE OF LAND FOR PUMP AT FOOT OF ROCHESTER HILL

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Whereas the Water Committee of the City of Rochester has bought from Ira Lee Stanley and Mabel P. Stanley a certain tract or parcel of land situate at the corner of Richardson Street and South Main Street in said City, and has paid therefor the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars, the same to be used for a location on which to erect a Pumping Station to be used in connection with the Rochester Hill Project,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the act of said Water Committee be and hereby is approved.

Passed February 6, 1934.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE SALARY OF CLERK OF MUNICIPAL COURT

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Chapter 24, Salaries of City Officers, be amended by adding thereto the following, to be known as Sections 3 and 4.

Section 3. The salary of the Clerk of the Municipal Court of Rochester shall be four hundred dollars per year, payable quarterly.

Section 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR EXPENDITURES PENDING THE PASSAGE OF THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That pending the passage of the annual appropriation measure for the fiscal year 1934, the Mayor be and hereby is authorized and empowered to validate orders on the City Treasurer for all duly approved and properly classified claims for operating expenses of the City of Rochester or any of its Municipal Subdivisions.

Passed March 6, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO PURCHASE A NEW 3-TON MACK TRUCK

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the Highway Commissioner be and hereby is authorized, empowered and directed to purchase for and on behalf of the City of Rochester one Model BF, six cylinder, Mack dump truck, in exchange for two used Mack trucks now used by the City, together with the payment of three thousand five hundred ninety-six dollars.

Said Commissioner is hereby directed to make delivery of said two used Mack trucks to the Mack Truck Company when and at such times as they deliver to him the said new Mack dump truck.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE JANITOR AT E. ROCHESTER FIRE STATION

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 1 of Chapter XXIV of the City Ordinances with reference to the salaries of City Officers be and hereby is amended by adding thereto the following section:

The Janitor at the Fire Station and Opera House at East Rochester, one hundred and sixty dollars per year, payable quarterly from the Salary Department.

RESOLUTION TO PURCHASE ADAMS GRADER

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That the City of Rochester purchase one Adams No. 301 Grader with Snowplow.

That the Highway Committee, the Purchasing Committee and the Highway Commissioner act jointly in making the selection of said Grader:

That the said Committees and the said Highway Commissioner be and hereby are authorized to expend a sum not exceeding forty-five hundred dollars in making said purchase;

That the City of Rochester does hereby make a special appropriation of the sum of not exceeding forty-five hundred dollars to defray the costs incident thereto.

RESOLUTION TO LEGALIZE VOTE OF MARCH 6

Resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That whereas the legality of a certain vote taken at the Council Meeting held on the first Tuesday of March to purchase one Mack truck has been questioned,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the action taken by said City Council to purchase said truck according to the terms of a vote taken and passed at the City Council Meeting held on the first Tuesday of March be and hereby is confirmed; and that all acts authorized by said vote be performed, and that said Mack truck be purchased as in said vote set forth.

RESOLUTION TO PURCHASE NEW PUMP TRUCK

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Resolved that the sum of seventyfive hundred dollars be and hereby is appropriated for the purchase of one six hundred gallon triple combination Challenger Pumper, fire truck with booster tank and standard equipment.

Be it further resolved that the Fire Committee be and hereby is authorized to purchase for and on behalf of said City one six hundred gallon triple combination Challenger Pumper, fire truck with booster tank and standard equipment; that said Committee be and hereby is authorized to purchase such fire truck as in its judgment it may deem for the best interest of said Fire Department of said City and that said Fire Committee is empowered to place the order and do such acts as may be required to complete said purchase.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE DUTIES OF THE CITY MARSHAL

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 5 of Chapter 5, on Police Department, be amended by adding the following thereto:

The City Marshal shall employ such extra police officers as he shall deem necessary for the proper protection and safety of the public.

Passed April 3, 1934.

RESOLUTION OF ANNUAL APPROPRIATION

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That there shall be raised, and there is hereby ordered to be raised, with such overlay as may be found necessary, on the polls and ratable estates within the said City \$276,093.38 to defray the necessary ANNUAL REPORT

expense of the City for the ensuing year, which together with the sums which may be received from various sources shall be appropriated.

Passed April 3, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE \$449.49 FOR McCALLIS-TER CLAIM

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the sum of \$449.49 be appropriated to pay the judgment held by James McCallister against said City for gravel taken for use on highways. This amount to be added to amount already noted to be raised by taxes.

Passed May 1, 1934.

RESOLUTION FOR THE LAYOUT OF RIVER STREET

Whereas a certain lay-out of River Street as laid out September 15, 1913, was accepted and filed away with the plan made at that time, be it resolved that said lay-out be spread upon the records and designated as the proper lay-out of said street and accepted as the sidelines of said street.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT GIFT OF FOUNTAIN FOR GONIC SQUARE

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: Whereas the late Charles Torr did give to the City of Rochester in 1917, a fountain which was received by said City and placed on Meader Park in Gonic Village,

Now, therefore, in token of the citizens' appreciation of the very beautiful gift by Charles Torr be it resolved that the City of Rochester accept the gift of the aforementioned fountain, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Mrs. Bessie B. Torr.

Passed June 5, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE MONEY TO COMPLETE WATER WORKS PROJECT, AS VOTED DE-CEMBER 7, 1933

Resolved by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That whereas it has been found that \$35,000.00 raised on notes of the City January 2, 1934, is not sufficient to complete the Rochester Hill Project, and the installation of a 12-inch Main on the Gonic Road,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that such further sum be expended as may be necessary to install a pipeline on the Gonic Road and that such additional sum, as may be found necessary to complete said project, not to exceed \$24,000.00 be raised on notes of the City.

That the City of Rochester issue its notes bearing interest at the rate of four per cent. per annum payable semi-annually, in such sums as will retire said indebtedness in twenty years from the date of said notes, in accordance with Section 3, Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

That the Water Commissioner of said City of Rochester shall employ all labor required in said work and pay therefor such wages as he may determine.

That the said Commissioner shall employ only such citizens of Rochester as have resided in said City six months or more before their application for employment.

That the Mayor and City Treasurer be and hereby are authorized to sign and execute such notes of the City on its behalf and the City Clerk is authorized to counter sign said notes and said notes shall be paid at the Rochester Trust Company.

That the City of Rochester make sale of said notes to the public in so far as it may seem advantageous to said City to do so, and the Finance Committee of said City is directed to purchase from any funds in said City, such notes as said City may be unable to sell the public.

Passed June 8, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE \$6,600 FOR RELIEF 1934 AND ADD IT TO THE BUDGET

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That the sum of Sixty-six Hundred Dollars be raised by taxation and made a part of the Annual Appropriation as passed April 3, 1934, and the Assessors are hereby authorized to add said amount to the Annual Budget for 1934.

Passed June 8, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO RELAY 2-IN. MAIN ON OLD DOVER ROAD WITH 6-IN. C. I. PIPE

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That whereas by a vote passed Jan. 2, 1934, \$35,000.00 was voted to be raised on notes of the City for the construction of a tank, pumping station and pipe lines on Rochester Hill and on French-Hussey and Gonic Roads, and a subsequent vote taken at Special Meeting June 8, \$24,000.00 additional was voted to be raised on notes of the City to complete both projects.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that as both projects are completed and there remains a substantial balance, that so much of said balance as may be necessary be used for a relay of the two-inch main on the Old Dover Road with a 6-inch main and the installation of necessary hydrants along said line.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE ADDITIONAL STOP SIGNS

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 3 of Chapter XIV of the City Ordinances as heretofore amended on June 2, 1931, be further amended by adding thereto the following:

All vehicles on Central Ave. shall be brought to a stop on Central Avenue before entering Portland Street from Central Avenue.

All vehicles on Front Street shall be brought to a stop on Front Street before entering Portland Street from Front Street. All vehicles on Silver Street shall be brought to a stop on Silver Street before entering Portland Street from Silver Street.

All vehicles on School Street shall be brought to a stop on School Street before entering Portland Street from School Street.

All vehicles on Washington Street shall be brought to a stop on Washington Street before entering North Main Street from Washington Street.

All vehicles on Jackson Street shall be brought to a stop on Jackson Street before entering North Main Street from Jackson Street.

All vehicles on Pleasant Street, East Rochester Village, shall be brought to a stop on Pleasant Street before entering Grove Street, East Rochester Village from Pleasant Street.

All vehicles on Pine Street shall be brought to a stop on Pine Street before entering North Main Street from Pine Street.

All vehicles on Mill Street in East Rochester Village shall be brought to a stop on Mill Street before entering Main Street, East Rochester, from Mill Street, East Rochester.

Passed September 5, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO HAVE PLANS AND SPECIFI-CATIONS FOR EXTENSION OF SEWERAGE SYSTEM

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That George D. Dame, Superintendent of Water Works and Sewers, be and hereby is empowered and directed to immediately make a survey and prepare proper plans for a layout and installation of sewers on Portland Street, running easterly from the present installation at McKinley Street, to East Rochester, as well as certain side streets running into Portland Street where in his judgment it seems advisable to install sewers therein; also to make proper survey and layout for the installation of sewers from the present installation running south over Rochester Hill. That said George Dame also prepare specifications and estimate of the cost of making the installations hereinbefore mentioned.

Passed October 2, 1934.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE PAY OF STREET COMMISSIONER

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That paragraph 8 of Section 1, of Chapter XXIV, Salaries of City Officers, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Rochester, be amended by striking out of the second and third lines thereof the words "and two hundred dollars in addition for conveyance used in the discharge of his duties," so that the same as amended shall read as follows:

"The Street Commissioner, fifteen hundred dollars for his services, payable weekly from the highway department."

Passed October 2, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO COMPLETE WORK ON TORR PARK

Resolved: That the Committee on Shade Trees, Parks and Commons be authorized to complete the necessary work on Torr Park, the same to be paid for out of moneys not otherwise appropriated or expended.

Passed October 2, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO RAISE \$30,000.00 FOR SEWERAGE EXTENSION

Resolved by the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester: That thirty thousand dollars be raised by said City by issuing notes therefor as follows:

One one thousand dollar note to be payable December 1, 1936,

One one thousand dollar note to be payable December 1, 1937,

Fourteen one thousand dollar notes to be payable December 1, 1938,

Fourteen one thousand dollar notes to be payable December 1, 1939, and that the rate of interest on said notes be $3\frac{1}{2}\%$, in accordance with Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

That the moneys raised by the sale of said notes be expended by said City for the extension of sewer system of said City as follows: from Silver Street to Western Avenue, across private land to Prospect Street, from Prospect Street to Portland Street, and from Portland Street to Chamberlain Street, including Chamberlain, Prospect, Adams Ave., First and Second Streets, and Western Ave., together with the costs of erection and installation of a pumping station on Western Ave., for the purpose of disposing of the sewerage into the large main on Winter Street;

That so much of said work be undertaken and carried on as can reasonably be done with due regard for conditions of weather under which said work may have to be carried on.

Passed November 13, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR A RELIEF OF-FICE DURING JANUARY 1935.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That a sum not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) be expended in the maintenance of the Relief Office Organization as carried on by the State of N. H., together with the Supervisor and other persons employed therein for one month from the time State Supervision ends.

Passed December 6, 1934.

RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE FOR SEWERAGE EX-TENSION OFF WINTER STREET

That the City of Rochester shall construct and Geo. D. Dame, Supt. of Water Works and Sewers, shall have full charge of the installation of the Extension of said sewer system of said City from Silver Street to Western Ave., across private land to Prospect St. from Prospect St. to Portland St., and from Portland St. to Chamberlain St., including Chamberlain, Prospect, Adams Ave., First and Second Sts., and Western Ave., together with the erection and installation of a pumping station on Western Ave.

That said Geo. D. Dame shall buy for and in behalf of the City all materials and supplies that may be needed in the construction of said sewerage extension.

That he shall engage all the employees, who shall be so far as possible residents of Rochester, who are now on the relief pay roll as maintained by the State of N. H. All other employees required in the construction of said sewerage shall be residents of said Rochester and the wages to be paid shall be determined by Geo. D. Dame.

Passed December 6, 1934.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE FOR STOP SIGN ON MILL STREET, EAST ROCHESTER

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Rochester: That Section 3 of Chapter XIV of the City Ordinances as amended June 2 and Sept. 4, 1934 be further amended by adding thereto another paragraph to read as follows:

All vehicles on Mill St., East Rochester, shall be brought to a stop on said Mill St. before entering Front St.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester:

During the year of 1934 unsettled cases of James McAllister against the City, and Smith and Rumery against the Rochester Trust Company, Rufus and Lillia Shorey, the City of Rochester and Sumner W. Watson individually and as Mayor of the City of Rochester were disposed of.

The matter of McAllister against the City of Rochester came on for a hearing before the Superior Court wherein it was decreed that the City was indebted to McAllister in the sum of four hundred twenty-five dollars, together with costs of Court amounting to twenty-four dollars and forty cents, making a total indebtedness of four hundred forty-nine dollars and forty-nine cents. The amount demanded by McAllister of the City was six hundred and sixteen dollars and forty-seven cents, thereby making a saving to the City of one hundred sixty-six dollars and ninetyeight cents.

The matter of Smith and Rumery of Portland, Maine, against the Rochester Trust Company, Rufus and Lillia Shorey, the City of Rochester, and Sumner W. Watson individually and as Mayor of the City of Rochester, came on for a hearing at Dover. Before said hearing was completed this case was adjusted by agreement of parties.

A petition for abatement of taxes was presented by Maybury Shoe Company, in September, referred to the Committee on Legal Affairs, reported to the Council that the property was properly taxed and that the petitioners were not entitled to an abatement, since which time the petition has been held under consideration for an adjustment between the parties.

The Wyandotte Worsted Company presented a petition for abatement of taxes which was referred to the New Hampshire State Tax Commission for final disposition, and is awaiting their report at the close of this year.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In rendering my report of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1934, I would state that we have been very fortunate in not having many serious fires, but we may not always be so fortunate, therefore, it stands us in hand to be prepared for whatever emergency may arise by having up-to-date equipment.

There have been 18 bell alarms, 119 still alarms, mostly chimney fires, 16 brush and forest fires in the city proper; 10 bell alarms, 4 still alarms, 2 brush and forest fires at East Rochester; 9 bell alarms, 6 still alarms, 17 brush and forest fires at Gonic; making a total of 201 alarms for the year. Out of town calls: We assisted Somersworth,

Out of town calls: We assisted Somersworth, August 20, in their forest fire. We used our pump three hours for them.

March 8 we sent the East Rochester pump to Farmington to pump water in their reservoir which took five hours.

The men at the station have put out 25 fires where some parts of the buildings were afire and 17 automobiles and trucks this year which have saved a lot of bell alarms.

I will recommend that the City purchase 1,000 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " rubber lined double jacket hose as Gonic and East Rochester are lacking for hose. We find our hose is in bad condition.

I will recommend that the City purchase 6 more fire alarm boxes to take the place of the 6 old boxes which are in bad condition. They have been in service a long time.

I will also recommend that the City put another permanent man in the Central Station as a house man. We leave this station with the doors wide open with the siren blowing and nobody to shut it off or to pull back the indicator or answer the telephone.

The City has purchased for the Fire Department this year one 600-gallon pumping car with a booster pump on it, 5 new fire alarm boxes, 10 feet of soft suction hose for the pump, 49 regulation firemen's helmets, 10 coats, 6 play pipes, 500 feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " rubber lined double jacket hose and 2 fire extinguishers.

In behalf of the Fire Department I will take this opportunity to extend our sincere thanks to all those who have been kind and have given to the department to show that they appreciate its good work.

In behalf of the Board of Engineers I will take this opportunity to extend our sincere thanks to all the officers and members of the Fire Department for the promptness in which they have discharged their duties during the past year.

In conclusion I will take this method to thank the Mayor and Fire Committee and Members of the City Council for what they have done for the Fire Department, during the year just ended.

By the detailed report of the librarian we think you will agree with us that the money appropriated by the council, and that received from the endowment funds have been judiciously allocated.

The reference room by minor changes and additional shelving has been made more attractive and better adapted to its purposes. The interior needs renovation throughout, and the building must be painted and minor repairs made.

We wish to repeat our plea made before, that someone interested in the library establish an endowment, the income from which should be used exclusively for repairs and upkeep of the building and thus insure for all time its original attractiveness.

Such an endowment will become not only a monument to the generosity and public spirit of the donor, but will also serve as a worthy inspiration to others interested in making the library an attractive as well as a useful institution.

Again the board and library employees have lost one of their most valuable members in the demise of Willis McDuffee. He had served many years as a trustee, and his unabated interest in the library's development and usefulness made him its most valuable asset. We shall miss his wise counsel and pleasing presence. His service as trustee has been made a part of the permanent record of the board.

We thank the librarian and her assistants for the continued performance of their arduous and sometimes taxing duties.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Rochester Public Library:

Gentlemen:—In spite of smoky walls, dingy woodwork, cramped spaces, inadequate shelving, windows around which the north-east wind blows in, and floors which bear the mark of the ceaseless tread of thousands of feet during the almost thirty years, the library has gone steadily on giving of its treasures to all who apply and adding slowly valuable books to its store.

It has purchased from the income provided by the city and the interest from the John McDuffee, Samuel D. Felker and Jennie Farrington funds 827 books adapted to the needs and requests of the patrons. These books as you will see by the financial report have averaged more than \$1.50 per volume. Many expensive books have been added. This has been made possible by the liberal discounts of book dealers and publishing houses and by taking advantage of cut price offers of such firms as the Union Library Association, Standard Book Company and well known publishers and book For instance, two books which were wanted houses. but which seemed impossible at their original price of \$12.50 each have been purchased this year at less than \$5.00. One of them was Clemenceau's "In the Evening of My Thought."

To the number of books purchased may be added 53 volumes of bound magazines and 123 gifts making the additions for the year 1,103. Duplicate books which could be spared to the number of 153 have been taken from the shelves to make room for new books. These have been given with your permission to a little library in the south. Forty-two books have been worn out and 40 books which have been accumulating on the delinquent lists since 1923 either at the stations or main library have been marked off. Some of these books have been lost or destroyed by patrons and paid for, some missing from the shelves cannot be accounted for, others have been borrowed and not returned. This makes a loss of 235 and the gain for the year 838. The number of accessioned volumes in the library at the close of 1934, 32,203. To this number should be added many unaccessioned pamphlets and hundreds of unbound magazines which have been filed and made accessible by means of periodical indexes to reference students.

For more than one hundred years the citizens of Rochester have had the reputation of being readers. Within the last few years many new families and individuals have come to the city, some of whom stay a while and then move on. Many of these stangers find their way at once to the library. To the readers have gone out, during the year, 100,355 books and to its rooms have come 18,178 readers and students, plus many more who were overlooked during the busy hours. Definite statistics may be found in the table which follows.

In addition to this large number of books which have gone out and come back and the necessary work entailed, the other departments have been carried on with the same attention to detail. Books have been sent to branch libraries and returned and the proper records kept, assistance has been given in reference work, books selected for the required reading of school pupils and members of study clubs. In the children's room a successful summer reading contest was carried on. The circulation records show that 21,566 books were given out from this department an increase of 1,954 over last year.

The need of more room and more shelving is apparent to all who visit the library. The sets of shelves in the reference room and librarian's office and the small inexpensive book cases for book display have relieved the congestion somewhat.

The room may be shabby, paint and varnish may be needed everywhere but the cheerful bindings of interesting books have helped visitors to forget the surroundings. Patrons have been liberal with their praise, the resident who is able to find at the library the books he wants and needs, the summer visitors living near the larger libraries who upon their arrival hasten to the library to obtain books they have been wanting to read, the young stranger who recently borrowed a book which he had tried for several years and at several different libraries to obtain. This is due to the generosity of the city, the gifts of friends and the free hand given to those in charge of the work. It is an inexpensive pleasure as well as an educational privilege which the city is giving to her people, through the library. It is making the people a more intelligent people and giving to each a broader vision through the books and magazines which it provides.

The patrons have shown their appreciation in different ways. Some have brought books, some magazines, sometimes a subscription and sometimes back numbers which would interest a certain class of read-Others have brought flowers to brighten the dark ers. corners. Special mention is due, for the splendid collection of scientific books and magazines owned and used by the late John Abolin, a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and given in his memory by his father Mr. Dick Abolin, also to the Haven Hill Garden Club who made possible in the rooms a succession of flowers from early spring to late autumn, to the Rochester Woman's Club who for many years have given a subscription to the New York Times, to the Mechanic Arts Department of the Rochester High School, for the attractive and convenient set of shelves which it built for the librarian's office. For all gifts and words of appreciation I express the grateful thanks of entire staff.

Although nominally each member of the staff is in charge of some particular branch of the work, the entire group work together in a spirit of general helpfulness whenever the needs of the hour demand it. At this time my praise and appreciation goes forth to each member of the staff. We are taught that a chain is only as strong as its weakest link. There are no weak links on the library staff.

I wish also to thank you, members of the Board of Trustees, for your kindness, your encouragement and your appreciation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

The annual report of the Rochester School Department submitted herewith is the second under my supervision and the forty-third in the series. In this report there are presented for your consideration certain statistical information, an account of the princ.pal accomplishments of the past year, my recommendations for the coming year, and such general discussion as will present the main facts usually desired by a supporting public.

THE HIGH SCHOOL

The work of the high school will be covered in detail by the report of Headmaster Elwood S. Fraser, but there are some important topics which merit presentation from the point of view of the superintendent.

During recent years, school administrators have been faced with the problems of ever increasing high school enrollment and an altogether too extensive withdrawal from high school before the completion of the four-year course. Increased enrollment is due to less available employment for those who have finished elementary schools and to a growing public realization of the desirability of continued school training. Extensive withdrawal during the first two years of the high school course is caused by a poor start, insufficient guidance, and failure to find a type of work suited to individual taste and ability. Our procedure since last June gives full recognition to these causes and appears to be meeting with satisfactory success.

Since many of the first-year pupils are in school because they were unable to find profitable employment, it follows that our offerings must be of a nature to meet their actual needs and hold their interest to the point where they will retain school membership. The same need is equally great with those who have come to us from choice. That need was met by a new and liberalized high school program which requires only four years of English and includes the statutory requirement of one year of United States History; all other work to complete the sixteen units necessary for graduation is elective and subject only to due regard to major and minor departmental work. The old plan of arranging work under five different courses, each having its own narrow limitations, was abandoned. Moreover, two new subjects were made available for first-year pupils.

But the mere offering of a more attractive program cannot insure improvement; wise assistance and direction in the choice of electives must be practiced. The superintendent visited each eighth grade room in June to discuss high school work and to answer questions. That was followed by an evening meeting where pupils and parents had an opportunity to meet a committee of high school teachers for further discussion and assistance. Advice as to electives was based upon the previous scholastic record of the pupil and the vocational interest expressed. In spite of these precautions there are occasional wrong choices of subjects but the likelihood of such occurrences is made less.

A proper choice of work is of hardly more importance than a favorable introduction to high school life. For the purpose of such introduction all eighth-grade pupils were allowed to visit one session of the high school to observe the actual operation of the schedule of which they were to become a part. With the feeling of strangeness thus dissipated it was easier for the high school teachers, assigned to do special guidance work, to make a friendly approach.

The absence of departmental instruction in grades seven and eight throws pupils into an entirely new high school situation which presents a hazard that cannot be avoided. All of their lives they have been instructed by one teacher in all subjects and have been directed by her in the preparation of their work. In high school this is changed when they usually have a different instructor in each subject and less explicit direction in the plan and execution of their work. To overcome this hazard, high school teachers have been requested to maintain a sympathetic attitude that fully recognizes the trying situation in which each individual finds himself. These attempts have effected a material reduction in the number of cases of withdrawal from high school without adequate reason.

PROMOTION OF HEALTH

The work of the School Nurse is the most important single item in our program of health preservation and promotion. Her whole time is given to school visiting where weighing and measuring pupils, the examination of eyes, temporary treatment of injury, and nutrition work make up her principal duties. Her intimate knowledge of individual pupils plays a prominent part in procuring special opportunities in worthy cases. The following condensed statement taken from her annual report shows an extensive and varied activity.

The enumeration of defects found presents a striking picture of the challenge and the opportunity that confront us. The report is based on examinations in the current school year and depicts conditions that now exist even after the corrections recorded since her last report in 1934 for the school year beginning July 1, 1933.

The bright spot in her report is found in the number of corrections accomplished. Members of the dental and medical professions have been most generous in their response to stated needs and the assistance given by the Rochester Kiwanis Club is deserving of equal commendation.

Nutrition work has consisted largely of encouraging the use of more milk, purchasing hot noon lunches either with private funds or federal assistance, and the presentation of information about proper food. It is my hope that even more may be accomplished through the medium of schoolroom health talks by the Nurse on timely subjects. Malnutrition is commonly thought of as due to lack of sufficient food but, as a matter of fact, it is too often due to an unwise choice of foods. Again, it is most often associated with limited finances but it is prevalent among the children of the well-to-do as well as with those of smaller means.

At the present time there are a large number of children who regularly purchase milk through their own means and sixty-two have been given federal milk during November and December of the present school year. The continuance of federal assistance during the winter of 1935 is assured. Our allotment of milk for November and December was seventy-five per cent of that supplied in the winter of 1934.

During the three coldest months of 1934, January, February, and March, hot lunches were prepared and served in every school except one where the need was not felt. The teachers deserve credit for the enthusiastic interest they showed in this important piece of health work, and those teachers who procured improved lunch facilities for their buildings are especially deserving of praise. We expect to serve hot lunches again in the winter of 1935.

There is much yet to be done to further dental education and acceptance of the fact that preventive work is preferable to remedial measures. With the opportunities now available we can hardly scratch the surface of dental work needed in our schools. We shall, however, hopefully look forward to the time when more adequate dental service will be a regular part of our school health promotion. The suggestion is here made that we shall do well to look carefully into the advisability of establishing a dental clinic in one of our school buildings where the public school children of our city may receive necessary treatment.

SAFETY EDUCATION

If we accept the principle that the function of our schools is to prepare boys and girls to take a useful and efficient part in community life, then we shall agree that safeguarding our children against present day hazards cannot be neglected. In March 1934 a committee of Rochester teachers undertook the preparation of a program of safety education for grades one to four. The work they did has been put in mimeographed form and placed in the hands of all teachers of those grades. After being tried and improved by revision and suggestion our program will be adopted for regular use unless a better one is available when the committee appointed by the Educational Council reports. The work of the Rochester teachers antedates by several months a similar undertaking by a state committee.

PAGEANTS

Pupils of the Allen School last spring presented a school pageant which received very favorable comment. These occasions bring parents into close and friendly contact with the schools and may well be utilized to convey valuable information. Children, who participate lose much of their self-consciousness and feel more at ease in social gatherings outside of school. It is my hope that at least two other schools may present similar events centered around a theme appropriate to health teaching.

BOOK (LIBRARY) CLUBS

For a great many years we have been told that our schools can achieve real success only when the work of those schools approximates life situations that must be faced by young people when school days are past. With equal force we have been told that subject matter and procedure must be vitalized to the point where pupils will not consider their work as something to be tucked away and never used outside the schoolroom. It has been a pleasure to observe the operation of book or library clubs in many of our schools. These clubs give practical training in the orderly conduct of a group, election of officers, expression of opinions, and they arouse genuine interest in worth while reading. For dignity and propriety these meetings furnish us all with a pattern worthy of imitation as the young members gain familiarity with courteous practices of adult life.

PUPIL GOVERNMENT

As I look back over my public school experience two things stand out prominently: the resentment frequently aroused when the public schools attempt a new procedure, and later criticism because they have not better prepared pupils to meet the actualities of life. It is my belief that school people too often overlook the fundamental principle that proper functioning of any individual or group comes as a result of practice and not by means of any miraculous change experienced when school days are ended.

It has been both gratifying and interesting to watch the progress of an experiment in pupil government as conducted in one of our schools. Having organized such a movement in my former school system in 1917 and appreciating the value of such training to the pupils it has been a pleasure to note its development here. Lest anyone should be misled into believing that their complete control is placed in the hands of the pupils themselves we hasten to state that responsibility is given to children only as they prove ability properly to assume it. Should any pupil object to being under pupil government he has only to state his objection and henceforth he is answerable to his teacher as though no such plan existed. We are not attempting to side step any duty or responsibility but are merely trying to permit a reasonable amount of experience and practice in the self-restraint that every worthy citizen must observe in adult life. It is an honest endeavor to prepare for the actualities of life too often neglected.

PUPIL PROMOTIONS

Promotion furnishes a perennial problem distressing alike to parents and to teachers. With the hope that some misunderstandings may be corrected the following statements are offered. In reaching a decision about doubtful cases of promotion the only thing which counts is the best interest of the child. No other consideration is worthy of being entertained. All known facts about the individual are weighed and the decision eventually made is what we sincerely believe will most help the child. While it is true that no pupil should be held back if there is a chance that he may be successful in the next grade, it is equally true that there is no justification for condemning a child to work for which he is not fitted. Whenever we yield to sentiment or to argument and promote a child to the next grade before he has built a suitable foundation we do him an injustice. Such a course is no more defensible than setting a freezing man at work cutting cord wood with a hatchet when only an axe will suffice.

PUPIL TRANSFERS

There are two aspects of pupil transfers that are of public interest, one of which arouses adverse criticism and the other equally great satisfaction.

It often happens that overcrowding in a given room produces an unwieldy and unsatisfactory condition both for the teacher and the pupils. It may be true that, at the same time, another room of the same grade, but in a different school, has a registration sufficiently low to warrant a balancing of membership by transfer. When that is requested, we always select those pupils whose walking distance will be least affected by the change. Cooperation of parents is solicited in preference to an arbitrary assignment even though it is unquestionably within the rights of the superintendent.

There have been many cases of removal of families from one school territory to another which would result in transfer of pupils unless parents request otherwise. Since we believe it good policy to allow school attendance to continue without interruption, all requests that children be permitted to finish the year in the school of first registration will be granted when room enrollment warrants.

BUDGET ESTIMATES

The information contained in this discussion is primarily for schoolboard members. When the annual budget is presented to the respective committees for their decision as to recommendations to be made to the Finance Committee, the estimates are itemized as accurately as the office can predict future needs. Since such estimates are necessarily based on expected rather than experienced needs it may easily happen that the actual expenditure of any committee budget cannot closely follow the original statement.

Reasonable flexibility in budget expenditure is the only way we can meet unforeseen situations and best serve the interests of our schools. When the proposed budget is reduced by the Finance Committee it is inevitable that there must be reduction in the amount spent for certain specified purposes and complete elimination of others.

INSURANCE

Insurance on school buildings was put on a schedule basis in the spring of 1934 and the amount of protection raised to \$300,000. This insurance was awarded in amounts of \$75,000 each to four insurance agencies as enumerated in the insurance table which appears elsewhere in this report. The two principal advantages of schedule insurance are more ample protection and a fixed annual premium.

An entirely new departure in insurance for this department was the purchase of liability insurance on vehicles transporting pupils. Unlike fire insurance premiums the annual premiums for liability vary from year to year according to the types of vehicles used and the prevailing rates. Both parents and drivers enjoy greater security under this plan.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE

During the summer of 1934 a fairly extensive repair program was put through as specified below:

At East Rochester the building was painted one coat outside, one roof was renewed, another was repaired, the hand rails on porch stairs strengthened, and one porch floor patched. No interior painting or desk repair work was done.

At Gonic all desks badly in need of refinishing were buffed and varnished, window sash was puttied, broken glass set, lunch room tables were varnished, and new outside doors were put at both entrances.

In the Allen School desks with rough surfaces were buffed and dressed with Tropelite, a varnish-like preparation impervious to acid or ordinary heat and much harder than varnish. Broken glass was set and all sash puttied. Broken window cords were replaced with metal chain. Ceilings in the teachers' rooms were whitened and a book closet was made for grade seven. Both entrances were painted and the steps in the rear of the building were completely renewed.

At School Street, all sash was puttied where necessary, glass was set, and broken sash cords were replaced by chain. Protective screens were built for rear basement doors. Selected desks were buffed and all desks throughout the building were dressed with Tropelite. Metal weather strip was put on all windows in the rooms occupied by grades three and six. The greater ease with which heating is accomplished indicates that it was a profitable expenditure. The School Street building is now 100 per cent. weather stripped.

While the Maple Street furniture was in fairly good condition as a whole the finish was worn through so that bare wood was exposed to wear and stains, and it was deemed best to apply Tropelite to both chairs and desks. Outside doors and entrances were painted. Necessary glass was set. A coal pen door was built for the basement. The wood floors were dressed with Myco-Sheen which does not discolor or darken them and is easier to care for than an oiled surface.

At the High School only a limited amount of repair work was done. That work consisted of buffing and varnishing some of the desks, and puttying window sash principally in the assembly hall.

My report in 1934 pointed out the advisability of maintaining a progressive and fairly extensive repair program in order that our school buildings may be kept in an economically good condition. With the exception of the East Rochester building there is not a school house that would not be preserved and greatly improved by a coat of paint in the summer of 1935. However, the principal repair item is to put a new roof on the high school building where the old roof has outlived its guarantee and requires frequent patching when ceiling damage reveals leaks.

All buildings were kept warm during the Christmas vacation and considerable painting was done in them, especially at the High School. We were thus able to make some minor repairs, to avoid frozen pipes with the consequent delay and expense, and to keep the buildings free from the period of defrosting that was experienced a year ago. It seems to me that we are following a policy in the care of our public buildings which we would all accept as the best for our own dwellings.

A careful inspection of our school grounds has convinced me that we can landscape a portion of every school yard without sacrificing needed play space. The educational advantage of so doing hardly permits of argument. Children are appreciative of beauty and their response is better when they can take actual pride in the appearance of their school grounds. It is recommended that one school yard be landscaped each year until all of our elementary school yards have been improved.

ASSISTANT TEACHER AT EAST ROCHESTER

Miss Marie Nixon was engaged as assistant teacher at East Rochester for such time as the enrollment in Miss Davis's room remains too large for one teacher to handle and do justice to all pupils. She devotes her time every forenoon to work in grades four and five. Her term of service began Monday, September 24, 1934.

SUMMER PLAYGROUNDS

Mr. Maurice O'Learv was not able to assume the duties of instructor at Dominicus Hanson Pines for the summer of 1934 and that work was ably conducted by Mr. Albert Bickford. The work of protecting and instructing young swimmers who frequent the park is one of unusual importance but not the only undertaking that ought to engage our attention. Many people both old and young would probably make extensive use of the recreation grounds if adequate provision were made for other activities besides swim-There is a real need for more playground ming. apparatus than is now available. In my opinion the construction of such apparatus, employment and direction of a Playground Supervisor, and general supervision of the "Pines" more properly belong to the appropriate committee of the City Council than to the School Department.

EVENING SCHOOL

In one of my regular monthly reports to this Board the opinion was expressed that Rochester ought to reestablish the Evening School for adults even though government subsidy may be withdrawn. That opinion is now expressed in the form of a recommendation that the Board vote to organize an evening school in the fall of 1935, with federal assistance if possible, but as an independent proposition if necessary.

SCHOOL CALENDAR

The next suggested school calendar proposes a change in the date of opening of school in September. It is recommended that the opening day be Wednesday after Labor Day instead of Tuesday as now specified in the Rules and Regulations. The reasons for so advising are here briefly stated: (1) The first week of school is always one of organization and no loss would be felt by changing to Wednesday. (2) Tuesday afternoon or evening ought to be available for a teachers' meeting before schools actually open. (3) Teachers would thus be able to spend the whole of Labor Day with their families, returning to Rochester on Tuesday.

In this, my second annual report, I wish to state that my early favorable impressions of Rochester are fully maintained. The cooperation of the School Board and the loyal support of the teachers merit sincere appreciation.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Arthur S. Rollins, Superintendent of Schools, Rochester, N. H.:

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report as Headmaster of the Rochester High School. The purpose of this report is to give a review of the work of the school during the past year—how the old activities have been modified, what new activities have been introduced, and with what result, and to point out the immediate needs of the school together with such records as are likely to furnish a valid basis for comparison from year to year.

The suggestions made in my previous report that we adopt a testing and guidance program, that the curriculum be enriched by courses in social and physical science, and that the program of studies composed of academic, commercial, general, household arts, and mechanic arts courses, be replaced by a program in which only two subjects, English and United States History, are required, and in which all other subject matter is elective, have been carried out as follows:

During the spring of 1934 standard tests in Mental Ability, English, and Chemistry were given to seniors, and this school year we are cooperating with the Scott, Foresman Company in giving a series of standard unit tests in General Science. A little later in the year we will be able to determine the progress we are making in the above subjects by comparing our scores with the standards furnished by the publishers. This year all teachers are giving written tests at the completion of each unit of work. These tests are the newer type of examinations, such as the true-false tests, the completion test, the best-answer test, and the instruction test, and also the old type of essay test. The above tests will be substituted for mid-year and final examinations.

The State Program of Studies on Guidance states that the work in guidance of the public high school should be, first, to hold up constantly before the pupils the idea that one day they must choose a worth while occupation; second, to get acquainted with them individually, learn their peculiarities, their ambitions, their secret hopes and aspirations; third, to direct them into studies and other school activities which they will enjoy and from which they will derive a maximum amount of good; fourth, to replace any worthless ambitions they may have by more worth while purposes; and fifth, to introduce a revised course of study involving subjects which will hold the attention and interests of pupils.

In order to successfully carry out the above objectives in guidance we decided that we must substitute a new system of office records for the inadequate old one that had been in use for many years. A new record system was purchased from the Visible Records Equipment Company of Chicago. We have on file in the high school office the following information in regard to each pupil: (1) Information relating to his home and family, (2) information in regard to his interests and activities, (3) his grade school record, (4) his high school record, (5) his educational and vocational plans, (6) information in regard to his attitudes and traits, (7) his health record, (8) his attendance record, (9) his conduct record, (10) his study habit record, (11) a record of his activities, honors, awards, prizes, etc., (12) his Mental Ability Record. We intend to use and are using the above records as an aid in our guidance work. It is my belief that there is no substitute for the actual personal interview. Each home room teacher is requested to plan for one conference period with each pupil each term. The headmaster plans to and is having personal conferences as occasion arises and time permits. In addition to our personal guidance work we have developed group guidance. We carry this on at special assemblies where the pupils have an opportunity to hear successful men analyze various occupations so as to make plain which are truly productive and which are more or less parasitic in their nature, and through our home room organizations where we bring before the pupils the idea that they must one day become citizens of the communityto sell to him the idea of being a useful, productive, helpful citizen.

By means of personal and group conferences with pupils and parents we have given information about school courses and subjects, the significance of various elective choices, data about educational opportunities, data regarding personal aptitudes, information on how to get further helpful data, and we have advised pupils in regard to the study of their assignments.

The greatest aid to our work in guidance was the modification and enrichment of our program of studies. On the other hand, without guidance, the new program could not have been developed into a successful experiment in meeting the needs and interests of our pupils. The following program has been effective since September 1934.

Note: Sixteen units are required for graduation. Pupils must elect two major subjects of three units each and one minor subject of two units. Elective subjects must be approved by the headmaster. Every pupil must take four subjects each year, and may take five subjects with the approval of the headmaster. By unit is meant a single study or subject pursued not less than four periods per week for one school year. Pupils should choose the electives that will prepare them for the work they plan to do after high school, and they are requested to confer with their home room adviser in regard to electives.

confer with their home room adviser in regard to electives. Two new subjects—General Science and Community Civics —are introduced in the above program. There are 94 pupils enrolled in General Science and 24 in Community Civics.

It is too early to formulate any definite opinion in regard to the effectiveness of the changes we have made. The general opinion of teachers and pupils is that the final results will be most satisfactory. At the close of the first ranking period in October a very detailed study of pupil achievement was made. The results are as follows:

In 1932-1933, 13% of our pupils failed and the state median was 8.9. In 1933-1934, 9% of our pupils failed and the state median was 7.4.

The above ranks were graphed and a graphical study was also made of the correlation between high school and grade ranks in English, Arithmetic, and Mental Ability for ninth grade pupils. Due to the addition of new subject matter and the increase in enrollment a change in our time schedule from six forty-five minute periods to seven forty minute periods was made. At assemblies, due to lack of room, we are unable to accommodate the entire school. Three classes attend and one class remains in the home rooms. Due to the fact that we have only two small laboratories which are overcrowded, one class in General Science is unable to do the required amount of laboratory work.

In so far as possible we have tried to schedule one supervised study room each period. The seven period schedule has helped in this respect. We still have a great many pupils studying in rooms where recitations are going on.

During the past three months all of the books have been re-catalogued by the office practice girls under the direction of Mr. Maxam. As there is no library in the school, it is very difficult to keep account of the supplementary reference books that are in the classrooms. It is necessary for us to check these books each day.

The most difficult part of our work during the past three months has been our attempt to revise our methods of teaching subjects to the extent that we will be able to hold the attention and interests of the pupils. In our teachers meetings and through continued study we are attempting to determine the teaching procedure that will bring about the most satisfactory results. We believe that the work in the classroom is the most important work of the school. We also believe that if our new program of guidance and our revised program of studies are allowed to overshadow our classroom teaching that our efforts will be in vain. There is a very grave danger that this will happen in the near future. At the present time due to too heavy a teaching load it is impossible for the headmaster to spend his time during school hours doing what should be the most important work in the school, the supervisory guidance of teachers and pupils, and the work of the school.

I believe that the work of the coming months should be a continuation of what we are now doing. I feel that we should spend our time in perfecting and evaluating our present work rather than in introducing additional new projects. Our program of studies is well balanced except for the sophomore year. I have the following recommendations to make for the school year 1935 to 1936:

In order to meet entrance requirements for hospitals and colleges a course in biology should be added to the work of the sophomore year.

A science teacher should be engaged to teach all work in science. At the present time we do not have any teacher on the faculty who is qualified by education and experience to teach chemistry, biology, physics, and general science.

Room 14 should be made into a laboratory for general science and biology.

As the assembly hall is not large enough to accommodate all of the pupils at an assembly, I suggest that desks and seats be placed in it, so that it may be used as a home room in place of room 14, as a study hall each period of the day, and as an assembly room large enough to accommodate one half of the school.

There is an overlapping of the work in History of Civilization and Medieval and Modern History. I suggest that a course in Modern History be substituted for the course in Medieval and Modern History.

Pattern Making as a trade is rapidly disappearing. We are offering a course in Pattern Making for 10 periods per week for 38 weeks. I suggest this for future consideration.
