TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - 3. To elect one Selectman for three years.
 - 4. To elect one Library Trustee for three years.
- 5. To elect one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
- 6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money upon the credit of the Town, and to determine the amount of such borrowing.
- 8. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors and Officers heretofore chosen.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to install one street light on pole opposite the entrance to the "Samuel Dimond Farm", on Warner Road, or do anything in relation thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will take any action for refinancing note now held by the Franklin Savings Bank.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to return to the former system of ten road surveyors, and to have all surveyors appointed at its March election.
- 14. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase fire fighting equipment.
- 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

The school board's estimate for support of Schools for the coming year is \$2.00 more than last year. Other Statutory Requirements are \$139.32 more than last year, (the estimate for high school tuition being \$150.00 more, with a small decrease in two other items). Thus the total budget shows an increase of \$141.32.

While the Legislature has not yet determined the amount to be appropriated for State Aid to Schools, it seems at this time unlikely that Salisbury will receive any money from the state next year.

This loss in revenue of \$145.94 and a deficiency appropriation of \$100.00 asked for this year in place of \$250.00 raised last year makes the total to be raised this year \$137.26 more than was raised last year.

Both schools are in charge of new teachers this year. Both are trained teachers with considerable experience. With the homes and schools cooperating our children should have a profitable year.

The attendance table shows another improvement in percent of attendance and in tardiness.
