

The old schoolhouse in School District #1 has been known at various times as the West, Gove, Hoyt's Road and Crowtown School.

The West School, in late years known as the Crowtown School, was built prior to 1760, when that part of Seabrook was known as Hampton Falls. Records of Hampton Falls for the year 1760 show, "Pd. for schooling on Hoyt's Road f25.0s.3P."

Hoyt's Road was named for Capt. Ephraim Hoyt who lived there. The road later became known as the New Boston Road. At the present most of this road is not used but the Seabrook Zoning map still shows a trail from the New Zealand Road through woods to Kensington, called the Old New Boston Road.

The schoolhouse was originally located on the corner of the New Boston Road and True Road. About 1860 it was moved to the south side of New Zealand Road opposite Weare Road(at one time known as Johnson's Lane) at the present-day entrance to the Yankee Greyhound Race Track.

This one room schoolhouse measured 30 by 40 feet. The framework was entirely of oak with a clapboarded exterior and wooden shingles on the roof. The interior walls were of plaster. Desks were installed when the building was moved about 1860. Previously, the students sat on plain wooden benches.

The schoolmaster's desk of this early period can be seen on the left side of an interior photo of the school taken in 1902. This print was reproduced in the 1968 Seabrook Commemorative Book. It is believed to be the original. The Historical Society of Seabrook purchased this desk at the Gove Farm auction on New Zealand Road in 1982.

The Crowtown School was the only school ever built in School District # 1, which comprised all of the area west of New Zealand Hill(now west of Rt. 95).

The children attending classes here were primarily from the Cilley, Fogg, Gove, Johnson, True and Weare families. In 1880, a school register was kept by teacher Ellen F. Maxfield. The two terms were from April 12 to June 25 and from August 2 to October 1. The school was closed during the winter due to the severe weather and the distance the children had to walk.

In 1880, the following children were recorded as having attended the "Gove School:"

In 1889, the school closed for four years due to the small amount of students in the area. It reopened in 1893 and sessions were held until 1912 when the school was permanently closed. It had been privately owned at one time by the Gove family. It was given to the town of Seabrook by Edward L. Gove (1826-1891), a birth-right Quaker. (When the Quaker Meeting House was closed at Seabrook, the Quakers living in West Seabrook held meetings here occasionally.) When the school was abandoned in 1912, the town returned it to the Gove Family. The school board presented it to Edward L.'s son, Charles E. Gove (1870-1956).

The schoolhouse was burned by an incendiary on October 9, 1949, at 3 am.

The 1982 Town Report is dedicated to Anthony T. Randall in memory of his service to the town of Seabrook.

Anthony was born in Seabrook on June 3, 1906, the son of Wallace I. Randall (1868-1941) and Josephine Fowler (1872-1950). He was the forth generation of Randalls to have lived in Seabrook, the first having settled here around 1830.

Mr. Randall made his living first as a shoemaker, working at the Mayfair in Newburyport, then as a lobster fisherman and finally as a clam shucker. He was married to Norma P. Fowler and they were the parents of 8 children.

Anthony served as Seabrook's Representative to the General Court at the State House in Concord from 1968 to 1978. During that time he served as a member of the Fish and Game Committee. He also was a member of the Seabrook Planning Board and the Seabrook Solid Waste Committee.

Mr. Randall was the third generation in his family involved in town affairs. His grandfather, George W. Randall (1839-1922), a veteran of the Civil War, was Town Clerk (1870-72), a Selectman (1892-93), State Representative (1879-80), and Supervisor of the Checklist (1901-12). His father, Wallace I. Randall, was Town Moderator (1913-14), Overseer of the Poor (1908-15), Selectman (1931-33), Auditor (1914,1921-22, 1929-31), and the Sealer of Weights and Measures (1904-10, 1912-14).

ARTICLE 13: "To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to be known as the "Sewer Fund" for the purpose of designing and constructing a municipal sewer system or sewerage treatment works including the purchase of land therefore, and to raise and appropriate the sum of ONE MILLION (\$1,000,000.00) DOLLARS to be deposited in said Fund".

ARTICLE 14: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and enter into a contract with any solid waste facility, or the operator thereof; or with other towns, cities, or unincorporated places for the purpose of providing a long term solution for the collection, separation, and/or recycling of refuse, garbage and waste. Said contract shall be upon such terms, including terms of years, minimum deliver amounts, and costs, as the Selectmen determine are in the best interest of the Town. To the extent that the Town has voted to authorize the Selectmen to enter into any specific contract for the disposal of the Town's solid waste, and said contract has not been executed, then said vote is hereby rescinded and revoked".

Motion by James S. Eaton, second by Walter I. Randall, to adopt Article 14 as read.

ARTICLE 14 ADOPTED

ARTICLE 15: "On petition of Roy F. Shiepe and Nine (9) other voters of the Town: At the 1981 Town Meeting, the people voted to appropriate the sum of \$18,500.00 for the purchase of a giant beach rake that could be pulled behind a tractor and keep the beach clean.

Further investigation revealed that it would be more economical and far better in the long run to get one that was individually motorized.

It is hereby petitioned that an additional amount of \$7,000.00 be added to the aforementioned amount so that a completely self-sufficient unit can be purchased".

ARTICLE 18: "To see if the Town will authorize the Planning Board to review site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses, or for multi-family dwelling units other than one and two-family dwellings, whether or not such development includes a subdivision or re-subdivision of the site, under the provisions of RSA 36:19a(Supp.)".

Motion by James Champoux, second by James S. Eaton to adopt Article 18 as read. (State law has changed, granting the Planning Board permission to do this.)

ARTICLE 19: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of THREE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED (\$3,500.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of purchasing a pressure/hot water cleaner for use by all Town departments. Said cleaner is to be operated and maintained by the Highway Department".

Motion by James S. Eaton, second by Walter I. Randall to adopt Article 19 as read.

ARTICLE 19 ADOPTED

ARTICLE 20: "To see what action the Town Will take on the following question: Are you in favor of abolishing the Parks Commission as established by vote of the Town on March 13, 1948, and consolidating all its duties and appropriations in the Recreation Commission established by vote of the Town on March 14, 1980"?

Motion by Robert Cushing Jr., second by Elizabeth Thibodeau to postpone Article 20 indefinitely.

ARTICLE 23: "On petition of Eric N. Small and one hundred seventy-seven (177) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town of Seabrook will raise and appropriate the sum of ONE HUNDRED SEVENTY THOUSAND (\$170,000.00) DOLLARS for the purchase of the 3.1 acre lot which surrounds the Old South Meetinghouse on the corner of Route 107 and Lafayette Road for historical and civic purposes".

Motion by Eric N. Small, second by Bruce Brown to adopt Article 23 as read.

ARTICLE 23 ADOPTED

ARTICLE 24: "On petition of Lydia M. Gould and nine (9) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of FOURTEEN THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED (\$14,900.00) DOLLARS for the following improvements at the Brown Library: installing storm windows, putty outside windows, carpeting the reference loft, painting the exterior, rebuilding the outside porch rail and drain pipe, and renovating the basement into a children's reading room".

SELECTMAN'S REPORT

The past year proved a very good one in regards to the Town's continuing search for water. The construction of the pumping station adjacent to Route 107 was the final step in a two year effort to locate and develop a high-yeild rock well water source. The pumping station has facilities to handle four wells, although the wellfield presently has only three developed wells. Pumping capacity is estimated by the water engineers at 1.6 million gallons per day. This is a significant increase over the Town's previous pumping capacity. The Town now has the ability to meet it's peak demand in the summertime without the necessity of a water ban.

In addition, the older gravel-packed wells can now be rested, decreasing the wear and tear on those pumps and allowing the wells to recharge for the first time in many years. It should be realized that the Town was in a bad position with regards to water supply. The new wells have helped, but demand will continue to increase. Therefore, the Town must continue to work towards insuring a steady supply in the years to come.

The purchase of the land known as Seabrook Beach was another highlight of 1982. Through its work with the members of the Ocean-side Community Association, the Board was able to negotiate a purchase and sales agreement which insures the townspeople the use of the beach while protecting the rights of the beachfront owners. Seabrook is now assured of having a waterfront which its people can be proud of for all time.

Another significant property purchase was the land around the Old South Meetinghouse. This 3.1 acre parcel was approved for purchase for civic and historical purposes. Although no plans have been made for the development of this parcel, the Town is lucky to have such an asset for consideration in meeting the future needs of the town.

The major construction for this year was the Community Center, scheduled for completion in October of 1983. The 1.2 million dollar project will provide the Town with a fine recreation facility for use by all age groups. Activities will include all sports and games in the gymnasium and game room, plus areas for activities of the senior citizens, special events in the all-purpose rooms, and kitchen and locker room facilities. The Recreation Commission has presented a buget which will provide ample activity time with proper supervision. We hope all citizens will utilize this facility and make it a true asset to the community.

1982 saw major changes in the area of insurance protection. The board hired an insurance consultant to study our present policies, evaluating them as to the amount and type of coverage, gaps in coverage, liability limits, and cost of coverage. Based on the recommendations of the consultant, the property and liability insurance were put out to bid. Through the bid process, the Town was able to get a better price for its insurance coverage. The consultant also

recommended increasing our liability limits to protect the Town from the ever-increasing frequency of lawsuits. The resultant insurance package provides far better coverage of the Town's assets.

Two other major changes to the insurance program were the addition of the Town Hall and the Community Center, and a switch in worker's compensation coverage. The latter coverage was placed with the N.H. Municipal Trust, a non-profit group, composed of municipalities and other governmental units in the State. The Municipal Trust has a cooperative program which returns interest and dividends to its members to offset the high cost of workers' compensation insurance. It is hoped this switch will result in a 33% decrease in insurance premiums.

The Town undertook a revaluation of all property in 1982, a task completed in the middle of December. For the first time the Town hired an appraiser to work solely on the power plant, rather than using our own employees. This practice will continue as the size of Seabrook Station continues to grow. The Board would like to offer special thanks to the clerks in the Assessing Department for their efforts in carrying through the process of revaluation.

The town was the fortunate recipient of two grants in 1982. Through the efforts of the Pollution Control Committee, an addendum to the sewerage facilities plan done in 1978 was approved. This means the Town will now have money to complete a facilities plan for sewage disposal. This is an important step, as it provides the Town with valuable data and a sound basis for considering future efforts to establish a municipal sewer system. It also makes the Town eligable for any federal monies which may become available for sewer construction.

The second grant received in 1982 was used to do a study of possible uses of the Public Service Company barge facility, scheduled for removal in 1983. The consultants recommended that the facility be shortened and used as a waterfront recreational area, with provisions for fisherman to moor their boats along the front wall. Articles are being presented in the warrant to put these proposals before the voters.

The past year also saw the organization of a second union in Town. The Seabrook Permanent Firefighters Association, IAFF Local 2847; now represents all fire captains and firefighters in its dealings with the Town. The Board negotiated the first-time contract and has worked hard to protect the Town's right to manage the operations of the Fire Department.

The added time necessary to negotiate contracts, to deal with welfare case loads, and to handle the ever-increasing personal and financial problems brought before the Board point to the fact that Seabrook will never again have the small town government it once had. The Board will continue to devote its energies to insuring that the operations of the Town of Seabrook will keep pace with the demands placed upon it by the Town's citizens.

REPORT FROM YOUTH SERVICES OFFICER

This years end marks the end of the second full year that this town has had a fulltime Youth Services Officer. We have spoken to many students at the Seabrook Elementary School on the subject of School Safety using the "Officer Bill" Safety Program. We have also started using an animated cartoon and coloring book type program called "Patch the Pony" in an effort to make young children aware of the dangers of strangers and to prevent children from becoming the victims of child molestors. This program is designed not to scare the children but to make them aware of the dangers. Visitors to the police station in November and December may have noticed the drawings made by our children of "Patch."

There will be a babysitting program soon in which we hope many youths will attend. We will be trying to teach the responsibilities of babysitting and the safety rules that babysitters should understand. Every youth who successfully completes the course will be issued a certificate.

We have many new bicycles registered in our files to date and we want all parents whose children received new bikes for Christmas or who have not registered their old bikes with us to call the station and set up a time for registration. It only takes 5 minutes and if you cannot come to us we will come to you.

1982 Statistics

- 50 New Juvenile Arrests
- 4 Repeat Juvenile Arrests
- 44 Cases entered into Hampton District Court
- 3 Run-Aways reported from this town, All found or returned home.
- 4 Run-Aways found by local police from other areas.

We have had a reduction in the number of cases brought to the Juvenile Session of the Hampton District Court due to the change in the laws that now allow persons 16 years of age to be brought into adult court on alcohol offenses. The majority of cases in the Hampton District Court resulted in work-type projects ordered to be performed by the youth rather than just fining the parent. This type of finding is working well as we have not to date had a repeat offender who has worked washing cruisers, sweeping or shoveling sand, painting, washing windows... This type of finding we hope will continue as it places the responsibility for delinquent behavior directly with the youth rather than with the parent.

We have in the past had a written agreement with the Exeter Area Youth Group Home, Inc., for the amount of \$4,000.00. We were guaranteed placement for the Seabrook Youths at this home located in Stratham, NH. This worked out very well for the youths whose parents could not handle and that needed extra supervision. As of this report the Exeter Group Home has decided to stop this practice and will charge the Town of Seabrook \$39.00 per day per youth. This contract saved us a total of \$17,000.00 in 1982 as we used the home for 539 resident days. The future usage of the group home will have to be

paid by the town if ordered by the judge; however, the town may seek re-imbursement through the parents according to the statutues.

We have also begun to have problems with vandalism to property once again. Parents should be made aware that they are liable for up to \$10,000.00 for any damage caused by their children. This office will take a strong prosecutive stand on any damage done to either private or public property in an effort to curb this needless occurance.

ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT

The following is a report on the activities of the Animal Control Officer and the results on that activity.

There were sixty-seven (67) tickets written for dogs on the beach, dogs at large and unlicensed dogs bringing into the town one-thousand twenty (\$1,020.00) dollars in fine money.

There were fifty-seven (57) dogs picked up in Seabrook and taken to the kennel. Of these only thirty (30) were claimed by the owners or 53.5%, four (4) or .07% were placed with new owners and the rest, twenty-three (23) or 40.3% were put to sleep because no one claimed them. The dogs that were put to sleep were held an average of 10.3 days instead of the 7 required by law.

There were 17 dogs that were picked up and claimed before they could be taken to the kennel.

There were twelve (12) complaints of cruelty to animals drawn up against 4 people this year three (3) have been arrested and the forth (4th) has a warrent out for him. These were the worst cases of abuse I have seen in my 12 years in the Animal Control Profession. It is hard to believe that any human being could beat a defenseless animal in such a manner. These dogs were tied in their own yard. There was also one complaint of cruelty to animals carried over from last year and it was placed on file without a finding when the case went to Court.

During 1982 there were twenty-two (22) dogs and cats killed by motor vehicles with eighteen (18) of them being after April and the reduction in hours. There were also four (4) dogs hit by motor vehicles. Three (3) of the four (4) dogs died on the operating table.

There has been fifteen (15) dog bites throughout 1982 with fourteen (14) of them occurring after April 1st and the reduction in hours.

The warrent for unlicensed dogs which usually has about one hundred-fifty (150) names on it, was handed to me without any names on it as a result of a new law not requiring the use of the property inventory forms. This made it impossible to find many of the unlicensed dogs that would have normally been found.

I would like to apologize to any of the residents of Seabrook who have had a problem with animals that might have been handled as well as it would have been in the past. It is impossible to provide the same services in one-half $\binom{1}{2}$ the time formally provided. It is my hope that the Animal Control Program will get back to what it was and that the people of Seabrook again have an Animal Control Program that will put a harness on the increasing animal problems.

It was a pleasure to serve as Animal Control Officer for the past forty-two (42) months and I am looking forward to a continued good working relationship with the residents of Seabrook.

I would like to thank all the residents of Seabrook who have been patient with the problems over the past year and for supporting me in trying to provide this service.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

I submit the following report to the Board of Selectman, the citizens and taxpayers of the Town of Seabrook. In the year 1982 the list of accomplishments was as follows:

The total cost of hot topping was \$47,000.00. The work at the beach was done on Haverhill Street, Atlantic Avenue, Ocean Drive to Ashland Street and Plymouth Street. In the remainder of the town hot topping was completed on the lower Farm Lane, the Causeway Street Bridge, Dwight Avenue, Wildwood and Hillside Cemetery, Parkersville Lanc to the parsonage and a section of Farm Lane and Walton Road.

Sidewalks were repaired on South Main Street and swailed for drainage. Sidewalks were repaired for Washington Street to the Rand Church on South Main Street. There was also a drain and a catch basin installed on South Main Street, which was drained onto the marsh.

Collins Street was swailed and drained along the street to Jim Brown's house. A catch basin was piped to the woods. On Farm Lane two catch basins were installed and piped across the road.

Catch basins and drainage were installed on River Street, Plymouth Street, Lowell Street, and Lawrence Street.

Trees were planted at Hillside Cemetery. Many trees were cut and thinned out along Adams Avenue, Stard Road and True Road.

The cemeteries were maintained from May to October.

The beach rake was used all summer on the ocean front and River Street. The seashore was cleaned up from June through Labor Day. The sand dunes and the river front were also cleaned.

A 140 foot long fence was installed on the north side of the land owned by the Town at the Old South Meetinghouse.

I would like to extend the roads on Lower Collins Street, Pine Street, and Ledge Road for emergency purposes, so the fire trucks could use these roads. I would like to improve the drainage on Walton Road by the elementary school and on Collins and Pine Streets.

I am proposing the purchase of a seven foot street sweeper that will be pulled behind a truck to eliminate so much hand sweeping with brooms.

I also would like to purchase a six wheel dump truck, diesel powered with a wing and a plow.

MOSQUITO CONTROL REPORT

The mosquito control program for 1982 commenced in mid-April and terminated on the Labor Day weekend. Employed for the period were two male students from the Essex Agricultural and Technical Institute in Danvers, Mass. majoring in natural resources and environmental sciences, myself as supervisor, and Miss Kathleen Hickey of Seabrook who has been with the program for several summers. As annually required by the New Hampshire State Pesticide Control Board, the entire staff was duly examined, certified, and licensed prior to assuming their duties.

Also as required by the State of New Hampshire, public notices were posted in the Seabrook Post Office and the Town Offices at the start of the season, and residents were further notified through the Newburyport Daily News and Portsmouth Herald.

All known beekeepers in Town were notified by registered mail should they wish their properties avoided during the spray program.

The spring treatment of fresh water breeding sites commenced during the third week of April and was continued as needed throughout the summer.

Larviciding of the many salt marsh breeding sites began in mid-May. During the month of June measurable rain fell on 21 days. The water thus deposited on the marshes, coupled with the normal twice per month tidal flooding, created an abnormal amount of mosquito breeding. It was necessary to inspect and/or treat the breeding sites on a weekly basis to assure that the mosquitoes were exterminated before they could reach the biting stage.

A similar situation existed in the inland or fresh water areas because of the excessive rainfall.

As temperatures were colder than normal during May, there was no noticeable buildup of mosquitoes on the wing until early June. Thus the adulticiding or spraying was not started until the second week in June. The spray route which was the same as in past years, was covered on seventeen occasions as compared to twenty a year ago.

Each week the Board of Selectmen was provided with a report of the previous week's activities and those planned ahead.

The same pesticides were employed as in the past, Cythion 91% ULV for adulticiding, Abate 2G and 4E plus FLIT M-L-O for larviciding. Thirty (30) percent less materials (pesticides) were used in 1982 than in 1981. The breeding potential was as great if not greater than a year ago because of the wet weather, but I feel that the stepped up efforts in surveillance and larviciding while the insects were still in the aquatic stages resulted in a lesser need of spraying from the street.

There were some problem areas which upon investigation proved that some residents were actually producing mosquitoes in great numbers in their own yards. Boats left uncovered, tires, and even such containers as coffee cans and empty beer cans were found producing mosquitoes.

Clogged roof gutters during rainy periods were often heavy breeding sites.

At this writing, the same persons who served the Town in 1982 will be returning for the 1983 program. The cooperation of the Townspeople has been greatly appreciated and we look forward to a successful season ahead.

THE PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Seabrook Planning Board has had a very heavy work load for the past year. Its regular meetings were lengthy, there being informational discussions, preliminary hearings and Public Hearings on Subdivisions and Site Plan Reviews, many of which crowded the midnight hour.

The Board also conducted a lot of special meetings with the Thoresen Group of Portsmouth, planning consultants on the Master Plan. Hundreds of man hours were put into preparing and finalizing it and the Board takes pride in its accomplishment in this endeavor. After the required public hearings the Board approved and adopted the Plan on June 15, 1982, and it is now available for residents at the Town Hall. It contains a great deal of information concerning the growth and progress of the town during the last ten to fifteen years drawn from several previous reports and imput from many citizens and officals. Based on this, it points up the aims and policies which the Board feels will benefit the town in the future and it supports growth and management policies.

In addition to the Master Plan, the consultants prepared a Capital Budget and Improvement Program for the next five(5) years which, if implemented by the Budget Committee, should help to set priorities on large expenditures. They have also drawn up suggested Zoning Regulations, Subdivision Regulations and Site Plan Review Regulations, which the consultants feel would tie in more closely with the aims of the Master Plan than the existing regulations do.

Your Planning Board will be studying these suggestions and will be proposing to the voters those changes that it feels are applicable for the town's welfare. Now that the townspeople have voted to rescined the "Water Moratorium", and the town enjoys a favorable taxrate plus the town's accessibility because of its proximity to several major highways. The Board anticipates a heavier case load in the future and feels it needs to protect the town with a tighter set of site plan review regulations.

The Board has also engaged the Kimball-Chase Co., a consulting firm in Portsmouth, to study methods of providing parking for residents so they may enjoy the benefits of Seabrook's beautiful beaches, and also to study the possibility of improving the present launching ramp at Farm Lane and developing a ramp and recreational facility at "The Rocks", at the end of what was Rock's Road. The consultants will also be working out an acceptable access to "The Rocks".

Because of all the forgoing the Planning Board is expecting a busy 1983; however, it hopes to accomplish this and to continue to serve you to the best of its ability.

1982 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SEABROOK RECREATION COMMISSION

The members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission are:
Vernon Small, Chairman; Diana Randall; Harry Knowles; Charlotte
Dow; Richard Beckman; Walter Randall; and Sal Rubera. The
Commission held regular meetings on the first and third Thursday of
each month, throughout 1982, and with the Recreation Director
carried out many of the goals set in 1981. This included expansion of the leisure programs for residents in Seabrook and capital
improvements of facilities available in Seabrook.

Activities conducted during the first year for youth included a summer playground program with a breakfast and lunch program, youth football program, cheerleading squad, fall session of activities, special events and trips.

One hundred and thirty seven youths enrolled in the Summer Playground Program, participating in arts & crafts, music, drama, indoor sports & games, outdoor sports & games, table games, National Junior Tennis League, trips and special events. Special events included a local track & field meet, state track & field meet, Wheaties Junior Frisbee contest, Little Wagon Show, peanut hunt, bicycle rodeo, Pepsi Hot Shot Basketball program, and parent's night. Trips were taken to Hampton playground for a play day, Pawtuckaway State Park and Hampton Beach. The summer staff consisted of two recreation supervisors, five C.E.T.A. youth workers and vollunteers.

Volunteers, from Seabrook, operated the fall youth football program, "Seabrook Rams", which participated in a seacoast league consisting of six teams. A town cheerleading squad of twelve girls was active in supporting the Rams at their games. The season ended with a banquet where special awards were given to the players, coaches, cheerleaders, and community supporters.

A fall session of youth activities was offered to the youth of Seabrook, for the first time, scheduled on Tuesday through Friday. Activities included recreation games, arts & crafts, indoor sports, swimming lessons and afternoon movies. Staff consisted of the recreation director, part-time instructors and volunteers.

Adult teen activities also were held throughout the year, such as women's fitness, women's volleyball, men's volleyball, and men's basketball. Co-ed volleyball, Craft Workshop and swimming lessons were started during the fall session. Also, new this year, a Women's Volleyball Team participated in a tournament in Newport, NH and made the semi-finals. Instructors included the director and part-time staff.

The recreation commission and director coordinated Seabrook's 1982 Old Home Day held in August. Over twenty non-profit groups and municipal departments participated, providing activities such as game booths, refreshment booths, contests, displays, demonstrations and more. The recreation department worked closely with the American Legion and Firemen's Association in producing the 1982 Miss Seabrook Pageant and Grand Ball. Theresa DiBurro was crowned 1982 Miss Seabrook and reigned throughout the weekend of activities.

The contests offered during the Old Home Day included clam shucking, corn husking, horseshoe pitching, musket shoot, Police & Fire Departments softball tournament, Industrial softball tournament, skillet throwing, bicycle races, and field races. Trophies, ribbions and/or awards were given to many of the winners. The department arranged for the entertainment provided such as magic show, country western band, dance show, teen disco, fireworks, and more. The Lions Club also was assisted by the recreation department in providing their third annual 10 KM Road Race during that weekend.

During 1982, the recreation department supported many of the town athletic programs by providing equipment and umpires or officials. This included programs such as Little League, Girls Softball, Men's Softball, Men's Baseball, Pony League, and Winnacunnet Little Warriors. The department also provided the opportunity for town youth to participate in the Hampton Youth Hockey Association as well.

Seabrook's Happy Senior Citizens Club took monthly day trips throughout 1982, in which the recreation department provided the transportation. The department also provided a special Christmas show for the Senior Club during the December meeting.

Volunteers were an important part of many of Seabrook's recreational programs, since many of the programs depended on such leadership. To help increase the number of volunteers and activities available to the town, a non-profit voluntary group was incoporated on September 29, 1982. The group established its name as "Friends of Recreation Seabrook". Their charter membership included over 180 people. The first activity it sponsored in conjunction with the Seabrook Recreation Department was a Roller Skating Party for Seabrook residents only, during Christmas school vacation. Over 160 townspeople attended.

Other special events were conducted throughout the year for townspeople. Trips were taken to Boston to the Ice Capades, Boston Bruins Hockey game and and Red Sox Baseball game. The recreation department provided its first annual youth Halloween and Christmas parties, with approximately 200 attending each. A Halloween Costume Contest and Dance was held after the town party and was sponsored by the Girl Scouts of Seabrook, in order to raise money for their camping program. The recreation department assisted the Scouts in providing this event.

Besides the expansion of programs in 1982, the commission and director carried out capital improvements. Seventy-six lights were installed at Veterans Memorial Park to facilitate the softball and baseball fields for night activities. Men's baseball, girl's softball, pony league, youth football, informal co-ed teams and Exeter American Legion Baseball.

The commission also continued construction on the Governor Weare tennis court and Veterans Memorial Park Restroom facility. The Farm Lane Boat Ramp was hot topped in 1982. Playground equipment was purchased by the commission to be installed at the Recreational Center property, once the project has been completed.

Proposed plans and goals have been scheduled by the commission and recreation director of 1983. This includes program expansion of activities such as ice skating, basketball games, tennis lessons, clinics and more. The department also plans to complete the restroom facility at Veterans Memorial Park and tennis court at Governor Weare Park. Other plans also are being considered to expand many of the exsisting recreational settings in town. Once the Seabrook Community Center is completed, many new programs will be developed for townspeople of all ages. Programs will operate on a daily basis, Monday through Friday. Some activities are being planned for Saturdays as well.

As a further note, the Recreation Commission and Recreation Director extend their appreciation and thanks to those townspeople who have supported the recreational movement in Seabrook. Continous support, such as that displayed by many, will be needed to maintain exsisting programs and assure the development of new leisure programs in the future.

- A study of elderly housing in the immediate area and information obtained from their administrators.
- Information and advise from Housing and Umban Department (HUD)
- 3. Information from 1980 census which was broken down into towns and released to us the last of October, 1982.
- A sample survey of 50 odd elderly residents of Seabrook.

The results of our survey are as follows:

- Permanent housing on a rental basis does not exsist in Seabrook.
- 2. There are 906 residents over the age of 62.
- 3. 10% of the residents are over 65 years of age.
- 4. Of the 677 over 65, 316 are male, 361 are female.
- 5. 65 couples over the age of 65 are living below the national poverty level (5690.00 for 2 people.)
- 6. Income eligibility for state and federal housing is:
 - 1 person gross Inc. \$13,600 adj. income \$ 9,500. 2 person gross Inc. \$15.500 adj. income \$10,800.

Most people over 65 qualify for state and federal income levels.

- 7. We found that over 50% would apply for housing if it were available, 12% felt that they might need it in the next 2-5 years, and 12% did not know.
- 8. On the human needs side of the questionaire 48% found it a physical or financial burden to maintain a private dwelling, 33% feared living alone, and 35% became depressed or lonely living alone.

We, the committee, feel that we have proved both a need for and the feasibility of adopting a Housing Authority.

REPORT OF THE SEABROOK CHARTER COMMISSION

This report is filed pursuant to RSA 49-B by the Seabrook Charter Commission and accompanies the final draft of the Seabrook Home Rule Charter 1983 and the letter Gary W. Holmes, Esquire, as Town Attorney, regarding his review and legal opinion of the draft.

At last year's Town Meeting, you, the Citizens of Seabrook, voted to establish a Commission to prepare a Home Rule Charter for the Town. On April 1, 1982, nine commissioners (six elected, three appointed by the Selectman) were sworn in and began a long process that will culminate the second Tuesday of March when the voters will decide whether or not to adopt the proposed Charter.

Drafting a Charter is similiar to writing a constitution. Our goal has been to produce a document that honors the spirit and ideals of those who established the Town, and to create foundation for self rule for the generations of Seabrook citizens to come.

The process involved a tremendous amount of investigation and self education about the legal process and the practical operations of the Town. We began by examining the King George III Charter under whose authority the Town presently operates (See attached copy). Aside from historical interest, it is so obviously outdated that it was of little or no value to our work. We contacted other communities that operated under modern Home Rule Charters, met with a representative of the New Hampshire Municipal Assoc., and consulted with Town Counsel to obtain legal guidance on the Charter drafting process.

From current town officials and employees, as well as other concerned citizens, we obtained valuable information on how the Town functions and suggestions for change. We initiated a survey of all town boards, commissions, and departments; held public hearings and meetings; and received written suggestions. Many officials and members of the public attended our weekly meetings in the Town Office building. The net result is what we believe to be the most comprehensive study of the operations of the Town of Seabrook that was ever done.

It is appropriate at this point to thank the townspeople and officials who gave freely of their thoughts, time, and advice. Because of their interest and courtesy, the Charter reflects far more than the ideas of the Charter Commissioners themselves. It combines the best thinking of those who helped us with our work, and are confident that the Charter will be evaluated by the voters as a document that was developed in open meetings and by a throughly democratic process.

The Charter we have prepared, for the most part, reflects how the Town currently operates. Though we explored many alternatives, it is our consensus that our basic form of local government, Board of Selectman with an Open Town Meeting, meets the needs of the community for the present and will continue to do so in the near future.

Part of our mandate was to make changes that we believe will benefit the town. Those changes will make government more efficient and more responsive to the needs of the citizens.

Finally, the commission recognizes that the Charter is not a perfect document. Every member of the Commission has his or her reservations about certian things that were included or not included. The Charter represents a number of compromises within the Commission itself, as the spirit of democracy often demands. It is a living document that can be amended by voters in the future. On one thing we all agree—it is a place to start, to build on, and the Town has much to gain from adopting it.

Contrary to popular belief, New Hampshire is not a "Home Rule" state. An important step was taken a few years ago when people amended the New Hampshire State Constitution to control local government through the establishment of a Charter. It is under that constitutional authoritythat the commission has labored. To ensure that in the future important decisions that affect how the Town operates are made by the citizens of Seabrook, not the legislature, we urge you to adopt this Home Rule Charter.

BROWN LIBRARY REPORT

The 1982 book budget of \$8,000.00 resulted in the purchase of approximately 700 books, covering both adult and children's books. The addition of these new books showed in an increase of total book circulation, which reached 10,377 books for 1982.

Several new books were added to the collection in memory of departed friends. This has become a popular way or remembering somone with a more lasting gift than flowers. We encourage memorial donations by everyone and are happy to answer questions you may have. When you do present a book in memory of someone, a speical plaque is placed in front of each book, telling the name of the donor and in whose memory it is presented.

The Brown Library has joined with other seacoast libraries in setting up a fiction depository in Portsmouth. This has enabled us to remove older fiction titles from our shelves and place them in a central location, the Potsmouth Court House, where they will be available to all libraries. This also means we don't have to discard older books that aren't being read at the present, but may become popular again. At also gives us more room on our shelves for purchasing new fiction.

Along with this project, the library has also joined other libraries in establishing a seacoast co-op card to replace the N.H. State Library card. The requirements for this card include being a responsible borrower for three months at the Brown Library. This waiting period is necessary because we are financially responsible for any books borrowed by and Seabrook resident at any library.

Regarding Article 24 of the town warrant, the storm windows were added to the east, north, & south sides of the building. The exterior was painted a true colonial red color to improve its appearance and a new sign was placed on the front lawn. Also the porch railing and drain pipe were replaced. And lastly, the renovating of the basement into a children's room was begun.

For the most part it was a successful and busy year for the patrons and staff of the Brown Library.

The Seabrook Lioness gave a donation of money to be used for large print books. Also, a gift of 23 Zane Gray books, all in very good condition, were given by Frank and Louis Sampson. These gifts are greatly appreciated.

We would like to extend special recognition to the two librarians who have so faithfully served the general public throughout the past year.

You are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Elementary school, Walton Road, on Tuesday, March 8, 1983 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots until at least 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the same day, and to meet in the Upper Hall of the Seabrook Firemen's Association Building, Route 286, on Thursday March 10, 1983, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act on the Articles below.

Further you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day pursuant to

RSA 659:49.

Article 1: To elect by Non-Partisan ballot: One Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; One Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; One Fire Chief for a term of one (1) year; One Road Agent for a term of one (1) year; Three Constables for a term of one (1) year; One Library Trustee for a term of three (3) years; One Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; Two members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; Two members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; and One member of the Budget Committee for a term of one (1) year.

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 2: To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance: To amend Section IV-A Height by adding reference to private utility structures so that said section will read as follows: No structure may exceed the maximum height of $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories or 35 feet, except municipal structures and public and private utility structures, such as windmills, radio, and television towers.

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 3: To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption for Amendment No. 2, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance: To amend Section X Definitions by incorporating and clarifying the definitions of the dwelling so that the new definition reads as follows:

Dwelling Building: 1. A single-family dwelling is a building designed

for or occupied exclusively by one family.

2. A two-family dwelling is a detached building designed for or occupied by two families exclusively, living independently and separately of each other therein. Two attached mobile homes shall not be deemed a two-family dwelling, but rather, two separate dwelling homes.

3. A multi-family dwelling is a building designed for more than two families, such as apartments and condominiums.

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 4: To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Seabrook: To amend Section VIII-B Non-Conforming uses by deleting the last phrase of said paragraph as follows: unless a special exception has been granted by the Roard of Adjustment.

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 5: On petition of Dorothea P. Merrill and fifty-nine (59) other voters of the Town: To amend Section IV of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Seabrook as follows: Insert after paragraph C: "D. RIGHT-OF-WAY: A right-of-way of 3 minimum lots or less shall have a width of not less than 32 feet and a right-of-way or more than 3 minimum lots shall have a width of not less than 50 feet.

(Not Recommended by the Planning Board) (On The Official Ballot)

Article 6: To see if the Town will approve the following: "Shall the Municipality approve the new charter recommended by the Charter Commission?"

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew and refund Town notes.

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to appoint such permanent police officers, firemen and employees for all other departments of the Town as they deem necessary.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such Town property as is no longer used by the Town.

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42 III to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax title property in the first instance to former owners of the property or the heirs of said owners for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertising sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the Selectmen.

Article 12: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers: For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000.00. To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five (5) years; own real estate individually or jointly; or, if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least five (5) years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000.00, and own net assets of \$30,000.00 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence.

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 13: On petition of Clyde O. Brown and eleven (11) other voters of the Town: Do you favor adoption of the Town Manager Plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statues Annotated?

(On The Official Ballot)

Article 14: On petition of Robert R. Cushing Jr. and twelve (12) other voters of the Town: To see of the Town will vote to adopt the following Conflict of Interest Ordinance:

1. The Seabrook Dog Track and the Seabrook Nuclear Project operate under circumstances that are unique to all other businesses in the town. Both are privately owned monopolies that are regulated by state and /or federal laws and agencies. Both have an enormous impact on the town, maintain lobbyists in the legislature to promote their interests, and in the past have used the authority of the state to override the wishes of the Town as defined by voters at town meeting.

In order to assure that the needs and wishes of the townspeople are placed above interests of those regulated monopolies, and to avoid even the appearance of a conflict of interests on the part of key town officials and employees, this ordinance is adopted.

- 2. The following offices and employees are defined as key town officials and subject to this ordinance: Selectmen, Water Commissioners, Assessors, Police Chief, Fire Chief, Civil Defense Director, Administrative Assistant, Planning Board, Board of Adjustment.
- 3. Association with the following concerns is defined as a conflict of interest:
- a. Yankee Greyhound Racing Inc., its subsidiaries, concessionaires, agents, and others affiliated with the Seabrook Bog Track.
- b. Public Service Company of New Hampshire, its partners, subsidiaries, contractors, or others affiliated with the Seabrook Nuclear Project.
- 4. It is incompatable with the positions outlined in paragraph 2 for any individual holding such position to be an employee, consultant or advocate for (whether paid or unpaid) or otherwise do business with any party listed in paragraph 3. To do so shall constitute an immediate forfeiture of position.
- 5. It shall be a part of any oral or written contract or employment agreement between the town and individuals subject to paragraph 2, that as a condition for employment with the town the employee agrees not to seek or accept employment with any party covered in paragraph 3 for a period of one year following the termination of employment with the town. To violate this constitutes a breach of contract and the town will take legal action for punitive damages against the violating parties.
- 6. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption by majority vote at Town Meeting. Provided however that any individual who has held a position subject to this ordinance prior to its adoption and who continues to hold said position at the time of adoption shall be exempt from its authority for a period of six months.
- 7. If any provisions of this ordinance are held invalid, the other provisions of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby. If the application of the ordinance or any of its provisions to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the application of this ordinance and its provisions to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

8. This ordinance is adopted under the authority granted the town in RSA 31: 39-A, effective August 10, 1981.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Five Hundred (\$25,500.00) Dollars to purchase three cruisers for the Police Department, the three existing ones to be disposed of by sale or trade-in.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to form a three member committee for the purpose of locating a suitable site for the Police Station.

Article 17: On petition of Clyde O. Brown and fifteen (15) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken under Article 45 of the 1982 Town Warrant: "... assigning a police cruiser to the Police Department for use by the Youth Services Officer in his official duties with the youth of the town."

Article 18: On petition of Francis L. Thibodeau and sixteen (16) other voters of the Town: "To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of at least five (5) voters to study the feasibility of contracting for a commercial security force for the Police Department to replace the Police Department currently used and funded by the Town of Seabrook."

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Six Thousand (\$26,000.00) Dollars to purchase a new ambulance, the old one to be disposed of by sale or trade-in.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand (\$90,000.00) Dollars to purchase a new fire engine, Engine #2 to be disposed of by sale or trade-in.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars to purchase a new engine and transmission for Fire Engine #3.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Seven Hundred (\$13,700.00) Dollars to implement the proposed Interim (One Year) Parking Management Plan at Seabrook Reach.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars to lease (with option to buy) a mobile sanitary facility to be located at Seabrook Beach.

(Not Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to implement the preliminary plan and design of Public Service Company of New Hampshire's barge facility at Seabrook Beach, and to report with recommendations at the 1984 Town meeting.

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars to establish preliminary plans for the development of the Public Service Company of New Hampshire barge facility at Seabrook Beach, and to authorize the Selectmen to solicit and accept funds that may be made available from PSC of NH through acceptance by the Town of the barge facility, as well as grants and other funding that may be made available by the State of New Hampshire, the Federal Government, and other sources.

(Not Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-Five Thousand (\$235,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of constructing a building on town-owned land to the rear of the Fire Station to accommodate the needs of the Water, Fire and Mosquito Departments.

(Not Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars to construct an addition to the existing garage on town-owned land to the rear of the Fire Station for establishing facilities for the Mosquito Control Program.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing a new transmission main for the Rte. 107 rock wells and making other capital improvements in the water system.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of establishing another rock well and further water search.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 30: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars to complete Article 25 of the 1982 Town Warrant which was "for the purpose of capital expenditures on construction and improvements to the Town Water System."

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing a water main and fire hydrant at the new Community Center Complex.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing water mains and fire hydrants on Fowler's Court and Parkersville Lane.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of relocating the water main and services along the bridge on Railroad Avenue.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars to move the telemetering panels to the new town hall.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to be used to study the retirement plan options available to permanent employees and elected officials not in the New Hampshire Retirement System.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 36: On petition of James C. Falconer and Twenty-two (22) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following law, pursuant to RSA 31:39; 125; 147: Whereas radioactive wastes and ionization radiations and their sources can be detrimental to health, welfare, and life on earth, and the well being of our citizens, and our unborn children, and have disastrous long term irreversible genetic defects: The people of Seabrook do hereby enact a law to limit, restrict and prevent the transporting, storage, and dumping of radioactive wastes within the Town of Seabrook; more particularly ionizing or non-ionizing radiation, whether solid, liquid, or gas, which material is known as but not limited to gamma rays, X-rays, alpha and beta particles high speed electrons, neutrons, protons, and other atomic or nuclear particles or X-rays or any byproduct materials from radioactive sources including plutonium, uranium, uranium 233, uranium enriched isotopes 235, and any other material involving ionizing and non-ionizing radiation including so-called, "Low level radiation and radioactive wastes." This by-law meaning and intending to prevent the Town of Seabrook from becoming a radioactive and/or Nuclear dumping ground now and forever.

Article 37: On Petition of Robin V. Crowell and twelve (12) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town of Seabrook, out of concern for the health and safelty of its citizens, will require that any emergency response plans for the town and the Seabrook Nuclear Project shall be subject to home rule approval by Town Meeting as a condition for acceptance by the town.

1. Any evacuation or other emergency response plans for the Seabrook Nuclear Project which affect the town and which are developed by or for the town, the state of New Hampshire and/or the Public Service Company, shall be placed on the Warrant by the Selectmen to come before Town Meeting for home rule approval by majority vote.

2. Out of respect for the democratic process of home rule no town official or agency shall promote the implementation of an emergency response plan for the Seabrook Nuclear Project which has not been approved by Town Meeting.

Article 38: On petition of Robin V. Crowell and thirteen (13) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to go on record to support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Seabrook and to the health and welfare of the people of Seabrook. These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to the same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

Article 39: To see what action the Town will take on the following resolution: Be it hereby resolved that, pursuant to RSA 203:4 Creation of Housing Authority, there is recognized and declared to be need for a Housing Authority to be established and function in the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire.

Article 40: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$250,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of loaning all or any portion of the amount to the Seabrook Housing Authority (if said Authority is fully created and empowered under the aformentioned article) said money to be used by the Housing Authority exclusively for studying, planning, construction and operation of an elderly housing project, including the purchasing, leasing, or optioning of land for said project. The Selectmen shall have the full discretion to set the terms and conditions of the loan including security, date and form of the note or notes, so long as said terms and conditions are not inconsistent with the intent and express terms of this article.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 41: To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for use as an offset against the following debt service:

Article 43: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Adjustment, rather than the Planning Board, to hear all applications for gravel permits pursuant to RSA 155-E.

Article 44: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend up to Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars in Coastal Energy Impact Program (CEIP) Planning Grants, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars as the Town's 20% local match toward said grant.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 45: Upon petition of James E. Champoux and eleven (11) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a part-time Code Enforcement Officer to work in conjunction with the part-time Building Inspector and Health Officer to enforce and police the Town's Zoning Regulations and other relating regulations and to perform all other duties which are required of that position, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars as a salary for said position.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 46: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars to develop the Ledge Road, Pine Street, and Lower Collins Street, and to excavate and hot top the parking lot to the north and south of the Police Station.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 47: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand (\$55,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a new 6-wheel dump truck with wing and plow for the Highway Department, the old one to be transferred to the Water Department.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 48: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing a new tow-behind street sweeper for the Highway Department.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 49: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) Dollars for the acquisition and/or development of land for recreational purposes.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 50: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of erecting a fence on the Chase Homestead property.

(Not Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 51: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Six Thousand (\$46,000.00) Dollars for the installation of a sprinkler system at the new Community Center

(Not Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 52: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to be the Town's donation to the Seabrook Day Care Center, which is under the sponsorship of the Child Development Council, Inc., and to include funds for the support of the Seabrook Day Care Center in the regular Town Budget starting in 1984.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 53: To see if the Town will vote to amend the Seabrook Parking Ban Ordinance of June 6, 1978, under authority of its Corporate Charter and the provisions of the New Hampshire Revised Statues Annotated: To amend Section 3 Seabrook Beach, so that the restrictions on Portsmouth Avenue reads as follows: Portsmouth Avenue: No on-street parking at any time on the west side of the street.

Article 54: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars to aid in the support of A Safe Place which is operated by the Seacoast Task Force on Family Violence.

(Recommended By the Budget Committee)

Article 55: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-One Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars for the construction of a replica statue to replace the Civil War Monument at the Wildwood Cemetary.

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 56: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars to add to the capital reserve fund, known as the "Motor Vehicle Fund."

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 57: Upon petition of Cecil K. Downard and twenty-six (26) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to provide Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars to hire a mechanic to work and repair town vehicles.

(Not Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 58: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of adding said amount to the Capital Reserve Fund, known as the "Municipal Building Fund."

(Recommended By The Budget Committee)

Article 59: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance,

REGULATION AND LICENSING OF AMUSEMENT DEVICES:

Pursuant to the powers granted by its Corporate Charter and Revised Statues Annotated 31:41-d:

1. Prohibited Practices and Devices

A. No person under the age of 14 years shall be allowed to operate any amusement device unless accompanied by a parent or guardian. It shall be the duty of the manager, owner or employees of any establishment where amusement devices are present to ascertain the age of each person operating or wishing to operate an amusement device.

- B. No gambling or wagering shall be permitted. No prizes of any kind or value shall be given away or sold at nominal fee for any reason whatsoever and no cash or "pay-off" shall be given for any reason whatsoever pertaining to a high score, matching number, skill points or other outcome of an amusement device game.
- C. No amusement device shall be licensed which is designed or fitted:
- 1) to allow deposit of multiples of coins before playing;
- 2) with a "knock-off" button and/or internal meter designed to cancel the visible accumulated points and record them internally in the device;
- to allow continuous play under the same scoring by depositing additional coins.

2. License Required

- A. No person, firm, corporation or association may allow to be operated an amusement device without first obtaining a license from the Board of Selectmen or their designee for said device.
- B. The Board of Selectmen or their designee may establish from time to time reasonable licensing requirements and standards; including number of machines, location and hours of operation, but in no event shall those requirements contain less than the following:
- That the applicant or applicants must be 18 years of age and of good moral character as reasonably determined by the chief of police.
- 2) That a full description of the premises is submitted with a statement that such premises will be operated in accordance with all applicable local ordinances. No amusement device shall be located other than within a fully enclosed permanent building.
- 3) That no license will be issued to any person or corporation for amusement devices located within one-half mile of the nearest school.
- C. The applicant shall pay \$50.00 per year or any part thereof for a license covering from one to three amusement devices; and for each additional device shall pay \$50.00 per year or any part thereof, provided that the applicant may at his discretion remove and replace any device
- at will without further payment of fee. However, each additional or replaced device must be licensed.
- D. Licenses shall be effective from the date granted until December 31 of the year granted. Each license will be reviewed annually by the Board of Selectmen, and renewed upon payment of fees, but only if the person, firm, corporation or association applying for a renewal has been found to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, and the location and operation of the amusement device will be detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the public.
- E. Any violation of any of these provisions of this ordinance or requirements and standards authorized pursuant hereto shall constitute a violation of the license and may be considered just cause for the revocation or suspension of the license. If the location and operation for said amusement device proves to be a detriment to the health, safety, and welfare of the public, the license for said device may be revoked or suspended. Any revocation or suspension shall be carried out by the Selectmen only after due notice and hearing.

F. The Board of Selectmen may from time to time amend this ordinance to modify, add or delete any provisions thereof. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to abrogate, limit or contradict any state or federal law or regulation.

3. Enforcement

- A. During all hours of operation the amusement device shall be open and accessible for inspection by the Selectmen or the Chief of Police or their designated representatives to determine compliance with the terms of this ordinance.
- B. Any person, firm, corporation, or association found to be in violation of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation as defined by New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 per day for each violation.

4. Definitions

- A. Amusement Device: The term "amusement device" shall mean any machine which, upon the insertion of a coin, slug, token, plate or disc, may be operated by the public generally for use as a game, entertainment, or amusement, whether not registering a score, and whether or not skill is used in its operation. It shall include but not be limited to such devices as electronic games, pinball machines, skill ball, mechanical grab machines, and all games, operations, or transactions, similar thereto under whatever may be indicated. The term does not include vending machines in which are not incorporated gaming or amusement features, nor does the term include any coin-operated rides or devices which solely produce music.
- B. <u>Person</u>, <u>Firm</u>, <u>Corporation or Association</u>: The terms person, firm, corporation or association shall include any of those entities or combinations thereof owning an amusement device, or maintaining an establishment where one or more amusement devices are available for general use by the public, or having control over such an establishment.
- 5. <u>Separability</u>: Each separate provision of this ordinance shall be deemed independant of all other provisions herein, and it is further ordained that if any provisions of this ordinance are found to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, all other provisions thereof shall remain valid and enforceable.

6. Effective Date and Duration:

- A. This ordinance shall take effect after public hearing and signature by the Selectmen or after approval and ratification at the Town Meeting and shall be in effect until repealed or modified.
- B. There is hereby created a 60 day "compliance period" during which all amusement devices presently in place and operating as of the date of this ordinance and not in compliance with the terms of Section 1 C hereof, shall be brought into full compliance. All other devices shall be properly licensed within 30 days after the date of this ordinance.

Article 60: On petition of Ronald D. Locke and thirty-five (35) other voters of the Town: To see if the people will vote to instruct the moderator to establish a three member committee for the purpose of researching the possibilities of better Cable Television Service to the Town and further to request the Selectmen to assist the committee in any way possible.

Article 61: On petition of Christina L. Westerback and nineteen (19) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to accept the so-called Pine Cone Drive Extention as a Town road.

Article 62: On petition of Paul D. Carey Jr. and thirteen (13) other voters of the Town: To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain Janvrin Drive as a Town-owned road.

Article 63: To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expense of the General Government for the protection of persons and property, for health and sanitation, for highways and bridges, for the support of the Town Poor and for all necessary expenditures for the ensuing year.

Article 64: To transact all other legal business that may come before this meeting.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1981, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In addition, the Town has not capitalized the cost of property and equipment purchased by the Proprietary Fund (Water Department). Likewise, no depreciation expense is recorded on this fund. Generally accepted accounting principles require that property and equipment of proprietary funds be capitalized and depreciated over the useful lives of the assets. The Town's records do not permit the application of adequate procedures to enable us to determine the cost value of capital assets or related depreciation expense on them.

Because of the material effect of the omission of fixed assets and related depreciation on the financial position, we do not express an opinion on the financial statement of this Proprietary Fund.

In our opinion, other then the financial statements of the Proprietaray Fund mentioned above, and except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the second paragraph of this report, the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire at December 31, 1981, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

TOWN OF SEABROOK

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Seabrook, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE WATER DEPARTMENT

There were 407,699,710 gallons of water pumped during 1982. This increase of 120,532,190 gallons over the previous year was mainly contributed to the increase use in the summer months. Industrial and commercial use decreased from 107,983,320 to 86,698,360 in 1982.

There were 49 services installed. A meter was installed at Markey's Lobster Pound, which used to be on a fixed rate.

This Department in 1982 took on several projects, among those were:

A chain link fence was installed between the well field property and the Vedrani's property on True Road.

The water main on Pine St. was extended approximately 600 feet. This project also included a fire hydrant, seven water services, and two 6" services.

Under article 25, a 12" water main was installed from the intersection of Washington St. and Walton Rd. to the Elementary School. This was done, due to the fact that the fire protection at the school was poor. This project included the installation of a hydrant at the American Legion, two larger hydrants at the School, hooking up a 10" water service at Spherex and marking three 6" connections between the new line and the existing 6" line. This portion of Walton Rd. and driveways was resurfaced with hot top.

Also under article 25 a larger project on Tilton, Concord, and Suncook Streets was started. The six 6" taps, the 6" water mains, and fire hydrants were completed late fall-early winter. The replacement of the 85 water services, disconnecting of the 2" water mains, and the resurfacing of the roads and driveways will be completed in the Spring of 1983.

Four 8" water mains, about one mile of electrical conduit, two electrical man holes, and the installing and hooking up of temporary piping at the new well field on Rte 107 was done under article 10.

The temporary piping, which connected one of the new wells with existing water mains was installed because, without a water ban, the water tanks were dropping even with all pumps pumping around the clock.

This well was put on line in July and pumped at a rate of approximately 600,000 gallons per day for the rest of the summer.

The Rte 107 well field was installed in 1982. L.A. Hanna & Sons did the drilling of the 10" wells 500ft deep. Lane New England Co., installed three submersable pumps. Griffin Construction installed the pump house, control building and did the site work. The engineers for this project was Jones and Beach of Stratham. The well field went on line December 13,1982, and will double the pumping capabilities of the system. The new well field can produce 1,600,000 gallons per day. A fourth well will be installed in 1983 at this site.

The water from the Rte 107 Rockwells is of excellent quality. This water isn't as hard as our other well fields. The level of iron and manganese are low. This has cause at time rusty or dark looking water.

A special town meeting was held November 17,1982 which lifted the eight year old water moritorium. Since that date several installations have been granted. Cimmaron Building 118, Best Western Motel, and Amesbury Machine are among the larger ones.

The water ban was lifted this year which had been in effect since 1974. Another water ban isn't anticipated in the near future. But then again we shouldn't waste this precious resource.

Because we have plenty of water, we aren't just going to sit back. We still are searching for more water sources for future needs to serve you better.


