The construction of the plant began in September of 1993 and was completed in December of 1995. Sewer flow into the plant began on December 18, 1995. The plant consists of a main operation building with a laboratory and office facilities. Other buildings and structures are:

- 1.) Influent building where sewage flow enters the plant
- 2.) Pump building
- 3.) Sludge process building
- 4.) Oxidation tanks
- 5.) Clarifier tanks

The plant is now being operated 24 hours a day.

VIRGINIA L. SMALL TOWN CLERK 1962 - 1996

The 1996 annual town report is dedicated to Virginia L. Small, who has served faithfully as Seabrook's town clerk for thirty-four years.

Ginny started preparing for this job in 1949 at the early age of sixteen when she would help her father, Judge Ralph O.Bragg, with the typing of town records and documents. When he died on November 11, 1952, her mother, Elizabeth, was appointed and then elected the following March and remained town clerk until her retirement in 1962. During those years, Ginny would assist her mother with the long lines in February and March when auto registrations were due.

In March 1962, Ginny became the third member of her immediate family to be elected Seabrook's town clerk. During the early years, she made her office in her home on Rocks Road and later on Weare Road. In 1987, she moved her office to the Seabrook Fire Station on Route 286 and three years later relocated for a final time into the new town office building at Smithtown circle.

During her term, she welcomed all the changes that were to come about in office technology. She went from a manual typewriter to a modern computer and she was one of the first town clerks in New Hampshire to offer renewal stickers for license plates.

Ginny ran a highly efficient and respected office. She was always helping those who came to her for assistance and had a reputation of being a dedicated "public servant."

Hollis was born in Salisbury, MA., the son of Arthur P. and Ola Collins Brown. He was a descendant of John Brown, one of the first settlers who came to the Hampton - Seabrook area in 1638.

In 1927 he married Viola B. Small of Seabrook and in 1929 they moved to Seabrook and resided here. They had two sons, Hollis I. Brown, Jr. and Bruce G. Brown. Hollis became a police officer in Seabrook and served as Chief of Police for the years of 1945, 1946, 1948 and 1949. He organized the first Policemen's Ball, which was held at the old O.U.A.M. Hall on May 27, 1949.

In 1950 he and Louis F. Violette built the Seabrook Lobster Pound on Route 286. Mr. Violette retired in 1957 and from then on Hollis and Viola operated "Brown's" until their retirement in 1972.

Hollis loved baseball and as a young man was manager and pitcher on his own team of Seabrook men who played baseball in the local area. He was an avid hunter, golfer, and enjoyed playing pool and checkers. He was well known for his wood-working abilities and many Seabrook homes have furniture he made.

Hollis and his wife Viola, who died in 1987 were married for 60 years. Hollis was a member of St. James Lodge #102 of Hampton, the East Gate Club and the Seabrook Firemen's Association.

CAT ORDINANCE

LICENSING REQUIREMENTS:

No cat three (3) months old or older shall be allowed to be or remain within the town unless registered and licensed as follows:

- A. All cats owned or kept in the town shall be registered as to sex, breed, name and address of owner and name of cat.
- B. At the time of registration, the owner shall obtain a license and tag for each cat and pay the statutory fee of one (\$1.00) dollar.
- C. It shall be the duty of the owner to cause the license tag to be securely attached around the cat's neck and kept there at all times during the licensing period.
- D. Registration and licensing of a cat previously registered and licensed shall be completed annually on or before the 30th of April. The licensed period shall run for one (1) year from the first day of the ensuing May.
- E. Any person becoming the owner or keeper of a cat after May 1 shall, if the cat is not duly licensed, cause it to be licensed until the first day of the ensuing May.
- F. A license duly recorded may be transferred to the Town of Seabrook with the cat licensed.
- G. The owner or keeper of five (5) or more cats or a breeder of cats shall obtain a special license pursuant to RSA 466:6.

DANGEROUS AND DISEASED CATS AT LARGE

No vicious, dangerous or ferocious cat or cats sick with or liable to communicate hydrophobia or other contagious or infectious disease shall be permitted to run at large in the town.

NUISANCES

Any cat owned or kept within the town which is not licensed, is not confined and is allowed to run at large or otherwise is in violation of this chapter is, hereby declared to be a nuisance and shall be impounded as hereinafter provided.

REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED CATS

The owner or keeper of any cats impounded hereunder may redeem the same by paying all costs, charges and penalties assessed, if any, that have accrued up to the time of making the redemption, and when the same are paid, the cat shall be released to the owner thereof.

CAT BITES

A. Whenever any cat bites a person, the owner of said cat shall immediately notify the Chief of Police, who shall order the cat held on the owner's premises or it shall be impounded for a period of ten (10) days.

B. The cat shall be examined immediately after it has bitten anyone and again at the end of the ten (10) days

period by a qualified veterinarian.

C. If, at the end of the period of confinement, the veterinarian is convinced that the cat is free from rabies, the cat shall be released from quarantine or from the pound as the case may be. If the cat dies in the meanwhile, its head shall be sent to the State Department of Health for examination for rabies.

VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

Any person violating any provisions of this chapter shall, in addition to any other penalty fixed by law, be fined an amount not exceeding twenty (\$20.00) dollars for each offense.

EFFECT ON OTHER LEGISLATION

This chapter is intended to supplement and not replace any other statute, ordinance or other law regulating the subject to which it is addressed.

SEVERABILITY

In the event that any portion of this chapter should be declared to be invalid or void, it shall not effect the validity of any of the remaining.

EFFECTIVE DATE

This chapter shall become effective May 1, 1996.

- B. An owner or person having custody of any dog(s), shall not permit said animal to defecate on any private property unless defecation is removed immediately, other than the premises of the owner or person having custody of said animal.

REGULATION OF NOISE - ENTERTAINMENT ESTABLISHMENTS

DEFINITION: - Entertainment means any live band, jukebox, record player or any type of mechanical music device that is audible outside of the building or premises.

PERMIT REQUIREMENT

Any business that plans entertainment that falls under this ordinance will be required to obtain a permit from the board of selectmen.

HOURS

Live entertainment or sound systems, jukeboxes, etc. will not be allowed to operate between the normal hours of 10:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. The board of selectmen may vary the hours of operation based on the circumstances of the application (ie, more restrictive or additional hours.)

INTENSITY AND VOLUME OF NOISE

The intensity and volume of noise will be regulated so as to cause as little disturbance outside the business as possible. Means of regulation will include, but not limited to location of the entertainment; people or device within the structure; insulation or soundproofing of building; keeping baffles such as doors and windows closed as needed and regulation of volume control on speakers. The chief of police or his designee shall act as the enforcement authority of this provision.

POWER TO CLOSE DOWN ENTERTAINMENT

Enforcement agencies are authorized to ensure compliance and temporarily close down the entertainment upon refusal of proprietor or operator to comply or continue to comply with appropriate by-laws, rules and regulations or statutes.

PERMIT REVOKED

Entertainment permit may be revoked for cause. Cause is considered to be one or more violations of appropriate statutes, rules and regulations or by-laws governing entertainment and/or noise.

PENALTY

Any person, firm or corporation willfully violating this regulation shall be subject to a fine of one hundred \$100.00) dollars for the first, five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for the second, one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars for the third violation within an administrative year, (July 1 through June 30), with administrative revocation of the entertainment permit by the board of selectmen after a hearing, if requested, following the third conviction within a licensing year.

VALIDITY

If any section or part of a section, or paragraph of this chapter is declared invalid or unconstitutional, it shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections, or part of a section or paragraph of this chapter.

EFFECT ON OTHER LEGISLATION

This chapter is intended to supplement and not replace any other statute, ordinance or other law regulating the subject to which it is addressed.

SEVERABILITY

In the event that any portion of this chapter should be declared to be invalid or void, it shall not effect the validity of any of the remaining.

EFFECTIVE DATE

This chapter shall become effective May 1, 1996.

BUDGET COMMITTEE - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

Another year has come and gone. In early December the Budget Committee started weekly budget sessions to look at all department budgets for the following year. The Committee's purpose is to make sure departments bring forward a factual proposal and also that it be affordable to the town. The Committee consists of nine members. There are three (3) appointed positions: A board of selectmen's representative, a representative from the school board and a representative from the beach precinct. The other six (6) members are elected by the town voters.

As many know, this coming year will be Seabrook's first year under the official ballot law. Some know this as Senate Bill 2 or RSA 40:13. This law lets every voter in town vote in April, not only for town elections, but also for the town's operating budget. This applies to all special warrant articles and also the school's budget and warrant articles. Due to the fact that this is the first year this is in effect, there is bound to be some difficulty in this process. We will work hard to bring about an understanding to all the townspeople what the proposals are and an explanation of each.

The new law (SB 2, RSA 40:13) makes town meeting , as we have come to know it for years, history. The new law is set up so that there is first a deliberative meeting to present the budgets as proposed. At this meeting the majority present can vote amendments to the proposed budget by either increasing or decreasing the total amounts. The only votes taken at this first meeting are to make amendments. The second meeting is more informational to let voters know all adjusted amounts.

The vote on town elections has been moved from March to April. On April 8, 1997, the voters will go to the polls and vote on town elections and budgets. If the majority votes down the operating budget, the town or schools have a small amount of time to have a special meeting to inform the voters in hope that they might pass the proposed budgets. If after this option is used and voted down, then last year's budget will go into effect for the coming year with certain automatic increases. Examples might be: contractual raises, leases, contracts for goods and services and debt service on bond issues. There are other items that would change also, but with the first year's jitters and the confusion caused by parts of the ballot law, only time and much work on our state governing personnel's part will bring about clarification of SB 2, RSA 40:13, to the cities and towns of New Hampshire.

Please take the time in the upcoming months to become informed of the issues that will be voted on. And also, please do your civic duty on April 8, 1997, and VOTE. Thank you.

A total of 127 families were assisted in 1996, and the Town has recovered \$7,409.78 through promissory notes, assignments, court actions, liens, and an additional \$2,621.19 has been worked off by recipients through the Town's Workfare Program.

Changes have begun to take place in the State and Federal programs and it is unknown at this time how much these changes will effect the Town. The Welfare Department has seen an increase in cases in the last few months of 1996. This increase in cases appears to coincide with the beginning of Welfare Reform and the downshifting to the Towns that goes along with that.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

This year the town has experienced a variety of emergencies to which this office has responded. This office had the task of notifying shut-ins during the E Coli water crisis and with the coordinated efforts of the Recreation Department and the Red Cross, we supplied the residents with spring water donated by concerned businesses in town. During the year we made preparations for the forecast of two major storms. Although we were well prepared, we were grateful that these storms did not reach major proportions.

The State, in conjunction with the power plant, conducted a series of emergency evacuation drills which included the combined effort of town officials, department heads and staff. The final drill was held in August and I am proud to say our score from the State was high. In this past year, I have put a lot of effort into the task of refurbishing our radios and updating the necessary equipment to maintain a highly efficient means of communication and protection against all emergency situations. I would like to thank Police Chief Paul Cronin and Fire Chief Jerry Brown for their assistance in this project.

I would especially like to thank my deputies, Ivan Eaton, Sr. , Keith Sanborn and Jeffrey Baillargeon, whom I have absolute confidence in, and my staff of volunteers for their continued time and assistance in making this a well organized and efficient Emergency Management Department.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

Your Seabrook Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) found 1996 a busy year with sixteen (16) cases presented and heard.

During the year, ZBA members also attended the N.H. Law Lecture Series and other seminars to remain current in the ever-changing laws and recent court cases which effects our community's land use and rulings on zoning adjustments within Seabrook.

FIRE DEPARTMENT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

The year 1996 proved to be busier than previous years for the Seabrook Fire Department due mostly to the extensive growth throughout the town. The fire prevention office has had its hands full in keeping up with this growth and has proven to be a very worth while effort by preventing fires before they occur.

Fire prevention activities are as follows: Business Inspections - 210; Place of Assembly - 46; Other Inspections - 480; Plans Reviewed - 72; Fire Investigations - 4; Service Calls - 178 and Training Sessions - 28.

Training is on-going with the firefighters, EMTs, EMT-1s and now three paramedics. By the time this report is issued the paramedics will have been in their sixth month of training and should be completed by October of 1997. They will be at the highest level of pre-hospital care for ambulance personnel.

The new ambulance that was purchased by the 1995 town meeting vote went into service last April 1996. It has been a practice to purchase a new ambulance every five years. Due to the increased load of ambulance calls, we will have to be looking at it more often.

This year the fire department will be asking the townspeople to support us in the request to purchase a new fire engine. Currently we have two, the oldest of which is 20 years old and has had a considerable amount of maintenance done on it in the past few years and is due to be replaced. The younger of the two is 15 years old and will also have to be replaced in a few years.

To maintain the expertise service we are able to provide, reliable equipment is needed. We the Seabrook Fire Department hope you will support our efforts in purchasing those tools to assist in continuing to provide this professional service.

My thanks go out to you the townspeople, all the town departments and most of all to the Seabrook Fire Department as a whole for a job well done.

The year 1996 showed an increase in the use of the Crime Line (474-2640). This untaped line had some calls coming in anonymously and some with citizens identifying themselves. One concern that these calls revealed was the high use of drug abuse within the community.

We informed and asked for assistance from the NH State Police Narcotic Division and they affirmed that young adults were abusing drugs in alarming numbers. They made numerous arrests and in some cases were able to turn their lives around for the better. Hopefully, the year 1997 will bring better awareness that drug abuse ruins lives of not only the abuser but of the families their lives touch.

Members of the Police Department and myself thank the residents for their continued support of the department. Because of your support, we were able to upgrade our patrols in the summer by the use of two leased motorcycles. These were not only an added tool in traffic enforcement but also we were more visible to the community. A grant with matching funds to upgrade the police computer system and installation of computers in the cruisers will bring the department into the 21st century.

The Youth Service Officer James Deshaies had a busy year, as you can see by his statistics. His cases which were handled out of court rose. We think that any matter that Officer Deshaies can resolve by not

taking it to court will spare the youth the trauma of being in the criminal justice system. Hopefully, these youths will not come to our attention again.

We are continually sending members of the department to various classes, seminars and meetings to keep them updated in changes in laws and regulations. The better trained the members of the department, the better they are able to serve the public.

Again, thank you for your continued support of the Seabrook Police Department.

MOSQUITO CONTROL - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

With the availability of the town truck, the field work began on April 16, 1996. Breeding sites were surveyed and those showing activity were larvicided (treatment to control the aquatic (larval) stages of the mosquito before they can become flying adults). Because of the heavy winter snowfall (and subsequent springtime melting) and wet April (6.5" of rain), many upland "freshwater" sites along with saltmarsh sites were treated through the spring. Saltmarsh sites show heavy breeding after each monthly 'high run' tide and require treatment. If heavy rains occur between these monthly lunar 'peak' tides, additional treatments are necessary. On July 13, 1996, (following a very dry June) the remains of hurricane Bertha dropped close to 5" of rain. Many upland sites that are typically 'spring-time' breeding sites required treatments along with the saltmarsh sites.

Adult mosquito populations (which are monitored weekly - a State requirement) rose in the weeks following this extreme occurrence but dropped back to low levels by mid August. There was a late (mid September) peak of saltmarsh species, probably from heavy rain received on Labor Day (remains of yet another hurricane - "Edouard"). Around this time also, EEE Virus (Eastern Equine Encephalitis) was detected in mosquito population in Rhode Island and southeastern Connecticut but none in Massachusetts.

As is usually the case in Seabrook during the summer months, most of the adult mosquitos are two species that come only from saltmarsh breeding sites. One in particular, <u>Aedes Sollicitans</u>, is active in bright sunlight unlike the other species that stay in the shade of a cool woods and then come out to feed at dusk.

Adulticiding (evening spraying with the spray truck) was done on 44 different nights between May 31st and September 11th. Three nights are required to cover the entire town. All sections of Town were covered at least 12 times in 1996.

Greenhead fly traps were again placed along the edge of the saltmarsh to intercept these painful biters before they can reach the treeline. These flies are attracted to the shade of the boxes, fly up inside where they are trapped, dehydrate and die. Thousands are caught in each trap.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

After several years of inactivity, the Conservation Commission has been reorganized and new members have been appointed by the Board of Selectmen. We have undertaken the task of reviewing and updating our files and are in the process of acquiring and reviewing new regulations, information and logistical data.

The Town of Seabrook is experiencing an unprecedented growth phase, primarily due to the new sewer treatment plant becoming active. Many areas in town that were not acceptable for house lots or businesses due to poor drainage conditions are now available for construction. This, combined with our relatively low tax rate has made Seabrook a desirable location to live or establish a business. Some of the areas available for development border wetland areas, salt marsh, or our water aquifer area. The Conservation Commission is mandated by its regulations to protect these areas from any endangerment. We have reviewed and commented on several new building projects that may have an impact on our water resources.

In 1996, the Conservation Commission began the research required for a project to clean-up and revitalize the ponds located in our town. Our goals for 1997 and beyond are to dredge the ponds to a habitable depth for fish, coordinate with the New Hampshire Fish and Game for restocking the ponds and establish a natural habitat of vegetation on the banks of the ponds. Once the biodiversity has been reestablished we expect many forms of wildlife will return to this natural habitat. In conjunction with this we also intend to provide areas for recreation, picnics, nature trails and winter sports such as, skating and cross country skiing. The string of ponds associated with Cain's Brook will be our beginning point for this project. The pond located behind the recreation center will be the first pond to receive our attention. The reasons for choosing this pond are two-fold. It is the pond nearest the beginning of the watershed, it would be counter-productive to address the ponds further down the watershed without the source being cleaned up first. And also, due to its location, it is the pond most likely to be used for recreational purposes.

Another project the Conservation Commission is concerned with is the dredging of Seabrook Harbor. Our chairman has consulted with the New Hampshire Port Authority and expects favorable results. We would like to see the sand dunes that have been eroded by storm damage rebuilt from the sand that will be removed by the dredging process.

We have contacted the library about establishing a section dedicated to literature concerning the environment and conservation

practices. As our town continues to grow, it will often be the private citizen that will have the major impact on our natural resources. We believe educational material may be the best way to protect and conserve our natural habitats.

The Conservation Commission generally meets on the second Thursday of the month at the Seabrook Town Hall, at $7:00~\rm p.m.$ The public is welcome to attend and contribute to our discussions.

The largest of all was the 66 lot subdivision of Greyhawk Realty Trust off Route 286. Next was the start of the second phase of Dandiview Acres off of Blacksnake Road and the 20 lot subdivision off of Whittier Drive. These are just a few cases out of the vast variety of the forty cases heard. Others include the expansion of the Route 1 corridor and the many lot line changes in the private sector.

Because of the large number of cases brought before the board, we felt it necessary to have an engineer oversee the sites to make sure the work being done is at or above town standards. This service is not funded by the town but by the developer.

In closing, I would like to thank all the members of the board for a job well done. In addition, I would like to thank Joseph Jones for his guidance as chairman and regret having to accept his resignation. In the coming year I am looking forward to serving the town and trying to look out for its best interest.

OFFICE OF CODE ENFORCEMENT BUILDING INSPECTOR - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

In 1996, six occupancy permits were issued for new commercial and industrial buildings. There is still a lot of interest in developing our industrial zone on Batchelder Road and Ledge Road. Commercial activity along Route 1 is still increasing with the opening of the new KFC and proposals for a laundry at the old Dunkin Donuts site; a Meineke Muffler Shop at the Old Man of Seabrook site; and a proposed Honey Dew Donut shop on the Small Homestead property. One municipal building for a pump station on Old New Boston Road was approved in 1996. The new addition to the Seabrook Elementary School was completed and occupied in September of this year.

The increase in new homes continues with a total of 35 new living units approved this year. An approved subdivision on the site of Adam's Campground off Route 286 has proposed to construct 66 new residential dwellings.

OFFICE OF CODE ENFORCEMENT HEALTH OFFICER - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

The Health Department had a very busy year in 1996. Failed septic systems were a major problem with complaints more than doubling this year. Hopefully most of the town will be connected to the town system in 1997.

The town experienced a major health problem with E Coli in the water supply this year. This has been corrected and the state now requires that the town chlorinate our wells to assure a safe water supply.

Complaints of unsafe and unsanitary conditions and miscellaneous complaints in rental buildings are increasing at a rapid rate. As our rental housing buildings get older, the problems with maintaining these buildings increase. The town does not have a code to regulate minimum standards for rental units making it very difficult to correct many of these problems.

SEWER CONSTRUCTION PROJECT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

The Seabrook Sewer Project has now entered its final phase of construction. Sewer service connection work is in progress to homes and businesses. As of the end of 1996 approximately 750 homes on the beach and in south Seabrook are connected to sewer.

The main sewer projects are 100% complete with only final paving to be performed on several streets in the spring of 1997.

House connections to the sewer are being scheduled in seven phases. Work is progressing in the first four phases as follows:

Phase I - South Seabrook, 95% complete Phase II - Business users, 30% complete

Phase III - Beach, 70% complete

Phase IV - Central Seabrook, 10% complete

Work in the first four phases is scheduled to be completed by summer 1997.

The projected schedule for the last three phases is as follows:

Phase V - North Seabrook, Summer, 1997 Phase VI - Northwest Seabrook, Fall, 1997 Phase VII - Southwest Seabrook, Fall, 1997

Preceding the hookup to the property, the Town will prepare a design of the connection. This design will be forwarded to the owner with an application form for signature. The sewer service design will then be bid out for construction or the work can be performed by the Town Sewer Department crews.

Prior to any hookup, a plumbing inspection of the building will be performed to insure that all vents, traps, and cleanouts are properly installed. The Town Sewer Office will coordinate the plumbing inspection schedule with the property owners. Owners will be detailed in the plumbing inspection report, which will be mailed to the owner, before the connection to the system. A final plumbing inspection will be performed to verify that necessary corrections have been made.

Two sewer policies have been adopted by the Town as follows:

- An individual homeowner may elect to hire his own contractor to install his service at a set fee for reimbursement.
- Individual home septic systems which are failing will be pumped by the Town for free until the home is connected to sewer.

We appreciate your continued patience with the Town as we work towards the connection of the 3500 properties to the new Seabrook sewer system.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Seabrook, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road), on Thursday, March 13, 1997, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to participate in the first session of the 1997 Annual Town Meeting;

And, you are hereby notified to meet in the auditorium of the Seabrook Community Center, U.S. Route 1 (Lafayette Road), on Tuesday, April 8, 1997, at 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon and to cast ballots on the official ballot questions below, until at least 7:00 o'clock in the evening of the same day.

Further, you are hereby notified that the moderator will process the absentee ballots at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon on Tuesday, April 8, 1997, pursuant to RSA 659-49.

Article 1: To elect by non-partisan ballot: one (1) Selectman and Assessor for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Tax Collector for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Supervisor of the Checklist for a term of six (6) years; two (2) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three (3) years; one (1) member of the Planning Board for a term of two (2) years; two (2) members of the Planning Board for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Park Commissioner for a term of three (3) years; one (1) Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three (3) years; three (3) Constables for a term of one (1) year; and one (1) Trustee of the Library for a term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 2: Shall we vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Thirteen Million Nine Hundred Twenty-six Thousand Four Hundred Six \$13,926,406.00 Dollars? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be Thirteen Million Three Hundred Ninety-seven Thousand Fifty (\$13,397,050.00) Dollars, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of re-roofing the town hall building. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the re-roofing is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 4: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-two Thousand Four Hundred Seventy-eight (\$62,478.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping three (3) police cruisers, and to authorize the trade-in of three (3) existing police cruisers. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the cruisers are purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 5: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-four Thousand One Hundred Twenty (\$24,120.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping two (2) police motorcycles. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the motorcycles are purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 6: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-six Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety-two (\$66,892.00 Dollars for the cost of Seabrook's contribution to fifteen (15) human service agencies in the seacoast area. A breakdown of each human service agency's request follows. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse as to each line item until the contributions are completed or in one (1) year. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 7: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty Thousand (\$180,000.00) Dollars to conduct a full field inspection type re-valuation of all property within the Town of Seabrook. This re-valuation to be effective as of December 1998. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the re-valuation is completed or in three

(3) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million One Hundred Ninety Thousand (\$1,190,000.00) Dollars for the purchase and installation of water meters. Any billing based on meter usage will allow for a basic rate equal to a minimum of 36,000 gallons per year. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the water meters are purchased and installed or in five (5) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 9: To see if the town will vote to ratify the financial terms of the collective bargaining agreement reached on November 28, 1996, between the board of selectmen and the Seabrook Permanent Fire Fighters Association, which calls for a Fifty-seven Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-nine (\$57,999.00) Dollar increase in salaries and benefits for the fiscal years 1996 and 1997, and further, to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-three Thousand Three Hundred One (23,301.00) Dollars for the contract year 1996, and further, to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-four Thousand Six Hundred Ninetyeight (\$34,698.00) Dollars for the contract year 1997, for a total appropriation of Fifty-seven Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-nine (\$57,999.00) Dollars for fiscal year 1997. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the contract payments are completed or in one (1) year. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-two Thousand (\$22,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of repairing the community center roof. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the roof repairs are completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty-five Thousand \$325,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and implementing a SCADA alarm and monitoring system for the water department. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the SCADA system is completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 12: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-eight Thousand (\$98,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing an emergency generator, chlorination equipment and fencing for the new bedrock well #5. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the emergency generator, chlorination equipment and fencing are completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$150,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and installing new radio equipment for the police, fire, public works, emergency management, and water and sewer departments. This will include Fifteen Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-five (\$15,325.00) Dollars from an approved grant from the U.S. Department of Justice Local Law Enforcement Block Grants Program, and One Hundred Thirty-four Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-five (\$134,675.00) Dollars from the town. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the radio equipment is purchased and installed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$250,000.00) Dollars for the restoration of Cain's Brook and repair of the dam. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the restoration and repairs are completed or in five (5) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 15: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-six Thousand (\$56,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing and equipping a tractor for the public works department, and to authorize the sale or trade-in of the existing 1985 John Deere tractor. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the tractor is purchased and equipped or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 16: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00)

Dollars for the purpose of repairing the department of public works building roof. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the roof repairs are completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 17: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-nine Thousand Six Hundred Fifty (\$39,650.00) Dollars for the purpose of paving and installing gates and fencing in town cemeteries. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI and shall not lapse until the paving, gates and fencing are completed or in two (2) years. The selectmen and the budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to convey to Michael J. Eaton, Jr., and Beverly Eaton, 1,909 square feet of land adjacent to the Worthley Avenue Pump Station and described as Tax Assessor's Map 16, Lot 66, at a price of Seven Hundred Six Dollars and Thirty-three Cents (\$706.33) based on cost of the land to the town, plus any applicable legal/administrative costs, the land being of no use to the town.

Article 19: Shall we adopt elderly exemptions from property tax? The optional exemptions, based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: For a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$25,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$37,500.00; for a person 80 years of age or older \$50,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the single taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$15,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$25,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$70,000.00, excluding the value of the person's residence.

Article 20: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Code of the Town of Seabrook - Vehicles and Traffic -, Section 24, Schedule V: Vehicle Weight Limits, to increase the maximum gross weight limit on True Road and Old New Boston Road to 55,000 pounds, consistent with other town roads.

Article 21: To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell a parcel of land on Batchelder Road owned by the town and described as Tax Assessor's Map 6, Lot 15-1 to an abutter, Will-Mor Engineering, value based on the average of three independent appraisals conditioned on the town obtaining an easement across part of the existing Will-Mor Engineering property for the purpose of providing full access to land-locked town property. The remaining terms of this transfer shall be negotiated by the selectmen.

Article 22: To see if the town will vote to establish an expendible Conservation Commission Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5.

Article 23: On petition of Betty Bronk and twenty-eight (28) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the Town of Seabrook will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Fifty (\$1,250.00) Dollars to the New Hampshire SPCA to support the many services they provide to the Town of Seabrook, including sheltering and adoption of homeless animals, impoundment facilities, lost and found services, animal cruelty/neglect investigation, assistance to animal control officers, public information services and referrals, education programs and services, pet therapy and more. The selectmen and the budget committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 24: On petition of Martin Paul Janvrin and forty (40) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of dismantling of all pumps and pipes pertaining to the Mill Lane Wells, to ensure said wells will no longer be a part of the water distribution system of the Town of Seabrook." The selectmen do not recommend this appropriation. The budget committee does recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 25: On petition of Eric N. Small and thirty-three (33) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Eight Hundred

(\$9,800.00) Dollars for the purpose of evaluating and correcting acoustic problems in the program room of the Seabrook Library." The selectmen and the budget committee do not recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 26: On petition of Karen K. Luxton and thirty-seven (37) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-d authorizing the library trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, provided, however, that no acceptance of personal property by the library trustees shall be deemed to bind the town or the library trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such personal property."

Article 27: On petition of Earl S. Perkins and twenty-four (24) other legal voters of the town: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars to purchase a parcel of land on Dow's Lane from the Estate of Joseph H. Perkins for the future widening of that road. Said parcel adjoins Dow's Lane on the west side, it is approximately 600 feet long, an average width of 30 feet and is shown on a plan of land for Joseph H. Perkins recorded in the Rockingham County Registry as Plan #D-19183." The selectmen do not recommend this appropriation. The budget committee does recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 28: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249-18 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic by adding the following section and to renumber the chapter accordingly:

On-street parking on streets north of Hooksett Street shall be restricted to Seabrook residents by special permit only.

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Article 29: To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell a parcel of land on Worthley Avenue owned by the town and described as Tax Assessor's Map 16, Lot 61, to an abutter, Bobbi-Jo Welch, value based on the average of three independent appraisals. The remaining terms of this transfer shall be negotiated by the selectmen.

Article 30: To transact all other legal business that may come before this meeting.

THE SEABROOK RECREATION COMMISSION - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

The members of the Seabrook Recreation Commission are: Vernon Small, Chairman; Oliver Carter, Selectman and Vice Chairman; Charlotte Dow, Secretary; Rosemary Fowler, Parks Department; William Knowles, Planning Board; Sheryl Maltais, Ralph Marshall, Shelly Carter and Salvatore Rubera. The administrative staff of the Seabrook Recreation Department are Sandra Beaudoin, Director of Recreation and Edward Pickard, Assistant Director.

During 1996 we observed an increase in the enrollment of structured programs and on many occasions had to double up classes or add more staff. Our summer camps still were on the rise in 1996: 154 children attended in 1992; 155 in 1993; 187 in 1994; 235 in 1995 and 264 in 1996. The department had four sessions of activities; three vacation schedules and a June schedule. In 1996 efforts were made to accommodate the increases in interests and enrollments. Attendance has been consistently increasing for the past few years.

The Community Center needed some repairs upon entering its twelfth year of being open to the public. This repair included improving the current dryvit system "stucco appearing walls on the exterior of the building." Some areas were reinforced to reduce any vandalism and other areas were painted with a weathering paint. Most of the maintenance was routine, except for some unexpected costly repairs to the Community Center's emergency generator.

The following indicates the number of different types of Special Events and the lowest & highest attendance for the type of event. The Daily Averages display shows the lowest and highest month's daily average attendance.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN/TOWN MANAGER - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

We are pleased to be able to provide you with the following report summarizing the events and activities of 1996:

The town continues to experience heavy growth, both residential and commercial, due to the construction of our sewer system. There are currently 105 residential housing lots in new subdivisions available for construction in 1997. Three new industrial buildings and two new commercial buildings have obtained site approval for construction and there are several proposals for new buildings and renovations for the commercial zone along Route 1.

Our recycling operation is expanding to include plastic, cardboard, used motor oil and used paint. Our volume has increased by 36%. The swap shop is operational and we invite anyone with good working items that they no longer need to drop them off at the facility.

Our water system this year went through some major changes, such as the installation of chlorination equipment and the start-up of our new well #5. The demand on our water supply is increasing and we are exploring several options to increase our supply with new wells along with possible improvements for our existing wells. The chlorination has created some problems due to its reaction with the iron and manganese in our system. We are working on this situation with our water engineers to minimize any inconveniences from the iron.

We are still pursuing the dredging of the harbor and Blackwater River to improve boat operations, anchorage and to reduce damage to the clam flats. Funding of \$1.7 million has been included in the Port Authority budget for this dredging and is pending approval by the state legislature.

We have experienced a very busy year and project 1997 to be just as busy as we concentrate on completing the sewer service connections and improve our water supply.

The board would like to encourage your participation in Seabrook's government. This can be accomplished by serving as a volunteer on many committees which town government has or attending meetings and voicing your input on how you would like to see us function. The office of the selectmen and town manager is here to serve you. Please let us know how we can improve our service.

SEABROOK LIBRARY - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

Nineteen ninety-six - the second full year spent in the new building - proved to be a most memorable year for the Seabrook Library. Membership has skyrocketed since the big move from the old Brown Library in 1994, with 560 new registrations occurring in 1996 which brings the total number of card holders to just under 5,000 (1987 - 1996). Circulation, or the number of items loaned, climbed to a record 28,748 in 1996 and the number of customers rose to a remarkable 25,201 - an increase over the previous year of 23%!

During the year there occurred several events of interest, the most notable of which was the inception of the monthly Poetry Evenings. Beginning as Slams and ending as Open Mike nights, participants enjoyed themselves while sharing their skills with words. Programs on various aspects of personal financial management were also offered to the public. Additionally, the Library progressed further along the path of full (computer) automation by starting to utilize its computerized card catalog, and also began offering the Internet to the public - which quickly became an extremely popular feature at the library.

The adult book discussion group continued with its monthly dinner meetings, and the Friends of the Library sold the annually-popular glow necklaces during the fireworks display at Seabrook's Old Home Days on August 17, 1996. Thanks are once again due to Friends' Chairperson Denise Favaloro for all of her efforts in this regard. Also at Old Home Days, during the day, the library sponsored a booth which featured surfing of the Internet which proved to be very popular.

Another significant event occurred in September when Lesley K. Gaudreau replaced Laura H. Maroon on the library staff when Laura moved on to a school library far more conveniently located for her. Lesley is a wonderful new addition to the staff as reference librarian and will concentrate her efforts towards grades 5 - 12. Many programs were held for young adults including a mystery night, babysitting classes, a workshop on the S.A.T. and college preparation, a self-defense workshop, and slate painting with Jean Keefe - whom we thank very much for the assistance.

The children's room held two successful summer reading programs entitled *Tree of Talking Leaves for grades 1 - 5, and Tribe of Readers* for the preschool set. Special events for children included performers Purley Gates, Judy Pancoast, Todd Wellington - "Professional Silly Person", and long-time local favorite Papa Joe.

Memberships in the American Library Association, the New England Library Association, the New Hampshire Library Association, CHILIS (Children's Librarians) and the Seacoast Cooperative Libraries were maintained; and in March Norman H. Brown was elected to the Board of Library Trustees succeeding Paul M. Kelley, who retired. The other trustee members are Patricia M. O'Keefe and Stanley A. Hamel.

The Seabrook Library is open Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 12:00 PM until 8:00 PM; on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10:00 AM until 6:00 PM; and Saturdays from 9:00 AM until 1:00 PM.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

I would like to begin the DPW report by thanking the men and women of the various departments who helped make 1996 a successful year. With one of the biggest snowfalls on record, all employees served the town in keeping the town roads clear and safe.

The highway crews were involved with numerous projects. They included spring cleanup, gravel and loam sifting operations, numerous drainage projects, re-grading shoulders of various roads, beach raking, and snow fence removal at the beach. Crews also assisted the water and sewer departments. Projects included help on pump stations, water line installations and sewer service hookups.

There were some changes at the transfer station and recycling center this year. We have expanded our recycling to include cardboard, waste motor oil and used paint. The amount of solid waste we disposed of at Ogden Martin Systems fell nearly 18% from 1995. The drop was due partially to separating out shingles and construction and demolition materials. The remainder was from an increase in recycling. The following is a breakdown of items removed from waste steam:

WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT - ANNUAL TOWN REPORT 1996

There were 484,681,050 gallons of water pumped in 1996. This was a 130,149,891 gallon decrease from the previous year. Industrial-

commercial use decreased from 133,460,815 in 1995 to 132,235,240 in 1996. This was a 1,225,075 decrease from the previous year.

A new well was put on line in July. This well, located off Old New Boston Road, is the largest capacity well that the town owns. It produces approximately 650 gallons per minute. The pump station was built by Scherbon Consolidated, Inc. of Amesbury, MA., and was engineered by Earth Tech-Whitman and Howard of Concord, MA. The site work at this pump station and well was done by the crew. Some of the work included building 900 feet of roadway, installing water mains, electrical conduit, drainage, and erecting the pump chamber. Hottopping and fencing will be completed in the spring of 1997. About 12 new water services were installed. Several water leaks were reported; most of these leaks were caused by the sewer crews. The following is a partial list of work the crews have completed over and above their normal and routine work:

The two wells at Mill Lane were shut down and disconnected after they were discovered to be contaminated with E. coli bacteria. The crew reshingled the roofs'at the Ledge Road pump stations. On the western section of New Zealand Road, about 12 water services were abandoned from the 10" water main and reinstalled to the 12" water main. Currently, in this section, from Route 107 to True Road where we have the two mains, there are no water services under the roadway. On Riley Road the water main and four water services were replaced. A fire hydrant at the end of True Lane was relocated. The crew, under the sewer department, installed a 24" force main drainage along Ocean Boulevard and an 8" force main on River Street. The crew also installed main line sewer and manhole structures on the Bagley property on Lower Collins Street, Bigs Lane, Pals Pub on Route 1, elderly housing on Railroad Avenue, and behind the homes through easements off Haverhill and Amesbury Streets. They also installed gas mains and electrical conduit to several sewer pump stations.

The wastewater treatment plant began to receive sewage around the first of the year. The discharging of the treated effluent occurred in April. At the end of the year the discharge had risen to approximately 200,000 gallons per day. So far, the contractors and town crews have installed about 650 sewer services. Except for one, all sewer pump stations have been completed and are ready to receive sewage.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the sewer and water department personnel for the outstanding work they accomplished in 1996. I would also like to thank everyone who cooperated with observing our partial water ban on the outdoor use of water during the summer months. This allowed outdoor use of water three hours per day between 6:30 am to 8:00 am and 6:30 pm to 8:00 pm.

Remember - water is a precious and useful resource and should be used wisely and not wastefully. Conserving water is everyone's responsibility.

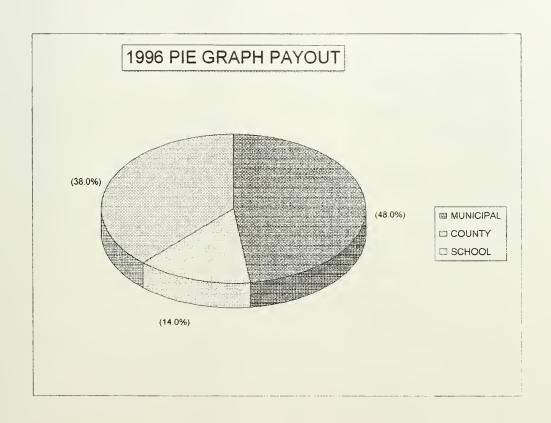

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager Town of Seabrook Seabrook, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook as of and for the year ended December 31, 1995. These general-purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general-purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general-purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general-purpose financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Seabrook has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Seabrook, as of December 31, 1995, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

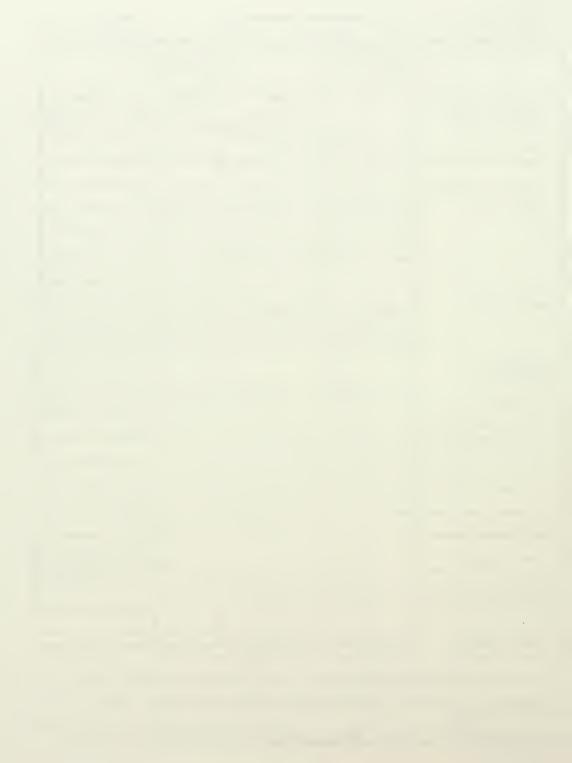
