You are hereby notified to meet at the Elementary School Auditorium in said Pembroke on Tuesday the 8th day of March next, at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 Are you in favor of the adoption of the following Amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

Amendment No. 1:

Section 5.00 - Use Regulations - Table Principal Uses - Residential - Delete #7 "Conversion of existing dwelling structure to two family dwelling." " $P \cdot P \cdot P \cdot N$ "

Amendment No. 2:

Section 11 - Change heading from SPECIAL EXCEPTION CONDITIONS TO "CONDITIONS - SPECIAL EXCEPTION AND PERMITTED."

Amendment No. 3:

Section 8.01 · Line 7 · place period after word "use" and delete remainder of paragraph "unless the increase in units or measurements amounts to less than 25 percent, whether such increase occurs at one time or in successive stages."

Amendment No. 4:

Section 9.01 · Insert the following after last sentence. "It is the purpose of this Ordinance to discourage the perpetuity of non-conforming uses whenever possible. The lawful use of any building or land existing at the enactment of this Ordinance may be continued, except as otherwise provided herein:

Section 9.02 - 1. Insert period after word "expanded" and delete the rest of paragraph "more than 50 percent of its original size at the time of adoption of this Ordinance. The expansion may be done at one time or in successive stages."

- 2. Insert period after word "expanded" and delete the rest of the paragraph "more than 100 percent of its original size at the time of adoption of this Ordinance. The expansion may be done at one time or in successive stages."
- 3. In first line delete the first "the" and insert the following "a conforming." In second line after word "to" insert "further." In third line delete the following "maximum building area and yard" and insert the following "dimensional and density."

In proposed Amendments change #4 to Section 9.03 and change word "rezoning to "recording."

Amendment No. 5:

Section 2.00 - Insert between the definition of Yard, Rear and Yard, Side the following: "Yard Sale: Holding of any public sale or auction, for a limited time, by any town organization, or by any resident family from his residence, building, or yard."

Section 5.00 - Retail and Service, add after "22," the following "23" Yard Sale (See Sections 11.03 and 11.20) and under district R-1, the letter "P", under district R-3, the Letter "P," under district B-1, the letter "P" and under district C-1, the letter "P."

Section 11.03 \cdot Insert after "G" the following "H" \cdot Yard sale (See Section 11.20 in lieu of paragraphs 1 thru 5 following.)"

Insert after Section 11.19 the following new section "11.20 Yard Sale: A permit for a yard sale may be issued subject to the following conditions:

1. General Conditions:

- a. Yard Sales by a resident family or town organization are limited to six days per calendar year unless special circumstances are deemed to exist, which in the opinion of the Selectmen warrant an extension of this time limitation.
- b. A permit must be obtained prior to date of sale and will be valid for only date (s) and time (s) specified in permit, so long as the public safety is not endangered by increased vehicular or pedestrian activity generated by the yard sale, and that there are no valid objections from abutting property owners on demonstrable fact.
- c. Yard sale permit will bear the permit number, name and address of yard sale sponsor, date (s) and time (s) of yard sale, location, and signatures of Selectmen.
- 3. To see what action the Town will take on the following question: "Shall the provisions for absentee ballot for the election of Town Officers be adopted by this Town."
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed, in the name of the Town, to the purchaser of such land.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named Funds, in Trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:
- A. The George P. Cofran Fund of three hundred dollars (\$300.00), the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Cofran lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
 - B. The Daisy M. Bailey Fund of five hundred dollars (\$500.00),

the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Locke and Clough lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

- C. The Norman C. and Abbie M. Smith Fund of two hundred dollars (\$200.00), the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Smith lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the following items of new equipment and to appropriate the amounts indicated therefor:

Sidewalk Plow (Highway Department	\$12,310.00
Emergency Generator (Fire Department)	3,750.00
Police Cruiser	4,900.00
Total	\$20,960.00

and to authorize the withdrawal of twenty thousand nine hundred sixty dollars (\$20,960.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of funds from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes, and in the amounts indicated or take any other action thereon:

Street Lighting	\$10,000.00
Fire Hydrants	11,000.00
Concord Dump Fee	4,040.00
	\$25,040.00

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be added to the appropriation of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) made under Article 8 of the 1976 Town Warrant, making a total appropriation of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) to defray the Town's share of the cost of relocating Horse Corner Road and discontinuing Horse Corner Bridge, the City of Concord bearing the remainder of said cost.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for the purpose of making renovations and necessary repairs to the Municipal Building to provide new Police Department facilities and office space for Town Administration; and to authorize the Selectmen to raise said sum of money by the issuance of Serial Notes of the Town as provided in RSA 33.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$950.00) for the purchase and installation of Street name signs for those streets where such signs are damaged or non-existent.

(This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift under the Will of George P. Cofran of an undivided one-third interest in and to the tract of land situated on Buck Street and known as Evergreen Cemetery, the same to be kept and maintained forever as a Town Cemetery; to accept a gift from Margaret O. Gault of her interest in said Cemetery, under the same conditions; and further to authorize the Cemetery Commission to negotiate for and accept in the name of the Town the remaining interest in said Cemetery from the remaining heirs of the late Nellie B. Osgood, or take any other action thereon.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance as a By-Law of the Town:

ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO LICENSING OF DANCES, MUSICAL CONCERTS AND ENTERTAINMENT FUNCTIONS

Every person or organization holding a dance, musical concert or entertainment function where a fee or charge is made directly or indirectly for admission or which will be attended by more than 200 persons regardless of any admission charge shall obtain a written license from the Board of Selectmen at least 30 days prior thereto, subject to the following conditions:

- (a) Such license shall specify the time and place of the dance, musical concert or entertainment function and the hours thereof.
- (b) A police officer or officers to be designated by the Chief of Police and paid by the licensee shall be in attendance at every such function, unless the license expressly states that no police officer is required.
- (c) The Selectmen shall have the authority after considering the advice of the Chief of Police, the Town Health Officer and Chief of the Fire Department, to grant or deny applications for licenses on such terms and conditions as they deem necessary and reasonable for the public protection and welfare. In determining whether to grant such licenses, the Selectmen shall consider the welfare of the residents of Pembroke, the danger of potential property damage or personal injury, public safety, and the adequacy of the planning and safeguards taken by the applicant to protect the public.
- (d) The Selectmen may, in their discretion, require the applicant to post a bond in such amount and on such conditions as they deem necessary to insure compliance with the terms and conditions of the license.

- (e) Any person or organization who violates this provision shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$100.00
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance as a By-Law of the Town:

ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO PROHIBITING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES AND OBSTRUCTIONS TO STREETS

It shall be unlawful to consume or carry an open container of any alcoholic beverage on any public highway or public sidewalk within the Town of Pembroke.

Persons violating this provision shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100.00.

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons, without necessity, to place any object upon or to assemble on a public highway or sidewalk in a manner which interferes with the free passage and safety of pedestrian or vehicular traffic.

Persons violating this provision shall, upon conviction, be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100.00.

- 15. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 16. To hear the reports of Auditors, Agents and Committees or of Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said Meeting.

The Board of Sewer Commissioners are pleased to report to the community that the capital construction project is almost completed, and that the sewerage treatment facilities were operational at the start of 1977.

Enclosed herewith is a comprehensive budget for the operation and maintenance of the Suncook Wastewater Treatment Plant, River Road Pump Station, Bridge Street Pneumatic Lift Station, Bow Lane Lift Station, and main interceptor lines in the Towns of Allenstown and Pembroke, as prepared by our Consulting Engineering Firm of Morgenroth & Associates, Inc., Boston, Massachusetts.

The calculations of the expenses are prorated based on the flow capacity treated in the facilities for this initial year of operation.

The revenues for the expenditures shall be derived from a users charge, as governed by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency Grant Requirements and plans have been made to hold public hearings on the rate structure of the sewer users charge.

Also included in our Annual Report ar the financial statements for the general operating budget, capital projects fund, and debt service fund.

CAPITAL PROJECTS FUND

The Capital Projects Fund is used to record all revenues and expenditures directly connected with the construction of the new treatment plant, as well as all administrative expenses concerned with this construction.

The Fund does not reflect any investments by the commission nor does it reflect expenses and revenues of these investments. These expenses and expenditures in connection with the bond issue, are recorded in the Debt Service Fund.

The account "Due from Debt Service Fund" reflects transfers from the Capital Projects Fund to the Debt Service Fund.

DEBT SERVICE FUND

The Debt Service Fund is used to record all revenues from investments by the commission and transfers to the Town of Pembroke General Fund.

This fund does not reflect bond issue revenue or construction costs connected with the new treatment plant. These are recorded in the Capital Projects Fund to the Debt Service Fund.

PEMBROKE AND THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION BICENTENNIAL

In order to commemorate our Nation's 200th Birthday, we joined with our neighbors to form the Allenstown-Pembroke Bicentennial Committee. More Ihan 80 citizens of the two lowns worked to plan our observance and many organizations lent their wholehearted support to the effort. The Selectmen of both lowns cooperated fully with the Committee, and the Budget Committees and voters made generous appropriations available. Space is lacking to mention and thank individually all who participated, but special commendation is due to the Pembroke Woman's Club, the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Girl Scouts, the Boy Scouts, the Extension Clubs, Ihe Veterans of Foreign Wars and Iheir Auxiliary, the American Legion and Their Auxiliary, the Silver Fox Club, the Grange, the Churches, the Schools, The Buck Street Fidelity Club, the Jaycees, the Fire Department, the Suncook Bank, the Library and the Police Department. Among the many Pembroke citizens who provided indispensable leadership were George and Pauline Rainville, Lucy Pratt, Richard Gammons, John Saturley, Clair Scolt, Monica Elliot, Ellen Paulsen, Edgar Bellerose, Norman Bonenfant, Roland Young, Oscar Plourde, Dorothy Kennedy, Robert and Peter Slackhouse, Bryan McMasler, Betty Stevens and Joseph Robinson.

After many meetings for planning, it was decided to reprint both the Carter and the almost forgotten McClintock Histories of Pembroke with the proceeds, after costs, to be divided between the two towns to enable both to get a start loward the publication of additional local historical works. The reprinting has been accomplished and the two-volume set of Pembroke Histories is now available for sale.

Other activities which highlighted the year included Acts and Antics, the

variety show put on by the Woman's Club and the Jaycees; the raising of the Liberty Pole by the Fire Department; the planting of a tree for every State in the Union by the Boy Scouts; the designation of Pembroke as a Bicentennial Community by the Federal and State American Revolution Bicentennial Commissions (Henry Munroe of Pembroke was a member of the latter); Tim Kennedy's rendition of the Declaration of Independence on Memorial Day; the July 4th Eve Street Dance; the exhibition of Bicentennial projects by the students and teachers of the Elementary Schools; and the presentation of George Cofran's portrait and a framed copy of the 1824 catalog of the Academy at the Pembroke Academy Commencement.

Bicentennial Week was the rainiest of the Summer, but everyone pitched in with undampened enthusiasm. Between July 25 and August 2 our celebration reached its climax. The Heritage Trail was opened; we shared an ecumenical religious observance; the bonfire blazed against a black summer sky; the DAR served lea in Pembroke Park; we toured local homes that dated from the Revolutionary Era; and the greatest parade since the Town Bicentennial in 1959 was held under a lowering sky. The Bicentennial Ball followed the parade, and on Sunday the DAR Vesper Service was held in the old Allenstown Meeting House. On August 2nd the festivities wound up with a band concert by the Suncook Union Cornet Band and a spectacular fireworks display.

Your Committee wishes to thank every person and organization from both lowns participating in this celebration of the 200th Anniversary of our Independence.

1976 PEMBROKE POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

On Sept. 18, 1976, the police department location was moved from the cramped quarters in the cellar of the old fire station to the first floor of the same building. Although needing some renovations to adapt from a fire house to a police station, it has already proven to be an improvement for the police personnel and more convenient for public access and parking.

The building is structurally strong and is ideally located in the most populated area and just off the business district. I hope that an appropriation of funds will be made to enable us to make the necessary changes vital to police functions. Certain changes are essential to prevent heat loss, such as bricking up the overhead doors and installing suspended ceilings in the garage area. The old wiring is bad and should be replaced as

soon as possible.

Serious crime dropped considerably in Pembroke in 1976. We believe more patrolling around the clock had a direct effect.

Governor Thomson has asked all police lo work closely with the public on programs lo reduce crime. You can help the police and yourselves by reporting any suspicious persons, circumstances, and vehicles to the police promptly. Be alert and get involved!

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continued to service Pembroke for the eighth consecutive year. They have provided skilled nursing care to anyone sick in the home, especially those needing continuity of care after discharge from the hospital. They are available to give hypodermic injections, change surgical dressings, and do other treatments prescribed by the attending physician. When indicated, family members have been instructed to give care between the nurses' visits.

Special services, such as, physical Iherapy, occupational Iherapy, speech Iherapy, and nulrilion guidance have been given by Ihe special staff and consultants in order to assist with the rehabilitation of an acute or chronic illness.

When family members are unable to supply all the needed care, a staff of

homemaker-home health aides are available to give physical care, do light housekeeping and assist with meal planning and preparation.

The nurses are delighted to advise new and expectant mothers in the care of themselves and their babies. They are also glad to work with families and individuals on normal nutrition and sickness and accident prevention.

Anyone in Pembroke may request these services - doctor, family, pastor, friend or patient himself. Patients are also referred by clinics and other agencies. All calls are answered, but continuing care can be provided only under a doctor's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. is all that is necessary to start service or make inquiries. Saturday, Sunday, and Holiday calls are only made when there is serious illness. Fees may be scaled to those unable to pay the entire amount.

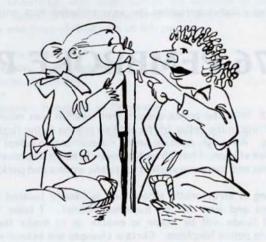
SUNCOOK CHILD & YOUTH PROGRAM

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

To the Selectmen and Citizens of Pembroke

I am grateful to report that, in 1976, fire losses were at a minimum. Weekly training continued to insure the proficiency of this department, while at the same time, we participated in large inter-department drills to assure better fireground cooperation when we respond to outside towns or they come to our assistance.

The Capital Area Dispatch Center Services improve constantly and, very soon, I hope that our participation will be reflected in insurance savings for our citizens.

Your Fire Department took an active and proud part in the town's Bicentennial Celebration. Initiating our entrance into the 3rd Century, we raised a Liberty Pole in Pembroke Park which proudly flew the Bennington flag. Wearing tri-cornered hats and carrying equipment of yesterday, we marched in the town's parade, and with our neighboring department. Allenstown, sponsored a bonfire that should be remembered for years to come. The new Fire Station was completed and occupied with dedication ceremonies held in September. Incidently, the new quarters allow us to house all our equipment, for the first time in over 10 years. Its location and efficient resources will allow us to serve the town as a whole.

I wish to commend the Pembroke firemen for their loyal and dedicated service reflected in countless hours, often late into the night and every weekend, as they painted, landscaped, and worked to finish those portions of the Station not covered in the contract. I also wish to thank the many citizens of Pembroke who, on their own, worked side by side with our firemen in completing the job. It truly was a community effort. To those individuals and companies that provided furnishings, supplies, and materials, we are all indebted. The combined effort has saved our town thousands of dollars.

This winter has been what many will call an "old-fashioned" one. Many of you have turned to wood to reduce the cost of heating. I

urge you to do two things for your safety and our peace of mind. Be sure your stove is adequately set up and, if possible, install smoke detectors. Members of my department are ready to advise or assist you in these or any matters pertaining to our mutual desire to protect you, your loved ones, and your possessions.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Since its beginning in 1893, the State Forestry Department has recognized the fact that forest fire prevention and suppression is a joint state and town or city responsibility. Local authorities recommend names of persons to the State Forester, who appoints one person as town or city fire warden and several other persons as town or city deputy fire wardens to a three year term.

The local forest fire warden controls the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and in such places as the fire warden deems as safe.

The State Forest Fire Service trains the local forest fire organization in modern forest fire prevention and suppression tactics. The State also provides backup personnel and equipment for suppression and prevention activities.

The combination of State and local forces has resulted in one of the smallest acreage loss due to forest fires in the United States for the past 20 years.

Report of the

Central New Hampshire

Regional Planning Commission

At the end of 1976 and six years of operation, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission had completed several studies of a regional as well as a local assistance nature.

During 1976 the Commission completed the following studies: an historic preservation report listing significant historic sites by community, a community facilities inventory for each community, a study outlining the impact of institutional tax exempt properties within each community. Currently the Commission is preparing a future land use study, a housing needs update study and an economic base study, all from a regional perspective.

In January the Commission delivered to the Town a set of photographic enlargements which were requested by the Selectmen and which can serve as aides to many of the Planning Board activities.

During September and October of 1976 the Commission cosponsored a series of seminars dealing with the legal aspects of planning. Several officials from Pembroke attended and the entire series received favorable comment.

In addition, the Commission responded to several inquiries from the Planning Board regarding local regulations and State law interpretation.

The Commission hopes to be able to continue to serve the needs of its member communities in future years and greatly appreciates the past support of its activities by the Town of Pembroke.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1976 ANNUAL REPORT

The Conservation Commission added a small measure to the observance of the bicentennial celebration by planting fifty shade and ornamental trees, the number being symbolic of our fifty states. This project was carried out in conjunction with the Pembroke Troop, Boy Scouts of America. A number of scouts working under the direction of Commission members selected planting sites along several of the town's streets including Pembroke Street, Buck Street, Broadway, Main Street, and also Memorial Field. Planting was done by the scouts under the leadership of Brian McMasters of Buck Street, as part of his scout requirements. This year's program added significantly to past accomplishments, replacing trees lost to disease, salt, and other pestilences.

The town forest at Brickett Hill received some improvement, in the removal of dead and dying trees. The wood was utilized by local people for fuel. Fields were also mowed again by Hemlock Hill Farm, a contribution acknowledged with thanks.

For 1977, opportunities exist for continuance of the roadside tree planting. This program is of long-range benefit to the town and will again receive first priority. A matter of growing concern is the deterioration of Class V roads (range roads) because of lack of attention. These roads are a substantial resource in their contribution to outdoor recreation opportunities and forest protection. A minimum of work, mainly to channel off surface water, will prevent serious erosion. Hopefully, a joint effort of volunteers and town forces can approach this problem in the coming year. The town forest remains a latent resource for outdoor enjoyment by the town. Several small projects may be implemented to make the area more useful and attractive. These may well be worked out with local volunteer groups.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

We are continuing our efforts to develop a regional special services center for students. Dr. Alan Pardy was appointed as the director of the Center which is called the New Hampshire Educational Resource Services, Inc. The initial task of surveying the various school districts has been completed; and a proposal has been presented to the school board as to what services the Center will be able to deliver during the 1977-1978 school year. Dr. Pardy has also assisted us in preparing a special services report that must be filed with the State Department of Education during the month of February. In addition a number of proposals have been filed with the Federal Government for the funding of special programs.

We are in the process of preparing a report relative to the state elementary school minimum standards that were established several years ago. This report as well as the educational program of the Pembroke Elementary Schools will be reviewed by a representative from the State Department of Education in the spring of this year.

We are also in the process of completing an in-depth study and discussion of the report that was prepared by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools when it accredited Pembroke Academy in 1974. A report will be prepared for consideration by the Pembroke School Board. The report will consist of a review of the New England Association recommendations that have already been implemented as well as a recommended time table relative to the implementation of the remaining recommendations.

We are very pleased with the success of the Work Study program that was established this fall under the direction of Ronald Rush.

The Curriculum Committee is continuing its work toward coordinating an educational program for grades one thru twelve. The Committee will begin to present the results of its work during the coming year.

The Staff Development Committee is being chaired by Virginia

Sanborn, a member of the Chichester Central School Staff. The system is functioning well in that all of the staff members have completed individual staff development plans; and have participated in numerous worthwhile activities. The Staff Development Process has been received with considerable enthusiasm.

The new Staff Evaluation Process that was discussed last year has been completed; and was implemented last September.

In closing, I would like to thank the School Board, School Staff and citizens of Pembroke for all that they have done for the students.

Because I believe the school to be reflection of the larger society, the Academy is confronted with challenges that are both simple and complex. Many of the more complex problems facing the school are the result of changing social structures and societal expectations. Some are internal to the school and require new approaches and innovations. However, there is reasonable evidence to suggest that the Academy is continuing to function well and attempting to meet the needs of its students.

Last fall, the New England Association of Schools and Colleges accepted my two-year progress report required of all member schools who have recently been accredited. Their notification letter indicated that the Commission was pleased to note the expansion of several programs such as horticulture, industrial arts, special education and work-study. Other progress was noted; yet, while lauding the expansion of the curriculum in some areas, the Commission noted with concern that the class size in others had reached a pupil/teacher ration of over 30-1. The increase in the number of these classes is pronounced. The letter continued to say that the Commission hopes that significant progress towards resolving its concerns will be realized before the Five-Year Progress Report is due on or before June 1, 1979.

Last year we administered the Test of Academic Skills, published by Stanford, to our senior class. This test measures ability in reading, mathematics and English. The results showed that our seniors were average in comparison with seniors across the country. For those seniors who took the college entrance exams commonly known as the S.A.T.'s - the results were a little above average in comparison with other college bound seniors across the United States. In assessing these results, one can draw many inferences depending upon one's point-of-view or frame of reference. The immediate observation would appear that we are at least "holding our own." We will, of course, strive to prepare our students as best we can with the available resources at hand.

The new work-study program, under the capable direction of Mr. Ronald Rush, has shown great growth and promise in its first year. The results are extremely encouraging and support our original assessment as to its need. As of January, 1977, the program lists 34 juniors employed and 39 seniors employed. There are 50 individual employers who cooperate with the school in carrying out educational and work related goals. The attitude of support and cooperation we have received from local and area employers is most commendable. I am personally very pleased with the progress of this new program and see it as a very positive adjunct to the regular school program.

With the advent of federal requirements relative to the learning disabled and the impact of our own special education program, new awarenesses and responsibilities are being realized on the part of our staff and administration. Currently, we have a fairly large number of students - particularly in the lower two grades - who are not experiencing success in high school. There are many reasons why some students do not succeed and the reasons are as complex as they are numerous. The implications for our staff and administration is extremely challenging. If there are legitimate reasons why some students cannot experience success in the normal ways, then new prescriptive programs for these individuals will have to be established. Developing new teaching techniques and adding more specialized personnel may be only a beginning in meeting the real needs of these students. We are now trying to identify these young people and make provisions for them in the classroom.

Teachers are constantly reporting to me the difficulty they have in challenging students to meet even minimum academic standards. Although some students are positively motivated to achieve, a growing number appear to be resisting those requirements that demand mental application and self discipline. The school realizes the importance of preparing our young people with the basic skills and attitudes for success in the world after high school and student apathy towards school work and attendance is a growing concern. More purposeful in their pursuit of gainful employment, many of our students lack the motivation to prepare themselves in the academic areas. A desire for immediate success in the work world. a desire for independence at an earlier age that money seems to promise, and a desire for material things now, are powerful motivating factors for many of our students. As a result of these factors, attendance concerns continue to be a reflection of the greater problem.

At no time has it been more important for the school, the parents and the community to work together in helping to meet the complex problems and challenges facing the education of our children.

A very special thanks to Superintendent Gerald Croteau for his continuing support, encouragement and leadership, and to Mr. Leo Goguen, Business Manager, for his valuable and constructive in-put and assistance. Again, my warm thanks to the Academy staff who continue to work hard and effectively in helping to educate our students. The many problems and challenges they face every day demands great dedication, skill and endurance and we all owe them special thanks. My sincere thanks to our students and parents who continue to be supportive and helpful. Although we face many tribulations, the overall spirit of cooperation and interest is extremely encouraging and rewarding.

The school had an opening day enrollment of 414; with a staff of 20 classroom and special teachers. Ms. Kathleen Lott has replaced Mrs. Marjorie Lawton in the Junior High Math area; Mrs. Mary Gosselin and Mrs. Priscilla Lemaire have been our two teacher aides working in the Intermediate and Junior High grades, respectively, and Mr. Ira Fateman is our new school counselor.

It is encouraging, as we start a new school year, to observe the progress the Pembroke Elementary School has made in the area of curriculum development during these past few years.

Since becoming principal of the school, the staff and I have set as our objective a program of studies which would be advantageous to our students, however problematic their learning difficulties may have been diagnosed. With that objective in mind, the school set out to review the present programs and to make critical decisions as to whether a complete updating or revision was required to reach our objectives.

In 1974 - 1975, the school had initiated a program in Language Arts in which the students would be grouped according to performance and not by grades. It was felt that a change of this nature would greatly maximize our efforts in coordinating the total Reading and English curriculum and eliminate the duplication of efforts in teaching basically the same reading levels in each grade.

Since its inception, the program has been working quite successfully and plans are being made to group students in a similar fashion next year in the area of Math.

In 1975 - 1976, a new Science program was introduced which took into account the wide variety of learning styles and experiences designed to meet individual differences in ability, interests and needs. We were able to coordinate our program in grades 4 - 8 so that we would not be duplicating units in each of the grades. Through the process of investigation, the program attempts to challenge intellectual ability, and encourage self-discipline.

This school year, 1976 - 1977, a new Math curriculum has been adopted. The program had been selected because of its approach to the basics, an old term with new meaning in today's educational jargon. This new series permits the student to work independently as he or she wishes or feels capable. It is the goal of the school to have multi-age grouping in this area of the curriculum next year, similar to that set-up in Language Arts.

In addition to the changes in the above mentioned areas, the Music department has also made tremendous strides involving many students. This year some 150 students are either in the instrumental or choral programs. This is a remarkable increase of students' participation from prior years. Had you seen the Christmas Concert, you probably would have been amazed at the quality of each individual performance. For next year, the school is projecting a larger number of students to be involved, for which we are pleased.

A new athletic activity has been added this year. Gymnastics, because of its tremendous interest, has been included and opened to anyone, boys or girls, in the school. So far there are 50 youngsters who are presently involved.

Our programs have been designed to meet the needs of students. Our goals set-up to provide the best available education for each and every one of our students. We have met with remarkable success in many instances and seek new approaches to help those youngsters not attaining individual success. I feel with the addition of two aides this year, who have as their primary duties, helping students with learning difficulties; and with the continued efforts of our two Title I tutors, and our full-time Learning Disabilities teacher, the successes will be even greater as time moves on.

In the years ahead, we must continue to strive and seek ways of

improving the curriculum, so as to enable all students the opportunity to reach potential success. The school cannot possibly believe that it has all the answers to the complex problems facing today's youngsters. To educate the total child, that is, physically, socially, intellectually and educationally, takes the full cooperation of the community.

Parents play the most important part in the development of the child, and we must utilize their efforts in the functioning of the school. The school has also welcomed parents to view, first hand, the education of their child and wish that many of them could involve themselves in some way in providing help, either through tutorial work in the classroom, or at home.

I wish to thank the Pembroke School Board, for their tremendous support, Mr. Gerald A. Croteau, our Superintendent, for his advice and influence, our staff for their dedication to all the programs involving our students, and certainly to the many fine parents who have supported our programs and trusted deeply in what we had and have developed.

The 1976-77 school year began with the Hill School enrollment down approxomately twenty students from the previous year. Although class sizes are still running high (Team C classes are still over 30) the severely over crowded conditions of a year ago have been reduced. From present statistics, it appears that the enrollment has peaked and will now level off or possibly even decrease slightly in the next few years.

New Staff this year includes Mrs. Marie-Claire Loiselle, Team B teacher, Mrs. Rita Murdough, Team B aide, Mr. Ira Fateman, Guidance counselor, and Mr. Paul Kiely, Principal. Twenty-three staff members have returned. The consistency in the Hill School program is in large part due to the small staff turnover rate.

The Hill School has operated an individualized instructional program for several years. Such a program requies additional staff planning and team work. Having Wednesday afternoons to accomplish much of this planning has been most helpful.

Also on Wednesdays, the staff has redesigned the math program, concentrating more on basic skills. A practical individualized management system has been developed.

Also on Wednesdays, the staff held a series of meetings to review disciplinary procedures. Inconsistencies were resolved. A model which provides students with opportunities to learn how to make better behavioral choices has been adopted.

Also on Wednesdays, special service teachers have conferred with classroom teachers on a regular basis. Because children with learning problems are able to function at the Hill School in regular classrooms for much of the day, with support help from the special service teachers for its remainder, their problems are minimized. Without a high level of communication between staff, this program would be ineffective.

A Parent Advisory Council has been organized. Its functions are to act as a communications link between home and school; to organize and give direction to a parent's group; and to review and consult with the administration on the math curriculum. Its members include Mrs. Jan Davis, Mr. Gerard Frechette, Mrs. Kay Taylor and Mrs. Lucinda Edmonds. Their efforts have helped to improve school-community relations.

As first year Principal, I have been impressed with the high value which is placed on education by the citizens of Pembroke. This value has been manifest in my conversations with parents, in

the concerns of the school board and budget committee with the quality of education, and in the efforts of the many school volunteers to help our children.

I would further like to give credit to the fine staff of the Hill School, whose dedication and expertise continue to provide our children with positive educational experiences.

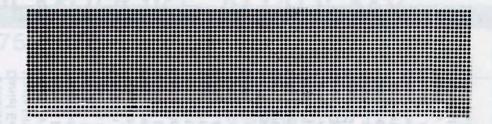

PEMBROKE WATER WORKS

The Commissioners of the Pembroke Water Works are pleased to present the following summary for the year ending December 31, 1976.

On March 9, 1976 at the monthly meeting of the Board of Water Commissioners Mr. William Stanley was elected Chairman of the Board and Mr. Maurice Lavoie was elected as Clerk of the Commission. The Board also welcomed back Mrs. Helen Petit to the Board who was elected to her third five year term as Water Commissioner.

1976 was a progressive year as a total of 3004 feet of new main was installed on our system, also adding a total of 45 new services, Thirty two (32) of them in Allenstown and thirteen (13) in Pembroke. A total of fourteen (14) services were relayed and another one hundred forty five (145) were repaired, and eight (8) unused services were disconnected from the system.

Forty nine (49) new meters were installed and a total of one hundred eight (108) meters were repaired for different malfunctions and seven (7) other meters were found frozen.

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PEMBROKE WATER WORKS NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1976

NOTE 1: Significant Accounting Policies -

Materials and supplies inventory is valued at cost using first in, first out method.

Property and equipment are shown at cost. Depreciation is computed by using the following estimated useful lives:

Exploration costs of new wells is shown at cost. All amortization is computed on the straight-line method over a five year period.

Uncollectible accounts receivable are written off to expense in the year they are deemed to be uncollectible.

- NOTE 2: Cost of water mains included in fixed assets reflects only those costs actually expended by Pembroke Water Works. In past years, Pembroke Water Works has acquired title to additional mains located in housing development areas. The cost of such mains has been borne by the developer. Under the standard contract provision, mains thus installed in development areas become the property of the town after a specified period of time has passed. The cost of mains so acquired is not reflected in any wasy in the fixed asset accounts.
- NOTE 3: In August 1973, the State of New Hampshire granted to the Water Works an easement and right of way for the construction of a well and pumping station on land situated in Bear Brook State Park. Under the terms of the easement agreement, the Water Works is obligated to supply indefinetely up to 50,000 gallons of water per day to the State at no charge.
- NOTE 4: Accounts receivable includes \$135.00 for a new service which was installed in June, 1976. As of December 31, 1976 the customer had not been billed for this installation.

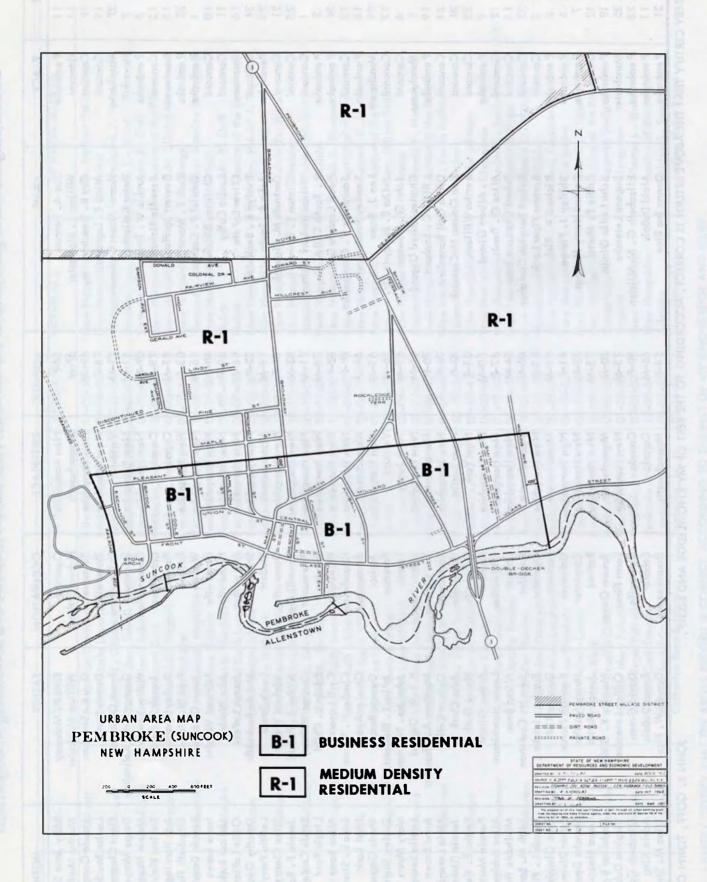

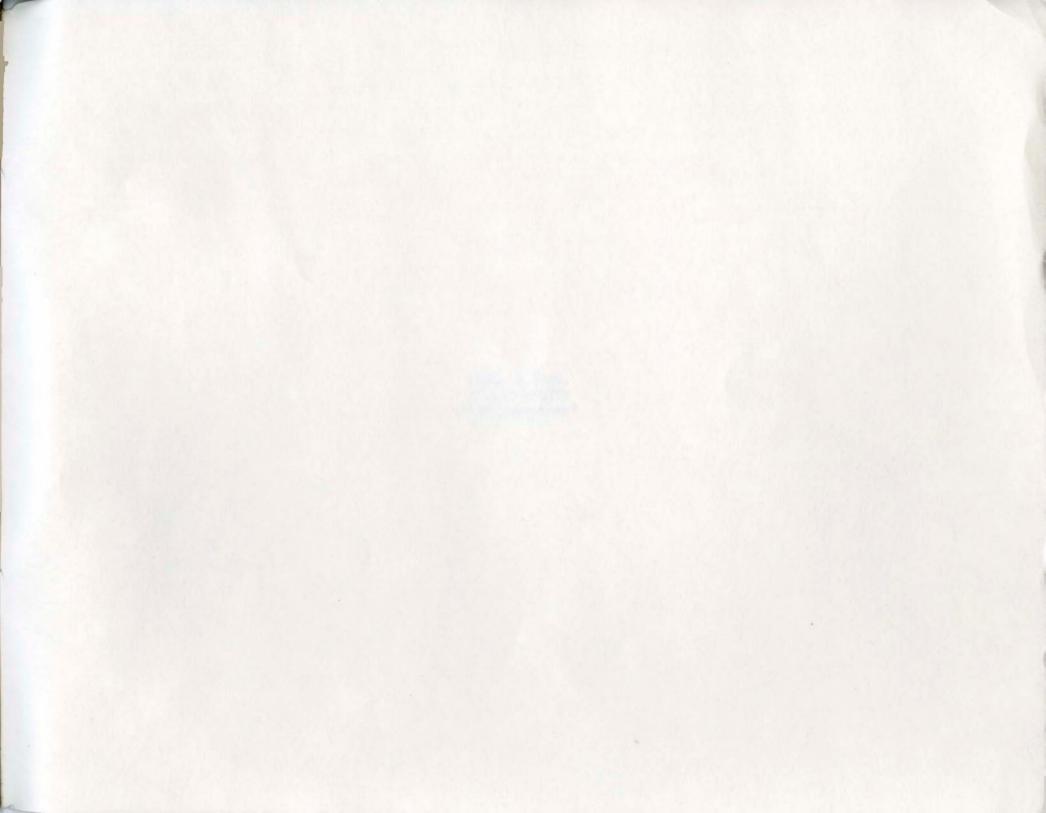
