

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar Scchool Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20c) cents on and after September 1, 1956, on all unpaid poll taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.

6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano in this Town.

7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

- (a) Samuel Webster fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Samuel Webster Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- (b) Levi and Olive Burroughs fund of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Levi and Olive Burroughs Lot in Evergreen Cemetery.
- 8. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will choose its Highway Agent by election of the voters at the Annual Town Meeting, the first such election to be held at the Annual Town Meeting for the year 1957.

9. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to install a sewer on Middle Street beginning from the Front Street sewer and continuing on said Middle Street to the proposed home of Ernest Plourde, a distance of approximately four hundred (400) feet. This sewer shall be constructed of materials commonly used for such purposes, the pipe having six (6) or eight (8) inches in diameter or such other specifications as the Town Planning Board shall recommend.

10. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars to purchase a new piece of fire apparatus, the same being equipped with adequate pump and other necessary equipment; and in connection with said purchase, to appoint a committee of five (5) legal residents, the Chairman of which is to be Fire Chief Alfred Metivier, and membership thereto to be appointed by said Chairman except that one member of said committee shall be a member of the Board of Selectmen, ex officio. To authorize the Board of Selectmen in connection with said purchase to borrow on six (6) serial notes, the total sum not to exceed Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$16,500.00) Dollars, five (5) of said notes to be in the sum of Three Thousand (\$3,000.00) Dollars each and the sixth (6th) note in the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred (\$1,500.00) Dollars, payable respectively one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4), five (5) and six (6) years from the date of issuance and to be paid from funds to be raised by taxation.

11. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to accept land by deed of Catherine Cuthy, said land being a strip beginning on Main Street and running westerly approximately five hundred (500) feet as surveyed and laid out by the said Catherine Cuthy, said land to conform to the standards established by Article 12 of the warrant for the Annual Town Meeting of 1955 and thereafter to be used and maintained as a town street.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of sidewalk construction at locations determined by the joint approval of the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of road construction at locations determined by the joint approval of the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board.

14. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to accept land by deed of Ralph E. Parmenter, said land being a strip forty (40) feet wide and beginning at Pembroke Street on the northerly side to land owned by Ralph E. Parmenter and running easterly approximately six hundred (600) feet to land of George Chickering. Also, another strip of land forty (40) feet wide and running southerly approximately two hundred (200) feet from the above mentioned strip to land of George Chickering; also another strip of land forty (40) feet wide and running in a northerly direction approximately three hundred (300) feet to land of Walker and Watson Batchelder, said streets to be laid out, surveyed, graded and rolled in accordance with Article 12 of warrant for 1955 Town Meeting and thereafter to be maintained as a Town street.

15. (By Petition)

To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain as Town streets two (2) tracts of land by deed of Marcellous H. and Perley R. Rowe:

- (a) A strip of land forty (40) feet wide beginning on the southerly side of Pembroke Hill Road between land of Agar and land of Wells and running southerly approximately seven hundred (700) feet to land of Charles P. Norton, said street to be known as Perley street, and
- (b) A strip of land forty (40) feet wide beginning on the easterly side of said Perley Street at a point one hundred (100) feet north of land owned by Charles P. Norton and running easterly a distance of approximately two hundred fifty (250) feet to Rowe Avenue, said street to be known at Chappell Street, both said streets to have sewerage and grading with approximately one (1) foot of gravel in depth by eighteen (18) feet in width at the expense of the grantors and at no cost to the Town.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept any proposed new street provided said proposed new street has received the approval of the Town Planning Board and said approval has been so certified by the Planning Board to the Board of Selectmen.

17. To see if the Town will authorize a land developer, owner or contractor to receive the utilities of water and sewerage prior to the grading of a proposed street, provided that said developer, owner or contractor will post with the Board of Selectmen a bond with sufficient sureties to guarantee the proper grading of said proposed street at a time to be determined by the Board of Selectmen. 18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven (7) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955 and to make a study of the Town's development in order to report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one (1) member of the Board of Selectmen and six (6) other legal residents appointed by the Board of Selectmen as provided in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

19. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To transact any of the business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

To the Selectmen:

Each year there is a demand for a statement on forest fires for publication in the annual town report. It is believed they serve a good purpose in reminding local citizens of the danger from such fires and how they can help prevent them. The following is offered with the respectful request for publication in your town report.

Be a Good Citizen — Cooperate

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 per cent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 per cent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 per cent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 3864 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — where wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. WILL YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

Remember

- 1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
- 2. Make certatin they are dead out before leaving them.
- 3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

REPORT OF PEMBROKE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the past year, a new tank truck was added to the equipment of the fire department as a result of fund raising drives held by the firemen. The new piece of apparatus is a 500 gallon tank truck which is equipped with a 150 gallon per minute pump. This truck will become a valuable addition to Tanker No. 1 for fighting fires where no water supply is available.

The cost of the new tanker was \$1,800 and will be paid entirely by funds raised by the firefighters. Only a small amount remains unpaid at the present time and the debt will be written off with funds coming from firemen's salaries. The men voted to donate their services until the new truck is paid off. At the present time, no water is kept in the tanker because no heat is available where it is housed. However, the firemen have insulated and weatherproofed the building housing the tanker and ladder truck and a heating system is expected to be in operation in the near future.

Another valuable addition to the fire department equipment was a portable two-way radio priced at more than \$400. Again, this piece of equipment was paid from funds raised by the firemen through a series of suppers, paper drive and dance.

Reviewing its fund raising activities during the past three years, the records show that over \$3,400 was spent for equipment valued at more than \$6,000 and this was done without cost to the taxpayer.

During 1955, only one serious fire occured which involved a home. The number of calls was less than in 1954. Local residents are again urged to report fires promptly upon discovery. The department wishes to thank all those who assisted and supported various activities conducted by the firemen during the year.

CIVILIAN DEFENSE REPORT

To the Citizens of the Town of Pembroke:

In the fall of 1953 I was appointed Civilian Defense Director of Pembroke by the State Director, Admiral Brinkman, with the consent of the Selectmen. At this time I wish to give my first town report.

Through Federal matching funds, we have equipped the Fire Department with a Radio Base Station and three mobiles. Also last year a portable walkie talkie was added. This radio system is on the same circuit as Allenstown and Hooksett.

This year a 2-way radio was installed in the car of the Chief of Police, on the State Police System.

I have contacted the Selectmen, Water Department, Highway Department and School Department, and they have assured us of their help in an emergency.

We are having Civil Defense School drills regularly. Tests have shown that all children can be in their shelters in $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. Every child can be delivered home by bus in 45 minutes. We are hoping to have a bell system in our two elementary school buildings that will ring simultaneously.

We are very fortunate to have the V.F.W. with their fine Ambulance Service.

In conclusion I want to thank all other organizations for their past cooperation in sending their representatives to our Civilian Defense Meetings, when we were organizing.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1956

To the School Board of Pembroke:

This is my ninth annual report of the schools of Pembroke. May I express my thanks for your desire to improve and progress in the understanding of the children of the town especially in the quest for better teacheers and the techniques of teaching.

Pride in a good teaching staff cannot be overlooked and when a minimum of change occurs, that pride is justified. You chose well in adding three new teachers to the teaching force in Miss Mabel Granger, Miss Leila Wirkkala, and Mrs. Mary Ellen Normandin.

With the entrance of nearly 60 pupils every September it has become necessary to add a new teacher each year until we now have eleven classroom teachers. Again next September we must add another teacher since we have about 60 children entering with but half of that number graduating. This means that there will be but one room under 30 pupils and in four years there will be no rooms with an enrollment less than 35 pupils.

According to the census for the next five to ten years there will not be an entering class less than 55 children. Unless this figure is changed sharply we must have at least two teachers for every grade in the school if we are to meet the educational goals of the children of the town.

We talk of increased enrollments and increased costs due to enrollments and we ask the people of the town to meet these ever increasing costs. Whether we believe it or not, the facts are there to read. Just for the records here are a few facts as a result of the last census of the town as of September 1, 1955. There were 1017 children in the town with an age of less than one year through 18 years. Of these 1017 children, 64 were less than 1 year of age, 64 were 1 year of age, 62 were 2 years of age, 71 were 3 years old, 70 were 4 years old, and 69 were 5 years old. Of these 69 5-year olds, 15 were attending the public schools and 9 the private schools. Let us put it another way — there are 400 children in the town from less than one year of age to 5 years.

The census further shows that the public schools had enrolled as of September 1, 1955 a total of 286 pupils. However, according to the school register report from the school itself, a report made every week to the superintendent's office, shows that on December 16, 1955 there had been enrolled 323 pupils and on January 13, 1956 this enrollment had reached 331 pupils. These are actual figures of actual boys and girls. It is an increase of 45 children over the census report of September 1955. And may I further point out that there were 309 children in this town who were attending private schools in September to say nothing of the increase from that date to January 13.

This is the greatest problem we must face in our democracy of the future. According to the best figures we can get at this time, which, by the way I believe to be very conservative, there will be 23% more children in the country in the elementary school in the next ten years than there are today or 6.6 million; 55% more high school children than today or 4.2 million; and 40% more college students than today or 1.1 million.

We just cannot ignore this problem because it means greater costs — books, supplies, maintenance, buildings, teachers, salaries, tuition, and debts.

Is it worth it? Yes, in my opinion, I am convinced that it is because more and more emphasis is being placed on the money value of an education. For instance, here are some statistics on lifetime earnings classified by education: the average elementary school graduate in a lifetime will earn \$116,000; the average high school graduate in a lifetime will earn \$165,000; and the average graduate of a college in a lifetime will earn \$268,000. The average college education costs \$9000 — compare the costs with the returns.

These are the facts — cold, hard facts — and the problem must be solved at once.

What is the answer? In my opinion, the immediate need in Pembroke is more classroom space if you as parents desire to give each child his chance in a democratic society. This means that within the last five years the enrollments have increased about 33% and that within the next five years, if the present population remains at the same increase, enrollments will increase another 33%.

I am convinced that our present school plant should be enlarged immediately so that we shall have at least two teachers for every grade; that provisions should be made for home economics and woodworking in Grades 7 and 8; that a study should be made for developing a good physical education program along with a good guidance program even to the point of installing a full-time physical director and a full-time guidance officer.

Again, may I express my thanks to the members of the School Board, the Principal, Supervisors, the teaching Staff, Children, and all other persons and organizations who have aided and given moral support during the past year in our joint efforts to solve the ever-increasing problems growing out of modern education in the town, state, and nation.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF PEMBROKE ACADEMY

January 18, 1956

To the Trustees of Pembroke Academy and the Superintendent of Schools:

The reconstruction project made it neecessary to delay the start of school until September 19. Of the nine days which were thus lost four have been made up, and the others will be made up during the February and April vacations. This method was preferred by the teachers and the student body.

We started with 217 pupils, have added four and lost 19, leaving us with a student body of 202 in the middle of January. Of the 221 registered, there are 130 from Pembroke, 41 from Allenstown, 24 from Hooksett, 23 from Epsom, and one each from Bow, Concord, and Chichester.

Ours is probably one of few schools in the State which wants and can accommodate more pupils. The gymnasium will soon be completed, giving us much better facilities for indoor games, both intra-mural and interscholastic, and our expanded physical education and social programs.

One aspect of the situation which continually bothers us is the number of pupils who drop out of school. We all realize that the reason for some of them leaving is an economic problem at home, but too many are leaving for personal reasons, little realizing that they will later regret not having finished high school.

Of the 34 young men and women who graduated from the Academy in June, 1955, four are in the armed forces of our country, 11 are attending some school for further education, one married, one at home, 11 working in areas for which they trained while here, and the other six working at various jobs. We believe this is an excellent indication that their high school work is being put to good use.

The staff is an excellent one from any point of view, whether it be background, training, experience, or personality. Five of us have Master of Arts degrees. One has two Bachelors' degrees. Mrs. Mabel Reed and Mrs. Elizabeth Morrill continue to supervise vocal music and speech activities. Mrs. Flossie Robinson and Mrs. Adine Chase are cooking hot lunches for about 95 people, and Mr. John Farnum is our new custodian. Miss Adonia Douillette makes a weekly visit and is checking the health of all pupils in school. Because of new teachers and a new administration, we have no cadet teachers this year, but we hope to reactivate this program in the near future.

Attendance percentage figures compare favorably with the normal ones, but the incidence of tardiness has already surpassed last year's total. A few boys, who find it necessary to work, are responsible for a majority of this feature, being apparentily unable to get up on time.

My thanks go to all of the many people who have helped to make this year so profitable. My hopes are for a school which is bigger and better able to serve our youth and our community.



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

For Year Ending December 31, 1955

Many achievements were accomplished during the past year; — following is a brief resume of some of the most important ones. Some of them were leftovers from previous years due to various reasons.

The new 6" cast iron main on High Street was completed with a branch up Lindy Street to take care of a hydrant at some future date.

A new 6" cast iron main was installed on Bartlett Street and a 6" hydrant put in use at Narrow Fabrics in place of the old 4" one. This line is now accepted as standard by the Board of Fire Underwriters.

Rowe Avenue was accepted at the last Town Meeting and a new 6" cast iron main was installed to take care of the new houses in this development.

A new 6" cast iron main was installed on Bean Hill Road to furnish these new houses. This line is large enough to take care of any future development in this area.

Elsewhere in this report will be found an account of all new installations in detail.

A cement block building has been constructed at No. 1 Well (Concord side), gasolene engine moved to the site for power and all arranged so it can be operated on short notice. It is known that the water here is of poor quality, but it is planned to use same as a Civil Defense measure. In case of a complete breakdown of electric power this water would be better than none at all.

The pressure regulator on the Glass Street main, at the foot of Turnpike Street, has been moved to a new location at the end of the 8" iron main at Dudley Road. This is where

the old wood pipe starts in. In case of shut-down of the wood line in Epsom this locality is completely out of water for hours at a time and causes much inconvenience. When this happens it is planned to furnish well water through the regulator at a low pressure. Due to the continuous leakage in the wood pipe this idea is not entirely practicable, but will help to alleviate the inconvenience to some extent.

It must be recognized that this wood main is in very poor condition and must be replaced in the very near future. Leaks are very prevalent although a pressure of only about 38 pounds is maintained. Five years ago this pressure was nearly double.

Source of Supply - Wells

The wells are operating very efficiently and their capacity is holding up true to form. The static level of water in the surrounding area dropped two feet during the summer months, but showed practically no difference when pumps were operating.

Well No. 3 is used for regular pumping service and operates approximately 70 per cent of the time on an average under normal conditions. Water was being used at such a rate about June 15th that No. 2 Well had to be started to supplement the supply. Both pumps were run continuously. This meant that in excess of $1\frac{1}{2}$ million gallons was being used daily.

During the week of July 17th water was being used at such a rate the tank was going down every day. On July 23rd the tank was below the half-way mark, less than 500,000 gallons, and it was deemed advisable to put a complete ban on the use of hoses for 48 hours. From then on the use of hoses was restricted to a few hours each day.

The Board of Commissioners have no desire to restrict the use of water for any and all ordinary purposes. It is requested that during times of drought the use of hoses be used within reasonable limits. Statistics of Pumping Record for 1955

Storage Tank Area

The area around the tank has been graded and loamed over. This will make for a better appearance when seeded down and lawn started.

A new map of Pembroke and Allenstown has been completed and all water mains, hydrants, gates, etc., will be plotted on in the near future.
