# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN OF WARREN WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 9:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at WARREN TOWN HALL in said WARREN on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at 9:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

(The Meeting will open at 9:00 A.M. and balloting will begin under Article 1. All other business will be taken up beginning at 10:00 A.M.)

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the report of the Selectmen and other Town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain highways and bridges and take any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to spend the Block Grant Highway Funds in the amount of \$17,366.67 which we expect to receive from the State in 1987 and designate where and how it will be spent.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for the Fire Department.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000 to be set aside in Capital Reserve for the purchase of fire equipment.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,525 for the Library, to include the salary of the Librarian.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Funds established under the provisions of the State and Local Provision Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100 for Civil Defense.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 for the care of trees.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the Mount Mooselaukee Health Center.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following funds for the Warren-Wentworth FAST Squad.

Operations \$2,500 Special Equipment \$2,000

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw all funds including interest from the FAST Squad Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the Selectmen to pay over such funds to the Warren-Wentworth FAST Squad to assist in the purchase of a new ambulance.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500 for the Town dump and \$700 for pest control.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for Solid Waste Removal, should the State order our Town dump closed. This is a possibility.

Comment: The long legal battle to maintain our Town dump has ended and the New Hampshire Supreme Court has upheld the validity of the State regulation prohibiting all open burning dumps. We will have to provide an alternative to dispose of the Town's solid waste and also comply with State and Federal regulations as to our Dump.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$7,800 for street lights.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500 for Town welfare.
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and Memorial Day.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$650 for Parks and Playgrounds.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600 for the Warren Cemetery and \$500 for the Glencliff Cemetery.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,819 for the following Regional Associations:

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500 for the interest on Tax Anticipation loans.
  - 26. To see if the Town will vote to pursue the Life Line for the Elderly.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$700 for Mascoma Health Service.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100 for Plymouth Area Task Force Against Domestic Violence.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$350 for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Grafton County Senior Citizens Council.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500 for the Cottage Hospital.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$996.25 for the White Mountain Mental Health.
  - 33. To see what action the Town will take on Class VI unmaintained roads.
- 34. To see if the Town will cease internments in the cemeteries from December 1st to April 1st.
- 35. To see what action the Town wishes to take on cleaning out the channel of Baker River, and to raise and appropriate funds for the same.
- 36. To see what action the Town wishes to take relative to the election of members and alternate members of the Planning Board and take any action relating thereto.

**Legal Comment:** The Town attorney advised that under State law, alternates for the Planning Board must be appointed by the Planning Board and not by the Selectmen. RSA 673:6, II.

- 37. To see what amount of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the expenses of the Planning Board.
- 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300 for a contingency fund.
- 39. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to exempt taxation on the K of P Hall property, now owned by Minerva Temple #40, Pythian Sisters, as non-profit organization. Such exemption would allow funds for building improvements for the betterment of the community and allow more charitable work by the Pythian Sisters.

**Legal Comment:** The Selectmen have been advised by the Town Attorney that the exemption of real estate in the Town from real estate taxes is controlled by State law, RSA 72:23, and cannot be decided by a Town meeting vote.

- 40. (By Petition) To see if the Town will adopt a rule of proceeding to require that the Moderator recognize every person wishing to speak, and to make every effort to answer or obtain answers to all questions asked, without any comment or characterization toward the person speaking.
- 41. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to require that all persons running for and accepting Town Office shall reside in the Town and be on the Town check-list.

**Legal Comment:** Residency is required for all Town officers in present State law, RSA 669:6.

- 42. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote to require that certified, complete minutes of all public meetings be recorded and transcribed, available for public information within thirty days after said meetings.
- 43. (By Petition) To see if the Town meeting will adopt a rule of procedure that the Moderator shall remain neutral at all Town meetings over which the Moderator may preside.
- 44. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote to limit the office of Moderator to no more than five one-year terms.

**Legal Comment:** The Town meeting has no authority under State law to limit the terms of office that any person may hold including the Moderator. This is a decision reserved solely to the voters.

45. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote to provide that no person shall be elected or appointed to serve in more than one Town office during the same period of time.

**Legal Comment:** Under State law, a Town officer or a person appointed to a Town Board may serve the Town in more than one or elected capacity except as specifically prohibited under State law. RSA 669:7.

- 46. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote to increase the number of hours the Town Clerk's Office will be open for business, which increase will include Saturday hours.
- 47. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote to order that safety lights be installed on the rear of the Town truck in order to avoid accidents and resulting lawsuits.
- 48. (By Petiton) To see if the Town of Warren will vote that all Articles for money appropriations be voted by check-list ballots.

**Legal Comment:** State law governs when a secret ballot may be required as to any action taken at a Town meeting. Under RSA 40:40-a, five voters may make a request in writing prior to a vote by voice vote or by division that the vote be taken by separate written ballot. The Moderator is legally obligated to honor this request. Under RSA 40:4-b, when any vote other than by ballot is questioned in writing or orally by seven or more voters present, the Moderator is legally obligated to retake the vote by secret ballot. Any rule of procedure adopted by a Town Meeting is valid only for that Town meeting and does not bind future Town meetings.

- 49. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote for a committee to investigate the cost of replacing the cupola on the Town Hall.
- 50. (By Petition) To see if the Town of Warren will vote to eliminate every other street light.
- 51. (By Petition) To see what action the Town will take regarding the Planning Board and any proposed or adopted sub-division regulations for the Town of Warren.

**Legal Comment:** The Planning Board can be abolished only by following the procedure contained in RSA 673:18 which requires a Petition signed by 100 or more voters or  $\frac{1}{10}$ th of the registered voters in Town, whichever number is less, and a question is placed on the ballot to be voted on while the polls are open.

52. Shall the Town of Warren accept the recommendation of the

Pemi-Baker Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee and appropriate \$952. This will enable the Committee to gather the necessary engineering, legal, and financial information in order to determine the detailed costs for a District solid waste disposal solution including but not limited to the District acquisition of and improvements to the Plymouth Incinerator/Recycling Facility.

53. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Several breaks occured within the town this past year. Several juveniles are awaiting court action on two of these. 1986 also saw a large amount of vandalism and theft at The Mooselaukee Inn. Four subjects were apprehended in acts of theft from there. Destruction of the property seems of no concern to the owners. Due to the increased amount of traffic thru town and the amount of citizens' complaints an increased amount of radar control was used. In excess of one-hundred traffic citations were issued as well as numerous warnings. State Highway was contacted and the speed limit on Rt. 25 was reduced from thirty-five to thirty miles per hour to match the speed limit on Rt. 25C which has been in effect for a number of years. Highway was also contacted in regards to eliminating the passing zone between the intersections of Rt. 25 & Studio Road & Rts. 25 & 25C. In hopes this well eliminate some vehicles from speeding up to pass only to come into a rather dangerous intersection on either end. Warren has never had a shoulder patch for identification purposes so one was designed by this officer and a minimum order placed at a cost of \$98.00. The department did not have a siren. We had a chance to purchase a near new Federal electronic siren and speaker for \$100.00 (a savings of about \$200.00). Money for these items came from pistol/revolver license sales. \$78.00 from 1985 and \$100.00 from 1986 sales leaving a minus balance of \$20.00 that will be taken care of from 1987 sales.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF MOUNT MOOSELAUKEE HEALTH CENTER-1986

The Mount Mooselaukee Health Center is a general medical clinic open to any and all who have medical problems. It is partially town supported.

In 1986 there were over 1,000 users of the Health Center, 329 for the first time ever. 39.1% came from Warren, 22.7% from Wentworth, 15.7% from Rumney and 22.5% from various other places. 214 visits by children age 2 months to 6 years were made to the Well-Child Clinic, a program partly funded by the N.H. Bureau of Maternal and Child Health. The state money, however, runs out about four months early, and the Center pays for the balance. There is also a twice-a-year dental clinic provided by the N.H. Bureau of Dental Health for children 3-6 enrolled in the Well-Child Clinic. This February 67 children were enrolled in the dental clinic. Over 500 free blood pressure checks and free or at-cost immunizations were given at the Center this year.

In 1988 federal funding for Dr. Hernandez will cease and we will need your continued support to keep the Center going. Therefore, between now and 1988 it will be incumbent upon us to increase the use of the Center as much as possible in order to keep our doctor and keep our Center totally self-sufficient.

We have made great strides in that direction due to the hard work of Dr. Hernandez, Pauline Michaud R.N., Bonnie Chierichetti and Priscilla Wolfe, receptionists, the Auxiliary and many volunteers.

The Board especially wishes to thank Faith Mattison, our unpaid administrator, for her dedication and many long hours of hard work on behalf of the Center.

The library acquired 174 volumes, 37 by gift. The remainder were purchased with funds provided by the Town, income from the Henry M. Bixby Fund for children's books, a state appropriation of \$107, fines, book sales, other investment income, and gifts. Primary among these was the gift of \$250 from Michael and Bernadette Hurley in memory of India Lupien for the purchase of children's books. Other cash gifts came from Dorothy Aldrich, Violet Gale, and Ruth Hendee. Magazine subscriptions currently total 31.

The library collection is regularly augmented by books borrowed from the New Hampshire State Library. Besides a generous supply on extended loan which is exchanged several times each year, the state system also handles special requests. This service is invaluable to a small library such as ours. This past year 66 requests were handled, some for fiction and biography, others for information on such varied topics as apple-tree grafting, horse and saddle equipment, asthma, Shaker furniture, graphology, and military decorations. Some of the books were requested by adults, others by students for school papers and projects.

The library welcomes suggestions and recommendations for additions both to its book collection and to its magazine subscriptions. All ages, all interests are welcome. We urge you to make use of your library.

## **GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' REPORT**

We appreciate the opportunity to submit the following report in our continuing effort to directly communicate with our constituents, realizing your concerns and our accountability for a fiscally conservative budget.

We have heard that budget message and continually strive to meet mandated and essential services in the most efficient and effective, yet economical manner possible. This has been reflected in tight county budgets the last two years, resulting in decreased county tax requirements. Some towns may have seen increased county taxes due to evaluation and apportionment formula used by the N.H. Dept. of Revenue Administration. However, public services at the county level still usually reflect more equitable distribution of tax dollars. County tax averages 6.2% of base property taxes.

The county is facing the same problems in the insurance market as the towns. However, we have joined in the N.H. Municipal Association's insurance programs for most coverage needs at reasonable cost. We shall also have to deal with the loss of Revenue Sharing funds in the next budget.

It is too early to make a comprehensive report on the new welfare system under Senate Bill-1. We do know that with the change in program liabilities, county costs will substantially increase, and towns should realize a decrease in welfare assistance payments. County focus under SB-1 is to serve the needs of the children, the elderly and disabled. Because the North Country is growing with changing needs, growth in the elderly population, and expanded service requirements, we must look to the future to meet those needs.

The House of Correction occupancy figures have grown dramatically due to week-end sentencing, new DWI laws, and continuous one year sentencing to avoid incarceration at state prison, causing overcrowding at the Correctional facility. One option now under consideration is the construction of a two story dormitory type addition for 30 beds. The result would be a net increase of 18 beds meeting space standards under a plan in line with previous jail study recommendations, and at far less cost than a new facility.

The farm continues to be self-supporting, provides work for inmates, and offers access for experimental projects. The Register of Deeds net profit margin is 3.6% of county revenues. The Sheriff's Department provides essential services in transport, superior court, dispatch, and other law enforcement activities, with increased revenue in fees. The Nursing Home is one of the finest in the state.

We are proud of our county; of the dedicated staff, exemplary services and high standard facilities.

Commissioners meet weekly, and encourage public attendance. We welcome facility tours.

## NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

Calendar year 1986 was a busy and productive year for the North Country Council as it continued to provide a wide range of assistance to towns and cities in the North Country.

The Council is a regional non-profit, public agency chartered under NH RSA 36:45 and is responsible for providing its member communities assistance in local community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation, and various other community services. Besides the direct assistance the Council provides each member community, it is an advocate for all North Country towns in legislative and funding issues at the state and federal governments.

Growth and development is no longer unique to southern New Hampshire; North Country towns are experiencing similar growth pressures. The Council recognizes the impacts associated with this development to schools, roads, waste disposal, water, etc. The Council is dedicated to assisting town officials with these complicated issues. Because most of the Council member towns do not have a staff of their own to do the research, answer the questions and respond to incoming requests, the Council has revised the way we help member towns. Now, each town has a staff person assigned to assist the local officials of that town with their daily needs. In this way, the Council serves its membership more efficiently.

In Warren, we coordinated and assisted with planning tasks of the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District and submitted the 10-year plan to the State. We also provided technical assistance to the Planning Board on current-use taxation.

Economic development is an important part of the Council's overall agency mission. This year the Council developed two marketing products: a regional brochure promoting the region and community profiles which the ten growth communities in the region are using to market their industrial development potential. The Council also produced a series of magazine advertisements, along with a display at the Eastern States Exposition, promoting the North Country as the sensible place to do business. The Council is now developing a workshop series on industrial development marketing for local officials in the region who are actively seeking economic development.

This past summer the Council co-sponsored the very successful North Country legislative tour. Over 285 legislators and their guests toured the North Country getting a glimpse of the life, economy, and culture that makes our region unique. A follow-up legislative reception was held in December to develop a legislative agenda for 1987. The tour and reception should have future beneficial legislative impact to the North Country.

The Council again provided information and guidance to several towns on federal and state grant and loan programs. This past year saw the Council administer over \$3.0 million in Community Development Block Grant funds. The funds cover such activities as housing rehabilitation, downtown revitalization, business revolving loan funds, and housing rehabilitation feasibility studies.

Community planning assistance has emphasized master planning and improvement in local land use controls. New state mandates and commercial and residential growth in several towns have created busy work loads for planning boards. The Council's assistance takes many forms: regional workshops, newsletters, regulation review and update, and assistance on a regular or onetime basis for subdivision and site plan applications.

The Council again co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture series with the NH Municipal Association. The Law Lecture this year covered such topics as local planning board procedures, administration and enforcement of ordinances and review of recent court cases and state law changes regarding local land use planning.

Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems. We rely on and appreciate the involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.



## TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION REPORT

Dear Selectmen,

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support of the Woodsville Community Action Outreach office. Because of the funds that we received from Warren last year, we were able to help 170 families with approximately 512 household members in the whole outreach area with different outreach needs such as emergency food and housing, Green Thumb seeds, budget counseling and referrals to other agencies.

During the 1985-86 Fuel Assistance program we helped 39 families in Warren with fuel assistance totaling \$17,501.86 in benefits. Another \$26,765.22 in U.S.D.A. products were distributed in the Woodsville Outreach area, including the site in Warren.

Because of the elimination of the County Welfare Assistance program this past year, we have noticed a large increase in the demand for our Outreach services. Your town's contribution to our program will help keep people off your town's welfare rolls.

This Outreach center has salary and office expenses paid for six months of the year by the Fuel Assistance program grant. The funds to keep the office open the other six months come from your town and those of your neighbor's.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with <u>your</u> help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent and assistant superintendent.

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expense is prorated among the several school districts of the Unit on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of S.A.U. #23 during the 1986-87 school year will receive a salary of \$51,145.00 prorated among the several school districts. The Assistant Superintendent will receive a salary of \$40,351.00 prorated among the several school districts.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Warren School District:

I herewith submit my twenty-second annual report to the voters of the Warren School District.

I wonder how many people reading this report realize that our young people entering Kindergarten next fall will graduate in the 21st century. Are we providing these youngsters with the necessary skills to compete successfully in the year 2000?

The new Elementary School Minimum (not maximum) Standards are currently being battered by the legislature under the guise that a constitutional amendment adopted by the voters in 1984 forbids the state from imposing costs on local municipalities unless the state provides the funds. This week, the New Hampshire State Board of Education is expected to approve the standards, which, among other changes, would require schools to hire reading specialists; lower pupil-teacher ratios in music, art and physical education classes; and lengthen the school year. How strict the Department of Education will be in enforcing these standards remains to be seen; but conceivably many small school districts will be forced out of the education business unless they can share services and costs. It should be interesting to see who wins this battle!

An unusual phenomena took place at the Warren Village School last year when the entire staff resigned for one reason or another. Fortunately good replacements were found and everything seems to be operating efficiently. The district may not be so lucky a second time around. Therefore, it seems appropriate to reiterate that school boards are elected by the people and make school policy reflecting the aspirations of the community while administrators carry out those policies.

Warren should be thinking about the creation of a Capital Reserve Fund to take care of emergencies within the district. There are many ways of doing this and districts usually adopt a plan appropriate to their needs and desires. Instead of reacting to situations by raising some large tax equities for one year a district can act because it has ''money in the bank''. It would be wise to investigate this option carefully.

Another phenomena which is appearing more and more in New Hampshire is the censoring of textbooks by certain groups or organizations in districts. Although Warren has not experienced this problem people should be very watchful since people doing the censoring do it quietly and discreetly.

May I take this opportunity to thank the people of Warren for their support for the past two decades.

### REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the Warren School District:

I herewith submit my seventeeth annual report to the voters of the Warren School District.

In my report of a year ago I felt that the next few years would be of special concern to the smaller school districts in S.A.U. #23. I centered on teachers' salaries last year but there are other equally important influences that will have a dramatic impact on the districts in S.A.U. #23.

The legislature is presently studying a plan to restructure the School Administrative Units in the State of New Hampshire. The results of this study will not be known until the legislature adjourns next summer. One of the aspects of the present S.A.U. organization, sure to be considered, is the optimum number of school districts that should comprise an S.A.U. Since S.A.U. #23 comprises the largest geographic area of any in the state, this aspect of planning will be likely to affect us most keenly. If the new legislation reduces the number of school districts, as it very well may, then the costs to the smaller districts could increase considerably.

Aside from the state study, there are developments closer to home pointing in the same direction. The Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District has shown some interest in becoming its own S.A.U.

Next year, even while having its own Assistant Superintendent, Linwood will remain a member of S.A.U. #23. Linwood, with its sweeping economic development, has shown an increase of nearly \$40,000,000 in a single year and next fall will contribute the largest share to S.A.U. expenses.

Haverhill also has had an S.A.U. study committee working for the past year to study alternatives to the present situation. The issue is clear. Smaller S.A.U.'s can spell substantially higher costs for the remaining school districts. Board members and citizens alike should follow these developments very closely at both the state and local levels.

As most of you know, next fall (1987) we will have an influx of twenty-two first graders. This is the largest number that anyone can recall. In any case it will become necessary to alter our grade level organization. To accommodate these children effectively we must plan on a single self-contained first grade next year. Since it is not educationally desirable nor even feasible to have three grades in one room, it will be necessary to maintain one of the other grades in a separate self-contained situation as well. This pattern will continue for the six years that these children will be with us at the Warren Village School. Our enrollment and census figures indicate that incoming classes beyond next year will be in the normal range.

As a consequence of the above, you will find in this year's School District Warrant an article giving the school the authority to borrow money

through a bond issue to build an addition to the school. Obviously, the immediate objective of the article is to provide for the children coming into school next year and assure a proper education for all of our students, grades one through six.

The proposed addition will give us two 900 square foot classrooms. It will free up space in the old wing for a resource center or a school library. Another point of view is to consider our accreditation. For years we have been listed as classification 3 school. The new construction will give us the potential for classification 1. Why not be number one? Let's get out from under that cloud once and for all.

We should be dismayed when we realize that next year's kindergarten class will graduate from high school in the year 2000. That's the 21st century!

About 80 years ago in 1906, the present school was built by people who cared enough to provide a good education for children who would live most of their lives in the 20th century. Their dedication and effort should serve as inspiration for us to do the same for children who will live most of their lives in the 21st century.

Please give the bond issue in this year's warrant every favorable consideration.

The close of the 1986-87 school year will mark the retirement of Mr. Norman H. Mullen who has served for twenty-two years as our Superintendent of Schools. His leadership has been forceful, dynamic and effective. It was sometimes controversial, but always directed toward the best interests of the children in his charge. Among many other fine accomplishments he has formed two cooperative school districts and developed a cost effective and efficient system of special education second to none in the State. It has been my privilege to work with Mr. Mullen as his assistant for seventeen of his twenty-two year tenure. His presence in the central office will be missed by all.

I'm sure everyone will join with me in wishing him a happy retirement and the very best in the years to come.

My thanks, as always, to the School Board, the Staff and the voters of the Warren School District for their continued support.
