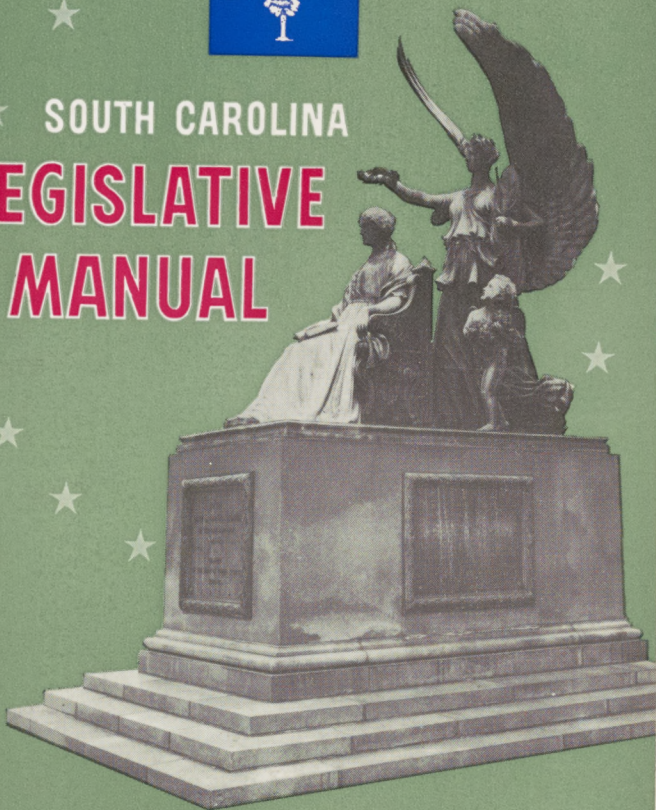

The first edition of the South Carolina Legislative Manual was issued on February 4, 1916, on the initiative of J. Wilson Gibbes, the author. It contained 117 pages.

Since then it has been published every year during the legislative sessions except 1922, 1926, 1928 and 1932—the present issue being the 43rd.

Biographies of Members and State Officers were added in 1919, and in 1925 their pictures were first used.

The Manual is original and authentic—its contents being made up from special day-to-day files, personal research work and data prepared for it exclusively by officials and heads of departments concerned.

All biographical data are secured from questionnaires answered and signed by the particular individuals, and expiration dates of terms of office on Boards and Commissions are supplied by Department Heads and Board Chairmen. In all matters every effort is made to preserve the truth of history by precision and correctness.

The Women's Monument on the Manual Cover is located on the northeast corner of the State House Grounds and was erected "To the Memory of the Women of the Confederacy, 1861-65; Reared by the Men of their State, 1901-11." Above the State Flag appears the squared battle flag of the Confederacy (with upward points of stars perpendicular to base of crossbars). The circle of eleven stars symbolize the seceding states. OATH

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am duly qualified according to the Constitution of this State, to exercise the duties of the office to which I have been elected (or appointed), and that I will to the best of my ability, discharge the duties thereof, and preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of this State and of the United States. So help me God."—
Const., Art. III, Sec. 26.

THE LEGISLATIVE POWER OF THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA

is vested (under the prevailing Constitution of 1895) in two distinct branches, the one styled the "Senate" and the other the "House of Representatives," and both together the "General Assembly."

The Constitution of 1895

was framed by a Convention (of the people convened for the purpose of framing an organic law), that assembled September 10, 1895, and adjourned December 4. It was not submitted to the electors for ratification, but was promulgated by the Convention and declared in force from January 1, 1896.

Temporary Chairman, Robert Aldrich, of Barnwell, said "but with the exception of the Constitution of 1790, the one which you will frame is the only one that is entitled to be called the exponent of the untrammelled will of the people of South Carolina. We had the Constitutions of 1776 and 1778, but they were enacted by the General Assembly and were nothing more than Acts of the Legislature.

"The Convention which was held in 1860 was called for the purpose of passing the ordinance of Secession, and it made such changes in the Constitution then in force as were necessary to adapt it to those changed conditions. We had the Constitution of 1865, which was framed by a Convention called together under a proclamation of a provisional Governor, the appointee of a President of the United States, who had no more power to appoint a Governor for South Carolina than any other citizen of the country, and the work of the said Convention was of no more force than the proceedings of a mass meeting of citizens. The Convention of 1868 was the fruit of the Reconstruction Acts, which were notoriously unconstitutional, of which one of the most prominent men in the Congress and a leader of the

party in power at the time had the hardihood to say there were only two fools in the United States who considered them constitutional; and if unconstitutional they were invalid. That Constitution was made by aliens, negroes and natives without character, all the enemies of South Carolina, and was designed to degrade our State, insult our people and overturn our civilization."

John Gary Evans (Governor in 1894-97, then of Aiken County), was president of the Convention. The six colored Republican delegates from Beaufort objected, for political reasons to sign the Constitution and were excused. (See page 727, Constitutional Conv. Journal, S. C., 1895).

Some Constitutional Provisions Pertaining to Members and Legislation

ANNUAL SESSIONS—In Columbia beginning on the second Tuesday in January and no limitation as to length of session.

Under the Constitution of 1868, the fourth Tuesday in November was the opening day. From then until 1896 the length of sessions varied from 144 days in 1870-71 to 26 days in 1882-83.

Under the Constitution of 1895, the opening date was changed to second Tuesday in January. The session lasted 54 calendar days in 1896, 52 in '97, 37 in '98, 40 days each year through 1911 (except in 1908, when it was 54 days, including a recess of 10 days), 52 in 1912, 53 in '13, 51 in '14, also a 29 day extra session. The session lasted 31 legislative days in 1915 and 1916. For length of sessions from 1917 to date see page 331.

ADJOURNMENTS—During the session "neither House shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which it shall be at the time sitting."—Art. III, Sec. 21.

Should either House remain without a quorum for five days, or should the two Houses disagree as to the time of adjournment, the Governor may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper.—Art. IV, Sec. 16.

BILLS AND ACTS—"Bills for raising revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives," but may be altered, amended or rejected by the Senate; "all other Bills may originate in either house, and may be altered or rejected by the other."—Art. III, Sec. 15.

"Bills appropriating money out of the treasury shall specify the objects and purposes for which the same are made, and appropriate to them respectively, their several amounts in distinct items and sections."—Art. IV, Sec. 23.

"Every Act or Resolution having the force of law shall relate to but one subject, and that shall be expressed in the title."—Art. III, Sec. 17.

Bills shall not have the force of law until read three times and on three separate days in each House, the great seal of the State affixed, and signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House. Legislative rules may (and they do) provide, for the first and third readings by title only.—Art. III, Sec. 18.

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION—Must be agreed to by two-thirds of the members elected to each House and same shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State; and if a majority shall vote in favor of such amendments the next General Assembly may ratify Amendments, and same shall become part of the Constitution.

COMPENSATION—"Members shall not receive any compensation for more than 40 days of any one session."—Art. III, Sec. 9 See page 10 for Statutory provisions.

ELECTIONS BY GENERAL ASSEMBLY OR EITHER HOUSE—"Members shall vote *viva voce* except by unanimous consent, and their votes shall be entered upon the Journal."—Art. III, Sec. 20.

ELECTION RETURNS, QUALIFICATIONS—"Each house shall judge of the election returns and qualifications of its own members."—Art. III, Sec. 11.

(On January 10, 1933, the Senate was petitioned by ex-senator M. G. Andersen to declare H. K. Cooke, of Horry, not eligible or qualified to sit as a Senator, under the Constitution, because he "was not registered and was not a qualified elector on November 8, 1932, the day of the election." The Senate by a vote of 33 to 2 seated Mr. Cooke).

EXPENSES OF STATE GOVERNMENT—"The General Assembly shall provide for an annual tax sufficient to defray the estimated expenses of the State for each year, and whenever it shall happen that the ordinary expenses of the State for any year shall exceed the income of the State for such year the General Assembly shall provide for levying a tax for the ensuing year sufficient, with other sources of income, to pay the deficiency of the preceding year together with the estimated expenses for the ensuing year."—Art. X, Sec. 2.

EXPULSION OF MEMBERS—"Each house shall punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same cause."—Art. III, Sec. 12.

EXTRA SESSIONS—The Governor "may on extraordinary occasions convene the General Assembly in extra session."—Art. IV, Sec. 16.

HOLDING ANOTHER OFFICE OR POSITION—"No person shall be eligible to a seat in the General Assembly while he holds any office or position of profit or trust under this State, the United States of America, or any of them, or under any other power, except offices in the Militia and

notaries public; and if any Member shall accept or exercise any of the said disqualifying offices or positions he shall vacate his seat."—Art. III, Sec. 24.

MEMBERS PROTECTED—"Members shall be protected in their persons and estates during their attendance on, going to and returning from the General Assembly, and ten days previous to the sitting and ten days after the 'adjournment,' except where a Member is charged with treason, felony or breach of the peace."—Art. III, Sec. 14.

[On Mar. 15, 1935, two members of the House of Representatives were arrested by Fairfield County Officers, while returning from the General Assembly to their homes. Following their arrest they were forcibly carried a distance of about 20 miles and their property and effects were searched. At the next session of the House, Tuesday, Mar. 19, 1935, a Resolution was passed, holding that the acts of these officers "constituted a contempt of the House of Representatives, and an unwarranted, high handed and unconstitutional invasion of the rights of the said two members of the House."] (See House Journal 1935, p. 963.) It was further ordered that the offending officers be brought before the House to be dealt with according to law.

[On the following day, Mar. 20, the officers were brought before the House plead guilty to the charge brought against them, and were sentenced to be kept in the custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms until 12 o'clock noon, Mar. 21, at which time they were again brought before the House, given a public reprimand and dismissed. (See House Journal 1935, pages 988-990 and 1018-1019.)]

OATH OF OFFICE—All Members and all officers, before they enter upon their duties, shall subscribe to the following oath: (See page 3 for Oath)

PROTEST MAY BE ENTERED ON JOURNAL—Any Member may dissent or protest against any Act or resolution that he may think injurious to the public or an individual, and have his reasons entered on the Journal.—Art. III, Sec. 22.

RIGHT OF PUNISHMENT—Each house may punish by imprisonment during its sitting any non-member guilty of disrespect, disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence, or who shall threaten harm to any Member for any thing said or done in either House, or who shall assault or arrest any person ordered to attend the House, in going or returning, or who shall rescue any person arrested by order of the House.—Art. III, Sec. 13.

SECRECY—"The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions as in the opinion of the House may require secrecy."—Art. III, Sec. 23. "Each house shall keep a journal of its own proceedings, and cause same to be published immediately after its adjournment, excepting such parts as in its judgment, may require secrecy."—Art. III, Sec. 22.

TERMS OF OFFICE—"The terms of office of Members chosen at a general election begin on the Monday following such election."—Art. III, Sec. 10.

VACANCY IN MEMBERSHIP—In case of such (whether from neglect to elect, refusal to qualify, resignation, death, departure from State, acceptance of any disqualifying position), the presiding officer of that House shall issue a writ of election to fill same for unexpired term.—Art. III, Sec. 25.

VETO BY THE GOVERNOR—Every Bill or Joint Resolution which shall have passed the General Assembly, except on a question of adjournment, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor, and if he approves he shall sign it.

Any Bill vetoed by the Governor shall be returned with his objections, to the House in which it originated, which shall enter the objection at large on its Journal and proceed to consider it. If two-thirds of that House agree to pass it, it shall be sent, together with the objection to the other House and if approved by two-thirds of that House it shall have the same effect as if signed by the Governor; but in all such cases the vote of both Houses shall be taken by yeas and nays and the names entered on the Journals.

Only so much of any Bill as is not approved by the Governor shall be reconsidered the approved portions becoming a law notwithstanding the objections of the Governor.

A Bill not returned by the Governor, within three days after presentation to him, Sundays excepted, shall have the same force and effect as if he had signed it, unless the General Assembly by adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall have such force and effect unless returned within two days after the next meeting.—Art. IV, Sec. 23.

(Nearly all of the 301 Acts passed in 1912 became effective without the Governor's signature, as Gov. Blease neither approved nor vetoed them).

(Governor may return Bill to the "next" House in which it originated, even though a general election has intervened and new Members have been elected and seated, as the two "Houses" are continuing entities.—Supreme Court Decisions, *Smith v. Jennings*, 67 S. C. 324).

(At 1919 session, which began Jan. 14, Governor Cooper returned Bill to Clerk of House on Jan. 16, after House had adjourned. Upon objection to its consideration on Jan. 17, Speaker Cothran ruled that the two-day constitutional limit had been complied with, citing *Corwin v. Comp. Gen.* 6 S. C. 398.—See House Journal, page 49).

(At the 1946 Session Governor Williams returned a Bill together with a veto message to the Clerk of the House on March 18. The records showed that the Bill had been delivered to the Governor on March 13. In

ruling that the three day Constitutional limit had expired, Speaker Blatt also ruled that the words, "three days" mean calendar days and not Legislative days. Speaker Blatt also cited the case of *Corwin v. The Comptroller General*, 6 S. C. 390, in which the word adjournment as used in Section 22, Article 3 of the Constitution, is found to mean an adjournment by concurrent action of both Houses of the General Assembly—see House Journal 1946 Session, Page 1267.)

YEAS AND NAYS—Shall be entered on the Journal at the desire of 10 House Members or five Senators.

Other Constitutional Provisions

MEETINGS OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY—"The General Assembly ought frequently to assemble for the redress of grievances and for making new laws, as the common good may require."

TERM OF OFFICE—"No person shall be elected or appointed to office for life or good behavior but terms shall be for specified periods, except notaries public and officers in militia."

DUELING—Any person fighting a duel or sending or accepting a challenge, or aiding or abetting shall be deprived of holding any office of honor or trust, and punished as law prescribes.

DEPARTMENTS SEPARATE—"Legislative, executive and judicial powers of the Government shall be forever separate and distinct from each other, and no person or persons exercising the functions of one of said departments shall assume or discharge the duties of any other."

LIBEL—"In all indictments or prosecutions for libel, the truth of the alleged libel may be given in evidence, and the jury shall be the judges of the law and the facts."

DEBT—"No person shall be imprisoned for debt except in cases of fraud."

CONSTRUING THE CONSTITUTION—Its provisions shall be construed as mandatory and prohibitory, unless expressly made, by its own terms, directory or permissive.

TWO OFFICES—"No person shall hold two offices of honor or profit at the same time" (special exceptions for Circuit Judges acting as Justices) officers in the militia and notaries excepted.

QUALIFICATIONS OF GOVERNOR—Belief in existence of the Supreme Being, attainment of age 30, citizenship of United States and citizen and resident of this State for five years next preceding day of election; shall not hold any other office or commission, except in militia, at the same time.

QUALIFICATIONS OF LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR—Same qualifications as Governor, "and shall *ex officio* be President of the Senate."

QUALIFICATIONS OF JUDGES AND JUSTICES—Citizenship, age of 26 years, licensed attorney for five years, resi-

dence in this State for five years next preceding election.

QUALIFICATIONS OF JURORS—Must be qualified elector, between 21 and 65 years, and of good moral character.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR SUFFRAGE—Must be a citizen of this State and U. S. at least 21 yrs. of age, not be laboring under disabilities named in the S. C. Constitution of 1895, be a resident in State 2 yrs., in county 1 yr., in polling precinct 4 mos., be able to read and write any section of S. C. Constitution specified by registration officer or show he owns and has paid taxes on assessed property of \$300 or more in this State in the previous year, and apply for registration. To vote in municipal elections the citizen must have all qualifications mentioned above and have resided within the corporate limits of any city or town in this State for 4 mos. prior to election and must have registered for county, State and national elections.

Exceptions: Ministers of organized churches and teachers in public schools and their spouses shall be qualified after 6 mos.' residence in State if otherwise qualified. Idiots, insane, paupers, supported at public expense, and prison inmates are disqualified. Persons convicted of crimes specified in Art. II, Sec. 6, are disqualified, but pardon by the S. C. Probation, Pardon and Parole Board removes disqualification (see Art. IV, Sec. 11).

(Under the 19th Amendment to U. S. Constitution, in force from Aug. 26, 1920, women were enfranchised).

ARRESTS OF ELECTORS—"Electors shall in all cases except treason, felony, or a breach of the peace be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at the polls and going to and returning therefrom."

TAXES LAID UPON ACTUAL VALUE—"All taxes upon property, real and personal, shall be laid upon the actual value of the property taxed, as the same shall be ascertained by an assessment, made for the purpose of laying such tax."

MARRIAGES OF WHITES AND NEGROES—Marriage of white person with negro or mulatto or person with one-eighth or more negro blood shall be unlawful and void.

SEXUAL INTERCOURSE—"No unmarried woman shall legally consent to sexual intercourse who shall not have attained the age of 14 years."

SPECIAL LAWS PROHIBITED—In all cases where a general law can be made applicable; general laws shall be uniform in operation; special provisions may be enacted in general laws.

SUSPENSION OF OFFICERS—Governor shall direct immediate prosecution of any officer having custody of public or trust funds, who is probably guilty of embezzlement or the appropriation of public trust funds to private use, and upon true bill found shall suspend officer and appoint another, until acquittal by jury.

FORMATION OF NEW COUNTIES—Governor shall order election upon petition of one-third of qualified electors in area of the section of old county proposed to be cut off, question of name and county seat also being submitted. General Assembly may establish such new county on two-thirds vote of electors for it. County shall not contain less than one-124th of population of State or less than \$1,500,000 assessed taxable property or less than 400 square miles area.

No county shall be reduced below 500 square miles, \$2,000,000 of assessed taxable property, or less than 15,000 inhabitants. No old county shall be cut within eight miles of court house building.

PRIZE FIGHTING—Prohibited, and General Assembly shall provide proper laws for prevention and punishment.

LIABILITY OF STOCKHOLDERS—Individually liable to creditors only for amount due upon their stock.

TAXATION AND ASSESSMENT—General Assembly shall provide by law for uniform and equal rate of assessment and taxation, prescribe regulations to secure just valuation for taxation of all property, real personal and possessory, except mines and mining claims and exempted property for municipal, educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes; may impose capitation tax upon domestic animals that by nature and habits are destructive of other property.

In 1947, Sec. 4 of Art. 10 of the Constitution was amended to provide that the General Assembly may by Act exempt from taxation household goods and furniture used in the home of the owner thereof.

DIVORCES—"Shall be allowed on grounds of adultery, desertion, physical cruelty, or habitual drunkenness"; Art. XVII, Sec. 3. (Under the Constitution of 1863, divorces were not "allowed but by Judgment of a Court, as shall be prescribed by law." The Constitution of 1895 permitted no divorces on any grounds until the present amendment became effective on April 1, 1949. Subsequently Act No. 137 of 1949 was passed, (1952 Code, Secs. 20-101 to 20-108, 20-110 to 20-121) providing for and regulating the granting of divorces in this State.)

LOTTERIES—None shall ever be allowed or advertised or its tickets sold.—Art. XVII, Sec. 7.

GAMBLING AND BETTING—"Unlawful for any person holding an office of honor, trust or profit." Conviction disqualifies.—Art. XVII, Sec. 9.

Special Statutory Provisions

Pertaining to Members and Legislation

COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS—Salary \$1,800 annually; subsistence expenses (\$10.00 per day) for each day actually in attendance on statewide legislative day (not to exceed 40 days); nine cents per mile travel expense for distance traveled going to and returning

from Columbia on weekend adjournments; \$15 per session for postage.

By Act of 1908 the existing statute providing \$4 per diem was changed to "\$200 for each regular session," beginning with 1909.

In 1920 the salary was changed to "\$400 for each session," effective with the 1921 session.

The 1943 General Assembly passed an Act increasing the salary to \$1,000 annually, effective with the 1945 session. (The 1944-45 appropriation Act appropriated \$400 as salary and \$600 as official expenses for each member.)

In 1955 the five cents per mile travel was eliminated from the Constitution, and a statutory provision that year increased mileage to 7¢ then in 1961 to 9¢.

The 1958-59 Appropriations Act (permanent provisions) provided limited subsistence expenses.

The 1960-61 Appropriations Act (permanent provisions) increased the salary to \$1,800 annually, effective with the 1961 session, also the subsistence expenses was changed from \$7.50 to \$10.00 per day.

In 1961 (Act No. 197) increased postage from \$5 per session to \$15 and provided for "such stationery as may be necessary . . ."

Under the Constitution "no General Assembly shall have the power to increase the *per diem* of its own members"; and the compensation for extra sessions shall be the same as for regular sessions.

EX OFFICIO BOARD MEMBERS—Every chairman of a committee of either House who is *ex-officio* member of any commission or board shall remain a member after each general election and until successor is appointed chairman thereof; in case of vacancy or disability, between sessions the Speaker or the President shall designate some member of such committee to serve on the board until next meeting or disability is removed.

REPEAL OF ACT, EFFECT OF—"The repeal of an Act or Joint Resolution shall not revive any law theretofore repealed or superseded, nor any office theretofore abolished."

TIME WHEN ACT TAKES EFFECT—"The 20th day after the day of its approval by the Governor, unless some other day be specially named in the Act." (Construction by courts has been: Exclude the first day, include the last.)

The Senate

Composed of one Member elected from each of the 46 counties for four years, so classified that one-half are chosen every two years. When the General Assembly shall establish more than one county at any session, it shall so prescribe the first term of the Senators from such counties as to observe such classification."

Senators must be duly qualified electors in their own counties at the time of their election, and must be at least 25 years old.

The House of Representatives

Composed of 124 Members chosen every second (even) year, apportioned among the several counties so as to allow "one Representative to every 124th part of the whole number of inhabitants in the State." (Const. Art. III, Sec. 4), which ratio beginning with 1920 under the U. S. Census was as follows: 1920—One Representative to every 13,578 persons in a County, 1930—14,022; 1940—15,321; 1950—17,072; 1960—19,295.

The Counties gaining and losing representatives under the Reapportionment Acts (dates refer to year Act passed—effective dates 1923, 1933, 1943, 1953, 1963) were as follows:

- 1922 —Gaining: Florence (1), Richland (1), Losing: Bamberg (1), Marlboro (1).
- 1932 —Gaining: Greenville (2), Horry (1), Spartanburg (1), Losing: Charleston (1), Clarendon (1), Edgefield (1), Saluda (1).
- 1942 —Gaining: Charleston (1), Florence (1), Greenville (1), Richland (1), Losing: Barnwell (1), Lexington (1), Newberry (1), Orangeburg (1).
- 1952 —Gaining: Charleston (2), Greenville (1), Lexington (1), Richland (1), Spartanburg (1), Losing: Abbeville (1), Anderson (1), Fairfield (1), Greenwood (1), Lee (1), Williamsburg (1).
- 1961*—Gaining: Richland (2), Aiken (1), Charleston (1), Greenville (1), Horry (1), Sumter (1), Losing: Clarendon (1), Colleton (1), Florence (1), Laurens (1), Marlboro (1), Newberry (1), Spartanburg (1).

* included in Appropriations Act

Under Art. III, Sec. 3 of the Constitution, enumeration of inhabitants for this purpose shall be made in every 10th year after 1901, but the General Assembly may adopt enumeration of the immediately preceding U. S. Census in lieu thereof, which is always done.

Each county constitutes one Election District, Members must be qualified electors in their own Counties at the time of their election and must be at least 21 years old.

In a Special General Election August 8, 1961, a Republican, Chas. E. Boineau, Jr., was elected to the House of Representatives from Richland Co. to serve an unexpired term. Prior to this election all House members were Democrats. According to Charles E. Lee, Director, State Archives Dept., John W. Bolts, from Georgetown Co. was the last Republican to serve as a member of the House, he was elected to the House in 1898 and 1900 and apparently served through the General Assembly Session which ended Feb. 16, 1901. RESOLUTIONS, BILLS AND ACTS**Names and Explanations of the Various Legislative Measures**

"Resolution"

A Resolution (sometimes called a "plain" or "simple" Resolution) affects only the action of the House and the Members thereof in which it is introduced.

Requires only one reading and adoption, and is not submitted to the other House.

"Concurrent Resolution"

A Concurrent Resolution affects the action of the entire General Assembly or a Member thereof; does not carry an appropriation; does not have the force of law, as an Act or Joint Resolution does, but records the sense of the two Houses concurrently.

Requires only one reading and one adoption or concurrence by each House.

"Bill"

is the term applied to a measure introduced in either House designed to become a law (or an "Act".)

It must be read and adopted three times on three separate days in each House, following which its title is changed to that of an Act. (See "Bills and Acts," Page 4.)

"Act"

is the term applied to a Bill that has passed both Houses. It is a *permanent* measure, having the force of law until repealed.

"Joint Resolution"

A Joint Resolution has the same force of law as an Act, but is a *temporary* measure, dying when its subject matter is completed. It requires the same treatment as a Bill does in its passage through both Houses, but its title after passage is not changed to that of an Act.

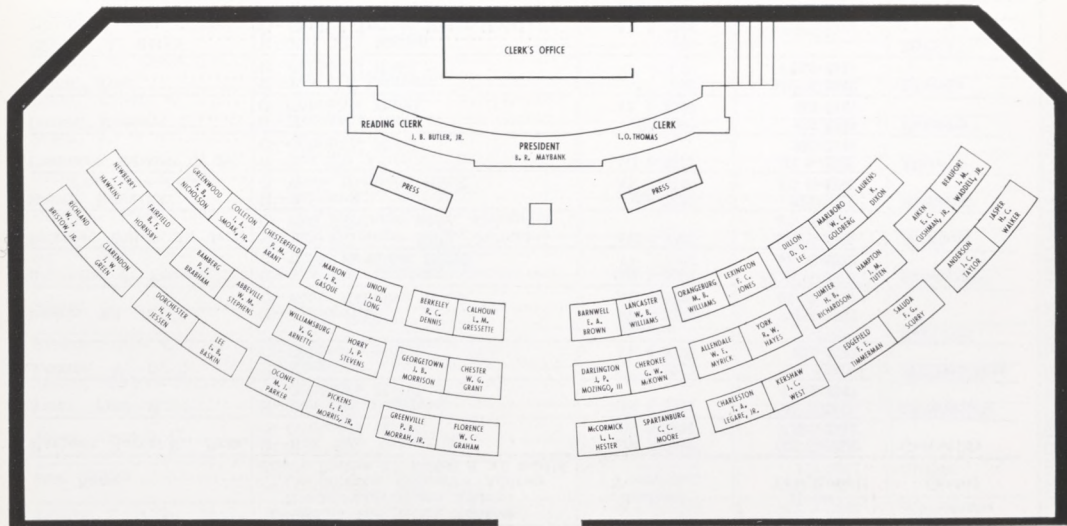


DIAGRAM OF THE SENATE CHAMBER

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NECESSARY VOTE ON ACTION BY SENATE

Absentees

To send for when less than a quorum shall convene. Requires a *majority of those present* (Rule 3).

Amendment on Third Reading

To receive same (unless by previous notice). Requires *unanimous consent* (Rule 30).

Bill for Special Charter

Concurrent Resolution to allow introduction thereof. Requires "a two-thirds vote of each house" that is, *two-thirds of those voting*, a quorum being present (Const., Art. IX, Sec. 2). See interpretation by Supreme Court on next page.*

Constitution

To pass measure submitting amendment thereto the electors. Requires "two-thirds of the members elected"—31 ayes (Const. Art. XVI, Sec. 1). Amendment to be entered on Journal with *yeas* and *nays* taken thereon.

To pass Bill ratifying same at *next session after approval* at a general election. Requires "a majority of each branch" by *yeas* and *nays* (Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 1) that is, a *majority of those voting*, a quorum being present. (Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 1). See Supreme Court Decision on next page.

Constitutional Convention

To pass measure submitting calling of same to the electors. Requires "two-thirds of the members elected to each branch"—that is 31 votes.* (Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 3).

Election of Standing Committees

For Chairman, a *majority* of the vote cast *viva-voce*; for members, voting *viva-voce*, a *plurality* (Rule 21).

Expulsion of a Member

Requires "the concurrence of two-thirds" (Const., Art. III, Sec. 12) of those voting.*

Fixing Debate and Time

For voting on any question. Requires "two-thirds vote of the qualified membership of the Senate" (Rule 16).

Free Conference Committee

Requires "the approval of two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the Senate and House separately taken." (Rule 4, Joint Rules).

Impeachment

Conviction of officers. Requires 31 votes (Art. XV, Sec. 2)—"two-thirds of all the *members elected*".

Order of Business

Varied by vote of three-fourths of Senators present. Reverted to by vote of two-thirds of Senators present (Rule 36).

Recalling Bills or Resolutions from Committees

Requires majority vote after expiration of five Legislative days. Before expiration of five days by three-fourths vote. Appropriation Bill excepted (Rule 26).

Recalling Bills from Committees

To recall Bill or Resolution (except Appropriation Bill), from Committee (after expiration of 5 legislative days) requires majority vote (before expiration of 5 days) requires three-fourths vote of Senators present (Rule 26).

Rules

To amend, rescind or suspend, *after one day's previous notice* is given. Requires "a two-thirds vote of the Senators present" (Rule 47).

To *suspend* (only) *without giving notice*. Requires unanimous consent (Rule 47).

Special Orders

Made without debate by two-thirds vote (Rule 37).

Time of Daily Meeting

To change same from 11 a. m. of the following day.
Requires *majority of members present* (Rule 2).

Veto by the Governor

To pass a Bill (or item or Section therein) over same. Requires "two-thirds of each house," that is, *two-thirds of those voting*, a quorum being present—"taken by yeas and nays, which shall be entered on the Journals of both houses" (Const., Art. IV, Sec. 23). See below.*

*SUPREME COURT DECISION

"When the Constitution speaks of 'two-thirds of that House,' as the vote required to pass a bill or joint resolution over the veto of the Governor, it means two-thirds of the house as then legally constituted and acting upon the matter. Whenever the framers of the Constitution intended otherwise, the purpose was expressly declared, as in Art. XV, Sec. 1, "a vote of two-thirds of *all members elected* shall be required for an impeachment," and in Art. XVI, Sec. 1, where, in proposing amendments to the Constitution, "two-thirds of the members *elected* to each house must agree thereto." *Smith v. Jennings*, 67 S. C., page 328.

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RULES OF THE SENATE

ADOPTED FEBRUARY 28, 1957

RULE 1

RULES ARE PERMANENT

The Senate of South Carolina being a continuing body, these rules shall continue in full force and effect from session to session until the same may be amended, modified or repealed in the manner hereinafter provided.

RULE 2

TIME OF DAILY MEETING

The Senate, on the first day of a session, shall convene at 12 o'clock noon, and on adjournment, shall stand adjourned until 11 o'clock a. m., of the following day, Sunday excepted, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the members present.

RULE 3

QUORUM

A majority of the total number of Senators qualified shall constitute a quorum.

QUORUM CALL OF THE SENATE

If at any time during the daily session of the Senate it is ascertained that there is not a quorum present, no business shall be in order except a call of the Senate, an order to send for absentees, or a motion to adjourn until a quorum shall be present.

RULE 4

ATTENDANCE, DUTIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF SENATORS

Any member or officer of the Senate who shall absent himself from the service of the Senate, without leave of the Senate first obtained, shall forfeit his pay while so absent. In case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene the members present are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms or any person or persons by them authorized for any or all absent members, as the majority of such members present shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall deem good and sufficient; and in that case the expense shall be included in the con-

tingent expenses of the Senate. This rule shall apply to the first convention of the Senate each year at the legal time of meeting, and to each day of the session after the hour to which the Senate stood adjourned has arrived.

RULE 5

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

The Journal of the Senate as prepared daily by the Clerk and printed shall constitute the permanent Journal but any Senator shall have the right to demand the reading of the Journal of the previous day and to move to correct errors and omissions.

RULE 6

WHICH SENATOR ENTITLED TO FLOOR

When two or more Senators rise to speak at the same time, the Senator who first addresses the President as determined by the President shall have the floor and the President shall so announce it.

RULE 7

SENATORS SHALL ADDRESS THE PRESIDENT

Every Senator, when speaking, shall address the President, standing in his place and when he has finished shall take his seat. Senators when addressing the Senate may stand at their desk or may go to the Podium in the center aisle.

RULE 8

QUESTION OF ORDER—APPEAL FROM PRESIDENT'S DECISION

If any Senator in speaking, or otherwise, transgress the Rules of the Senate, the presiding officer shall, or any member may, call him to order; and when a member shall be called to order by the President or a Senator, he shall sit down and shall not proceed without leave of the Senate. Every question of order shall be decided by the President, without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate. The President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

RULE 9

MAY SPEAK TWICE IN ONE DEBATE

No Senator shall speak more than twice in any one debate, on the same day, without leave of the Senate.

RULE 10

ENDORSEMENT OF PAPERS

No Senator shall present any Bill, amendment or other paper, without having first endorsed the subject matter thereof and his name.

RULE 11

COMMITTEE REPORTS, HOW MADE

Reports must be separately made and on not less than half a sheet of paper, and shall be signed by the Chairman or such Senator as the Chairman may designate.

RULE 12

WRITING AND WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS

When a motion shall have been made, it shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the President or any member, delivered at the table and read before the same shall be debated. Any motion may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of the yeas and nays. No motion shall be made concerning a matter which has gone out of the possession of the Senate except a motion to recall, and if the same should prevail the Clerk shall send an appropriate message requesting a return of the matter.

RULE 13

MOTION TO RECONSIDER

No motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order unless the matter is in the possession of the Senate, nor shall any motion to reconsider be in order unless made within the next two days of the actual session of the Senate thereafter, and by a Senator voting with the prevailing side.

RULE 14

MOTION TO ADJOURN AND TO TABLE

Motions to adjourn and to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

RULE 15

PRIVILEGED MOTIONS

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be entertained but

1. To adjourn.
2. To take up order of the day.
3. To continue.
4. To lay on the table.
5. To postpone to a certain day. (Adjourn Debate.)
6. To postpone indefinitely.
7. To strike out the enacting clause.
8. To commit.
9. To amend.

which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are above arranged, and the first five of which shall be determined, without debate. A motion to lay an amendment on the table being agreed to shall not have the effect of disposing of the main question.

RULE 16

FIXING TIME TO CLOSE DEBATE

The debate on any question and the time when such question shall be voted upon may be fixed by a vote of two-thirds of the total qualified membership of the Senate. The debate on the question of fixing such time shall be limited within the discretion of the Chair; and such motions shall have precedence over motions numbered 6, 7, 8 and 9 in Rule 15.

RULE 17

YEAS AND NAYS—VOTE OF ABSENTEES SENATORS PRESENT MUST VOTE

When there is a division of the Senate on any question, and it shall be required by five Senators, the question shall be decided by the yeas and nays; and, on taking the same, no Senator who is absent when the affirmative and negative have both been put and the result announced by the President, shall be allowed to vote without leave of the Senate, and such vote, when allowed, shall not affect the result.

In taking the yeas and nays, and upon a call of the Senate, the names of the Senators shall be called alphabetically. Under the call of the yeas and nays every Senator present must give his vote one way or the other unless excused by the Senate.

RULE 18

NOTICE OF PROTEST

When a Senator intends to protest against any action of the Senate, he shall give notice of his intention so to do immediately after the determination of the matter and shall be allowed three days and no longer

from that time (unless by leave of the Senate) to deliver his protest; but in case of an adjournment *sine die*, such protest, if delivered to the President within three days, shall be entered on the Journal.

RULE 19

PRESIDENT TO VOTE WHEN THERE IS A TIE

When the Senate is equally divided on any question, the Clerk shall take the decision of the President, who may assign the reason of his vote.

RULE 20

A QUESTION MAY BE DIVIDED

If a question in debate contains several points, any Senator may have the same divided; but on a motion to strike out and insert it shall not be in order to move for a division of the question; but a rejection of a motion to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition, nor prevent a subsequent motion simply to strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion to simply strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.

RULE 21

HOW COMMITTEES ARE FORMED

In the appointment of the Standing Committees the Senate shall proceed *viva voce*, severally, to elect the Chairman of each Committee and then, *viva voce*, the other members necessary to complete the same; and a majority of the whole number of votes given shall be necessary to the choice of the Chairman of a Standing Committee. In all other elections a plurality of votes shall make a choice. All other Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless the Senate differently directs.

When any subject or matter shall have been referred to a Committee, any other subject or matter of a similar nature may, on motion, be referred to such Committee.

RULE 22

STANDING COMMITTEES

The following Standing Committees—each Committee to consist of not less than five nor more than eighteen Senators—shall be appointed at the commencement of each session, with leave to report by Bill or otherwise:

1. A Committee on Agriculture.
2. A Committee on Atomic and Nuclear Energy.
3. A Committee on Aviation.
4. A Committee on Banking and Insurance.
5. A Committee on Commerce and Manufactures.
6. A Committee on Education.
7. A Committee on Enrolled Acts.
8. A Committee on Federal Relations.
9. A Committee on Finance.
10. A Committee on Fish, Game and Forestry.
11. A Committee on Highways.
12. A Committee on Interstate Cooperation (1952 Code 9-101-7).
13. A Committee on Judiciary.
14. A Committee on Legislative Library.
15. A Committee on Medical Affairs.
16. A Committee on Military.
17. A Committee on Natural Resources.
18. A Committee on Penal and Charitable Institutions.
19. A Committee on Penitentiary.
20. A Committee on Privileges and Elections.
21. A Committee on Rules.
22. A Committee on Rural Electrification.
23. A Committee on Social Security.
24. A Committee on Veterans Affairs.

RULE 23

PRIORITY OF BUSINESS NOT DEBATABLE

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be settled without debate.

RULE 24

APPEAL FROM DECISION OF PRESIDENT

Senators shall have the right of appeal from the decisions of the President.

RULE 25

BILLS MAY BE RECOMMITTED

After commitment and report of a Bill to the Senate, or at any time before its passage it may be re-committed.

RULE 26

ALL BILLS REFERRED TO COMMITTEES, AND TO PROVIDE FOR RECALLING BILLS FROM COMMITTEES

All Bills or Joint Resolutions when first read shall be referred to the appropriate Committees. After the expiration of five legislative days from date of reference, any Bill or Resolution, except the General Appropriation Bill, may be recalled from any committee by a majority vote of the Senators present; before the expiration of five days from the date of reference, any Bill or Resolution may be recalled from committee by the vote of three-fourths of the Senators present.

RULE 27

PRINTING

All Bills when placed on the Calendar shall be printed and distributed to the Senators.

RULE 28

CLAUSES IN BILL MUST BE GERMANE

No clause shall be inserted in a Bill unless the same relates to the general subject of the Bill.

RULE 29

BILL BY COMMITTEE

No Bill or Resolution shall be introduced in the name of a Committee except with the approval of two-thirds of the members thereof at a duly called meeting of the Committee; and the Chairman of the Committee shall certify thereon that this rule has been complied with.

RULE 30

SECOND AND THIRD READING OF BILLS, RECOMMITTAL AND NOTICE OF AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING

The final question upon the second reading of every Bill, Resolution, Constitutional Amendment (or motion originating in the Senate), and requiring three readings previous to being passed, shall be, "Shall it pass and be ordered to a third reading?"

NOTICE OF AMENDMENT ON THIRD READING

No amendment shall be received on third reading of a Bill, unless notice be given upon second reading, or unless unanimous consent of the Senate be obtained.

AMENDMENTS ON THIRD READING DEBATABLE

Whenever an amendment is received on a third reading of any Bill, Resolution, amendment or motion, the same shall be debatable.

MOTION TO COMMIT ALWAYS IN ORDER

It shall at all times be in order before the final passage of any such Bill, Resolution, Constitutional Amendment, or motion, to move its commitment; and should such commitment take place, and amendment be reported by the Committee, the said Bill, Resolution, Constitutional Amendment, or motion, shall be again considered and read a second time.

SECOND READING AMENDMENTS MAY BE
AMENDED ON THIRD READING

Any amendment adopted on the second reading, or a Bill, may be further amended on the third reading, provided previous notice of general amendments has been given.

RULE 31

PRESENTATION OF PAPERS

Senators, when presenting petitions, memorials or reports, shall make a brief statement of the subject matter of such paper, and send it to the President, when it shall be read by the Reading Clerk, unless otherwise ordered.

RULE 32

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE

All messages to the House of Representatives shall be sent by either of the Clerks, as directed by the President.

RULE 33

THE CLERK CHARGED WITH PRINTING

The Clerk shall be charged with the duty of having executed, in a proper and accurate manner, the printing ordered by the Senate or provided in the rules.

RULE 34

ALL PAPERS TO BE DELIVERED TO CLERK AT CLOSE OF SESSION

At the close of every session the members of the Senate shall be required to hand in to the Clerk all

petitions not reported on, and all papers in anywise appertaining to the legislative business of the Senate, that the same may be regularly filed in his office.

RULE 35

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

When acting on confidential or executive business the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the President, the Senators, the Clerk of the Senate and the Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate.

All nominations made by the Governor to the Senate shall be referred to such Committee of the Senate as the President or the Senate may direct. Such nomination shall be considered by the Committee to which the nomination is referred at its next meeting and such other meetings as the Committee may determine. No unfavorable report may be made thereon unless and until an opportunity for a hearing is given the nominee. If the Committee fails to make a report within two weeks, the nomination may be recalled from the Committee by the Senate in Executive Session. When the report of the Committee is received by the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?"

Messages containing nominations to the Senate may be published in the Journal, when received as other messages, and the fact that a nomination has been made or that it has been confirmed or rejected shall not be regarded as a secret. But all information communicated, or remarks made by a Senator when acting upon nominations concerning the character or qualifications of the person nominated, and all votes upon any nominations, shall be kept secret.

Other messages from the Governor pertaining to confidential matters shall be subject to such secrecy or publication as the Senate, in each instance, may order.

RULE 36

ORDER OF BUSINESS AND SPECIAL ORDERS

1. Called to order by the President.
2. Prayer by the Chaplain.
3. Receipt of communications.
4. Introduction and reference of new Bills and Resolutions.
5. Call of local uncontested Calendar.
6. Motion period.
7. Call of the statewide Calendar.

The order of business above provided for may be varied by vote of three-fourths of the Senators present and any order of business already passed may be reverted to in any legislative day by the vote of two-thirds of the Senators present.

RULE 37

MOTION PERIOD

During the motion period above provided, any motions pertaining to the business of the Senate may be made. During this period all motions to take up Bills or Resolutions out of order for the purpose of making them special orders on a subsequent legislative day shall be in order and said motions shall be made in priority by the recognition by the President of the Senators making said motions. Each such motion shall relate to a separate Bill. Such motions shall be determined without debate and by two-thirds vote of the Senators present. During the motion period no Bill or Resolution can be made a special order ahead of Bills or Resolutions which have already acquired the status of adjourned debates.

RULE 38

CALENDAR OF CONTINUED BILLS

When the General Orders of the Day shall be taken up, any Senator may move to continue a matter, when called on the Calendar, to the 2nd, or any special session of the same General Assembly, and if the Senate agree thereto the matter shall be thereunto continued. The Clerk of the Senate shall make up a Calendar of all matters so continued, placing the same thereon in the order in which they have been continued. At the ensuing session the continued matters shall be taken up and considered in the same stage in which they were when so continued. Matters ordered to be placed in the General Orders at the said ensuing session shall be placed there in turn and have priority according to the last order for consideration made upon them, and the Calendar shall be proceeded in as hereinbefore provided.

PRIORITY OF MOTION TO CONTINUE

A motion to continue shall have precedence over a motion to lay on the table, and shall be decided after such remarks as the presiding officer may, in his discretion, permit.

RULE 39

ADMISSION TO THE FLOOR OF SENATE

No person shall be admitted to the floor of the Senate while in session, except as follows, viz.: The offi-

cers of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and the Clerk, and Sergeant-at-Arms, former members of the Senate and House of Representatives, the Governor and his Private Secretary, State Officers, Justices of the Supreme Court, President and Vice-President of the United States, members of Congress, Governors of States and Territories, State Printers, and such other persons as the President of the Senate may see fit to invite to a seat on the floor of the Senate.

RULE 40

PLACES ASSIGNED TO REPORTERS

Reporters of public journals, upon application of the proprietors thereof, shall be assigned such places for the execution of their duties as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

RULE 41

BILLS SHALL RECEIVE THREE READINGS—RESOLUTIONS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS TO LIE ON TABLE ONE DAY

Every Bill shall receive three different readings, on three different days previous to its being passed, and the President shall give notice of each, whether it be the first, second or third reading. All Resolutions to which the approval and signature of the Governor may be requisite, or which may grant money out of the contingent or any other fund, shall be treated in all respects, as to introduction and form of proceedings on them in the Senate, as Bills. All other Resolutions and Reports of Committees shall lie on the table one day for consideration.

FIRST AND THIRD READINGS BY TITLE

The first and third readings of each Bill shall be by its title only; *Provided*, That on each third reading the Bill shall be read in full on the demand of any Senator.

RULE 42

PRECEDENCE OF MOTION TO REFER

A motion to refer to a Standing Committee shall take precedence over a motion to refer to a Special Committee.

RULE 43

PRINTED BILLS TO BE ON DESK ONE DAY BEFORE SECOND READING

No Bill or Joint Resolution shall receive a second reading unless printed copies of the same shall have been laid on the desks of the members at least one day previous to such reading.

RULE 44

TITLE TO BILLS TO AMEND OR REPEAL ACTS

Every Bill or Joint Resolution which shall propose the amendment or repeal of any Section, Chapter or Title of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall in its title express the subject matter of such Section, Chapter, Title, Act or Joint Resolution so sought to be amended or repealed. Every Bill or Joint Resolution proposing to amend any Section or Sections of any Chapter of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall give the full text of the said Section or Sections, as it or they would read with such amendment or amendments inserted therein.

RULE 45

BROADCASTS BY TELEVISION AND RADIO

A Committee composed of the President of the Senate, the Clerk of the Senate and the Chairmen of the Judiciary, Finance and Rules Committees shall have full authority to regulate, supervise and fix times of broadcasts of the proceedings of the Senate by radio or television.

RULE 46

JEFFERSON'S MANUAL TO GOVERN OTHER CASES

In all cases not embraced by the foregoing Rules, the Senate shall be governed by such rules as are laid down in Jefferson's Manual of Parliamentary Practice.

RULE 47

SUSPENDING AND AMENDING RULES

Any of the Senate rules may be suspended by unanimous consent of the Senate; and without unanimous consent, one day's previous notice shall be given of a motion to suspend either of the foregoing Rules; and for the adoption of such a motion a two-thirds vote of the Senators present shall be necessary.

All permanent amendments, rescission, or repeal of any of the above rules shall be considered by the Senate only after at least one day's notice of intention to offer changes in the rules, and all such permanent changes shall require a two-thirds vote of the total membership of the Senate.

The Clerk of the Senate shall have these rules recorded in a permanent book which shall be kept at all times in the Senate Chamber. All permanent changes in the rules after the same shall have been adopted shall be certified by the President and shall be recorded in the permanent Rule Book by the Clerk.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

All members elected November 8, 1960, to serve until Monday after the General Election in November of 1962.

First year of legislative service stated always means the *session* year. Before 1896 members were elected in November, and their first *session* year began in the same month. 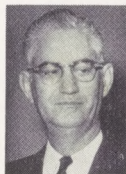

NECESSARY VOTE ON ACTION BY THE HOUSE

Bill for Special Charter

Concurrent Resolution to allow introduction thereof. Requires "a two-thirds vote of each house," that is *two-thirds of those voting*, a quorum being present. (Const., Art. IX, Sec. 2). See interpretation by Supreme Court on Page 155.

Consideration—Immediate and Deferred

To make Special Order requires majority vote for Appropriation Bills and local Bills, and two-thirds vote for all other Bills after consideration of written Resolution by Rules Com. (Rule 56).

Constitution

To pass measure submitting amendment thereto to the electors. Requires "two-thirds of the members elected"—83 yeas. (Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 1). Yeas and Nays required on Second Reading only. See 'Supreme Court Decision on Page 155.

To pass Bill ratifying same at *next session after approval* at a general election. Requires "a majority of each branch," by yeas and nays (Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 1), that is "*a majority of those voting*, a quorum being present." Yeas and Nays required on Second Reading only—See Supreme Court Decision on Page 155.

Constitutional Convention

To pass measures submitting calling of same to the electors. Requires "two-thirds of the members elected," that is, 83 votes. (Const., Art. XVI, Sec. 3).*

Dispensing with References—Printing—Report

With reference to Committee on first reading.—*Unanimous consent*. (Rule 46).

With printing—*Majority vote*. (Rule 51).

Expulsion of a Member

Requires "the concurrence of a two-thirds of those voting." (Const., Art. III, Sec. 12).*

Impeachment

Of an officer by the House requires "two-thirds of *all the members elected*"—83 yeas. (Const. Art. XV, Sec. 2).

Reconsideration of Question

After refusal to reconsider or affirmation of the first decision—Requires *unanimous consent* for further motion. (Rule 45).

Removal of Officer

By the Governor for neglect or cause. Requires "the address of two-thirds of each house," by yeas and nays. (Const., Art. XV, Sec. 4). See *Supreme Court Decision below.

Rules of the House

To rescind, suspend or alter (except Rule 1):

Requires vote of "two-thirds of the members present," after Report of Rules Committee on written Resolution. (Rule 77).

Amendments on Third Reading

To offer amendment (except by Chairman of Ways and Means Committee, if he gave notice at second reading of Supply or Appropriation Bill), or amendment by Committee after Bill has been committed or re-committed. *Unanimous consent.* (Rule 50).

Time of Daily Meeting

To change same from time set by Rules. Requires majority of those present. (Rule 1).

Veto by the Governor

To pass a Bill (or item or section therein) over same, requires "two-thirds of each house," that is, *two-thirds of those voting*, a quorum being present—"taken by yeas and nays, which shall be entered on the Journals of both Houses."* (Const., Art. IV, Sec. 23). See below.*

Free Conference Committee

Requires "the approval of two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the Senate and House separately taken." (Rule 4, Joint Rules).

*Supreme Court Decisions

"When the Constitution speaks of 'two-thirds of that House' as the vote required to pass a bill or joint resolution over the veto of the Governor, it means two-thirds of the House as then legally constituted and acting upon the matter. Whenever the framers of the Constitution intended otherwise, the purpose was expressly declared as in Art. XV, Sec. 1, 'a vote of two-thirds of all members elected shall be required for an impeachment,' and in Art. XVI, Sec. 1, where, in proposing amendments to the Constitution, 'two-thirds of the members elected to each house' must agree thereto." *Smith v. Jennings*, 67 S. C., page 328.

YEA AND NAY VOTE not required on each reading—There is no requirement in Art. XVI, Sec. 1 of the Constitution that the yeas and nays vote shall be taken on each reading of the proposed amendment the wording thereof being merely that it shall be agreed to by two-thirds of the members elected to each House and entered in the Journals respectively, and the yeas and nays vote, taken on the second reading, meets the requirements of this Section. *Thompson v. Livingston*, 116 S. C. 412, 107 S. E. 581, 583.

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RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

As Adopted January 11, 1961

RULE 1

DAILY SESSIONS—CALLING HOUSE TO ORDER—QUORUM

The hour to which the House shall stand adjourned every day shall be 11 o'clock a.m. of the succeeding day (except Wednesday when the House shall stand adjourned to 10 o'clock on the following Thursday, and Friday, when the House shall stand adjourned to 12 o'clock on the succeeding Tuesday), unless otherwise ordered by the House. *Provided*, that by motion made at any time the House by majority vote may fix the day and hour at which time the House shall next meet (not to exceed constitutional limitation) and this shall be decided without debate. *Provided*, That in the event of recess by the House during any daily session, the House shall reconvene at eight o'clock p.m., unless otherwise ordered, but a motion to recede until an hour certain may be made without the time having been previously fixed, one motion being sufficient to fix the time and recede. *Provided*, that unless otherwise ordered, the House shall consider only local uncontested matters on Friday of each week.

At the hour to which the House shall stand adjourned on any day the Speaker shall take the Chair and call the members to order.

If a quorum be present the Journal of the proceedings of the preceding day shall be corrected, if necessary, and confirmed. If a quorum then or at any other time be not present, the members present, if twenty or more, may send for the absent members; and all questions as to expenses of further proceedings against such absent members shall be determined when a quorum shall be present.

RULE 2

DECORUM OF MEMBERS

When the House is called to order, every member shall take his seat, and shall, during the sitting act with decorum. The members may keep on their hats while actually sitting in their respective seats, but at all other times they shall be uncovered (except such as shall be conscientiously restrained from uncovering their heads).

RULE 3

MEMBERS MAY BE CALLED TO ORDER

The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the Rules of the House or Parliamentary law, as practiced

or recognized by the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order.

RULE 4

PROCEDURE WHEN MEMBERS CALLED TO ORDER

If a member shall be called to order while speaking he shall immediately take his seat until the question of order be decided, unless allowed to proceed upon explanation. If the decision be in favor of the member, he shall proceed; if otherwise he shall not proceed without leave of the House; and, if the case require it, he shall be liable to such other proceedings as the House may take.

RULE 5

CHAIR TO DECIDE QUESTION OF ORDER

If one member on the floor call another to order for words spoken, the exceptionable words shall be taken down in writing by the member objecting, then read, admitted, denied or explained, by the member who spoke, and handed to the Chair, upon which the question of order shall be decided, and proceedings had as provided in the Fourth Rule.

RULE 6

MEMBER NAMED FOR DISORDER TO WITHDRAW

If, in any manner, repeated cries of order shall not produce order, the Speaker may call by his name any member obstinately persisting in irregularity whereupon, if the Speaker deem it necessary, he shall state the offense committed. The member may be heard in his exculpation and shall withdraw, and the House shall consider of the punishment to be inflicted, or further proceeding to be had.

RULE 7

GALLERY OR LOBBY MAY BE CLEARED—CONTEMPT PROCEEDINGS

In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the gallery or lobby, the Speaker or Chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall have power to order the place to be cleared, or any member may move for such order; and any person guilty of a contempt of the House may be ordered into custody by the House and dealt with as may by it be deemed proper.

RULE 8

MEMBERS MAY APPEAL FROM DECISION

All questions of order shall be determined by the Speaker in the first instance without debate, or with such debate as the Speaker, at his discretion, may permit; but any member may appeal to the House from the decision of the Speaker, on which appeal

no member shall speak more than once without leave of the House.

RULE 9

SPEAKER MAY INFORM BUT NOT DEBATE

The Speaker may give information or explain any matter before the House; he may speak on points of order in preference to other members, and as often as he may deem necessary; but he shall not enter into any debate or endeavor to influence any question before the House.

RULE 10

DECORUM WHEN SPEAKING

Every member, when about to speak, shall rise from his seat, and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker," and, in speaking, shall avoid disrespect to the House or to the Senate, and all personalities; and he shall confine himself to the question under consideration.

RULE 11

WHEN MEMBERS ADDRESS THE SPEAKER

The Speaker, when addressed by a member who rises in order, shall name the member, using no title but that of "Mr.," "Mrs.," or "Miss". The member who shall rise first in order, shall be first heard; and if several rise about the same time, the Speaker shall decide who was first up.

RULE 12

MEMBERS MAY SPEAK NOT MORE THAN TWICE ON SAME QUESTION

No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without leave of the House, except merely to explain his meaning, even if the debate on the question should be continued for many days.

RULE 13

PENALTY FOR ABSENCE WITHOUT LEAVE

If any member shall absent himself without leave, he may be sent for and made to pay expenses, and kept in custody, at the discretion of the House.

RULE 14

CALL OF THE HOUSE

Upon a call of the House being ordered, the Clerk shall call the roll of the members and note the absentees; the names of the absentees shall then be called over at such intervals and as often as the House may direct; proclamation may be made and messages sent to require the attendance of members; and, if the House shall not dispense with further proceedings, the doors may be closed; absentees (for whom no sufficient excuse is made) may be taken into custody as they appear, or they may be sent for and taken into custody wherever to be found, and each detained in custody and made to pay fees, at the discretion of the House.

RULE 15

FEES OF HOUSE MEMBERS

The fees of the regular messenger, or of any special messenger, to be appointed by the House shall be two dollars for any arrest; for each day's custody and for the discharge, one dollar; for traveling expenses, going and returning, ten cents a mile.

RULE 16

SPEAKER TO APPOINT COMMITTEES

All Committees shall be appointed by the Speaker, except Senatorial and Gubernatorial appointees and *ex officio* members of the House.

The Speaker, in appointing the several Committees, shall name the members constituting said Committees in alphabetical order, and the Chairman shall be elected by the several Committees.

And the Committee may at its discretion elect a Vice-Chairman.

RULE 17

STANDING COMMITTEES

As soon as practicable after the first meeting of the House succeeding a general election the following Standing Committees shall be appointed to serve until the next general election, or until a special order to the contrary be made by the House:

1. Committee on Ways and Means.
2. Committee on the Judiciary (Privileges and Elections).
3. Committee on Agriculture and Conservation (Fish, Game and Forestry).

4. Committee on Education and Public Works (Education, Highways, State House and Grounds, Railroads, Aviation).
5. Committee on Rules.
6. Committee on Military, Public and Municipal Affairs (Medical Affairs, Social Security, Penitentiary, State Hospital, Police Regulations, Military Affairs, Veteran's Affairs).
7. Committee on Interstate Cooperation.
(membership limited to 5, under 1952 Code, Sec. 9-103).
8. Committee on Labor, Commerce and Industry (Labor, Commerce and Manufacturing, Banking and Insurance, Merchants and Mercantile Affairs).

Not more than twenty-seven (27) members shall be appointed on any one Standing Committee and no member shall serve on more than two Standing Committees, except, that membership on the Committee on Rules or the Committee on Interstate Cooperation shall not be counted as one of the two said committees. Any member elected as an officer of a committee shall automatically, upon such election, vacate all other committee appointments, except that this shall not apply to the Committee on Rules, and the Committee on Interstate Cooperation.

Provided, That the Committee on Education and Public Works shall be deemed to be the Committee on Education, and the Committee on Military, Public and Municipal Affairs shall be deemed to be the Committee on Military Affairs, and the Committee on Medical Affairs, in all cases where the statutes provide for the Chairmen of these committees to perform *ex officio* duties.

RULE 18

JURISDICTION OF COMMITTEES

Unless otherwise ordered Committees shall have jurisdiction only over matters pertaining to the subjects indicated by the names of the respective Committees, and to the subject matter indicated in parenthesis following the names. (See Rule 17.)

RULE 19

WHEN COMMITTEE MAY BE CHANGED

After a Committee has been appointed no addition to it or change shall be made, except to fill a vacancy or excuse a member. *Provided*, That in filling a vacancy on any Committee, the assignment of any member may be changed from another Committee to fill such vacancy.

RULE 20

ELIGIBILITY OF MEMBERS OF COMMITTEES

No member shall be appointed on a Committee before he shall have been sworn and have taken his seat. Any member who shall be sworn after the general announcement of the Committee shall, within a few days afterward, be placed by the Speaker on a Standing Committee whose number of members will not thereby be extended beyond the number provided in Rule 17.

RULE 21

ATTENDANCE OF COMMITTEE MEETINGS

A majority of a Committee shall, when assembled, constitute a quorum for business. If the members fail, to the probable delay, or neglect of business, to form a quorum, upon the summons of the Chairman, or if individual members frequently fail to attend the meetings of the Committee, the Chairman shall report the delinquency to the House, which shall in its discretion, take order for the censure of the delinquents, or other suitable proceeding.

RULE 22

SITTING OF COMMITTEES—PUBLIC HEARINGS

No Committee without special leave, shall sit during the sitting of the House, except that the Committee on Rules, and any Committee of Conference or Free Conference, may sit at any time, and may report at any time when a message might be received. All Committees shall have leave to report by Bill or otherwise.

Except that no Committee shall sit unless a quorum be present and all Bills introduced by Committees must carry the statement of the Chairman that the Bill has the approval of two-thirds of the membership of the Committee.

Provided, That no Committee shall introduce a Bill pertaining to subject-matter over which the Committee does not have jurisdiction.

Provided, That the State Appropriation Bill and the Deficiency Appropriation Bill may be introduced by a majority vote of the Ways and Means Committee.

Provided, That no Bill, except a Committee Bill, shall be considered until one week after date of reference to Committee, and notice in writing of all public hearings shall be given by Committee Chairmen to the Clerk of the House at least five calendar days prior to the date fixed for the hearing, such notice to be published in the House Calendar.

Provided, That no statewide Bill appropriating money shall be considered by the House until after such Bill has been referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1953 session Speaker Blatt ruled that under the fourth Proviso of Rule 22, any statewide Bill appropriating money must be referred to the Ways and Means Committee before being considered by the House. See pages 806-808, House Journal, 1953.]

Speaker Blatt also ruled that under the third Proviso of Rule 22, which requires that a Bill cannot be considered by a Committee until one week after date of reference, does not apply where a Bill is referred to one Committee, reported by it and subsequently committed to another Committee. The House, by majority vote, may recall a Bill from a Committee any time after it is committed to the Committee, if it was previously referred to a Committee and remained there for a week. See page 824, House Journal, 1953.]

RULE 23

UNFAVORABLE COMMITTEE REPORTS

Every unanimously unfavorable Report by any Committee, shall be considered immediately by the House, and adopted or rejected without debate; *Provided*, 30 members do not signify objections to doing so by rising when called on for that purpose.

RULE 24

DIVISION VOTE OF HOUSE

If, upon a question taken by acclamation, the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, the House shall divide by those in the affirmative first rising from their seats, then those in the negative. If the Speaker still doubts, or a count be required, the Speaker shall name one member from each side to tell the numbers in the affirmative and those in the negative, and from their report shall state the decision.

RULE 25

WHEN AYES AND NOES SHALL BE ORDERED

Upon any question, at the request of any ten members, who may signify their requests by rising, the ayes and noes shall be ordered; whereupon, at the decision, the Clerk shall call the roll and take the names of all who vote aye, and all who vote no, which he shall enter on the Journal.

RULE 26

PROCEEDINGS GOVERNING AYES AND NOES

When a question is to be taken by ayes and noes after the House is ready for the question, and the same has been stated, the debate shall cease, the Door-keeper shall close the door and keep it closed until the decision shall have been announced by the Speaker.

Provided, That on motion of any member of the House of Representatives to open the door of the House immediately after a roll call, and before the vote is announced, it shall take a number not less than ten (10), to object by a rising vote, to prevent said door from being opened and allowing such members as may be outside to come in and cast their votes.

After the door has been thus closed, no member, when called by the Clerk, shall say more than "aye" or "no." Every member who may be in the House when called shall (unless the House shall have before excused him from voting on the question) give his vote under the penalty of such proceeding as the House may, after decision, in its discretion adopt to punish his contempt.

No member shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to vote after the decisions shall have been announced by the Chair. After the decision of the question, a member absent may be permitted to record the vote he would have given if present, but such vote shall not affect the previous question.

RULE 27

WHEN MEMBERS SHALL NOT VOTE

No member shall vote on any question of a private nature in the event of which he is personally or pecuniarily interested.

RULE 28

SPEAKER TO VOTE LAST—EQUAL VOTE REJECTS THE QUESTION

The Speaker shall vote in all cases (except when he may be personally or pecuniarily interested or shall be excused), his name being called last in the ayes and noes. If with his vote the House be equally divided, the question shall be decided in the negative.

RULE 29

WHEN DEBATE IS IN ORDER

No motion shall be debated until it shall have been stated by the Speaker. Any motion shall, if desired by

the Speaker or any other member, be reduced to writing, and delivered in at the table and read, before it shall be debated.

RULE 30

MOVER MAY WITHDRAW QUESTION

The mover may withdraw any question or proposition before an amendment or decision except a demand for the ayes and noes, after the same has been ordered, and except after the previous question has been ordered.

RULE 31

NO NOTICE REQUIRED TO INTRODUCE BILL

No notice shall be required of a member of his intention to introduce a Bill.

RULE 32

HOW PAPERS MUST BE ENDORSED—TITLES AND TEXTS OF BILLS TO AMEND STATUTES

Every Bill, before presentation, shall have its title endorsed; every report, its title at length every petition, memorial, or other paper, its prayer or substance; and, in every instance, the name of the member presenting any paper shall be endorsed, and the papers shall be presented by the member to the Speaker at the desk.

And every Bill or Joint Resolution which shall propose the amendment or repeal of any Section, Chapter or Title of the General Statutes or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall, in its title express the subject matter of such Section, Chapter, Title, Act or Joint Resolution, so sought to be amended or repealed. If this be not complied with, the paper shall not be received by the Speaker.

Every Bill or Joint Resolution proposing to amend any Section or Sections of any Chapter of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall give the full text of the said Section or Sections as it or they would read with such amendment or amendments inserted therein. And if this latter clause of this Rule be not complied with, the Bill or Joint Resolution shall be amended so as to conform to this Rule before it be considered by the House.

RULE 33

APPROPRIATION BILLS COMPTROLLER GENERAL'S CERTIFICATE—PRINTING OF—

Every General Appropriation Bill and Supplemental Appropriation Bill for the ordinary expenses of State

Government before presentation shall have attached thereto a certificate from the Comptroller General that the total of the appropriations therein provided for is not in excess of the estimated total revenue of the State for such purposes, including that revenue which may be provided for in the Bill, or in any other Bill previously passed by the House for the fiscal year to which the Bill is applicable, and an Appropriation Bill without such certificate shall not be read the first time in the House, but shall be returned to the Committee on Ways and Means by the Speaker.

The General Appropriation Bill and Supplemental Appropriation Bills shall include only provisions for appropriating funds, provisions affecting revenue, and rules, regulations, and procedures relative thereto; and no provision of an Appropriation Bill, and no amendment thereto, shall be in order which is not germane to these purposes.

After passage on second reading, and before its consideration on third reading, every General Appropriation Bill and every Supplemental Appropriation Bill shall have attached thereto a certificate from the Comptroller General that the total of the appropriations therein provided is not in excess of the estimated total revenue of the State for such purposes, including that revenue which may be provided in the Bill, or in any other Bill previously passed by the House, for the fiscal year to which the Bill is applicable, and if the Comptroller General cannot give such certificate, the Speaker shall order the Bill recommitted to the Ways and Means Committee. After the report of the committee, any amendments which it shall recommend may be adopted.

All State Appropriation Bills shall be printed at each stage in their passage so as to show the amounts appropriated for any of the purposes therein for the fiscal year immediately preceding, the amounts requested by the institution or department, the amounts recommended by the Budget Commission, the amounts approved by the Ways and Means Committee, the amounts passed by the House, the amounts approved by the Senate Finance Committee, the amounts passed by the Senate, and the amounts agreed upon by the Free Conference Committee.

Provided, however, that appropriations for Clemson College, The University of South Carolina, The Citadel, Winthrop College, South Carolina State College and The Medical College of South Carolina may be made in a lump sum.

RULE 34

DILATORY MOTION NOT ENTERTAINED

No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker.

RULE 35

SUSPENSION OF QUESTION OR SPEECH

A question before the House shall be suspended by:

1. A message.
2. A Report of the Committee on Rules.
3. A Report of a Committee of Free Conference.
4. A question of order.
5. A question of privilege.
6. A question of taking a recess.
7. Any other incidental question, such as of reading papers, dividing a question, withdrawing a motion, excusing a member from voting, or the like; of which the six first named may suspend even a speech; *Provided*, That the Sixth, if once negatived, be not received during the same speech without the assent of the member speaking.

RULE 36

DEBATE MAY BE INTERRUPTED

When a question is under debate, no motion beside those mentioned in the next preceding Rule shall be received, except:

1. To adjourn, or recede.
2. To continue.
3. To lay on the table.
4. For the previous question.
5. To postpone indefinitely, or to a day beyond the session.
6. To adjourn the debate to a certain day within the session.
7. To recur to the morning hour.
8. To commit or recommit.
9. To strike out the Enacting or Resolving words.
10. To amend.

which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are here arranged, and of these the first and second may be permitted to interrupt a speech; subject to provisions contained in subsequent rules.

[Note: See Rules 42 and 43.]

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1919 session Speaker Cothran ruled that a motion to adjourn to a day beyond the session is not in order. See House Journal, page 771.]

RULE 37

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS

A motion to strike out the enacting words of a Bill, or resolving words of a Resolution, shall have precedence of a motion to amend, and, if carried, shall be considered as equivalent to rejection.

RULE 38

PRIVATE CLAIMS

No Bill or Amendment providing an appropriation to pay a private claim against this State or a department thereof shall be acted upon until the same has been investigated by a Standing Committee of the House and a report made thereon.

RULE 39

DELEGATIONS TO INTRODUCE ONLY LOCAL MATTERS

No Bill or Joint Resolution shall be introduced as a delegation bill or resolution unless such bill or resolution relates only to local matters concerning the county which such delegation represents.

RULE 40

SUBSTITUTE MOTIONS

Subject to the foregoing rules when a motion is made the Speaker shall entertain but two substitute motions which shall be considered in their inverse order.

RULE 41

DIVISION OF A QUESTION

Any member may without debate, call for the division of a question, and the House may divide it if it shall appear to comprehend the question so distinct that, one being taken away, the rest may stand entire for decision. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed, indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost shall not be deemed equivalent to agreement, nor shall it preclude either amendment or a motion to strike out and insert.

RULE 42

NON-DEBATABLE MOTIONS

Motion to:

Adjourn

Take a recess

Continue

Lay on the table

Take up any matters in the orders of the day not regularly reached

Proceed to the orders of the day

Discharge, lay aside for the day, depart from, or suspend the orders

Postpone indefinitely, or to a day beyond the session

Adjourn a debate
 Recur to the morning hour
 Fix the hour to which the House shall next meet shall be decided without debate; after such short conversations as the Speaker may permit. No motion to:
 Lay on the table
 Postpone or adjourn a debate
 Proceed to general orders of the day; or to Commit having been negatived, shall be again allowed at the same stage of the Bill or proposition within one hour of the time when the question was before negatived.

RULE 43

MOTION TO ADJOURN AND TO RECESS

Motions to adjourn, to recede, and to recede subject to the call of the Chair shall always be in order, except whilst the House is actually engaged in deciding a question by ayes and noes, or in voting *viva voce*, or in balloting; but a motion to adjourn, or to take a recess, having been negatived, no new motion to adjourn or take a recess shall be in order until fifteen minutes shall have elapsed from the decision of the former motion.

RULE 44

INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT

Indefinite postponement shall dispose of the question.

RULE 45

MOTION TO RECONSIDER

When a question shall have been once decided in the affirmative or negative, any member who voted with the prevailing side may, on the same day or the next day of the sitting of the House, move for a reconsideration thereof; and if the House shall refuse to reconsider, or, upon reconsideration, shall affirm its first decision, no further motion shall be in order except by unanimous consent.

Provided, That the Bill, Resolution, Message, Report, Amendment, Motion, or the paper upon which the vote was taken shall not have gone out of the possession of the House announcing the former decision.

A motion to reconsider may be laid on the table without affecting the question with reference to which the same is made; and if such motion be laid on the table, it shall be deemed a final disposition of the motion.

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1936 session Speaker Taylor ruled that a motion to reconsider the action of the House on a veto by the Governor was in order under

Rule 44 (Now Rule 45) although such a motion is out of order under the procedure followed in the National House of Representatives. Speaker Taylor's ruling was subsequently upheld by the S. C. Supreme Court. See Case No. 1194, *Coleman v. Lewis, et al.* opinion No. 14323, filed June 30, 1936; also pages 1841-42, House Journal of 1936.]

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1957 Session Speaker Blatt ruled that the motion to reconsider was in order at any time on the same day or the next day of the sitting of the House even though the House was restricted to the consideration of local uncontested matters only. The motion to reconsider could be made and so noted in the record during a local session. See pages 732 and 733 of House Journal.]

RULE 46

PROCEDURE ON FIRST READING

The first reading of the Bill shall be by title only. No amendment shall then be in order and the Bill shall be referred to some Committee, unless the House unanimously agree, without debate, to dispense with reference.

RULE 47

SECOND READING OF BILL

The second reading of a Bill shall be Section by Section, and line by line, and word by word—recurrence not being allowed, unless by leave of the House, upon motion, without debate. After the Bill shall have been read, and all amendments and privileged motions (if any) disposed of, the question shall be: "Shall this Bill be ordered to a third reading?" Upon a decision in the affirmative, the order shall be made accordingly. A decision in the negative shall be a rejection.

RULE 48

THIRD READING OF BILL

At the third reading of a Bill, the Bill shall be read by its title only.

If the Bill originated in the House, the question then shall be: "Shall this Bill pass and be ordered to be sent to the Senate?" A decision in the negative shall be a rejection. Upon a decision in the affirmative, the order shall be made without question.

In the case of a Bill which originated in the Senate (if no amendment has been made by the House), the question shall be: "Shall this Bill pass, the title thereof be changed to an Act, and be ordered enrolled?"

If the Bill has been amended in the House the question shall be: "Shall this Bill pass, and be ordered to be returned to the Senate with amendment?" A

decision in the negative shall be a rejection. Upon a decision in the affirmative, the order shall be made without question.

RULE 49

HOUSE BILL AMENDED BY SENATE—AMENDMENT TO BE PRINTED

A Bill which originated in the House having been returned from the Senate, with amendment, the Speaker shall call the attention of the House to such amendment. The question then shall be: "Will the House agree to the Senate amendment?" A decision in the negative shall be a rejection. Upon a decision in the affirmative, the title of the Bill shall be changed to an Act, and ordered to be enrolled.

Provided, That a motion to nonconcur shall have precedence over a motion to amend the Senate amendments.

Provided, further, that if a State-wide Bill which originated in the House, or which, having originated in the Senate has been amended by the House, shall be returned from the Senate with amendment, such amendment by the Senate shall be laid on the desks of the members at least one day previous to action by the House on such amendment.

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1949 session, Speaker Pope ruled that the last proviso to Rule 49 was complied with, if copies of the Senate Journal containing the Senate amendments had been on the desks of members for one day. (See House Journal 1949, p. 1827)].

RULE 50

AMENDMENTS ON THIRD READING

At the third reading of a Bill, no order or amendment shall be permitted without unanimous consent, except that the Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means may (if he shall have given notice at the second reading of his intention to offer amendments at the third) be permitted to offer amendments to any Bill to raise supplies or to make appropriations, such as may be pertinent to the Bill; and,

Provided, That the House may, in its discretion, commit or recommit any Bill at its third reading; and after the report of the Committee any amendment which it shall recommend may be adopted.

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1950 session, Speaker Pope ruled that under Rule 50, a motion to reconsider that has been laid on the table at the second reading of a Bill does not prevent the consideration of amendments on third reading offered by the Chairman of the Ways & Means Committee, or by Committees as described under this Rule; and that the application of the parliamentary clincher under Rule 45 at the second read-

ing of a Bill has no effect at the third reading of the Bill except to prevent reconsideration of the second reading.

(See Pages 148 and 212, 1950 House Journal)].

RULE 51

BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS TO BE PRINTED

All Bills and Resolutions reported by a Committee shall of course, be printed, together with the report of the Committee, unless the House shall specially dispense with printing. The Standing Committees may order to be printed for their use, such papers as shall be referred to them.

RULE 52

PRINTED BILLS TO BE ON DESK ONE DAY PREVIOUS TO SECOND READING; APPROPRIATION AND SUPPLEMENTAL— 3 LEGISLATIVE DAYS

No Bill or Joint Resolution shall receive a second reading unless printed copies of the same shall have been laid on the desks of members at least one day previous to such reading. *Provided*, no General Appropriation Bill or Supplemental Appropriation Bill for the ordinary expenses of the State Government shall receive a second reading unless printed copies of such Appropriation Bill shall have been laid on the desks of members at least three legislative days previous to such reading.

RULE 53

MOTIONS TO COMMIT AND RECOMMIT

Any Bill, Report, Petition, or other paper which may come before the House, may be committed or recommitted before a final decision thereon.

RULE 54

SPEAKER MAY ORDER ENGROSSMENT

The Speaker may, whenever he may think it necessary, order any Bill, after its second reading, or any Resolution, Report or other paper which has been under consideration, to be fairly engrossed.

RULE 55

AMENDMENTS MUST BE GERMANE

No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment. *Provided*, That in determining whether or not any amendment be germane, the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be guided by the prece-

dents of the House of Representatives and if there be none available then by the precedents and principles established by the National House of Representatives.

RULE 56

SPECIAL AND GENERAL ORDERS AND MOTIONS

Orders of the day shall be Special and General; Special when set for consideration after Third Reading Bills or when set for consideration on a particular day at a particular hour; General, when a matter is ordered for consideration or action on a day subsequent without special reference given to it. NO BILL except a COMMITTEE BILL or LOCAL BILL shall be made a Special Order for a particular day at a particular hour.

Special Orders may be set for Appropriation Bills and Local Bills by majority vote. Special Orders on all other Bills shall be set only by written Resolution, which has been referred to the Rules Committee, and agreed to by two-thirds of the members present after the Committee has made its report.

Any member may insist upon a Special Order of the Day, or other Special Orders, until it be discharged.

A General Order of the Day shall always require the special assent of the House before it be proceeded in or executed.

A Special Order, set for a certain day and hour or for a certain day and hour and from day to day until disposed of, not being considered by the House at the hour named, shall be transferred by the Clerk of the House to the Special Orders of the following day immediately after Third Reading Bills and from day to day thereafter until disposed of, in the chronological order of original appointment.

Ten (10) minutes, if so much be necessary, of each Legislative day immediately before Special and General Orders on Second Reading Bills shall be given to motions. *Provided*, That time consumed by roll calls shall not be considered as part of the time allotted to motions.

Provided, further, That during the motion period no motion shall be withdrawn after a substitute has been offered therefor.

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1951 Session Speaker Blatt ruled that it was in order at any time to set the State Appropriations Bill for a Special Order and that it did not require unanimous consent. See pages 279-280 of House Journal.]

RULE 57

CONSIDERATION OF MATTERS, IMMEDIATE AND DEFERRED—
PRIORITY OF CONFERENCE OR FREE CONFERENCE REPORT
AND REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RULES

Every Bill which shall be ordered for a second reading, every Report of a Committee, and every original Resolution received from any member shall be ordered for consideration on the next day of sitting after the order, and shall be placed in its turn in the General Orders of the Day, and each paper in the General Orders shall have priority according to the date of the last order for consideration made upon it.

Except that the House may make a Special Order for the consideration of any subject on any day subsequent, or may agree to take up any matter in the Orders of the Day before it be reached in order; or may consider any Report or Resolution on the day, it may be submitted, provided ten members do not signify objections to doing so by rising when called on for the purpose, if a proposition so to consider be made to the House; and,

Except that a Bill reported by a Committee shall be read a first time, when the Report may be received and ordered for consideration along with the Bill; and that a report of the Committee on Rules may be considered whenever the House shall direct.

Except that no report of a Committee on Conference or Free Conference, except on local matters, shall be considered until such Report has been printed in the Journal and explained by the Conferees on the floor of the House.

“Provided, That when ten members object to the immediate consideration of any Resolution, the Resolution shall be referred to an appropriate Committee, and shall not be considered by the House until after the Committee has made its report. Provided, further, That such Resolution shall be printed in the same manner as is prescribed in Rule 51 for the printing of Bills and shall be referred to in the House Journal by the title only.”

RULE 58

MOTION TO CONTINUE

When the General Orders of the Day have been taken up, any member may move to continue a matter, when called on the Calendar, to the next session; and if the House agree thereto, the matter shall be thereupon continued; and the Clerk of the House shall make up a Calendar of all the matter so continued, placing the same thereon, in the order in which they have been continued, and at the ensuing session the continued matters shall be taken up and considered in the same stage in which they were when so con-

tinued; and matters ordered to be placed in the General Orders at the said ensuing session shall be placed there in turn, and have priority according to the last order for consideration made upon them, and the Calendar shall be proceeded in as hereinbefore provided.

A motion to continue shall have precedence of a motion to lay on the table and shall be decided after such short conversation as the Speaker may in his discretion permit.

[At the opening of the 1946 Extra Session Speaker Blatt ruled that all Legislation that had been continued until the next Session, or was pending on the Calendar upon adjournment of the Regular Session, was in order, and should be considered in the Extra Session in the same stage in which they were when the Regular Session adjourned—See House Journal 1946 Extra Session, Page 1573.]

RULE 59

QUESTION OF PRIORITY NOT DEBATABLE

All questions as to a priority of business, or as to the time when any matters shall be considered or ordered for consideration and as to a departure from the regular order of business shall be decided without debate.

RULE 60

ORDER OF BUSINESS DAILY

When the House shall not direct a different course, which, at any time, in any particular not forbidden by these Rules, it may do, the following order of business shall be enforced every day by the Speaker, unless departed from by leave of the House:

1. After the Journal has been confirmed, the Speaker shall present to the House communications on the Speaker's table intended to give information to be referred; messages and papers from the Senate; Resolutions, Bills, Reports of Committees and such like matters.

2. That upon each legislative day the House shall, for a period of thirty minutes, if so much time be necessary, consider uncontested second and third reading Bills before considering special orders or other general orders. Upon this call a single objection shall prevent the consideration of the Bill. Such objection shall be made in the manner prescribed by Rule 10. It shall be entered upon the Calendar with the name of the member or members objecting and the Bill thereafter shall be deemed a contested Bill until the member or members objecting shall formally from the floor withdraw objection.

3. Upon completion of the call of the Calendar of uncontested Bills the Speaker shall call for withdrawal of objections and any Bills upon which all objections are withdrawn, shall be considered again as provided in paragraph 2 above.

4. All uncontested matters on the Calendar having been disposed of, the House shall then take up consideration of contested matters in the order in which they appear on the Calendar, except that the Speaker shall call for Motions immediately before Special and General Orders on Second Reading Bills, as provided in the last paragraph of Rule 56.

RULE 61

CLERK TO PREPARE DAILY CALENDAR

The Clerk of the House shall cause to be printed and laid on the desks of the members, every morning, the orders of the preceding day, arranged according to priority, and numbered from the commencement of the session, every matter being introduced and numbered anew after every new order upon it, and the substance of the order being summarily stated, as: "Bill, etc., ordered for a second reading"; "Report of Committee, etc., on Bill, etc., ordered for consideration"; "Report on Bill, etc., taken from the table and ordered for consideration."

RULE 62

RESUMPTION OF INTERRUPTED DEBATE

A debate interrupted by a simple adjournment shall afterwards be resumed at the point of interruption as if debate had been formally adjourned. If the matter under debate be in the orders, general or special, it shall be first taken up when next the orders are taken up, unless a special order to the contrary be made by the House.

If it be a matter not in orders, it shall be taken up at the next meeting before any other question is presented, except incidental questions, and such matters on his table as the Speaker may think necessary to present, and such questions as the House may give special leave to be first presented.

In like manner, and with like exceptions, a matter interrupted by a call for the orders of the day shall, after the orders have been disposed of, or laid aside, and such matters as may be taken up from the table have been disposed of, or after adjournment, be resumed at the point of interruption, before any other question.

RULE 63

WHEN MESSAGES MAY BE RECEIVED

Messages may be received at any time whilst the door is open, except whilst a question is being put, or a ballot, or a *viva voce* vote is taken. A message shall be presented to the House by the Speaker when received, or afterwards, according to its nature, and the business in which the House is engaged; or its consideration may, on motion, be ordered by the House.

RULE 64

DUTIES OF CLERK, READING CLERK AND SPEAKER

The Clerk, or Reading Clerk, as the Speaker may direct shall prepare in writing, present to the Speaker for his signature, and send all messages to the Senate ordered by the House, unless a different form of sending any message be ordered by the Speaker of the House.

The Reading Clerk shall read all papers to be read at the desk, which the Speaker may direct him to read, the Speaker being especially responsible that all amendments ordered by the House be correctly made, and that the attention of the House be called to all amendments made by the Senate since the matter was before the House.

The Clerk shall also be charged with the duty of having executed, in a prompt and accurate manner, all the printing required by the Rules or orders of the House.

RULE 65

CLERK MAY REQUIRE RECEIPT FOR PAPERS

No member shall take any books or papers from the possession of the Clerk of the House without first acquainting the Clerk, and, if required, giving him a receipt to return the same in a reasonable time or on his demand.

RULE 66

CHAIRMAN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

In forming a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the Chair and appoint a Chairman to preside over the Committee.

RULE 67

RULES FOR COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

The Rules of the House, so far as they may be applicable, shall be observed in a Committee of the Whole, the Chairman being substituted for the Speak-

er, except the Rule limiting the time of speaking on a debatable question; but no member of the Committee shall speak on the same question oftener than twice until every other member choosing to speak has spoken.

RULE 68

AMENDMENTS BY COMMITTEES

No Committee of the Whole or other Committee, shall deface or interline a Bill or other paper, referred to it, but shall report any amendments recommended on a separate paper, noting the page and line.

RULE 69

SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

If inexpedient to elect on the opening day of the session, the Wednesday following the organization of the House, a Speaker *Pro Tempore* shall be elected, who shall preside in the absence of the Speaker. The Speaker in the absence of the Speaker *Pro Tempore*, or the Speaker *Pro Tempore*, may name a member to fill his place during occasional absences from the chair, but such substitute shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

In the absence of the Speaker and Speaker *Pro Tempore*, the House shall elect a Speaker *Pro Tempore* to serve until the return of the Speaker or Speaker *Pro Tempore*.

RULE 70

PAY CERTIFICATES

It shall be the duty of the Clerk to issue pay certificates to members for per diem and mileage, and to officers and employees, and for incidental expenses, upon the order of the House or of the Speaker, the signature of the Speaker being attested by the Clerk.

RULE 71

ADMISSION TO HALL—HATS

No person not a member or officer of the House shall be admitted within the bar without the special leave of the House. The following persons, and no others, shall be admitted within the Hall; namely,

The present and former members and officers of the House of Representatives; the members of the Press as designated by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; the Governor; the present members and officers of the Senate; the present officers and employes of the Engrossing Department; and such persons as may be invited by order of the House; *Provided*, no seat

in the House shall be occupied by any one except the members thereof.

All persons in the gallery or lobby shall be uncovered, and all persons not members of the House shall be uncovered whilst in the Hall.

The Doorkeepers and Messengers are charged with enforcement of this Rule.

RULE 72

ADDRESSES

No person shall be permitted to address the House, or the Joint Assembly, except by written Resolution, and such Resolution shall be referred to the Committee on Rules before being considered by the House.

RULE 73

TIME ALLOWED TO EXPLAIN VOTE

No member having asked and obtained leave of the House to explain his vote on any question before the House shall be allowed more than ten minutes for such explanation.

[Speaker's Ruling: At the 1960 Session Speaker Blatt ruled that the intent of Rule 73 is that the member desiring to explain his vote must obtain unanimous consent therefor and must in the same motion state the length of time desired, not to exceed ten minutes. To rule otherwise would result in a majority of the House being able to take up all the time available to the House (1240 minutes) by granting to each member ten minutes to explain his vote. See page 1526 of House Journal.]

RULE 74

PRECEDENT AND PARLIAMENTARY LAW

In all particulars not determined by these Rules, or by the laws or Constitution of this State, or of the United States, the practice of this House shall conform to its previous usage, or be guided by parliamentary law as it may be collected from the best authorities.

RULE 75

ALLOTMENT OF SEATS

As soon as practicable, after the House has been organized, the seats of the members shall be allotted as follows: The Clerk shall prepare a number of ballots, equal to the number of Counties, upon each of which shall be written or printed the name of a County. These shall be put into a hat or closed box, and, under the direction of the Speaker, shall be

drawn out one by one by the youngest Page present. As each ballot is drawn, the delegation from the County whose name appears upon the ballot shall select their seats. *Provided*, That no delegation shall be allowed to select more than one seat on the main aisle. This Rule shall take effect immediately.

RULE 76

CHANGING OR SUSPENDING RULES

None of the foregoing Rules shall be rescinded, suspended or altered, except by written Resolution, which has been referred to the Rules Committee, and agreed to by two-thirds of the members present, after the Committee has made its report.

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JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND HOUSE

Adopted March 30, 1961

RULE 1

READING OF BILL

Every Bill shall receive three readings on three several days in the House in which it originates before it is sent to the other House.

RULE 2

MESSAGES BETWEEN THE TWO HOUSES

All messages between the two Houses must be in writing and numbered in regular sequence for each session, except that messages announcing the organization of either House, or its readiness to adjourn pursuant to Joint Resolution, may be communicated orally by the Clerk in person.

RULE 3

PRESIDENT PRESIDES IN JOINT ASSEMBLY

When the two Houses meet for any purpose, the President of the Senate shall preside and discharge the duties of the Joint Assembly.

RULE 4

COMMITTEE OF CONFERENCE AND FREE CONFERENCE

Question of difference between the two Houses shall be referred to Committees of Conference as follows:

If the disagreement be upon a Resolution, Bill or Report adopted by one House and sent to the other House for consideration, and it be proposed to amend such Resolution, Bill or Report, the House in possession of the paper will send a message to the other House containing the amendment proposed. If that House disagree to such amendment, it will return a message accordingly. If the House proposing the amendment still desire to urge it, it will send a message to the other House, insisting upon its amendment, and asking that a Committee of Conference may be appointed at the same time naming its own Committee of Conference. This will be granted as of course. The Committee of Conference shall meet in Joint Session and shall formulate and submit their report in writing to both Houses. If the Joint Committee of Conference fail to agree upon any plan of settlement, or their Report be not concurred in by both Houses, the Resolution, Bill or Report shall be lost. *Provided*, that the Conference Committee shall not have power

to insert any new matter not found in the Senate or House version of the Bill, Resolution, or Report in disagreement. Nor shall the Conference Committee have power to alter or delete any matter agreed upon by both Houses in said Resolution, Bill or Report. And in the case of appropriation of money they shall not have the power to exceed the maximum or go below the minimum found in either in the Senate or House version. *Provided, further*, that upon the approval of two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the Senate and the House separately taken any Resolution, Bill or Report may be referred to a Committee of Free Conference, *Provided, further*, that any new matter inserted in an appropriation Bill by a Free Conference Committee may be stricken upon motion carried by majority vote in either the Senate or the House of Representatives, that all new matter, including any appropriation which is in excess of the maximum amount passed by either the Senate or the House, contained in a report of a Free Conference Committee, shall be italicized, except that in the event any question arises as to what constitutes new matter the same shall be resolved by the presiding officer of each body.

Provided, further, it shall always be in order before the adoption of the report of the Committee of Free Conference to move to recommit it to the same Committee of Free Conference notwithstanding that either House had adopted the report. Should such motion prevail (by a majority vote of either House) a message shall be sent to the other House informing them of that action. Upon receipt of such message, notwithstanding the previous adoption of report of the Committee of Free Conference, a motion shall be in order to recommit the report to the same Committee of Free Conference.

RULE 5

NOTICE OF REJECTION TO BE SENT

When a Bill or Resolution or any other matter which shall have passed in one House is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to that House in which the same shall have passed.

RULE 6

PAPERS TO BE INCLUDED WITH BILL

Each House shall transmit to the other all papers upon which any Bill or Resolution or Report sent to it for consideration shall have passed.

RULE 7

RATIFICATION OF ACTS

All Bills that have been read three times in each House and have been duly engrossed and become Acts,

shall be returned into the possession of the Clerk of that House in which the Bills originated. A day for the ratification thereof in the Senate Chamber shall be fixed by a message between the two Houses. At the time appointed, the Speaker of the House, attended by the Clerk of the House and Sergeant-at-Arms, in the official costume, with the members of the House, shall repair to the Senate Chamber, the Clerk of the House taking with him the House Acts which are to be ratified. The Senate, with its officers, shall duly receive the House and its officers, the Clerk of the Senate having in his possession the Senate Acts which are to be ratified. Whereupon, the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House shall interchangeably sign and present to each other the Acts from their respective Houses by their respective titles; and when they are all signed and ratified, they shall be left with the Clerk of the Senate, and the Speaker, with the House and its officers, shall retire to the Hall of the House. The Clerk of the Senate shall forthwith deliver the said Acts to the Governor for his action, making a note on each Act of the day and hour of its delivery.

RULE 8

CLAIMS

The report of the Comptroller General to the General Assembly on Claims, filed in his office, required by Section 5 of an Act entitled, "An Act to prescribe and regulate the introduction of measures relating to private interests and the conduct of the same in the progress thereof," approved December 26, A. D. 1885, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims of the two Houses who shall examine the same and hear any parties desiring to be heard in reference to any claim therein mentioned, and report back to their respective Houses the results of such examination for the final action of the General Assembly.

RULE 9

MEASURES OF PRIVATE INTEREST

That no measures relating to private interest shall be introduced into the General Assembly, except in strict conformity to the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to prescribe and regulate the introduction in the General Assembly of measures relating to private interest, and the conduct of the same in progress thereof," approved December 26, 1885, and the conduct of such measures in their progress through the General Assembly shall be regulated by the terms and requirements of the said Act. (Note: must be by petition, with draft of measure, and referred to Committee).

RULE 10

VOTING IN JOINT ASSEMBLY

In a Joint Assembly, when a vote is being taken, no member may change his vote after it has been announced and recorded but a member who did not vote when his name was called may do so before the result has been duly announced.

That in all elections held by the Joint Assembly nominations to fill the vacancies shall be called for by the presiding officer, and no member shall second any of the nominations until the presiding officer shall declare that "It appears to the Chair that no further nominations are to be made."

Seconds to nominations will then be in order until the motion to "proceed to a ballot" is made and adopted. No nomination or seconding speeches will be allowed unless by previously arranged Concurrent Resolutions providing for such.

Should there be but one nomination to fill any one vacancy, it shall be permissible to elect and declare the election by *viva voce* vote.

In elections where there are more nominations than there are vacancies, there shall be appointed on behalf of the Senate by the President of the Senate two Senators and the Assistant Clerk of the Senate and by the Speaker of the House of Representatives two Representatives and the Assistant Clerk of the House of Representatives who shall serve as tellers for the pending election. The Clerks of the respective Houses shall call the respective rolls.

DOORS SHALL BE CLOSED

That in all elections in the Joint Assembly the doors of the Hall of the House of Representatives shall be closed and no person other than members, Clerks, and attaches of the two Houses shall be allowed within the Hall of the House of Representatives; *Provided*, That representatives of the press may be admitted; and *Provided*, That the gallery shall be open to visitors. The Sergeant-at-Arms of the two Houses and the door-keepers are charged with enforcement of this rule.

RULE 11

COMMITTEE ON INVITATIONS

There is hereby created a joint committee to be designated as the Committee on Invitations to be composed of six members, three of whom shall be appointed by the President of the Senate from the members of that body and three of whom shall be appointed

by the Speaker of the House of Representatives from the members of that body. Any invitations extended to the General Assembly to attend any functions between the hours of eight o'clock a. m. and five o'clock p. m. shall be referred to this committee in order that it may determine what legislation or other pertinent matters may be pending before the General Assembly and its committees before action is taken on any such invitation.

RULE 12

METHOD USED FOR ENGROSSING, AMENDING, ENROLLING OR RATIFYING BILLS OR JOINT RESOLUTIONS

Any Bill or Joint Resolution may be engrossed, amended, enrolled or ratified by the use of necessary printed or typewritten material, or a combination thereof, which has been duly certified.

AMENDMENTS TO JOINT RULES

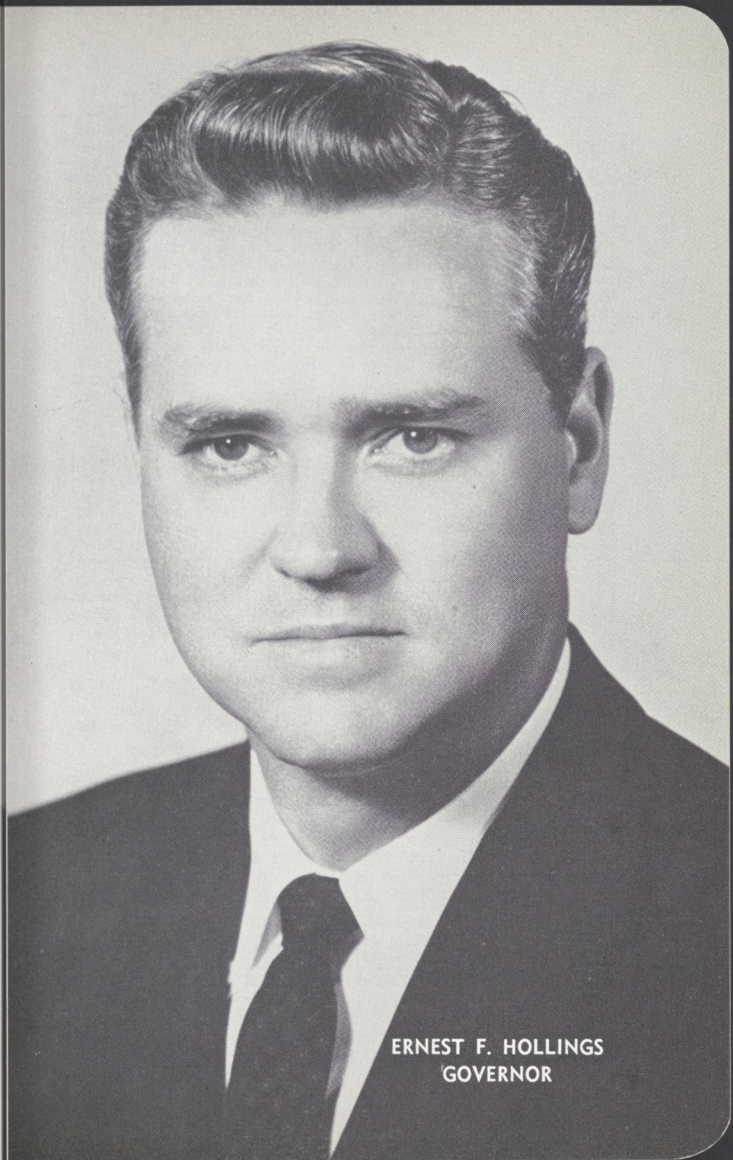

After copies are prepared for the bound volumes of the Acts they are filed for permanent keeping.

Duties of Office—(For detailed duties, see 1952 Code, Sec. 44-25).

The Adjutant General is head of the Military Department of the State. He administers the affairs of the National Guard, and the State Guard when so organized. The Governor, by law, is the Commander-in-Chief. The Adjutant General is a Constitutional officer and has the rank of Major General.

All military records are filed and kept up-to-date. All orders, records and all reports, returns and communications prescribed by Act of Congress, or by direction of the War or Navy Depts., are filed for record.

Records of S. C. soldiers who served in the Spanish-American War, Mexican Border service, and World Wars I and II, are on file. An official Roster of the S. C. Soldiers, Sailors and Marines of World War I has been published in two volumes and distributed to agencies designated by the General Assembly.

The National Guard consists of the Army Guard and the Air Guard. All of the Air Guard units are located at McEntire Air Natl. Guard Base near Columbia, while the Army Guard is situated in 76 cities and towns throughout the State. About three-fourths of the Army Guard are assigned to the 51st Division, and the remainder are non-divisional units. Present strength of the Natl. Guard is 10,500.

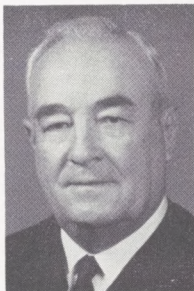

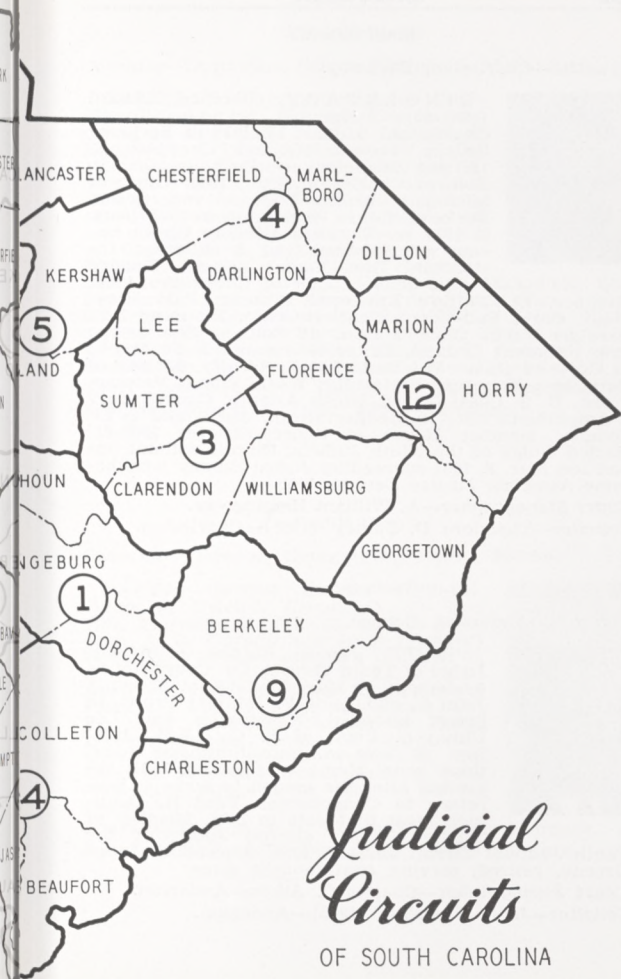

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The Citadel

The Military College of S. C., located at Charleston. Founded in 1842, occupied buildings on Marion Square for 80 years; moved in 1922 to a splendid new site on Ashley River adjacent to Hampton Park.

Four barracks afford dormitory accommodations for 2,000 cadets. Other bldgs. are the Academic Bldgs. (Bond Hall, LeTellier Hall, and Arts bldg.), Summerall Chapel, Memorial Library and Museum, Mark Clark Hall, Alumni Hall (Gym), Armory, Physical Educ. Bldg., Mary Bennett Murray Hospital, president's and officers' quarters, mess hall, central steam plant, laundry, etc.

The replacement value of the college plant is approximately \$12,500,000.00.

The Citadel is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and is on the approved list of the Assn. of American Universities. It gives courses in arts and science, engineering and business administration leading to A.B. and B.S. degrees. The civil engineering course is accredited by the Engineers' Council for Professional Development. The Chemistry Department is accredited by the American Chemical Society.

The cadet corps is organized as a regiment having 4 battalions. ROTC training is in the Army or the Air Force. The Dept. of the Army and the Dept. of the Air Force detail officers and non-commissioned officers as instructors in military and air science and tactics.

CLEMSON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE OF SOUTH CAROLINA
(Located at Clemson)

Clemson College is the outgrowth of the interest of Dr. Thomas G. Clemson in agricultural and mechanical sciences. He was a distinguished scientist, graduate Royal School of Mines in Paris, Charge D'Affaires American Legation in Belgium, Supt. of Agricultural Affairs of U. S. during President Buchanan's administration.

At close of Confederate War, Dr. Clemson took up his residence again in S. C. In his will he devoted bulk of his property to establishment of an agricultural college on his Fort Hill Plantation, which had been the home of his father-in-law, John C. Calhoun.

Clemson College was opened in July, 1893, with departments of agriculture, chemistry and engineering. Later there were added textiles, Arts and science and education. The program of collegiate instruction is currently organized under the schools of Agriculture, Architecture, Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Textiles, and the Graduate School.

The Federal Government maintains departments of Air Science and Military Science and tactics.

When U. S. Government began cooperation with States in establishing certain public activities, these were placed under control of Clemson College.

The services today include the divisions of Agricultural Extension, Agricultural Research, Livestock and

Poultry Health Dept., Crop Pest Commission and Bd. of Fertilizer Control (Inspection and Analysis). They bring the college in close contact with agricultural and industrial enterprises throughout the State.

The college lands consist of approximately 22,763 acres, including 7,668 acres at the Agricultural experiment stations in different parts of the State. Inventory values of equipment, and buildings is \$35,370,000.

SOUTH CAROLINA EXPERIMENT STATION

Director Agricultural Experiment Station—O. B. Garrison, Clemson College.

Main station at Clemson, with branch stations at Florence, Pontiac, Summerville, Charleston, Blackville and Johnsonville. Work supported by both Federal and State governments.

Investigations now under way include spacing, fruiting, mechanization, insect and disease control for field crops, fruits and vegetables; feeding, breeding and management of livestock; chemical studies of foods and feedstuffs; economic studies of production, consumption and marketing; food and health habits of children and adults.

THE COAST EXPERIMENT STATION

H. H. Pierce, Supt., Summerville

Here emphasis is placed upon beef cattle breeding, pastures, forage crops and forestry. Grazing and mineral feeding tests are conducted and various legumes and pasture grasses are studied. An experimental forest area was established here in 1912 and is yielding valuable information on the growth habits of various species of pine. The effects of draining and liming cut-over lands are being investigated.

THE PEE DEE EXPERIMENT STATION

J. B. Pitner, Supt., Florence

This station deals with cotton breeding production, insect and disease control, tobacco investigations and corn breeding. Here were worked out many of the spacing and cultural practices which have resulted in more economical cotton production. The tobacco work at this station has recently been expanded and important results are being secured.

THE SANDHILL EXPERIMENT STATION

W. H. Rhodes, Supt., at Pontiac, near Columbia

Peaches, field crops and forestry are receiving much attention here. Investigations are yielding valuable data on fundamental soils problems. The new Clemson Livestock Laboratory is located at this station.

THE TRUCK EXPERIMENT STATION

W. C. Barnes, Supt., at Charleston

Work here is confined to studies designed to determine best practices for successful truck farming. Varieties, breeding, insects, diseases, fertilizer requirements, cultural practices, harvesting and marketing methods are being investigated.

THE EDISTO EXPERIMENT STATION

W. B. Rogers, Supt., at Blackville

This station was established in 1936 to work primarily with watermelons, cantaloupes, cucumbers and asparagus. Various phases of sweet potato production are also being investigated. The research work done is proving of much value to the growers of these crops and livestock in this area. The program has been recently expanded to include grazing and feeding experiments with beef cattle.

CLEMSON COLLEGE SHEEP EXPERIMENT STATION—
WELLMAN DIVISION

C. H. Mudge, Supt., at Johnsonville

Investigations with sheep are being conducted at Johnsonville, on funds provided by Mr. Arthur C. Wellman, Pres., Wellman Combing Co. The adaptation of the Polwarth breed of fine wool sheep and the breeding of dual purpose breeds for fine wool and meat are being considered.

CROP PEST COMMISSION

J. H. Cochran, Entomologist; W. M. Epps, Plant Pathologist at Clemson

The work of this agency is under the direction of the South Carolina Experiment Station and includes the certification of nursery stock, sweet potato and other plants. It also undertakes to prevent the importation into South Carolina of destructive new insects and diseases. Regular inspections are made in carrying out these duties. The S. C. Bee Disease Law and the S. C. Economic Poison Law, 1954, amended 1961, are also under direction of this agency.

SOUTH CAROLINA CROP IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

R. H. Garrison, Executive Secretary

The S. C. Foundation Seed Assn. is charged with the responsibility of increasing new and superior varieties developed by experiment station and agricultural research plant breeders, in order that farmers might secure registered stock of these varieties at the earliest possible moment.

The S. C. Crop Improvement Assn. is the agency designated to handle all certification for variety, trueness to type, germination performance and weed seed and plants. Farmers who plant registered or certified seed may have their crops inspected and if fields and seed meet requirements they are then able to sell high quality seed. This requires a close inspection of fields and laboratory analysis of the seed.

The seed certification program has increased in size each year both in the number of farmers who have submitted application for certification and the number of acres inspected.

The Seed Short Course held during Farm and Home Week, sponsored by the S. C. Crop Improvement Assn. has been a great help to farmers, seedsmen and agricultural workers.

FERTILIZER INSPECTION AND ANALYSIS

B. D. Cloaninger, Director

The inspection and analysis of fertilizers are under the supervision of the Agricultural Committee of the Board of Trustees. District Inspectors are located in different parts of the State. Their duties are to collect official fertilizer and pesticide samples for analysis and check on the tagging and labeling of all fertilizer material.

The chemical work consists of the analysis of commercial fertilizers and pesticides as provided for by the Laws of this State. This Department also undertakes the analysis of waters, ores, minerals, and other naturally occurring materials, portions of human bodies in cases of suspected poisoning (as provided for by law), and the analysis of home-mixed fertilizers. All the work of this Department is done without charge.

LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

R. W. Carter, D.V.M., Dir. & State Veterinarian

Maintained as a part of Clemson College but located at Sand Hill Experiment Station, 10 miles N.E. of Columbia on U. S. No. 1, Box 1771, Columbia.

The office was established about fifty years ago under authority granted to the Board of Trustees of Clemson Agric. Coll. The work of the Dept. is to assist animal and poultry owners in the prevention and eradi-

cation of contagious, infectious and communicable diseases. All livestock imported into the State must pass inspection and tests before they are received in order to prevent the introduction of contagious and infectious diseases. In the prevention, control and eradication of livestock and poultry diseases, the dept. aids in the promotion of these industries in the State. A laboratory is maintained to assist in the diagnosis of animal and poultry diseases. Also includes an office maintained by the Agric. Research Service for the purpose of assisting in the control and eradication of animal diseases.

EXTENSION SERVICE

Located at Clemson.

Established under terms of Act of Congress, May, 1914, and State Legislature, the Clemson Coll. Extension Service is a branch of the Clemson Agric. Coll., and is a cooperative agric. service supported by the counties, the state, and the federal government. The Ext. Service is responsible for conducting with all people of S. C. the cooperative educational and demonstrational programs in agriculture and home economics of Clemson Coll. and the U. S. Dept. of Agric.

The job of the Ext. Service is to make available to farmers, homemakers, and rural boys and girls, through on-the-farm service, demonstrations, meetings, newspaper articles, publications, letters, radio and television broadcasts, and other methods, the results of research and successful farm and home experience and to assist them through interpretation, practical demonstrations, and otherwise in applying this information to improve their farms, homes, and communities to build a safe, sound and progressive agriculture and rural life.

JOHN DE LA HOWE SCHOOL

Established under 1918 Act, taking over property, in accordance with the will of this deceased Frenchman, Dr. John de la Howe (emigre judge and counselor for Huguenots of S. C., who died on this estate in Jan., 1797), as an agr. & mech. school for training free of charge normal dependent boys and girls of the State.

It is the policy of the Institution to give the children the best physical care possible, as well as to give them the best mental training which they are capable of receiving; and then place them in self-supporting jobs. Most of the boys and girls who go out from de la Howe make good citizens, and are successful as wage earners.

The John de la Howe school has an enrollment of 250, is located nine miles from McCormick and has a modern and well-equipped plant. There are 1447 acres of land on the estate, 1,000 of which are in virgin forest. The Institution has a modern and well-equipped physical plant.

MEDICAL COLLEGE OF SOUTH CAROLINA

At Charleston, Corner Lucas and Calhoun Sts.

The Medical College of S. C. was established by Act of Legislature upon the petition of the Medical Society of S. C., Dec., 1823. The coll. was opened in the Fall of 1824.

In 1827, the City of Charleston donated \$15,000 for a building, in return for which medical attendance was to be furnished the charitable institutions of the city for 25 years. In 1825 the State Legislature made an appropriation of \$10,000 and in 1830 one of \$7,000 for the maintenance of the college.

In 1831, a disagreement arose between the faculty and the Medical Society which led to the resignation of the faculty who organized a new college "The Medical Coll. of the State of S. C.," which was incorporated in 1832. The two colleges existed until 1838, when those conducting the second school of S. C. ceased to operate and the old organization took over the original bldgs.

The college was suspended for four years during the War Between the States, but reopened in 1865.

In 1913 it became a State College operated and controlled by the State. \$76,000 was raised, chiefly by popular subscription of the citizens of Charleston for the erection of a building in 1913 upon a site donated by the City Council of Charleston.

In 1881 a Dept. of Pharmacy was created by Act of Legislature; operated for 2 yrs. and temporarily discontinued until 1894, then reopened under the old charter.

The School of Nursing was created in 1919.

In Jan. 1920, the General Assembly appropriated a fund of \$55,000 for the erection of a building for physiology and pharmacology.

In Sept. 1930, a two-story bldg. was erected, the lower floor to be used for the library and the upper floor for the dept. of pathology.

In 1938 the General Assembly authorized a bond issue of \$150,000 which was augmented by a grant of \$115,095 from the Federal Govt. and by a fund of approximately \$22,000 from the Alumni Assocn., making possible new bldgs. to provide for additional space for clinics and laboratories.

In 1939 Bernard M. Baruch gave \$125,000 in memory of his father, Dr. Simon Baruch, which along with an additional sum of \$21,000 from the Medical College Alumni, was used for constructing the auditorium, the wing between it and the library, and for extensive remodeling and equipping of old buildings.

In 1947 the General Assembly made an appropriation of \$3,100,000 to the Medical College for the construction of hospital and clinical facilities. To this were added a Federal grant of \$5,760,000 and an additional appropriation by the 1953 General Assembly of \$1,183,000, making the total available for hospital construction approx. \$10,043,000. This Medical College Hospital went into operation Sept. 26, 1955.

The General Assembly of 1949 made an appropriation of \$50,000 for the purchase of land adjoining the hospital site, to which was added an additional appropriation of \$50,000 in 1950.

The General Assembly of 1950 also appropriated \$351,000 for the construction of an addition to the Medical College Bldg. proper. To this was added a \$100,000 grant from the National Cancer Institute to include a cancer research unit. The four-story bldg. concerned was completed Jan. 21, 1953.

The General Assembly of 1953 passed an Act authorizing the establishment of a four-year school of Dentistry as a part of the Medical College. Establishment of the school will depend upon provision of funds for construction and maintenance.

In 1951 the Alumni Assn. of the Medical Coll. through generous cooperation by the Charleston City government and the A. C. L. Railroad secured and transferred to the Medical Coll. a large plot of ground between the Medical College and the Ashley River to serve as a site for dormitories, for the financing of which the General Assembly of 1950 passed an authorizing act involving a revenue bond issue of \$1,000,000.00. This bond issue was purchased by the Federal Housing Agency, and the dormitory bldg. financed by this means went into operation Jan. 1, 1955.

On Sept. 1, 1955 the new School of Nursing building was opened and immediately occupied completely. The cost of this building, equipped, totalling \$976,770.00, was secured from the State Institutional Tuition Revenue Bond Issue Act of the General Assembly.

Construction of the Medical Science Research Bldg. and the addition to the Out-Patient Clinic, adjacent to the Laboratory Clinic Bldg., in progress during the current year is financed by Tuition Revenue Bond Issue and grants from the Health Research Facilities Branch of the Natl. Institutes of Health and Hill-Burton funds at a total cost \$1,156,327. Cost of property on which this bldg. is located was \$38,794.

Construction is in progress for an addition to the Psychiatric Floor of the Medical Coll. Hospital, financing by Tuition Revenue Bond Issue and Hill-Burton funds is approved at \$517,424.54.

The College is a member of The Assn. of Amer. Medical Colleges. It is on the approved list of The Council on Education of the American Medical Assn.

SOUTH CAROLINA OPPORTUNITY SCHOOL

Located in West Columbia near the Columbia municipal airport

Established in 1921 as month-long summertime experiment in adult education, the Opportunity School

was held one month each year on the campuses of various colleges in the state. After 25 years in this status, the school acquired the former Columbia Army Air Base hospital area and opened there January 2, 1947, as a nine-month, residence-type educational facility with the traditional summer session retained.

A legislative act of 1957 placed the school under a board of trustees, thus giving it independent status. Dr. Wil Lou Gray, founder of the school and its director for 36 years, retired in 1957.

Purpose of the school is to make elementary and high school education available to adults who did not complete these studies during youth. It also provides refresher courses and evening classes, and serves as an adult conference and training center.

More than 10,000 adults have enrolled in the Opportunity School since 1921, over half of these since the school acquired a permanent location. The original school site, made available by the War Assets Administration, included 998.03 acres and 218 buildings. Part of this development has since been made available to other educational facilities.

Facilities include classrooms, dormitories, library, infirmary, student lounge, home economics laboratory, woodworking shop, ceramics laboratory and art studio, dining area and recreation lake.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

Comprising 115.4 acres including athletic facilities in Columbia, the U. S. C. was chartered in 1801 as S. C. College, opened 1805, used as hospital for Confederate Army, 1862-1865. Reopened as Univ. of S. C. in 1866, closed 1877.

Charter amended by Legislature, dividing it into two branches, S. C. College at Columbia, and Claflin College at Orangeburg; reopened 1880 as S. C. Coll. of Agr. & Mech. (the last four words being omitted in 1882); School of Law established 1867; in 1887, name changed to U. S. C.; in 1890 changed to S. C. Coll.; in 1894 teachers' course added and women admitted; 1905 Centennial Celebration reorganized as U. S. C. 1906; School of Education and Graduate School, established 1906; School of Engineering 1910; School of Commerce 1919 (included in School of Business Admin. since 1946); School of Journalism 1923; School of Pharmacy 1924; School of Nursing, 1957.

University is member of the Southern Assn. of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the Assn. of Amer. Universities and the Natl. Assn. of State Universities; the School of Law is a member of Amer. Assn. of Law Schools and is classed "A" by Council of Legal Education of Amer. Bar Assn., and the several professional schools are members of the several professional assns.

RESEARCH

The discovery of knowledge through research is a tradition at the Univ., and is one of its principal objectives along with teaching and service to the state.

The Univ. is performing contract research for a number of governmental and private agencies. These investigations include an ecological survey at the Savannah River Project, vacuum tubes, millimeter waves, and chemistry projects—enzymes, diazonium salts, peroxides, ion exchange, electrolytes, reactions of organic compounds, medicinal plants, etc. The Bureau of Business and Economic Research is also conducting research on seven industrial development projects under the sponsorship of the State Organization for Associated Research.

Among the research contracts awarded to Univ. faculty are a number of grants for "pure" research, in which the investigator has freedom of discretion in the pursuit of knowledge. Outstanding training and highest ability qualify researchers for such grants.

SOUTH CAROLINA ARCHIVES DEPARTMENT

The Archives Department (formerly the Historical Commission) has the following duties: (1) to care for non-current state and county records, (2) to procure transcripts of records relating to South Carolina in other depositories, (3) to stimulate research in the fields of South Carolina history, genealogy, and archeology, (4) to publish official records, (5) to approve inscriptions for historical markers on state highways, and (6) to disseminate information regarding the making, care, and administration of public records.

The older publications of the department include: legislative journals of the early colonial period, records from the British Public Record Office, colonial land records, and the records of Revolutionary and Confederate Soldiers. ATOMIC ENERGY COMMITTEE

THE STATE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON ADULT EDUCATION

The State Advisory Committee on general Adult Education is an outgrowth of the Illiteracy Com., appointed in 1918 by Gov. Richard I. Manning at the request of the State Federation of Women's Clubs. The members of this group have worked without traveling expenses or any remuneration whatsoever.

The duty of the committee is to cooperate with the division of Adult Education to help meet the needs and interests of adults in this critical period. The program emphasizes remedial education for those who are in need of the foundation subjects, but also includes citizenship training, parent and liberal education.

“UC” means Unemployment Compensation.

Duties of the Comm.—Administration of the SCUC law which provides for the collection of contributions from subject employers and the payment of unemployment benefits to their workers when out of jobs through no fault of their own, the payment of UC benefits to Federal civilian employees and to ex-servicemen under the provisions of Title XV of the Social Security Act, and for the operation of a statewide Employment Service.

Administrative Expenses—Administrative costs of the dept. are paid from grants from the U. S. Dept. of Labor, Bureau of Employment Security to the State of S. C., upon budgets submitted by the Comm.

Coverage—Generally, all employers in the State engaged in business or industry who have four or more workers within as many as 20 different weeks of the calendar year are covered by the Law, and their workers may become eligible for benefits when unemployed.

Contributions—Employers subject to the Act pay contributions at rates ranging from .25% to 4.1%, depending on how well they have stabilized their employment.

Job Insurance—Unemployment ins. benefits are paid to the individual who has been paid wages in covered employment within a base period, qualifies as an insured worker as defined in Sec. 68-102 of the U. C. Law, and meets the other eligibility requirements. An insured worker's weekly benefit amount is computed as 50% of his average weekly wage in the quarter of his base period in which his wages are highest, not to exceed 50% of the average weekly wage of all workers in covered employment as determined by the Comm. on June 30 of each year.

UC Fund—Contributions collected by the Commission are placed with the State Treasurer. He, in turn, deposits the collections with the Secy. of the Treasury of the U. S. to the credit of the Unemployment Trust Fund. These funds draw interest while thus deposited.

UC for Federal Employees—Unemployment insurance protection was extended to Federal civilian employees by the addition of Title XV to the Social Security Act of 1935. The jobless Federal worker will file his claim at a local State Employment Service office and his benefits will be paid to him by the State Employment Security Agency in the same manner and under the same conditions that benefits are paid workers covered by the State UC Law.

UC for Ex-Servicemen—Title XV of the Social Security Act was amended in 1958 to extend unemployment insurance protection to ex-servicemen who entered the military service after Jan. 31, 1955, or were discharged after Oct. 27, 1958. Military service and wages of eligible ex-servicemen are to be treated as though they had been included under the State UC Law. The jobless ex-serviceman will file his claim at the State Employment Service Office and benefits will be paid to him by the Employment Security Comm. under the same terms and conditions that benefits are paid to workers covered by the State UC Law. The cost of benefit payments for UC for Federal employees and ex-servicemen is paid by the Federal Government.

The S. C. State Employment Service operates as a division of the Employment Security Commission. Twenty-nine local offices and one branch office located throughout the State serve as a free labor exchange where workers and jobs are brought together. The placement of job seekers, employment counseling, special services to veterans, industrial services, gathering and disseminating labor market information, community participation and taking claims for unemployment insurance are the main functions of these public employment services. Workers of all skills, professions, and types, including youths, older workers and the handicapped are placed in suitable jobs by the local State Employment Service Offices. No fee is charged workers or employers for services provided. The State Employment Service is affiliated with the United States Employment Service.

FORESTRY COMMISSION, S. C. STATE

Established 1927—includes 5 non-salaried members.

Forest fire control provided on over 11,790,000 acres of forest land. Maintains 138 lookout towers and over 210 miles of telephone line for fire detection and reporting; 559 mobile and fixed two-way radio stations are in operation. Operates fleet of 198 trucks and 86 tractors in fire suppression work on State and privately owned forest lands.

Operates four forest tree seedling nurseries with a combined annual capacity of 150 million seedlings.

Operates and maintains four State Forests, comprising approximately 123,494 acres of land. One of these is owned by the Federal Government, but is operated by the Commission under a 95-year lease. The State Forests are operated for the production of timber, game management and recreation, and serve as research and demonstration areas in application of sound forestry practices.

Renders advice and direct assistance to landowners in the proper management and utilization of forest

lands. Marks and tallies forest trees for cutting at a nominal cost to landowners. Conducts forest management demonstrations.

Responsible for the acquisition, development, operation and maintenance of the State Park System composed of 26 State Parks totalling 48,736 acres including 5 areas for Negroes. Every year, approx. 3 million people use the recreational and educational facilities offered by the State Parks.

Information and education work includes publications, signs, posters, educational motion pictures, exhibits, school forests, fire prevention campaigns, conservation week, radio, press, club work and summer forestry camps for advancement of both forestry and parks in cooperation with the public as well as Federal and State agencies, forest industries and assocns.

Duties of Commission—Enforcement of the South Carolina Workmen's Compensation Law, effective Sept. 1, 1935.

Scope of Act—Applies to all employers of 15 or more employees, with the exception of casual employees, farm laborers, domestic servants, Federal employees, saw mills, planing mills and/or manufacturers of shipping containers, logging operations and work incident thereto, those engaged in the production of turpentine, steam laundries, rock quarries, sand mines and oil mills, State and Co. Fair Assocs., unless such employees and employers voluntarily elect to be bound by this Act. The Act is mandatory upon the State, Municipal corporations within the State, political subdivisions of the State, and employees of the State or of any such corporation or subdivision.

Insurance Provisions—Every employer within the provisions of the Act either insures and keeps insured his liability thereunder in any authorized corporation, Assn., organization or any mutual Ins. Assn. formed by a group of employers so authorized, or shall furnish to the Industrial Commission satisfactory proof of his financial ability to pay direct the compensation provided in the Act.

Jurisdiction of Act—Applies to all employees as above classified receiving injuries by accident arising out of and in the course of their employment.

Medical Features—An injured employee is entitled to all necessary medical, surgical and hospital attention, original artificial members, and medical supplies for a period of 10 weeks immediately following the injury or for such additional time if necessary.

Compensation—Total disability at 60% average weekly wage for 500 weeks and not to exceed \$10,000.00. Temporary total disability, on same basis, terminated when employee returns to work at a wage equal to or greater than his average weekly wage before injury or when he is fully recovered. Partial disability, 60% of difference between average weekly wage earned at time of injury and the average weekly wage earned as a result of the injury for a period not to exceed 300 weeks from date of injury. Temporary partial disability, on the same basis, terminated when employee either earns his former wage or is fully recovered.

Loss of Members—Compensation exclusive of healing period ranging from 10 weeks for loss of one of the toes other than a great toe to 200 weeks for loss of an arm in accordance with Section 31 of the Act.

THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL OF THE STATE OF
SOUTH CAROLINA

The Judicial Council was created by Act No. 41, 1957, to make a continuous study and survey of the administration of justice, and the organization, procedure, practice, rules and methods of administration of all of the courts of the State, and of all of the agencies, boards, commissions, bodies and officers of the State having quasi-judicial functions and powers. Further, to investigate criticisms and suggestions pertaining to the administration of justice; to publish information concerning the work of the courts; and to recommend such changes in the methods of conducting business of the courts as might be desirable.

Duties of Commissioner—Enforcement of all S. C. laws pertaining to labor.

The Commissioner of Labor, his assistants and factory inspectors shall visit and inspect at reasonable hours, as often as practicable the factories, mercantile establishments, mills, workshops, public eating places and commercial institutions in the State. He shall collect, assort, systematize and present in his annual report to the Governor and General Assembly such statistical details heretofore collected by the Commission-

er of Agriculture, Commerce and Industry, pursuant to 1952 Code, Sec. 40-31 as are within the purposes of this Act together with such other matters as he may deem advisable or for the public welfare.

Commissioner of Labor and his agents investigate industrial disputes, strikes and lockouts—appoint committee act if efforts fail—The duties of the Commissioner or his agent and/or agents shall be to investigate industrial disputes, or strikes or lockouts arising between employers and employees, or capital and labor; to ascertain as near as may be, the cause or causes of such industrial disputes or strikes or lockouts; to make a finding of fact in respect thereto; to endeavor, as far as possible, to induce both sides to such industrial dispute or strike or lockout to arrive at an agreement; and to remove misunderstandings of differences. When the said Commissioner or his agent, and/or agents shall fail to induce both sides to such an industrial dispute or strike or lockout to arrive at an agreement, then the said Commissioner shall have the power and is hereby empowered to appoint a committee of three as follows: One from capital, one from labor and one at large. He shall be *ex officio* chairman of said committee. The duties of said committee shall be the same as that prescribed for the Commissioner of Labor hereinabove in this section.

LIBRARY ASSOCIATION, STATE

Created by Legislative Act in 1929, charged with duty of creating public libraries over the State and, acting through its Bd. of Dirs., to be known as the State Library Board, of devising and carrying into effect methods by which public library service may be extended and improved in the State.

In Nov. 1942, the Board was reorganized and in March, 1943 an office was organized with a \$1,000 grant from the Budget Commission and a \$2,000 appropriation. The appropriation for 1961-62 is \$113,241.00. The major part of the appropriation goes to county and regional libraries as State Aid which is now \$1,500 per qualifying county. In addition to State Aid, the appropriation is used to promote the establishment of county libraries in the counties without them, for establishment grants to groups of two or more cos. which will unite for regional library service, for books for loans to individuals and communities without library service, and for informational and advisory services to existing libraries. Through these services, the State Library Board hopes to reach the goal of a network of libraries over the State making adequate library service easily accessible to every citizen in S. C. Under the Library Services Act the State Library Bd. has qualified for \$177,517.00 to be used in demonstrations of public library service in rural areas during 1961-62.

Created by Act 887, 1934 (1952 Code, Sec. 59-1) to construct and operate Santee-Cooper hydro-electric, navigation, flood control, health betterment system and for other purposes. The Santee-Cooper reservoirs and lock are vital parts of the waterway from Columbia and Camden to Charleston. Installed capacity of generating machinery is sufficient to produce above 1,500,000,000 kw. hours of firm and secondary power annually.

The total cost is approximately \$95,000,000 which was financed entirely by loan and grant from the United States and private sources without the State having any money invested. Total bonded indebtedness will be paid from revenues entirely without any tax being levied for that purpose. In addition to the large Hydro-Electric generating plant near Moncks Corner the Authority operates a small Hydro-Plant at spillway at Wilson's Landing, an 88,000 KW Capacity Steam plant near Large Hydro Plant and the electrical distribution

facilities in Conway, Myrtle Beach and Loris, certain rural lines in Horry Co., Pawley's Island and Georgetown Co., and the distribution facilities in the towns of Pinopolis, Moncks Corner and St. Stephen in Berkeley County. The Authority also serves 85,000 farms in 37 Counties of the State and the city of Bamberg through the Central Electric Power Cooperative System which the Authority operates and maintains. Power lines serve large industrial customers in Charleston, Georgetown, Myrtle Beach, Harleyville, Johnsonville and Berkeley Co.

Prepares information for use by the Commission in connection with its regulation of privately-owned electric utility companies operating in South Carolina, promotes the adoption of more satisfactory rate schedules by these companies, investigates service complaints and works closely with the several power companies with the general aim of providing the best possible electric service to the greatest number of customers at the most reasonable rates consistent with sound economic principles. Since the activation of the Electrical Utilities Div., the average annual residential use of electric energy in S. C. has increased from 632 Kwhrs. to 5,178 Kwhrs. and the average price paid has been reduced from more than six cents to 2.05 cents per Kwhr. The total sale of electric energy to ultimate consumers has increased from 775 million Kwhrs. in 1932 to 8,681 million Kwhrs. in 1960 with residential sales increasing from 45,641,383 Kwhrs. in 1932 to 2,063,220,371 Kwhrs. in 1960.

One of the major activities has been the promotion of rural electrification, including surveys and investigations of potential electric distribution lines to the farms of the State and requests to the privately owned and publicly owned power utilities to construct and operate rural electric distribution lines. Under this stimulus these agencies have built more than 48,500

miles of rural lines, to which are connected more than 296,000 customers, compared with a total of 394 miles and less than 2,000 customers prior to the organization of this Division.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

Created by Act 319, 1937 (1952 Code, Sec. 71-1), to enable the State to join with the U. S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare in extending financial assistance to the needy aged, the needy blind the permanently and totally disabled and dependent children, and to cooperate with the Federal Government in various other activities of mutual concern. The Dept. also provides general assistance to unfortunate persons in need who are not eligible for other forms of assistance provided in the Act. The Department is responsible for establishing standards and licensing agencies, institutions, or family homes (other than agencies operating under an established religious denomination, the Children's Bureau, or any children's home or institution to which State funds are appropriated) engaged in the business of receiving children for care and maintenance. The Agency performs miscellaneous welfare services including investigation of dependency claims of selective service men, civil defense, etc.

Effective July 1, 1957, the Confederate Home was closed, the General Assembly placing responsibility on the State Dept. of Public Welfare for the care of persons who were residents thereof. These persons are now being cared for in licensed nursing homes.

Under Act 238, 1959, a Medical & Hospital Care Program for public assistance recipients was inaugurated; in 1961 this was extended for those 65 yrs. or older who are not recipients of assistance but whose income & resources are insufficient to meet costs of necessary medical care.

The Dept. operates under the S. C. Bd. of Public Welfare, composed of one member from each congressional dist. and a Chm. from the State at large. County Boards of Public Welfare are appointed by the State Board or the State Director, upon the recommendation of a majority of the county legislative delegation, including the Senator.

The State Dept. is administered by a State Director, appointed by the State Board, and county directors are selected by the respective county boards. All employees except the State Director and his confidential Secretary are selected under a merit system required by the Social Security Act of Congress.

WOODROW WILSON MEMORIAL MUSEUM

Created by Act in 1929 (1952 Code, Secs. 44-801 to 44-804). The property (consisting of the Wilson home and grounds) was purchased by the State of S. C. in that year from the Columbia Township Auditorium Commission for \$29,000. In custody of the Archives Department of S. C. Managed by American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary of S. C., with a small annual appropriation for maintenance.

The house was built by the Rev. and Mrs. Joseph R. Wilson, parents of Woodrow Wilson, about 1871, and they resided therein for four or five years. (This is the only home that his parents ever owned). Restorations and improvements have been made throughout and the place is regarded as one of the show places of America and is becoming a popular shrine for Americans.

In the house is the bed in which Woodrow Wilson was born in Staunton, Va. and the bed was purchased from a member of the Wilson family at a price of \$1,000.

On the grounds are 3 magnolia trees and one sweet olive tree planted by his mother (one tree was destroyed by sleet a few years ago). In the past an offer of \$1,000 was received for the olive tree.

The second floor of the building is now used as State Headquarters of the American Legion.

Present Catawba Indian restricted lands consist of 4,018.8 acres of land, located on or near the Catawba River, York Co., 9 miles east of Rock Hill. Of the Catawba land, 630 acres are held in trust by the State of S. C., and 3,388.8 acres are held in trust by the U. S. Government.

Under the provisions of a Memorandum of Understanding dated Dec. 14, 1943 between the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Catawba Tribe and the State of S. C., the Federal Government assumed the trusteeship of the 3,388.8 acres bought for the Catawbas by the State of S. C., and provided for the supervision and management of this land. Under the terms of the Memorandum the State of S. C. assumed the responsibility of furnishing the educational facilities for the Indian children. The tribe subsequently requested the Bureau and Congress to divide the Federal trust property among the membership. Public Law 86-322 was enacted to make this possible. By the terms of this legislation which became effective July 2, 1960, the property held in Federal trust for the Catawba Indians will be given to them free of any Federal trust restrictions.

Incomplete records in Oct. 1958 showed 62 families living on restricted land, 21 families living on the "old reservation" under the State, 26 families living in Rock Hill, and 53 families live elsewhere or a total of 162 families with an enrollment of 614 Indians. More than 95% of the men and many of the women are now working in the industrial mills in Rock Hill. *Bureau of Indian Affairs local Rep.*—Arthur N. Arntson. *Commr. Indian Affairs*—Phileo Nash.

This includes delinquents, incorrigibles, misdemeanants, and felons. Boys are received only through commitments by the courts. Vocational Trade training is offered in Barbering, Auto Mechanics, Carpentry and Woodwork, Laundry and Dry Cleaning, Dairying and Photography. Work experience is gained through assignments in farming (grains, vegetables, poultry, hogs and beef cattle), care and beautification of grounds, cooking and maintenance of bldgs. and grounds. In 1959-60, total boys cared for—555; enrollment on Nov. 2, 1960 was 285 boys.

The S. C. Mental Health Commission, the Board of Regents of the State Hospital, was re-named and its powers enlarged by Act 836 of 1952. It is a constitutional department created by Article XII of the Constitution. The Commission is the governing body of the state mental health facilities—the State Hospital, Pineland, Training School & Hospital for Negroes, and six mental health clinics. It also is charged with the regulation, licensing and inspection of all hospitals and institutions in this state maintained for the care and treatment of the mentally ill, mentally defective, epileptic, drug addicted and alcoholic.

The Commission functions through the following: an Administrative Division, a Mental Hygiene Division, a Biometrics Branch, a Fiscal Branch, a Community Service and Education Branch.

It is the State Mental Health Authority for S. C., cooperating with the federal government in this area.

Pineland, a State Training School and Hospital for the mentally retarded of the Negro race, was established by Act 836, 1952, with the name of Pineland officially designated by Act 680, Section 5(b), 1954.

Pending construction of this new training school, it was activated July 16, 1953 by using one building at the State Park Unit of the State Hospital. To this building was transferred 75 mentally retarded children who had been admitted to the State Hospital and on Nov. 11, 1953 the first trainee was admitted.

The new buildings for the institution were completed during the fiscal year 1955-56 and Pineland is now a new institution consisting of 6 dormitories with a capacity of 360 beds and a school building. The new buildings were occupied Feb. 14, 1956. The population as of June 30, 1961 was 354.

Pineland is located on State Highway 555 about a mile north of the State Park Unit of the S. C. State Hospital.

COUNTIES IN S. C., FORMATION OF

(The following information was compiled by A. S. Salley, Jr., Secretary of the State Historical Commission.)

By an Act ratified in 1769 the province of South Carolina was divided into seven judicial districts: Charlestown, Georgetown, Beaufort, Orangeburgh, Ninety-Six, Camden and Cheraws. The first six of these were given the names of the principal towns within their borders and those towns were made the seats of their respective districts. Cheraws District derived its name from the fact that the Cheraw Indians had formerly occupied a considerable portion of the land within its borders and after they had gone elsewhere and white settlers moved in, the section was, at first called "the Cheraws' lands" soon simplified into "The Cheraws."

In 1795 Pinckney and Washington Districts were established. Pinckney embraced the present counties of Union and York and a part of Cherokee. Washington embraced the present counties of Greenville, Pickens, Oconee and Anderson.

In 1798 the nine districts then existing were divided up into twenty-four. From Ninety Six District, Abbeville, Edgefield, Newberry, Laurens and Spartanburg Districts were formed; from Washington District, Pendleton and Greenville Districts were formed; from Pinckney District, Union and York Districts were formed; from Camden District, Chester, Lancaster, Fairfield, Kershaw and Sumter Districts were formed; from Cheraws District, Chesterfield, Darlington and Marlborough Districts were formed; Ninety Six, Washington, Pinckney, Camden and Cheraw were discarded as district names; Georgetown District was divided into Georgetown and Marion Districts; Charlestown into Charleston and Colleton; and Orangeburgh into Orangeburgh and Barnwell.

In 1799 Richland District was formed from Kershaw.

In 1802 Horry and Williamsburg Districts were formed from parts of Georgetown.

In 1804 Lexington was formed from Orangeburgh.

In 1826 Pendleton District was divided into Pickens and Anderson Districts and the name Pendleton discarded as a district name.

In 1855 Clarendon District was formed from a part of Sumter.

The Constitution of 1868 changed the entitlement of the thirty subdivisions from district to county and established a new county from a part of Pickens and named it Oconee.

In 1871 Aiken County was established from parts of Orangeburg, Barnwell, Edgefield and Lexington Counties.

In 1878 Hampton County was established from a part of Beaufort.

In 1882 Berkeley County was established from a part of Charleston County.

In 1888 Florence County was created from parts of Marion, Darlington, Williamsburg and Clarendon Counties.

The Constitutional Convention of 1895 established Saluda County from Edgefield.

In 1897 Bamberg from Barnwell; Cherokee from Spartanburg, Union and York; Dorchester from Berkeley and Colleton; Greenwood from Abbeville and Edgefield.

In 1902 Lee from Darlington, Kershaw and Sumter; 1908 Calhoun from Orangeburg and Lexington; 1910 Dillon from Marion; 1912 Jasper from Beaufort and Hampton; 1916 McCormick from Edgefield, Abbeville and Greenwood; and in 1919 Allendale from Barnwell and Hampton.

There are 46 counties in South Carolina, with areas varying from 377 square miles in Calhoun to 1,214 in Berkeley. (See page 10 for Constitutional limitations as to area, population, etc., in the formation of new counties).

Cape Romain National Wildlife Refuge

McClellanville

Cape Romain National Wildlife Refuge consists of 34,716 acres of brackish, salt, and fresh marshes, as well as barrier beaches and a timbered coastal island. The refuge is 40 miles north of the City of Charleston, and 20 miles south of the City of Georgetown.

How to Reach—Bus from Charleston or from Georgetown. By auto 40 mi. north of Charleston on U. S. Hwy. 17; 20 mi. South of Georgetown on U. S. Hwy. 17.

Accommodations—Tourist homes at McClellanville, and Government-owned accommodations on Bull's Island Unit.

Interesting Features—Impounded waterfowl marsh areas. Concentration area for all shallow water ducks and diving ducks which frequent this section of the coast. Clapper rails, gallinules, and coots abundant. Most species of shore-birds present the year 'round, but the refuge is a point of high concentration for shore-birds during spring and fall migrations.

Carolina Sandhills National Wildlife Refuge

(4 miles northeast of McBee, on U. S. Highway No. 1)

Description and Purpose—The Carolina Sandhills National Wildlife Refuge is an upland area of 44,927 acres being administered as a demonstration and experimental area for the management of native wildlife, particularly bobwhite quail, wild turkey, white-tailed deer, waterfowl and mourning dove. Other wildlife species present include: squirrel, rabbit, beaver, raccoon, and opossum. Approximately 900 acres within the refuge have been developed for waterfowl usage and have attracted Canada geese, mallards, black ducks, pintails and blue-winged teal.

The Santee National Wildlife Refuge

The Santee National Wildlife Refuge was established under a cooperative agreement with the S. C. Public Authority and comprises approximately 70,658 acres within the Santee and Pinopolis Reservoirs of the Santee-Cooper project. Under the terms of the agreement, the refuge is administered by the Fish and Wildlife Service for the protection of waterfowl and other wildlife. Approximately 3,000 acres within the refuge area have been placed under secondary dikes

which will tend to stabilize the water levels in part of the reservoir in the interests of waterfowl and fish.

Savannah National Wildlife Refuge

This wildlife refuge was established primarily as a sanctuary for wood Ducks and a wintering ground for other waterfowl. The refuge consists essentially of abandoned rice fields. Developmental work on the areas has been that of restoring old rice field banks. About 2,000 acres of land have been surrounded with new banks so that the water levels can be controlled.

Largemouth bass, bluegill, redear sunfish, and catfish are propagated for distribution at this station.

Orangeburg National Fish Hatchery

The Orangeburg Natl. Fish Hatchery is located about $\frac{1}{2}$ mi. S. of Orangeburg. The reservation covers 56 acres of which approximately 13 acres are in rearing ponds. One large reservoir of about 7 acres supplies the 16 rearing ponds and holding house with water.

At the Orangeburg station the following species are propagated: Largemouth bass, bluegill, redear sunfish and catfish. The distribution area embraces western half of S. C. In addition to the Orangeburg hatchery, a sub-station known as the Orangeburg Co. hatchery comprising 14 ponds, is operated for the production of sunfish.

Walhalla National Fish Hatchery

The Walhalla Natl. Fish Hatchery is located at the confluence of the East Fork of the Chattooga River and the Indian Camp Creek in Oconee County, 21 miles north of Walhalla, S. C. The Walhalla Trout Hatchery was started in 1935 and completed in 1938.

The Walhalla Hatchery propagates and distributes rainbow, brook (speckled) and brown (Lock Leven) trout for the vast mountain areas of South Carolina, Georgia and portions of N. C. The mountains of these three states contain a great number of trout streams.

Trout hatching rearing and distribution is a year-round activity and visitors are welcome at all times. In connection with the hatchery, a picnic area with ample room, plenty of tables, fireplaces, drinking fountains of spring water, rest rooms, shelter house and parking space, is open to the public.

The hatchery is comprised of a hatching building with 12 rearing tanks, food preparation and cold storage bldg., and office bldg. Four long double raceways are used to rear a large number of large size fingerling and yearling size trout for distribution. The personnel of the Walhalla Hatchery consists of 5 employees and an attendant is on hand at all times.

SELECTIVE SERVICE SYSTEM

The Selective Service System is authorized by the Universal Military Training and Service Act of 1948, as amended, originally enacted by Public Law 759, 80th Congress. The 86th Congress extended the Universal Military Training and Service Act, as amended, until July 1, 1963.

This System exists to insure that in our free society the obligation and privilege of serving in the armed forces of this country are shared by each of us according to the laws passed by the Congress (representing the will of the people).

The Governor of S. C. has charge of the administration of this Law in this State and is authorized to nominate for appointment by the Pres. a State Director for Selective Service who shall have administrative control of an office through which Selective Service duties are performed within the State.

The function in the State is: (a) to register all persons required by the law to register; (b) to classify the registrants; (c) to make available opportunities for classified registrants to be reclassified or make appeals to the State Appeal Board from classifications which the registrant may believe to be erroneous; (d) to make available and call for induction into the armed forces qualified registrants to fill quotas set for the State by the National Headquarters for Selective Service; (e) to main, edit and integrate the records of the 1940-47 Selective Service and the record of the Current Selective Service. All necessary expenses for the operation of the State Selective Service System, supplies, equipment and office assistants of the various subsidiary units are paid for by the Federal Govt.

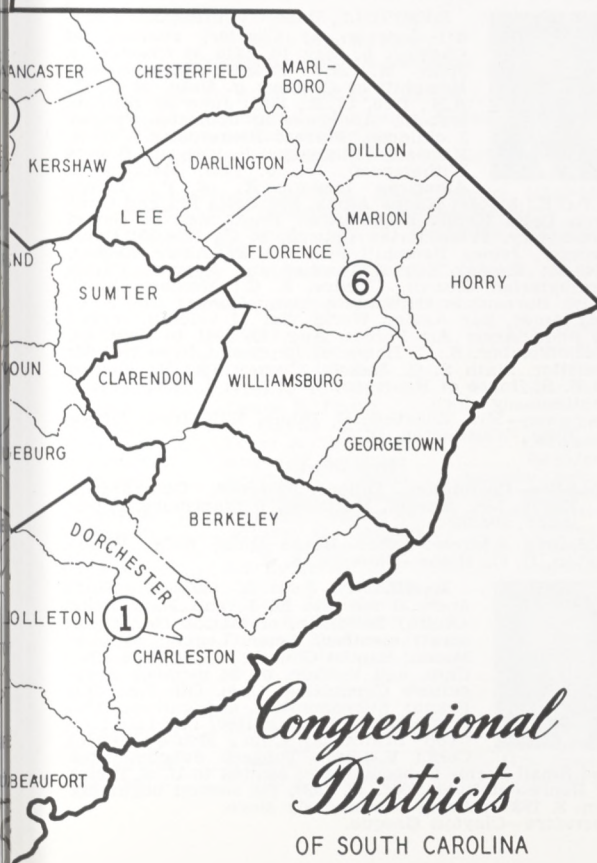

"WOMEN'S MONUMENT"

(The Historical data was written by the late J. Wilson Gibbs, Clerk, House of Representatives, and published in the 1929 Manual).—Ed.

Located on northeast corner of State House Grounds.
"To the Memory of the Women of the Confederacy,
1861-65. Reared by the Men of their State, 1909-11."

Historical

Erected by Women's Monument Commission. Wilson & Sompayrac, of Columbia, architects; Frederick W. Ruckstull, of New York, sculptor.

The base is of one solid 28,000-lb. block of Winnsboro granite, pronounced by Ruckstull as "one of the finest in the world," "on the finest site for a monument in South Carolina." The sculptor's effort was to honor the great middle class at the end of the war, with the central figure that of a woman of about 40 years. The monument is partly realistic and partly symbolic.

In 1909 the Legislature passed Major (now Governor) John G. Richard's Bill appropriating \$7,500, on condition that an equal sum be raised by voluntary contributions from the males. Five months and 21 days thereafter the *Columbia State* announced it had raised \$11,000.

The monument was unveiled at 1:22 o'clock p. m. on April 11, 1912. Gen. C. Irvine Walker, Chairman of the Commission, delivered it into the keeping of the United Daughters and Sons of the Confederacy, and the address of acceptance was made by Arthur L. Gaston, of Chester, Commander of the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

The oration by Joseph W. Barnwell, a distinguished lawyer of Charleston (a member of the corps of Citadel cadets who volunteered for the war), was a notable panegyric.

Gen. Eli Torrance, of Minneapolis, formerly commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, sent two beautiful wreaths.

THE INSCRIPTION

The Committee conducted a contest for the honor of writing the inscription. From the large number of compositions that came from various States, unsigned but numbered, the following, submitted by Capt. William E. Gonzales, editor of the *Columbia State*, was selected (exactly as it appears on the monument):

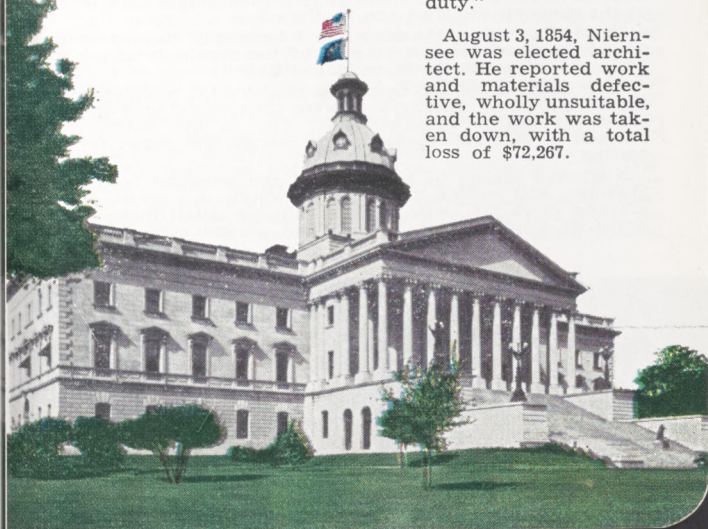

the state house

Mr. Wilson declares that South Carolina's State House is "one of the notable buildings of the world." Designed by Maj. John R. Niernsee, whom death prevented from carrying out what he said was "his life work," and in vital particulars his plans were afterwards departed from.

December 15, 1851, cornerstone for a "Fire Proof Building" was laid and in 1852 General Assembly appropriated \$50,000 to complete it and to begin next section as "New State Capitol." P. H. Hammerskold was the architect, and in May, 1854, he was dismissed for "concealments and misrepresentations and general dereliction of duty."

August 3, 1854, Niernsee was elected architect. He reported work and materials defective, wholly unsuitable, and the work was taken down, with a total loss of \$72,267.



Nov. 27, 1854, Gov. Jno. L. Manning recommended that new building be located at intersection of Senate and Richardson (now Main) Streets, with north and south exposures, declaring: "If change of location be made, in the end, perhaps it may not be a subject much to be regretted that delay and disaster attended the first efforts to construct a new Capitol for the commonwealth."

The General Assembly ordered location of new building changed, with wings extending east and west, as at present. Niernsee planned to complete building in 5 yrs. In 1857 it had advanced to top of basement window-heads.

October 1, 1860, he reported the "absolute value of work put into the building" to be \$1,240,063, and the structure as advanced to nearly 66 ft. above the foot of the foundation. "The Corinthian granite capitols, some 64, are being executed in a style and finish heretofore unequalled in that line." (Mr. Wilson characterizes this work as "wonderful, nothing finer in France or Italy.")

Work was suspended when Sherman's army destroyed Columbia on February 17, 1865. Only slight damage was done to the building by the shells, as the cannons were of light calibre, but the loss caused by destruction of the old State House, with its valuable library; the offices, workshops, etc., with their priceless contents of plans, drawings and models, the work of 10 yrs.; and a vast quantity of finished marble and rough material was estimated by Niernsee as \$700,000 finished marble.

"But 6 balls struck the western front," with little damage "except one which shattered the moulded windowsill and balusters of the 2d window (from the northern end) of the Hall of the House of Representatives." Four shots struck the interior of the bldg.—10 shots in all. Brass markers are placed at the spots on the west and southwest.

Damage to the quoin-stones and basement cornice at the southwestern corner was caused "by the proximity of the fire from the adjacent old State House Bldg."

"One of the latest and best busts of Calhoun" was destroyed. Five "bells of St. Michael's Church, Charleston, sent up here some time ago, deposited under one of the sheds, were cracked by fire and made useless, except the metal for re-casting."

Niernsee's library of architectural and scientific books, engravings, and several thousand drawings, the result of his practice of 25 yrs., with all the valuable detail State House drawings, contracts, etc., which had accumulated during 10

yrs., "were utterly swept away during that terrible night" — "an irreparable loss."

Nothing remains of these drawings but several prints of a perspective view and one full size detail of a Corinthian capitol, but this perspective and evidence in the bldg. itself indicate his conception of the completed building.

His plan did not contemplate a dome anything like that now on the bldg., but a lofty and finely proportioned tower rising through center of bldg. and supported on piers and arches from the ground up—a "rectangular lantern" somewhat pyramidal in outline, 30 ft. square at base, 180 ft. above ground, and to cost \$200,000.

Niernsee returned to Columbia as architect in 1885 to resume work, but died June 7. Succeeded by a former associate J. Crawford Neilson, of Baltimore, and on Oct. 1, 1888, by his son, Frank Niernsee, who successively carried on the work, mainly on the interior, until it was again suspended about 1891.

In 1900, Frank P. Milburn, was appointed architect. He replaced the roof and built present dome and north and south porticos at a cost of about \$175,000, McIlvain & Unkefer being contractors. Senator J. Q. Marshall, of the Commission, protested strongly against Milburn's appointment. He finally secured investigation of the work and Milburn and contractors were sued by State. There was a mistrial and case was not re-tried.

A Joint Legislative Committee, after calling in Capt. S. S. Hunt, Supt. of construction of U. S. State Capitol, characterized the dome as "infamous, no uglier creation could be devised, and it is nothing short of a miserable fraud."

Apr. 8, 1904, Chas. C. Wilson, of Columbia, was elected architect, under whom sundry items of improvements and equipment, on interior were made, and terrace and steps on north front building. This work continued several years at total cost of about \$100,000.

Mr. Wilson says: "The style of the building is in Roman, Corinthian, with considerable freedom and distinguished originality in much of the detail. The workmanship of Maj. Niernsee's time is exceptionally fine, indicating not only his great genius but the enthusiastic cooperation of mechanics of the highest skill and integrity.

"All credit for this noble and dignified building is due to the original designer and architect, Maj. John R. Niernsee. It is due him and to future generations of South Carolinians that it be protected from further departure from his design, and in good time, in the State's future prosperity, it is not too much to hope that it may yet be restored to his ideal."

Appropriations for the building have been verified in legislative documents to the amount of \$3,540,000, the records of several other years not being available.

Mr. Niernsee was born in Vienna, Austria, May 29, 1814.

EDITOR'S NOTE: In Mr. A. S. Salley's history of the State House it is stated that the granite for this handsome structure was quarried in the immediate vicinity of Columbia, the greater part of it coming from the Granby quarry located about 2 miles south of the State House.

The state seal



The following facts concerning the Seal are taken from the official bulletin on "The Seal of the State of South Carolina" by A. S. Salley, Jr., Secretary of the State Historical Commission.

On March 26, 1776, the Provincial Congress of S. C. set up an independent government, electing John Rutledge, president. On April 2, 1776, the President and Privy Council were authorized by Resolution of the Gen. Assembly "to design and cause to be made a Great Seal of South Carolina."

After the Declaration of Independence, a design for the arms of an official great seal, prepared by William Henry Drayton, a member of the Privy Council, was accepted, together with a design for the reverse, said to have been designed by Arthur Middleton. Both designs were turned over to an engraver in Charles Town and engraved as a great seal, which was used by Pres. Rutledge for the first time on May 22, 1777.

The Seal was made in the form of a circle, four inches in diameter, and four-tenths of an inch thick.

Both the arms and reverse symbolize the battle fought on June 28, 1776, between the unnamed, and unfinished fort at Sullivan's Island (now Fort Moultrie), and the British Fleet.

A DESCRIPTION OF THE SEAL FOLLOWS:

ARMS

A Palmetto tree growing on the seashore erect (symbolical of the fort on Sullivan's Island, built of Palmetto logs); at its base, a torn up oak tree, its branches lopped off, prostrate, typifying the British Fleet, constructed of oak timbers and defeated by the fort; *both proper*. Just below the branches of the Palmetto, two shields, pendant; one of them on the dexter side is inscribed MARCH 26, (the date of ratification of the Constitution of S. C.)—the other on the sinister side JULY 4, (the date of Declaration of Independence): Twelve spears *proper*, are bound crosswise to the stem of the Palmetto, their points raised, (representing the 12 states first acceding to the Union); the band uniting them together bearing the inscription *QUIS SEPARABIT (Who shall separate?)* Under the prostrate oak, is inscribed *MELIOREM LAPSA LOCAVIT (having fallen it has set up a better)*; below which appears in large figures, 1776 (the year the Constitution of S. C. was passed, the year of the Battle at Sullivan's Island and of the Declaration of Independence, and the year in which the Seal was ordered made). At the summit of the Exergue, are the words *SOUTH CAROLINA*; and at the bottom of the same *ANIMIS OPIBUSQUE PARATI (prepared in mind and resources)*.

REVERSE

A woman walking on the seashore, over swords and daggers (typifying Hope overcoming dangers, which the sun, just rising, was about to disclose); she holds in her dexter hand, a laurel branch, (symbolical of the honors gained at Sullivan's Island),—and in her sinister hand, the folds of her robe; she looks toward the sun, just rising above the sea, (indicating that the battle was fought on a fine day, and also bespeaking good fortune); *all proper*. On the upper part is the sky, azure. At the summit of the Exergue, are the words *DUM SPIRO SPERO (While I breathe I hope)* and within the field below the figure, is inscribed the word *SPES (Hope)*.

Facts concerning the new sword prepared by Lovick O. Thomas, Clerk of the Senate.



The Sword of State

This sword rests in the customary rack on the Senate rostrum in front of the President's chair during the daily sessions and is carried by the Sergeant-at-Arms on all State occasions. The present Sword of State was presented to the Senate February 20, 1951, as a personal gift to South Carolina by Lord Halifax, former British ambassador to the United States. The sword was fashioned by master craftsmen of London, England, having a pointed straight blade, the upper portion of which is etched with a design containing the State flower, the yellow jessamine. One side of the design is centered with the State seal. It has a golden curved guard and a handle wrapped with gold braid. This sword replaces the cavalry sword that was used after the Sword of State disappeared from the Senate rostrum in 1941. The cavalry sword was presented on March 5, 1941, and is carried in the Senate Journal of that date as follows: "Mr. Means, on behalf of the Charleston Museum, which is the oldest like institution in the U. S., presented to the Senate a cavalry sword made in 1800 and used in the War of 1812 and in the War of the Confederacy, to replace the Sword of State recently stolen from the Chamber."

This sword has been returned to the Charleston Museum.

Facts as to the history of the Sword of State and of the one that mysteriously disappeared in 1941 were secured from A. S. Salley, Historian Emeritus, and are as follows:

Earliest mention found is in Journal of the "Commons House of Assembly of South Carolina" for Friday, May 5, 1704, wherein it is stated that 26£: 11s 3d (about \$129) be paid for a Sword of State "for the Rt. Hon. the Governor and all succeeding Governors for the Honr. of this Government."

The Governor and the eight deputies of the eight Lords



Proprietors of Carolina constituted the Upper House of the General Assembly. The Sword of State was secured and used by the Grand Council until that body passed out of existence with the overthrow of the government of the Lords Proprietors in South Carolina in December, 1719.

Thereafter it was used by His Majesty's Council for South Carolina, at least until June 23, 1722, when Arthur Middleton, president of the Council, and acting Governor, informed the Commons House that it was "no way proper to be used by any of his Majesty's Governor" and suggested that the House give it to the "Corporation of Charles City [Charleston] and Port, to be carried before the Mayor." Says Mr. Salley:

"Whether this suggestion was carried out and a new sword procured, the writer has so far been unable to ascertain, but throughout the records of his Majesty's Council for South Carolina down to the Revolution evidence is found of the use of a Sword of State. On March 26, 1776, South Carolina adopted a constitution independent of the government of Great Britain and elected John Rutledge, president of the State. He was inaugurated on the following day, and the Journal of the Lower House records that his Excellency was 'preceded by the Sheriff bearing the Sword of State and the Officers of the Legislative Council'."

"The same Sword of State," says Mr. Salley, "has been in constant use ever since, being borne by the Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate instead of the Sheriff of Charleston District (now County) as then."

"That this Sword of State was made in Charles Town (now Charleston) by a local silversmith is evidenced by the fact that it contains no hallmarks which would not be the case had it been made in England."

Facts concerning the Mace were taken from Mr. Salley's official bulletin No. 3 of the Historical Commission of South Carolina.



The mace

This is the emblem of authority of the House of Representatives. It has been the custom every day, upon the opening of the session, for the Sergeant-at-Arms to bear the mace ahead of the Speaker and lay it upon its specially prepared rack on the Rostrum in front of the Speaker, there to remain until recess or adjournment. Whenever the House officially attends in the Senate Chamber, and upon State occasions, the mace is always borne at the head of the procession.

The mace was made in London, in 1756, as shown by the hallmarks thereon, by Magdalen Feline, and purchased by the "Commons House of Assembly of the Province of South Carolina" for 90 guineas. The panels contain the royal arms of Great Britain, the arms of the House of Hanover, the arms of the province of South Carolina, and other insignia.

Made of solid silver, with gold burnishing, it very much resembles the mace of the Common Council of Norwich, England. So far as Mr. Salley is able to learn it is the only mace in use in the United States that antedates the Revolution. In the diary of Joseph Quincy, Jr., of Massachusetts, it is recorded that on March 19, 1773, he visited the House in Charleston and saw the mace, "a very superb and elegant one," on the table before the Speaker.



During the Revolution this mace was appropriated by British sympathizers who offered it for sale to the House of Assembly of the Bahama Islands. The records of that body show that authority was given to purchase it, but show no further action. Mr. Salley's article declares that "as a matter of fact" it was not purchased and that the mace now in Nassau was made in London 43 years after the South Carolina mace was made.

Mr. Salley disproves the "silly twaddle" about the South Carolina mace's being the mace of the British House of Commons that Cromwell referred to as a "bauble."

From the time the mace disappeared from its place in the old State House in Charles Town, during the latter part of the Revolution, to 1819, its whereabouts was known to only a very few. "In 1819 when the Hon. Langdon Cheves, of South Carolina, went to Philadelphia, as president of the Bank of the United States, he found it in a vault of the bank and restored it to its rightful owners."

In a letter to Mr. Salley, the Hon. James Simons, of Charleston, deceased, states that the "mace was not used after war until I became Speaker, when I had it brought up into the House and used for the purposes for which it was intended."

Carolina Wren

(Written by Gilbert J. Bristow, Pres. Columbia Natural History Society, 1947-49):

The Carolina Wren is a member of the family Troglodytidae. It is present in all areas in South Carolina from the coast to the highest mountain. The song; which may be interpreted as *tea-ket-tle, tea-ket-tle, tea-ket-tle*; may be heard the year around, day and night, in all kinds of weather.

The Carolina Wren is slightly smaller than an English Sparrow and has a conspicuous white stripe over the eyes. The back of its body is rufous-red with underparts somewhat lighter in color. The tail, which is finely barred with black is held erect when the bird is excited.

NOTE: Prior to 1939 "The Carolina Wren" had been unofficially recognized as the State Bird of S. C. In 1939 the General Assembly passed an Act (No. 311) designating the Mockingbird as the official Bird of the State. Act No. 693, 1948 (1952 Civil Code, Sec. 28-2) was passed repealing the 1939 Act and designating the Carolina Wren as the official State Bird instead of the Mockingbird.

yellow jessamine

Officially adopted by the General Assembly on February 1, 1924, upon the Report of a Select Legislative Committee consisting of Senator T. B. Butler of Gaffney, and Representatives G. B. Ellison of Columbia, and T. S. Heyward of Bluffton.

"As fair as Southern Chivalry,
As pure as truth, and shaped like stars,"

"No flower that blooms holds such perfume,
As kindness and sympathy won.
Wherever there grows the sheltering pine
Is clinging a Yellow Jessamine vine."

From "Legend of the Yellow Jessamine," by Mrs. Teresa Strickland, of Anderson, S. C., when the flower was made the emblem of Dixie Chapter, U. D. C., about 1906.

The "Carolina, or Yellow Jessamine" is defined by the New International Encyclopaedia as "a climbing plant which grows upon trees and fences and bears a profusion of yellow, funnel-shaped flowers an inch in diameter, with a fragrance similar to that of the true Jasmine." Its odor on a damp evening or morning fills the atmosphere with a rare and delicate sweetness.



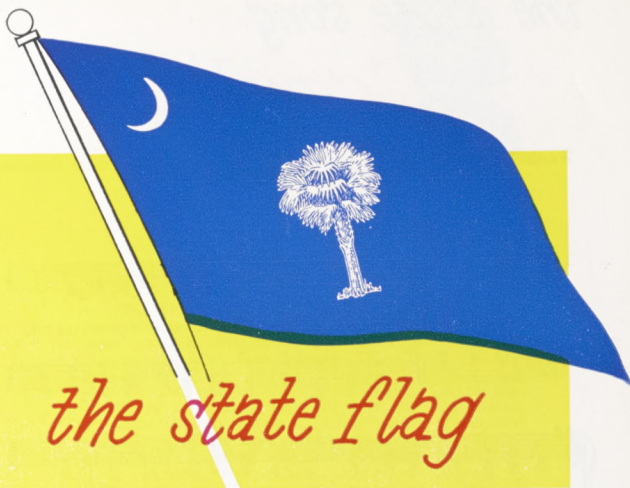

palmetto

Adopted as the "Official State Tree of the State of South Carolina" by joint Resolution No. 63, approved March 17, 1939.

The South Carolina Palmetto is classified by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as "*Inodes Palmetto* (also called *Sabal Palmetto*) and commonly known as the Cabbage Palmetto." It has long been closely associated with the history of South Carolina, being represented on the State Flag (adopted in 1777) as well as on the State Seal, where it is symbolical of the defeat of the British fleet by the fort on Sullivan's Island, built of Palmetto logs.

The Palmetto is an attractive feature of the coastal areas of South Carolina and is also found in Georgia, Florida and North Carolina. The large leaf-bud is highly prized as a salad vegetable for use in making pickles or relishes, and in Florida some use has been made of the fibers, from the leaf bases. Such uses, however are wasteful, since the palm must be destroyed in either case and years must lapse before it can be replaced.

Designed by Col. William Moultrie in 1775 shortly after the regular troops of South Carolina took Fort Johnson. The blue of the flag matched the soldiers' uniforms and the crescent was taken from the silver crescent worn on the front of their caps.

Adopted as State Flag in 1777 and on Jan. 28, 1861, as National flag of S. C.; "Blue with a white Palmetto upright in the center, and a white crescent in the upper flagstaff corner of the flag."

This became again the State flag when South Carolina entered the Confederacy, and continued upon re-admittance to the United States.

The Statutes prescribe that the flag shall be displayed daily, except in rainy weather, upon the State House and each State college.

It is also prescribed that any person who mutilates, injures or desecrates the State flag, wherever displayed, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 or by imprisonment for not more than 30 days.


The flag of South Carolina was the first to float over any part of Mexico.

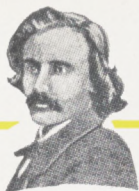

HENRY TIMROD

Henry Timrod, Laureate of the Confederacy, was born in Charleston, S. C., Dec. 8, 1828, (the date of Timrod's birth is given as 1829 on the gravestone but in a notebook kept by his father it is recorded as 1828), moved to 1104 Henderson St., Columbia, in 1863 where he died October 7, 1867, and was buried in Trinity Churchyard, Columbia. There is a bronze bust of him by Valentine on Washington Square, Charleston, unveiled on May 1, 1901, and also a portrait by Polly Guerry Walker, in the S. C. Senate Chamber, State House, Columbia, unveiled March 2, 1960.

THE STATE SONG "CAROLINA"

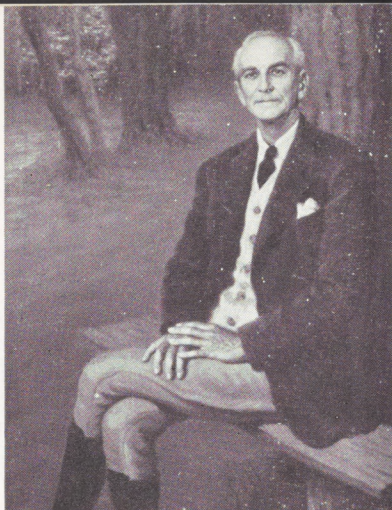
Acting on the memorial of the South Carolina Daughters of the American Revolution that the patriotic song "Carolina," written by Henry Timrod, South Carolina's most beloved poet, set to music by Miss Anne Custis Burgess, be made "*legally* the State song," the General Assembly, on February 11, 1911, adopted Senator W. L. Mauldin's Concurrent Resolution that it "be accepted and declared to be the State song of South Carolina." (See Senate Journal, page 557. While the text of the Resolution states "and set to music by Miss *Custis*, a daughter of South Carolina," this is evidently a confusion of her real name, which is stated in full in the memorial and given above).

Set to music by Miss Anne Custis Burgess

Miss Burgess was born in Mayesville, S. C., Jan. 22, 1874, died Oct. 15, 1910, and was buried in Evergreen Cemetery, Summerton, S. C.

Poet Laureate

Appointed by Governor Blackwood under authority of Joint Resolution No. 736, passed in 1934 and calling for the appointment of some outstanding and distinguished man of letters as poet-laureate for the State of South Carolina.



Archibald Rutledge

Born at McClellanville, S. C. in 1883, was educated in Charleston and at Union College from which he was graduated in 1904. For many years he was head of the English Department in the Mercersburg Academy. Since 1937 he has lived at "Hampton", his ancestral home, near McClellanville, S. C.

In May 1958, he was asked by the Library of Congress to make, for the National Archives, tape-recordings of 75 of his poems. He was one of 5 American poets called on to render this service.

He is the author of 73 books.

Dr. Rutledge was presented a gold medal as a gift from the State of South Carolina, bearing the great seal of the State on one side, and the following inscription on the other:
