

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Foreword

Steven Mansbach

This compendium of works on paper documents the rich collections of Eastern European modernism held by the Columbia and Cornell University Libraries. In depth and range it constitutes one of the great research resources for the study of modern art and culture, only rivaled perhaps by a similar compendium documenting the [East Slavic titles](#) at the New York Public Library (NYPL) and Columbia University Library. Moreover, the various entries attest to the acute bibliographical scholarship that informed the selection, analyses, and scope of these two University Libraries' collections, each mutually reinforcing. Although the comparative strength lies within the Czech holdings, the breadth of genres, topics, and categories is striking, and communally reflects the rich engagement of modernist creators in the full array of the literary and especially in the visual arts, inclusive of architecture, theater, poetry, and advertising, and, unique in its expansiveness, in the study of sexuality. The entries presented in this volume thus constitute far more than an aggregation of individual items – whether of visual and literary, “biotic” and sexual, or industrial and instructional invention. Rather, they point to and creatively engage the most essential – and most overlooked – aspect of the modernist enterprise generally: the priority of a visual “poetics” manifested through the design of book covers, broadsides, and illustrated avant-garde booklets of decisively modern subjects and interests. This was frequently communicated through the most progressive visual styles and employed a “new typography.” Indeed, it was the very centrality of “works on paper” that fundamentally determined the nature, course, and impact of modern culture generally, and of the Eastern European avant-garde in particular.

It is arguable that advanced visual artists and their apologists, and especially the European avant-gardists from the Estonian northeast to the Balkan lands in the southwest, produced as many texts as paintings, as many theoretical tracts as sculptures, and even more essays and illustrated articles than architecture. In hundreds of broadsides, manifestos, novellas, and periodicals – many of them documented in this compendium – the makers and advocates of a new culture proved to be as adept with the pen as they were original with the brush, the chisel, or

the straightedge. And this was true whether creating original works or illustrating the products of others. All were inspired to embrace the *word* as a *visual* medium. Of course, painters and sculptors and other practitioners of the visual arts had often written to explain or to justify what they sought to achieve with the customary tools of their craft. From the Italian Renaissance through the nineteenth century, visual artists had expressed themselves eloquently in words, often to explain their intentions or to persuade potential patrons of their talents. But never before the first half of the twentieth century – the focus of the present compendium – did artists seize upon the written word with such prolixity, passion, and purpose. It was as if the modernists aspired to make the word potently visible or, conversely, to empower the visual to be “read” as if a text. This convergence of communication – a type of conjunction of image and text, or at least an interdependence of one with the other – is powerfully demonstrated in a plurality of the items documented in this volume.

This compendium rightly adduces the originality and variability of the works on paper produced by modern artists, poets, advertisers, and their advocates in a host of disciplines from aeronautics (No. 389) and “biotics” (No. 398) to Surrealist performances and social revolution. Although differing in their emphases and departing from one another in the methods of application, the major protagonists in the advanced cultural movements represented here sought, in Karel Teige’s memorable words, to constitute a humanistic poetics for a modern era, which is “...to pose a new problem for poetry and redefine its mission: poetry for the five senses, poetry for all the senses.” Teige, whose manifold creativity is well documented in this book’s Czech section, advocated a potent coincidence of the visual and the poetic through which to fashion a “new people, who will create the new society.” The Czech’s belief system, which was widely embraced throughout Eastern Europe just as it was frequently imitated to the West, was advanced under the rubric of “Poetism.”

Poetics was both the objective and the *modus operandi* of many of those authors, artists, and publishers of the works contained in this volume. It served all progressive formations as an aesthetic, social and political motor force, one that was singularly versatile and could be expressed in a medley of visual languages with what was assumed to be a universal resonance. Although it was inflected differently in each of this volume’s geographic sections, and despite functioning under different names, the poetics of Eastern Europe asserted an authority that garnered support from artists across nationalities, backgrounds, and personal characteristics. For

Ljubomir Micić (No. 1009) [**Figure 1, below**] and his “Zenitist” confederates in Zagreb, Ljubljana, and Belgrade, “poetry is the most liberated art and where our greatest hopes lie.” Likewise, for Lajos Kassák, the great Hungarian impresario and modernist artist well represented in the entries below, an authentic modernism must give rise to a poetics as much visual as textual. Similar views were emphatically advanced in Poland, Romania, Bulgaria, Serbia, and in the Baltics – all of which have examples to be noted in the following entries. What united these disparate stylistic expressions was a universal affirmation of poetics as uniquely modern transcendence of traditional aesthetic categories and practices in a heroic endeavor “not to decorate life but to organize it” along new, more humane principles (to quote a Hungarian contemporary of Kassák, Ernő Kállai, who likely borrowed the phrase from his Russian modernist collaborators Ilya Ehrenburg and Lazar El Lissitzky).

The majority of the works on paper presented here are collective endeavors. This is due not only to the nature of “poetics”, which so frequently dictated a close collaboration between visual and literary artists. It also stems from the very character of avant-garde periodicals, also to be evidenced in the present volume. Most every example represented a heroic endeavor to replace the traditional individualism of the artist with a collective aesthetic commitment to reform society and to consolidate a progressive poetics to attain it. Hence, artist-led movements, and the booklets and gatherings they produced, were pitched to supplant the individuation that has characterized the history of art production and the social structures they had long served.

The periodicals, almanacs, and radical book covers gathered by Columbia and Cornell University Libraries might thus best be recognized as an idealized model for the kind of radical social and aesthetic reorganization of human behavior and political formation that the avant-garde impresarios, who were overwhelmingly poets and writers, and their artist confederates sought to effect beyond and through the pages of their publications.

As the array of items brought together here attests, modernist works on paper were the materialization of a wide range of visual and literary artists, as well as the committed expression of a cadre of progressive political figures, university intellectuals, and even the exceptional industrialist and merchant. The result was a significant, even if short-lived, enhancement of the relationship between art and politics, and between the arts and social dynamics. This interconnectiveness led to a profound and original intercourse between artists and politicians, and artists and economic leaders, who constituted at least one minor dimension of the restricted audiences for the new styles and engagé content of the works contained in this compendium.

The role and character of the audiences for these progressive works on paper merit attention. Although most advanced periodicals, pamphlets, and broadsides sought to promote inclusivity, as did, of course, the numerous (often illustrated) translations, a large multi-confessional and multinational readership/viewership was seldom reached. Despite impressive efforts to circulate their published journals, articles, books, and ephemera through a free exchange with like-minded groups across regional and national borders, or through the presentation of examples of their publications at international fairs and exhibitions, the makers of modernism found only an extremely modest number of consumers for their progressive works. Whether it was the idealism that motivated their contents or the visual radicalism of the works' design, the creators and authors soon discovered that the audience for avant-garde expression (and exposition) was extremely circumscribed. For example, the Latvian *Laikmets: ilustrēts mākslas žurnāls* [The Era: illustrated journal of the arts] (No. 62), the Hungarian *Horizont* [Horizon] (No. 1040), the Czech *Život: sborník nové krásy* [Life: anthology of new beauty] (No. 900)[**Figure 2, above**], the Bulgarian *Plaměk* [The Flame] (No. 975)[**Figure 3, above**] and *Vezni* [Scales] (No. 988)—none ever had a circulation of more than a couple hundred. Similar statics characterize most of the other publications documented here. At base, the modernist works on paper, regardless of the format – journal, booklet, instructional or informational manual, or a substantial tome – rarely garnered a viewership/readership much beyond the

adherents to the avant-garde groupings themselves. The general public either took scant notice or evinced little interest (with a very few exceptions limited to translations of well-known foreign authors).

Nonetheless, the modernists from Eastern Europe persisted in their endeavor to cultivate a local audience. To do so effectively, many united their new visual idioms with messages or references that had singular local resonances. Hence, the East Europeans spoke simultaneously a dual language: it was a progressive parlance with universal aspiration, yet it also operated as an ingenious local dialect or discourse that corresponded to domestic traditions and expectations. In essence, the modernist works from this region were at the same moment uncannily forward-looking and retrospective. Corporately and individually, their creators pursued an imaginative strategy by which native traditions might be reconfigured in a cosmopolitan future. In order to communicate their frequently revolutionary message, the avant-gardists needed to implement a new visual strategy, one that might appeal to all social strata and ethnic sectors. This objective was necessarily a blend of the pedagogic and the aesthetic, an ingenious amalgam that exploited poetics for educational objectives rather than for primarily sensual gratification. Only through such a radical scheme might a new mankind be envisioned, educated, and empowered to construct a New World upon the intellectual, political, and social stultifications of the old.

The items constituting this compendium collectively chart a totalizing ambition to transform humankind and its society. At base, such a visual poetics relied on an idealized understanding of man as a reasonable, responsive, and responsible citizen. In a word, the Eastern European modernists sought to redeem humankind through initiating a deeper, more rational, and more authentic integration of the citizen with a dynamic and machine-reliant modern society.

The profundity of the redeeming mission of modernism shaped the choice of styles employed in the design of book covers, determined the typography developed for pamphlets and brochures, prompted radically new conceptions of the book format, and even resulted in new printing processes. Examples of all of these strategies are furnished in the items comprising the compendium, where one encounters varied and innovative use of the linocut, etching, photo-illustration, photomontage, photogravure, woodcut, and photo-collage. In their totalizing ambition to transform mankind and society, modernists sought to overcome all hitherto prevailing limitations: political, economic, social, and psychological. Through articulating and

employing a program of radical aesthetics in their manifold works on paper, the avant-garde affirmed the primacy of poetics as the most efficacious means to release humankind's latent sentient and intellectual faculties from the limitation of outmoded political conventions and restrictive social practices.

Paging through the libraries' impressive holdings—almost all of which were acquired purposefully and coherently within the last decade through the acumen and industry of Robert H. Davis, Jr., the principal compiler of this annotated checklist—the user of this monumental compendium will encounter some of the most striking and unorthodox graphic designs ever created. But even more consequential, the very act of looking at these extraordinary works on paper may well result in a new and transformative experience: *reading-as-seeing* and *seeing-as-reading*. This new relationship between the text and the image—most frequently manifested in the modernist design of book covers and wrappers, in the orchestration of interior illustrations, and through typographical lay-out—points to the way these remarkable works on paper transcend the traditions of the past. They offer us not just aesthetic stimulation but guide us to see in the Columbia and Cornell University Libraries' collections a materialization of the idealism, invention, and imagination that shaped the first half of twentieth-century culture.



Compiler's Introduction

Background

In 2007, I had the great good fortune to become involved with an exhibition and publication project organized and curated by Professor Steven Mansbach of the University of Maryland, and my long-time NYPL colleague Wojciech Siemaszkiewicz. The remarkable exhibit “Graphic Modernism from the Baltic to the Balkans, 1910-1935,” was presented in the library’s Sue and Edgar Wachenheim III Gallery (from October 5, 2007-January 27, 2008), accompanied by an award-winning 79-page catalogue containing essays on the manifestations of modernist art and illustration in these diverse regions.

At that point in time, I was infinitely more familiar with avant-garde book design in the East Slavic lands, producing a checklist of NYPL holdings (that has since been expanded to include Columbia as well), so it was truly revelatory to see and experience the much less well known output from Estonian, Latvian, Lithuanian, Hungarian, Romanian, and Western and

Southern Slavic artists and designers.* Many of the works that were displayed were part of the historical collections of the NYPL, but under the visionary leadership of my longtime colleague and friend Edward Kasinec, the Library had begun expanding holdings in this area, adding many choice examples to NYPL holdings. At the time, I had resolved to pursue this area in my ongoing collection development activities, in my capacity of Assistant Chief of the Slavic & Baltic Division.

Less than a year later, however, the Slavic & Baltic Division fell victim to institutional reorganization and a “re-imagining” of the institution. In October 2008, I departed for Morningside Heights to become Librarian for Russian, Eurasian & East European Studies, but brought along with me a desire to see these under-represented and brilliant examples of 20th century book culture become better represented in the holdings of a major academic institution.

In the area of Slavic Central and Eastern European modernism, Columbia’s historical holdings at the time were largely restricted to literary works by more widely-known (in the West)—authors such as Vítězslav Nezval (1900-1958), for example, or titles held by Columbia’s renowned Avery Architectural and Fine Arts Library. In 2010, I was given the added responsibility for Slavic and East European collection development at Cornell University. Cornell likewise was limited in its holdings of this genre. The stage was set to do some important work in the creation of “destination collections,” across two great academic libraries with historic Slavic and East European holdings.

In 2011, after settling into my new role and expanded responsibilities, I made my first purchase of interwar modernist materials—a convoy of interwar Latvian imprints—from Boston’s F.A. Bennett Books. Since then, I have had the pleasure of working with an array of dealers to build these collections: among them, Michael Weintraub, and James Steerman of New York, and Michael Fagan, and Philipp Penka, both now of Boston. And while Czech material may be the most numerous in our combined holdings, they have striven to offer materials representing a wide array of traditions from the “Baltic to the Balkans.” I am grateful to them

for their expertise and efforts on behalf of both university collections. Over the past decade, Columbia and Cornell have acquired a steady stream of materials, often with the support of my library colleagues in both Ithaca and Manhattan.

Checklist Content

While the collection has representation from throughout Eastern and Central Europe, materials from Czechoslovakia predominate, reflecting both the productivity of Czech modernism, and propitious timing, as recent years of collecting coincided with the gradual wind-down of the holdings of the late Kingston, New York-based collector Robert Leibowitz and his wife June.

The checklist includes items designed or illustrated by more than 300 artists, active ca. 1898-1957. The earliest item, a Czech poster by Karel Vítězslav Mašek dating from 1898, is an outlier, as are several imprints from 1957. Eight percent of the dated titles on the checklist were produced from 1900-1919, and the vast majority of these date from after 1913. Thirty-six





percent of imprints on the list date from the 1920s, 46% from the 1930s, 10% from the 1940s, and only five titles date from the decade of the 1950s. Why the late chronology? It is because these titles were designed and/or illustrated by important proponents or practitioners of modernist aesthetics. For example, the Surrealist painter and graphic artist Vojtěch Tittelbach (1900-1971) designed the photomontage covers of item No. 814.







While the NYPL exhibit focused exclusively on the art of the book in connection with literary works, or modernist periodicals, this checklist includes examples of a modernist aesthetic in areas such as architectural design, and advertising. For example, No. 617, an advertisement for the “Virtus” Camera; No. 773, an album depicting the Pardubice Exhibition of 1931, sponsored by the Pardubice Electric Company; or No. 829, an ad for Tungsram Radio.





At Cornell, the subject and linguistic scope of my purchases have generally been more limited. These have ranged from Czech modernist titles, to an archive of materials pertaining to the Hungarian Soviet Republic of 1919, as well as the work of Hungarian artists Victor Erdei from 1907 (No. 1029), and Tibor Gallé from the mid-1920s (Nos. 1034-1035). However, the majority of titles pertain to the subject of human sexuality, broadly defined, reflecting one of the

Cornell Rare Book Library's collecting foci. Some are erotic romps—for example, No. 277, a comedy by Karel Elgart-Sokol with woodcuts by Karel Jílek. Others, such as the self-help works published by “Hydiko House of Cosmetics” (Nos. 209-226), deal with a variety of topics in

sexual relations, incorporating the use of photomontage and other modernist design elements.

The checklist includes a half-dozen items published *outside* the homelands, yet depicting the work of important artists and designers from Slavic Central, and Eastern Europe—by way of

example, No. 1046 by Lajos Kassák, with a cover by Sándor Bortnyik. Because the titles in question were printed in the 1910s and 1920s (only two date from 1945), and are rather rare, I have included them. Finally, not all of the books are illustrated *per se*, but are included because of the individual who, for example, designed the typography.

A few words concerning the indexes. While the name, short title, and place of publication indexes are fairly straightforward, the holding institution index is perhaps less so. Reference is made to academic and public institutional holdings as they appear in the OCLC WorldCat Bibliographic Database, a shared cataloging resource contributed to by some 17,900 libraries in 123 countries. It is an impressive database—but it does not include the full range of Eastern European libraries, nor does it register, of course, the holdings of private collectors. In perusing this list, and thinking about institutional concentrations of material, there are in most cases, no surprises. The Getty, Yale's Beineke, Indiana, Illinois, the NYPL, Harvard, to cite a few examples, are well represented. Nevertheless, there are a few surprises (at least to me!). For example, the holdings at the University of Toronto, or the Sächsische Landesbibliothek in Dresden. It is hoped that these indexes will help to suggest the inter-connections between artists, writers, and publishers, and perhaps will have ferreted out some often hard-to-find prosopographical data in the process. They are by no means exhaustive, but hopefully an aide in looking at these materials.

Once the present scourge of Coronavirus has passed, the time may be ripe for another exhibition of a selection of these works on paper, particularly as we are in the midst of the centennial decade of the creation of more than a third of the items checklisted. It is hoped and expected that—as with the rediscovery of the Russian and Ukrainian avant-garde during the 1980s—such an exhibit would make the diverse creative output of artists and designers from East Central Europe better-known and appreciated, and thereby more fully integrated into the history of modernism during the first half of the 20th century.



My colleagues from Columbia’s Rare Book & Manuscript Library—former Director Sean Quimby, Jane Siegel, and Jane Gorjevsky, as well as Avery Classics Curator Teresa Harris, her predecessor Carolyn Yerkes, former Avery Director Carole Ann Fabian, and my Global Studies supervisors Pamela Graham and Kaoukab Chebaro—all have been enormously supportive of these collecting efforts over the years. At Cornell, Director of Collections Kizer Walker, and Curator of the Human Sexuality Collection Brenda Marston have provided enthusiastic support for collection building and processing. Columbia’s Primary Resources Fund has also provided essential financial assistance for many unique acquisitions.

Introduction

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The present checklist enumerates the works on paper that make up the Eastern European Modernism holdings of the Columbia University Libraries and the Cornell University Library. The compendium includes print materials from 1890-1940 from Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, the former Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, and the former Yugoslavia. In its breadth and panoramic view of life, the collection resembles the modernist magazine: the holdings include publications on literature and visual art, music and theater, sexuality and architecture, among other topics. The majority of works on the checklist date to the 1920s and 1930s, a period when the book arts received increased attention from authors and publishers, artists and printers alike, and it is primarily to this remarkable part of the collection that the present essay is devoted. After roughly sketching the general tendencies within the more radical experiments in the book arts, the essay addresses the significance of print media for the Central and Eastern European avant-garde. Several outstanding works on paper from the compendium are highlighted in three subsequent sections—the avant-garde book as manifesto; Central and Eastern European hybridity as subversion; and avant-garde forms, popular publishing and mass audiences—in an effort to illustrate the breadth and richness of the collection.

The Avant-Garde Book Revolution

During the golden age in the history of European book arts at the turn of the 20th century, the previously distinct roles and occupations involved in the production of print media came into maximally close contact. The collaboration between writer, graphic artist and printer, inaugurated by modernism, was perhaps nowhere more pronounced than among the avant-garde. Radical young European artists, against the background of the tumultuous 1910s, demanded a clean break with the past, and presented themselves as the builders of a new civilization. They sought to revolutionize the book as an art form. With the development of new communication technologies and the increasing importance of visual and auditory culture in the broader

society—represented by the growth of cinema, photography, advertising, radio—some feared that print culture, unless innovated, would gradually be supplanted by other forms of communication.¹ Instead of rejecting these developments of contemporary civilization, as had some earlier modernists, the avant-garde sought to incorporate new technologies into their publications, as if to remind the reader of the long forgotten fact that the book is an original form of multimedia technology.

In creating their print-based artworks, the avant-garde relied on new technologies, both directly and symbolically, by translating and adapting them to the book form. New print technologies that became available at the turn of the 20th century allowed, for example, the spread of mechanically reproduced photographic images in printed materials. Following the example of popular illustrated magazines, the avant-garde took advantage of these technological developments and introduced photography and photomontage into their books in the 1920s. Thus, photography displaced gravure, xylography and other means of image reproduction in avant-garde print publications, both inside books as well as on their covers. Moreover, in avant-garde books photography began to function as an independent artistic medium, which communicated with the viewer not only by virtue of its commentary on the accompanying text, but in its own right. That is, as the image more broadly was liberated from its submissive illustrative function in the avant-garde book, so was the photograph. Together with the development of abstract photography, avant-garde books helped the medium to be recognized as an independent and legitimate art form.² Engaging with new technologies more symbolically, some avant-garde publications strove to create “cinema by other means,” reproducing the experience of cinema in print.³ In the 1920s, the avant-garde book stood at the intersection of different media—old and new, verbal and visual, spatial and temporal.

The 1920s also saw the increased circulation of print media across national borders as world markets, including those for literature and art, expanded, and expectation of and agitation

for a world socialist revolution intensified. Many avant-garde artists who espoused leftist political sympathies looked to the “successes” of the Russian Revolution with great hope, and began to emphasize the political function of art, with its potential for agitation, which went hand in hand with the desire to reach wider audiences locally and internationally. While images traveled easily across borders, words proved more difficult to decouple from their national origins. In an effort to make the word more comprehensible across languages without recourse to translation, avant-garde print publications, especially those of the 1920s, began to pay careful attention to the visibility of text and its potential to communicate visually and instantaneously. The desire to make language more legible beyond national borders fueled a radical revolution in typography, which sought to transform the word into a symbol of international communication alongside the image. The avant-garde book thus not only transfigured the image by liberating it from the text, and by incorporating new technologies for its reproduction, but it also transformed the word itself, in pursuit of international legibility.

The orientation toward an international audience is arguably present from the very moment of avant-garde’s inception, both within the region and in Europe more broadly. The often-cited founding text of Italian Futurism, which initiated the explosion of avant-garde “-isms” in Europe, was first published in French in the Parisian daily *Le Figaro*, and on the same day in a Romanian newspaper in Craiova. Several years later, in Central Europe, the founder of the Hungarian avant-garde Lajos Kassák, among other artists in the region, articulated a new vision of literature against that of Italian Futurism.⁴ For these artists, Futurism became a prompt for both imitation and polemics.

The avant-garde’s international orientation of the 1910s was characterized by competition—by the intention to outdo the older generation and fellow young artists alike, artistically, socially, politically and otherwise. This competitive spirit frequently found expression in the form of manifestos.⁵ By contrast with these early polemics, the avant-garde’s internationalism of the 1920s was more defined by cooperation. At this stage, the initially separate manifesto began to be integrated into other avant-garde art forms. The tenets of a new

movement, its specific forms and ideology could now be read not only in forceful rhetorical assertions, but increasingly in the form and content of the print media themselves. Initially, avant-garde magazines took the lead in creating an international audience and an international avant-garde network.⁶ Some attempted multilingual experiments to promote internationalism,⁷ while others concentrated on the silent communication of the visual medium. The visual communication of typography and illustration had replaced the cacophony of sounds of different national languages. For the post-war generation of young artists, such displacement of national languages was welcome, since the word was perceived as complicit in the nationalism that fueled the Great War.⁸ Alongside the magazine, which became a vehicle of visual communication, the avant-garde book merged with the manifesto and likewise became a launching platform for new movements and an organ of international communication.

The Avant-garde Book as Manifesto. Highlights from the Compendium




Figure 1: No. 1047. László Moholy-Nagy, Lajos Kassák, *Buch neuer Künstler* (Wien, 1922). Page spread with Fernand Léger and a punching machine.

The Hungarian artists László Moholy-Nagy and Lajos Kassák's collaboration on *Buch neuer Künstler* (The book of new artists, 1922; No. 1047) [**Figure 1**] was pioneering in transforming the book into an international channel of communication. Recognized as one of the first anthologies of the international avant-garde and a genealogy of its different movements leading up to Constructivism,⁹ this book contains almost no words other than the last names of the artists whose works are reproduced in it, and a brief introduction. On the pages of this book-manifesto, reproductions of Suprematist paintings by Olga Rozanova and Dadaist wood-relief collages by Hans Arp appear side by side with photographs of technological and architectural

marvels in the wordless poetry of mechanically reproduced images.¹⁰ *Buch neuer Künstler* can thus be read as a manifesto of new art, wherein mechanically reproduced images displace, or even entirely replace verbal communication. The juxtaposition of images as, for example, on the page spread where paintings by Fernand Léger are placed side by side with the many wheels of a punching machine, creates rhythmic visual parallels between them, sets the otherwise static composition of mechanically reproduced images in motion, and suggests technology and art share their aims. In this sense, the book not only reiterates the claims made in Kassák's brief introduction, where he notes the confluence of “art, science, [and] technology [*technika*]” that characterizes his era of artistic creation, but also performs them without excessive reliance on text. In this sense, the book goes further than El Lissitzky and Ilya Ehrenburg's parallel propositions in the Berlin-based magazine *Veshch / Gegenstand / Objet* (1922), which proclaimed the turn toward the construction of new art objects, in place of polemical attacks on the past.¹¹ That is, the *book as manifesto* replaces earlier rhetorical declarations and endless programmatic statements. Moreover, as manifesto, the anthology pioneers the concept of photo-poetry, becoming—to borrow a formulation from the Czech avant-garde—the first “mechanically reproduced book of image poems.”¹²

As the concept of the book was being reimaged to foreground visual communication, greater attention to typography became a priority, if the book was not to abandon verbal communication altogether. That is, if the word was to travel across national borders along with the image, it had to be made visible; instead of being *read* the word had to be *seen*. The Czech works on the present checklist contain probably the greatest number and variety of typographic experiments. For example, Jaroslav Seifert's *Na vlnách TSF: poesie* (On the waves of TSF: poetry, 1925; No. 718) [Figure 2] brings to life proposals of the Czech avant-garde group known as the Poetists, and serves as their book-manifesto. Here, Karel Teige's typographic innovations

and ingenious use of the page's white space rivals Stéphane Mallarmé's *Un coup de dés jamais n'abolira le hazard*. Meanwhile, the poems printed in this collection recreate the life of modern man and the modern city, playfully mimicking and challenging the telegraph as a medium of communication, as well as the representation of this medium in Italian Futurism, the first movement to declare its fascination with technology.¹³ In his assessment of his own typographical work for this book, Teige states that "the typography complete[d] the poetic process and transposed the poems into the visual sphere."¹⁴ Typography was not a process extraneous to poetic creation, but, in the Poetists' view, went hand in hand with it.

Central and Eastern European Hybridity as Subversion

When viewed as manifestos, the avant-garde books found on the present checklist show a remarkable plurality of agendas and stylistic languages used to achieve them: from Expressionist

and Dadaist chaos, to Constructivist order and clarity. In contrast with the more stylistically uniform publications of Western modernism and the avant-garde, the publications from Central

and Eastern Europe show a greater degree of hybridity. For example, Karel Čapek’s translation of Apollinaire’s *The Zone* (*Pásмо*, 1919; No. 108) [Figure 3] is illustrated with his brother Josef Čapek’s Expressionist linocuts. As the young Teige aptly noted in his review of the book, the book’s form does not seem to correspond to its content. Teige suggested that the Simultanist drawings of Robert Delaunay would be more appropriate as illustrations.¹⁵ In early Hungarian avant-garde publications, the Expressionist visual idiom—through its connection to the politically inflected German Activism—often served as an index of the leftist orientation of the published works. For example, Kassák’s *Tragédiás figurák: regény* (Tragic figures: a novel, 1919; No. 1060) [Figure 4] is illustrated by Sándor Bortnyik’s two (Cubo-) Expressionist linocuts, while the cover of *Máglyák énekelnek* (Bonfires Sing, 1920; No. 1056) employs Expressionist lettering, though the flowing arrangement of the text (in imitation of signing), and the abstract cover point to other visual idioms.¹⁶ A similar trend can be observed in later Bulgarian modernism. The poet Geo Milev’s leftist magazine *Plamuk* (The Flame, 1924-25; No. 975), notably founded after the failure of the Communist Revolution in Bulgaria, also blended

Expressionism, specifically its fascination with apocalyptic themes,¹⁷ and expectations of a world socialist revolution.

Beyond visual languages, books of the Polish avant-garde on the checklist provide interesting examples of Central and Eastern European hybridity on the level of content. For instance, Tytus Czyżewski's *Osiol i słońce w metamorfozie; Włamywacz z lepszego towarzystwa* (Donkey & the sun in metamorphosis; A Burglar with better company, 1922; No. 913) contains a blend of Futurism, Alogism, Expressionism and Dadaism, all of which combine within the distinct Polish avant-garde movement known as Formism. Written in 1918, the first drama in this volume integrates Futurist poetic images, which seem to evoke the Russian Futurist opera *Victory over the Sun* (1913) as well as Kazimir Malevich and Rozanova's "alogical" paintings from the same period, with Dada humor and suggestive political content in a one-act play that describes itself as a "formo-satirico-bouffonade." The second drama, written in 1921—that is, after the official founding of Formism—is more distinctly Dadaist in its absurdist critique of the decadence and mechanization of culture: a burglar breaks into a salon in Paris to find both mechanized mannequins and people; soon he himself becomes mechanized amidst cacophonous dialogues. Dadaist humor and mystification can also be found in other Polish works on the checklist, such as Edward Kozikowski and Emil Zegadłowicz's *Niam Niam: antologja poezji*

murzyńskie (Niam Niam: an anthology of negro poetry, 1923; No. 331), which falsely presents itself as poetry in translation from African Zande languages and seems to draw on Tristan Tzara's Dadaist experimental "negro" poetry, as well as on modernism's fascination with "primitivism" more broadly.¹⁸ However, what is particularly interesting about Czyżewski's publication is that it documents the presence of both Russian and Western currents of exchange, and the Polish avant-garde's conversation (and polemic) with a variety of sources.

The Baltic section of the checklist reveals a similar orientation toward artistic developments in the West and East. Though still largely Expressionist, in the 1920s the Latvian avant-garde shows signs of interest in Dadaism. *Trubadūrs uz ēzeļa* (Troubadour on a donkey, 1921; No. 71) [Figure 5] is a humorous, possibly Dada-inspired collection of poetry by the Latvian poet Jānis Sudrabkalns, who shared the experience of serving in the First World War with many young artists of his generation, including the Dadaists. In the context of postwar

Europe, the figure of the troubadour is reinterpreted as that of a travelling musician and a vagabond poet—figures which also reemerge in the early days of Dada in Zurich, which became a temporary home for many poets and artists seeking to flee the war. By contrast with the more Expressionist Latvian covers, such as Niklāvs Strunke's linocuts for Andrejs Kurcijs' *Dvēseles*

kabarejs: dzejas (Soul cabaret: poetry, 1921; No. 53), the arrangement of the words and letters on the *Trubadūrs* cover—the apparently random emphases and italics, the shifts in fonts and the non-linearity of the reading they encourage, the red and black color scheme—resembles Dadaist typographical experiments on posters and magazines. The later dated items in the Latvian collection, especially the magazines, show signs of the influence of Russian Constructivism. In them, the language of German Expressionism, tied to the trauma of the First World War, blends with Constructivism to communicate an anti-militant leftist message, such as in the Latvian magazine *Jaunā Gvarde* (New guard, 1928-1929; No. 44).

Perhaps the most interesting manifestation of hybridity in the Central and Eastern European avant-garde is the confluence of Dadaism and Constructivism—two movements seemingly diametrically opposed to one another—in a number of 1920s works on the checklist. Otakar Mrkvička's photomontage on the cover of Jaroslav Seifert's *Samá láska: verše* (Only Love: Poetry, 1923; No. 720) playfully integrates miscellaneous photographic clippings and lettering into a grid, which would become one of the distinctive features of Constructivist book, magazine and poster design.¹⁹ Lajos Kassák's typographical and calligraphic “picture poems” in *Világanyám* (The World, My Mother, 1921; No. 1062) likewise combine the “languages” of Dada and Constructivism: Dadaist typography is tempered by the stable grid-like arrangement of the page.²⁰

Somewhat more playfully and ironically, Josef Šíma's cover for Teige's translation of Georges Ribemont-Dessaignes' novel *L'Autruche aux yeux clos* (*Pštros se zavřenýma očima* or The Ostrich with closed eyes, 1925; No. 679) [Figure 6] integrates the two competing aesthetics and ideologies of Dadaism and Constructivism. Here, half-dressed Roman copies of classical Greek statues of a man and a woman (identified as Venus of Cyrene) are pasted against a background photograph of the Temple of Poseidon. The couple and the trip that is suggested by the postcard-like photograph²¹ is reminiscent of Hannah Höch's photomontage “Bourgeois

Wedding Couple – Quarrel” (1919), which features similarly arranged male and female figures in a satirical critique of bourgeois relationships. This evocation of Dadaist use of photomontage seems appropriate for Georges Ribemont-Dessaignes, who was a well-known French contributor to the Dada movement. At the same time, the presence of Classicism, which evokes French Purism and international Constructivism, suggests a different source and perhaps a changing aesthetic. How should the viewer interpret the figures’ half-clothed bodies? Is Dada photomontage-clothing finally covering up and eclipsing Classicism, or is Classicism being exposed underneath Dada antics? The composition seems to deliberately suggest both possibilities, trivializing the trumped-up opposition between them.

What is the source of hybridity with the Central and Eastern European avant-garde? Often cultural hybridity in the region is construed in terms of delayed reception of the Western (and, occasionally, Russian) cultural trends and imperfect domestication of their languages. Such a view is, in turn, connected to the peripheral geographical position of the region vis-à-vis major centers of cultural production like Paris and—increasingly so in the 1920s—Berlin. Perhaps instances of hybridity such as Ivan Olbracht’s *Žalář nejtemnější* (The darkest prison, 1929; No. 619) [Figure 7], which reproduces vaguely Suprematist designs (with some Surrealist motifs) on the leather-bound cover of the book, can be explained in this vein. The flat geometric forms floating on the cover clash with the luxurious materiality of the book—leather binding, japan paper, gold ink—which connotes the French tradition of *livre d’artiste*, rather than the cheaper, seemingly more accessible aesthetic of paperbacks or paper dust covers, preferred by the avant-garde.²²

However, in addition to such curious objects, the checklist includes many more instances of intentional hybridity. For example, the cultivation of hybridity as a value can be easily discerned in both the Czech and Hungarian sources.²³ The above cited cover by Šima reads like

a playful parody of fashionable artistic trends; it appropriates the languages of Dada and Purism-Constructivism and critiques them at the same time. An intentional synthetic and syncretic approach can likewise be observed in Kassák's reception of Dadaism and Constructivism in his poetry, visual art and, especially, in his editing of the magazine *Ma* (Today, 1916-25). For the Hungarian avant-garde in particular, the clash between these two aesthetics was a question of ideology and politics. Specifically, the use of either Dada or Constructivist visual languages became part of a political-philosophical debate on what the leftist artist living under the conditions of capitalism should do. Is the artist to embrace the language of Constructivism and practice constructive art in preparation for the imminent socialist revolution, as Moholy-Nagy does? Or is the artist to critique bourgeois society through Dadaist idiom—as Sándor Barta and Ödön Palasovszky (No. 1077) do—the only option that allows the artist not to take part in the building of capitalism?²⁴ Kassák's refusal to choose between these paths, and instead to experiment with a plurality of avant-garde languages, is not a failure to understand the exclusive terms of the debate, but a politicized choice that harks back to his conflict with Béla Kun during the 1919 Hungarian Soviet Republic. That is, as stated in his "Letter to Béla Kun in the Name of Art" (No. 1055), the artist must refuse to submit to the dictates of politics in the sphere of art.²⁵ Whereas, at the time, political forces were increasingly leading leftist avant-garde artists to align

themselves either with Dadaist destructive practices or with the Constructivist faith in the imminent socialist future, which required preparation and practice, Kassák spoke out against the political determination of art in his letter, as well as in his appeal to a plurality of artistic languages. Such a position illustrates that there was much more to Central and Eastern European hybridity than first meets the eye.




Figure 8: No. 605. *Zpáteční lístek: básně*. (Praha, 1933), cover by Karel Teige.

Among other seemingly incompatible languages are Constructivism and Surrealism, the confluence of which is clearly pronounced in the Czech works on the checklist. On the cover of Vítězslav Nezval's *Zpáteční lístek: básně* (Return ticket: poems 1933; No. 605) [Figure 8], the Surrealist photographic objects (a swan, a hat, a train and Saturn), which remind one of Breton's "chance encounter of a sewing machine and an umbrella on an operating table,"²⁶ are integrated with Constructivist design elements by Karel Teige. On this cover, the bold, modular letters that characterized Teige's earlier typographical solutions, as in *Zlom: verše* (Fissure: verses, 1925; No. 148), give way to lighter and cleaner typography. In addition to the minimalist, uncapitalized text of the title, author and publisher, the tilted positioning of the title aligns this book with Czech Constructivist experiments in the sphere of publishing, as well as with El Lissitzky's proposals on book design published in Kurt Schwitters's Dadaist magazine *Merz*.²⁷ Moreover, although today the fame of the book is often derived from its status as a historical record of the connections between Czech Poetism, Russian Formalism, and Czech Structuralism in the figures of Jan Mukařovský and Roman Jakobson (to whom the book is dedicated), equally deserving of recognition is the book's layout. In organizing the book's contents, Teige implements Bauhaus-like principles, which he had previously employed, entirely appropriately, in *Nejmenší byt* (The minimum dwelling, 1932; No. 803). Here too, the mixing of different visual languages, Surrealist and Constructivist, is by no means accidental. In this particular example, it can be read as a form of resistance to politics that would exclude interest in Surrealism from socially conscious art. In the same year the book was published, Teige, an ardent Communist, repudiated Ilya Ehrenburg's charges against Surrealism and eventually joined the Czechoslovak Surrealist group in Prague. The conflict between Surrealism and leftist politics would reemerge and

fracture the group in 1938.

The hybridity evident in many avant-garde print publications in Central and Eastern Europe cannot simply be explained by the region's late reception of European trends, by its marginal(ized) geographical position between East and West, nor by the linguistic obstacles this position may entail. For the Central and Eastern European avant-garde, insistence on hybridity and synthesis became a way to challenge the European West as the center of artistic production and to carve out a space for artists from this region in the history of art. For all of the avant-garde's fascination with the new and rejection of the past, a certain critical approach to this fetishization can be observed in these synthetic forms.

The fact that hybridity was a conscious choice in many publications is supported by the many examples of "pure" Constructivist book design. The cover of the Czech anthology *Život: Sborník nové krásy* (Life: an anthology of the new beauty, 1922; No. 900)—a crucial benchmark in the development of the Czech avant-garde, and a collaboration between Devětsil members Bedřich Feuerstein, Jaromír Krejcar, Josef Šíma, and Karel Teige—can be cited as a forerunner

of Constructivism in Czech book and magazine design. On this “first photographic cover on a Czech book” and the “first Czech photomontage cover,”²⁸ one observes a wheel of an automobile pasted onto a section of a Greek column, which appears against the background of an open sea. While the column invokes classical order and clarity, the wheel stands in as a symbol of modern clarity and rational perfection.²⁹ Read symbolically, the cover can be interpreted as an acknowledgement that the past, rather than being erased or slavishly imitated, should be updated to produce new rational forms. By contrast with the photographs printed in the French Purist magazine *L'Esprit nouveau*, which the cover of *Život* quotes,³⁰ the photographic images on the cover of *Život* overlap and interpenetrate: the “then” and the “now”, the “past” and the “present” are not merely placed in a sequence of succession, but are shown to depend on each other. Perhaps more important than the symbolic juxtaposition of the column and the wheel is the medium of the composition: photomontage not only symbolically represents, but *performs* the triumph of new rational forms on the level of medium. Although from this point forward photography and photomontage would become a common feature of Czech avant-garde book covers, the clear rational aesthetic of Purism enacted on the cover would, for a time, give way to the more playful spirit of Dadaist photomontages.

The prescient aesthetics of this cover would be explored and developed to its full potential in the mid 1920s, especially in the work of Karel Teige and Otakar Mrkvička. For example, Teige’s cover design for the Czech translation of Isaak Babel’s *Red Cavalry* (*Rudá jízda*, 1928; No. 118) [Figure 9] places photographic cut-outs into a Constructivist grid, setting them against the contrastingly colored orthogonal planes, which heighten the visibility of the black and white photos. Similar solutions are evident on the covers of the Czech avant-garde magazine *ReD: měsíčník pro moderní kulturu* (Red: a monthly for modern culture, 1927-1931; #671). Parallel developments can also be traced in Kassák’s books, such as on the cover of *Napok, a mi napjaink; regény* (Days, our days; a novel, 1928; No. 1059).

The popularity of Constructivism in Central and Eastern European book design cannot be understood outside of the avant-garde's interest in architecture, since in the 1920s and 30s architecture became an exemplary art form, through which the avant-garde could bring art into life. Several works on the checklist document the avant-garde's deep engagement with





Figure 11 (Top): No. 803. *Nejmenší byt*. (Praha, 1932), Table of Contents. Figure 12: No. 721. *Slavík zpívá špatně*. (Praha, 1926), cover by Karel Teige.

Constructivist architecture. For example, Pál Forgó's richly illustrated *Új építészet* (New architecture, 1928; No. 1031) [Figure 10], with a Constructivist design by Kassák, covers developments in Western Constructivism, from Le Corbusier and J.J.P. Oud to Gropius's Bauhaus, and includes interior and furniture design. Detailed attention to both International and Russian Constructivism is found in Teige's *Nejmenší byt* (The Minimum dwelling, 1932) [Figure 11] which, in addition to being an invaluable source of comparative architecture and sociological approaches to the housing problem, is a stellar example of Teige's innovative book design. Architecture made the avant-garde's desire to (re)organize life and society visible and possible beyond the symbolic level. It is no surprise that these architecture publications deal with the problem of worker's housing and, in this sense, can be viewed as a meeting place between the avant-garde and broader society.

Vectors of Influence: Avant-garde Forms, Popular Publishing and Mass Audiences

Today, just as a century earlier, the avant-garde book often confounds the inexperienced viewer. How should one read books that do not contain any words or make sense of words and images that appear to send different, often contradictory messages? Many avant-garde books were neither specifically aimed at nor well received by popular audiences. Nevertheless, to gain a fuller understanding of these books, they must be evaluated against the avant-garde impulse of “popularizing art” by making it available in print, rather than confining it to the “musty” museum.³¹ Building on the book’s traditional educational function, many avant-gardists were driven by a democratic and egalitarian impulse to make art more accessible to popular audiences, to bring art into life, to bridge the gap between them.

A substantial number of the items in this checklist document the influence of avant-garde forms in book design, on popular publishing, and vice versa. Materials in the present checklist reflect both vectors of influence: the avant-garde artists’ direct participation in commercial enterprises, and the borrowings of avant-garde languages by mass print media. By the late 1920s, the visual language that initially appeared in a few select avant-garde publications began

to enter the publishing mainstream. By the 1930s, the Czech Surrealists Jindřich Štyrský and Toyen (Marie Čerminová) no longer illustrated exclusively the books of fellow avant-gardists like Vítězslav Nezval (the covers of *Falešný Mariáš*, Cheating at whist, 1925; No. 584 and *Menší růžová zahrada*, The Smaller rose garden, 1926; No. 591) and Jaroslav Seifert (the cover of *Slavík zpívá špatně*, The Nightingale sings off-key, 1926; No. 721) [Figure 12], as they did on the 1920s. In this transitional period, they also turned to illustrating popular non-fiction literature (see Toyen's design for *Rembrandt: tragedie prvního moderního cloveka: román*, Rembrandt: the tragedie of the first modern man: a novel, 1931; No. 843 and Štyrský's illustrations for *Prostonárodní České písne a říkadla*, International Czech songs and rhymes, 1937; No. 282), popular and pulp fiction (Toyen's covers for *Kouzelný dům*, Magic house; 1939; No. 134 and 1947, No. 135); Štyrský's covers for *Bachantka a jeptiška*, Bacchante and the nun, 1931; No. 361 and *Peníze*, Money, 1931; No. 616) [Figure 13], and even classics (Toyen's cover for Ivan Turgenev's *Dým*, Smoke; 1934; No. 830). The use of photomontage on covers and in illustrations, combined with innovative typography that communicated with the reader subconsciously and instantaneously, can be cited as a lasting influence of the avant-garde on mass publishing. This trend is especially visible in the photomontage covers in Cornell's rich holdings on human sexuality.

Photography and photomontage in book illustration brought closer together the audiences of mass readers and of consumers of avant-garde publications. The use of photomontage in avant-garde book publishing developed alongside the rise of International Constructivism, with its new emphasis on objectivity. Whereas Constructivism's claim to realism, outside of the sphere of architecture, was largely symbolic, photography offered a different path toward objectivity, a different way to forgo mimesis that came into question at the turn of the 20th century. Photography and its cognate processes, such as the photogram, understood as a direct imprint of reality on light sensitive film, paper, or other materials, could circumvent representation altogether; it offered a non-mimetic way to return to the real and to overcome the crisis of geometric abstraction, which was increasingly felt throughout the 1920s. Thus, whereas many covers from the early and mid 1920s rely on the simplicity of geometric forms alone, by the late 1920s, these forms increasingly enter into dialogue with photomontage and the two carefully balance one another.

Photography's perceived objectivity also played a role in creating erotic appeal in print publications for both artistic and educational purposes. The eroticism of Surrealist photomontages in print is well known and present in this compendium: Nezval's *Posedlost* (Obsession, 1930, No. 600) [Figure 14], *Žena v množném čísle* (Woman in the plural, 1936; 604), and *Most: básně 1919-1921* (The Bridge: poems 1919-1921, 1937, No. 594), to cite just a few examples. Somewhat more surprising are the covers for popular, non-avant-garde books on sexual education. For example, the cover of *Pohlavní zdravověda* (*co má věděti každý mladý člověk o sobě a druhém pohlaví*) (Sexual hygiene: what every young person should know about oneself and about the other sex, 1930; No. 221) [Figure 15] playfully employs the medium of photomontage to suggest sexual activity between the man and the woman in the upper part of the plane, uniting the two separate images through a suggestive black phallus both people appear to hold. The use of photography suggests the erotic intimacy of the publication, baiting the reader with its soft-pornographic content, while at the same time promising detailed, photographically accurate and reliable information.

As the photographically illustrated covers of many of the books in this collection show, cinema was another place where the avant-garde met popular tastes and vice versa. Especially in the Czech section of the checklist, one encounters the proliferation of cinema stills in book marketing, for both works of literature that were adapted for the screen and literature that had little to do with the film from which the still was borrowed. Toyen's covers for Karel Josef Beneš's novel *Kouzelný dům* (Nos. 134, 135), which was made into a film by Otakar Vávra in 1939, use the film adaptation to generate reader interest.³² The cover of the non-avant-garde sexual education book *Diskrétní odpovědi na dívčerné otázky* (Discrete answers to confidential questions, 1929; #210) [Figure 16] uses what appear to be film stills from a melodrama to suggest the romantic content that can be found inside the book's covers.

Beyond book marketing, cinema was an important medium for the avant-garde for other reasons. Like Vladimir Lenin, much of the leftist-leaning avant-garde saw the agitational potential of cinema, and tried to take advantage of it in different ways. Beginning in the 1920s,

Charlie Chaplin became a symbol of the abuses of the capitalist West and an icon of an everyman for the leftist leaning avant-garde and popular audiences alike. The present checklist documents this avant-garde interest in Chaplin and the potential of his films to reach the masses with a revolutionary message. Chaplin's image migrates from publication to publication in photographic and pictorial forms in, for example, in Nos. 107, 204, 798, and 804.³³ Teige, who despite his editorial work for various Czech magazines rarely penned introductions, does so for the translation of Chaplin's "only book" into Czech (No. 203) [Figure 17] and devotes a chapter to Chaplin's work in his *Film* (1925, No. 798).

Among the special topics encountered in Columbia and Cornell holdings are compendia documenting the travels of Central European artists to the West and East. The unfinished album

of Karel Lodr and Bohumil Kříž, *Studijní cesta do Paříže* (Study trip to Paris, 1937; No. 494), pays homage to the old artistic center of Paris, while Helena Bochořáková-Dittrichová's work

Dojmy z SSSR (Impressions from the USSR: with 15 woodcuts by the author, 1934-35; No. 152) and the Czech translation of Georges Duhamel's *Journey to Moscow* (Cesta do Moskvy, 1929; No. 255) turn the reader's eyes eastward. The interwar fascination with the USSR is also documented in many other non-travelogue, non-fiction publications on contemporary life in the land of the Soviets (Nos. 744, 806).

The works on paper documented in this checklist are a treasure trove for any researcher who wishes to grasp the evolution of modernist and avant-garde languages, their gradual change and coexistence in Central and Eastern Europe. While the Russian avant-garde has, to a certain extent, begun to be integrated into the cultural and art history of 20th century Europe, the Central and Eastern European region and its unique artistic culture is still understudied. In particular, the subversive potential of its synthetic approaches to different media and different stylistic languages remains undertheorized. Finally, the collection of works on paper on this checklist is also invaluable for the contemporary artist and book designer who wishes to revive the rich experimentation of the historical avant-garde, borrowing its techniques and translating them into today's media and forms.

Steven Mansbach, a Distinguished University Professor and professor of 20th-century art history at the University of Maryland in College Park, focuses his research and teaching on the genesis and reception of classical modern art, roughly from the last quarter of the 19th century through the middle of the 20th. Carol Rounds has been teaching Hungarian at Columbia since 1988.
