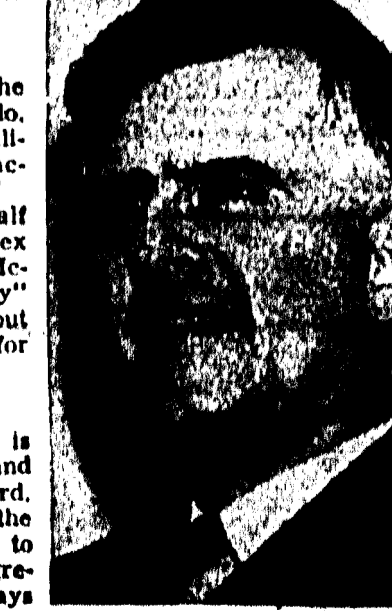

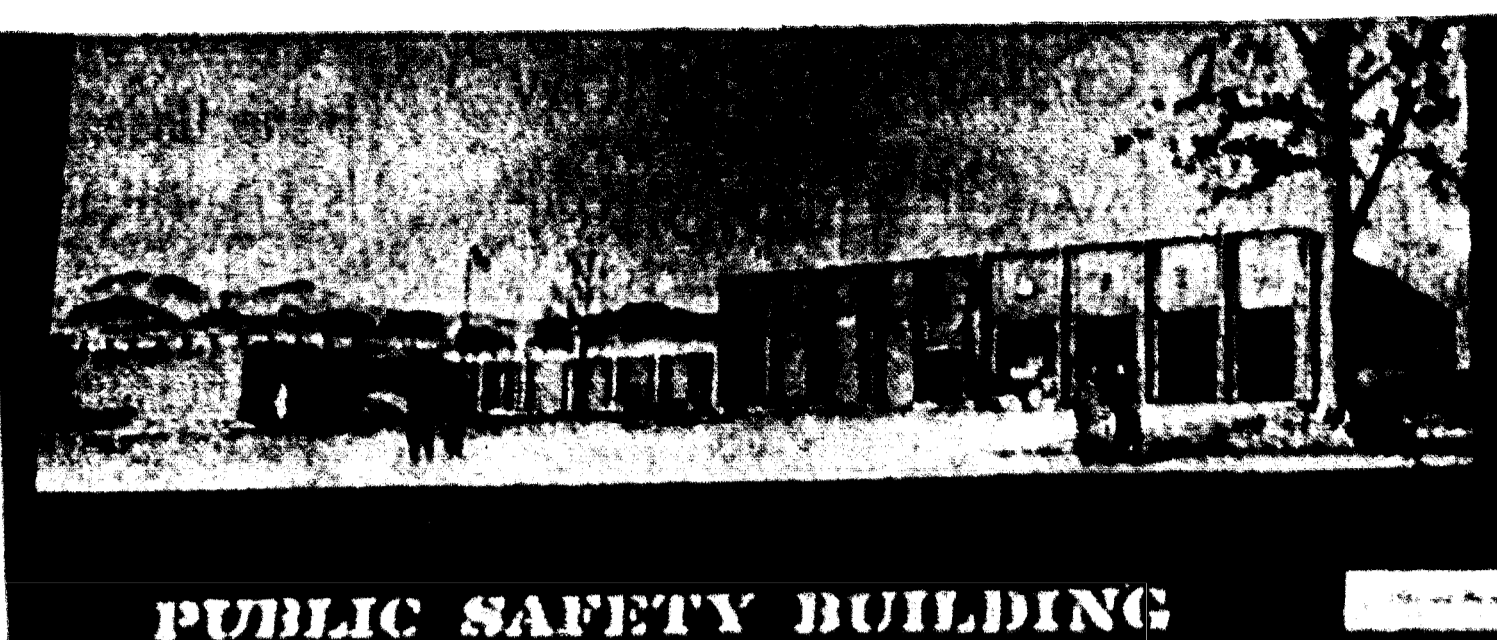

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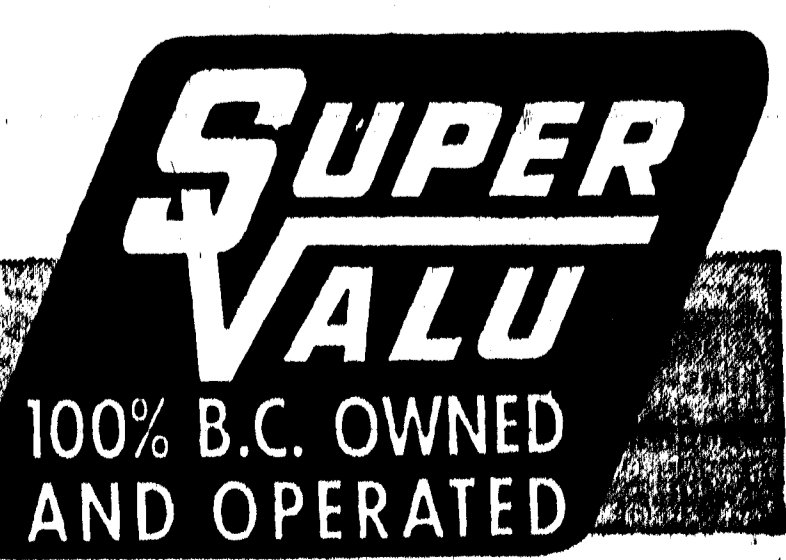
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Marty Barry Relives Past

HALIFAX (CP) — Marty Barry relaxed in an armchair in his comfortable Halifax apartment and recalled his career in the National Hockey League with modesty becoming a former Lady Byng Trophy winner.

Barry was never a super-star during his 11 years in the NHL. His name has faded from the memory of many who followed hockey in the 1950s and is almost unknown among the younger generation of fans.

But folks around Detroit whose hockey recollections go back to the mid '30s won't soon forget the high-scoring line of Marty Barry, Larry Aurie and Herb Lewis that helped the Red Wings to Stanley Cup victories in 1934 and 1937.

Now 51, Barry is manager of a grocery store at Shannon Park, a naval base with married quarters in nearby Dearborn. His hair is almost completely grey and his tall, lean frame has added a few pounds since his playing days.

Raised in Montreal, Barry played all the early hockey there, jumping to the old New York Americans of the NHL in 1937 at the age of 21.

"Montreal didn't want me," he recalls. "They had a good team and it was hard to break in."

BENT TO AHL

Even the Americans didn't keep him long. He was shipped down to Philadelphia of the American Hockey League and moved to New Haven of the same circuit.

Barry's second crack at the big time came in 1939 when Boston ruins drafted him. This time he stayed up.

A centre, Barry was a digger and hard worker. He gained a reputation as a "huck" man because he missed only one game in 11 seasons but emphasizes that he never held a record for consecutive games played.

There were only 64 and 65 games in a season completely compared with 70 now.

Winter Golf Schools Blossom In Formerly Quiet Season

But times have changed and across the country winter golf schools are springing up, often in the most unexpected quarters.

Winnipeg pros Bill Whibley and Steve Cikialuk have set up operations on the second floor of a furrier's building in downtown Winnipeg. And their clients range from raw duffers to polished amateurs.

Whibley is the veteran pro at Pine Ridge Golf Club and the fast-rising young Cikialuk is a first-year pro at Elmhurst Golf and Country Club.

Twelve hours a day, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m., the pair instruct in the fundamentals of putting, pitching, chipping and driving. They have 35 students enrolled. The equipment fee qualifies a member for eight lessons but for veterans of 50 years.

Whibley's brother Frank also conducts one in Kitchener, Ont., and there are two other winter schools in the Metropolitan Winnipeg area, one sponsored by the school board and the St. James YMCA.

Whibley emphasizes, however, that while the rival schools use only the lightweight practice golf balls, his school goes with the standard ball in training sessions.

There are five nets for driving practice and others for practicing various other shots.

The school operates until March 28, by which time Whibley and Cikialuk will begin thinking of returning to the scene of the water hazards and rough.

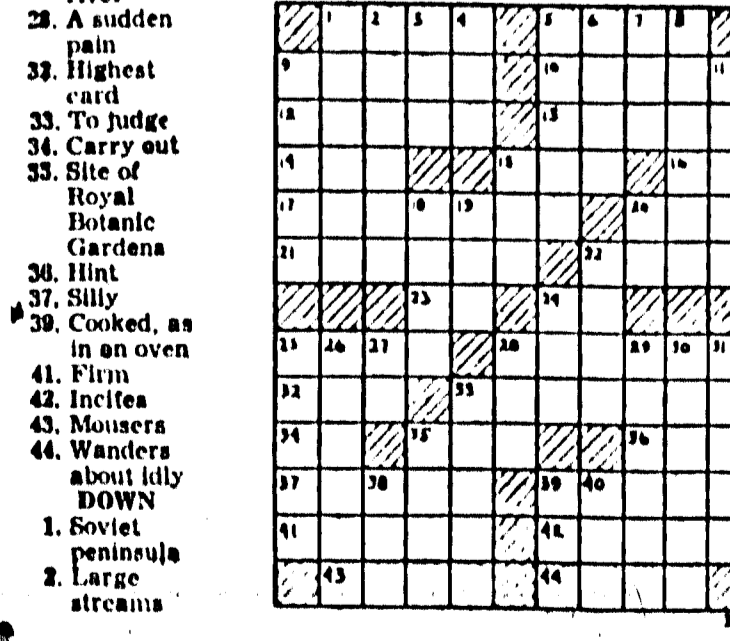

Net Federal Debt Zooms; \$50 for Each Canadian

OTTAWA (CP)—The net federal debt shot up during the last year by nearly \$50 for each Canadian, according to a bookkeeping addition to government statistics.

The net federal debt at the end of the fiscal year was \$12,216,000,000, an increase of \$585,000,000 from the previous year. The remaining \$521,000,000 was added to the debt to cover an actual deficiency of \$1,385,000,000.

MLA Demands Retirement Of Kamloops Consultant

VICTORIA (CP)—A New part of a planned NDP "near Democratic Party member of campaign" demanded the retirement of a department of highways life consultant at Kamloops.

Overwork "Killed Pilot"

ST. CATHARINES, Ont. (CP)—The Corporation of Great Lakes Pilots charged here Tuesday that the death of a pilot in the Welland Canal in 1961 was the direct result of overwork.

In a brief presented to the royal commission on maritime pilotage, the corporation said working conditions in the Welland Canal — Lake Erie-Sarcelle area are the worst of any portage district in Canada.

The corporation's brief said area pilots are treated like boys by their employer, the federal transport department, and have no voice in policy decisions on pilotage.

It said that a pilot who died at lock Number 1 on the Welland Canal in 1961 was an overwork victim.

He had been up all the way from Milwaukee to the place where he died, a distance of 700 miles, it said.

WORKED IN FOG The brief pointed out that in addition to piloting the vessel in the Welland Canal, the pilot had to be in charge of Lake Huron and Lake Erie.

It appears that in the department's chain of command, no one is willing to put his signature to any document of responsibility for fear of reprisals from above, the corporation charged.

The measure provides that constituencies could have a population 20 per cent above or below the provincial average. She urged that this "tolerance" figure be increased to 25 per cent to prevent a sharp drop in representation from rural areas.

Licensing Said Only Alternative To TV Ads—And That's Unpopular

OTTAWA (CP)—The only alternative to advertising on television is a return to a license fee and the public doesn't want this, it was stated Wednesday before the Board of Broadcast Governors by the president of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters.

"TV is not all that profitable," said Mr. Jamieson, vice president of CIBG-TV St. John's. "Many stations still are skating close to the limit."

Prairie People On Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Population increases of more than seven per cent in Calgary and Edmonton have been estimated two years after the June 1 census of 1961 and these lead a trail of 11 metropolitan areas, the bureau of statistics reported today.

Thief Pawns Stolen Goods

VANCOUVER (CP)—A man who stole \$1,033 worth of merchandise from his employer and pawned most of it in Kamloops has been returned to two years in prison.
