As it was, the Mozart and the Grieg Sonatas were exasperating because we could not always hear the violin. The Grieg, which is seldom heard has passion and fire and the technical control necessary to make it speak, its

As for the addition of the Irish Harp and Mrs. Raiston's singing of the old folksongs; we do not see where this sort of thing has any place on a program made up of the music of Bach, Mozart, Grieg and Chopin, If Mrs. Ralston had a voice it might be another matter. We can hear the finest in folksinging any night on TV.

Sandys in Bad Spot: Some Nations Need Help

Now the panic is over, east African leaders are gradually coming to grips with the unpleasant fact they must rely on outside help to keep the peace. The problem is: How much help, and from what source?

Britain's Commonwealth Secretary Duncan Sandys is charged with the delicate task of helping find some scheme politically acceptable to prime numisters Kenyatta of Kenya, Obote of Uganda and President Sycrete of Tan-

So far, the three Africans seem undecided on what form of assistance they can accept graviously to offset any repetition of the niutinies among their own armed forces that recently almost toppled their governments.

It was a grave embarrassment, so soon after independence from Britain, for them to have to call in British troops to restore order. Now they are seeking the most painless way of guaranteeing security in a region that China's Chou En-Lai recently described as ripe for revolution.

Britain is anxious to help, but there is a limit to how far she can go in accepting responsibility without seeming to be helping keep a government in power by force.

Sandys has given some indication he has the outline of a plan for some form of Commonwealth Trire Brigade" a mobile force ready to go to any troubled spot.

The prerequisite, of course, is that any such force would have to be acceptable to the African countries. It would be a force drawn from all Commonaeath countries or restricted to African countries alone.

The Prime Minister's proposals for expediting the business of Parliament ery out to be adopted; and it seems most likely that they will be adopted with little opposition except from the small tringe of members who still equate parliamentarianism with long recitation of trivia and procedural haggling.

If there is one thing the members are likely to have learned during the recent recess it is that their constiuents resent pettifogging waste of public time, and that the resentment has increased in proportion to last year's raise in the members' pay. Further, the official Opposition can scarcely obstruct changes in procedure the bulk of which, in other circumstances, it has itself favored.

Settling Argument For Group Of TOPS

Dear Dr. Molner: Please settle a friendly argument in our TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly) Club. Though we all know that a calorie is a calorie. some of us feel that if taken in protein form it is used up faster and helps us to lose weight.

Others say it doesn't matter if you eat, for instance, two boiled eggs at 140 calories or a sweet roll at 140 calories; as long as your daily intake is 1,000 calories or less you'll lose weight. Does this make any difference? - B.N.

The ones who favor protein foods are right, but for the wrong reason .

Yes, 1,000 calories are 1,000 calories, and a calorie, in whatever form, represents the same amount of energy, whether it is used up to keep you warm, or to support your physical activity, or to be transformed into body fat and stored.

Whether the calories come from protein or starch doesn't make any difference from that

However, the food you aat doesn't always reach your stomach and digestive tract in a form which can be converted instantly into calories. Sugars and starches rapidly reach the blood stream in the form of blood sugar.

Protein, on the other hand, is converted more slowly by the digestive processes. That's why protein foods satisfy the appetite for a somewhat longer time. Hence they help a person who is trying to maintain a reducing

that amino acids in protein, the basic "building blocks" of the body, are important for sound health. Starchy foods alone will give you calories but will not furnish all the nutrients for keeping bone, muscle and other tissues in good condition,
