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
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

# Auto Manufacturers' Position Puzzling

The Motor Vehicles Manufacturers' Association, over the signature of the president, E. K. Brownridge, has issued a statement supporting "the objectives of the agreement between the governments of Canada and the United States concerning trade and production in automotive products.

However, the statement goes on to say: "While, as a result of the agreement, there could be a narrowing of the cost differential between vehicles produced in Canada and the United States over a period of years, no such narrowing will be possible for some time. The inflationary forces in current labor contracts in several industries could be felt before the economics of the agreement come into effect.

"Attaining the objectives," the statement continues, "will require longterm plans for new and heavy capital investment by motor vehicle and parts manufacturers. . . New markets must be developed for expanded production. No early change in the pattern of production or in the volume of imported vehicles can be expected because Canadian vehicle production must at least continue its current relation to import levels. Lower costs of vehicle production will come about only when Canadian-produced composents become competitive in world markets. Time will be necessary to adjust to the new regulation, respecting the industry; and a long time will be needed to reach the final objective of car and truck production at world competitive levels."

In its statement the MVMA seems to be saying just about the same thing that had been said a few days earlier by the president of American Motors and fully endursed by the president of the International Harvester Company, that the hope of achieving any early reduction in Canadian automobile prices from the arrangement was just a "sheer fallacy" and that "prices have a greater chance of being incraesed than decreased."

This is puzzling in that the whole purpose of the agreement is—or is supposed to be—to enable Canadian producers to operate on a larger and more efficient scale.

For decades a great many Canadian manufacturing industries have complained that their productive efficiency -their ability to achieve minimum costs—has been thwarted by the existence of a United States tariff structure which has documenated heavily against the importation of highly manufactured good into that country, and by the relatively small size of the Canadian domestic market on which Canadian manufacturers have therefore been compelled to rely.

The latter argument that the Canadian market is too small in itself to permit the attainment of minimum manufacturing costs per unit has probably been overworked but nevertheless it does carry some element of truth.

But it has long been argued that if Canadian manufacturers could obtain favorable access to the huge U.S. mass market, much of Canadian industry could achieve low per unit manufacturing costs. This in turn would bring lower prices and through them a much more competitive position both in Canada and in foreign markets.

Taking this argument of Canadian manufacturers at its face value, one might suppose that the main economic effect of the agreement in automotive production would be to establish precisely the conditions our manufacturers have sought for years as the essential requirement for their more efficient productive operations.

No one supposes, of course, that such a free-made agreement should work smoothly overnight and prices be reduced immediately. (Nor should they dealers must be given a chance to get rid of their used car stocks. purchased at higher prices.) Our relatively small-by international standards—automotive industry must be safeguarded over the transition period which will be necessary for it to expand its operations. It should then be in a position to meet its established large-scale counterpart in the United States on a competitive basis. This, however, is a far cry from the suggestion that greater specialization in automotive production will result in not lower but higher prices.

If this he the case, surely we should thus like the plague any further elforts at achieving greater specialization and improved efficiency in the structure of Canadian production, for our doubtful reward will come in the

form of higher prices. Canada has long had a policy of protection for her industries, behind which they have been comfortably but inefficiently developed. But it has yet to be demonstrated that our traditional tarill protection has ever brought lower prices and higher living standaids to the Canadian people.

We should not have to werry too

much about this It is good that the youth of our country is examining our central instrtutions; it is good that they are grawing on controversial subjects and nourishing their intellects on the meat and marrow of them.

It would have been sad to deprive the youth who burned and bled in the Battle of Britain from having had the pleasure of endorsing pacificism in the years before the Second Great War.

These young Liberals have discussed the Crown and its place in the Canadian was of life in a sophemoric way—and in a negative way. When one wants to do away with something of value, there must be presented an alternative of apparently greater value. This the university Liberals do not seem to have profiered.

It is easy to argue that the Crown, as it is represented in the Commonwealth today, is an anachronism. It can be argued, in a sophomorie way, that the monarchy is little more than **a symbol** and a cipher. This argument can be put forward with force. But it is wrong.

We have to distinguish between multiple symbols. Members of the Royal Family, as people, dedicate themselves to the duty of exemplifying what we like to think of as Christian family life. Not all of them have had the fortitude or stamina to live up

to the exacting standards which we impose upon them; but others within the Royal Family have come forward to take over the burdens which some were unable to carry.

The role of each member of the House of Windsor in the conduct of the affairs of the Commonwealth is unenviable. Privacy is denied them. Duties are arduous. Family life is a luxury which they may enjoy only occasionally. They live constantly in the eye of the public and the camera.

It is true that the Sovereign no longer rules; and so one could say that the head of state in Canada and her sister Dominions is vestigial and un-

But what would we do if we removed the symbol of the Crown from our way of government? Though the Crown has little authority but acts as a servant of the people, it does serve as an apparent veneer over the rough edges of political conflict with which we live from day to day.

In our Parliament, in our courts, in our public services, it symbolizes an institution which is above the rivalries and self-interest of ward politics and ambitions of power. Like so many institutions that we

inherited from the British, the Crown may seem unnecessary and anachronistic—but it works.

This part of the machinery of our government costs us nothing.
