Of interest during National Mothers' March. The club also assists the Kinsmen in the operation of the Regatta Midway. This is combined with the management of a food tent which serves meals to more than 100 Kinsmen and Kinettes over the four days of Regatta; and further in line of direct assistance is one Kinsmen dinner meeting catered to by the Kinettes each year.

Conventions have also played a big part in the history of the Kelowna Kinettes who assisted the Kinettes in hosting the 1961 District Convention, and the 1962 National Convention, and who are now working at an ever-increasing pace on plans for the 1965 District Convention to be held in Kelowna in May.

# Space Medical Research Finds Cause Of Motion Sickness

NEW YORK (AP) — Space medical research has turned up a cause of motion sickness. The finding can help the search for better drugs to combat seasickness, air sickness or even space-flight sickness, Dr. Eugene Konecni said today. The research has found that one antibiotic produces a numbing effect on organs within the ear that give rise to the motion sickness sensation, he said, and tests are under way to learn how much of this drug might be a threat to a patient's sense of balance.

Konecni, of the National Aeronautics and Space Council, told the New York State Medical Society about studies conducted by Dr. Ashton Graybiel and associates of the U.S. Naval School of Aviation Medicine. He said Graybiel had found that the motion sickness sensation comes from hair cells that detect the motion of fluids in canals of the inner ear. Other experiments showed abnormal functioning of the eye is related to certain uncontrolled movements of the eye. The eye has a tendency to resist any change in its vertical or up-and-down axis, and undergoes jerking motions when the head is tilted. Now a test has been devised to measure this effect precisely, Konecni said. This provides an eye test to measure normal or abnormal functioning of the inner ear.

# Group Of Italian Actors Concede With Ban On Controversial Play

ROME (AP) — A group of Italian actors bowed to a city government ban on the play "The Deputy" after giving one performance of the controversial play behind the closed doors of a Rome bookstore.

The Rome prefecture banned the play by West German writer Rolf Hochhuth after the Vatican radio and newspaper attacked efforts by Gian Maria Volontè and a group of actors to stage the play. It questions whether Pope Pius XII did all he could to save the Jews from the Nazis.

"We made our point," said Volontè. "We wanted to show we had a right to put the play on here. We'll meet later to decide what to do next." Volontè suggested his group might try to stage "The Deputy" outside Rome, since the ban applies only to the city.

In banning the play, the prefecture cited the 1929 Lateran Concordat that established relations between the government of Italy and the Vatican State. It recognizes a special status for Rome as the centre of Roman Catholicism and obliges the Italian state to protect the papacy from "public offense and injury."

Volontè's troupe tried first to present the play before an invited audience Saturday night in an improvised theatre. The police prevented that performance on the grounds Volontè had

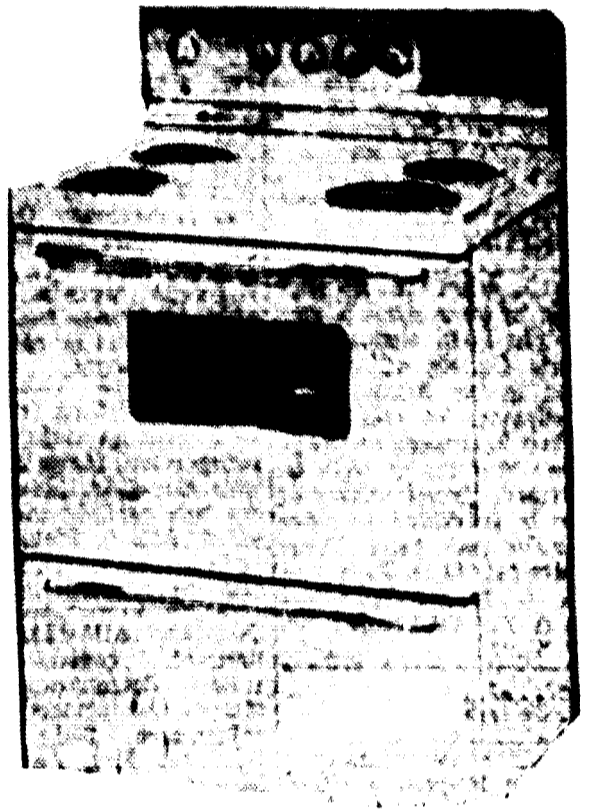
