THIRTY-NINTH BIENNIAL REPORT

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES MISSISSIPPI STATE HOSPITAL

TO THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI:

We, the Board of Trustees of the Mississippi State Hospital, hereby submit our Biennial Report covering the period from July 1, 1931, through June 30, 1933.

During this period the present Board of Trustees has only been in control of the institution since July 1, 1932. Therefore, we cannot give a detailed report of the management of the institution prior to July 1st of last year.

The present Board of Trustees has followed a policy of rigid economy in directing the institution. We have consolidated places, abolished all positions which we consider useless, and have done everything within our power to economize and save the State every possible dollar. The appropriation for this biennium was approximately \$300,000.00 less than for the previous one. There is approximately the same number of patients to care for as was in the institution during the previous biennium. In spite of this decrease in our appropriation and the fact that approximately the same number of patients is being cared for, we have effected a savings of approximately \$32,000.00 under the appropriation. Our per capita cost is approximately \$109.00 per annum which is the lowest per capita cost in the history of the institution.

There have been several improvements, to which we point with pride. The most beneficial was the increasing of the dairy herd by 47 head of pure bred Holstein milchcows which were purchased in Mississippi and in Wisconsin. These cattle have increased the milk production of the institution from approximately 5,000 gallons to 15,000 gallons per month. As a result, the patients are getting more milk to drink than at any other time in the life of this institution.

The buildings of the institution have been kept in the best possible repair.

Our capable manager of the Rankin County Farm, Mr. L. S. Massengale, is cultivating approximately 800 acres of land, which is 100 more acres than has been cultivated by the institution at any time in its history. Practically all of this land is being cultivated by patient labor.

We proudly call to your attention the General Hospital, Occupational Therapy Department and T. B. Camps. We also call your attention to the herds of beef and dairy cattle, the flocks of poultry, the hog farm, and the truck farm.

It has been the policy of Mr. J. G. Jones, our very competent and capable steward, to help in every possible way Mississippi farmers by buying direct from the producers native meat, home grown syrup and all Mississippi farm products not grown at the institution.

The patients of the institution are being kindly and humanely treated, well fed and well clothed. Due to the untiring services rendered by Dr. Mitchell and our very capable Staff of Doctors, we believe more patients are cured at this institution than at any other institution of its kind in the South.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Honorable Board of Trustees:

The thirty-ninth biennial report of the Superintendent for the two years ending June 30, 1933 is herewith respectfully submitted. On account of economy, as well as kindness to the members of the legislature who are supposed to read this report, it was suggested by the secretary of the Budget Commission that I make my report as brief and as concise as possible. For this reason I will not go into detail and make as full report as has formerly been done.

POPULATION MOVEMENT

At the beginning of the Biennium there were 3,360 patients on the books of whom 1,640 were white and 1,720 colored. We admitted during the biennium 2,222 patients of whom 1,092 were white and 1,130 colored, having therefore treated during the two years 5,582 patients. We discharged during the two years 1,558 of whom 1,030 were white and 528 colored. Died during the two years 625 patients of whom 203 were white and 422 colored, leaving on our books June 30, 1933 3,399 patients of whom 1,499 were white and 1,900 colored. There were on parole June 30, 1933 837 patients of whom 404 were white and 433 colored, leaving in the institution on June 30, 1933 2,562 patients, 1,095 of whom were white and 1,467 colored.

The principal psychoses of those admitted were Manic Depressive, Demetia Praecox, Senile Psychosis, Psychosis with Cerebral Arteriosclerosis, General Paralysis, Epileptic Psychosis, Psychosis with Somatic Disease, Alcoholic Psychosis and Psychosis due to Drugs.

The principal psychosis of those who died were Senile Arteriosclerosis, Manic Depressive, Dementia Praecox, Epilepsy and General Paralysis. The principal causes of death were Arteriosclerosis, Endo and Myo-carditis, Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Chronic Nephritis, General Paralysis, Epilepsy, Pellagra and Apoplexy.

The general health conditions have been remarkably good throughout the two years. I have been fortunate in having a very competent and efficient Medical Staff who have been painstaking, energetic and conscientious in their work. With our wards and all departments crowded far beyond their normal capacity, with the admission of so many patients, most undesirable; brought to our doors as a last resort with little or no hope

of recovery, because of the ability and faithfulness of my doctors our death rate has been greatly reduced and our discharges much increased. Notwithstanding these adverse conditions they have made our entire population fairly comfortable.

The work of the hospital continues much the same as in the past. All patients are visited morning and evening by the ward physician and all new admissions upon their arrival are given a preliminary mental and physical examination, and are examined especially as to acute disability. All surgical operations are performed in the hospital building by members of the Staff. On admission each patient is given a thorough examination, physical, neurological and complete laboratory tests are made and the results are made a basis for appropriate treatment. Careful records and histories are kept on all patients. All patients admitted are given anti-typhoid serum.

This report is accompanied by statistical tables prepared by the Mental Hygiene Commission showing the number of patients admitted, discharged and died; and also the classification of the several forms of mental illness, etc.

PSYCHIATRIC ACTIVITIES

Staff meetings have been conducted every morning except Sunday as in the past when all new cases are presented for diagnosis and outline of treatment, as well as representation for consideration of parole. Staff conference is held daily in the Superintendent's office when happenings on the wards such as illnesses, accidents, etc., are brought to the attention of the Superintendent. Malaria inoculations have continued as in the past, which are followed up by the usual anti-syphilitic treatment, and besides, excellent results are being had from the Diathermy treatments. Hydrotherapy, continuous baths and packs, are used regularly for their quieting and sedative effects. No mechanical restraints have been used for years.

For sometime we have attempted to sterilize those patients who are returned home and it is to be hoped that in the future every patient who comes to the institution before they return to their home will be sterilized in order to lessen the mental disorders which will be handed down to future generations, and thereby save the State of the burden of caring for an increased number of mental cases.

Occupational Therapy continues as in the past with several new workers. More patients have been selected by the physicians for this line of treatment and every effort is being made to stimulate interest. Congenial employment, as well as the occupation of the patient, is one of the most important, if not the most valuable agent, of our treatment. There are many well diversified interests to be found in a well equipped hospital. In enabling the patient to engage in the work best suited for his taste it is affording the greatest opportunity we have for his contentment, betterment and recovery. Large numbers of patients are engaged every day in some manner in one or more of the activities of the hospital. To those whose conditions are such that they must remain in the hospital this form of employment adds much to their general health and in making their lives endurable. Others are assigned to industrial work which occupies so large a place and also as a method of treatment. Still others with a greater possibility of recovery are usefully and pleasantly occupied in the Occupational Department where the work is carefully selected and assigned to the beginners and where the work, as mental improvement is shown, is increased. The beautiful products turned out in this department in these different classes are remarkable, the more so when it is considered that many of them know nothing of art work. The recovery of many of these patients and the improved conditions of others is ample returns and justifies the painstaking efforts on the part of the instructors. Many entertainments are provided consisting of parties, dances, games, picnics and other forms of amusement. Church services are conducted regularly every Sunday by the different ministers of Jackson.

DENTAL, X-RAY AND LABORATORY DEPARTMENTS

The dental department is one of the busiest departments in the institution and the work of Dr. Berry is eminently satisfactory. The laboratory and X-ray work has been of untold value and I feel that we are doing better work along this line than is to be found in most institutions.

SOCIAL SERVICE DEPARTMENT

This department under the direction of Mrs. H. J. McInnis is still doing satisfactory work. There are three conditions which the social worker attempts to correct, mainly, to prevent the

commitment of patients who can be cured at home, to assist the patients while in the hospital and to supervise the patients after leaving the institution. For the last year more attention has been given by the Director in making preparole investigations and for this reason more patients are sent home with fewer returns. One who is not fully conversant with the extensive influence exercised by the social worker for the good of the patients cannot realize the full importance of the work.

OTHER DEPARTMENTS

The carpenter, engineering and laundry departments have all been busy and in the hands of competent and efficient directors, and the work in each of these departments has been entirely satisfactory.

The garden, the farm, the hog farm, and the dairy departments have shown splendid results, and the State should be proud, and the Legislature satisfied with what is accomplished in these departments.

Mr. J. G. Jones, the Steward, has been in charge of the business office for the past year and has carefully and energetically supervised the business affairs of the institution. I feel that the hospital is fortunate in having such a man to look after its business affairs. He has been painstaking and energetic in the discharge of his duties, and has made a faithful, efficient and loyal official. Accompanied with this report you will find the report of Mr. Jones showing the expenditures of the money.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

I wish to take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation for the goodness and generosity of the friends of the sick and afflicted who have given of their time, talent and worldly goods in order to bring comfort, contentment and happiness to our patients. Many organizations have donated gifts and entertainments. Individuals and all grades of society have contributed according to their ability and in many ways brought happiness to those in need, and on behalf of these sick people I hereby tender my most earnest thanks to all these friends and outside world for the services they have rendered to our patients.

It is to be hoped that before another year ends we will be enabled to move to the new hospital where the unhappy portion of our fellow-beings, who are by visitation of Providence deprived

of their reason, will find a safe retreat and be provided with whatever may be conducive to their comfort and restoration to a sound state of mind. There is perhaps no phase of human life that shows greater progress up to the present or greater hope for the future than that concerned with treatment of mental disorders and maintenance of mental health. We know that many mental diseases properly treated are curable, and that sickness of the mind is, in ever increasing number of cases, just as susceptible to scientific treatment as sickness of the body. Reason is a priceless possession. To restore reason, to bring light out of darkness, to maintain mental stability is a mission worthy of every cent of money, of every ounce of effort that can be marshalled to that end; and because this service for humanity can and will be most intelligently and effectively performed in the new hospital is why in years to come this hospital will prove to be a blessing to suffering humanity and a pride to all patriotic Mississippians.

CONCLUSION

As I come to the end of my sixteenth year of service in this institution with a deep sense of honor that has been conferred upon me these many years and the responsibility that has been placed in my keeping for the safe-guarding of this institution in all that it implies, I wish again to express my gratitude for the kind, generous and personal relations I have enjoyed. To my Staff, resident officer, and all employees who have gone far beyond requirements of their positions in order to do just a little bit more, many, many times over, because they saw a way to be of service to the people who so sorely needed help, I wish to extend sincere thanks. And to the members of the Board of Trustees, individually and collectively, who have always been alert to the interest of the hospital and have devoted unceasing efforts to promote the welfare of the patients, and have encouraged the officials and employees with their enthusiasm; for their work and their cooperation in all plans for better service, I am indeed grateful.
