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rape In late Roman law, rape was among the most heinous offences, punished by death without amnesty. A harsh statute of Constantine on *raptus* (*CTh.* 9.24.1) aimed at abduction marriage rather than rape, penalizing also the girl regardless of her consent. Rape and violent abduction were common in the post-Roman west, although they were serious crimes in all Germanic codes. In Persian law, rape was punished by a fine.
