Course Description

This course offers an overview of Montana politics and government, with a focus on the state's political history, constitutional structure, political institutions, campaigns and elections, and contemporary policy issues. Upon successful completion of this course, students should: 1) understand the origins and nature of Montana's constitutional system; 2) appreciate key moments in Montana political history and how they have influenced the state's contemporary political culture and public policy debates; 3) and have improved their research, writing, and oral presentation skills.

Required Text and Other Readings

The following book is required for this course:

• Mike Dennison, *Inside Montana Politics* (History Press, 2019).

Additionally, there will be three other types of readings, all of which will be posted on the course's Moodle website: 1) additional readings listed on the syllabus; 2) a weekly selection of written material and other multi-media content, most of which will focus on this year's campaigns and elections; and 3) additional background materials in preparation for sessions with guests.

- 1. Weekly Reaction Outlines (33.3% of final grade); due weekly prior to class
- 2. Campaign Strategy Memo or Policy Memo (33.3% of final grade); due Friday, November 20
- 3. Class Participation (33.3% of final grade)

Students wishing to enroll in this co-requisite option must meet with the instructor prior to starting their project to discuss its aim, scope, sources, and style. Such a meeting should occur in the first few weeks of the semester.
