This course is an interdisciplinary course of the New York and New Jersey Education and Research Center. Priority registration is given to NYNJERC Trainees. Others may register with permission of course instructor.

Course Description: This course provides a review of major industrial processes and health hazards associated with each. Includes site visits to metropolitan NY/NJ industrial facilities during working hours. Trainees will learn key concepts of industrial hygiene and safety, including hazard recognition and control methods.

Selected Concentration Competencies Addressed: Each Concentration identifies competencies for each degree offered. The competencies addressed in this course for the MPH in Environmental Health Sciences:

- Describe the major environmental health problems facing the general public as well as among specific communities or susceptible, vulnerable sub-populations
- Specify current environmental risk assessment approaches and methods for a particular hazard or risk in a community
- Describe the federal and state regulatory programs relating to environmental (community) protection
- Identify occupational safety and health issues in the workplace
- Apply federal and state regulatory standards which are related to worker safety and health protection.

Course Objectives: By the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify exposure mechanisms to occupational safety and health hazards in industrial facilities
- Develop a basic risk assessment plan for the characterization, management, and remediation of health and safety hazards

Special Circumstances During COVID-19 (For Spring 2021)

The School of Public Health recognizes that students may experience challenges or be negatively impacted due to the COVID-19 pandemic, mental and emotional health toll from systemic racism, altered personal and professional obligations, and other crises existing at the moment in our local, national, and global communities. Students are encouraged to discuss these challenges and circumstances with their instructor, if they feel they may need additional support or temporary accommodations at the beginning or during this course. Course Requirements and Grading:

- Reaction papers: Each student must prepare a reaction paper for each site visited. The
 reaction paper will be a maximum of 350 words. The paper will capture your reaction to
 the safety and health practices at the site, based on the hazards, worker exposures, and
 control methods in place at the site. These will be discussed on the video conferences.
 Class participation and discussion is an important part of the class. Late papers will not be
 accepted and you will receive 0 points.
- Hazard abatement memo: Each student must complete one hazard abatement memos
 from the sites visited during this course. Following the completion of the site visit you are
 required to write a two-page memo, from the perspective of a worker, outlining one particular
 hazard present, its potential health effects, and recommended control(s) to mitigate
 exposure.
- Online discussion board: Each week questions will be posted to Canvas. You are required to respond to the questions I post, and respond to at least one of your classmates post.
- Class participation: Discussion and interaction between students is an important part of
 this class. Engaging in discussion is critical to understanding the interdisciplinary aspects of
 occupational safety and health. Being prepared for the site visits, and asking questions of
 our site visit hosts is also an important way to gain knowledge. Your participation will be
 graded based on attendance, participation in discussions, and questions/comments
 provided at each site visit.



- Group presentation: Each student will be assigned into a group. Your group will be
 responsible for creating an interdisciplinary in-class presentation. The presentation shall be
 60 minutes in length (timing will be part of the grading). Be sure to address industrial
 hygiene, safety, ergonomics, and medical aspects in your presentation. The presentation
 shall include:
 - Introduction to/description of the site
 - Basic information about the facility (for example)
 - Location
 - Number of employees
 - Annual sales, etc.
 - Violations found by OSHA or other official inspectors
 - Process map
 - o Hazards/how are hazards identified?
 - o Controls/What controls are in place? Were they adequate?
 - Health effects of industry and specific site visited
 - Recommendations for improvements in worker health and safety in the plant or facility.
