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Tackling childhood obesity by implementing an integrated care approach

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Introduction

This study evaluated an integrated care approach focusing on intersectoral collaboration aimed to tackle childhood overweight.

Method

- **Fourteen professionals** from the three sectors were interviewed.
- Face to face semi-structured interviews
- To determine in and outside sector collaboration, perceived outcomes and hindering and facilitating factors.

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Key messages

- In daily practice professionals experience structural factors hindering network collaboration as required for an integrated care approach.
- Specific attention for organizational aspects is required to optimalize the functioning of networks linking professionals from public health, medical and social domains, essential in preventing childhood overweight.



- Collaboration within each sector was adequately established. All were in contact with the central care provider. However, minimal contact with social domain partners was reported.
- Hindering factors: the complexity of childhood overweight, not knowing network partners, unclarity in referrals, feedback, roles and responsibilities. Also, frequent changes in policy and personnel, lack of a visible leader, funding and time.
- **Facilitating factors**: a positive attitude towards intersectoral collaboration, short communication lines, a shared vision, trusting each other's expertise, and formalized agreements and periodic meetings with partners.
