Evidently the November issue of <u>The Maine Alumnus</u> was late in publication for mine just arrived yesterday. As usual I read nearly all of it from cover to cover. I was much interested in the interview with you on "The Distinguished Lecture Series."

They do not realize they must be concerned because they are Americans and America has a problem. According to the 1960 census only one third of one per cent of the population of Maine is negro. I hope your symposium is a great success on the basis of student involvement.

I have a Massachusetts granddaughter who is a freshman at Maine this year and is completely enthusiastic about her experiences there. I hope that her cousin, a grandson of mine, whose home as determined by his father's work in the Foreign Service, is in Jerusalem, may be at Maine next year.

My very best wishes to you. May your term as Student Senate President be all that your personal goals have set for it, even unto those things you do not put in words but are in your heart and mind.
