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## NOTE

The first issue of the consolidated index, the publication of which is directed by section 62 of the act of January 12, 1895, was that for the first session of the Fifty-fourth Congress. It was published in March, 1897, and received with favor by those who have had occasion to use it. No adverse criticism of it has thus far reached the ears of the compiler. He has therefore felt fully warranted in preparing this (the second) number on the same general plan, adding, however, a set of tables which will enable the user to trace the documents and reports by number as well as by subject, title, or author.

This Index to Congressional documents is not an index to the daily action or proceedings of Congress. That function is filled by the index to the Congressional Record which contains those proceedings. The present volume indexes those papers which do not appear in the Record, but which Congress orders to be printed separately from it. When printed and numbered consecutively in four series, namely, Senate documents and reports of Senate committees, House documents and reports of House committees, these papers form the set of volumes of the public records known as the "Congressional reserve." As this Congressional set supplements the Congressional Record, so this Index supplements and completes the Congressional Record index. The Record index directs the inquirer to the proceedings in either branch of Congress when committee-reports or communications from other departments of the Government or from private parties were presented. The present Index gives the directions necessary to find the text of such reports or communications.

In this Index an entry of every document or report may be found in at least three places, namely: Under the name of the Senator, Representative, or Delegate, if any, who presented it; under the Committee, if any, which prepared it; and especially under its subject or subjects. Under the name of each member of Congress may be found the number and title of every document and report he presented. Under the name of each Committee can be found the number and title of every report made by that Committee. Under the subject is noted every printed paper bearing on that subject which is numbered in the Congressional set. In each of these entries, not only the number of the document or report, but also the number of the volume in which it will finally be bound in the sheep-bound "Congressional reserve" set, is given, and in the case of committee-reports also the number of the bill or resolution upon which the report is based. Those public documents not numbered in the Congressional set can not lawfully be included in this Document Index, but the Document Catalogue (or "comprehensive index"), also issued from this office, is wider in its scope, and should be consulted when references to the Congressional Record index and to this Index fail to satisfy an inquiry.
