Dear Governor:

We have experienced considerable expense in some instances in sending legal representatives to represent the State of Georgia in extradition proceedings in other states.

Sometimes, after a requisition is granted, a habeas corpus is filed, and when this is done, it is necessary for the State seeking extradition to send a legal representative.

We recognize, of course, that so long as a requisition for extradition is pending before a Governor, it is the duty of the Law Department of such state to render such assistance to the Governor as they may be called upon to render.

After the Governor has granted a requisition, we see no objection to the Law department of that state representing the State seeking extradition.

If a mutual arrangement of this kind could be made, it would in some instances save considerable expense and inconvenience.

The Law Department of this State would be very glad to represent any State seeking to extradite a man from Georgia after the Governor of Georgia has filed the requisition, should any subsequent court proceedings be had.

I am also writing to ask if you see any objection to a mutual agreement of this kind.
