Dear Sir:

The Law firm of Nilles, Oehlert and Nilles, Fargo, North Dakota, who represent the International Harvester Co. in this case has written Sheeiff L. R. Kerling of Sargent County that they are advised that the State's Attorney and the Sheriff will now recommend to the Governor that the Mortorium be lifted so that this foreclosure can proceed.

It is my understanding that the Rehaks intend to move to town and discontinue their farming operations. If I am not mistaken the Rehaks will agree to allow the Int. Harvester Co to take their farm machinery, to-wit: a tractor and binder without any further difficulty. But, if the Rehaks intend to continue farming operations and have use for this tractor and binder, I do not recommend that the Mortorium be lifted.

I would suggest that you centact Frank and Edma Rehak, postoffice address, Forman, North Dakota and determine from them if they intend to discontinue farming operations and if they are willing to deliver the above described farm machinery to the International Harvester Company.
