

TRI-COLLEGE FUNDS APPROVED

"Gentlemen's Agreement" To Support Concept At a recent meeting T the Board of Directors of the Tri-College University formally approved the 1971-72 budgetsubmitted to them by Provost A1 Anderson and the three commissioners.


The three institutions thus expressed sufficient confidence in the Tri-College concept, and in Anderson's performance as Coordinating Provost, to arrive at a gentleman's agreement, as President Joseph Knutson of Concordia, put it to support the consortium even if this means that all operating costs have to be paid by the schools involved.

The Board informally agreed to support the Provost's Office for the 1972-73 fiscal year, by which time the basic Hill Foundation grant will have expired. highly complimentary in its remarks about the job done by Dr. Anderson in getting the consortium off the ground. In commenting on an item in the proposed budget which would have provided funds to bring in consultants from the outside, President Roland Dille of Moorhead State College noted that, "There pro+ bably isn't anyone in the country who knows more about cooperative arrangements among colleges than Al Anderson."

The Board's action is important in that it assures all involved in tri-college projects that there will be a measure of continuity even after foundation money runs out. It is hoped, by Board members. that new sources of funding can be obtained from other foundations and from the federal government The Board has made it clear, though, that the future of the Tri-College University will not depend on obtaining these funds.

Composed of the presidents of the three institutions, Dr. Anderson, and

Summer At SU

North Dakota State University operates all year on a quarter basis. Summer Quarter courses are offered in two 5-week sessions, a full 11-week quarter, and in special sessions of varying lengths. By enrolling in both 5-week sessions, a student may earn up to 18 hours credit.

Nine credit hours is the maximum load for one 5-week session. A 3-credit lecture course in the 5-week session usually meets 60 minutes each week day which is equivalent to the time required in a full quarter. Higher credit courses meet proportionately longer.

Credits earned in the Summer Quarter are applicable to all degrees awarded by the University.

Admission is complete and IBM cards available only after a for mal certificate of admission or permit to register has been received by the student.

Any student, new or former, who arrives on Registration Day without a Master Card having been made up will be required to rehister as much as two days late because of machine time required for card make-up.


Registration will take place in the Old Field House from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m to 4 p.m. on June 9, and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m., the afternoon of July 16 for the First and Second Sessions respectively Faculty advisors will be in the old Field House at the same time.

A matriculation fee of \$6 is assessed students at their initial registration in the University.

Registration fees for summer work are \$10 per credit hour for North Dakota residents and \$18 per credit hour for nonresidents.

Every student must have an TBM Student Master Card in order toregister.

New students will have a Master Carl available to them in the lobby of the Old Field House only if they have made formal appli-



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

are afraid to run them out. I would suggest that they go down there and clear them out (mace, clubs, bullets or dogs), then Fargo wouldn't be a hippie haven.



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
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
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
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MSC Summer Session

Starting with Summer 1971, several changes will take place in your MSC registration:

- 1. You will receive a pre-printed registration permit which will eliminate much of the need to fill out various forms.
- There will be no class cards. Instead, you will enter section numbers of desired classes on your registration permit. (<u>IMPORTANT</u>: You must be very sure to enter the correct number).
- You will receive a <u>printed schedule</u> when registration is complete. You
 must check this schedule immediately and make changes before leaving
 the registration area.
- 4. You will not pay your bill until the following day (or later if you preregister). Your printed bill will be filed at the Business Office.

ADMISSION REQUIRED BEFORE REGISTRATION

- No student (except Tri-College University) may register for classes until his application for admission has been approved by the Office of Admissions.
- Students Requesting Graduate Courses (500 and above or "g") must first be approved by the Office of Graduate Studies.

TRI-COLLEGE REGISTRATION

- Students enrolled at Moorhead State College, Concordia College, or North Dakota State University are eligible for courses at one of the other two colleges if they are concurrently registered at their home institution.
- Eligible students may register by (a) Securing a permit from your Registrar.
 (b) Submitting the permit to the Registrar at the college offering the course.
 (c) Returning the permit, if approved, to your home college registrar.

EXCEEDING 9 CREDITS

- If you seek to register for more than 9 credits, you must (a) have a cummulative GPA of 3.0 or above and (b) present an excess schedule permit signed by your advisor and by the Dean of Academic Affairs (forms available from the Office of Academic Affairs).
- 2. You may not register for more than 10 credits in either session.
