## NEW COURT STAFF FOR CEDUNA

The State Government is to upgrade the staffing of the Ceduna Court, the Premier, Mr. Dunstan, announced today.

Peaking during a visit to Ceduna, Mr. Dunstan said a public service Clerk of the Court would soon be appointed by the Department of Legal Services.

"The Clerk will take over the duties being performed on a part time basis by police officers at the moment. The appointment will give a more comprehensive service to the Court, and will allow for better use of police resources on the West Coast," the Premier said.

Depending on discussions with the Public Service Board, the new Clerk may also act as a representative of the Department of Public and Consumer Affairs, and provide a further Government service to the Ceduna area.

The Government wants to provide as many government services at the local level as possible.

"The police officers who have acted as Clerks of the Court over the years have done their jobs very well, but the Government believes police officers should be able to give as much time to police work as possible. We are trying to cut down on the extra tasks imposed on policemen in country areas".
