<u>NEW SOUTH AUSTRALIAN CABINET POSITIONS</u> :

A restructuring of the South Australian Cabinet was announced today by the Premier, Mr. Dunstan.

The move followed yesterday's election meeting of the South Australian Labor Parliamentary Caucus at which Mr. Brian Chatterton (Legislative Council Member for Midlands) and Mr. Jack Wright (House of Assembly Member for Adelaide) were elected to Cabinet positions.

The moves followed notices of intention to retire by the Minister of Labour and Industry, Mr. Dave McKee (A.L.P. Member for Port Pirie) and the Chief Secretary and Minister of Lands, Mr. Frank Kneebone (A.L.P. Legislative Council Member for Central No 1).

Mr. Dunstan said that Mr. Hudson's other special duties were to oversee the future development of the Monarto and Redcliff Projects, and the State's housing programme.

He said that it was vital that these three related areas gained the close involvement of a senior Minister.
