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

The night session is slated to open at 7:30 o'clock with Hazard playing Owensboro. A pair of Central Kentucky Conference teams, Winchester and Frankfort, the latter defending CKC champion, will ring down the curtain on the first day's activities.

Semi-finals are carded for 2 and 3:15 o'clock Saturday afternoon with University High-College Hill winner playing the Breckinridge-Clark County victor in the opener and the survivors of the two Friday night games clashing in the second tilt.

Saturday night at 8 o'clock the two semi-final losers will meet in a consolation battle for third place honors with the championship tilt slated to get under way about 9:15.

Owensboro and College High atrived today and established headquarters in the Brown-Proctor hotel. Coach Lawrence McGinnis sent his Owensboro Red Devils through a snappy workout on the Wesleyan floor and the Western Kentuckians impressed a small crowd of watchers with their aggressiveness and ball-handling ability.

If someone were to have asked me several days ago just how man times Bowling Green and College High had met on the hardwood, would have been completely stumped. However, to get the jump of the customers, I rummaged through about a dozen or more of our file; in an attempt to get a complete record on the series, my previous basketball records having been lost or misplaced after I received the "Greetings." According to the most complete record I was able to obtain, the two local schools have played 11 times during the past 16 years, all of the engagements having been in district tourney play... Of those 11 engagements Bowling Green High won nine. The first game was played in 1931, and, of course, the last meeting of the two was in the district last week. College High's first and only win before this season was in 1935 when the Cards took a 25-19 decision in the early rounds of the tourney. The two have played four times in the district championship game, with Bowling Green winning all the finals games.





Saturday's district crown was the first for the Cards since 1937, when they last won the regional meet.

In voting for Glasgow over Bowling Green as the site for the annual Fifth regional tourney, it would appear that Franklin athletic officials whacked off their noses to spite their faces, Not that Glasgow isn't a good tournament town, nor that the meet won't be properly conducted—the Glasgow gymn just isn't large enough to accommodate the crowds that are certain to flock to the tourney. Apparently the objection to holding the tournament at the Western gym was that College High, favored team in the region, had used the Western hardwood for its home encounter. However, in two meetings this season the closest the Franklin boys have

been able to come to the Cards was 14 points in a game on the Franklin court.

There is no doubt that the tournament would draw larger crowds at the Western gym, and the players would have more freedom on the court, which would be free of spectators. At the district tournament last week at Glasgow, players of both teams in the championship game were hampered by spectators crowding too close to one of the baskets at the end of the court. (Could be that Franklin became accustomed to playing among the fans in its recent tournament at Lewisburg where the crowd was out on the corners of the floor.) Another question this writer can't answer is why Franklin would choose to send the tournament 30 miles farther from its city, which undoubtedly will cause some of the Franklin followers to decide not to attend. Maybe Franklin had a deeper reason—as I have previously said, it's beyond me... When one of the College High representatives stated at the drawing Sunday that he believed the tournament would make more money in Bowling Green, Glasgow replied to the effect "We don't care about the money," and immediately the suggestion was made to divide the tournament into three sessions instead of two, with tickets for a single game to be priced at \$1.00 each for adults and 50 cents for children.

Win, Lose Or Draw With HERB WALLACE

Regional Tournament History Told Duck Ray And Dee Gibson Back In Fold Murray Beat Western Four Times In '32 Before Louisville Did It To Local Crew

If you have a few minutes to waste and care to reminisce, we'll roll back the pages about 20 years and give forth with a little regional tournament history . . . It's been a colorful event, that for the greater part of those 20 years climaxed the local high school season. Five times during the past 20 years the meet has been held outside of this city, Glasgow having entertained the tournament three times before this season and Horse Cave and Franklin once each. The meet never has produced a state champion in boys' play, but the Woodburn girls gave the region two state championship teams back in the days of D. and V. 



Members of the Board of Control along with great numbers of other school men and interested parties are becoming increasingly alarmed over the violent breaches of sportsmanship displayed at so many of the games played this season. Recent disciplinary action was taken by the Board penalizing member schools when very likely the greater portion of the blame should fall on unruly spectators over whom school authorities have little or no control. Almost vicious criticism of officials seems to have been the rule in many sections of the state—the criticisms coming from those who refuse to accept any decision that is not flagrantly favorable to the team supported by the hecklers in question. 'In most cases the most unreasonable criticism comes from those who never blew a referee's whistle and have no conception of accurate decisions. Recently newspaper columnists of our state have called attention to this sad state of affairs with the attendant warning that the whole sports program will suffer unless conditions improve.

The State High School Basketball Tournament brings together the better teams of the state; sportsmanship and conduct of all who attend should be in keeping with the type of play. The tournament gets bigger every year—it should become better as well.

Tournament History

The winners of the Kentucky State High School Tournament during 28 years have come from eighteen different schools. Representatives of the large schools have copped the lion's share of the championships, Lexington winning five times, Manual four, Ashland three, St. Xavier two and Male one.


