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The Arndt M. Stickler History Club

In ancient days students sat at the feet of the old philosophers or followed them about through gardens, in order to get the gleam of life that scholars of the age had or to hear marvelous stories of the universe, or perhaps, just to be near great and noble characters. Even so, do students of the modern age long for contact with just such noble men as those of old.

In the month of January, 1922, a group of students in the Western Normal decided that they would organize a club wherein they and others in later years, might come together in close association with their most-respected and well-loved master teacher, the ideal personality and character of every history student's ambitious dreams. It was on January 28, of that year that the organization was made and with President Cherry's consent, the Arndt M. Stickler History Club became a living entity whose purposes were: that the name and mark of Dr. Stickler might be cherished, in the years to come, by students in the Western Kentucky Teacher College, and that those who wish to make

history this major work might have opportunity for a broader field than can come from classroom recitation.

This Club was the first organization of its type on College Heights and was the only one until the fall of 1924.

Through the assistance of Miss Gabrielle Robertson a definite program was made for the rest of that first school year. Included among other interesting papers and talks was the talk made by Professor J. C. Cherry on "Kentucky History" at a meeting held around the fireide in the old "Senior House," which is our beautiful library now, one cold night in March. Mr. Cherry presented the Hill, Bowling Green, and the vicinity generally as in the days of Daniel Boone. No less pleased were the club members when Dr. Stuckler read his doctor's thesis "The Tariff of 1816." So well did the charter members like the Club, that others asked and received admittance.

Last year the Club entertained Mr. Robert, the Secretary of the Filson Club, who made an interesting talk on collecting valuable papers, such as those in the Drafes Collection. Later on, General M. M. Logan of Bowling Green, made

an address on "Henry Clay." The program for the year was centered about Kentucky History. One of the best papers given by a student was that of Miss Polly McClure who wrote on "The Four Constitutions of Kentucky." All work in the club presented by students is original research material.

According to the constitution of the club, one meeting is held on the last Saturday night of each month, but during the fall semester of this school year the third Monday and last Saturday evenings of each month were devoted to programs on Kentucky History with two programs, however, on the political fight during and directly after the War between the States.
