STEVEN GOETZ is a native of Cincinnati, Ohio, where he began his piano studies at the age of six with his father. He continued his work with Edward Zolas at the Cleveland Institute of Music and with Martin Canin at Stonybrook, SUNY. This 25-year-out plants is currently working on a Master of Music degree in piano at the University of Texas at Austin under the tutelage of Nancy Garrett. Mr. Goetz has been the featured artist under the programs of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra's Young Artists' Series and that of the Michigan Symphony Orchestra. Most recently, Mr. Goetz uon First Laureate in the Carnegie Hall Jeunesses Musicales Auditions for South Central USA, and is the holder of a Carnegie Hall-Jeunesses Musicales Certificate of Award.

IEUNESSES MUSICALES MOVEMENT was born simultaneously, but separately, in Belgium and France to maintain the morale of young people during the German occupation. The founders, who became the leaders in what was to become a great international organization, are now both deceased – Marcel Cuvelier of Belgium and Rene Nicoly of France. Immediately after the war, the two countries created the International Federation of Jeunesses Musicales (FIJM) and invited others to join them.

The principal objective of the international Jeunesses Musicales movement is to relate in every significant way the cause of good music to the lives of young people. Each member country creates its own mode of fulfilling this objective. In most cases, they make artists, ensembles and speakers available to local member chapters. They also encourage the careers of gifted young artists by means of tours on a regional, national or international level. In addition, they contribute gualified instrumentalists to the World Orchestra.

Carnegie Mall-Jeunesses Musicales is the name given to the American organization participating in the Jeunesses Musicales movement. A grant from the Ford Foundation made it possible for it to operate as a non-profit legal entity and to pursue its objectives. It has been active in many international programs of the Jeunesses Musicales movement, including the annual congresses, the World Orchestra and various competitions. The President of Carnegie Hall Jeunesses Musicales is the noted violinist, Isaac Stern.
