



Public Housing


- U.S Department of Housing and Urban Development gives federal aid to local housing agencies that manage public housing
- Agencies built cost efficient high rises to maximize the number of people to benefit
- Started in the 1950s and ends in 1974
- Intended to create safe and decent rental housing for low income families, senior citizens, and persons with disabilities
- Eligibility depends on US citizenship, immigration status, & criminal record






Racial Segregation in New York City (Map by Eric Fischer)

Crumbling Conditions

- 370 year old buildings
- At least 300,000 unmet repair requests
- ♦ \$6 Billion are needed to accomplish all repairs
- 80% of apartments have at least one deficiency
- Tenants face: mold, asbestos, inadequate or no heat/electricity
- ♦ Waiting line of 160,000 people

Easier to understand


