POSTGRADUATE TEACHING AT JEFFERSON

A doctor's education is never ended. Practicing physicians must keep abreast of medical progress. Until now, the large body of Jefferson alumni interested in taking refresher courses in various subjects have had to depend upon postgraduate courses offered by other medical institutions. On February 8, 9, and 10, 1949, the first Postgraduate Course of Instruction was given to alumni at the

Jefferson Medical College.
This course was sponsored by the Alumni Association through its Executive Committee. The success achieved by this course assures a permanent place for such courses in future years.

ni Association this spring. To help in planning the course for next year, the present committee on postgraduate instruction circulated questionnaires to the alumni taking the course. The response to the questionnaires indicated enthusiastic approval of postgraduate teaching at Jefferson. More specifically, the response to the various questions can be summarized as follows:


It was the unanimous opinion of the alumni taking the course that it was worthwhile. The great majority favored holding these courses annually. The majority thought that the course should be three days in length. A somewhat smaller number thought that the course should continue for five days or more. It was thought by many that the length of the course should depend upon the nature of the subject taught. The majority felt that large classes, such as the present one of 75 doctors, were appropriate. Several were of the opinion that some specialized subjects could be taught better to smaller groups.

A wide variety of subjects was suggested for next year. The present committee is very grateful for the many helpful suggestions and criticisms made by those attending the course. Many students thought that mimeographed summaries of the lectures, including copies of slides which contain figures, should be distributed to those attending the course. It was suggested that members of the course

be provided with a list of those attending the course, giving full name, date of graduation and home address. Elimination of evening classes was thought to be desirable. It was suggested that patients be presented to illustrate certain points in the diagnosis of the conditions discussed. The elimination of technical details of surgical treatment was urged. Many other helpful suggestions and criticisms were made which will make for improvement in next year's course.

An important step forward has been taken in initiating these postgraduate courses at Jefferson. As Chairman of the Committee on Postgraduate Instruction, I should like to extend my thanks on behalf of the Committee to all those who participated in the course, either as instructors, or students—to the instructors for their excellent teaching and to the students for their tolerance and cooperation.

DEPARTMENT OF ANATOMY

From the outside the Daniel Baugh Institute of Anatomy of the Jefferson Medical College looks the same, but inside long needed changes have taken place. Rather than wait for the time when necessary funds could be accumulated to erect a new building, it was decided to renovate, for the time being, the old quarters.

During the short summer recess of 1948, the following major changes were effected at the Daniel Baugh Institute of Anatomy. In the old Museum the numerous flat, glass-topped cases were removed and their contents put to better usage by transferring some of them to the Dissecting Room, others to side shelves. Ten fluorescent lights were strung from the ceiling. The walls of the Museum were painted a soft bright color. A portion of the Museum adjacent to the old office was used to build new quarters for the secretarial help which was moved out of the Library. The old Staff Room was done away with. Its lockers were removed and by cutting a doorway into the Library, the available space was used to enlarge the Library. The section of the first floor, once used for Applied Anatomy, was altered by building three new rooms for prospective staff members.

A large, modernly equipped Photographic Room was built in the cellar, access to which was accomplished by erecting a new cellar stairway. The two Demonstration Rooms on the second floor were transformed into a spacious, well lighted, and brightly painted Museum for Histology and Embryology and Neuroanatomy. This was accomplished by tearing down the intervening wall and by removing the iron seats and dissection equipment.

All hallways were painted in a bright color and adequately illuminated. No major changes were made in the two amphitheatres used for lecturing as plans have been made to abolish the upper amphitheatre and modify the lower. The available space to be gained by these alterations will be used to erect quarters for experimental research and animal housing.

The most striking, and, incidentally, the most useful and practical change at the Daniel Baugh Institute of Anatomy is the installment of a one-system house telephone exchange. Individual professors have their own telephones in their rooms; all halls have a telephone; there is one in the dissecting room and several in the basement. All calls are handled by one operator.

Two additional technicians have been employed to hasten the output of a set of slides for each student in Neuroanatomy, comparable to the sets students now have for Histology and Embryology. Moreover, with the added technical help, the staff members are aided greatly in their research work. At the present time a number of research projects are under way and all in all the future of the Institute appears to be a bright one.

DEPARTMENT OF DERMATOLOGY AND SYPHILOLOGY

It will be of interest to Jefferson Alumni to learn that announcement has been made of the affiliation of the Department of Dermatology and Syphilology of Jefferson Medical College and Hospital with the Skin and Cancer Hospital of Philadelphia. Several years ago, when a change of medical administration at the Skin and Cancer Hospital was effected, it was decided by the Board of Trustees that the clinical facilities at that institution could be shared by the Medical School of the University of Pennsylvania, the Medical School of Temple University, and Jefferson Medical College. It was not possible for Jefferson to assume any responsibility at that time, but within this past year Jefferson Service has assumed the responsibility for the Tumor Clinic at the Skin and Cancer Hospital. Dr. Theodore Eberhard, Associate Professor of Radiology at Jefferson Medical College, has been appointed radiologist to the Skin and Cancer Hospital, and the Tumor Clinic is a joint effort on the part of Dr. Eberhard and Dr. Clarence Livingood, Professor of Dermatology and Syphilology at Jefferson. In addition, Dr. Livingood has been named Co-Medical Director of the Skin and Cancer Hospital. This is a desirable association because it increases the clinical facilities for teaching both residents in Dermatology and Syphilology and radiology residents of the respective departments at Jefferson.

Plans for the future of the Department of Dermatology and Syphilology include increased emphasis on the residency training program, affiliation with other clinical departments at Jefferson to further broaden training of the residents and clinical investigation, and an effort to improve undergraduate teaching by replacing the lecture method of instruction with more extensive presentation of cases and discussions with smaller groups. An affiliation has already been made with the Endocrinology and Radiology Departments of the Hospital and joint clinical investigative studies are in progress.

PATHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

This first year has been spent mostly in re-organization and emphasis has been laid upon the teaching of pathology. The course has been divided into three parts: (1) General Pathology. This is given to sophomores during the first half of the year. It consists of a study of basic pathologic changes discussed from an etiologic point of view. Lectures are supported by gross and microscopic examinations of pathologic material. (2) Surgical Pathology. This course is given to the sophomore during the second half of the year. It encompasses lectures on, and gross and microscopic study of, surgical lesions only. Each organ is considered in a systematic manner and (3) Pathology in Internal Medicine. This course is given to the juniors in the second half of the year and consists of lectures and gross demonstrations. It parallels Surgical

Pathology in that medical diseases of each organ are discussed systematically. In each, an attempt is made to correlate clinical findings with pathologic changes.

The second problem that has confronted us has to do with securing an adequate teaching staff. An attempt is being made to encourage men to enter the field of pathology and to keep the members already in the department interested and satisfied. The chief problem, and a serious one, is to obtain adequate compensation. The administration has been most sympathetic with us and we are all at present attempting an equitable solution.

Because the above two factors were more pressing, we have not yet launched on a research program on any great scale. Two separate items being investigated at the present time are hemosiderosis and hepatic necrosis. A third one being planned is reproduction of Loeffler's syndrome. My own interest in chemotherapy of experimental tumors has continued and broadened. This work is being carried out under the Elizabeth Storck Kraemer Memorial Foundation. Our results to date are quite encouraging in that with a Hepbisul compound we are getting complete regression of a rat tumor (R 256) in about one-third of the cases. In addition to this compound we have several other interesting leads which we plan to pursue in the near future.

We are of the opinion that the present floor space in our department could be used to better advantage. By shifting (not deleting) the museum cases around it is possible to construct several demonstration rooms, technician rooms, experimental rooms and a storage room. The present technician rooms and experimental rooms can then be transformed into offices which are badly needed. Plans for these changes have already been drawn up and given to the Dean

OPHTHALMOLOGY DEPARTMENT

The Ophthalmology Department has been granted space for a new operating room exclusively for the use of the Eye Department. This will be a happy improvement to all the surgeons who shared the third operating room.

The Department is now training an Orthoptic Technician and we hope in the near future to establish an Orthoptic Clinic for the training of crosseyed children.

A recent addition to our Staff is Dr. James S. Shipman, who is helping us to establish a detachment by the use of audio-visual techniques. During the past year, 8 motion pictures in sound have been shown and numerous projection slides have been added to our Library. A new motion picture entitled "The Mechanism of Glaucoma" in animation is in production.

Plans are being formulated for the establishment of a reading clinic at Jefferson which is sorely needed.

The Department is committed to the Resident Teaching Program and two Ophthalmologists will begin their service July 1st.

ANNUAL GIVING FUND NEARS \$100,000

The First Roll Call of the alumni fund is already a pronounced success—the results exceed early expectations but yet fall short of the needs and of the potentialities.

With 2,945 or 48.5% of all living graduates having given \$98,476.86 to date, there is ample room for improving the standing in the two months before final results are reported on Alumni Day.

In this founding year of the Fund, there is cause for gratification by all alumni that their teamwork has already produced, for Jefferson's strengthening, the equivalent of an endowment yield of two and a half million dollars. There may be pride that their fund now ranks among the top two or three of the 162 such alumni funds in the nation.

But such satisfaction may be tempered by the realization that, as yet, not quite a majority of Jefferson's sons have taken a share in this effort to advance. Class agents who have exerted themselves so well feel confident that a strong majority will be named in the Founders' Roll at the finish.

Current funds are sorely needed and will be wisely used. Following the April meeting of the Alumni Executive Committee a report will be made on the planned uses of the fund in supporting teaching salaries and teaching facilities the coming year.

GRADUATE COURSES IN THE BASIC MEDICAL SCIENCES

The Board of Trustees of the Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia has authorized the Dean to make official announcement of the institution at the College of courses leading to the degrees of Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy in the basic medical sciences: Anatomy, Bacteriology, Biochemistry, Pathology, Pharmacology, and Physiology.

Under the provisions of its Charter, the Jefferson Medical College is enabled to grant these degrees as evidence of appropriate performance. The College has the facilities for providing this training and it is expected that the decision to open its departments of medical sciences to qualified graduate students will help to alleviate the great shortage of personnel, trained in these fields.

The plan, if successful, should strengthen the preclinical departments and the determination to reach a high level of attainment will contribute to the reputation of the College.

Rules, regulations, and qualifications governing the selection and admission of students, the conduct of courses, and requirements for the degrees, as approved by the Faculty, are available upon application to the office of the Dean.
