REPORT OF QUESTIONNAIRE RESPONSES

Dear Alumni,

We are happy to report that as of August 15, 1980 we have received 1058 returns to the questionnaire mailed in July. This represents a response of over one third and is considered excellent.

The responses to the five questions in the questionaire are by a large margin "yes," this indicates that:

- You do not wish the Baccalaureate Nursing Program to be known as the "School of Nursing" because this title has belonged to the Diploma Program since 1891.
- The monies accumulated by the Alumni Association over the years are to be retained for the use of our Alumni as set up by our By-Laws.
- 3. We continue to have an Alumni Room.
- 4. We continue to have our Annual Alumni Day.
- 5. We continue to publish an Annual Bulletin.

In addition to the above, the following questions have been presented and we will make every effort to answer them to your satisfaction.

- Q. Why does The Allied Health Review have the initials DN after the diploma graduate names?
- A. This is done to identify the program since there are nine programs in the College of Allied Health Sciences, i.e., CT — Cytotechnology; MT — Medical Technology, etc.
- Q. Will the Diploma Program graduates be able to obtain a degree in conjunction with the new nursing program?
- A. For information on this subject please write to the Office of the Registrar, College of Allied Health Sciences, 1020 Locust Street, Philadelphia, PA 19107.
- Q. How will we be able to obtain pins, caps, transcripts and references?
- A. For this information refer to the last page in this Bulletin. As the changes occur in the phasing out process you will be kept informed through the Bulletin or by special mailings.
- Q. What positions will be available to graduates of the Diploma Program who are not presently working, but may wish to return to nursing after families are raised?
- A. The process will probably be the same as it is now; if you have not been employed for a great number of years, a refresher course would certainly be advisable; if it has only been a year or two, you would probably have on-the-job training. At the present time refresher courses are not offered at Jefferson.

- Q. What is the job outlook for the graduate of the Diploma Program who does not have a B.S. in Nursing?
- A. Literature indicates that in many positions experience and a good work record are of prime importance, when an applicant is being considered for hire. However, because of the future trends in nursing it would certainly be advisable for the young diploma graduate, with many work years ahead, to seek a B.S. in Nursing.
- Q. Why is the Diploma School of Nursing being phased out?
- A. This was elaborated on in the 1979 Bulletin in the articles written by Lewis W. Bluemle, M.D., President, Thomas Jefferson University and Doris E. Bowman, Director, School of Nursing. After re-reading both articles, one of the chief reasons for the phasing out is that not enough qualified young people are seeking admission to the program. If you have the 1979 Bulletin I would suggest that you re-read both articles.
- Q. What about the future employment of the present nursing school instructors?
- A. This is difficult to answer; but, no doubt, some will seek employment elsewhere and some will transfer to other positions in the University.
- Q. Will we have a merged alumni association and will we still be considered graduates?
- A. By virtue of the fact that we graduated from Jefferson we are members of one Alumni; however, as of now and in the foreseeable future, we, the Diploma graduates, plan to retain our identity as the Alumni Association of the Diploma Nursing Program. You will always be a graduate of the Diploma Program regardless of what other letters you place after your name.

The Diploma Graduates have a rich heritage and I am sure we are all proud of being a part of it. This is certainly evidenced by the continuing loyalty, interest and support for the Alumni Association, which is made known through communications from you. We hear not only from our younger graduates but also from our golden agers, some are ninety plus years young.

I hope this lengthy message has answered some of your concerns.

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION 1979-1980

It seems like only yesterday that I was informing you of the decision to close our school of nursing by 1982. As mentioned at that time, this was not an easy decision for us to make but, we felt, a timely one. The two major reasons being, first, the recommendations of our professional organization that by 1985 the entry level for the professional nurse would be the baccalaureate degree; and second, the decreasing number of qualified applicants being attracted to our school.

We continue to receive letters from our graduates and others in support of the school and expressing regret at our closing. It has been rewarding to us to receive such documentation of support for our program.

In September, we will not be taking a new class and during June and July, we will be saying farewell and "Thanks for a job well done" to a third of our faculty members. some have been with us many years and have contributed considerably to the development of the school. These include the following:

One of our last graduating classes had Commencement on June 4, 1980, in the Ballroom of the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. Seventy-four students received the diploma and pin of our school. Six additional members of this class have time to make up and will become members of the graduating class of June 1981.

I was reluctant to say "yes" to the class idea for a gift but finally gave in. As a result, my portrait was unveiled during Commencement Exercises and later displayed in the Scott Memorial Library. To each member of the class of 1980: I'm sorry that I gave you such a hard time (about the project, that is) but I do appreciate your time, effort, the kind words you expressed and your just being "you." Thanks again!

Students remaining in the school for the next academic year will include sixty seniors and thirty-eight juniors. Even though our last graduating class will be small, it will be somewhat larger than the first graduating class in 1893 — three graduates.

One of our projects during the stepping down process in 1981 will be to convert our graduate records to a more compact and efficient microfiche system compatible with the College of Allied Health Sciences system. This is no small undertaking when you consider that we will have to convert over 5,000 graduate records. In 1982, all records will be transferred to the office of the Registrar, College of Allied Health Sciences.

Number one among extracurricular activities still seems to be basketball, though this year our cheerleaders were not active. Mary Ann Maxwell, '80, led this year's team to the league championship. She also was the recipient of the Thomas Jefferson Award for Athletic Achievement.

The class of 1979 should be pleased to know that our students are doing well in CPR using their gift of Resusci-Anne. Thanks for making this experience possible.

Many hours are going into the preparation of our final report for continued accreditation by the National League for Nursing. The visit is scheduled for November 10-12, 1980. When the words don't come easily and the proofreading gets to be a drag, we do succumb to asking, "Is it worth it?" Remembering our past and present commitment to excellence, the immediate answer is "Yes."

On the heels of the NLN visit will be the Middle States visit for accreditation of the university. Everyone seems to be involved in some phase of preparing that report.

You may or may not be aware that SEPTA has moved its general office (600 employees) into our building. This has required shifting of some of our departments; however, we have been assured that the school of nursing is to remain in the same location until it closes.

With the phasing out of the diploma program and the closing of the practical school, by 1982 there will be only baccalaureate programs in the college — Baccalaureate Nursing, Cytotechnology, Dental Hygiene, General Studies and Medical Technology.

Although the prospects for me in the coming year seem a bit gloomy as our numbers get smaller, the future of nursing is bright — it is yours. By basking in your reflected glory as you impact on our profession, my future brightens considerably.

Our largest fund raising activity this year was a "Night on the Town" which included dinner and the movies for two people. Money raised aided us in enjoying a Door Decorating Contest at Christmas which provided students with a chance to have fun during the Christmas season. Until October of 1979, we also continued to sponsor Albert, an American Indian Child, through the Lutheran Services.

The School of Nursing classes also kept busy throughout the year with various activities. In order to help finance the yearbook, seniors engaged in numerous bake sales, along with candy and hoagie sales. Two raffles were also conducted during the academic year. In addition, the class participated in a blood pressure screening program held at the Federal Reserve Bank, providing health care to its employees and the public. The senior class wishes to express its sincere thanks to the Thomas Jefferson University, College of Allied Health Sciences, School of Nursing (Diploma Program) Alumni Association and The School of Nursing Department of the Women's Board for their generous contributions which helped make the yearbook project a success. Perhaps the most meaningful project un-

dertaken during their three years, will be the presentation of the Class gift: a portrait of Miss Doris E. Bowman, Director of the School of Nursing.

Junior Students worked hard raising funds with some very profitable activities such as a turkey raffle, a Tupperware sale, Easter candy sale, and baked goods sales. They also planned and participated in a beautiful capping ceremony — a historic event, as it was the last such ceremony of the Diploma Program.

Margie Mullen, Kathleen O'Brien, and Suzanne Bradley represented the Student Body at the Dean's Student Advisory Committee where they attended many meetings and also helped to develop a successful semi-formal dance that was held in February.

In conclusion, the Student Affairs Council wishes the students success and good luck during their remaining years. Thanks to all for contributing to a great academic year.

COMMENCEMENT 1980

At Commencement Exercises — 1980, the graduating class presented to Thomas Jefferson University, a portrait of Doris E. Bowman with some of the following comments:

A member of the Jefferson Medical College Hospital School of Nursing, Class of 1942, Doris E. Bowman volunteered her services as a member of the Jefferson Hospital Army Hospital — the 38th General Hospital. After basic training in Bowie, Texas, the unit was shipped to Egypt.

Discharged in 1945, Miss Bowman returned to civilian life as a private duty nurse. Then, she enrolled at the University of Pennsylvania, receiving a Bachelor's degree in Nursing Education. After graduation, she left Philadelphia to teach Medical-Surgical Nursing, and later, Fundamentals of Nursing in a Northern New Jersey School. She returned to Philadelphia to enroll in graduate school at the University of Pennsylvania, earning a master's degree in Education.

With her M.S. in hand, she joined the faculty of her Alma Mater in 1954 as instructor in Pediatric Nursing. She later became Assistant Director of Nursing and when Nursing Service and the School of Nursing became separate departments in 1958, she was appointed to the position of Director of the School of Nursing. The School continued to function under the Hospital until 1969 when it became a unit under the College of Allied Health Sciences.

If you were to survey Miss Bowman's family, friends and colleagues to determine her outstanding characteristics, loyalty would no doubt top the list. Her loyalty to Jefferson is beyond question. She has given of her time, talent and energy to her position.

There is always time in her busy schedule to keep in touch with alumna and former faculty and staff. Nothing pleases her more than an unannounced visit of an alumni member with a babe in arms or toddler in tow.

She delights in playing with the child — it is obvious to all who witness this that Miss Bowman has never lost her love for children.

Much of her leisure time is devoted to her family — her brother and his wife and their two children. Her recreational program includes quilting, the theatre and more recently riding a bicycle along the Ocean City boardwalk.

"The students all appreciate the quality of their nursing program and therefore in deep appreciation we present to Thomas Jefferson University this portrait of Miss Bowman with the hope that those who see it in years to come will remember her and her dedication, and be reminded of all that Jefferson has contributed to our lives."

Scholarship Fund

Graduate — Two \$1000.00 scholorships for each of the spring and fall semesters, granted to active members of the Alumni Association who are working towards a degree in nursing and who meet the requirements.

Requirements: Refer to By-Laws

Student — Given annually to a worthy student to pursue the course in the Diploma Program, no pre-set amount. The amount depends on the need of the student.

General Fund

Used to pay operating expenses, mailings, to send candidates to conventions, etc.

ALUMNI AWARDS

- The Alumni Association Prize to the member of the graduating class who attained the highest average during the three-year course. Prize \$100.00.
- Thomas A. Shallow Memorial Prize to the graduating student who demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Operating Room Nursing. In 1978 changed to the graduating student who has demonstrated the greatest proficiency in Surgical Nursing. Prize \$100.00.
- Student Recognition Award An award of \$300.00 yearly to the junior student for the highest academic rank.

MEMORABILIA

In the Alumni offices we have displayed nurses' pins, pictures, dolls dressed as nurses, scrap books with old clippings, diplomas, graduation programs, and alumni bulletins.

We also have memorabilia at the Nurses Museum located at Pennsylvania Hospital, 8th & Spruce Streets.

Addresses are kept current by requesting address changes from the Post Office on all mail sent out by the Alumni.

JEFFERSON'S PROFILES IN COURAGE — 1980

Our 1979 Bulletin seems to have been circulated beyond the Alumni membership because our attention was called to a report in the journal "Nursing — 80," April issue. We learned that the author had read our Bulletin, and impressed by the courage of Vivian Moyer, made an appointment with her, and following an interview, published the following article:

Much to Teach

"RN Vivian Moyer, of Philadelphia, PA, tutors nursing school graduates who've failed the state board examination in medical/surgical nursing. Ms. Moyer, who has multiple sclerosis (MS), can also teach many of us about living life to the fullest.

A graduate of the Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing in 1943, Ms. Moyer served as an army nurse in England during World War II. In 1953, she received a BS in nursing education from the University of Pennsylvania. She taught at Jefferson, then at Philadelphia General Hospital, and, finally, in 1964, at Pennsylvania Hospital School of Nursing, at which time the diagnosis of multiple sclerosis was made.

"Actually, I had noticed a disturbance in my vision back in 1950 while I was doing some practice teaching," she told us. "But I was told it was probably due to my tensions from teaching. The problems passed, and I guess I had a remission for 15 years. Then I began having difficulty walking, and the MS was finally diagnosed.

Now I was faced with learning how to continue going back and forth to classrooms and teaching on the floors. Fortunately, I was offered the position of student health supervisor. I stayed in that job for 8 years. After a time, I had to use a walking stick. But even with the stick, I fell a number of times and suffered broken bones.

"In 1976, I had to begin using a wheelchair. Nobody pointed to it and said, 'Here, you're going to be in this wheelchair the rest of your life.' But I finally understood that this was going to be my life, and I'd better get used to it. I thought of the Gls we'd see on the ward after D day — paraplegics, quadriplegics, amputees. We'd wonder how they were going to handle the handicap for the rest of their lives. I found out for myself: You have to make adjustments."

Ms Moyer, who's able to walk short distances with the help of a walker, began tutoring students in her apartment about 2 years ago. "I started off teaching only registered nurses, but I've begun teaching practical nurses as well.

"Some people say I should charge more than I do, but I'm satisfied. I feel that I'm not only teaching, but also learning — that I'm still growing as a person. Everyone I've tutored has subsequently passed. If this is continuing contribution to nursing, I'm happy and proud."

We're sure we speak for everyone when we say the profession's proud of her.

CREDENTIALING IN NURSING

Thirty-five years ago I had my first experience in credentialing in nursing - I wrote the state board examination for licensure as a registered nurse in Pennsylvania. (Subsequently, I was licensed in Massachusetts and North Carolina by endorsement.) Later, as a faculty member and educational administrator, I became intimately acquainted with the approval process used by state boards of nursing for programs-preparing persons for licensure as nurses and national voluntary accreditation of educational programs. In the latter instance, I served as a member of the accreditation team to schools and colleges of nursing on numerous occasions and as a member of the Accreditation Review Board for the NLN Council on Baccalaureate and Higher Degree Programs as well as being on the receiving end of the process. Approval/accreditation of educational programs is another form of credentialing. More recently, while on the staff of the American Nurses' Association, I was involved in the certification programs offered by the ANA Division on Nursing Practice and served as the coordinator for the Council of State Boards of Nursing. Certification, too, is a kind of credentialing. As the executive director of a board of nursing (North Carolina). a member of the ANA National Accreditation Board for Continuing Education in Nursing, and a member of the Task Force on Credentialing in Nursing, my involvement in credentialing continues unabatedly. Therefore, it is indeed a pleasure to be addressing my fellow alumni on a subject of intimate, intense and far reaching concern to all of us - credentialing.

The action which ultimately set into motion a study of credentialing in nursing was the result of a territorial skirmish. A resolution was adopted by the 1974 ANA House of Delegates to examine the feasibility of ANA accrediting basic and graduate programs in nursing, a function then and now of the National League for Nursing. After a series of conferences involving representatives from nursing education, nursing practice, and experts in credentialing in other fields, a proposal emerged and was subsequently approved by the ANA to broaden the scope of the study to include all aspects of credentialing - accreditation, certification, and licensure - because it was realized that these mechanisms are inextricably tied together in the overriding purpose of providing quality assurance. The study was to include credentialing of all categories of individuals engaged in the occupation of nursing, as well as programs of nursing education and nursing service. The overall aim was to look at credentialing as it exists in nursing and to recommend future directions in credentialing for the profession.

The report, THE STUDY OF CREDENTIALING IN NURSING: A NEW APPROACH, was released at the end of January, 1979. A major finding, as you might suspect, was that the current system of licensure and certification of nurses and accreditation of nursing services and nursing education is uncoordinated, fragmented and duplicative. The recommendations of the Study Committee call for a restructuring of credentialing and the establishment of a national credentialing center.

What quickly becomes apparent in studying credentialing is that there are two undercurrents to be dealt with. While these currents are not divisible in practice, they may advantageously be separated out in attempting to deal as rationally and objectively as possible in developing solutions and in gaining rational and objective consideration of recommendations. One of these undercurrents is the territorial one of the control of the credentialing system and its various aspects. Again, one may identify separable questions and, thus, possible separable solutions. Who makes the definitions?, who sets the standards?, who conducts the process?, who awards the credential?, who establishes what the credential may be used for? The second undercurrent includes the more personal concerns of the credentialee, whether it be an individual or an institution. What are the credentials?, what standards are required of the credentialee?, what inhibitions and what entitlements accrue to the credentialee?

To a large extent, three of the recommendations of the Study Committee roughly parallel these streams, one dealing with the credentials themselves and the other two with the credentialing system and its control.

In relation to the credentials, it is recommended that:

- 1. Licensure, as a mandatory, state governmental credentialing form, used to protect the public by assuring minimum level of professional competence, be required only of those individuals who are accountable for the full scope of practice.
- 2. Registration be the form of credentialing for assisting personnel, the second category of persons engaged in nursing, untitled but defined by education as associate degree prepared. Registration, as a national, non-governmental form of credentialing, by which individuals are listed on an official roster, would attest to employers an individual's ability to perform specific functions necessary to the practice of nursing, but which do not constitute the full scope of practice. (Under such a system, the term "registered," while conveying a different meaning from today's usage, would

preserve the familiar titular identification and public recognition of the majority of nurses and the use of a new title for the professional group eligible for licensure would call attention to the emergence of a new role for nursing.)

- 3. Certification be used exclusively to denote minimal competency in a field of nursing specialization and that licensure be required as a prerequisite.
- 4. Accreditation, a non-governmental form of credentialing, be available for all organizations of nursing services as well as nursing education programs and that state boards of nursing not be responsible for the approval or accreditation of schools of nursing.

To move on from the credentials themselves to the means of accomplishing credentialing in a comprehensive, cohesive, coordinated, efficient, and accountable manner, a free-standing nursing credentialing center is recommended. The center would bring together the community of interests in nursing for policy-making and coordination. In such a center, the functions of accreditation of programs of nursing education and nursing services, the certification of nursing specialists, and the registration of the yet untitled assisting per-

sonnel would be conducted, and the coordination of services for state licensing would be provided. The report proposes the characteristics of such a center, its purposes, functions, and structure.

Since nursing has had a sad history of revering and enshrining, but not implementing, its landmark studies, the Study Committee recommended a plan for followup which appears as an addendum to the report. They recommended the establishment of an independent task force to act as a catalyst and focal point for stimulating discussion aimed at broad acceptance of the study recommendations, including implementation of the nursing credentialing center and to develop additional data necessary for definitive decision-making by nursing organizations and credentialing bodies for committing themselves and their resources to such an endeavor.

Change, particularly in the direction of unification, is anxiety-producing. It is never easy. It requires some compromise for the common good. If nursing can carry this through for the benefit of the public as well as the profession, we will have created a model that other professions can emulate. How wonderful for nursing to act first, instead of reacting last.

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THE 80's: DECADE FOR DECISION A.N.A. CONVENTION REPORT JUNE 8-14, 1980 HOUSTON, TEXAS 52nd BIENNIAL CONVENTION

Doris Bowman and I arrived in Houston International at 4:30 P.M. on Sunday, June 8, and were driven to the Lamar Hotel by Doris' cousin and his wife who live in Houston. It was the hottest day of the year — 99° with the humidity to go with it.

We walked the eight blocks to the Albert Thomas Convention and Exhibit Center in time to register. Our registration pins were admission to everything.

After a quick bite (standing in line was the order of the day since everything was closed for Sunday) at the Hyatt Regency, we went to the Coliseum to hear the keynote address of Rhetaugh G. Dumas, PHD, R.N., FAAN; deputy director, National Institute of Mental Health, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Rockville, MD. Dr. Dumas is the first woman to hold this position.

Dr. Dumas has a great deal of enthusiasm for nursing in the 80's. The three major challenges, according to Dr. Dumas, are:

- Improving the access and quality of health and mental health care for the underserved.
- Controlling health and mental health care costs while assuring that nursing's contribution is not short-sightedly sacrificed, and
- Shifting emphasis from a preoccupation with illness to a focus on prevention and health promotion.

During the 80's nurses should best be educated so they can greet tomorrow's health and care with confidence. The base for nursing practice is becoming more scientific with every passing year. Hands-on care giving has not become old fashioned and there will always be an important place in nursing for care of the whole person.

Tomorrow's nurse must be flexible and must be able to deal with high technology and sicker patients. She or he must be able to find solutions to problems for which no known techniques exist.

She or he must be able to assume leadership and responsibility and not be afraid of the increased accountability for decisions made.

"We are about to come together in the nursing profession and we will meet the challenges of the 1980's with renewed commitment to this great profession and with one voice — one audible coherent powerful voice."

Starting with early Monday morning, June 9, wherever we went we were bombarded with pins, pens, hats, candy and the literature for the candidates to be elected, but once again only 734 delegates elected the A.N.A. officers: I don't call that very democratic, but that's the way of the A.N.A.

Rising early and getting in early — 6:30 A.M. — breakfast was the rule of the day. Breakfasts were an event since the biscuits were freshly made and "grits" were part of each platter of eggs, etc.

Doris and I went to the Music Hall to the hearings on resolutions at 8:00 A.M. There was a lot of discussion and very little decision making at that meeting and we stayed for several hours.

In the afternoon I went to the continuing education program "Commitment to Self Care in the 80's" sponsored by the Division on Community Health Nursing Practice. The moderator, Raymond G. Cink, MPH, RN, Vice Chairperson, ExComm, A.N.A. Division on Community Health, St. Paul, Minnesota, presented the speakers (1) Dr. Toni Sullivan, associate professor and director, BSN program, Felician College, Lodi, New Jersey; (2) Jean McKibbin Smith, M.S., R.N., clinical instructor, staff development, Memorial Hospital, Gulfport, Mississippi; and (3) Dr. Carolyn Chambers Clark, director, The Wellness Institute, Sloatsburg, New York. None of the material was a new concept but an elaboration and in words that have been presented in the past few years in reference to handling stress either through diet or various self-care programs which these three presented.

After we went to the continuing education programs, we looked for the room to take the examination. It was filled with nurses taking examinations. The examination was pertinent to the program just presented and we were told the results would be forwarded to us in a few months.

Monday night we went to Brennans for dinner. The gardens and restaurant are lovely besides having good food. They are a branch of the same in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Tuesday morning while we were eating breakfast we met Dr. Harriet Werley. She was one of the moderators in a round table discussion we attended on "Behavioral Psychology." It was the first I knew that she publishes a magazine "Research in Nursing and Health."

Part of this day was spent in seeing the many worth-while exhibits. It was surprising to see so many hospitals from all over the United States with booths. Most of the samples from drug companies were too large or cumbersome to bring back with us — such as a plastic yardstick.

Those of you on faculty remember Pat Tucker who taught Orthopedics. We spoke to her several times during the course of the convention. She is now an

editor with the magazine "Nursing 80." She hasn't changed a bit except maybe she's more fun to be with.

Tuesday afternoon another continuing education program was attended — "Impact of Alternative Modes of Care" sponsored by the Commission on Nursing Research with Nola Pender, commission member and professor, School of Nursing, Northern Illinois University. Elsie Weyrauch and Lynda Barnard Austin, nurse assessment team nurses for Alternative Health Services, Department of Medical Assistance, State of Georgia, Atlanta, presented first.

Because of the rapid growth in the number of elderly, Georgia Medicaid sponsored an alternative home health care research over a three year period. Objectives: (1) prevent unneeded institutionalization; (2) provide complete community health services at reduced costs, 1600 participants in 17 counties. Three means of accomplishment were: (1) Adult Day Rehabilitation with daily nursing visits, physical therapists, occupational therapists, prosthesis aids and transportation to and from centers - as needed. (2) Alternative learning services as needed — with foster care, board and congregate care. Daily supervision of activities, meals, etc. was provided as needed. (3) Home delivered services. The cost advantage was a high volume of screening with an efficient rise of professionals. Services are less costly than rising institutions and clients (this word substituted for "patients" wherever you went at the convention) receiving this kind of care live longer.

Dr. Loretta Nowakowski, executive director, Institute for Personal Health, and adjunct assistant professor of nursing, Georgetown University, School of Nursing, Washington, D.C., advocates health promotion through self health care. The role of the nurse in this is (1) Administrator, (2) Designer, and (3) Implementer. The nurse must deliver what has been promised. Two responsibilities are (1) Marketing and (2) Research at a national level. There is a high fear of costly illness of the clients. Nursing has *not* identified its purpose. Doctors say "health" but mean disease. Clients want someone to listen — *not* Preach — to them.

Dr. Joan LeSage, chairperson, geriatric/gerontoligical nursing, Rush Presbyterian/St. Luke's Medical Center, Chicago, Illinois. These clients were divided into William Jones apartments built in 1963 with 144 people in 115 units providing complete care and the Johnston R. Bowman Health Care for the elderly built in 1977. The clients are transported from the apartment to the Health Care Center for care.

Tuesday evening we took a taxi to the Galleria and Sackowitz's. The Galleria is something like our malls but *much* bigger. There's a hotel in one section of it. We ate in a Chinese Restaurant that evening and thoroughly enjoyed it.

Before starting another interesting day let me tell you a little bit about Houston. One sees NO GRAFFITTI anywhere. Each evening the sidewalks are "washed down"

with hoses and each day you arise to a bustling *CLEAN* city with very little public transportation and some problem crossing the wide, well-trafficked streets. The buildings look so new you'd think they'd just been built and most of them have been built within the last 10 years. There are underground shops and "commissaries" so that the workers in those buildings do not need to go out in the *humid hot* air for lunch. There are also underground parking areas. As the people arrive from outlying areas (except for hotels there is no living space in the downtown area) the traffic is *very* busy but this gradually subsides until about 4:30 P.M. when there is a mad exodus to their homes and apartments.

Wednesday "Decade of Diversity: Strategies for Nursing Education in the 80's, a basis for innovation in clinical Learning Experiences" sponsored by the Commission on Nursing Education. The moderator was Dr. Gloria Smith, dean and professor, College of Nursing, University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma City. "The Rural Community: A Setting for Clinical Learning," Dr. Darlene Meservy, director of continuing education, School of Nursing, University of Utah, Salt Lake City, began very hesitatingly to tell of their innovative program to give nurses in their community the help they needed to prepare for their future roles. We in the East have very little understanding of the difficulties some of these schools have providing this.

Characteristics of the area -

Wide distribution of population. 1/3 of population lives in 3 counties.

Transportation facilities are poor.

Nursing care needs as well as needs of students.

Students evaluate their own feelings about working in these areas.

Rural clinical experiences are more expensive. The students must provide own transportation and living expenses. Two hours driving time daily is needed.

Portapac TV unit to take on rural settings. These are shared with the students who do not participate in rural program.

Miss Rosemary Bell, MSN, R.N. "Innovative Approaches to Clinical Learning in the Urban Community." Associate professor, College of Nursing, and chief, Nursing Staff, Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan.

There is a contract between the Detroit Institute and Wayne University.

Monies are constantly being sought through United Fund, Medicare, Pharmaceutical Companies.

Students spend 60% time in service, 40% time in teaching.

Education time is reimbursed through University.

Miss Bell quoted Dr. Christman as "Education plus service equals power."

Dr. Elizabeth Grossman, dean and professor, School of Nursing, Indiana University, Indianapolis. "Planning Clinical Learning Experiences to Meet the Needs of Diverse Populations."

"The times change and we change with them."

Relevant curricula to keep abreast of changing needs of society.

- Chronic and degenerative diseases have replaced infectious diseases.
- 2. Increased longevity.
- 3. Accidents are most frequent cause of death in ages 1 through 40.
- 4. Better educated population. Economic and human rights.
- Effect on clinical innovation. Date and commitment of faculty.

Indiana University assisted faculty.

Needs, circumstances, goals of school.

Specialist degree with major in primary care.

Wednesday at noon we picked up the A.N.A. history book which was a gift for registering early — "One Strong Voice" on our way out of the Albert Thomas Convention and Exhibit Center.

Wednesday we took a former housemother, Mrs. Bard, to a lunch at Vargas, As we drove up, two peacocks welcomed us and then promptly flew (did you know peacocks could fly? I hadn't known until I saw these!) to the top of the building. Our table was under a glass roof by a live tree and the view beyond was a small waterfall and stream with swans — black and white — ducks and geese calmly swimming by. What a beautiful restful place to eat a delicious lunch.

Wednesday evening we ate in the Hotel Lamar dining room because we were still full from lunch. Mr. Bard's daughter drove us around a section of Houston we hadn't seen before — Rice University on one side and the Medical Center and Zoo on the other side. The Medical Center was so overwhelming and hard to believe.

As dusk was falling, we walked to the Hyatt Regency and enjoyed a view of the city from the "Spindletop." There really wasn't much we missed! I felt like a little girl again seeing so many new and different things!

Thursday morning Doris and I were one of the first to arrive to hear Dr. Jerome Lysaught, professor of Education, Medical Education and Preventive Medicine, University of Rochester, Rochester, New York.

All week I was worrying that I wouldn't have anything outstanding to tell you, until we heard Dr. Lysaught. He spoke for 2½ hours, was interrupted many times, but never used a note or lost his train of thought. He is thoroughly believable and why nursing hasn't followed his advice is hard for me to understand. Doris brought her tape and anyone who has a chance should take advantage of hearing it.

1966 the American Nurses' Foundation, American Nurses' Association, and National League for Nursing got funding from W. Kellogg Foundation, Mellon Fund and an Anonymous Benefactress.

Proposal developed:

- 1. Nurses should be represented but majority should not be nurses.
- 2. The Director of the study should not be a nurse.

At that time Dr. Lysaught was Acting Director of the Medical Division of Education at University of Rochester, Rochester. Emory Morris, head of the Kellog Foundation, was to visit Evelyn Hall, Director of Nursing Education at Rochester and Dr. Lysaught set up a clinical setting for Mr. Morris to see. Mr. Morris remembered this when the head of the commission was to be appointed, and he insisted Dr. Lysaught be that person. Formal implementation period was 1970-73 with two series of regional meetings. 1978-79 — initial change was not to make nursing a greater profession but to improve delivery of health care.

Characteristics to demonstrate commitment to expanded delivery of nursing service.

History and origin of proposal:

1900 — Limited knowledge base for doctors and nurses.
 1909 — Rockefeller Foundation appointed Abraham Flexnor to study and report. It was issued in 1910.

So long as American medicine provides care without a scientific base.

- 1. Develop a stronger knowledge base.
- Increase the length of preparation period. Continue to learn and do research.

Abraham Flexnor — a biologist — established that doctors should be well paid and should be based on client's ability to pay.

- Established accreditation and licenses rid of incompetents!
- Relocate within the collegiate system into a collegiate setting.
- Needs for college program as well as medical school.
- 4. Continuing education.

University of Rochester in 1921 was the first school to adopt Flexnor's model.

- 1923 Nursing has not kept step with medicine. Goldmark Commission on Nursing established because:
 - Public concern about influenza outbreak after World War I.
- 2. Medicine became more scientific than nursing.Recommended:
 - American nursing follow lead of medicine's move into the collegiate system.
 - Nursing be developed for community, health nursing to prepare foundation for specialization in either community or hospital.

No action was taken:

1925 — Esther Lucille Brown report similar to Goldmark Commission recommendations — *nothing happened*.

1928 — Characteristics

- 1. Strong level of commitment.
- 2. Long and disciplined educational process.
- 3. Unique body of knowledge and skill.
- 4. Discriminatory authority and judgment.
- 5. Active and cohesive professional organization.
- Acknowledged Social Work and service.

These studies were still not acted upon.

Reasons for nursing shortage:

- Female high school graduates have a lot more choices.
 At the University of Rochester one in three are female applicants to Law school, engineering and management.
- 1½ million maintain licenses but never practice nursing.
- 3.1 in 4 work only part time.

Proposition:

- 1. As economists define a real manpower shortage, there is no nursing shortage.
- In the face of the problem of nursing we have a tremendous problem of returning nurses for patient care.

Extrinsic or economic:

- 1. Nurses not paid well to direct patient care.
- 1978 average salary for staff was \$6.00 per hour or \$12,000 per year.
- Grocery clerks' union affords a stock boy \$11.87 an hour.
- Nurses are not recognized and rewarded for work accomplished.

System has got to be changed.

In nursing schools:

What have you published
How much teaching
Clinical competence
Emphasize continuity of clinical excellence
Provide and teach others how to provide.
Greatest gift an instructor can provide is to
demonstrate a role model of excellence.

Set up a program for:

reward recognition professional support

Primary nursing:

Full responsibility
Unification model to bring back concepts
Teaching
Research

After listening to Dr. Lysaught it was ever so clear why nursing needs to change to a better system such as Rochester, Rush and Case WesternReserve have adopted.

We were to vote after the morning sessions. As I stated earlier, we could only vote for those running from our section of A.N.A. — not the officers of the organization.

COLLEGE OF ALLIED HEALTH SCIENCES ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

The College of Allied Health Sciences Alumni Special Achievement Award was established in 1977 to recognize the accomplishments of allied health alumni.

The 1980 distinguished alumna was Barbara G. Schutt, Class of 1939. The award is given for her many accomplishments in many fields of nursing and in education.

Among these were general duty at Jefferson, College health, camp and private duty nursing while working towards a Bachelor of Arts degree at Bethany College, Bethany, West Virginia. After three years in the Army Nurse Corps, Lt. Schutt used her nursing experiences in the fields of public service and journalism.

As assistant, associate and executive director of the Pennsylvania Nurses' Association, a branch of the American Nurses' Association, Miss Schutt concerned herself with nursing services and education and the economic welfare of the members, and the advancement of nursing in the state. During this time, 1946-1958, she served as editor of *The Pennsylvania Nurse*.

Sandwiched among all of these activities, Barbara earned a Master of Science degree in Education at the University of Pennsylvania in 1949.

From 1958-1971, Miss Schutt was editor of the American Journal of Nursing, the official magazine of the American Nurses' Association with a circulation of 325,000.

Her active career was finalized in 1979 after serving as Director, Division of Nursing, Mohegan Community College in Norwich, Connecticut from 1974-79.

After such a busy and productive career in nursing, our best wishes go to Barbara C. Schutt for a happy retirement.

HARRIET WERLEY HONORED FOR CONTRIBUTION TO NURSING SCIENCE

Harriet Werley, Ph.D., FAAN, is the first recipient of the Award for Distinguished Contribution to Nursing Science given by the American Nurses' Foundation. The award was presented by Ray Showalter, ANF president, at a meeting of the Council of Nurse Researchers at the ANA convention in Houston.

Dr. Werley, who became associate dean at the School of Nursing, University of Missouri/Columbia in January, has been a researcher for 26 years. At the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research, she developed the department of nursing research, recognized as the first center for nursing research in the nation. At Wayne State University in Detroit, she developed the Center for Health Research, the first such program in the nation to be established in a college of nursing.

In accepting the award, she emphasized the importance of basing nursing's curricula on its own research. While the volume of nursing research has increased, many problem areas remain to be investigated, she said. "Nursing must marshal its talent and resources to be more research productive, so that nursing's investigative capabilities and results are more readily recognized by the scientific community.

Dr. Werley is founder and editor of Research in Nursing and Health, a national refereed journal. She is the author of 50 articles published since 1954.

The award was made possible by a grant from the Bristol-Myers Fund. Members of the selection committee were Susan Gortner, Ph.D., FAAN, Barbara Hansen, Ph.D., FAAN, and Ada Jacox, Ph.D. Twenty-seven nurse researchers were nominated.

THE CONCHOLOGISTS

"This is your friendly visitor from P.C.O.P. (Philadelphia Center for Older People)." That Emma had formerly been a nurse is just one reason she is our ideal comforter of the housebound. Her warmth and positive attitude add to her total aptness. Lately she has been volunteering in Crafts. Besides all this, there is Emma's alluring hobby of conchology. The minute you enter her apartment (like a warm museum) you feel transported to Florida's Captive or Sanibel Island. Sea shells confront you everywhere. Shells, as mysterious and varied as the myriad human faces in a crowd, but far more beautiful."

Blanche and Emma, in helping others, have enriched their lives and have endeared themselves to others. Keep going, Ladies!
