### The President's Message



Dear Fellow Alumni,

On May 7th when I assumed office from Flossie Roche, I felt awed and honored as I looked across the sea of faces enjoying the annual luncheon and renewing friendships. I also realized at that time, that this was only a small gathering of the graduates of Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing. Generally speaking, these were mostly the reunion classes.

So how many members of the alumnae (a feminist at heart) are there? It was a real shock to learn that of over 3000 living Alumnae, only 779 are dues paying members. There are also 235 life members (those who have belonged to the association for 40 consecutive years.)

Because not all of the members live in the Philadelphia area, the work of running the organization, planning and executing the work falls on the shoulders of a few loyal and devoted members. To them we give thanks.

The annual meeting moved ahead smoothly and efficiently, and those alumnae who attended heard of the work which is being carried out in the name of all of the alumnae. There were 62 at the meeting. Many appeared impressed and pleased with the work which had been done, and that which was being planned.

The Satellite Group in New Jersey met several times last year and are continuing to plan for the future. A second group will be meeting in the Harrisburg area in August to develop an on going group, which will renew friendships and keep up with the Philadelphia group. Interest is astir in the Baltimore area, but it needs a little more nurturing to arrive as a viable group.

All these activities make for an exciting and interesting future for the alumnae of the School of Nursing of Jefferson Hospital. It also means that we need to expand the membership in the organization.

The younger members can seek funds for educational purposes. Nursing as a profession will only grow and evolve as we have prepared leaders who can move forward. As a past recipient of alumni scholarship fund, I am most grateful for the help I received while engaged in doctoral study.

More and more of our members are representative of the national population — getting older. Some of them will be in need of financial assistance from the relief fund. Fortunately, previous presidents and boards of directors have had sound financial advice, and both the Relief Fund Trust and the Scholarship Fund are secure at this time. However, we have no crystal ball, so do not know what the future will bring.

We do know that in 1992, the Alumni Association of Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing, (we have changed our name several times) will celebrate its 100th anniversary. The last class to graduate (1982) will celebrate its 10th anniversary. My class will celebrate its 50th anniversary. Will there be members to celebrate the 150th anniversary? Membership is not a big expense but it is a source of real pleasure to meet with friends and classmates several times a year, and have a voice in the progress of the nurses who shared the organdy cap, and black, blue and gold

## The Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing Roll of Honor

The School of Nursing may be closed but many of its graduates have distinguished themselves and their school by their contributions to the field of nursing. It is a given fact that they were excellent patient bed-side nurses who gave full measure in caring for those committed to their care. We are interested in compiling a record of those who gave and continue to give to the growth and development of nursing.

Our successors, the graduates of the baccalaureate program, have no direct ties with the School of Nursing, so do not know of our contributions to nursing. Indeed, many of our alumnae sisters have no knowledge of the many contributions made by Jeff nurses. So, it is proposed that information be solicited and compiled into a permanent record for the edification of future nurses who will graduate from Thomas Jefferson University and give the graduates of the School of Nursing of Jefferson Hospital a source of pride in their accomplishments.

In order to determine criteria for selection of candidates for the Hall of Fame, Alumni Bulletins were reviewed and a list of criteria was prepared. The number and variety of contributions was gratifying, however, it is believed that this is only the tip of the iceberg. The major problem the committee will face is the identification of those graduates who have made significant contributions to nursing and who have died. The committee, therefore, asks that you, the living graduates, identify those mothers, sisters, aunts, and acquaintances who were and are Jeff graduates. If the maiden name is given, and approximate year of graduation, our records will identify exactly the year of graduation.

The criteria identified are as follows:

Criteria: Meets one or more of the following criteria which are beneficial to the advancement of nursing and

- 1. Established a nursing education program
- Served on state, regional, national or international committees
- 3. Wrote or edited books on nursing (articles)
- 4. Received honors or awards (nurse of the year)
- 5. Service to Government (not military)
- 6. Missionary in a foreign country
- Served as officer in Nursing Organization(s) (Local, State, National)
- 8. Invented, designed or improved equipment

At the back of this Bulletin is a form for you to nominate any one who will meet one or more of the criteria. Please indicate in the space below the criterion how your candidate meets it. You may nominate any number of graduates. Please use a separate sheet of paper for each nurse you wish to nominate. Remember, we also wish to identify those nurses who are no longer with us.

It is not necessary for you to sign your name if you do not wish to

## Glimpses From An Earlier Time

In 1931 the members of the class of '32 were completing their training at the Training School for Nurses of the Jefferson Medical College Hospital. Yes, it was called a "Training School" in those days. Now, we say we train animals — we educate people.

We were in the midst of the Great Depression, but it didn't mean a whole lot to us. We had been well protected during our student days—clean, warm shelter, adequate nutritious food, and in addition a stipend of \$6.00 a month our first year, \$7.00 the second, and \$8.00 the third. (But we paid no tuition.) If we didn't like the menu of the day, there was always plenty of bread, molasses and milk. We stayed healthy. We saw people selling apples on the street for 5 cents, and some of our families were having a rough time, but none of us lost any money on the stock market—we didn't have any to lose.

As we completed our program in September and October of 1931, some went back to their hometowns. Many of us elected to stay in Philadelphia where we felt comfortable, particularly in our own hospital.

By and large, the hospital was staffed by student nurses. But private duty nurses were common among the private patients. Many opted for that. Ruth Ulsh (Menicon) 1931, reports that after working for 13 months in O.B.O.R. she resigned to do private duty nursing. She had one case 11 days, 12 hour duty, for \$66.00 (\$6.00) a day. She received \$75.00 a month in O.B. the first 4 months, then \$80.00 the next 9 months.

When I completed the program, I went on the registry. I had one case, a D & C on third Corridor. All I remember of that is that the patient slept all day, for which I was grateful, for I had on my first pair of white duty shoes, and they hurt my feet. I also had a blister on my heel. I wasn't called back the next day. I never knew whether she didn't need a nurse or if I wasn't satisfactory. However, I was glad. That one case convinced me I wasn't cut out for private duty nursing.

A few days later, the word was around that Miss Melville was calling to her office many young nurses. We found out that the new Curtis Clinic was opening, and she was calling nurses to staff it.

Probably the first one to be appointed was Miss Marguerite Barnett, '14, as supervisor of the clinics. Barney, as we all called her, was not only our supervisor, but our friend and professional and personal advisor.

I remember when we became 21 years old, she herded us all together, and marched us to Lombard Street to register to vote. She felt strongly about that. When Election Day came, the same procedure prevailed, and we were given time to go vote. Not given time — mandated that we go. To this day my conscience makes me vote at every primary and general election.

Each morning we congregated in her office on sixth floor of the clinic to get our supplies, tell her our problems, and get directions for the day. It made a close bond between those of us who took advantage of it.

It was during those morning conferences that we also planned get-togethers. Our most remembered was the pic-

nics. On our Sunday off, we would pack a picnic lunch, take the open air trolley to beautiful Fairmount Park, and enjoy an outing. It was so good to get out of the city, particularly on a hot summer day. You must remember there was no such thing as air conditioning in hospital or nurse's home in those days

Sometimes we would go to the clinic rooftop for R & R. Pictures will attest to this.

Nurses were not "allowed" to fraternize with medical students or interns. One time Miss Melville saw Caroline and Millie being escorted to the door of the Nurses' home by two medical students. She called Barney the next day, and scolded her for allowing "her girls" to do such a terrible thing. She told her to tell them to cease and desist such activity. Barney relayed the message! I'm sure it didn't stop the "activity."

After Miss Barnett was appointed, Miss Melville began to summon the rest of us, one by one. A phone call: "Miss Melville wants to see you in her office Tuesday, 1:30 P.M." We never questioned the time or motive. We were accustomed to doing what Miss Melville said!

I am not sure what kinds of clinics existed before this. I know there was an OB clinic. They moved to the Curtis Clinic intact with their nurses, secretaries, white mice, rats and rabbits, and stayed pretty much to themselves.

Minnie Souder, '30 came with E.N. & T. I know this was formerly in the basement of the old hospital building for I remember as a student taking patients from the hospital floors for T & A's. The fact that you HAD tonsils was reason enough in those days to have them removed. The adults were seated in a chair, and under local anesthesia, the M.D. snared them out.

It seemed to me to be quite gruesome. The children were lined up on stretchers, and waited, one after the other. I think Edna Scott worked for a time in this operating situation. Dr. Lott was the primary physician in the department.

Minnie left in 1935, and Rita Kratzer, '35 took over. Minnie remembers that if Dr. Lott liked you, you could do almost nothing wrong. But beware if you crossed him!

A new nurse to be appointed was Dottie Dundore (Williams), '33. She had G.U. Clinic, but didn't stay too long. Dottie had a college degree, and had taught school before

she entered nursing. A college degree was a rarity for nurses in those days, so Miss Melville soon tapped her for the nursing school office. However, not before Dottie made friends with all her co-workers. One such was Fred, the orderly in "her" clinic. Fred was quite a fisherman, and arranged deep sea fishing expeditions for us. Most of us had never been at sea, and we reacted violently. We were told to eat strawberry jam on the boat because it would taste as good coming up as going down. Those of us who were the sickest, caught the most fish, so apparently the fish liked it, too. Those who didn't get seasick got sunburned. But we sure had fun! Other classmates were always happy to go along.

Millie Smith (O'Connor), '32, was called for G.I. clinic on 8th floor, and Carolyn Jones (Transeau), '32, for Orthopedic and Neurology. Millie worked with giants like Drs. McCrae, Beardsley, Griffith, and Rhefuss. The nurses here learned to do many procedures pertaining to the G.I. tract. Three times a week gall bladder drainages were scheduled. Endless shots were given to arthritis patients for Dr. Cohen. Diabetic clinic was Saturday A.M. with Dr. Duncan. Etta Heal (Baker), '37, replaced Millie, and adds memories of Dr. Duncan. He was tall and austere, and in his English tweed suits he would give the patients H\_\_\_, and tell them not to come back again unless they "brought their blood sugar down before next week!" Millie and Etta both speak of the wonderful experience of working with such outstanding doctors. Students nurses came to these clinics too, so Etta and Millie were able to teach them, as well as the medical students, the various procedures.

Caroline's time was taken up very often in the cast room of Orthopedic clinic with Drs. Rugh, Martin, and Hand, Neurology doctors were Drs. Burns and Gilpin, whom she helped with spinal drainages every Friday.

Caroline eloped, and Millie left to work in a doctor's office. I think Etta left to marry. Remember, married nurses were not permitted to continue working at the hospital.

Jo Fink, secretary in surgical clinic, recalls the special treatment clinic for syphilis. I do not remember which clinic this was affiliated with — was it Dermatology? or was it G.U.? Anyway, secretaries and nurses from other clinics helped. The lines ran from the treatment room to the elevator, all waiting for their weekly injections of Bismuth or Neoarsphenamine. The young secretaries were frightened about those "horrible" diseases. But the patients were treated well, and appreciated the care. Many times they brought gifts — tailor

made woolen skirts, and mill workers brought silk stockings, etc.

I've already told you something about Ruth Ulsh. To continue, when the clinic was being staffed, Dr. Scheffey (for whom Ruth had worked in OB) asked Miss Melville to assign Ruth to Gyne clinic, fifth floor. Ruth was happy to accept the assignment, even though it was a cut in pay from O.B. At the time she was engaged to Nick Menicon. Miss Melville stopped her one day in the hall, and asked her if she were married. "No, Miss Melville." She was telling the truth. But shortly thereafter she did marry, and kept it a secret from administration until she resigned to join Nick who was a chaplain in the army. We girls knew about it, but our lips were sealed. She was in Gyne from November 1931 until April 1935. During her first week in the clinic, she heard two painters talking about the new building. "This is a white Elephant." We certainly refuted that statement over the next 40-odd years.

Also on the fifth floor was Surgical clinic. Gay Arnold (Blue), '32, was the nurse here. There was the general surgical clinic, Varicose Vein and Proctology clinics. Dr. Haskell was "her" proctology chief; Drs. Willauer and Walkling, surgeons. Those of you who knew Dr. Willauer will appreciate this story. The older Italian women would come to have their varicose veins treated with injections to sclerose the vein. Some of the women would drive Dr. Willauer to distraction by wearing round elastic garters. He would take the garters, stretch them like slingshots, grab scissors and cut them to shreds. The women would come to Gay crying, not knowing how to get home with their stockings falling below their knees. Gay would make a knot on the top, fasten it with adhesive tape and admonish her to take it off the minute she got home, and not to come back until she had a garter belt.

On Sundays, when we were on duty, but the clinics were closed, we would congregate in one of the surgical clinic treatment rooms, and prepare supplies for the following week. Gay would have the raw supplies ready. Bolts of gauze would have been cut to the proper sizes the day before in Central Supply. We would fold and wrap the dressings for sterilization on Monday. We made cotton balls. We made applicators. We sharpened needles. There were no disposables then. No disposable nothing that I can remember. Needles and syringes were boiled between use. We didn't worry about Aids, nor even hepatitis. I know of no case of infection being transmitted.

During this time we discussed love and life! Was it better

to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all? The problem was never solved.

Gay led the singing. It made the chore less boring. Gay was (and is) a good vocalist. Poor Gay, even though I would sit next to her, she never was able to keep me in tune!

Sometimes we would be assigned to relieve in accident ward, or perhaps to sit with a patient recovering from emergency surgery, coming out of ether. I don't remember that there was such a thing as a recovery room. We didn't much care for these assignments — only because we felt inadequate in strange surroundings.

Before patients came to the clinic they stopped on first floor, registered, told their complaint so the registrar could assign them to the appropriate clinic. They had to pay 50 cents, 25 cents, or nothing as determined. During clinic hours an operator ran the elevator. One day, a patient handed him a slip of paper that read "Pain in R ear." Mistakenly, the patient was directed to proctology clinic instead of ear clinic. Imagine being told to take your pants down to have your ear looked at!

The clinic was officially opened with appropriate dedication ceremonies on December 17, 1931, and the portrait of Cyrus Curtis was unveiled. Of course, you realize that by this time we had all settled in, and were functioning well. I hope you also realize by now that I have not mentioned Children's Clinic.

I was one of the lucky ones to receive the order to report to Miss Melville. I felt particularly grateful when she asked me (told me) to take Children's Clinic. It is the one I would have chosen had I been give a choice.

The chief of the clinic was Dr. Norman Macneill, affectionately known as "Mac." I don't remember knowing him before, but it didn't take long to realize how fortunate I was. He was very easy to get to know and I knew in short order that he was a kind and caring man. This was borne out in the eight years I was in the clinic. He sailed in, in a hue of colors, red hair complementing his green suit, pink shirt, and tie the color of "baby B.M." (his words.) This doesn't sound as bizarre today as it was in the conservative era of the 30's.

The clinics were open 11 AM to 1 PM, except on Saturday when it was 11 AM to 12 Noon. Even if we had not had a clock, we would have known when it was clinic time. The parents, mostly mothers with their children, would be in the booths usually around 10:30 AM. They would have checked in with the secretary, who called for the history to come from the record room via pneumatic tube, or write a history if the patient was new. The nurse then saw that each patient was weighed and measured. This might be done by the R.N. or a student nurse if one was available. Also Debs from the Main Line, who were Junior League trainees, came on some days. Many a Main Line deb got baptized as she placed a male baby on the baby scales, and took off his diaper. All of us learned to keep our lips closed. The R.N. tried to be in the weighing room when possible. This was her opportunity to observe the children, evaluate them and teach good health

When this was done, the history was put in an open file box for the physician. The child was either put in one of the examining rooms to wait, or sent outside to the booth.

When we heard the tap-tap-tappity-tap in 16/16 double time, we knew Mac was coming down the hall. He sailed in, and firmly took charge. As the other doctors came in, they assigned students to each patient. There were usually four,

five, sometimes six doctors. Each one would be supervising the medical students.

In the hall, which was the waiting room, there were booths which were supposed to keep the mothers and their children separate from other families in order to prevent cross contamination of the so-called childhood diseases, which are practically non-existent now. But can you imagine trying to keep them separated? They ran all over the place. So we tried to screen them as soon as possible.

We did have a holding room for diagnosed or suspected communicable disease patients. If so diagnosed, they were kept here until private transportation could be arranged by parent or social worker, or they could be transferred to the Philadelphia Hospital for Contagious Diseases, (no longer in existence.)

Dr. Macneill flitted all over. Students and staff alike sought his advice. Sometimes there weren't enough patients for each two students. Sometimes there were too many. Mac said we were a weather clinic. "Whether they (the children) came or whether they didn't, depended on the weather." So true. So the students prodded, thumped, listened, looked and conferred with each other. Dr. Macneill would stand at the door of the examining room, 10 feet from the patient, and make an accurate diagnosis before the student had an inkling. He needed only his five senses, not the armada and sometimes inaccurate laboratory results which we often see today.

He didn't cotton to birth control. If the rest of us were wont to berate a poor struggling mother for having 10 children, his answer was: "God will take care of them." Most of us knew that God's initials were frequently "NMM."

Again, he would be instructing a mother in infant feeding. She would ask if her three month old baby should have solid food. "Mother, if God wanted him to eat meat and vegetables

at three months He would have given him teeth now." He was not much for bottle feeding, if breast milk was at all available. "Can I give my baby a bottle?" "Mother, cows' milk is for calves. Mother's milk is for babies."

However, we had a big walk-in closet filled with all kinds of samples of baby foods and commercial formulae. All sent by the newly emerging baby food companies. I remember the Gerber foods especially. They sent pictures of the Gerber baby which we hung all over the clinic. These samples of food and formula helped many families eke out the babies' diet. He was very generous in passing out these samples to any needy family.

The medical students received wonderful training in all the aspects of pediatric care to be found in any general practice. In addition to this general practice we had specialized services. Dr. John Coppolino had a congenital syphilis clinic. All babies born to leutic mothers in the OB department were referred to him. I think this was on Tuesday. Dr. Coppolino taught me to draw blood for the Wasserman tests, this at a time when nurses barely were allowed to take blood pressures. We drew from the jugular vein or the fontanel. Tricky business. Medical students learned from all of us. Treatment hopefully was prevention by good prenatal care. The Wasserman positive infants were given Acetarson, perorally, Arsphenamine or Bismuth. Also one day a week we had a heart clinic. I do not remember who was in charge of that clinic. Was it Dr. Edward Thomas or Dr. Aaron Capper? No matter. They were both involved in Children's care.

Wednesday afternoon was Well Baby Clinic. That was a day we all liked. All those healthy black, white and yellow babies! The Debs particularly liked that clinic. We averaged 1,000 babies a month for awhile. We vaccinated for smallpox, and gave DPT immunizations. One year we tuberculin tested them. (Once when I was a school nurse in Williamsport, I had to attend a two day seminar on how to do tubercular testing. I, who had done hundreds, and had taught medical students to do them.)

Thursday PM was Children's Psychiatric Clinic, under the care of Dr. Baldwin Keyes. This was primarily counselling of parents and psychological testing and evaluation — many times to facilitate placement in institutions.

I particularly remember Blaine and Evan W. (I remember their names after 55 years!) The mother had taken these two children all over Philadelphia and New York City to every facility that did psychological testing, especially to the ones that would tell her Blaine and Evan had the highest I.Q. I think they did test out to something like 130 for Blaine, and 150 for Evan. There was no question that they were bright. The mother, considering herself very bright, looked for a husband equally bright, and married him to procreate super children. The only thing was, the husband was living in New York on welfare, and she was in Philadelphia on welfare. I do wonder what happened to them! The last I saw of them she had them on a harness going down 10th Street.

Dr. Keyes had one great fault! After every clinic day, he would bring his notes for the history to Miss Edwards, the secretary, and the two of us would spend hours deciphering his writing. It consisted of a first letter, and then lots of squiggles. We got pretty good at it. If it was impossible, we would keep the history, and ask him the next week to decipher it. He usually accepted our interpretation.

During all this time I had been taking classes at the University of Pennsylvania. Finally, I went on parttime from Children's Clinic. I was taking Public Health Nursing, and Katherine

Tucker, my advisor at Penn, advised me that my class work would be much more valuable if I had some actual public health experience. I thought my pediatric and Curtis Clinic was adequate.

However, I had been in the clinic 8 years, and felt it was time to move on. So, with the blessing of Dr. Macneill and the others, I resigned in 1939 with regret, and went with Philadelphia Nursing Society.

By this time there had been many changes of staff. The clinics survived until about 1974. Pediatric Clinic was the first one to close in 1974.

By 1978, all the clinics were closed, and former patients were assigned to private physicians. Now all clinic floors, with the exception of first, are used by the medical college.

And so ended a remarkable era. I wonder where the medical students now get the kinds of excellent experiences they did in the Curtis Clinic! Not only the medical students — the nurses were doubly fortunate in working with such top notch doctors in all fields. The doctors were compassionate, caring, and willing to give their time and expertise gratis to patients, medical students, nurses, secretaries; yes, even the Debs. This was the theme that ran through all the letters that I received. Each nurse thought "her" chief was the best. I knew mine was. Dr. Macneill died in 1965. He was a great doctor, and a great human being. I am grateful to have been a part of the clinic.

I'm sorry not to talk about all the R.N.'s, secretaries, and others who were part of the clinics. There was a constant going and coming. Perhaps someone else out there will pick up the story for next years Bulletin.

## Accentuate The Positive

Since my last article, some bad luck occurred. I asked myself, "Why would my fellow alumni be interested?" But since so many people continue to give me encouragement, I once again send along a report.

I've had people say, "Hang in there." "Things could always be worse." "Keep your chin up." And when kids today hear of problems, they often say, "That's deep." The phrase that helps me the most is, "One day at a time."

Now for an update on the bad luck.

In July 1987, during a pivotal transfer (necessary because I have multiple sclerosis, I was dropped. An X-ray showed that the right femur snapped, and I was sent to surgery for insertion of plates. No weight bearing allowed; therefore, no transfer.

However, thanks to Dr. Hoyer, who invented a canvas with hooks, chains and pump — the Hoyer Lift — I have been transported from bed to wheelchair, and from wheelchair to bed via this transportation.

The Hoyer was used in the hospital in July 1987. And in July 1988, I am still swinging in this remarkable contraption because the fracture has not healed, although there has been considerable progress in the healing process.

The rattle of the chains takes me back to high school literature when we studied Victor Hugo's *Les Miserables*. Jean val Jean was in chains in prison for 19 years. So my one year must be accepted.

Recently I went for my "every second month" X-ray of the femur. Although the orthopedic surgeon is anxious to have me "restart" weight bearing and pivot, he hastens to add, "You have had to be remiss for one year, so physical therapy must come first." Although I hope to get back to where I was one year ago (and even hope to start tutoring again) I am told that I have severe osteoporosis because of no weight bearing. It looks as though I am a sitting duck for another fracture.

Another obstacle that has cropped up at the worst time is a problem I an having with my left shoulder, relating to an arthrotomy eight years ago. It's slow going, and always gets back to "one day at a time."

On a happier note, I am still able to "go places" by a Septa Paratransit van. To be picked up and returned home, I must call for reservations exactly one week in advance of decided trip (allowed only within city limits). These outings allow me to keep doctors' appointments as well as enjoy trips to the grocery store or shopping malls, always with a Home Health Aide by my side. Several times a year, I make trips to my niece's home in Narberth and my sister's home in Wynnewood, ordering vans that provide services to the suburbs.

Every August, my sister, her daughters, sons-in-law, and their children spend a week at the New Jersey shore. There are five little ones now, ranging in age from three months to seven years — three boys and two girls. For my day's visit with them, I call on a friend who has multiple sclerosis and drives his own specially-equipped van from his wheelchair. My Home Health Aide accompanies me, and she and my friend "do the boardwalk" while I spend time with my family.

My family and I meet for a festive lunch in the lovely dining room of the Flanders Hotel in Ocean City. Then we walk the boards, giving me a chance to enjoy a look at the ocean. At the end of the day when I'm being put to bed with the help of (you guessed it) the Hoyer lift, I'm happy to have the memory of a day at the shore.

My elder niece's two little boys, age 7 and 4, come to my apartment for a weekly visit, making a bee-line to an A&P box covered with gift-wrap paper and filled with toys. We have a glorious play session.

I have been in the wheelchair for 12 years now, and "no bed sores." Jefferson training—take a bow!

Note: Miss Moyer was graduated from Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing in 1943. Her clinical experience from 1945 to 1953 was wide and varied. In addition, she served in the Army Nurse Corps, World War II, and spent 18 months in a General Hospital in England. In 1953 she received a B.S. in Nursing Education from the University of Pennsylvania, after which her teaching career began. Miss Moyer was president of the Jefferson Nurses Alumni Association, 1959, 1960, 1961

## Reaching a Cherished Goal

As far back as I can remember (and that's a very long time) I wanted to be a nurse. I was inspired by a great-aunt, who lived in a rural area and spent her life-time accompanying the local doctors to deliver babies in their homes, and caring for them and the mothers for two weeks, or until she received a call from a doctor to assist with another delivery. But in those days our parents guided our lives, and even until my graduation from high school, my parents never wavered from their decision that a nurse's life was that of slavery, and no child of theirs should choose that profession. Therefore I trained in clerical work until I was twenty-one, and in the following year, in March 1924, I was accepted into Jefferson Hospital as a "probie," determined to earn the respect and obedience that Miss Melville demanded of us. This was not difficult as I was accustomed to following orders from my elders.

There were twelve of us in that class, assigned six to a room at 1012 Spruce Street, with Miss Virginia McCleavy presenting us with more rules and regulations. Our first encounter with the awesome hospital was to have our "shots," a minor detail. OH YES! there had been an operation just before we entered the operating room, and the bloody sponges hadn't been removed from the floor, a gruesome sight. As we lined up and received the "needle," one by one we turned white and four of us, including me, slowly eased to the floor, causing the nurses dismay and hasty reviving. I expected to be sent home that night, but ethics prevailed, and I remained at Jefferson.

Our next assignment was to the "sterilizing room," where we rolled bandages, folded sponges, scrubbed floors, cleaned bathrooms, and prayed for tolerance. At the end of the first month, after uniforms and books were deducted, (in those days students received a small monthly stipend from the hospital) our first pay was fifty cents.

After three months probation, we all received our "caps," the goal for which we strived. My first assignment was to give "Mr. Jones" a bath. He related that all beginners started with him, and he helped me do a perfect job. I remember he had one leg amputated, my first encounter with such a condition.

After "capping" we thought at last we were nurses, but the struggle had just begun. Back-breaking at times, but rewarding, and my long sought goal had finally materialized.

After reading the 1987 Alumni Bulletin, which I enjoyed to the extent that I wanted to write to say—it all brought back so many memories; for instance, the descriptions and experiences of Thelma Showers Morris in her "duty" at Pine Street. Even though she followed me by five years, we shared so many memories. Miss Cushen showed patient concern for our "cogitation" in following instructions to prepare a male corpse (I'm sure we must have had more than our share of them.) But as Thelma described the working crew, "we were one big happy family."

Also the article by June Reginak Dupnock on "School Nursing" brought back memories of my thirteen years as a school nurse, which in very few ways corresponded to the present methods. I was the lone nurse in the Kennett Square Consolidated School with 1200 students. This included ele-

mentary and high school grades in the one building, and encompassed the rural area.

My first two months at the beginning of each term was spent "hunting" for head lice in the lower grades, and separating the culprits from the "clean" guys. I could give aspirin only on doctor's orders, and appeased upset tummies with "Rolaids" and rest on a cot (which the patient looked forward to, especially if the next class was unpopular.)

As paper work increased, a second nurse was employed and before I retired, we had one teen-age pregnancy. One morning a drunken high school student was sent to me to be taken home to his parents. These two events aroused a turmoil among the administration, being the first of the kind to happen. I was glad I did not have to make the decisions.

Do none of the R.N.'s wear caps anymore? (I still have my first cap.) I am amazed when I do volunteer work at the bloodmobile and find none of the nurses capped. When I ask them why? they reply "too much trouble." Do they not care about the distinction between aides and R.N.'s? If they worked as hard as I did to get my cap, no one could take it away from them. Oh yes, I had to wear a complete uniform when I was a school nurse.

I am proud to be a "Jefferson" graduate. I will close my travels down memory lane by quoting the ending from the president's message, "Thanks for the Memories."

## SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

This year's Alumni Achievement Award Winner, Sister Rose Kershbaumer, a member of the Medical Mission Sisters, has worked in developing African countries for the past 34 years. The Medical Mission Sisters are an order of Catholic nuns who provide medical care in developing countries around the world. The primary focus of the order is on caring for women and children. The Alumni Special Achievement Award is given each year to recognize the outstanding achievement of an alumnus in the areas of education, research, or community service.

Sister Rose Kershbaumer has attended Columbia University, the University of Pennsylvania, and the Catholic Maternity Institute since graduating from Jefferson's School of Nursing in 1948, but ask her where she went to school and she'll proudly respond "Thomas Jefferson University!" Sister Rose says "I have always identified myself with Jefferson. Jefferson taught me at an early age to be responsible, and to always be my best. I believe that what I learned at Jefferson was the basis for my future education and involvement in nursing."

Sister Rose says she joined the Mission Sisters because, "It was something I had been considering for some time. I felt it was a good way for me to achieve my goal of service. I have always been interested in other parts of the world, so I suppose I was more aware of the problems in developing countries than here in the United States."

After completing her training for the Mission Sisters in 1954, Sister Rose's first assignment was to a 100-bed hospital and nursing school in Berekum, Ghana, in West Africa. Her responsibilities included teaching and general staff nurse duties. From there she was moved to Techiman Ghana, and then to Uganda in 1964 as the matron of nursing for Virika Hospital. Virika had been in existence for some time, but was poorly staffed. A full team of professionals was brought in, including Sister Rose who served as matron of nursing for four years. She reorganized the nursing service, established outreach clinics, and began a school of nursing.

When Sister Rose was assigned to Africa, Mission Sisters' assignments were for life, but in 1957 the decision was made to allow sisters to return home every seven to ten years. Today, sisters return every three to five years, often for continuing education.

In 1969, Sister Rose returned to the United States to complete her Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing and her Master's Degree in Nursing from the University of Pennsylvania. "I received a \$500 scholarship from Jefferson's Nurses Alumni Association, at that time \$500 was a lot of money and it enabled me to continue my education. It was one more way that Jefferson had a major impact on my life." During her time in the States she spent her summers working in New Mexico

and Utah in programs for maternal care and completed a certificate course in midwifery in New Mexico. She then returned to Holy Family Hospital in Ghana as director of nursing and became more involved in midwifery. The hospital had a school of midwifery which she supervised.

Sister Rose continues to be deeply committed to midwifery. "One of the big differences in nursing care in Africa versus America is in the area of child birth. In Africa, a midwife has complete responsibility for prenatal care and child birth. If a doctor is brought in it is at the referral of the midwife," says Sister Rose. "Another big difference is that in western medicine there is a great dependence on technology, but in Africa clinical expertise is relied upon.

"Because there are fewer doctors and the sense of need is so great, nurses have more autonomy, they are given much more control in the care of patients," says Sister Rose. "I also think there is more understanding of the demands made on a nurse's time."

After leaving Ghana in 1973, Sister Rose went to Zambia, then to Kenya and then to Malawi where she has been since 1980. Sister Rose has worked with the World Health Organization, the United States Peace Corps, the Malawi Ministry of Health, two hospitals and several major African universities.

Sister Rose says "Medical care has come a long way during my years in Africa. The goal of the Mission Sisters is to work our way out of a job, to teach locals to do what we do. In almost all of the places I have worked that has been accomplished. In 1954 we had some doctors and nurses, very few registered nurses, and no other allied health professionals. There were only a few nursing schools and they were staffed mostly by Americans. The students I taught in Nairobi in the late 1970s are now running that school, and I have worked with many of my former students as colleagues in other parts of Africa. It's a very rewarding feeling."

In the early 1980s Sister Rose was working for the World Health Organization at the University of Malawi as an educator and coordinator of their efforts to develop a school of nursing. Today the President and Dean of the University's Kamuzu College of Nursing are Malawians. Many of the teachers are also Malawians. Other changes include a new school of allied health which has been opened in Malawi, offering seven programs including pharmacology and ophthalmology.

Sister Rose, who was in the United States for a brief visit in August, is back in Africa continuing her work with the Mission Sisters. Her dedication to nursing and midwifery in developing countries is extraordinary, as is her dedication to Jefferson.

## Archives and the Nursing Experience

When was the first nurse hired to work at Jefferson Medical College? Who was she? Where did she get her training? What were her duties? And knowing that, why did she choose to become a nurse? These are the classic five W's, the questions which the University Archives strives to answer, or at least to explore. Our daily challenge is to answer hundreds of questions such as these about the University, its people, and its past. Sometimes, finding the answer is as easy as checking a catalog or an index. Sometimes, after every possible resource has been exhausted, the mystery remains.

The Archives, a department of the Library, has a five-fold mission. We identify, collect, organize and describe, preserve, and make accessible those materials that have archival value to the University, its staff, students and alumni. To determine whether an item should be kept in our permanent collections, we consider administrative, legal, fiscal, and historical values. Perhaps the item explains a policy decision, describes events from a special perspective, records operating costs and equipment purchases, or illustrates campus life. A walk through the Archives reveals Jefferson's many facets.

If we are to provide answers, we must know where to look, so our first charge is to identify and collect those materials that *hold* the answers. The official records and publications of the University are our most important source of information. In recognition of this fact, the College of Allied Health Sciences has embarked on a systematic program to transfer its inactive records to the Archives. Many of the important records of the School of Nursing have also been transferred to the Archives. Miss Doris Bowman, alumna of the class of

1942, Emeritus Professor of Nursing, and Director of the School from 1958 to 1982, has been tireless in her efforts to preserve both documents and artifacts of the School.

The official records, of course, are only a beginning. The Archives also collects the personal papers and memorabilia of our faculty, staff and alumni. Textbooks and class notes, letters and diaries, programs of commencements and cappings, pins, invitations and souvenirs of events are all part of Jefferson's history. One of the Archives' top goals for the coming year is to increase its documentation of nursing staff and student life through adding the personal papers of alumni.

Once materials are acquired, our next task is to put them in order, arranging them in a way that accurately reflects why they were created and how they were used. As we organize collections, we also describe their contents, so that answers can be readily found. These descriptions may be in the form of an index or an inventory, called a finding aid, that can be used to assist researchers. In addition to printed finding aids, the Archives will soon be adding holdings data to the Library's automated catalog, Jeffline. We will also be reporting our holdings of personal papers to the National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections, maintained by the Library of Congress.

Because only those materials that have enduring worth are chosen for inclusion in the Archives, our next concern is to ensure their permanent preservation. This would be easy if no one ever used them, but of course, we want to preserve them so that they *can* be used. This can be quite a dilemma! Simply by storing materials in protective containers made of acid-free paper, and keeping them in a climate controlled area, their useful lifespan is greatly increased. We also re-

quest all visitors to handle them with loving care. In rare instances, we must restrict access to fragile items. Stringent controls are also placed on access to confidential information.

While our primary clientele are University administrators, we serve the entire staff, affiliates, alumni and students. The Archives is also open to the public; we receive many telephone calls and letters each month, requesting information about the University and its alumni. Often, these questions come from people searching for their own family history. Academic scholars, too, find answers in the archives, as well as authors of fact and fiction. These collections support research in such fields as the history of nursing, social history, minority and women's studies, history of education, health policy and hospital administration.

The Archives is a relative newcomer to Jefferson, having gotten its start in 1975. Who kept the institution's archival records, dating from as early as 1824, before us? We are very fortunate that so many offices and individuals recognized the importance of Jefferson's historical records over the years, carefully keeping them for posterity until the Archives could take up its charge. The Alumni Association of the School of Nursing is responsible for preserving much of that heritage. Since its beginnings in 1895, the Alumni Association has been a forward-looking organization, firmly rooted in the past and its traditions.

I began this brief excursion through the Archives with five W's. There are five more important questions which should now be answered. Who does the Archives serve? You! What

does it have that might interest you? A cape, a rose, a candle; a pillow, a ribbon, a cap; these and many more await you. Where can you find them? In Room 310, Scott Library Building. When can you see them? The Archives welcomes visitors from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Why visit the Archives? Perhaps, if you are like me, to look for answers to the *first* five questions. Come, satisfy your curiosity!

#### Relief Fund Committee Report

During 1987 the Nurses Relief Fund Trust was able to give financial assistance to 10 of our graduates.

As stated in the 1984 revised By-Laws "Any graduate of the Diploma School of Nursing and the White Haven School of Nursing shall be given consideration for benefits from the Relief Fund Trust to help meet expenses incurred due to illness or other expenses for necessities." All things being equal first consideration will be given to Life and Active members. However, all applications received will be reviewed and given consideration.

All or a portion of the amount of money distributed to a recipient from the Relief Fund may have to be reported to the Internal Revenue Service as taxable income. Each recipient will receive a statement at the end of the year showing what portion of the distribution to her/him should be reported.

An application for Relief Fund benefits can be found in the back of the bulletin.

#### The Satellite Committee

At the June meeting, your Board of Directors approved the following guidelines for Satellite Committees. These are:

Purpose: To promote fellowship among members.

- Goals: 1. To provide assistance to sick members if needed, through the Relief Fund Trust.


