Dynamic equilibrium — this is our challenge: to respond to the challenge of change without losing vital functions, traditions or identity.

Our vital function for many years has been to produce a nurse capable of performing as a generalist in beginning positions in hospitals, extended care facilities and health maintenance facilities.

Major curriculum changes have not been made in the past year. While some diploma schools are considering eliminating credit courses our unique position in a medical university allows us to continue to offer college credit for freshman courses in psychology (3), sociology (3) and microbiology (5). Students desiring to take additional credit courses may enroll in the College of Allied Health Sciences elective program at their own expense.

Academic excellence is a personal goal of many students; as alumni you help to motivate them toward that goal through the Alumni prize. The 1973 recipient was Virginia Corotto.

One of our most beautiful traditions, the rose arch, was meaningful this year to sixty-eight young women who had been challenged by Jefferson alumnus, Dr. Peter L. Eichman, to take their places working for change in health care delivery systems — change that is necessary for the continued growth and up-grading of the profession.

As you know, one of the challenges Jefferson has responded to is that of making allowances for married students. Four of the graduates were married prior to the senior year; of these, one was the mother of a two year old son. Forty of the graduates plan to remain at Jefferson. As always, the others will scatter, one going as far as Central Alaska to a mission hospital.

Championship basketball teams are becoming an undergraduate tradition! For the second consecutive year the team won dual titles — The Southeastern Pennsylvania Student Nurses' Basketball League and the 4th Annual Thomas Jefferson Invitational Tournament. Not taking a back seat to the team, our cheerleaders won the Southeastern Pennsylvania Student Nurses' Cheerleading Championship. Gold basketball charms and gold megaphone charms were given to the respective team members by the League. The trophy case is literally filled to overflowing, but there's always room for one more!

Cheryl Steimer, '73 was recipient of the Thomas Jefferson Award for Outstanding Athletic Achievement presented at the annual basketball banquet at the Three Threes Restaurant, April 25, 1973. Both

the banquet and the award are traditionally provided by the School of Nursing Department of the Women's Board.

The School of Nursing Department of the Women's Board plays a major role in supporting traditional activities of the School such as the tea for freshmen and seniors. Being Alumni, you are aware of their contributions and know that they are so numerous the entire report could be devoted to them. Suffice it to say, we are indebted to them.

Identity crisis and youth seem to be synonymous. There are those of you who might feel that the advent of a new nursing program at Jefferson, a baccalaureate program, has created an identity crisis for our school after eighty-two years. Be assured that no such crisis exists. Each school has its own faculty, philosophy, objectives and, of course, students. The faculties have, on occasion, held joint meetings and enjoy a rapport that allows for exchange of ideas for mutual benefit.

In September 1973, the School of Nursing will be co-ed with the admission of two male students!!! Although male applicants have been accepted since 1971, until now none has accepted the appointment.

As Jefferson Medical College was putting finishing touches on sesquicentennial plans the American Hospital Association was celebrating their centennial. As part of the centennial celebration a Centennial Club was formed. This group, composed of one student from each member diploma school selected because of clinical excellence, probably will never meet or organize formally but each will wear with pride a special pin symbolic of their unique honor. Jefferson's recipient was Bonnie Zaiss, '73.

Sesquicentennial activities have involved the school in that students and graduates are seen in the film, "Of Light and Learning," produced here on campus for the kick-off of the fund raising campaign.

Looking back, the past year has been a good year, a year of challenge and change; a year of maintaining dynamic equilibrium.

Looking ahead, one sees the challenge of inevitable change coming with the admission of male students; the writing of a voluminous report so necessary for the anticipated NLN accreditation visit next year; the confusion of moving as the Edison Building (former home of Philadelphia Electric) at 9th and Sansom becomes the home of the College of Allied Health Sciences; and the continued preparation of capable nurses like yourselves.

SCHOOL OF PRACTICAL NURSING

The School of Practical Nursing continues to recruit a very varied group of students for its twelve month program and to attempt to meet the many challenges graduates will be faced with in the future. In an effort to obtain more experience in direct patient care the school has established its first affiliation with a smaller community based hospital (Jeanes) in Northeast Philadelphia. The Faculty hopes to cultivate this affiliation further in the future and perhaps create others to enhance the program.

In the past year the Nursing Service Department of Thomas Jefferson University Hospital has inaugurated a new in-service education program designed to upgrade licensed practical nurses employed a minimum of one year to an advanced status with greater remuneration. These licensed practical nurses will be permitted to dispense medications on a limited basis and generally take more responsibility for patient care on the evening and night tours of duty when registered nurses are often in short supply. It is hoped that this program will be successful in retaining more licensed practical nurses who enjoy giving responsible bedside nursing care rather than being formally prepared through educational programs to become registered nurses.

Commencement Exercises are held each year during the second week of September in McClellan Hall and a new class registers the following day to begin the program during the third week. With the graduation scheduled for September 12, 1973 the number of graduates of this school will number 277.

NAMED TO ACADEMY OF NURSING

We are proud to announce that two Jefferson graduates have been elected to the newly established Academy of Nursing.

The Board of Directors of the American Nurses' Association at its January 1973 meeting elected 36 nationally prominent nurses to be charter fellows of the academy. "The establishment of the Academy of Nursing is an historic step for the nursing profession."

The 36 charter fellows were chosen from more than 100 nominees and symbolize the high degree of commitment of today's nurses to provide a high quality of care.

Barbara G. Schutt, R.N., M.S., Norwich, Conn., class of 1939; is a contributing editor of the American Journal of Nursing. Before being named contributing editor Barbara was executive Secretary of the Pennsylvania Nurses' Association and editor of the Pennsylvania Nurse. She also served in Okinawa as 1st Lt. U.S. Army Nurse Corps.

Harriet H. Werley, R.N., Ph.D., class of 1941; is academy recording secretary and the director of the Center for Health Research, Wayne State University, Detroit, Mich. Dr. Werley conceived, established and developed the Department of Nursing at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research. Harriet has provided the leadership for the promotion of research in nursing that was patient-care oriented. Within four years, she, along with staff, developed and initiated a postmaster's educational program to prepare Army Nurse Corps officers for research positions within the military.

ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION RELIEF FUND BENEFITS

Active and life members are entitled up to three hundred dollars (\$300.00) annually toward their Hospital bills. (It is no longer necessary to be hospitalized at Jefferson.) This sum of money is to be applied after the members hospitalization insurance and other benefits have been used. Nursing Homes are excluded.

Associate members are entitled up to one hundred-fifty dollars (\$150.00) annually toward their Hospital bills. (It is no longer necessary to be hospitalized at Jefferson.) This sum of money is to be applied after the member's hospitalization insurance and other benefits have been used. Nursing Homes are excluded.

1. Members are required to be in good standing with the Alumnae Association at the time of admission to a hospital.

2. Upon request to the Secretary-Treasurer a form will be submitted to the applicant member, to be completed by the Medical Record Department of the Hospital to verify hospitalization.

3. Any graduate must be a member of the Alumnae Association for one (1) year before she is eligible to receive benefits.

4. Pregnancy and its complications entirely excluded.

5. Cosmetic surgery entirely excluded.

6. Dental surgery and/or complications are entirely excluded.

7. If a member has not paid dues before April 1st she is not eligible for benefits from the Relief Fund.

8. Special cases due to adversities, must be referred to the President for investigation and subsequently to the Board of Directors for consideration.

The above By-laws were amended, voted on and accepted at the Annual Alumnae Meeting on January 9, 1973.

SESQUICENTENNIAL —

A CELEBRATION AND A CHALLENGE

A Sesquicentennial in 1974

Anniversaries are a time for reflection. They are a time for looking back to review one's progress, and even more a time to look forward and assess the way ahead. As Thomas Jefferson University celebrates in 1974 the 150th anniversary of its founding, Nursing Education at Jefferson celebrates its 83rd anniversary. Nursing education has been a vital part of Jefferson for more than half of its existence.

Jefferson graduates can and should take pride in the fact that their university stands in a unique position among American medical centers. It is unique as a university that is wholly medically oriented, and health-related. It is unique as a University in which the programs range across a broad spectrum of nursing, medical, and allied health professions. It is unique in combining its classroom and laboratory instruction with clinical experience in professional settings and relationships.

An obligation of leadership — preparing for change

No matter how long it has been since you graduated from Jefferson, everyone has seen changes affect the nursing profession. Furthermore, you could forecast other changes that seem necessary and desirable.

Forecasting change accurately, and preparing to meet it, are obligations of leadership. It is in fulfillment of those obligations that Thomas Jefferson University has embarked upon its Sesquicentennial Campaign; a commitment to Century 21.

No matter what affection one feels for Old Main or Thompson — no matter how warmly one recalls the hours spent on duty within their halls and laboratories — neither building can compete with the facilities we expect in a modern medical center. What is more important is that the educational programs in nursing and other disciplines must change as curricula are updated to incorporate new knowledge and understanding into health care.

Almost four years ago, Jefferson addressed itself to the changes we must undertake if we are to meet successfully the medical challenges of the 21st century. A Master Planning Committee, comprising representatives from each school and college within the University, has met regularly ever since January, 1970. It has examined specific questions intensively, through task forces and sub-committees, and has agreed upon a Master Plan that Jefferson seeks to implement with support provided in its Sesquicentennial Campaign.

Jefferson's Master Plan

Jefferson's Master Plan represents an \$84,000,000 program. Of that amount, \$53,000,000 will be invested in a new Clinical Teaching Facility to be built north of the present campus, between Sansom, 11th, Chestnut, and 10th streets. The Clinical Teaching Facility will be financed entirely through bonds.

Between Walnut and Locust streets, east of 10th, new student housing units will be constructed at a cost of \$6,000,000. Money for this construction has been authorized and provided through the Pennsylvania Higher Education Facilities Authority.

The remaining \$25,000,000 will be money required for an Educational Improvement Fund. That fund will assist in reorganizing ambulatory services, establishing community health centers, making improvements in teaching, in strengthening undergraduate programs, and in scholarships and fellowships. These improvements and innovations represent the most important part of the Master Plan — they are the substance that turns bricks and mortar into a medical university. The Educational Improvement Fund is that part of the Master Plan that requires private support from alumnae, alumni, faculty, friends, corporations, and foundations.

The Sesquicentennial Campaign

Trustees of Thomas Jefferson University have volunteered to direct those divisions of the Campaign that are seeking support from outside the Jefferson family. Dr. Peter A. Herbut, as President, is serving as the chairman of the Sesquicentennial Campaign among present members of the Jefferson family, including the administration, faculty, and employees. At the time this is written, more than \$1,345,000 has been pledged or paid by the Jeffersonians within this Division. Almost \$2,000,000 has already been pledged or paid to the Campaign from foundations and corporations close to Jefferson.

In the final tally, however, Jefferson's alumnae and alumni will determine how rapidly Thomas Jefferson University reaches its Sesquicentennial Campaign goals. Jefferson graduates are those who chose it for their education, and who know how much that education has contributed to their own professional careers. They are the ones who can provide in this campaign for those to whom an R.N. is only a cherished goal today.

Mrs. Harriet O'Conner has accepted the leadership of the Alumnae Division in the Sesquicentennial Campaign. In doing so, she said, "The Sesquicentennial Campaign is not just another annual appeal for funds. It is a once-in-a-decade chance that alumnae have to participate significantly in shaping the health education and health care that will affect thousands of Americans in the next generation."

Mrs. O'Conner has expressed it well. We ask that you, along with every other graduate of Jefferson, join in helping to shape the outline of Thomas Jefferson University in the years immediately before us. In doing so, you will have a direct impact upon the Nursing Education that Jefferson can offer to those who will follow in your footsteps.

PROGRESS OF THE THOMAS JEFFERSON UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL 1972-1973

As plans for the new Clinical Teaching Facility move forward, attention to the renovation of the current facilities to improve patient care continues.

In December 1972, work on the Intensive Care Nursery was begun and was completed in June of this year. This unit is located in the same area on the ninth floor of the Main Building, but there, all resemblance to the old crowded nursery ends. The new facility has four separate nurseries with a central nursing station, an x-ray unit, treatment and utility rooms, and storage, supply and disposal areas capable of being reached from an outside corridor to limit the number of persons entering the nursery. Monitoring capability is built into each room so that the high risk infant is under constant supervision by the physicians and nurses. Many other features too numerous to mention make this a modern facility for the care of Jefferson's high-risk babies as well as of those of more than forty other hospitals in a three-state region from which we receive transfers via ambulance and helicopter.

The nursery renovations received its major support through funds pledged by the Women's Board. This group of dedicated ladies, through fund-raising activities such as the Old Market Fair, Charity Ball of Philadelphia, and the Women's Board thrift shop, —the PennyWise Shop, has supported many projects for better patient care at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital. Some of these over the past three years

include the construction of the helipad, the renovation of the term nurseries and the expansion of the Dialysis Unit.

The Operating Rooms Department has received its share of attention by the Administration. In December 1972, the endoscopic treatment room was converted to an operating room, and in July 1973, the two female dressing rooms were reconverted to operating rooms. Open-heart surgery, kidney transplantations, complex orthopedic procedures and hand surgery have dictated the need of more specialized operating rooms and these renovation programs have been planned toward meeting these needs.

In the planning, the needs of the community have not been overlooked. Participation in the Philadelphia Department of Health, Childhood Lead Poisoning Control Project, Community Mental Health Services, and the Children and Youth Program provide support of community health programs under Jefferson's leadership. The Volunteer Service through patient care, offers health career opportunities to young people searching for their field of interest. These youngsters are assigned to the areas of their choice such as Radiology, Respiratory Therapy, Clinical Laboratories, School of Nursing and Practical Nursing, and many other departments interested in promoting the progress of young people and their own areas of responsibility.

Other changes which have taken place over the past year include some major administrative assignments. Mr. Edwin L. Taylor was appointed to the position of Hospital Director, and Francis J. Sweeney, Jr., M.D., was promoted to the position of Vice-President for Health Services in July 1972.

This report highlights only a few of the many changes which have taken place over the past year. Plans for the future are exciting and innovative as Jefferson moves ahead fulfilling her commitment to patients and the community she serves.

For those of you who haven't visited us recently, we would like to show you the new Jefferson and hope that you will stop by when you are in center city.

THE PATIENT SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Patient Services continues to seek to communicate and demonstrate to the patient and his family, personnel and the community, the concern and responsiveness of the institution in meeting the health needs of each individual.

The Department does this by seeking out those individuals who have problems or questions about the services provided. Talking to the patient to identify the sources of difficulty in obtaining service and to then determine an appropriate course of action to provide optimum care is a routine practice of the Patient Representative. The hospital policies and procedures are interpreted on an individual basis. Of course, follow-up is provided to ensure that satisfactory service has been rendered. A big job! Yes, but most challenging and rewarding.

Out of the constant strides in growth, one can say that Jefferson has provided a centralized and consistent patient grievance mechanism. It is anticipated that future guidelines to be built into contracts between Blue Cross and hospitals will include an ombudsman to handle consumer complaints. Jefferson again uses foresight. Ours has been in formal existence since 1968.

For the comfort of the patient there has been a Host-Hostess Program started during the past year. Young men and women were hired to meet and take new admissions to their assigned rooms. They introduce the patient to the Head Nurse and make it known where the Patient Services Department is located if he has any questions. This group also takes as many patients as possible to the first floor lobby for discharge. Their friendly, courteous response to these persons gives them assurance and comfort. The Information Clerks and Patient Escorts continue to add warmth and cheeriness to the patient whose day is spent in a strange place.

As reported last year, The Society of Patient Representatives was launched and advanced rapidly since early January 1973. There are now more than two hundred members from over the entire United States. Canada and Hawaii are represented.

Area representatives by state have been appointed by the American Hospital Association upon recommendation of the Board of Directors of the Society. They communicate with all those in their area who show interest in an ombudsman program.

The Director of Patient Services was elected to the Board of Directors, to remain until January 1, 1975. The Director is also a member of the Education Committee and assisted in the preparation, organization and presentation of two major workshops, one in Chicago, October 1972 and one in Miami Beach, May 1973. "Communication is Representation" was the subject for the Miami Beach two day affair.

On October 11th and 12th, the third workshop entitled "Enabling the Patient Representative to Develop More Effective Skills" will be held in Denver, Colorado. A Board meeting will take place on October 10th to make plans for an active 1974.

The Patient Representative will meet the challenging question "Will the True Patient Representative Please Step Forward" in Chicago at the Health Congress, August 1973. A Board member will be a panel member.

At Jefferson the Patient Representative program has continued to grow. Its challenges have become enormous with increased activity in the legal aspects of the patient-hospital relationship. "Consumerism" remains a key word in the thinking of the public whether it be of hospital or industry oriented. While it is perhaps more difficult today to create an understanding with the educated thinking public, none the less, the position of Patient Representative remains a heartwarming one with the goal of putting patient care first and keeping the patient aware that "there is truly someone who cares."

NEW DIALYSIS FACILITY AND TRANSPLANTATION PROGRAM

Thomas Jefferson University Hospital has made a major dedication to patients with renal disease by constructing a new dialysis facility and initiating a new transplantation program. The new dialysis unit is primarily intended for home dialysis training and to support the transplantation program. Nurses and technicians will be trained in the unit as well. The head nurse is, Margaret Mary Bryan, R.N. and associate head nurse is, Anita Baborsky, R.N.

It is a 5 bed unit which in combination with the old unit gives us a total of 8 dialysis beds. This is the largest hospital dialysis facility in Philadelphia. It has a Pediatric wing and a room constructed for home peritoneal dialysis training. The new unit was made possible by the generosity of the Women's Board of the hospital, and is dedicated to the memory of Dr. Theodore Tsaltas. Dr. Tsaltas was a Professor of Pathology at Jefferson and was one of the first chronic dialysis patients in the United States. He excelled in teaching and research and frequently utilized himself as a subject for experimentation with new dialytic techniques. He was an engaging human being, who despite his own medical problems was able to give love and comfort to his friends, patients, and family.

The construction of the new unit coincides with the reactivation of the renal transplantation program at Jefferson. The transplantation team is headed by Dr. James Colberg and includes: Drs. Herbert Cohn, Jules Bogaev, Stephan Bulova, Ruth Gottlieb, Michael Simenhoff, James Burke and Norman Lasker. Eight renal transplants have been performed within the last 8 months, 6 of which have been successful. The 2 patients who rejected their kidneys are back on chronic hemodialysis and are awaiting a repeat transplant.

The transplantation program at Jefferson is fortunate in having the support of an excellent Immunology Laboratory, which is run by the hospital blood bank and the Cardeza Foundation. This has contributed to the excellent results of the transplantation program to date and to our plans for expansion in the future. One of the chief roles of the dialysis unit will be to provide a large number of potential transplant recipients and furnish better matchings for cadaver kidneys. 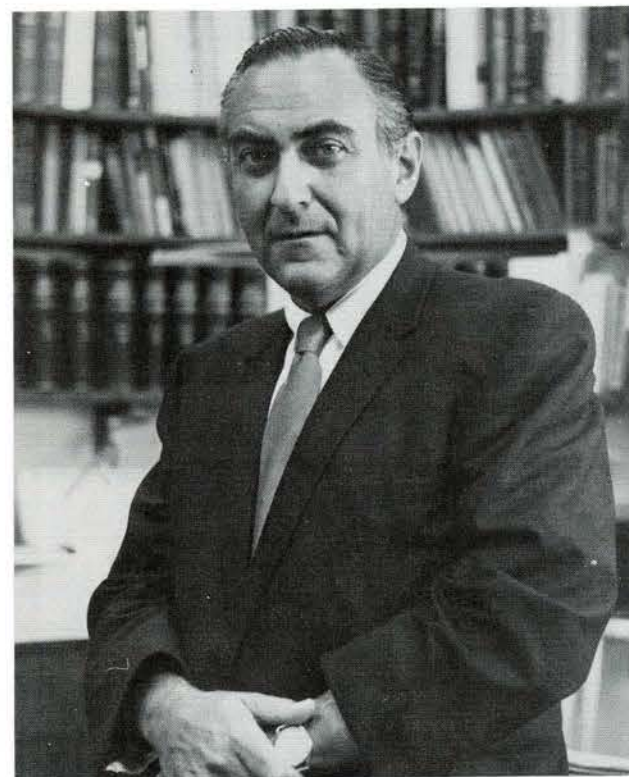

CHANGES IN THE DEPARTMENT OF RADIATION THERAPY

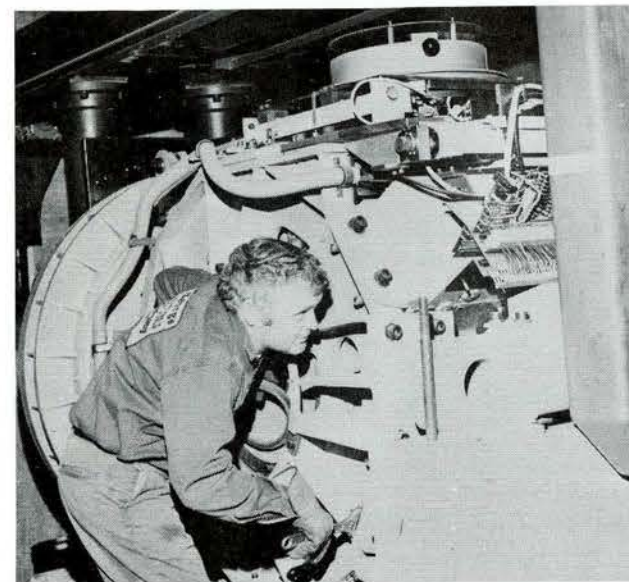
The facilities of the Department of Radiation Therapy and Nuclear Medicine have been undergoing a dramatic face-lifting, and we are now almost ready to show our "new look" to the world. The waiting rooms and examination rooms on the first floor of the Main Building have already assumed a bright modern air, and our two staff nurses find that they offer our patients greater comfort and privacy.

But it is the new Radiation Treatment Center in the basement of the same building that will make the major new contribution to our patients' welfare. Installed there will be new, modern and powerful radiation treatment equipment, the most impressive, both in size and in usefulness, being the 45-million-volt, 14-ton betatron, one of only five in the United States. This versatile machine, with its high-energy capabilities, can be used to treat the most deeply seated tumors, yet it can also be used for low-energy radiation in the treatment of problems such as skin cancer.

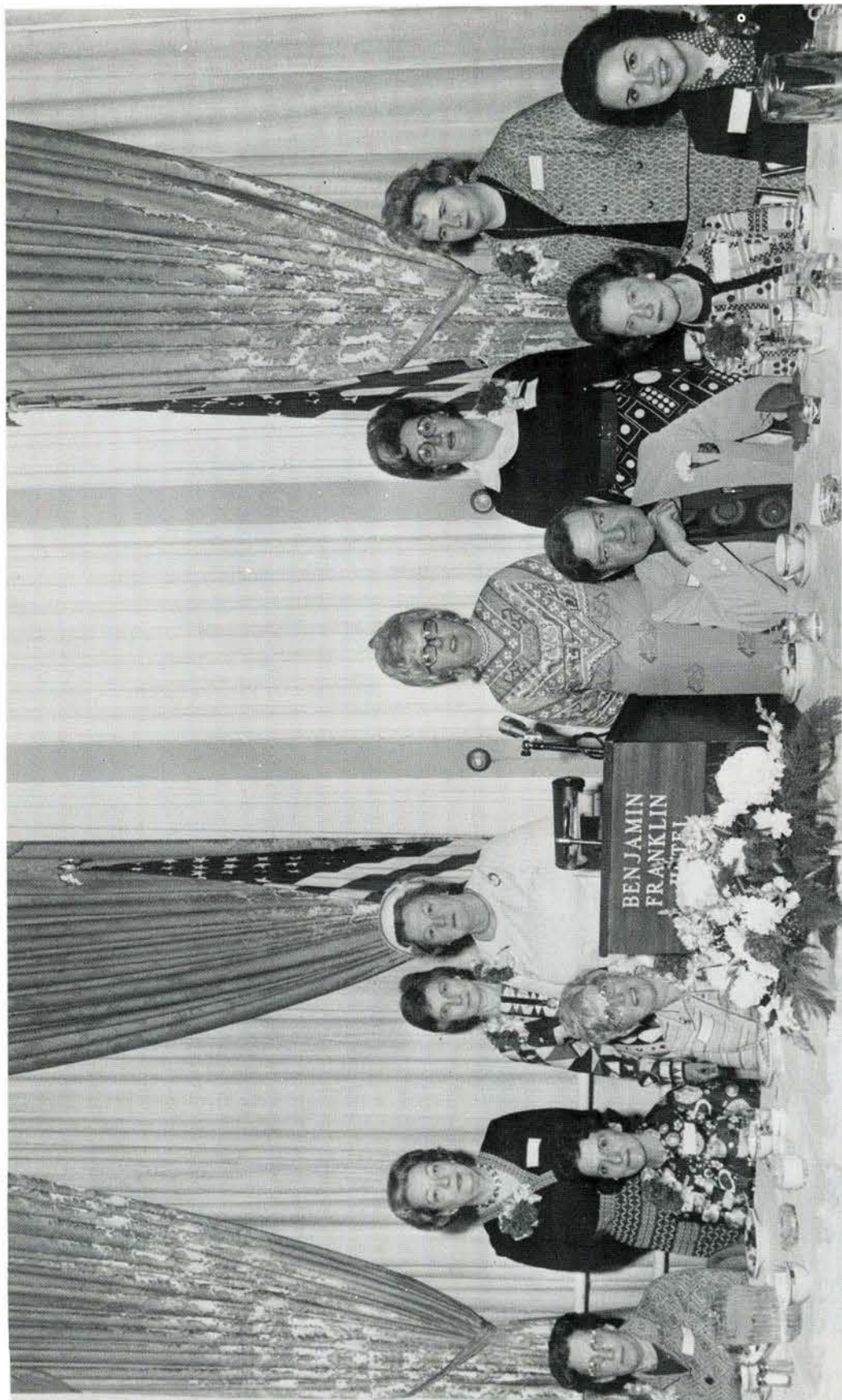
The new equipment, though much more sophisticated than the old, will require little new training for the technologists operating it. The therapy equipment will be monitored by a central computer which will measure and record the exact radiation dosage required for each patient.

We are proud that our department will now be able to provide the most up-to-date radiation treatment facilities for our patients' care, in addition to the devoted service of our staff which has always been a key factor in the care we provide.

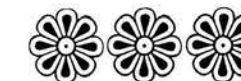
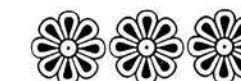
