NURSES' RELIEF FUND

The Nurses' Relief Fund is available to all Diploma and White Haven graduates. The purpose of the Relief Fund is to provide financial assistance annually toward hospital bills and/or bills incurred at home due to an extended illness and requiring the services of a physician.

The fund is also available for use in cases of adversity. Nursing Home cases will be given special consideration. All things being equal, first consideration will be given to Life and Active members. However, all applications received will be reviewed and given consideration.

All or a portion of the amount distributed to a recipient from the Relief Fund may have to be reported to the Internal Revenue Service as taxable income. Each recipient will receive a statement at the end of the year showing what portion of the distribution to her/him should be reported.

During 1985 we have been able to assist fifteen of our graduates from the Relief Fund. IF YOU KNOW OF ANY JEFFERSON OR WHITE HAVEN GRADUATE IN NEED OF ASSISTANCE, PLEASE LET US KNOW AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

Surgery For The Unborn

A Nurse's Own Story

On January 9, 1982, Patricia Dunn, RN, was admitted to Philadelphia's Pennsylvania Hospital in premature labor. She was 26.5 weeks pregnant. Doctors controlled her contractions with uterine relaxants. But 3 days later, ultrasonography showed that the fetus had hydronephrosis and hydroureter of the left kidney.

A cystic mass in the fetal kidney was causing fluid to accumulate, putting pressure on the fetus's abdomen and chest. If this pressure increased, it could cause severe lung and kidney damage. Dunn knew this could be fatal to the fetus. And even if the fetus lived, the damage was likely to be irreparable.

On January 19, another ultrasound study showed that the renal mass, now measuring 6 x 8 cm, was creating pressure on the fetal thorax, elevating the diaphragm and causing hydronephrosis in the right kidney, too.

Pennsylvania Hospital obstetrician Stewart Weiner, MD, laid out three possibilities: First, if doctors didn't intervene surgically, the fetus probably would be born with severe anomalies and die shortly after birth. Second, they might induce labor and deliver the 28-week-old fetus, who would have the expected problems of prematurity as well as life-threatening kidney problems. Third, they might perform percutaneous aspiration of the cystic mass, an experimental technique for treating fetal urinary-tract obstructions. By decompressing the mass with a needle, doctors hoped the fetus's lungs and right kidney would develop normally and lead to a full-term pregnancy.

Here's what Patricia Dunn decided and what happened afterward.

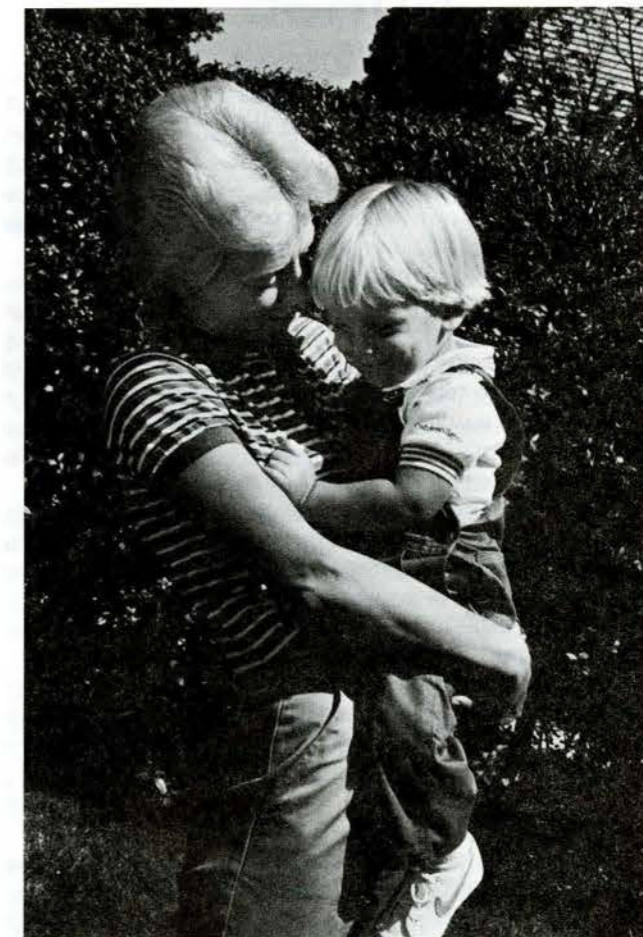
It wasn't an easy choice. I didn't want to lose the baby that I could feel moving around inside of me. But I didn't know if I could devote my life to a disabled child. My husband and I also had to consider the needs of our two other children.

The type of fetal surgery suggested by Dr. Weiner offered hope. But as an obstetric nurse, I knew the procedure was risky. Blood vessels or fetal organs might be ruptured accidentally. Also, there could be a premature rupture of the amniotic sac, as well as infection or premature delivery.

My husband and I talked late into the night about what we should do, but I never felt so isolated in my life. Only I could feel the baby's movements. And somehow I thought the decision was more mine than anyone else's. Mixed up by the fast-moving confusion, I felt deeply guilty, bitter, and angry. It didn't seem fair: Both of us love children so much. Why did we have to make such a critical decision? What if we made the wrong decision? For the rest of that night, we got very little sleep.

The next morning, we told Dr. Weiner: We wanted him to try *in utero* corrective surgery. That afternoon, he performed

the first needle aspiration of the cystic mass. It took about 30 minutes.

This initial procedure decompressed the mass, giving the fetal lungs and right kidney more space to develop. Ultrasound studies revealed that the mass continued to grow, however. Pressure on the lungs and right kidney from the cystic mass determined when the procedure must be repeated. During the next 6 weeks, the procedure was performed three times.

Each time, I went into premature labor and was given uterine relaxants. Because I was sedated during the procedures, I grew more and more concerned about the baby's well-being. Afterward, I would anxiously listen for normal fetal heartbeats and wait for fetal movement to resume. I was also afraid of delivering the baby during that time because he might have respiratory depression from my being sedated.

With time on my hands now, my feelings of guilt, bitterness, and anger surfaced again. I kept wondering if I'd done something wrong to precipitate the fetal problems, although I'd been careful with medication, caffeine, and so on. I wondered if a genetic factor was involved. I kept looking for answers, but I found none. And because I was hospitalized more than I was home, I was torn between who needed me more—the

HOW YOU CAN HELP AS A NURSE

If you're caring for a woman who's undergoing fetal treatment, here are some helpful things to remember:

Before the procedure

- Examine your own attitude about fetal treatment—your active support of her decision is vital. If you can't give it, then ask your head nurse to reassign the patient to a nurse who can.
- Don't assign her to the same room as a mother whose baby rooms in or visits for feedings. Because the outcome of her pregnancy's uncertain, she may feel even more isolated and depressed at seeing another patient's baby.
- Offer yourself—be there and listen. Realize that her feelings of guilt, bitterness, anger, or denial are normal and similar to those experienced during the grieving process. Encourage her to express those feelings to you or to a psychiatric nurse-consultant.
- Help her explain the procedure to her children, using words, drawings, or teaching aids (such as dolls) appropriate to their ages.
- Avoid using such expressions as "God (or Nature) will take care of things"—the outcome of this patient's pregnancy is uncertain.

During the procedure

- Reach out. Holding her hand helps her cope with pain and keep still. And it shows that someone cares and is there for her.
- Keep her informed of the health of the fetus by checking the fetal monitor continually. She may fear the worst if she's not sure.

After the procedure

- Understand that she may feel isolated and alone. Putting her in touch with other mothers who experienced fetal treatment may help.
- Allow her husband or another supportive person to stay with her if she desires.
- Let her know that mothers with high-risk pregnancies usually suffer more severe postpartum depressions.

baby whom I didn't know would live or my children at home. My nurses comforted me by giving me a little extra attention, and by just listening to me.

At 34 weeks, the renal mass had reaccumulated to 3 x 4 cm, once again putting pressure on the fetal diaphragm. Doctors had decided that doing more intrauterine aspirations would endanger the fetus, so labor was induced. During delivery, I wondered if the baby would live and if he did live, what his renal status would be. And like every parent, I wondered if he's have any birth defects. After an 8-hour labor, I delivered

a baby boy, with good Apgar scores, weighing 5 pounds, 12 ounces. We named him Patrick.

Because of postnatal respiratory problems, Patrick had to be intubated. But after a few days, he was breathing well on his own. An ultrasound study confirmed he had a multicystic left kidney. But his right kidney functioned normally, and his urine output was adequate. His BUN and creatinine remained within normal limits, too. That was good news to my husband and me.

When Patrick was 10 weeks old, a left nephrectomy and inguinal herniorrhaphy were performed. He recovered uneventfully.

If you could see Patrick playing with his sister and brother now, you'd never guess that he's a bundle of medical history, a technologic and medical wonder. To our family, he's just a healthy, happy, *very special* 2-year-old who adores his Cabbage Patch Kid and blowing bubbles.

Diagnosed with a multicystic kidney 8 weeks before he was born, Patrick Dunn (seen above with his mother) underwent corrective surgery while still in the womb. Now a healthy 2-year-old, he's one of only a handful of children who've undergone fetal treatments. Though such treatments are risky, they can mean hope to a mother who's told her baby has a life-threatening birth defect. "Patrick probably owes his life to fetal surgery," says Patricia Dunn, a nursing manager at Pennsylvania Hospital in Philadelphia.

A Pandora's Box Of Ethical Problems

From an ethical perspective, fetal treatment poses complex questions about when life begins and raises the issues of abortion and right to life.

If a fetus can be treated like any patient, does that make it a "person"? If so, can a doctor who neglects to insert a drainage catheter into the head of a hydrocephalic fetus be sued for medical malpractice? Can a mother who refuses fetal treatment be compelled by the courts to have it done? And, finally, if a mother refuses treatment and decides on an abortion—what are the legal and moral implications?

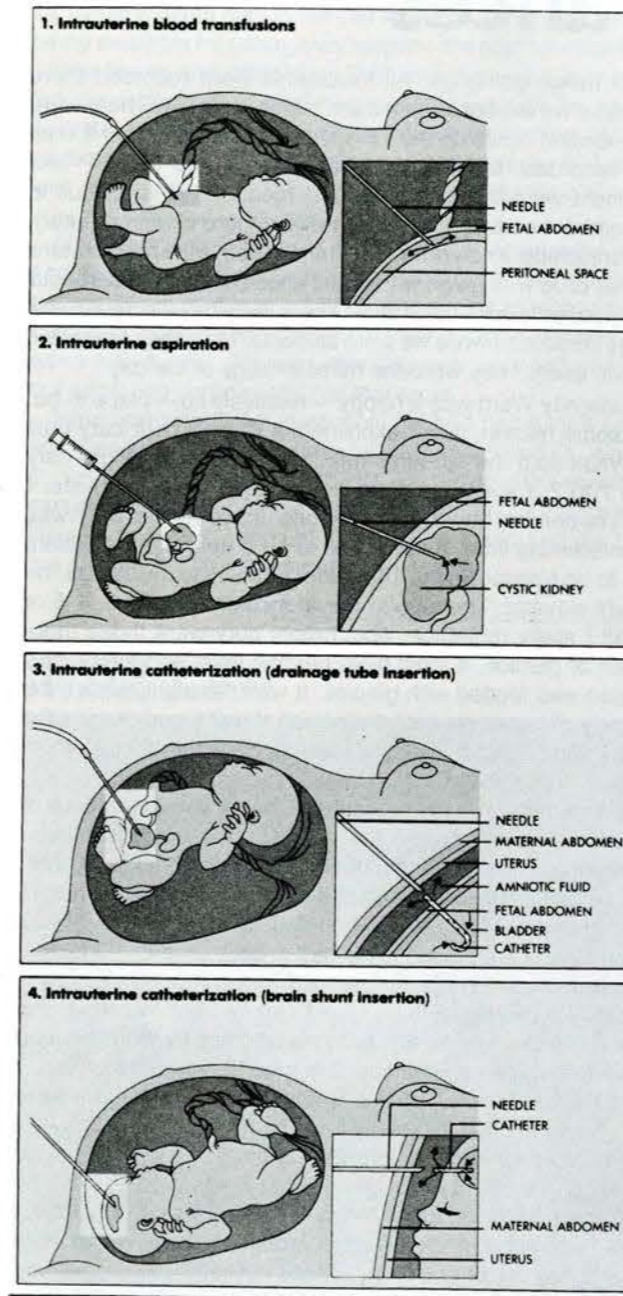
Bioethicists are pondering these questions—and raising some more. In an article in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, Dr. John Fletcher of the National Institutes of Health pointed out "the apparent inconsistency of encouraging fetal therapy on the one hand and respecting parental choice about abortion on the other. Should the moral status of the wanted fetus with a treatable defect outweigh that of an unwanted fetus with the same treatable defect?"

And in an article in *Life* magazine, ethicist Rev. Richard McCormick of Georgetown University posed the hypothetical case of a woman who refuses a blood transfusion because her religion forbids it. Most courts would probably support her decision, even if she dies. But what if her unborn child needs the transfusion?

Today, doctors can determine if a fetus has any of more than 100 birth defects by using techniques such as ultrasound, fetoscopy, amniocentesis, amniography, and fluid collection from the fetus. Which fetuses should be treated and which shouldn't?

As the brave new world of fetal treatment unfolds, the debate will intensify.

FOUR PRENATAL TREATMENTS



The surgery performed on Patrick Dunn is one of four techniques used to treat fetal abnormalities. These formerly unthinkable medical advances can be done today for two reasons: Doctors can detect fetal disorders earlier in the pregnancy using their sophisticated arsenal of techniques for prenatal diagnosis. And uterine relaxants introduced during the last 10 years keep the traumatized uterus from contracting during fetal treatments.

Here's a short description of each of these techniques:

1. *Intrauterine blood transfusions.* The first human intrauterine procedures were done in New Zealand in 1963: Fetuses with severe anemia because of Rh blood incompatibility were given transfusions directly through the abdomen. Since 1974, drugs have been administered to fetuses with vitamin deficiencies, dysrhythmias, respiratory distress syndrome, and thyroid malfunction.

2. *Intrauterine aspiration.* The earliest attempts at surgical treatment were called "needlings"—draining fluid-filled areas of the fetal brain or thorax by inserting a needle. First performed in 1978 when doctors at Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass., drained cerebrospinal fluid from a fetus with hydrocephalus, the procedure is also used to treat urinary-tract obstructions such as Patrick Dunn's, when insertion of a drainage catheter isn't required.

3. *Intrauterine catheterization (drainage tube insertion into bladder).* More invasive than needling, this form of intrauterine catheterization requires implanting a plastic catheter in the fetal bladder to drain excess fluid. The drainage catheter usually stays in place until birth, when more permanent surgical treatment is possible.

This procedure was first performed successfully in April, 1981, at the University of California, San Francisco, on a fetus (a twin) diagnosed with hydronephrosis. A catheter was inserted into the fetal bladder, preventing a life-threatening urine buildup. The procedure worked: The twins are now 3 years old.

4. *Intrauterine catheterization (brain shunt insertion).* Another form of intrauterine catheterization is being used to treat hydrocephalus, in which a buildup of fluid in the fetal brain prevents development of nerve cells, causing retardation or death. In this procedure, a "prenatal brain shunt"—developed by doctors at the University of Colorado, Denver—drains fluid into the amniotic sac.

At the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md., current experiments are paving the way for treating major birth defects such as congenital diaphragmatic hernia, spina bifida, and limb deformities. Someday, performing bone and organ transplants *in utero* may also be possible.



Further Remembrances

Last year when I wrote "Tempus Fidgets" I hoped others would remember their "pink" days at Jeff and record them for a growing history of "Training at Jeff." But, it was not to be. Many of you wrote, called and said the article evoked memories — good and bad, many of which are funny in retrospect. I must say that it was a difficult paper to write because I got so angry at how we were used. But, I worked it all out and now see the real humor and the results of the experience, because I have done well with the results. As one of my classmates said; I was the last one they ever expected to remain in nursing and earn a doctorate.

Because of your responses to last year's article, I have been asked to continue with my memories. I doubt they will be as amusing, second attempts rarely are. So here goes —

Our days as a Probie were busy. Each day began on the ward, sweeping the floors, counting the face towels and serving trays. Fresh post-op patients got a bowl (really a crock) of hot tea with lots of sugar in it. We did not serve milk or cream because this produced gas which led to troubles for both patient and nurse. Prostigmine was introduced while we were students and that was some help for both patient and nurse.

We were taught to work together, which is a concept not shared by all nurses. But two nurses making a bed together protects the patient from unnecessary danger. Patients were always rolled toward the nurse so her body would prevent falling from the bed. I believe we were taught to respect the patient more than many other students. We had to address each by Mr., Mrs. or Miss and first names were never used. For every rule there is an exception, and this one was when the patient was coming out of ether.

Two of the most difficult chores were sitting with a fresh post-op and a dying patient. We did both.

When one of the patients assigned to you was scheduled for the OR, you did all the pre-op and post-op care. Recovery rooms were far off in the future and OR's had limited staff also. You also "ran" the case to the OR and stood with the sedated patient (and we didn't strap them to the stretcher) until taken into the operating room. There, you were supposed to be an assistant to the anesthetist. Sometimes you counted pulse, but most of the time you tried to stay out of the way of the staff. Retrieving and counting sponges was a favorite assignment while there. When surgery was completed, you helped get the patient back on the stretcher and then helped the anesthetist take him back to his room.

There he was put in an "ether" bed. Why we didn't lose patients from dehydration is beyond me. Our air conditioning was open windows and ether beds were made with woolen blankets — summer and winter. In addition, ether boots were worn.

Spinal anesthesia was very new then and we students were taught to take blood pressure. (I later found out that Jeff was one of three or four hospitals that permitted the nurse to do this physician's chore). For the spinal, B/P were q 15 minutes for three hours; q ½ hour for three hours; and then q hour for three hours; then q 3 hours. We also took TPR every three hours or as necessary.

The TPR chart was a thing of beauty if the patient had a

lot of things going on. All treatments were recorded there because we did not keep nurses' notes routinely. There were no specified hours on the TPR sheet. The nurse filled it in as she recorded. Most of the chart was in blue ink, BP and enemata were the exception as I recall. (This is difficult to remember because I have not worked there in many a year). Sulfanilamide, a new drug, was charted above the temperature.

That drug was given with equal doses of Soda Bicarb, but many patients still turned blue! There were three or four Sulfa drugs introduced while we were students. Now, they are rarely, if ever, used. They were the miracle drugs of the day.

Maternity Ward was a happy — relatively so — place to be. For some reason, never explained, it was 12 hour duty until Dr. Vaux said the students needed time off too. Night duty was 7 to 7. I spent that time on Eleventh Floor — private. I don't remember how long it was, one or two weeks, but it was an interesting time. If there was to be a delivery, the patient had to be transported to 14th Floor or down to the 3rd via the freight elevator. The regular elevators didn't stop at 3, 4, 5 or 6. All I really remember about night duty were those thousands of gladioli. It must have been August and everyone's garden was loaded with gladioli. It was the night nurse's job to carry all bouquets out into the hall at night, and change the water and pluck off the dead flowers in the morning. I dislike gladioli to this day!

It was also on 11th Floor that I had the happy chore of catheterizing a lady and took out 1500 cc. She had been done in the morning by her obstetrician and he evidently hurt her because she did not want it done again. But she had to be emptied. When I returned on duty the next evening, I was greeted with an "At last!" And had to cath her then and again before I left at 7 A.M.

But who can forget the "Jessie" cart on Mat? We really had that down to a routine and patients who had to go in between were told to get on schedule. It is hard to believe when today new mothers are out of bed almost immediately and able to use the bathroom. We really have come a long way baby.

Probably my most embarrassing time was when I had to be taken from Mat Isolation because I was sick. One of the patients had to call to the Ward because I was stretched out on an empty bed and was too miserable to move. All because I ate a raw carrot one of my friends in Diet Kitchen gave me. Of course, if you went into Isolation, you could not return to the Ward, so someone had to be pulled to relieve me because I was put in 629. I didn't stay long.

The Operating Room was an interesting experience, but had very little to do with nursing care. In those days, we set up in the A.M. for 12 hours. We had to learn to drape the coop and how to cover it between cases. We had a few temperamental surgeons, but most of them were thoughtful and considerate. I remember one day no residents or interns showed up to assist Dr. Spangler and I was told to "get in there and retract." They had to find a bench for me to stand on so I could really see what was happening. (This experience proved valuable when I was in the Army and we didn't have assistants).

Perhaps, the outstanding memory of the OR was the Sunday School Lesson conducted by Dr. Fry. Someone had to scout the hospital for the Saturday's paper. Then we prayed

that we would be called as a relief on some floor that was short. That way we could get out of the session. Meanwhile, we were counting and re-counting sponges to be packaged for surgery. Night duty in the OR was also 12 hours. Besides being available for emergency surgery, the students sterilized all the linens and dressings. That was how I got burned by the big autoclave. It really was simple enough for one to operate, but we weren't given adequate instruction and because of its size, we were afraid. I ended up in 629 again with a reaction to TAT. Hives are horrible, especially when they get between your toes.

One night was very quiet so my partner and I went up to 14 OR and lay down on two of the tables. We had our capes with us, because it was cold and so we were stretched out — two black masses with white organdy caps on the end. We woke with a yelp. Joe was standing over us trying to figure out when two corpses got into that room.

Now, Joe was a real institution! He had had a cleft palate and harelip repair at Jeff when he was a baby and Dr. Warren B. was very proud of that early job. Joe ran all of the elevators, except Annex, at one time or another during our three years. Usually he was a pleasant man, but he could and did bawl out a student if he felt the need was there.

MARTHA...



September 15, 1923, Martha E. Riland, a native of Sunbury, Pennsylvania, came to Philadelphia to enter Jefferson's Training School for Nurses. Martha graduated from Jefferson in 1927 and since then has had an interesting professional life.

After graduation she worked as a private duty nurse. At that time, if your patient was in the hospital you worked a 12 hour shift. If you were lucky or unlucky enough to get a home case — it was usually 24 hour duty. The nurse would sleep on a cot in the patient's room.

During summer vacations she would relieve the staff nurses on 8th Annex; then in 1945 when Miss Ethel M. Hopkins was

Other memories pop-up but I can't find much of a logical sequence for them. Saturday afternoon on 10th Floor we had to replenish the toilet paper in all bathrooms, and look for the rotting oranges that Miss Gillespie had locked in some closet.

Folding linen in the basement for the OR, then riding down the ramp in an empty laundry truck. It was the basement of the Annex and the ramp went from Main Building down, probably a full story.

I also learned, from Miss Gillespie, to take the stained or ripped linens into the rooms of Board members and apologize profusely for it, but that was all we had. We soon had all new linens. It was a scheme which has come in handy over the years.

Now, please, someone else give us your memories. Our days at Jeff were hard and thank God they are gone, but they are good for laughs and they are very impressive on the young students of today who would not tolerate such treatment. We didn't know any better. We did turn out well despite it all.

Ever since she first came to Jefferson in 1923 Martha has been a loyal and dedicated supporter not only of the Alumni Association, but Jefferson as well, and during these years many lasting friendships were made.

Martha was, and is a friend to many people, her opinions and ideas are valuable not only because of her varied work experience but also due to the interesting travels she has taken in the past. Her work as alumni coordinator was outstanding, and I'm certain I speak for everyone when I say thank you for a job well done. Martha, we love you.

FROM THE TJU HISTORIAN

The 1907 Hospital ("Old Main")

The southwest corner of Tenth and Sansom Streets may be considered "a tough old spot" as far as the physical endurance of its buildings is concerned and as "holy ground" in terms of its benefit to mankind. Only two buildings have been located there. The first was "New Medical Hall" of Jefferson Medical College, erected on this corner in 1828 through the benefaction of the Reverend Ezra Stiles Ely, a member of the board of trustees. The original college building, from 1825 to 1828, was the renovated Tivoli Theater at 518-20 Prune Street (now Locust).

Enlargements and modifications of the Tenth Street Jefferson Medical College in 1838, 1846, 1879 and 1881 changed its appearance from that of a church, to that of a Greek temple, and finally to a facade of florid Victorian style. In the renovation of 1879, two stores on the corner in which the upper floors had served as a connected mini-ward for 15 postsurgical patients were converted into a laboratory building.

About 1895, it became evident that a building program was necessary to provide Jefferson with a new medical school and a new hospital. In 1898, after 70 fruitful years at Tenth and Sansom, a new Jefferson Medical College was erected at the corner on Tenth and Walnut, where now stands the Curtis Building. The old hodgepodge of Jefferson Medical College was now ready for demolition to accommodate the new Jefferson Medical College Hospital (the present "Old Main").

Was "Old Main (1907)" the first Jefferson Hospital?

No. Dating back to May 1825, dispensary were available to the public at the old Tivoli Theater site. (See *Directions*, October 1985). The first full-scale hospital was built in 1877 on Sansom Street between Tenth and Eleventh, where now stands the Thompson Building. It was the second teaching hospital in the country to be connected with a medical school, the first having been the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania in 1874. It was a five-story building of Victorian Gothic style that contained a clinical amphitheater ("pit") seating 600 students. Many "greats" of Jefferson operated and lectured there.

Over a period of thirty years (1877-1907), that hospital trained 5,000 doctors in its halls; cared for 2,000,000 patients in wards and dispensaries; treated nearly 50,000 accident cases; and graduated 148 nurses.

By the turn of the century the hospital was antiquated; 125 beds were insufficient for the demand; it was too small for the volume of work and not fire-proof. By 1902 it was possible to demolish the old medical school building at Tenth and Sansom and erect the new hospital ("Old Main"). The 1877 hospital was maintained for nurses' education and living quarters,

and the clinical amphitheater continued to be used for surgery and teaching until the Thompson Building replaced it in 1924.

"Old Main's" Past and Future

With planning for the latest features essential to the comfort and scientific care of the sick, construction of "Old Main" was started in 1903. This was made possible by private and public beneficence and by placing a large mortgage on the property. The building was opened on June 8, 1907, at a ceremony attended by Board President, the Honorable William Potter, with a rousing address by Dr. John Chalmers DaCosta. Eight stories tall, with ground floor and basement; built of steel, concrete, brick and terra cotta; floored with tile or other non-flammable material; provided with natural light by three streets; supplied with interior electric lighting; steam heated from an outside plant; cleaned by a vacuum system; and ventilated by a noiseless exhaust system, this ample hospital with more than 300 beds embodied the most modern advances in institutional construction. On June 24, 1907, the patients at that time in the "Old Jefferson Hospital" were removed to the new institution.

"Old Main" served Jefferson patients, faculty, staff and students well for more than seven decades. On March 1, 1974, the ward services were discontinued and all patients were assigned to individual attending physicians instead of ward chiefs. "Old Main" continued to house pediatric inpatients until 1983.

New Uses for "Old Main"

After becoming unsuitable for inpatient care, it functioned for a variety of outpatient, research and educational activities, housing the department of radiation therapy and nuclear medicine, the Hemophilia Center, the Clinical Pharmacology Unit, educational facilities for the College of Allied Health Sciences and psychiatric outpatient care.

A decision has been made to preserve this old but structurally sound building. Among other things, the building will house an imaging center with the latest equipment for diagnosis by ultrasound, CT scanning and nuclear magnetic resonance. There is a certain nostalgia to the preservation of the English Renaissance style achieved by the architects, James Windrim and Son. The new look restored by the out-

side cleaning process unveils the salmon bricks from their previous black, accentuates the pediments and pilasters, while attracting the admiring gaze of many passers-by. "Old Main" is starting a second life in keeping what was best of the old and adding the best of the new.

Fall Cleaning Revitalizes "Old Main"

The facelift performed on the Main Building this fall represented a dream-come-true for Gene E. Prouty, director of physical plant.

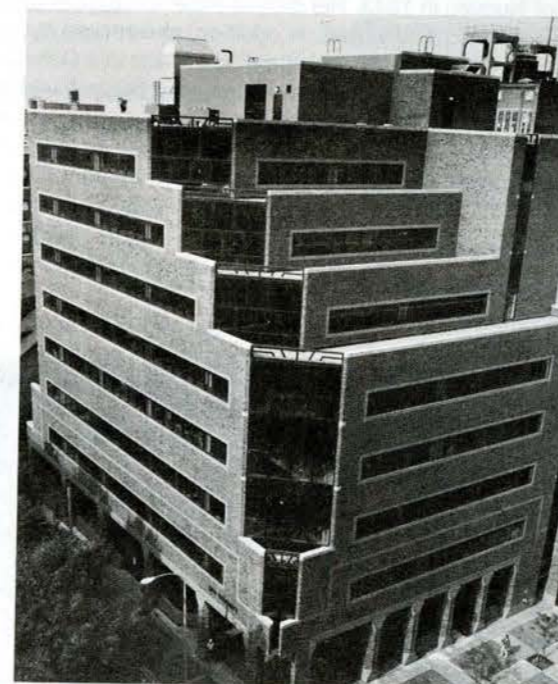
"It was just a very dirty building," said Mr. Prouty, explaining why he proposed that "Old Main" be cleaned by a special process. Michael J. Bradley, executive hospital director, agreed that the building was in dire need of a cleanup, and the project went forward.

The process, which involved the application of a special cleanser, then rinsing with high-pressure water, took only about eight weeks. During this time, some needed patching of the exterior and bird-proofing were also done.

In addition to revealing the original colors of the bricks and its interesting architectural features, the cleaning has unveiled the words, "Jefferson Medical College Hospital," on the front of the building and "Jefferson College Dispensary" on a side

JEFFERSON SURGICAL CENTER OPENS



Construction on the new Medical Office Building at 1100 Walnut Street was completed this year, and was officially opened in July. This building is to be used as an ambulatory care center, and will house the Jefferson Surgical Center on

the third floor. Among the procedures offered on this floor are: Ear, Nose and Throat Surgery; Hand Surgery; Hernia Repair; Breast Biopsy and Minor Gynecological Surgery. Ambulatory surgery enables the patient to arrive, undergo surgery and return home on the same day. These patients are reunited more quickly with family members; lose less time from work; and enjoy financial savings because hospitalization is not necessary. The center also features special facilities for children, including a playroom for pediatric patients awaiting surgery. Parents can accompany their children throughout the experiences, except while in the Operating Room. Last year, 38 percent of the surgical operations performed were ambulatory cases. By 1990, 50 percent of all surgical cases in the nation will be ambulatory in nature. Jefferson is ready.

The newly reconstructed 7th and 8th floors of the Thompson and Main Buildings which house the new Ultra Sound Department opened in early July with the most modern Diagnostic equipment available.

The construction of the Bodine Center for Radiation Therapy is proceeding on schedule, and is expected to be opened early in 1987. This Department is newly constructed where the parking area was located on the Street Level of the New Hospital, and was fully described in our Alumni Bulletin last year.

It has occurred to me that my fellow Alumni may wonder whatever happened to Vivian Moyer. Unfortunately I cannot report I am hopping in and out of cabs, with the help of a doorman, as before. Now I am an active user of Septa Paratransit, which on short order sends a van with a lift for my wheelchair.

My home health aide and I go to various and sundry places via this blessed transportation. We are picked up at 9 a.m. and the van returns for us at 1 p.m. I can assure you the greatest amount of energy for people with multiple sclerosis comes in the morning, hence these hours. It gives me an opportunity to get my shopping chores accomplished in various malls throughout the city of Philadelphia.

I also have a friend who owns a van with a wheelchair lift. He takes me to Avalon, New Jersey in the summertime when my sister, nieces and their children, age 5, 2 and 6 months are there. These same children visit me once a week and we have a glorious play session.

In my last report I was tutoring RN's who failed State Boards. My nursing and teaching experience helped. All those tutored passed the next Board exam.

I discontinued tutoring because I finally needed an aide to transfer me from bed to wheelchair, etc. This is accomplished by aides boosting me, then we hold each other as if to dance. In this manner I can stand on my feet and then pivot wherever I plan to sit. I have three efficient home health aides — one from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. during the week; another one during those same hours over the weekend; and one from 4 to 6 p.m. to transfer me into bed.

The Bionic Woman — In my bedroom is a hospital bed (brown, not white) with electric controls — head and feet up

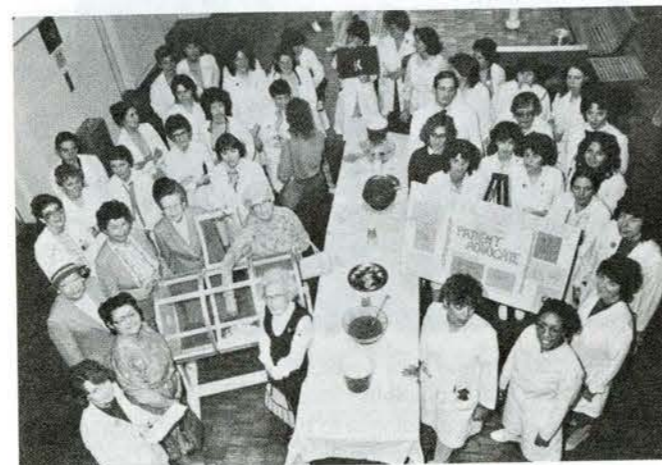
or down; bed up or down. Several feet below the bed is a t.v. and of course remote control. On the wall I arranged for switches — one turns the air conditioner on or off; the other turns a heater on or off. Beside the bed is a quite large bedside cabinet with a formica top. It contains three drawers and a cabinet. I arranged for the carpenter to put wheels on this cabinet and affixed a platform to the side. This holds extra large waste basket lined with "Hefty" bags. The wheels help me to readjust the table when necessary. Used Pampers are tossed into the waste basket. My evening aide prepares a light supper. She proceeds with back care and passive exercises to legs. Then on my left side beside the wall, she places Pampers, Kleenex box, towel, and the current book I am reading. (Pampers were a great discovery since I cannot walk to the bathroom. On my infamous table is a telephone which allows me to reach the desk in the lobby of my apartment building twenty-four hours a day. I call the doorman at 10 p.m. to assist with ventilation for the night. Visitors usually call me when they plan to arrive after 6 p.m. Lights-out are at 11:30 p.m., and I am alone until 7:30 a.m. At this time Angela arrives and we usually have ordered a van for 9 a.m., for example, to visit a shopping center.

I recently decided to better use the 12 noon to 3 p.m. free time and in an effort to try to contribute to society I have begun tutoring again.

So you see, "Jeff" training has helped me in many ways.

Note: Miss Moyer was graduated from Jefferson Hospital School of Nursing in 1943. Her clinical experience from 1945 to 1953 was wide and varied. In addition, she served in the Army Nurse Corps, WWII, and spent 18 months in a General Hospital in England. In 1953 she received a BS in Nursing Education from the University of Pennsylvania, after which her teaching career began.

She was president of the Jefferson Nurses' Alumni Association — 1959, 1960, 1961.

Changes

The view of Corregidor was a beautiful tropical island. The sight of Bataan was a bountiful junglar peninsula. The overwhelming fences and supplies of the Japanese changed the scene to barren jagged rock. Fragments of the bombed out Topside Hospital, after forty some years of jungle growth, are barely visible.

Formal gardens lead to a magnificent Memorial on Corregidor. A series of steps and an elevator lead to the Cross, the Shrine of Freedom and the Altar of Valor to overlook the South China Sea from Mt. Samat on Bataan. On the walls of the shrine the names of the nurses "Angels of Bataan and Corregidor" are cast in bronze among other units.

The American Cemetery's white circular walls are scarcely seen beneath the bougainvillia. The white marble crosses and stars of David and the two concentric white walls on the blocks of which are engraved the names of those missing in action are above the immaculate manicured lawns.

The Blood Rocks of Corregidor, once piled high on the beaches, saturated with the blood of the Defenders, are almost extinct. The tourists have unique souvenirs.

Madeline Ullom, a 1938 graduate from Jefferson's School of Nursing, Diploma Program, is a retired Army lieutenant colonel. As a young lieutenant, she was one of the nurses taken into captivity when the Phillipines fell to the Japanese in World War II. In April 1985, Madeline Ullom received a salute and a Bronze Star from Col. Edward Frey.

On January 25, 1986 Mary Robinson Godfrey, class of 1909 celebrated her 100th birthday. Mrs. Godfrey resides at 22 McColly Street, Ligonier, PA 15658.

In 1910 she was appointed a member of the U.S. Navy Nurse Corps, at that time in existence for only two years, and during World War I served at a naval hospital in Philadelphia.
