FOUNDED IN 1825



in the "Metropolis of Modern Medicine"

The time is 1954. One hundred twenty-nine years have elapsed since the inception of this great college. It's 1954, but the pioneering spirit and undaunted foresight which imbued the minds of the enthusiastic founders in 1825 is finding expression in the actions of the present leaders of the college. Not being content with facilities which have kept Jefferson among the foremost medical college hospitals

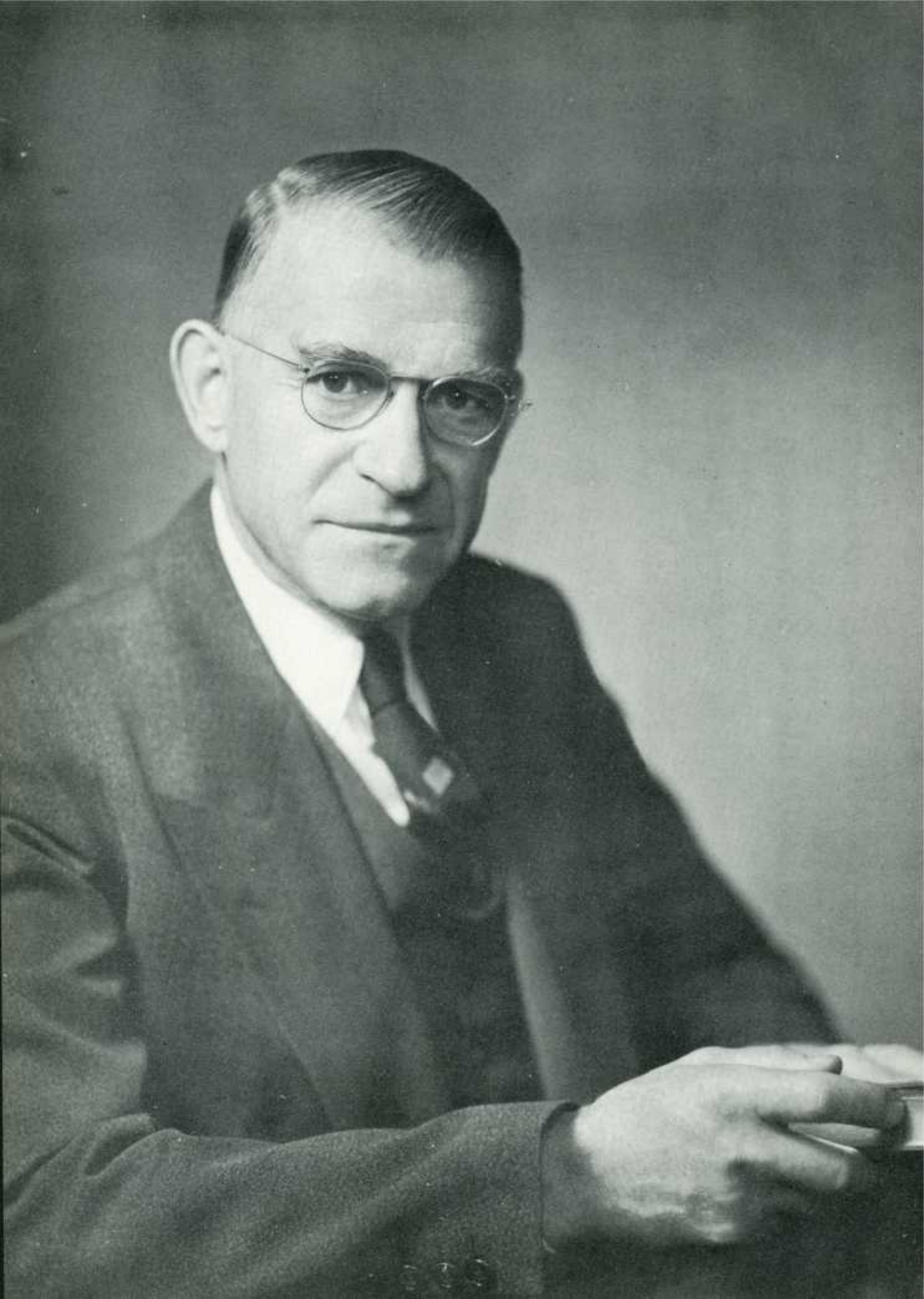


in the country, the officers and administrators of the college dreamed of an addition to the institution which would increase its service to greater Philadelphia. The dream formed, and with the contributions of those who realized its purpose, and the cooperation of all connected with Jefferson, a new hospital was opened. Only if one has seen this new superstructure, and only if one is related in some way

to medicine, can the true magnificence of this building be recognized. The new Pavilion ranks Jefferson among the largest American hospitals. The story of this neophyte, however, is yet to be written. It is not of utmost importance that Jefferson becomes one of the largest college related hospitals, but rather it is significant that she is now better able to administer to those who have created her. Her



greatness and success shall be measured in the suffering and disease she alleviates, the happiness she engenders, the sorrow she placates; and the forward medical leagues she strides. Beneath the roof of her head which rises majestically above the surrounding city, the visions of old men, and the dreams of young men have become reality. She adds to the heritage and the power of Jefferson.

DR. LOUIS H. CLERF launched his medical career by graduating from Jefferson Medical College. After completing residencies at Jefferson Hospital and the New York Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital, he became associated with Dr. Chevalier Jackson in the Bronchoscopic Clinic at Jefferson. Since that time he has been a memorable part of our college, holding the position as head of the Department of Laryngology and Bronchoesophagology from 1930 until 1954, at which time he was named Professor Emeritus.

His career has been somewhat like that of the sunrise, bright, ever-ascending, and shedding a warm glow upon all those who come into his presence. He is known as a doctor, scientist, investigator, and naturalist. To us he is a teacher and thinker, one who possesses those attributes ascribed to a professor by Osler: "Enthusiasm, full personal knowledge of the branch taught, and a sense of obligation." More than that, he loves and respects his students, and makes no attempt to dazzle them with his knowledge, but strives to instill in them the principles of a subject in which there is no master greater than he.

Dr. Clerf considers among his greatest achievements the 1954 DeRoaldes Award, which was presented to him by the American Laryngological Association for his outstanding contributions to laryngology, and his participation as an official representative to the Fourth and Fifth International Congresses of Otolaryngology. In addition he belongs to innumerable outstanding medical organizations, has published nearly 200 pieces of medical literature, and has been consultant to many hospitals in the Philadelphia area.

We as students, however, will remember Dr. Clerf for his noblest contribution to the medical world, the giving of himself, and the conferring upon his students of "the best that is known and taught in the world."

from the seduction of females or males, of freemen & slaves.

Whatever in connection with my professional
practice or not in connection with it, I see or hear
in the life of men which ought not to be spoken
of abroad, **I WILL NOT DIVULGE**

as reckoning that all such should be kept secret.
While I continue to keep this Oath unviolated,
may it be granted to me to enjoy life & the practice
of the Art respected by all men in all times!

As its farewell gift, the Senior Class of 1955 proudly presented to the college the portrait of Dr. Baldwin L. Keyes.

Born in Rio de Janeiro, and educated in London, Dr. Keyes found his way to Jefferson and was graduated from here in 1917. It was in this year that he began a thirty-seven year term of military service.

During World War I he was attached to the British Army and for his valor received the British Military Cross. In World War II, he was a commissioned officer with the Medical Department of the U. S. Army, part of which time was spent as the Neuro-Psychiatric Consultant for the U.S. Armed Forces in the Middle East.

Many "firsts" are attached to his name. At Jefferson in 1929, he organized the first child psychiatric clinic in the United States. His aid was instrumental in the founding of the first mental hygiene group in Philadelphia, and he was among the founders of the Pennsylvania Psychiatric Society.

Many similar honors, too numerous to mention, could be added, for Dr. Keyes has been and is now one of our leading psychiatrists, being active in both state and national affairs having to do with psychiatry. His professional services, and his speaking and writing abilities are in constant demand, and Dr. Keyes tries, in his affable way, to accommodate each request.

Consequently, it is only fitting that his portrait should join those of other great Jeffersonians who have contributed to medicine by tirelessly teaching and practicing the finest principles of the medical profession.

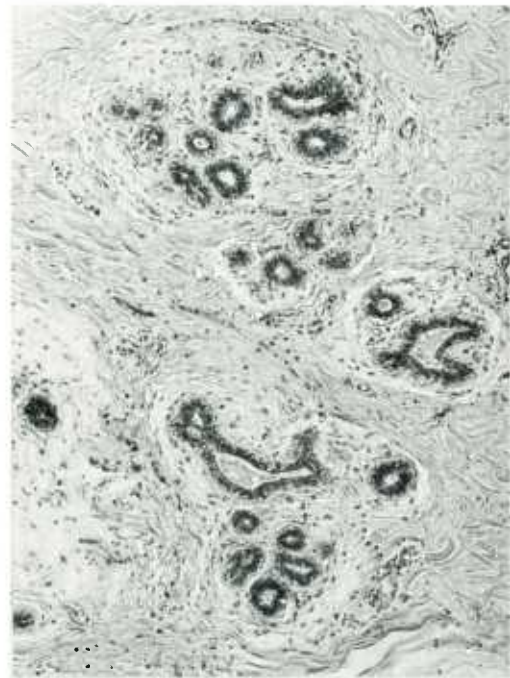


ourses of Instruction

For almost one hundred twenty-five years, physiology has been a part of the Jefferson curriculum. Dr. Robey Dunglison created the department which was first known as the Institutes of Medicine. In 1889, a new physiology laboratory was equipped to perfection by Dr. Albert P. Brubaker. The present laboratory was first opened in 1929, and student experimentation on larger animals then became possible.

Today, under the leadership of Dr. J. Earl Thomas, the department has continued the policy of providing excellent facilities for student experimental study. This type of study is supplemented by fine faculty instruction and lecturing. The staff continues to maintain the friendly attitude toward the student which has become a trademark of the department.

BIOCHEMISTRY

Jacob Green, in 1825, organized the chemistry department at Jefferson. It is interesting to note that Dr. Green held the degree of Master of Arts at the time and two years later received his M.D. degree from Yale University. Since that time, a succession of brilliant men has followed and has maintained the high academic standards in this department. Today Dr. A. Cantarda and his very capable staff completely indoctrinate the freshmen students with the fundamentals of biochemistry. A new text by members of the department has modernized the laboratory instruction which is integrated with the laboratory study of physiology. Today's freshmen, therefore, vividly see how closely related biochemistry is to the study of medicine.

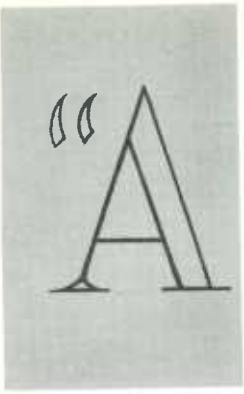

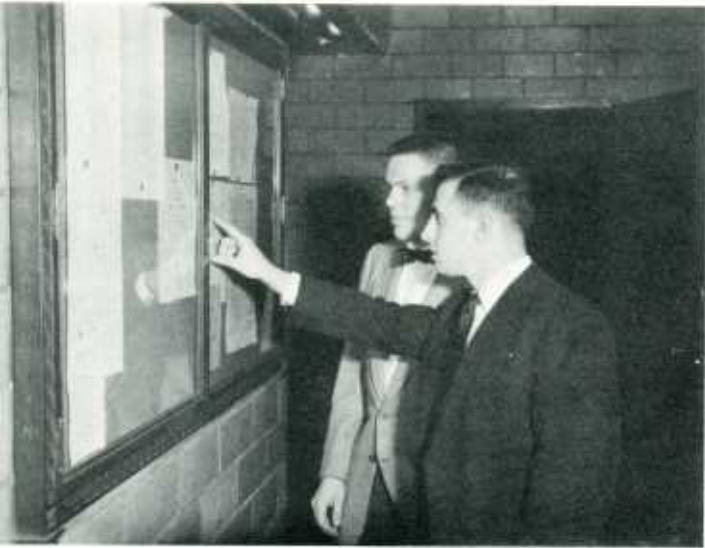

PATHOLOGY

Pathology was first taught at Jefferson as part of Surgery and Anatomy. In 1834 the groundwork for an extensive pathological museum was begun, and in 1839 Samuel D. Gross published the first treatise on pathology ever to be printed in the English language. Finally in 1870, Dr. Keen began lecturing in pathology as a separate subject. The teaching of this course is no longer limited to morbid anatomy. Today, the morphologic changes are studied, but in addition, etiology, prognosis, and pathologic physiology are being emphasized to make this a Science of Disease. The student, through laboratory study, lectures, post-mortem observation, and clinico-pathologic conferences, learns to associate the condition of the patient with the responsible and underlying disease entity. The importance of this subject plus the excellent manner in which it is taught makes it an important part of the student's curriculum.

Jefferson Medical College was one of the first medical schools to incorporate a course of Bacteriology into the curriculum. Bacteriology sprang from the head of Pathology in 1892 when Dr. W. M. S. Coplin, an assistant in pathology, delivered the first lectures on the subject. The laboratory work began some years later in 1897. Since these early struggles, many great advances have been made. The student is afforded a spacious well-equipped laboratory with every facility present which might be needed. Dr. Goodner does not permit "his boys" to forget the heritage which is theirs, for pictures of Louis Pasteur and other great bacteriologists adorn the classroom walls. Their pictures are not present alone, for the grand ol' man of bacteriology has gleaned the greatest concepts of this subject and gladly instills them into his students.

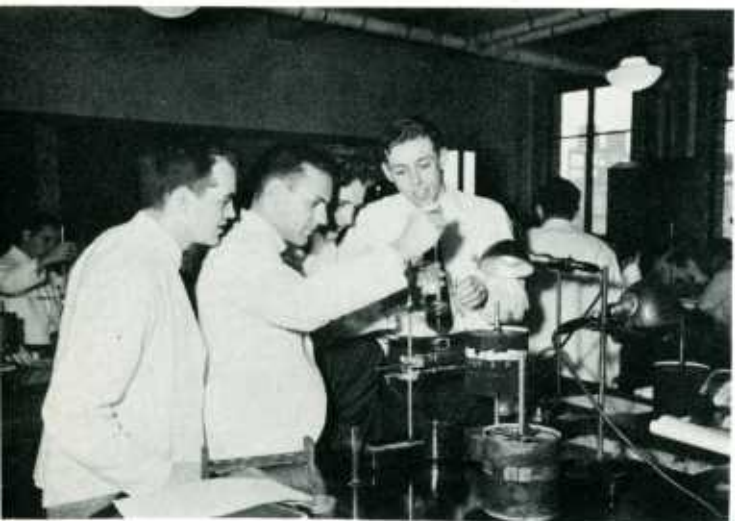

The Art of Pharmacology

Pharmacology is found to be the neophyte of our review of Jefferson's heritage. Only twenty-three years ago, the department was established with Dr. Charles M. Gruber as head of the field. It was in 1954 that Dr. Gruber resigned and was replaced by Dr. Julius M. Coon. The department manages to teach accurately and yet carry on an

active research program. The lecture course is remarkably integrated with the laboratory study of the physiological effects of drugs. Though difficult to appreciate at the time of study, this basic material soon becomes a valued asset to the doctor, regardless of the branch of medicine into which he enters.

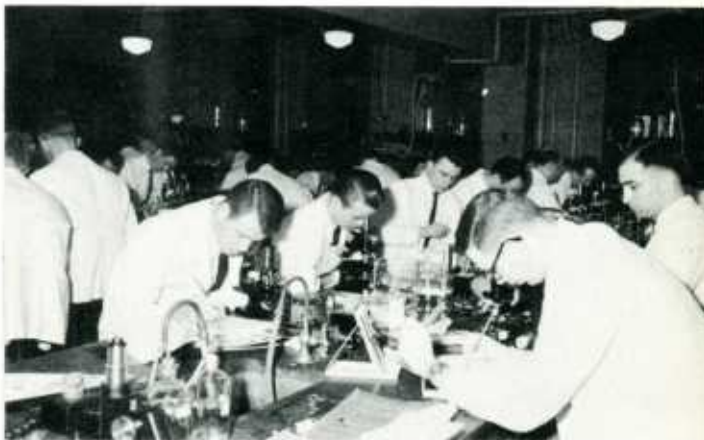

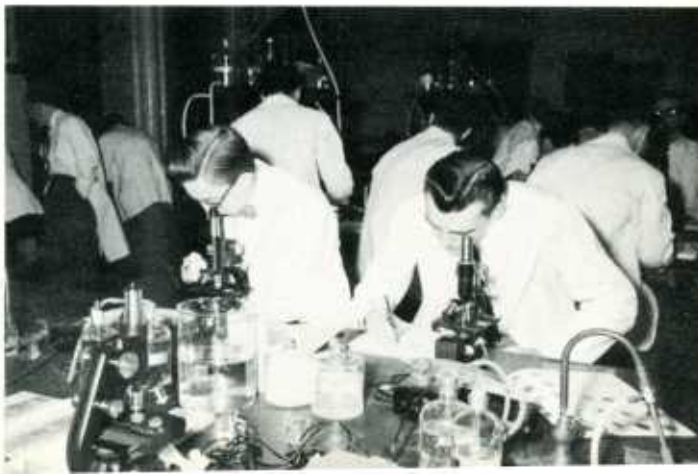

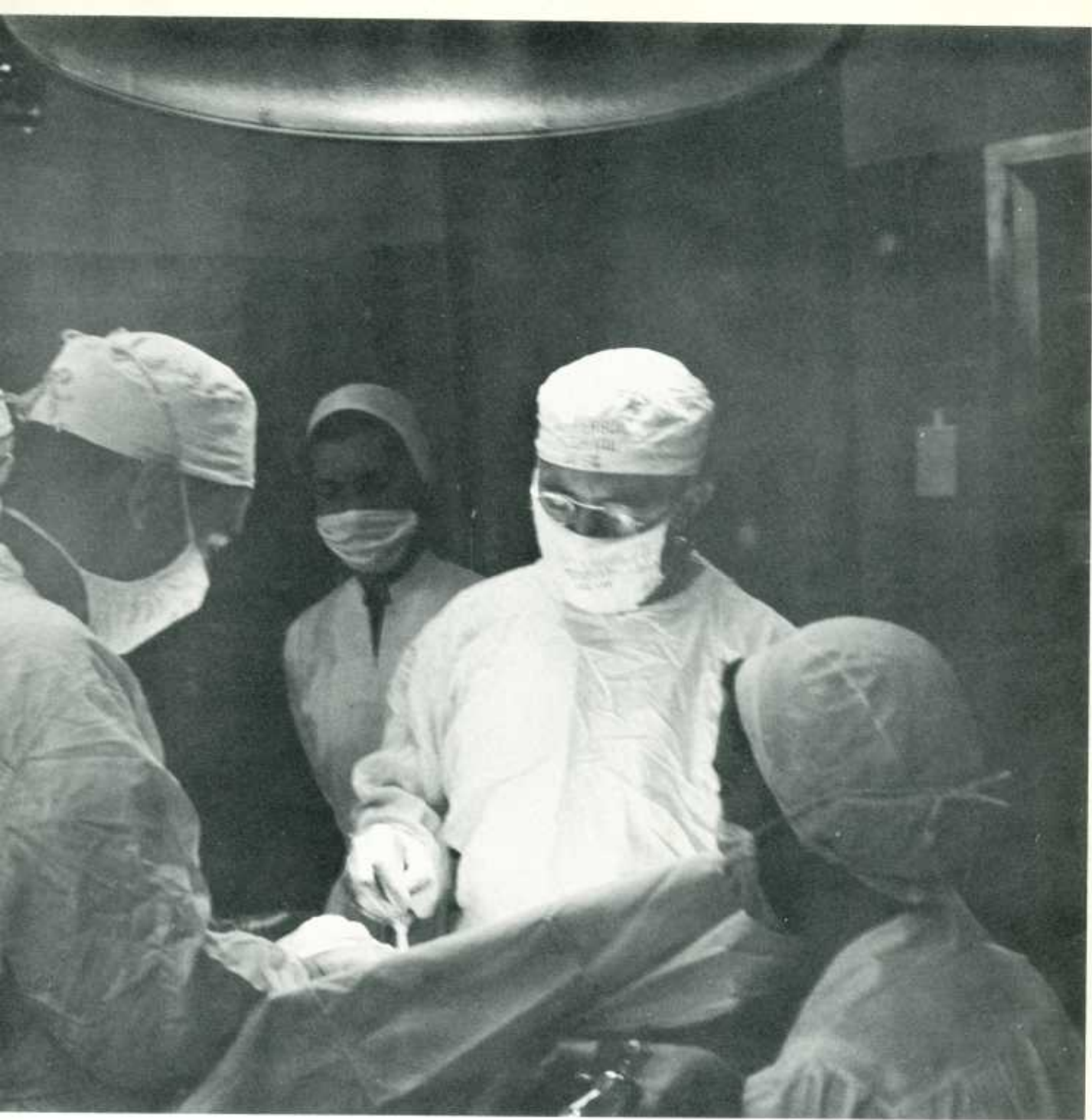

The founder of Jefferson Medical College also founded the Department of Surgery. His position was later filled by men such as Samuel D. Gross, the "Emperor of American Surgery"; William Keen, America's first brain surgeon; and John Chalmers DaCosta who was one of the greatest surgical instructors in the country. The best surgical traditions and ethics have been continued since the inauguration of the department. Today

The early days of obstetrical teaching were marked by pure didactic teaching, until in 1841, Dr. Charles D. Meigs, as the head of the department, dynamically changed the program. An impressive teacher, he championed Jefferson to a place high in the world of obstetrics. In the 1890's Obstetrics was separated from its allied fields, Gynecology and Pediatrics. More significant was

the establishment in 1892 by Dr. Theophilus Parvin of the first real obstetrical clinic and the first maternity. Another leader in the department was Dr. Edward Davis who was among the first to use x-ray for the diagnosis of pregnancy. This distinguished line of successful obstetricians has been maintained in the department, and outstanding teaching is the byword of the present day staff.

In 1892 the Department of Gynecology was founded under the leadership of Dr. Edward Montgomery, who first instituted clinical instruction. In 1921, Dr. Brooke Anspach became Professor, and continuing the fine plan of instruction of his predecessor, initiated a workable plan of section instruction. Presently, Dr. Scheffey, with his fine staff, has fashioned these early ideas into an excellent method of teaching which is received by today's generation of Jefferson students.

Pediatrics was delivered from its "mother department" in 1888 when an out patient department for Children's Diseases was established. The cord, however, was not cut until 1908 when a full professorship gave independence to the department. The credit for this obstetrical work belongs to Dr. Edwin E. Graham. Dr. Edward L. Bauer continued the established precedent of pediatric advancement until he in turn relinquished the task to Dr. Charles F. McKhann, the present department head. The desire of the teaching program is designed not to make a pediatrician of the student overnight, but rather to equip the student for the pediatrics he will encounter in general practice, a policy which is admirably accomplished by Dr. McKhann and his staff.

In 1894 Dr. Orville Horwitz accepted the clinical professorship of Genito-Urinary Diseases, but he had no clinic. Consistent with the increasing role of psychiatry in everyday medical practice, the Department of Psychiatry has been steadily broadening its teaching program. From a rather humble beginning in 1892 as the Nervous and Mental Department, the program now extends through a three year period culminating in three weeks of training at one of three state mental institutions. The student soon becomes familiar with "everyday" psychiatry.

Although divorced from its former mate, the Department of Psychiatry, the Neurology faculty remains on friendly terms in the attempt to complete the student's training of the nervous system. Starting in the sophomore year, the teaching is carefully geared to correlate symptoms and physical findings with the underlying pathology.

Otology was securely introduced to Jefferson by Dr. Laurence Turnbull, who performed the first mastoid operation in America, and who was therefore honored as the "Father of Otology in America." Today this department is firmly linked with Laryngology and Bronchoesophagology under the astute direction of Dr. Fred Harbert.



In 1917, with the election of Dr. Chevalier Jackson to the Professorship of Laryngology, Jefferson Hospital became the mecca of bronchoscopists, and the first Bronchoscopic Clinic in the United States was opened. Dr. Jackson was ably succeeded by Dr. Louis Clerf, who last year retired to become Emeritus Professor. With this auspicious beginning, the department continued to grow and firmly indoctrinate the student in the principles and practices of the specialty.

A Clinical Lecturer in Ophthalmology and Aural Surgery was appointed at Jefferson in 1867, but it was not until 1873 that the first daily clinic for treatment of diseases of the eye was established. It is the purpose of the department to at least acquaint the student with the practice of ophthalmology and firmly correlate ocular findings with the patient's general physiology.

Being one of the younger entities on the faculty and having been born in the Department of Hygiene and Bacteriology, the Preventive Medicine staff has succeeded in demonstrating that this field should be the ultimate aim of all medical practice. This is accomplished both in the "laboratory" at Fife Hamill, and in a short but well-balanced lecture series.

FROZEN SECTION

On September 10th, 1951, one hundred and seventy young men converged on an antiquated building at 11th and Clinton Streets. Not knowing quite what to expect, a tremble at the notions advanced to them, and mustering whatever fortitude they could, these men began a semester which, to a man, they will now tell you was a nightmare they could not face again.

Now, in the last year of school we look at the events that occurred between September and March of that year with kindlier thoughts. It is the pleasantries, the companionship, and the lighter moments that are best remembered in retrospect. We forget so very easily the many unpleasant, psychically traumatic, and indeed even at times the diabolical moments at D.B.I. The edge of fear of D.B.I. has dulled with the years. The Luger of 11th and Clinton now fires only blanks in our fickle memories.

At exactly 9:00 A. M. D.B.I. time, we heard the soft pitter patter of little feet, and a well-developed, very well-nourished, black clad male charged into the Upper Amphitheater. His soft, soothing Southern voice, which was soon to bring most of us close to incontinence of bowel and bladder, welcomed us to our new home.

From the beginning, we learned of Jefferson's physic trauma: the quiz, and the little black book. The first week was devoted to introducing us to both of these. Dr. Michels conducted us through the looking glass of anatomy in four hours on a simmery summery day, and we learned that cat anatomy was not enough. As we readied ourselves for our first big week-end, the words of wisdom of the dean rang in our ears. "Go home, don't eat too much, study no later than 2 A. M., get a good night's sleep, then get up at seven and freshen your memories. Relax Sunday, at least long enough to eat dinner, then don't study too late after midnight so you can be bright and refreshed Monday morning, 'cause Anatomy is an arduous task."

Fall became winter. We greeted D.B.I. in the darkness of the morning and bid it good-bye in the darkness of the evening. Then after six weeks on the end of Dr. Bennett's upper extremity, we faced our first preliminary—to the professors a preliminary, but to us it seemed like a main bout. After this first three-hour workout, we wondered if dental school were this rough.

Mild-mannered, unassuming, quiet Dr. Ramsey, eventually nicknamed the velvet harpoon for these traits, and Dr. De Angelo, who later tried to tune in the World Series for us, reminded us that there was another course at D.B.I. We didn't listen—then one morning they let us know that we would have the opportunity to let them know that we knew what they knew by crystallizing our knowledge. We crystallized it all right, in fact after that one we were stone cold.





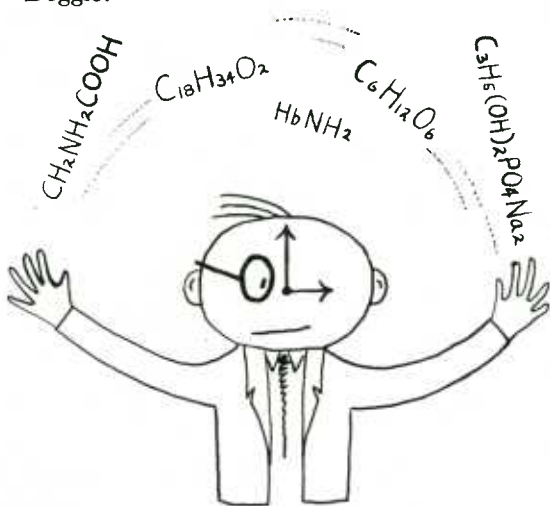
Then came the head and neck and we all wished that we had "killed" the arm test so we could "drop" this one. When grades were posted no one was ever excited. The stampede down stairs was just to make sure everyone else had done all right. We finally resolved ourselves to the fact that anatomy would never end, and we continued onward, ever onward.

But we had our laughs—Remember Dr. Bennett stopping late comers with "Mah name's Bennett, doctor, what's yours?" And who could forget those pleasant visits with Space Cadet Angel in his own little world, or Dr. Hausberger who took two hour dissection carefully in his hands and with a hearty, "Dis ist nicht impawrtant, nie," threw it on the floor. Do you recall Mike's booming voice admonishing us to "Get that nerve! No man ever leaves Jefferson without seeing the nerve to the mylohyoid." We wondered if we could be the first to sneak out without seeing it. Then there were the promenades down the Magenstrasse, trips over Lane's first and last kinks, and crawls on hands and knees to allow the coconuts to fall on the tougher portion of the skin. Mike's best friend, the little man with his head full of buckshot; hanging by his arms from a wire is probably still there, no doubt trying to figure his way back to Meckel's Cave. Reminisce too on the boat trips through the heart with Jack "Little George" Healey who also ran side trips through the middle ear. Long shall we remember him for the time which he gave to us in order that a complex subject might be made simple. Then there was Dr. Hutchinson, the only man who could sleep with apparent impunity in a Bennett lecture, but who was made to pay for his crime finally by being forced to demonstrate his shapely platysma in all its natural glory.

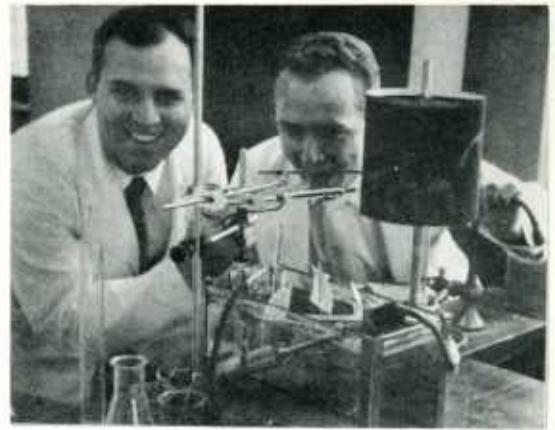
The ace in the hole was Neuroanatomy, and "Green Gloves" Brown chased us up and down the spinal cord. How proud we were when we put our last smudge on our fourteen foot impressionistic mural of the CNS!

But at last it was over. The finals, final finals, and the comprehensive were things of the past, and we were free men. After a day and a half mid-semester vacation, we finally arrived at "Big Jeff" where we found men's rooms on each and every floor. It was not very long until we were swept up and deposited by Dr. Cantarow amidst proteoses and peptides not to speak of the dogs and cats with whom Dr. Thomas placed us in Physiology. Mornings were spent in comfortable and well-heated McClellan Hall while the Auditorium was "healthfully" air-conditioned. Here we heard inspirational lectures on nerve-muscle physiology and were kept busy spiking potentials. Dr. Pincus taught us that the heart had four chambers.

Not knowing any better, and since we saw a stethoscope in his pocket, we believed him. The greatest moment of all was when what appeared to be a white balloon which had been perched on the rostrum gave us a full lecture in physiology. Unfortunately, Dr. Crider was drowned out by the pile driver outside whose schedule was carefully made out to coincide with that of the lectures. This was the term that the hospital construction men spent half their time looking in and we spent most of our time looking out. We learned how to build a hispital, and they learned the origin of the song—"How Much Is That Window In The Doggie?"



April, May and June became sweat drenched memories and we became experimental animals. Summer arrived and human beings, whom we had once resembled, went to the beaches and mountains and we went to vitamins and the hormones. It was a consolation to know that Jefferson was the only Medical school in the country that gave its students the Fourth of July off. We shall always have endearing memories of this vacation, for we spent a delightful day setting off Roman candles and sky rockets in our rooms, celebrating the finals which were closing in upon us.



Memorable too was Biochemistry and Dr. O.1 N. Hansen whose Swedish accent was barely intelligible over the noise of the blackboard as he tried to rattle it from the wall. We ran to the upstairs lectures from the downstairs lectures expending the high energy phosphate bonds which Dr. Rutman so lucidly explained. The greatest race of all was that to the lab to get our exam papers before anyone else saw them. There were many hectic moments as we tried to juggle figures to get out of the lab by three. It was all worth it, for now we were learning medicine, and the administration realized our value, as they saw fit to place us in the nurses' replacement pool in case of an atomic attack.



Suddenly it was over and we were still partially alive. We staggered out onto the streets, left the college behind us for sixty days, and worried about nothing except whether or not we had passed.

SECOND YEAR

The second year started like a race as Pete Herbut tried to beat us to the end of a lecture—he won. Bacteriology was given to us by the old microbe hunter, Dr. Kenneth Goodner, who felt a new north wind blowing down on Philadelphia. He enjoined us not to take notes, and now we know why. In addition to the more orthodox portions of the course we received bits of homespun philosophy on such varied themes as art, Pasteur, music, Pasteur, literature and the French scientist, Louis Pasteur.



In K.G.'s lab we learned much of the nature of man and bacteria and also learned that Pasteur was a small man with a beard and ivy growing around his head. On the side, Dr. Goodner was a bacteria trainer, for his educated cocci could instantaneously look like rods, the rods like cocci, the gram negatives could at will become positive, and the glucose fermenters could become very finicky and ferment only fructose. The coup de grace of course were the acid fast smears in which the only tubercle bacillus had been cleverly hidden in one corner under a monocyte. The highlight of any day was when K.G. flowed among us with his bulging black book and whispered sweet nothings in our ears. In addition to learning such things as how to sterilize a mouse without interfering with his sex life, we learned more than enough about bacteriology.

In contrast, Dr. Herbut, machine-gunned across facts and more facts, day after day, and month after month. Again we became experimental animals as the department changed their testing methods, and never before had we taken an exam where it was possible to end up owing points. We gladly entered the Morgan "Inner Sanctum" and his "Now today, boys," became the class password. This too was the home of smiling Joe McCloskey whose soft spoken commands and theories on educational organization still ring in our ears. There was Dr. Stasney who can still be heard describing the "Radd zells in the toobooles." And still remembered are Dr. Herbut's concise histological descriptions: "The cells are arranged singly, diffusely, in cords, or whorls. They are small or of giant proportions and are round, oval, spindle, polygonal, or irregular. The cytoplasm may be scanty but is usually quite abundant. The nuclei are single or multiple, round, oval, spindle, irregular, frequently bizarre . . ." Then there was Raymond who quietly buried his cigarette ashes as he lit one weed from another and introduced us to the post. Test followed test, practical followed practical, quiz followed quiz, and headache followed headache as we lightly tripped through congenital anomalies, degeneration, inflammation, trauma and finally arrived at neoplasms. In between times, Dr. Sawitz taught us the neat and valuable trick of keeping a specimen can from opening in our pockets.

To prepare us for visits to outlying hospitals and urged on by the military, the administration deemed it necessary to teach us among other things, the neglected art of map reading. Even if we couldn't find the right trolley to PGH we could, with our maps and compasses, get back to Fort Bragg.

In the second half of the year we were blessed with plenty of free time for we only had eight

“curses.” A new problem that we experienced this year was determining just how to wear a stethoscope. We remember well Dr. Gruber and his playmates, Gold, Gargle, Gilligan and Blumgart, whose names were all inscribed on the ceiling of the auditorium.

As part of his course in Pharmacology we learned seven hundred doses, half of which were time-honored remedies culled from the Egyptian Papyrus. Of value was the arsenic-bismuth treatment of lues, which should prove valuable when penicillin runs out. In lecture the good doctor recited from the compends which we so jealously guarded and which were so sought after by unethical students of a certain California medical school the following year. In the lab we learned how much dogs cost by the pound, how to treat a turtle with congestive failure, and what would happen to a rattlesnake when “my friend, Harry Gold” spit tobacco juice down its throat. Best of all—we liked the quiz section when Dr. Gruber sat on our laps while he waited for an answer, and Kratz’s jokes.

Smiling, ever-charming, John Hodges, swam with us through blood and urine and marched us through feces. We learned that the average size of a red blood cell was 5.5 to 9.5 microns, that a promyelocyte has 75 granules, and a few other normal laboratory values which could be approximated if we happened to forget what Dr. Hodges felt was the exact range, without any loss of credit. Here we had the pleasant experience of making our lab partners turn green as we twisted a blunt 18 gauge needle in his arm, and the thrills of examining our own blood smears and finding white cells definitely pathognomonic of leukemia. Remember, too, the practicals where your buddy in front of you forgot to shake up the blood specimen and left you with fifty million erythrocytes for a red cell count. Then there was the delight of being splashed with hot urine by the lab genius across the table who always heated a test tube with you in mind. Perhaps the most glowing tribute to this course is found in the many times that we have referred back to “Hodge’s notes” in subsequent years.

Finally, Drs. Fry and Surver teamed up to give us our first course in surgery. Although it was generally agreed that this was a very fine course, many were disappointed that they were still not allowed to take out even an appendix after finishing.

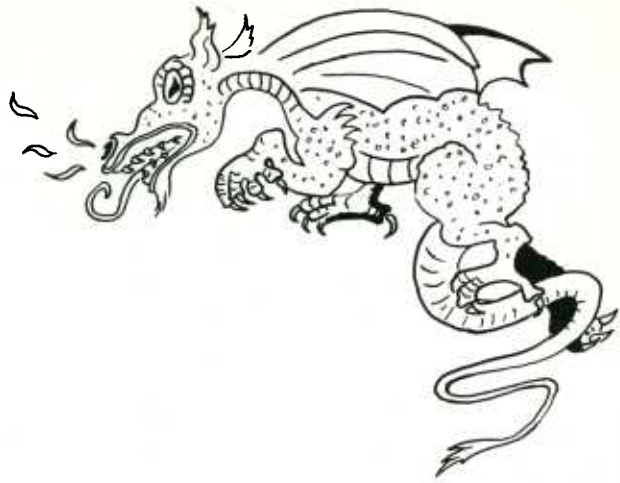
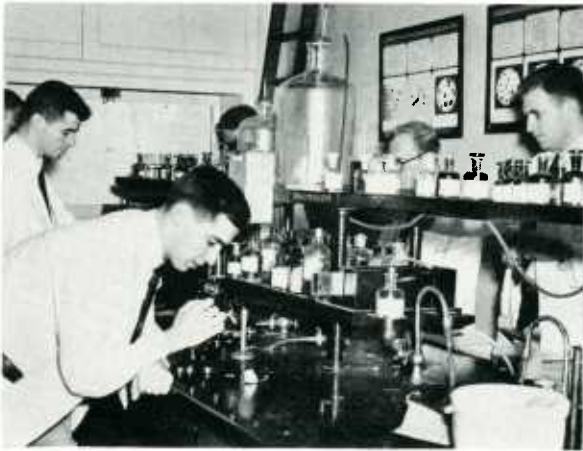
The year ended, the battery of exams passed away, and we felt that the hardest was behind us, for we had done our first physical on a female patient. Two years had ended, the first two years of our medical career, and at this point we knew that they could not have been better.



THE CLINICAL YEARS

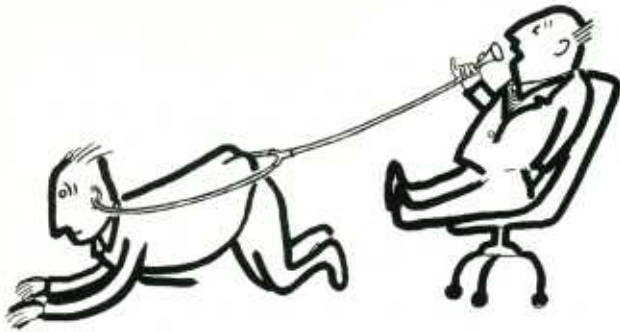
And so the clinical years began. We now set sail well supplied with the necessary charts which we had worked so hard to obtain in our first two years. Our travels were to take us to many ports, each one affording a new view of the vast world of medical knowledge. During our trip, many tried to decide which of these places suited them best while others tried to feel at home in all.

MEDICINE

In Junior medicine we moved into the wards and met face to face, for the first time, real “honest to goodness” sick people. The first task was to exchange pleasantries with “our very own patients” who had already exchanged pleasantries with the senior clerk, resident and staff consultant in the



medical clinic; the interne in the accident ward; and the social service worker, three shifts of nurses, the interne, resident, and attending physician on the medical ward. Although we introduced ourselves as Doctor, the patient somehow got the mistaken impression that we were “low men on the totem pole”. In between running daily PSP’s, circulation times, venous pressures and vital capacities, our training consisted of daily sessions at the bedside. These gatherings were conducted by members of the staff who significantly increased our prestige with “our” patients by addressing us as “mister” from the ubiquitous, omnipotent and obsequious roll book.



The clinical work was supplemented by a fine series of 36 lectures by various men who, being unable to cover the entire assigned subject in one hour, often found it impossible to impart to us much of anything. At the end of the third year, although we knew little about heart or kidney disease, we felt assured that we would never miss a diagnosis of recruitment deafness.

Finally the time arrived, and as seniors in the medical out-patient clinic, the staff valiantly tried to impress us with the idea that the term "croak" referred only to a piece of pottery, and that those numerous croaks with a pain in the left buttock referred to both eyeballs and thence to the clerk's neck, and occurring only after the noon meal, were actually suffering from a clinical entity known as Lindquist's syndrome.

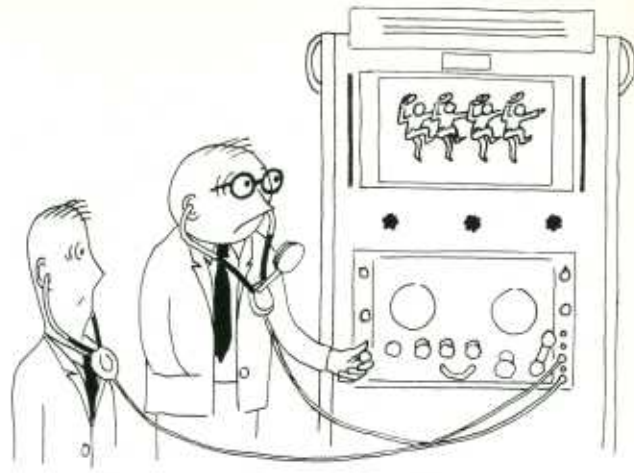


A welcome relief from the psychoneurotics, schizos and paranoids seen in the clinic, who were gainfully employed in the city, were the psychoneurotics, schizos and paranoids seen in the greener pastures at the state hospitals. Here seniors were sent for a three-week vacation; most of them returned!

In Friday's pit, in an attempt to maintain the old Jefferson tradition of turning out homespun family doctors, the Junior and Senior classes were presented with clinical cases selected to demonstrate the more common diseases which we would later meet in practice. We soon realized by these presentations that our practice would largely consist of hemophilia, both "A" and "B", congenital hemolytic anemia, "C" and "D", porphyria, and Rickettsial pox. When such clinical material was available, the staff thought it might be worthwhile to at least acquaint us with some of the more uncommon entities such as coronary artery disease and congestive heart failure.



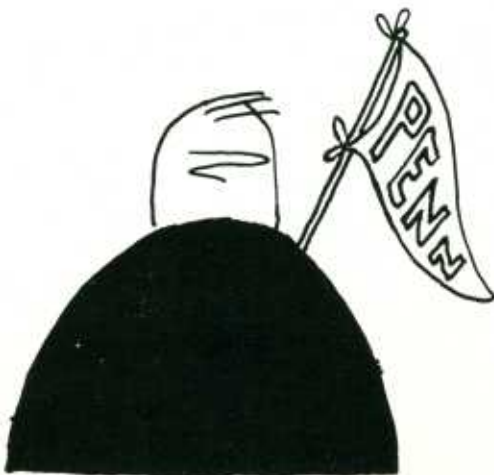
Fortunately, as graduation grew nearer and with more and more conferences, demonstrations and therapeutic pits, we had realized that the overall plan of the medical department had left remarkably few gaps in our training regardless of whether we were to go into general practice or one of the specialties.



SURGERY

In the third year course in surgery we saw the surgical method of Jefferson's psychic trauma. As invited guests of the Wednesday Hour of Charm pit, we watched with mixed emotions as Dr. Shallow and his magic friends caused numerous seniors to develop castration anxiety. Who could forget

each Wednesday at four when the procession entered, led by "Tiny Tom" with collar clasp, followed by Drs. Lemmon, Eger, Fry, Wagner, Manges, Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Beane, and other staff men who, with collar clasps, were also in the vicinity. Following the staff men, came the 4th, 3rd, 2nd and 1st year residents, and three wise nurses from afar bearing gifts in covered pans.



Sitting in the dugout flaunting the colors of the Red and Blue, without a tie clasp, was Dr. Raymond "They shoulda stayed in the Ivy League" Moore who coached the senior team as they played their last quarter.



Then there were the days when the younger men were allowed to take over. There was Dr. "Pop" Lemmon whose questions were of the one word answer type, such as: Give me the anatomy, histology, biochemistry and physiology of the liver, son. The one word answer reverberated loud and clear—Da h-uh.



The material of the Pit was loosely pulled together by some loosely pulled together lectures. Dr. Lemmon in his soft southern accent extolled "the sheltered mahgin of Pupahrt's Ligament" in a series of lectures which we found out later were about hernias. Histrionic Dr. Willauer bade us never to forget that $\frac{1}{4}$ percent procaine would neither get us into trouble nor anesthetize the patient.

In surgery out-patient we got our first taste of blood and pus, and our first smell of an ischio-rectal abscess. Here we felt that we were actually doers of the profession and not hearers only.



Dr. Gibbon's pits were a part of the fourth year curriculum. It was difficult getting used to a surgeon without a collar clasp. Gone was the staid formality and we soon realized that Doc Gibbon knew there was a great deal more to surgery than the I-A Septal defects (which we had previously made synonymous with him). At least you went down to his pit with your own section and didn't have to worry about them laughing at you from the top row.



Surgery in-patient was a real thrill. Here we were allowed to put on scrub suits to watch the surgeon's back while he operated.

When all was said and done, although no new DaCosta's or Gross's had yet shown their faces in the class, all of us had at least received the fundamentals to start us on the way.



Each Saturday morning starting a weekend off right was the "compleat pediatrician", Dr. Norman McNeill. Brilliantly attired in his Ishihara outfits, he crystallized many therapeutic procedures by reminding us that it was like having a small boy urinate off a bridge and expecting a whale in the Atlantic to have a climacteric.



PEDIATRICS

High above the bulk of trials and tribulations of Jefferson Hospital we found relative peace and solitude for six weeks amidst the concerted bawling of the inhabitants of the children's ward. There, calmed and soothed by the soft, friendly and erudite voice of Dr. Charles McKhann, we also learned, painlessly, both the art and science of pediatrics. Scattered hither and yon were pearls of pedantry culled from the J.A.M.A. (Journal of the African Medical Association) by Dr. Felix Karpinsky.



Even though some of us were perturbed at being called out of bed for an emergency case of impetigo, it was generally agreed that the six weeks were well spent, especially afternoon nap-time.



During our senior year, with the aid of the staff, we learned how to treat happy babies and ailing mothers in the out-patient clinic. Here also, we learned that the common cold was!

Despite the good instruction, it was quite apparent that those in the class who knew most about pediatrics were the fathers who had limitless experience sitting up with their kids at night.

OBSTETRICS

Although 95% of the class was innately clever enough to initiate their own delivery spontaneously, it was deemed necessary to spend another 9 months teaching us how a fertilized egg gets from the warm confines of the womb to the cold, cruel outside world.



In obstetrics clinic our biggest problems were learning how to say, "Cuándo tenía su último período?", and not confusing F.H.S. and F.S.H.



The purpose of Junior in-patient ward work was to teach us the true meaning of the word obstetrics which means to "stand by". We feel that the original meaning was too literally interpreted by "primips" in labor, and staff men; although some of us were lucky enough to catch the projective progeny of grand multiparas. As an added feature we learned how to sleep seven men and two manikins in five beds, as well as how to make our bodies utilize carbon dioxide in the anoxemia room.



The clinical work was supplemented by didactic lectures from the faculty members including "Uncle Thad" whose stirring message, on one occasion, was brought to us by tape recording. In these lectures the pitfalls of anesthesia, narcosis, induction and intervention with the natural forces of labor were inculcated into embryonic OB men.

Unfortunately, as we witnessed in the delivery room and outlying hospitals in the senior year, many of the staff members had not attended these lectures.



GYNECOLOGY

Junior gynecology consisted of a well organized course of lectures on pelvic malignancy which was well correlated with demonstrations and lectures on pelvic malignancy on the ward, and which were supplemented by noontime "discussion" hours. These were well mixed with fibroids and pelvic relaxations and garnished with leukorrhea. By the end of the term we were convinced that all big girls were not made of sugar and spice and everything nice. It was here that we learned why a gynecologist must use only one glove—the other hand must be free at all times to hold a roll book! In the senior year in the out-patient department we learned that vinegar had other uses besides seasoning and that those wooden high-ball mixers could also be used for cervical smears.

The art of gynecology was admirably demonstrated by Dr. Scheffey who could put his arm around a patient with metastatic carcinoma in tumor clinic and make her feel as if she didn't have a worry in the world. Important as this art may be, our training was so orientated that the Jefferson graduate, if he remembers the concepts taught, will meet less and less of these hopeless situations.

Throughout the junior and senior years, we have plodded our way through innumerable clinics, OPD's, conferences, wards, and lectures. We have run the gamut of emotions. We have been praised, cajoled, and threatened. We have received much more than we have contributed. The clinics are now memories but the lessons we have learned will continue to be our mainstay as we leave the shelter of "Mecca" and begin our practice of medicine.

Student Council

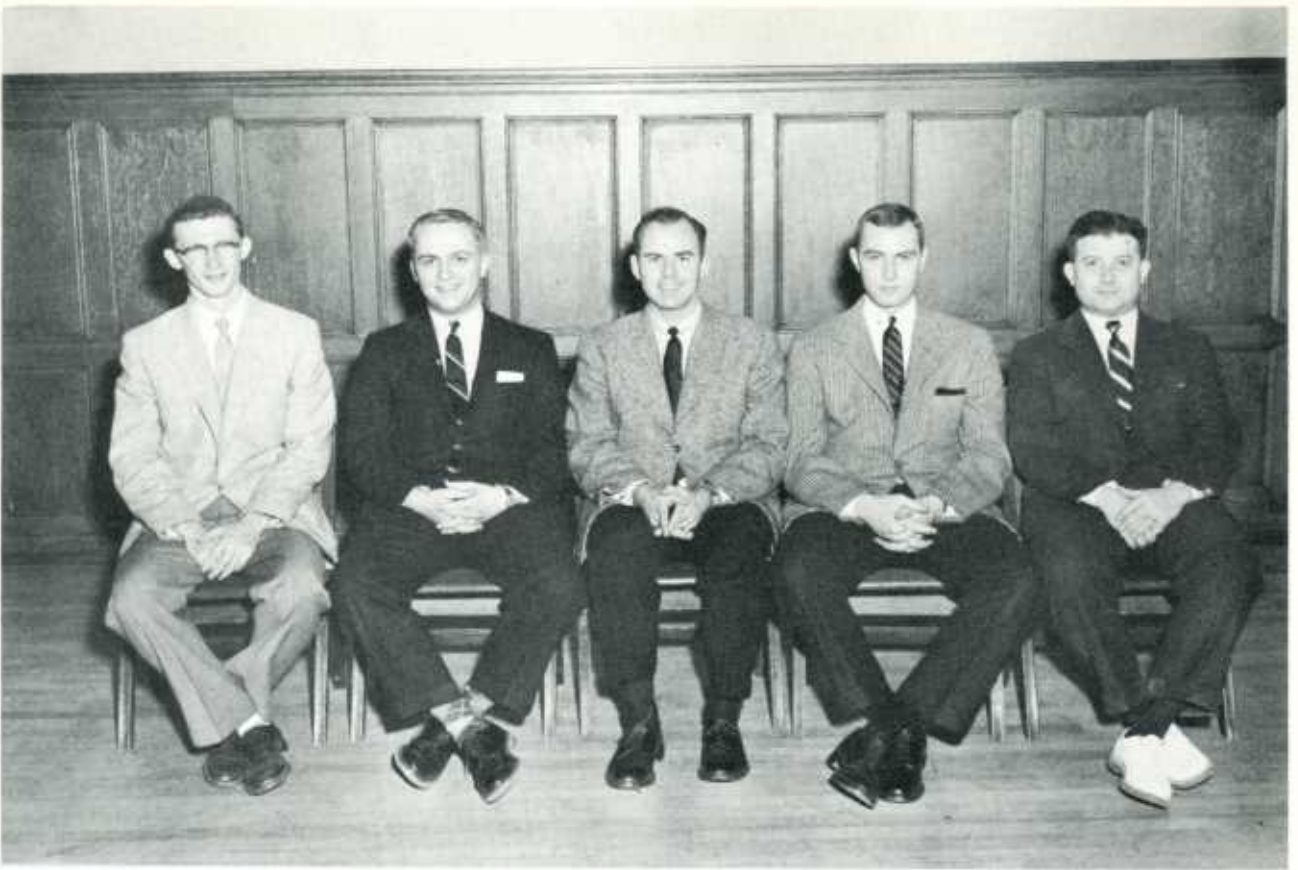

The Forum was organized in 1948 with the object of studying, promoting, and advancing the relatively new science of psychiatry and its allied branches among the Jefferson undergraduates. The society has been fortunate to have had as guest speakers such eminent psychiatrists as Doctors Alfred Noyes, Spurgeon English, Edward Weiss, and Elinor Steele. The Forum's program has consisted of a series of lectures and discussions designed to cover those aspects of psychiatry that are of special interest to the medical student. Its very existence serves testimony to the modern medical student's desire for further understanding of a quite new yet very potential field of medicine.

Kappa Beta Phi

In 1922, attempting to integrate the various fraternal groups at Jefferson, twenty-two men banded together to form the organization known as Kappa Beta Phi. The purpose of this organization was then as now to promote social fellowship throughout the College. Dr. Ross V. Patterson was the first faculty advisor and moderator. He was succeeded by Dr. Eli Saleeby in 1938.

In 1933 Kappa Beta Phi sponsored the first all-school dance, which has come down to us now as our cherished Black and Blue Dance. In 1940 a further and far more valuable function was established, when the yearly profits from the Black and Blue were pooled until a fund of over \$11,000 has been realized. This amount was sufficient to return enough interest to put a Student Loan Fund into effect this year.

Kappa Beta Phi has now a limited membership of 130 men from the Junior and Senior classes.

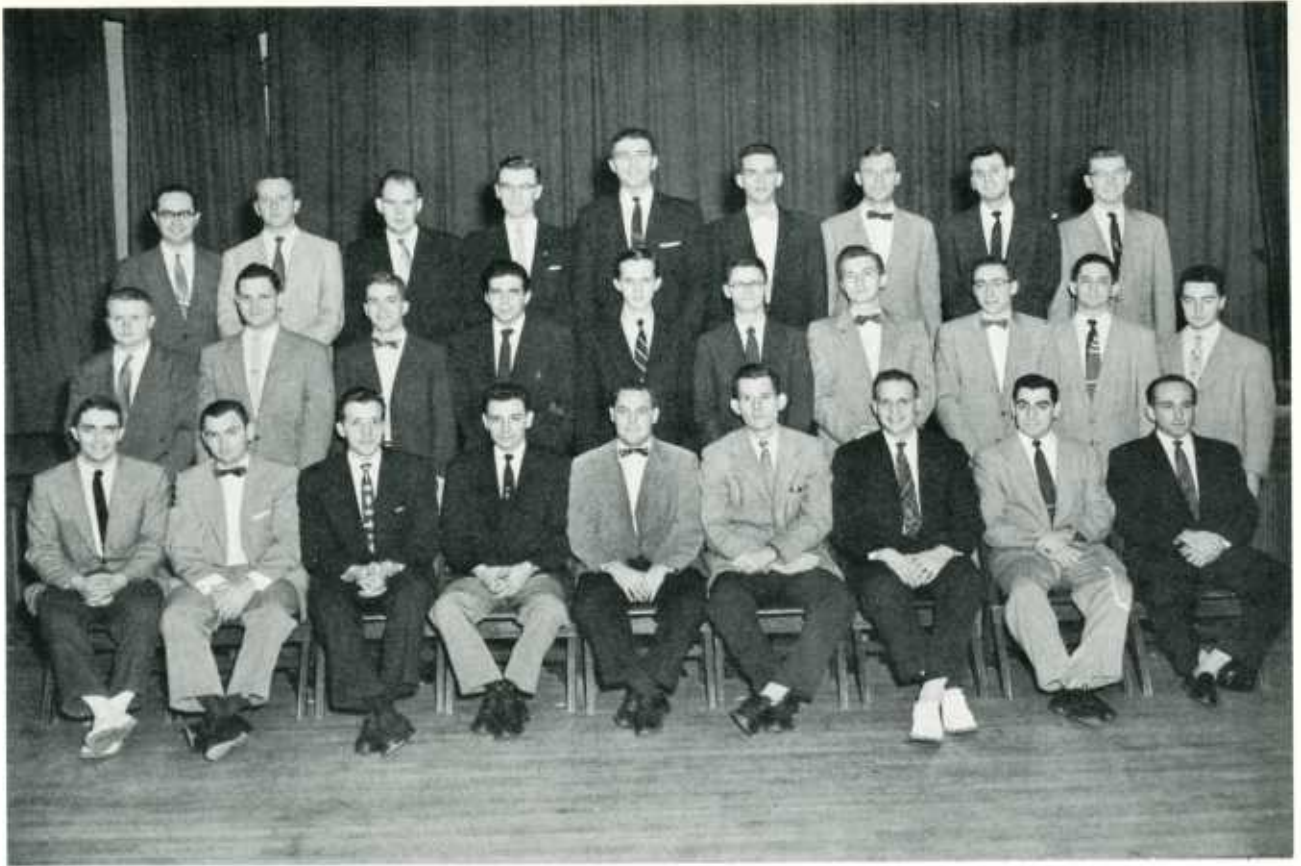

Phi Beta Pi was established on March 10, 1891, by thirteen students from the Western Pennsylvania Medical College, now the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, in protest against the abuses of the fraternity situation as it then existed. In 1932 part of the membership of the former Omega Upsilon Phi joined with Phi Beta Pi, resulting in a substantial increase in membership. From such beginnings arose an organization which today boasts a membership of over 21,000 men and 87 active chapters.

The Eta chapter was established at Jefferson on March 7, 1902, with sixteen men as charter members. The first meetings were held in the Odd Fellows Hall in downtown Philadelphia. 919 Spruce Street followed the original meeting place and served as Chapter House until March 1, 1929, at which time Eta chapter moved to its present location at 1032 Spruce Street.

The National Fraternity of Phi Rho Sigma was founded in Chicago by Milbank Johnson and fellow students at Northwestern University, and in 1904, Rho chapter was granted its charter through the efforts of a group of Jefferson students. The objects of the fraternity are three-fold: first, to promote good fellowship among congenial men; second, to encourage a high standard of professional work; and third, to assist by every honorable means, the advancement of its members.

1954 marks the fiftieth year of Phi Rho Sigma at Jefferson, and to commemorate the occasion, a Golden Anniversary Alumni Banquet was held in the Chapter House in November of 1954 with over 200 alumni, wives, and students in attendance. Theta Kappa Psi

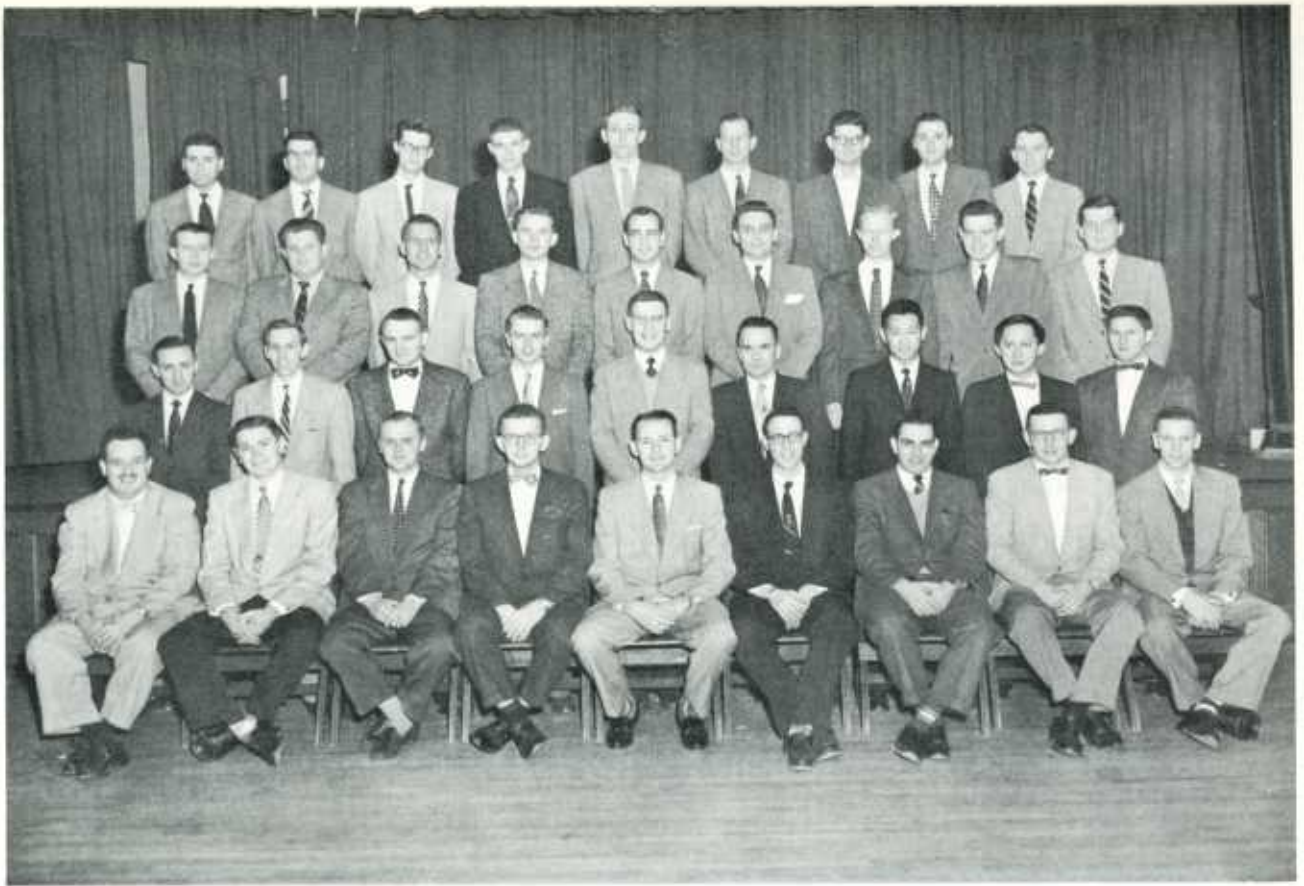
