DOCTOR OF SCIENCE—JOE HENRY COLEY

Joe Henry Coley was born in Alexander City, Alabama. When he was two years old his father, a graduate of Jefferson Medical College, Class of 1880, moved the family of nine children to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, where the senior Doctor Coley practiced medicine until the age of 89 years. It was in this environment that Joe Henry Coley was raised, attended school, and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the Oklahoma City University in 1930. He earned his Doctor of Medicine degree from Jefferson Medical College in 1934 where he was a member of the Phi Beta Pi and Kappa Beta Phi fraternities. He subsequently interned at St. Luke's Hospital in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, and did post-graduate work at the University of Oklahoma.

Doctor Coley has continued to practice medicine in Oklahoma City, following in the footsteps of his father and specializing in Obstetrics and Gynecology. He started teaching at the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine in 1937 and presently is an Emeritus Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at that institution. Doctor Coley has served on the staffs of Children's Memorial Hospital, the Hospital of the University of Oklahoma, and the Presbyterian Hospital, of which he is a corporate member.

Doctor Coley volunteered for service in the United States Navy in 1939, following a family tradition—one brother is a Rear Admiral and another is a Captain. He was the first physician called to active duty from Oklahoma in World War II. This service spanned the years from 1941 through 1945, first with the United States Marine Corps the South Pacific, including New Zealand, and later with the Navy in San Diego, and the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery in Washington, D.C. After the war he was a volunteer medical officer for the United States Marine Corps Reserve Unit, in Oklahoma City and presently is a Commander, Medical Corps, United States Navy, Retired.

Doctor Coley, in addition to his memberships in many medical societies, has devoted much time and energy to civic endeavors. He is Chairman of Teachers Retirement, Medical Board of the State of Oklahoma; an Elder in the Central Presbyterian Church; a founder of the Osler Society, Sportsmans Club and Embassy Club of Oklahoma City; and a founder of Midwest City, Oklahoma.

Doctor Coley's love for Jefferson and his knowledge of its history is equalled only by his endeavors for his Alma Mater. He was a close friend, confidant, and advisor to Jefferson's past President, the late Peter A. Herbut, and is a member of the University's Founders Society. His Alumni activities have included service as Class Agent, member of the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association, and Vice President for the State of Oklahoma. The success of Jefferson's Sesquicentennial Fund Drive was greatly enhanced by his Chairmanship of the Alumni Section. He was selected by the Alumni Association to serve as Alumni Trustee on the Board of Trustees of Thomas Jefferson University, a responsibility he held for six and one-half years—the longest ever served by an Alumni Trustee. During his term as Trustee, which entailed regular commuting between Oklahoma City and Philadelphia, he was particularly interested in the planning for the new Jefferson Hospital, the medical curriculum of Jefferson Medical College, and the caliber of its students. Perhaps Doctor Coley's feelings for Jefferson are best summarized in his own words, "I have a deep sense of moral responsibility to this institution. It gave me a marvelous education, for which I am and shall be forever grateful."

Joe Coley's life has been greatly enriched by his wife, Sarah Billups Coley. Doctor and Mrs. Coley have four children, three daughters and a son.

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE—MARVIN WACHMAN

A native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Marvin Wachman received his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Northwestern University where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He received his Doctor of Philosophy Degree at the University of Illinois in 1942 following which he served with the United States Army in France and Germany during World War II. He began his career in education at the University of Illinois and has served on the faculties of the American University of Biarritz, France; Colgate University; and as a visiting professor at San Diego State College and the University of Minnesota. His particular interest has been in the history of the culturally deprived and the involvement of the urban community in higher education.

In 1961, his leadership qualities in education were recognized when, as a young professor of history at Colgate University, he was selected to be the President of Lincoln University, Pennsylvania. Doctor Wachman's years at Lincoln were distinguished by his ability to maintain tranquility on the campus while continuing to develop a high degree of academic excellence in the school. In 1970 he moved to Temple University as Vice President for Academic Affairs and in 1973 he was appointed President of Temple—the position he holds today.

Doctor Wachman, while administering to the needs of Temple, has been deeply involved in the activities of greater Philadelphia. He has served as a trustee of Thomas Jefferson University, the Academy of Music of Philadelphia, the African State Aid Fund, the Abington Memorial Hospital, the Jewish Publication Society of America, and many others. He is a director of the African Academy of Arts and Research, Inc., the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, the Greater Philadelphia Partnership, the Philadelphia Saving Fund Society, and the Philadelphia Urban Coalition. He also serves as a member of the overseers for the College of the Virgin Islands. His memberships include the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the American Association of University Professors, the American Historical Association, and the American Civil Liberties Union.

Doctor Wachman has made a number of contributions to the literature in education.

He is married to the former Adeline Lillian Schpok and they are the parents of two daughters.

DOCTOR OF SCIENCE—ROBERT IRBY WISE

Robert Irby Wise, a native of Barstow, Texas, received his preliminary education in the schools of Texas and was awarded his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Texas at Austin where he developed his interest in bacteriology and immunology.

He earned his Master of Science and his Doctor of Philosophy degrees in bacteriology from the University of Illinois. He then returned to Texas and began his career as a microbiologist and Director of Bacteriological and Serological Laboratories at the University of Texas Hospitals in Galveston. During this period he developed a keen interest in medicine, matriculated into the medical school at Galveston and received his M.D. degree.

Following graduation from medical school he served his internship at the United States Public Health Service Hospital in New Orleans, Louisiana. He served his residency in internal medicine at the University of Minnesota Hospitals where he began his research in staphylococcal disease at a time when illnesses caused by this organism were rampant in this country and abroad.

Doctor Wise came to Jefferson Medical College in 1955 as an Assistant Professor where he continued his research in staphylococcal disease and anti-microbial therapy. During the ensuing years his research brought him national acclaim and recognition by his peers. He was selected by the Board of Trustees of Jefferson to be the Magee Professor of Medicine and Chairman of the Department in 1959—the position he retired from in 1975.

The Wises then returned to Maine where he and his family had spent a number of summer vacations. However, opportunity again beckoned and he joined the staff of the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Togus, Maine, where he is now the Chief of Staff and where he has continued his productive research in infectious diseases.

Robert Wise has received numerous awards, including the Ashbell-Smith Distinguished Alumni Award, University of Texas at Galveston, and the Julius W. Strumer Memorial Lecture Award, American College of Pharmacy and Science. He has served as a Visiting Professor of Medicine in a number of universities both in the United States and abroad. His portrait was presented to Thomas Jefferson University by his colleagues and friends in 1976 and hangs in the Jefferson Medical College.

Doctor Wise is a member of many societies and organizations, including Alpha Omega Alpha, the honorary medical society; the Association of American Physicians; the Infectious Diseases Society of America; the Philadelphia College of Physicians; and the American College of Physicians where he was a member of the editorial board of the ANNALS OF INTERNAL MEDICINE. Doctor Wise has also served as a member of the Boards of Trustees of Drexel University and the Magee Memorial Hospital. He has made many significant contributions to the medical literature.

He is married to Mary Catherine Dosterschill and they are the parents of one daughter and two sons.

DOCTOR OF LETTERS—JOHN RUSTEN HOGNESS

John Rusten Hogness was born in Oakland, California, attended Haverford College and the University of Chicago where he received his Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry in 1943 and his Doctor of Medicine degree in 1946. He interned and served a residency in internal medicine at the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, and in 1950 became Chief Resident in Medicine at the Kings County Hospital in Seattle. Following this he served a Fellowship in endocrinology at the University of Washington. His career is distinguished by his accomplishments as a physician, as an investigator and author, and as an educator and leader in the fields of medicine, higher education generally, and health care.

While a medical officer in the United States Army during the years 1947-1949, he was assigned to the Atomic Energy Commission in Los Alamos and later to the Department of Research and the Graduate School at Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington.

Doctor Hogness' academic career began at the University of Washington in 1950 where he was appointed to the faculty as an Assistant in Medicine. During subsequent years he was promoted through successive ranks to Professor of Medicine in 1964. His career as an administrative leader in medicine also began at the University of Washington where he was appointed Medical Director of the University Hospital in 1958, Assistant Dean of the School of Medicine in 1959, and Dean of the School of Medicine in 1964. He was appointed Chairman of the Division of Health Sciences for the university that same year and Executive Vice President of the university the following year. In 1970, Doctor Hogness was appointed Chairman of the Board of Health Sciences and Director of the Health Sciences Center at the University of Washington.

Doctor Hogness left the University of Washington in 1971 to become President of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences in Washington, D.C. In 1972 he became Professor of Medicine at George Washington University and a Trustee of Case Western Reserve University in the same year. In 1974 he returned to the University of Washington to become its President. He has also served as a member of the Advisory Board for the Biomedical Science Center at the City College of New York, and as a member of the Council for the Biological Sciences at the Pritzker School of Medicine at the University of Chicago. Doctor Hogness, in 1979, was selected as the President of the Association of Academic Health Centers—the position he holds today.

Included among Doctor Hogness' long list of honors are honorary degrees from the Medical College of Ohio, Haverford College, and George Washington University. In 1976 he was named the Johns Hopkins University Centennial Scholar and two years later he was selected the Cartwright Medalist of Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons.

He has been a consultant to the Atomic Energy Commission, the Veterans Administration, the Surgeon General of the Army, and the Public Health Service. He belongs to a large number of organizations including Alpha Omega Alpha, the honorary medical society; the American College of Physicians; the Association of American Medical Colleges, which he served as a member of its Executive Council; the American Archaeological Society; the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences; the Association of American Physicians; the Royal Society of Medicine of London; and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

THE ACADEMIC COSTUME

The wearing of academic dress dates back to the early days of the oldest universities in the world. In the American Council on Education's book entitled "American Universities and Colleges" it is suggested that "gowns may have been counted necessary for warmth in the unheated buildings frequented by medieval scholars. Hoods seem to have served to cover the tonsured head..."

Throughout the years European universities have continued to show great diversity in their academic dress. American universities, on the other hand, when they decided to adopt academic dress about sixty years ago, immediately established a code of regulations which today is followed by almost all American institutions. The establishment of this code has made it possible to distinguish the Associates, Bachelors, Masters, and Doctors and at the same time recognize the university which has given them the degree.

The Associate in Arts and Bachelor's gowns have pointed sleeves and are worn closed. The Master's gown has oblong sleeves, open at the wrist. The rear part of its oblong shape is square cut and the front part has an arc cut away, and is worn open or closed. The Doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves. It is worn opened or closed. Cotton poplin or similar material is used for the Associate's, Bachelor's and Master's degrees, and rayon or silk ribbed material is used for the Doctor's degree. All gowns are black except for the Associates in Arts degree which is gray.

The hoods vary in length: 48 inches for the Doctor's degree, 42 inches for the Master's, and 36 inches for the Bachelor's and Associate's. All hoods are lined in silk in the academic color or colors of the institution conferring the degree. If the institution has more than one color, the colors are shown in divisions using chevrons. The binding or edge of the Doctor's, Master's and Bachelor's hoods are usually made of velvet in the color designating the subject in which the degree was granted. The Associate of Arts hood has no velvet border. The outside is black.

Black mortarboards are worn for all degrees.

THE JEFFERSON PROCESSIONAL

The Jefferson Processional was commissioned by the Alumni Association of Jefferson Medical College and played for the first time on November 15, 1974, at the Sesquicentennial Celebration of Jefferson Medical College of Thomas Jefferson University. This piece was presented to Thomas Jefferson University by the President of the Alumni Association of Jefferson Medical College, Dr. John J. Gartland. The composition was composed by Burle Marx.

THE PRESIDENTIAL BADGE OF THOMAS JEFFERSON UNIVERSITY

The President's Badge was created for the Inauguration of Lewis W. Bluemle, Jr., M.D., the third President of Thomas Jefferson University, on September 7, 1977. It consists of four official corporate seals of Thomas Jefferson University and the predecessor corporation, The Jefferson Medical College of Philadelphia. These seals were used to mark diplomas, certificates, and other official documents and have been gold-plated to form the Presidential Badge.

The medallion on the President's right is the corporate seal of Thomas Jefferson University today and was created in 1969 when Jefferson Medical College became Thomas Jefferson University. It carries a contemporary likeness of Thomas Jefferson.

The other three medallions are the various seals that were used in Jefferson Medical College for many years. The oldest marked every diploma that was issued by the College from 1839 to 1967. This seal carries a traditional likeness of a young Thomas Jefferson and the founding date of the College as 1826. Prior to 1839 the diploma of Jefferson Medical College carried the seal of the Jefferson College in Canonsburg, Pennsylvania—the parent institution.

Another seal was developed in 1967 as a result of research done by the late Edward L. Bauer, Emeritus Professor of Pediatrics, who determined that the founding year of Jefferson Medical College was 1824 rather than 1826. This seal is identical to the present corporate seal except the words "Thomas Jefferson University" replace "Jefferson Medical College". It was used for only two years—from 1967 to 1969.

The Presidential Badge is on permanent display in the Scott Library and is used at all convocations of the University.
