To Our Patrons.

In this catalogue of our second annual fair we have made but few changes. There will be no entry fee charged for any article or animal unless it is so stated in the catalogue. We have cut down a few of the premiums because we found it necessary to do so to get upon an even footing. We will state for the benefit of those interested in our fair that last year we expended \$145 more than we received, but at the same time we called our fair successful beyond our fondest expectations. There are many people who think that the agricultural societies and fairs in general make a great deal of money, but the facts of the case are that it is a struggle for nearly every society in Maine to pay its running expenses. This year we are out for business. We are going to make every effort possible to have our fair a grand success.* We want the people to say, as they did last year, "I had the best time of all at Dixfield fair. That's the place to go next year." We want to make ours the BEST SMALL FAIR IN MAINE and to do this YOU MUST HELP US.

Last year we had one of the best hall exhibits of any fair in Maine, but many people say "a new broom sweeps clean. It won't be as good next year." Now let us show them it will be as good, and, if possible better. Make something pretty to bring to the hall. Hunt around in your attic and find those old relics of bygone days and take them along for people to see. Don't think entirely of the premium but just think that this is OUR FAIR here at Dixfield and we all want a good one.

Now in regard to the stock exhibit we will say that we would like to see a lot of it there. We are to have a little different arrangement than last year, and it is this. We have not the proper accommodations to keep all the stock during the fair, and so we wish to have the cattle exhibit the first day, and also all other stock except horses. Then this stock can all be carried home the first night, and the next day we will have the horses

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and colts. This will avoid confusion and help us, and we think will make it much better. Bring your stock early in the morning of the day of exhibition.

Another thing which we are to do this year different from last is to pay all premiums at the grounds on the last day of the fair. Please bear this in mind because we wish to settle every bill at that time.

Rules and Regulations.

- 1. All stock entered for premiums shall be in their places the first day before 9 o'clock a m. All entries will positively close at that hour.
- 2. No animals shall be entered for more than one premium except trotting or town teams or herds.
- 3. All animals or articles brought for exhibition must have cards attached with the number as entered at the Secretary's office and placed in such part of the show grounds as shall be designated, and the exhibitors shall in all cases obtain their cards of the Entry Clerk previous to placing their animals or articles on the show grounds, there shall also be similar cards attached to pens containing animals and stating the breed so as to be easily read by the spectators.
- 4. Special care will be taken to preserve safely all articles and stock on exhibition, but the same will be taken only at the owner's or exhibitor's risk.
- 5. If any person shall enter any animal or article he does not own, or in any way obtain premiums by fraud, all such premiums will be cancelled.
- 6. All premiums awarded will be subject to pro rata reduction sufficient to meet any deficiency which may occur in the receipts to meet said expenses.
- 7. All premiums will be paid during the last day of the fair at the grounds. Those not called for on that day will be forfeited.

ENTRANCE.

An entrance fee of 25 cents will be charged each person entering the grounds. Children under 12 years, 10 cents. Children under six, free.

FORAGE FOR STOCK.

There will be a Forage master on the grounds who will furnish hay and grain at market prices.

RULES FOR EXHIBITION.

- 1. No premiums will be paid unless awarded according to the rules and conditions of this list.
- 2. No person shall act as Judge in any class who has any interest whatever where the premiums are awarded.
- 3. Persons who enter animals as thoroughbreds shall furnish certificates of registration and Judges shall satisfy themselves that they are as represented.
- 4. No person shall be allowed to interfere with the Judges during their adjudication and any person who by letter or otherwise attempts to influence the decisions, shall be excluded from the competition.
- 5. Programs for each day's exercises will be published in hand-bills, also any other rules that may be necessary.
 - 6. Premiums withheld from stock not deemed worthy.

PAYMENTS.

Entrance fee, 5 per cent of purse. Five per cent additional will be deducted from winners only.

CONDITIONS.

No nomination will be received nor name recorded without the entry fee as above. Entries by telephone or telegraph will be placed on memorandum, after which, if no entry fee is received within 24 hours, the entry will be dropped from the list and the horse cannot start. This track is a member of the National Trotting Association and the National rules will govern, except hopples allowed, and except where otherwise specified. Mile heats, best three in five to harness. Money divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent. No horse to receive but one money. Six to enter, four to start. Trustees reserve the right to declare off and return money in any class not filling to their satisfaction. The Association will not be responsible for any accident to any person or property during this fair. The management reserve the right to reject any entry not satisfactory to them. Horses entered in one class may name in another without expense, except to pay if started, but a stake entry will not entitle a nominator to a nomination in any class event. Hay, straw and stalls free. Entries will positively close on Monday, Sept. 22, 1902, and must be made to LEON M. SMALL, Sec., Dixfield, Maine.

LADIES' RACE.

No articles in classes 24 to 28 inclusive, will be allowed to be entered for a premium unless it is the handiwork of the exhibitor.

All persons who require space in the buildings or grounds for goods on exhibition must have them in place on or before 12 o'clock M., the first day of the fair, unless otherwise ordered by the trustees, and no articles can be entered after that hour.

No entrance fee will be charged on articles exhibited in the hall, and space will be free to exhibitors, except those selling goods.

No article entered can be removed from the building before 3 o'clock P. M., on the last day of the fair, and no premiums will be paid on articles removed in violation of this rule,

No person shall be allowed to draw more than one premium on specimens of the same lot or collection.

No collection of vegetables or fruit exhibited as a collection for a premium can be entered for any other premium, or as separate artices, or vice versa.
