The National Board of Fire Underwriters reports that the total estimated fire loss for the first nine months of this year was $\$ 213,405,000$. For the same period la
$\$ 245,351,000$, almost $\$ 32,000,000$ more.,
That decrease, of approximately 15 per cent, in fire waste is good news. But it dosen't give us cause to pat ourselves on the back and praise our care, caution and competence.
The fact that over two hundred million dollars worth went up in smoke in nite months amounts to a national disgrace Americans are still the most wasteful of all peoples when it
What caused the destruction margin.
nd, in addition. nswer is easy. People took chances with old or damaged heating, plants. They allowed rubbish to accumulate. They stored inflamable liquids in open containers, or near a source
of flame. They allowed electric wiring to yo unattended, or of flame. They allowed electric wiring to go unattended, or
repaired it themselves. They fossed cigarettes and matches away blindly, letting them fall where they might. They allow ed grass to grow jungle dike on property. And they did a thousand and one similiar things that are close to the heart

If the present trend continues, total fire loss for the year will be in the neighborhood of $\$ 285.000,000$. Almost every dollar of that waste can be laid to someone's carlessness,
