We have one boy named Van Hal working on a Seminar program with a Grinnell Prof and are most proud of such an honor for an isolated farming school such as this.

We have not been standing still, however. Weekly seminars have been held each Friday afternoon. The programs vary from Student Reports on projects to visiting professors. We have had or are scheduled to have profs from Coe, Central, Penn and Grinnell so far.

In addition educational movies have been shown from various industrial companies and more are scheduled to follow. The Data Processing center at Ottumwa gave a fine presentation a couple of weeks ago, when I had to be gone on a debate trip. By the way, I must explain, the students run the whole show, hence my absence is not too severely missed. They also arrange for the programs and make the contacts for each visitor. This way they get prime

experience in meeting the public. Our fall field trip was to Colling Radio Co. in Cedar Rapids where we were most graciously entertained. The Data Processing center was covered rather extensively. The manufacturing, 121/2 acres of building, was sore-footedly covered and explained in fine fashion. Of particular interest was the Apopllo mission electronics and space "magic" that is being done by this firm. This is a real asset to Iowa!

Individual projects are being prepared by all of our local science and math students (whether they are members or not) for the local science fair to be held on March 5, 1965. The Academy juniors will run the show which will feature Atomic Energy from Oakridge, Tenn. The Gov't. is sending the displays and materials just for the fair. We are most proud of this since we featured the Space Mobile last year and had over 3,000 in attendance. The largest turnout in the history of this community of about one thousand souls, and a high school of only 250. We are indeed conveying knowledge and there is reception for it. It would make a real show or magazine article in view of the surroundings and limited facilities—a real view of rural Iowa or America in Action from the rural view.

Outside of this we have just been busy. So thanks again and please pardon my own brand of typing.
