Vertical Road draws inspiration from the Sufi tradition and the Persian poet and philosopher Rumi. Exploring man's earthly nature, his rituals, and the consequences of human actions, Vertical Road becomes a meditation on the journey from gravity to grace.

I met Akram Khan before I had ever actually seen his work. We both spoke of the paths we had taken, of our lives, and of the meaning, the value of the social link created by roads. He explained to me the role of the human body as he sees it—a vector of communication, cultural memory, and personal history. And, then, both of us began to see that our two worlds obviously shared the idea of forming links between people and peoples.

From the confrontation of our ideas on diversity emerged a common image: the Vertical Road. That is also how this partnership came to be.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Akram Khan (Artistic Director/
Choreographer) is one of the most acclaimed choreographers of his generation in Britain.
Born in London into a family of Bangladeshi origin, he began dancing at seven and studied with the renowned kathak dancer and teacher Sri Pratap Pawar. After studying contemporary dance and working with Anne Teresa de Keersmaeker in Brussels, he presented his first solo works in the late 1990s. He was choreographer-in-residence and later associate artist at the Southbank Centre. Khan is currently an associate artist of MC2: Grenoble and Sadler's Wells, London in a special international cooperation.

Vertical Road continues Khan's exploration of the interfaces between different cultures and creative disciplines, bringing together performers and artists from East and West. In his recent work *Gnosis*, he combined his classical Indian and contemporary dance roots. His previous work In-I, a duet with actress Juliette Binoche, toured internationally last year. His company piece bahok, originally produced in collaboration with National Ballet of China, completed its international tour in May 2010. Earlier notable works include Kaash. ma, Sacred Monsters, zero degrees, and Variations, a production with London Sinfonietta in celebration of Steve Reich's 70th birthday. Khan has received numerous awards throughout his career, including an MBE for services to dance in 2005 and an honorary doctorate of arts from Roehampton and De Montfort Universities.

Nitin Sawhney (Composer) is one of today's busiest, most versatile, and most sought after composers. He has made eight studio albums, for which he has been nominated for a Mercury Music prize and won a MOBO, two BBC Radio 3 awards, and a South Bank Show award. He has scored over 40 films; has performed around the world with leading orchestras and his band; composed extensively for dancer Akram Khan, winning a New York Performance and Dance Award for best score for zero degrees; and composed for many theatrical productions. He has worked with Sting, Cirque du Soleil, Shakira, Paul McCartney, Jeff Beck, Tao Cruz, Imogen Heap, and many others. Recently he has written scores for videogames and is currently scoring a major TV series for the BBC, Human Planet. The recipient of four honorary doctorates plus fellowships from the Liverpool Institute for Performing Arts and South Bank University, Sawhney is a judge for The Ivor Novello Awards, the British Academy of Film and

Television Arts, and the British Independent Film Awards and sits on the board of trustees for London's Whitechapel Gallery and Somerset House. Recently he was made an associate artist at Sadler's Wells.

Jesper Kongshaug (Lighting Designer) has worked on numerous theater, opera, and ballet performances, art exhibitions, and television shows. He has created unique lighting designs for the Royal Theatre in Copenhagen, most recently for Wagner's Der Ring des Nibelungen at Den Jyske Opera. His international works include Hotel Pro Forma Operation: Orfeo, The Magic Flute for Boston Lyric Opera, Hair at the Theatre Mogador in Paris, Der Rosenkavalier at Opéra de Lyon, Le Grand Macabre at San Francisco Opera, and L'École des Femmes in Dramaten, Stockholm. He was lighting designer for lesper lust Opera for Performa05 in New York City, La Traviata (2007) at Stockholm Opera, Goya with Placido Domingo (2004) and Le nozze di Figaro (2008) at Theater an der Wien, Don Carlos (2009) at Royal Danish Opera, and The Nutcracker (2009) at The Royal Ballet. Kongshaug has done architectural lighting design as well as several high-profile large-scale light installations. His awards include the Danish Lighting Prize (2008) for his design for the new Royal Playhouse and the Nordic Lighting Prize, Helsinki (2008). Kongshaug teaches at the Danish School for Design and the National Danish Theatre School and acts as consultant for museums, the Tivoli Gardens, and private firms.

Kimie Nakano (Costume Designer) studied literature in Tokyo, theater costume at L'École National Supérieure des Arts et Techniques du Théâtre in Paris, and theater design at Wimbledon School of Art in London. She was an assistant designer at Opéra de Paris and the Saito Kinen Festival. She assisted in designing costume for films, including 8 1/2 Women by Peter Greenaway, and designed for the short film Basho. She designed for the award-winning play Yabu no Naka, directed by Mansai Nomura at the Japan Art Festival 1999. Her collaboration on Megumi Nakamura's Sandflower received the gold award in the Maastricht Festival 2000 in Holland. Nakano's international design work includes the Ali to Karim USA tour (2008); Pas, pas moi, va et vien at Théâtre National Populaire, Lyon (2006); The Oslo Experiment at Stratos Oslo (2007); and 2 Graves at Arts Theatre and the Edinburgh Festival in the UK (2006). Directorial credits in the UK include Snow for the ENO studio and 8:15 for the Rambert Dance Company. Nakano is currently based in London and Burgundy, France.

Faroog Chaudhry (Producer), born in Pakistan, graduated from the London Contemporary Dance School in 1986. He worked in a variety of dance mediums around Europe, including as a company member of the Belgian modern dance company Rosas in the mid-1990s. In 1988 he received an Asian Achievement Award for his work as a dancer. After retiring from dancing in 1999, he completed an MA in Arts Management from City University in London. As a freelance dance manager, he teamed up with Akram Khan in 1999. A year later they co-founded the Akram Khan Company. As the company producer, Chaudhry plays a key role in forming innovative business models for Khan's artistic ambitions and offers creative support during the development of Khan's projects. He is a "project champion" for Arts Council England's Cultural Leadership program, chair of Dance UK's board, and a member of the Strategic Advisory Committee for the Clore Leadership Programme. In February 2011, Chaudhry became an honorary artistic advisor to Guangzhou Opera House in China. The French Ministry of Foreign Affairs acknowledged him in a list of the world's top 100 cultural actors and entrepreneurs in 2008.

Fabiana Piccioli (Technical Director) studied philosophy at University La Sapienza di Roma. From 1999 to 2002 she worked as a dancer in Rome and Brussels. She then became technical coordinator and production manager at the Romaeuropa Festival before joining Akram Khan Company as technical manager in 2005. She was lighting designer for the company's productions *Variations*, bahok, and *Gnosis* and for the Svapnagata Festival at Sadler's Wells. She also co-designed the set for bahok.

Eulalia Ayguade Farro (Dancer), from Barcelona, Spain, studied at the Institut del Teatre before moving to Anne Teresa de Keersmaeker's Performing Arts Research and Training Studio in Brussels. From 2001 she worked with Publik Eye Company, Denmark, and then joined Akram Khan Company in 2003. She has also made her own work with Anton Lachky and worked with Enclave Dance Company (Brussels) and Hofesh Shechter, performing in *Uprising* and *In Your Rooms*.

Konstandina Efthymiadou (Dancer) trained in rhythmic gymnastics for 10 years before entering the State School of Dance in Athens. She worked with Choreftes, the Hellenic Dance Company, Haris Mandafounis Contemporary Dance Company, and the National Opera of Greece. In 2007 she moved to Brussels to join Ultima Vez for the creation

of Menske and toured Spiegel in 2008. In 2009 she joined Enclave Dance Company under the direction of Roberto Olivan.

Salah El Brogy (Dancer) was born in Ismailia, Egypt. He began dancing professionally with the Ismailia Folkloric Dance Troupe and worked with Reda Folkloric Dance Troupe, the biggest dance troupe in the Middle East, before moving to Cairo to pursue a diploma in dance. After graduating from the Contemporary Dance Theatre School in the Cairo Opera House, he became a member of its troupe as a soloist and has since started developing his own technique.

Ahmed Khemis (Dancer) was born in Algeria and has lived in Tunisia since he was eight years old. At age nine he joined the Sybel Ballet Theatre under the direction of Syhem Belkhodja. In 2002 he joined the National Centre for Contemporary Dance in Angers and in 2005 danced at the Suresnes Cités Dance Festival. He created a solo piece for the Spring of Dance Festival in Tunis, was invited to the Montpellier Dance Festival to perform a solo created by Odile Duboc, and has worked with the Montalvo-Hervieu and Georges Momboye companies.

Yen-Ching Lin (Dancer), born in Taiwan, studied at the Taipei National University of the Arts and the London Contemporary Dance School (LCDS), where she completed the postgraduate diploma program and obtained an MA in Contemporary Dance. At LCDS, Lin worked with choreographers such as Maresa von Stockert, Charles Lawrence, Jonathan Lunn, and Jan de Schynkel. She was a member of Edge 05, joined the Bern Ballet in 2006, and danced for Hofesh Shechter Company from 2007 to 2010.

Andrej Petrovic (Dancer/Rehearsal Director) was born in Bojnice, Slovak Republic, and graduated from the Dance Conservatory in Banska Bystrica before joining Študio Tanca Professional Dance Theatre. He is one of the co-founders of the professional dance company Dajv. He has collaborated with Editta Braun Company (Salzburg), Fatou Traore (Brussels), and Giorgio Barberio Corsetti and Fatore Kappa Physical Theatre (Rome). He graduated in Dance Teaching from the University of Music and Dramatic Arts in Bratislava and worked with Jean Abreu Dance Company in London and Jaroslav Vinarsky in Prague before joining Akram Khan Company in 2007.

Elias Lazaridis (Dancer) was born in Kavala, Greece. He started dancing at the age of eight in classical ballet. After high

school he studied dance in Athens, where he performed with the Greek National Opera and the Adlib Dances (Kat Valastur). After his graduation in 2004, he continued his research with Anne Teresa de Keersmaeker's Performing Arts Research and Training Studio in Brussels. He is currently based in London and has performed with the Hofesh Shechter and Eastman companies.

Sung Hoon Kim (Dancer) was born in Seoul, Korea. He graduated from the Korean National University of Art with an MA in Dance Performance. Since 2004 he has been a member of the Laboratory Dance Company in Seoul. He teaches extensively and has performed and choreographed for numerous venues and festivals around Korea and internationally. He joined Akram Khan Company in 2009.

ABOUT THE COMPANY

Akram Khan Company, founded in August 2000 by choreographer Akram Khan and producer Farooq Chaudhry, journeys across boundaries to create uncompromising artistic narratives. One of the foremost innovative dance companies in the world, the company is renowned for its intercultural, interdisciplinary collaborations and for challenging conventional ideas of traditional dance forms. The dance language in each production is rooted in Khan's classical kathak and modern dance training and continually evolves to communicate ideas that are intelligent, courageous, and new.
