Georgianna J. Laroche was born Georgianna J. Roberts to Mr. James Roberts and his wife the former Miss Mary Henley on January 8, 1820. Georgianna attended Chatham Academy. She excelled at history and arithmetic. At the age of 14 Georgianna married Mr. Isaac D. Laroche on December 1. 1834. They had a total of twelve children seven of whom reached maturity. She died giving birth to her last child on September 14. 1860.

Mrs. Georgianna J. Laroche, formerly Miss Georgianna J. Roberts,¹ was a native of Savannah, Ga.² Born to James and Mary Roberts³ on January 8, 1820.⁴ Georgianna attended The Chatham Academy, and received honors in arithmetic and history as a member of the first class at the age of eleven in 1831.⁵

Georgianna was married to Mr. Isaac D. Laroche a native of Augusta.⁶ The ceremony took place at Christ Church of Savannah on December 1, 1834, the Rev. E. F. Neufville officiated.⁷ Georgianna and Isaac apparently lived with her family for at least the next six years as no Laroche appears in the 1840 census.

Georgiannas! husband Isaac was the grandson of Isaac Laroche. This Isaac Laroche and his brother John, one of the twelve original trustees for the state of Georgia as appointed by King George II, Came to Savannah in 1733 to help in "planning and laying out the present city of Savannah.". Isaac settled in Augusta and married Miss Elizabeth Drummond. Their son Isaac married Eliza Oliver, and they had Isaac D. Laroche.⁸ He came to Savannah and married Georgianna. After Georgiannas death Isaac remarried twice. The first time he married Josephine Adams.⁹ He remarried a second time in 1864 to Marie A. Richards.¹⁰

Isaac was a very active businessman as can be witnessed by the

number of transactions recorded in the Superior Court deed books.¹¹ Isaac was a commercial merchant and auctioneer by trade.¹² He was also the leading cotton factor in the state of Georgia.¹³

Isaac was apparently concerned for the well-being of Georgianna and their children.¹⁴ He bought them a seperate lot, number (5) five Pulaski Ward, next door to their existing lot. 15 It was bought for the seperate use and behoof of Georgianna J. Laroche, his wife for and during her life."16 This property along with the "following negro slaves- Claudia, Osborne, Jim, Tricia, Sally and George, Jack and Moses-" were put into the hands of George H. Gordon as substitute Trustee on May 19, 1850.17 At this time Georgianna and Isaac had three living children; Alice. Ruth. and Elizabeth.¹⁸ They also had three children who died before the 1850 census was taken. Mary who died in 1841,19 Isaac who died in 1850,²⁰ and James who died in 1849.²¹ By the census of 1860 They had seven living children; Alice, Ruth, Amy, Ellen, Ida, John, and Isaac.²² This Isaac was (1) one at the time of the census.²³ Georgianna and Isaac were apperently hesitant about naming another son after his father. John, listed in the 1860 census with Isaac was two years older than Isaac. Another son had been born to them in the middle of the 1850's. His given name was George.24 Elizabeth who was mentioned in the 1850 census as being one year old, was not listed in the 1860 census.²⁵ I can only guess that she died but their is no reference affirming this. They also had another daughter in the 1850's. Laura who died in 1856.26

Alice Laroche the oldest daughter of Georgianna,27 married Mark Edga Williams on December 17, 1860.²⁸ Amy married Wm. E. Dunwoody on January 3, 1870.²⁹ Ruth married Rudolph R. Richards on April 11, the year is not given.³⁰ Ellen married Felix Lessing on August 11, 1870.³¹ Ida married Theodore Hunt on July 12, 1874.³² Isaac D. married a Miss Ernst, and Robert D. married Miss Mary Celia Olsen.³³

Georgianna died on September 14, 1860 probably from childbirth complications. Her last child, Robert, was born September 2, 1860 only twelve days before Georgianna died.³⁴

Not much information could be found concerning Georgianna. It is logical to assume that she was brought up with the duties of a housewife taught to her. Even if she had not been taught in her younger years how to be a good house the fact that she had twelve children within twenty years would have taught her just as well.

I did not have a chance to research her fathers family.
