


Biography

Captain James Floyd Ray was born August 17, 1937 in Baldwin County, Georgia to parents Claude Elbert Ray (1908-1996) and Annie Joe Moye Ray (1911-1999), according to Findagrave.com. Ray graduated from the United States Military Academy in the class of 1959. While at West Point, he became a Rhodes Scholar. He studied philosophy, politics, and economics at Oxford University and planned a career path in international economics. Ray was a distinguished student, graduating from West Point second in his class. James Floyd Ray married Charlotte Ruth Walters in Smith, Texas on July 12, 1961, according to the Smith County Marriage Records database found on Ancestry.com. He considered himself a Protestant. Also noted on the Findagrave.com page is that during his time in the Army, Floyd served as the Captain of the SD 5891 company in the 99th province in the 4th Infantry Division, Fort Lewis, Wash. from 1963-1964. Following that, he served in the Military Assistance Command, Vietnam (MACV) from 1964-1965. While serving in this position he helped advise generals and ground troops on battlefield tactics and logistics. On January 9, 1967, Ray was killed by gunshots or small arms fire while on the ground in Vietnam, according to the U.S. Select Military Registers database found on Ancestry.com. His body was recovered. While his military career lasted only four years, he was revered by friends and family with many commenting on his valor, honor, and courage and many saying he had the potential to become a member of the Joint Chiefs Commission.








