ADVISOR RESIGNS

April 23, Syracuse, New York-- Dr. William Stiteler announced his resignation as <u>Not-</u> <u>Hole</u> faculty advisor in a nationally telecast news conference this afternoon.

Stiteler has been the target of intense campus pressure following allegations that he had purchased (given a mound shaped distribution) 68% ± one standard deviation of this year's Not- Whole supplies at the Varsity. An investigation of the charges revealed repeated irregularities in Dr. Stiteler's behavior. A two person (really 1.96 person) investigative panel concluded, "without a doubt" that Dr. Stitler used Not-Whole funds to buy himself lunch at the Varsity, and may have squandered the remainder of the budget on gambling debts, video games, and ice cream sandwhiches.

gum balls, birth control devices and Skoal.



FINALS CANCELED

In her first move as President of the College, Mrs. Hasenstab announced the cancellation of finals. E.B. Nifkin, reached for comment at his home in Tully said, "This is the first time in my 52 years at ESF that finals have been cancelled. I hope this is the start of a new tradition."

Hasenstab offered the announcement without comment at her first press conference. She did not offer any alternative method for assigning grades, but many professors have commented they feel this move will have little effect on their classes.






