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
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POLICY AND DEADLINES

for the impact of austerity--and plan far enough ahead in order to avoid having to take constrictive measures in a hurried manner.

In recent months, with as wide consultation as possible, we have been discussing ways in which to bring about greater economy in the College's operation. We are determined that such economies will contribute to strengthening the quality of our program efforts and enrich the accomodation of faculty and students as they fulfill their respective aspirations in program activity.

We have, therefore, concluded that we should cut back <u>temporarily</u> the use of our Warrensburg campus, leaving appropriate guardianship in the hands of a minimum staff there to protect the properties and insure the continuation of critical research efforts. The two 5-week sessions of the School of Forestry's Warrensburg's program will be consolidated into one session and will be held at another location.

There are other similar shifts being discussed, such as the relocation of the Cranberry Lake Biology program. Further discussion is required, however, before any definite decisions can be reached regarding that program, or others.

There will be one significant administrative organizational modification in the consolidation efforts that we are making. Effective immediately, the Director of the Forest Technology program at Wanakena will be reporting to Dean John Berglund of the School of Forestry. Thus the Forest Technology program will become more closely related to the administration of the School of Forestry. We believe that this will benefit both the School of Forestry and the Wanakena enterprise.

As each of you knows, the problems faced at ESF in fiscal constraints are common throughout the educational community in New York and far beyond. While we must make every effort to accomodate to those realities, we want to assure all members of our College community that the shifts we are now making or may make in the future, will be designed, where possible, to strengthen program quality. That being the case, we are confident that those who are active in any of the program areas affected will want to cooperate to take full advantage of any opportunity provided in these reconfigurations to assure the continuation of the excellence which has long since become the hallmark of ESF's programs.

The New York Public Interest Research Group Inc., (NYPIRG) will hold its general interest meeting on Wed., Sept. 22, at 7:30pm in Newhouse I Lounge. All students and members of the general public are invited.

Arthur Malkin, NYPIRG's Legislative Director in Albany, will speak about social change in the 80's, and how Syracuse University and Forestry School students can take part in affecting public policy. Malkin will discuss two of NYPIRG's recent victories in the New York State Legislature, the enactment of the "Bottle Law", which will mandate that all beverage containers be returnable, and the State Superfund, which will help pay for the clean-up of toxic waste dumps. He will also discuss NYPIRG's plans for the upcoming year, including issues ranging from the nuclear weapons freeze campaign, to high utility rates, toxic chemicals, and nuclear power.

NYPIRG is a non-profit, nonpartisan research and advocacy organization directed and supported by New York college and university students. Consumer protection, higher education, energy, and the environment are NYPIRG's principal areas of concern.


